The pool, in the planning stages for several years, will require 90 working days for completion. Parks and Recreation Department Chairman Gene Chitwood has described the pool as in the shape of a "plus sign."

The pool will have about 80% "swimming water." Chitwood noted that swimming water at depth around four feet. The deep water area is as deep as 12 feet. Three diving boards are to be located around the diving well.

Shallow water and a baby pool will provide adequate play area for young children.

The pool will feature a filtration system to keep the water clean and purified at all times. Water consumption at the new pool will be drastically reduced from the present non-filtered pool.

Construction plans for the bath house, refreshment center and fence have not been completed. These facilities are scheduled to begin undergoing construction as soon as pool construction will permit.

**DIVERTED ACREAGE** Acreage diverted under the 1969 feed grain and wheat programs may now be used for livestock grazing, Robert L. Melbern, Chairman of the Coryell County Agricultural Sta-bilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, has announced, Grazing can begin now. He reminded farmers that under normal circumstances no grazing is permitted on acreage still under contract in longterm land retirement programs such as the Conservation Reserve and the Cropland Adjustment Program. In counties designated for emergency assistance because of natural disaster, county ASC committees

may permit haying and grazing on these lands. Today's announcement affects only livestock grazing on

land diverted under annual commodity programs. No diverted acreage may be harvested, again with the exception of those counties designated for the emergency program, where both grazing and having may be permitted by county committees.

Diverted acreage is land set aside from crop production by farmers participating in voluntary commodity programs. Diverted acreage must be kept in conserving uses, Among other provisions, this means no livestock may graze during

the growing season, (May 14-October 14 this year in Coryell County) Vegetative cover is required to be maintained to protect the diverted land from erosion.

Public benefits are provided by conserving use of diverted acres, Melbern said, as wellas protection of the farmer's land, By helping prevent soil erosion, conserving uses help keep water run-off more silt-free than if the land were left idle but unprotected. Diverted land also provides many thousands of acres of wildlife habitat.

Cotton farmers are reminded to turn in cotton production for the years 1966-67 and 1968 now, as cotton yields will be considered soon. Forms have been mailed to all farms with cotton allotments. If the years 1966-67 have previously been reported, acreage is already entered on the form before the form was

mailed. Farmers are reminded that fall grazing of diverted acres is now permitted. This is the acreage farmers have kept out of wheat, feed grain and cot-ton under the 1969 Farm Programs. Since conserving use is required, livestock may not be grazed on diverted acres during the growing season.

However, the prohibited grazing

period is now over.

# **Unlimited Spending On Construction May Deflate Buck**

construction projects, no mat-. ter how worthwhile they may be, would cause more inflation and could make the dollar as worthless as the German Mark after World War I, Texas Congress-man W.R. (Bob) Poage said during discussions on the Public Works Appropriation Bill.

As passed by the House and pending now in the Senate, the measure included among other items \$600 million in new funds for waste treatment facilities. Poage voted for the bill and supported the \$600 million figure, which the Administration said was all it could prudently spend in a year.

The veteran lawmaker's views on the long range effects of unbridled spending were expressed in response to urgings he received from persons advocating the appropriation of one billion dollars on waste treatment facilities. In response to one individual who wanted this amount raised, Poage agreed to the desirability of providing all the facilities of this kind the Nation needs as soon as it can be done.

"It would also be desirable to provide all of the hospitals that we need," he continued, "all of the roads and airports that we need; all of the schools and

**MRS.GOSSETT** 



# American Red Cross Trying To **Relieve Captive Gl's**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct., 1969--The American Red Cross is intensifying its efforts to open channels of communica-tion and relief to U.S. servicemen being held as prisoners of war in North Vietnam.


A resolution sponsored by the American society urging that prisoners of war be given the benefits and protection of the Geneva Conventions was adopted without a dissenting vote last month by the representatives of 77 governments and 91 national Red Cross societies attending the quadrennial International Conference of the Red Cross in Istanbul.

