Paul counted his education and all things he could boast of, in the natural man, but lost, for the excellency of knowing Jesus--and added that he had lost all things, but he counted them as nothing, that he might win Christ, Phillipians 3:4-8.

The power of God does not flow through methods, but through men; men who will live the Bible, before they pass it on to others.

Elijah lived in the presence of God. He said, "The Lord God of Israel, before whom I stand." I Kings 17:1.

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REP. W.R. POAGE DENOUNCES WEDNESDAY'S MORATORIUM

... Defined As Treason

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 15. The anti-Vietnam war speeches in the House last night were denounced today by Rep. W. R. (Bob) Poage, D-Tex., asaid and comfort to the enemy of the United States.

Poage's remarks to his colleagues follow:

MR, SPEAKER, It would be foolhardy to predict on the pro-ceedings of today, but it is clear to me that the proceedings in the House of Representatives last night must have given the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong their greatest encouragement since the stopping of the bombing of North

The talkathon of last night was well billed and advertised and has even been reported as nothing more than an exercise of free speech or a dignified discussion of vital issues -- and when one takes most of the

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from their context, it can be seriously contended that they were a presentation of dissenting viewpoints.

Certainly I would not deny anyone the right to express his own views or to question the wisdom of government policies, but when these views are presented in such a manner and under such staging as to en-courage the enemy to believe that such presentation is evidence of a complete lack of determination on the part of the United States, it can only result in the prolongation of the war and the loss of the lives of more American boys.

Nor does the fact that we are willing to assume that those who presented these views did so in good faith in anywise change their effect. The authorities in Hanoi were obviously duly impressed and recognized the tremendous advantage dropped in their lap. In spite of the fact that the North Vietnamese openly and officially applauded this so-called moratorium, I did not hear one speaker last night repudiate association with the enemy, At least until the next session

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

John Tower Supports Judge Haynsworth

During his tenure on the Court had the opportunity to write several opinins in the field of criminal law. These indicate that he fully realizes the practical difficulties of dealing with criminals. He has guarded against clear violations of individual rights. He has also exhibited a realization that we cannot afford in our society a permissive attitude which allows criminals to go free because of legal technicalities which are of no importance in the specific case involved.

Of course we cannot predict a judge's exact actions after he becomes a member of the Supreme Court. Our Constitution appropriately provides that Supreme Court Justices, once confirmed by the Senate, experience a freedom from political pressure which is unique in our government. They need not serve, indeed they should not serve, any President, and they are not called upon to face the rigors of popular election. A Justice, once confirmed, be-

comes literally his own man and of Appeals, Judge Haynsworth he is free to make his legal decisions solely upon his own interpretations of the Consti-

> will interpret the Constituttion in keeping with his legal back-ground. The legal background of Judge Haynsworth is such that he can be expected to follow a general policy of strict con-struction of the Constitution, In my opinion, the Court has suffered over the past several years from a lack of justices who are willing to apply a strict interpretation to the wording of

LET'S QUOTE EISENHOWER FAIRLY

As the nation debates the size and cost of national hose. Back about 50 B.C. when defense, Vietnam, the ABM and the draft, it is ironic the Romans went to Gaul, they how eagerly critics turn back to the Eisenhower era to support their position.

Two sentences from the late President's famous Farewell Address of Jan. 17, 1961, are quoted in virtually every anti-military article:

"In the councils of government, we must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unsought, by the military-industrial complex. The potential for the disastrous them came into being. When rise of misplaced power exists and will persist."

Clearly, this is a warning. But what did Eisenhower, the soldier, really mean? What else did he say? If he were alive today, would he permit the use of his words as a "cover" for attacks implying the Saxons, were handknit and some kind of conspiracy between our military servbadly shaped of various yarns. lices and their suppliers of goods and services?

First, his whole speech was a plea for peace and "how we use our power" to achieve it. But immediately (unlike those who minimize the need for a strong defense) he declared: "We face a hostile ideology-global in scope, atheistic in character, ruthless in purpose, and insidious in method. Unhappily, the danger it poses promises to be of in-

definite duration." Turning to the "military-industrial complex" his first words were: "A vital element in keeping the peace is our military establishment. Our arms must be mighty, ready for instant action, so that no potential aggressor may be tempted to risk his own

Next, he freely pointed out the "total influence" of military security upon our lives, but came to this stern conclusion: "We recognize the imperative need for this development."

Only then came his advice to guard against "the complex," but even it was fully qualified by the phrases "unwarranted influence" and "misplaced power."

Did President Eisenhower really intend to condemn the "military-industrial complex"? His whole address deserves to be studied. To quote two sentences out of context is an abuse of the General's intelligence and an injustice to his memory.

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


