



TITLE HOPES ON LINE AGAINST BELTON

"Big Red" vs. "Hornet Pride"

The District 13AAA "game of the season" is set for Belton's Tiger Stadium Friday night. Coach Jack Moss set the stage for the game noting that the Tigers were district champions last season and this season there are ten seniors on the Tiger team. On the Hornet side of the coin last season consisted of one non-district and one district win with only three returning starters from last year.

Moss notes that in "Triple A" ball experience is a big factor in a close game. The team with the desire to hit and the fewest number of major mistakes will win, reports Moss.

Belton is a big experienced team averaging over 190 pounds on defense and over 186 pounds on offense. The Tigers are a ball controlled offense relying almost exclusively on the ground attack. Belton has passed seven times in the last two games and three passes have been intercepted.

The Tiger defense is tough against the run and most teams this year have tried to pass without any real effort to establish a ground attack. Del Valle scored 26 points last week with a good passing attack but Belton offset the scoreboard by powering for 49 points all on the ground.

The Tiger offense is so efficient that Coach Jack Meredith normally tries for two point conversions on running plays.

Personnel for the Tigers include 210 pound junior fullback, David Bartek and Senior halfback, Jim Stewart a neat 180 pounds. Bartek has handled the straight ahead running this season for the Tigers with Stewart carrying on power sweeps and wide plays.

The Tiger offense has not been to pass except in two games, Killeen and Lockhart, neither time was the passing a big factor in the games outcome. Lockhart is one of

the districts top defensive squads and Belton managed three touchdowns.

Coach Moss describes the Tiger running game as similar to the Hornet ground attack with the backfield set the main difference.

The Hornets are in good shape this season with only one loss and that to Killeen. The team has worked as a unit all season long and definitely could have been considered underdogs in several of their early season games.

The fact that everyone on the team is working hard coupled with the complete lack of injuries has been the big reason for Hornet success.

The Hornets and Tigers will not need any emotional stimulation for the big game but in Gatesville excitement and anticipation, which began to mushroom last Friday night will reach a peak on Friday night at 8:00 p.m.

Moss anticipates no real changes in the Belton attack for the Hornet game by Coach Meredith nor does Moss plan any big surprise either. "Both teams have been successful with their styles of play", notes Moss, indicating that there would be no need for change.

Fans can look for the Coaches to alter their style under battle conditions if the regular game plan fails. Should Belton fail to establish its ground attack the unknown passing game, would receive a severe test against the districts toughest pass defense.

Getting away from "ifs", the Hornets offense steadily improves each week and the ver-

sital offense scores with several different runners and pass receivers. Offensively the Hornets have averaged four touchdowns per game.

Defensively the Hornets have contained all but one opponent this season to less than 16 points and opponents in the first six games averaged only two touchdowns each.