Last week the American Red Cross followed this action with a cable message to Red Cross societies in all parts of the world, asking that they appeal to the Red Cross society of North Vietnam to take appropriate steps to insure that American prisoners are receiving the hu-mane treatment called for in the Conventions. The Red Cross societies were also urged to have their governments address similar appeals to the government of North Vietnam. In commenting in the Senate on this action last week, Senator J. William Fulbright of Arkansas said, "Irrespective of the nature of the conflict which gives rise to his imprisonment a captor should be mindful, in the words of the Convention, that a prisoner is in the hands of a detaining power 'as a result of circumstances independent of his own will.' He should, as recited in the International Red Cross Conference resolution, be promptly iden-tified; afforded an adequate diet and medical care; permitted to communicate withother prisoners and with the exterior; promptly repatriated if seriously sick or wounded; and at all times be protected from abuse or reprisals. And, as specifically prescribed in the Convention, a neutral intermediary such as the International Committee of the Red Cross should be afforded free access to prisoners of war and their places of detention,' Earlier, the Senator pointed out that the steps taken by the International Red Cross Conference and the American Red Cross are not only entirely ap-propriate, but " should command the support of all men of good will."

American officers and enlisted men are known to be prisoners of war in North Vietnam and 918 others are missing and be-lieved captured. Both through the world Red Cross organiza-tion and through diplomatic and other channels, the American Red Cross has sought unceasingly since the beginning of the Vietnam conflict to assist U.S. prisoners.

North Vietnam signed the 1949 Geneva Conventions covering

Chairman, who presented the October theme, "Education: Whose Responsibility?" A 12minute film entitled "Just One More" was shown. It was a Texas State Teachers' Association film which portrayed the teacher's role in the complete education of our children. Mrs. White then introduced guests for the evening: Mr. Doug Smith, President of the Board of Education; Mr. James

R. Powell, member of the Board; and Mr. L. C. McKamie, Superintendent of Schools. These men told about the workings of a school board and answered questions from the audience. Some of the questions and answers follow:

Q. What is the main function of the school board?

A. To set the policies of the school district. Changes must be made each year to comply with new school laws. The board sets the policies to be used in the administration of these laws. The board watches for and recommends any needed changes and improvements in the schools. Probably the hardest and most important job is to hire a new superintendent when the need arises.

Q. Does the board meet at set intervals, and do the members receive a salary of any kind A. The board meets the se-

cond Tuesday night of each month. There is no salary. Q. As a board, how do you arrive at decisions?

A. First, a "round-table discussion" of the matter. There must be a deep concern discussion" of the matter. There must be a deep concern on the part of board members of Patriotism." A. By public election (Mr. Smith noted here that there is usually a poor turn-out for school board elections and that citizens should be more interested in who is elected to the board "since we handle maybe a million dollars a year of ŸOURmoney."

Q. How many are on the board?

A. Seven. Serving at this time are: Doug H. Smith, Pres-ident; Dan Edwards, Vice-President; Ray Byrom, Sec-retary; and Jack Saunders; Fred Koch, Jr.; Hal N. Anderson; and James R. Powell. (At this point it was noted that none of the present board members were present board members were serving at the time the elementary and senior high schools were built, and that the junior high building was already on the planning board before any of these men were elected, Mr. Smith sympathetically pointed out that Mr. McKamie had been through all three!)

Q. In waiting for a break in high interest rates before going on with the building program, will any such savings more than offset the current rise in cost of materials and labor?

A. This has been considered, and we feel that in all probability, it will more than offset this increase. If not, we've made a mistake, but we're human, too.

Q. Is the board limited to men or can a woman be elected? A. It is not limited to men, and probably all a woman would need to do would be to file and wait for election, "There isn't much competition."

Q. How long is your term of office? How many terms can you serve?

A. It is a 3-year term with no limits on re-election. At least one member was known to serve six terms (that is 18 years any way you look at it -- and without pay!)

When a new building is built, will there be room to include kindergarten in the elementary school?

A. In September, 1973, kin-dergarten as part of the public school system will be compulsory statewide.