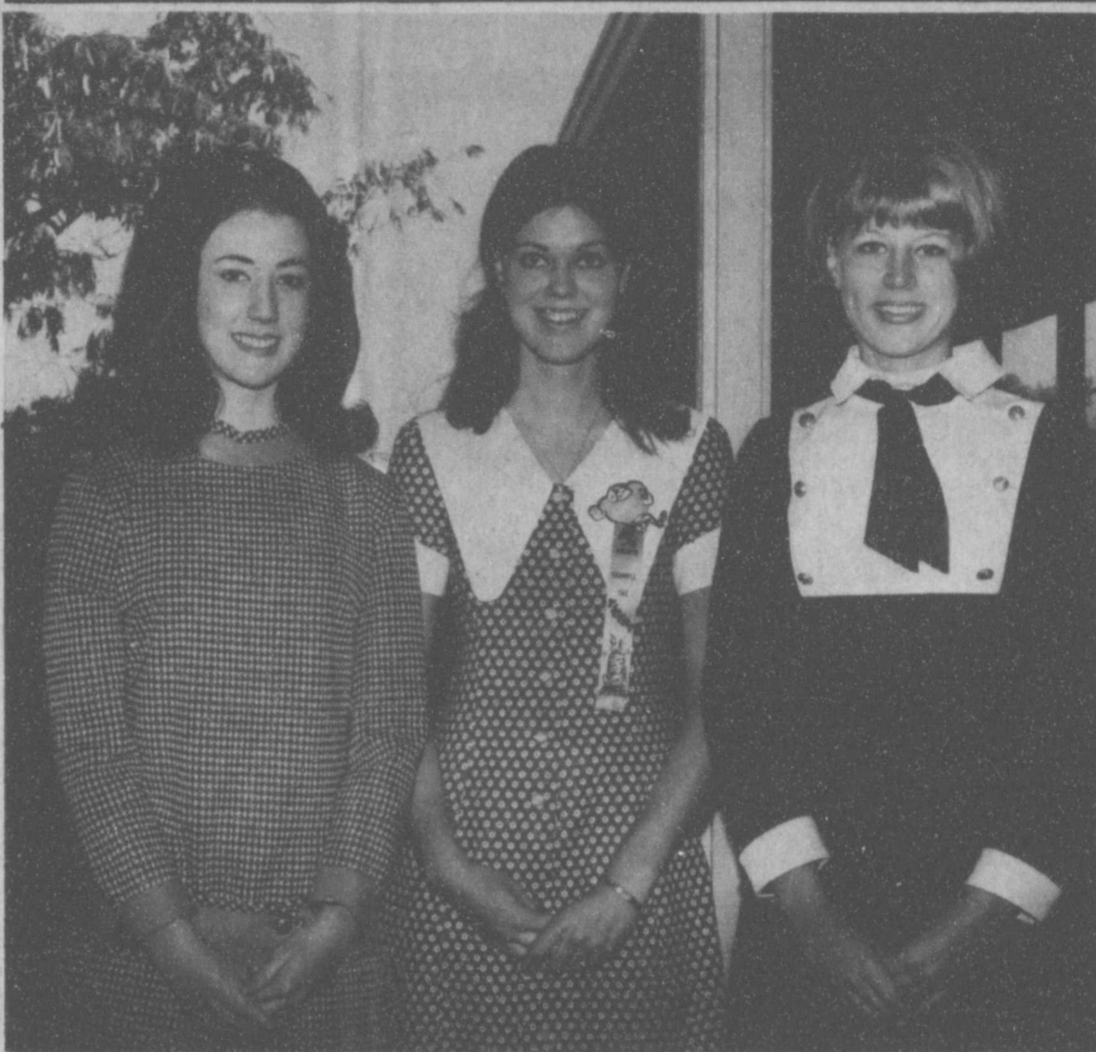
Asked if he felt like "an underdog" this Friday night Moss said "I don't know why we should not be considered underdog." "They are as big as the Green Bay Packers," Moss said pointing to their defensive line averaging 190 pounds per man. Offensively the Tigers average 186 pounds for the eleven man starting squad.

Tickets for the game went on sale Wednesday morning at the High School office, causing more than normal activity. Excitement over the game has spilled out into the downtown area with many stores displaying banners encouraging the team.

Prediction time draws near this week and many factors must be considered in a prediction. Belton has a winning tradition and the Hornets have quickly developed a winning tradition. Tradition means nothing on the field except that each player better understands the need for an all out effort when a team has this winning tradition.

Belton is solid as a rock and the Hornets desire and effort will receive its supreme test in Tiger country, Belton 22-Hornets 14.

Human Skeleton Discovered On Raby Ranch North Of Here

The skeleton of a human was discovered in a rugged area of the old Raby Ranch late Saturday afternoon, by Sheryl Vernon and his son, as they were looking for a deer stand.

Vernon reported the finding to the Sheriff's office after dark Saturday and Sheriff Cummings D.P.S. Patrolman, J.K. Hamilton, District Attorney Byron McClellan and two Texas Rangers along with State School officials visited the scene at about 10 a.m. Sunday.

Sheriff Cummings noted that the skeleton was situated on a shelf of a ravine about a mile

from the nearest road.

The law officers returned to the scene in the afternoon with Scotts Funeral Home employees to gather up the remains for possible identification.

Sheriff Cummings indicated that from identifying marks on clothing at the site the body might be an escapee from the state school.

Tuesday the remains were taken to Texas Department of Public Safety laboratory in Austin for identification purposes.

Cummings estimated that the body was at least one year old.

EVANT FHA LOAN SET FOR CLOSING TODAY

The \$244,000 Farmers Home Administration loan for the Evant Water and Sewage Supply Corporation will be closed today at 9:30 a.m., at the FHA offices in Gatesville, reports Vance Stephens, County FHA supervisor.

The project has required three years to reach this point and Stephens estimated that contractors would begin work as soon as closing was completed.

Contracts for the project have been signed for nearly six months and equipment is already being placed on the job site. The last group of easement papers were signed this week.

The project will furnish water to an estimated 220 families in the Evant area.

In other FHA developments Stephens reported that an additional loan of \$20,000 is being sought by the Coryell City Water Supply Corp. to reach the bids which were received recently.

The construction estimates under the proposal project were drawn up in 1967 and today's

prices caused the estimates to be low by nearly \$30,000.

Stephens expressed hope that funds would be available for the additional loan but he noted that the project would be carried on anyway.

The FHA has completed a recent survey on the needs of Coryell County under the community project programs. Stephens noted that Coryell communities were grouped into 13 regions and needs in each region were assessed.

Stephens said "We will have over 1220 families served with water needs when Coryell City and Evant projects are completed." He estimated that another 1200 families need the service in Coryell rural areas. Stephens said that about 90 percent of all private wells in rural areas would be considered inadequate under many standards.

Stephens pointed to expanding present systems to meet the needs of all rural areas of Coryell County. He assured that regardless of need the future projects would depend upon economic feasibility.

Sanders Injured In Attack At Mountaiew

George Harper Sanders, 51 an attendant at the Mountain School infirmary just north of Gatesville, was beaten severely in the head and face about 10:30 p.m., Sunday by three inmates of the school.

Sanders was taken to Coryell Memorial hospital and kept under sedation for a period of time. He received a large number of stitches in treating the wounds, reports the nurses desk.

Sanders was on duty at the school infirmary alone when a 15 year old inmate, who had entered the hospital on Friday complaining of a stomach ach, called Sanders and asked for aspirin.

Unsuspecting, Sanders returned to the single occupant room with the aspirin and unlocked the door. The 15 year old surprised Sanders with a

weapon made from a thin steel strip which is part of the bed spring system.

"Sanders never completely lost consciousness during the struggle" noted Superintendent George Adams. Blood traces were evident all along the hallway leading to the single unit rooms and large areas of blood stains were in the 15 year olds room. Adams said "I think he (15 year old) beat him (Sanders) down and dragged him back into his room, got his keys and let out the other two boys."

The two other youths were 16 and 17 year olds. Sheriff Winfred Cummings reported the three boys had planned the attack as part of a planned escape. Cummings related that the boys had hoped to climb the fence, travel to Houston and spend some time there and then travel to New York City.

When the two boys were freed by the 15 year old they returned to the room where Sanders lay and when Sanders attempted to call for help, they beat him again and tied him up with a bed sheet and tried to gag him.

During a routine check, J.R. Latham, a youth activity Supervisor at the school, heard shouts from Sanders. Latham immediately called for assistance from Y.A.S. employee James Freeman.

The two supervisors were able to control the three youths and return them to the cell type hospital rooms.

Latham and Freeman contacted the Gatesville hospital for an ambulance. Sanders had been employed at the school since 1963.

Supt. Adams indicated that the three youths had lived in the same dormitory in recent months. One of the boys had entered the infirmary last week for psychiatric observation and the other two entered the hospital on Friday and Saturday nights, complaining of stomach sickness.

Billie J. Eckert of Gatesville died in the Temple V.A. Hospital Monday, November 3. Eckert resided at 114 North 30th Street and was 38 years of age.

Services were held November 4, in Scotts Funeral Home, with Rev. Edgar McNeeley officiating. Burial was in Restland Cemetery.

Eckert, the son of Lloyd Eckert and the former Miss Opal Kay Kendall, was born June 29, 1931. He was reared near Goldwaite and moved to Gatesville in 1954. He married the former Miss Eunice Durst in 1952.

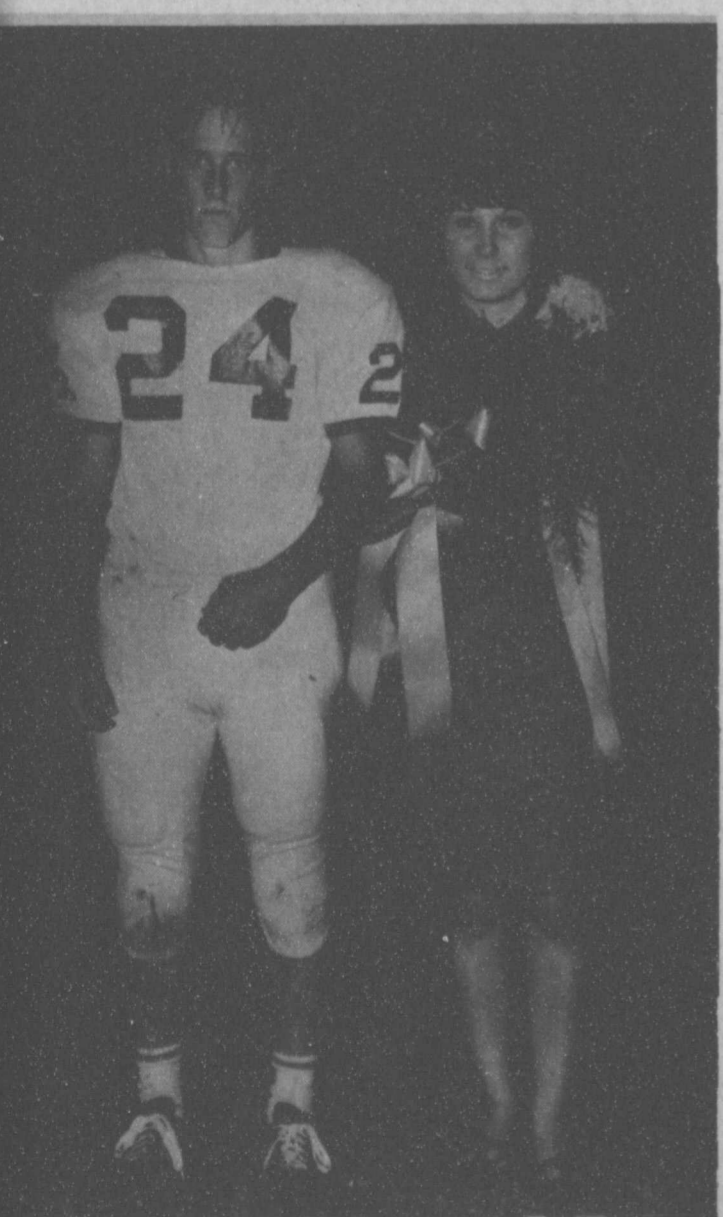

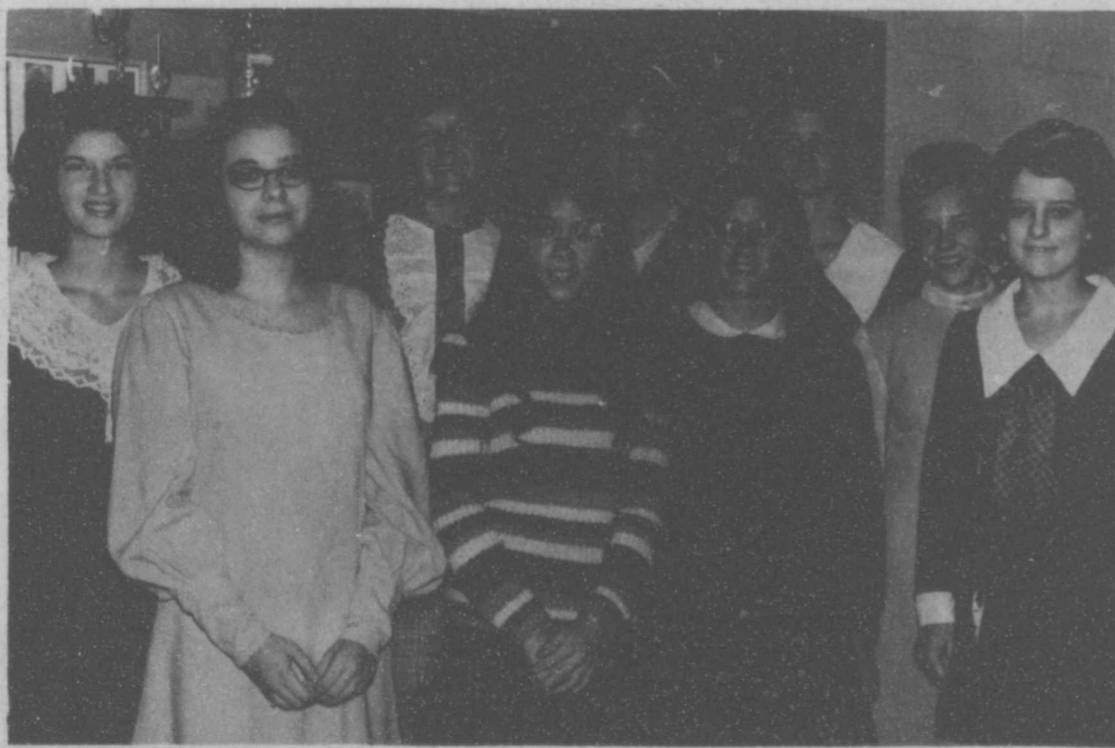

Goins noted that the Buick received \$400 and the Chevrolet \$150. Goins explained that Davee was driving east on Main street and Drake attempted to enter the west-

bound lane of traffic on Main street from south 22nd street. Failure to yield right of way charges were filed against Drake.

Monday at 9:35 a.m., in the 1100 block of Main street a 1968 Chevrolet driven by Douglas Gilmore and a 1963 International truck belonging to Superior Dairys of Austin collided, causing \$400 to the Gilmore vehicle and \$25 to the Dairy truck.

Goins noted that both vehicles were traveling west on Main street when the Dairy truck driven by Bryant Wolfe Jr. of Temple attempted to change lanes and collided with the Gilmore vehicle.

Tuesday afternoon at 2:20 p.m., city patrolman investigated an accident in the 2100 block of Waco street where a 1967 Ford pick-up driven by Michael Douglas Coward of Jonesboro Star Route had struck a 1969 Chevrolet belonging to Robert Onzo legally parked in front of the Onzo home.

Goins reported the Coward vehicle struck the car and then turned over in the road way Coward received head lacerations in the accident and was taken to Coryell Memorial Hos-

pital. The 1967 pickup was estimated a total loss and the 1969 Chevrolet was damaged—\$1100.

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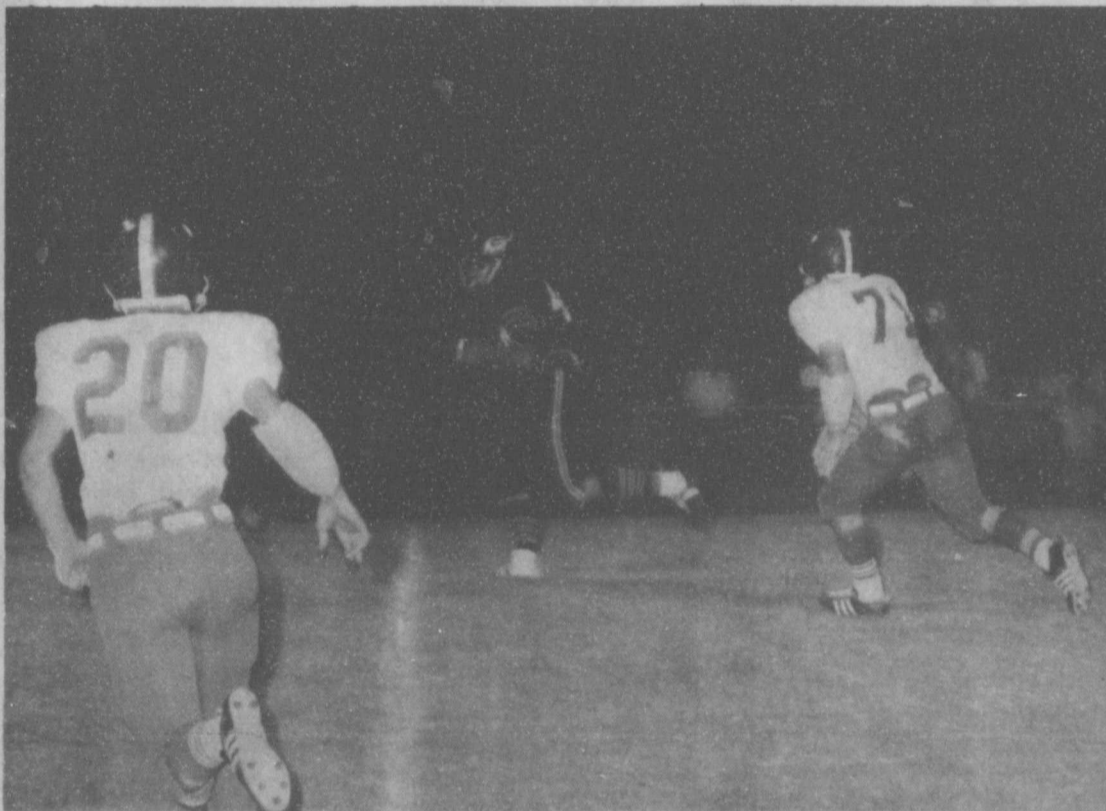

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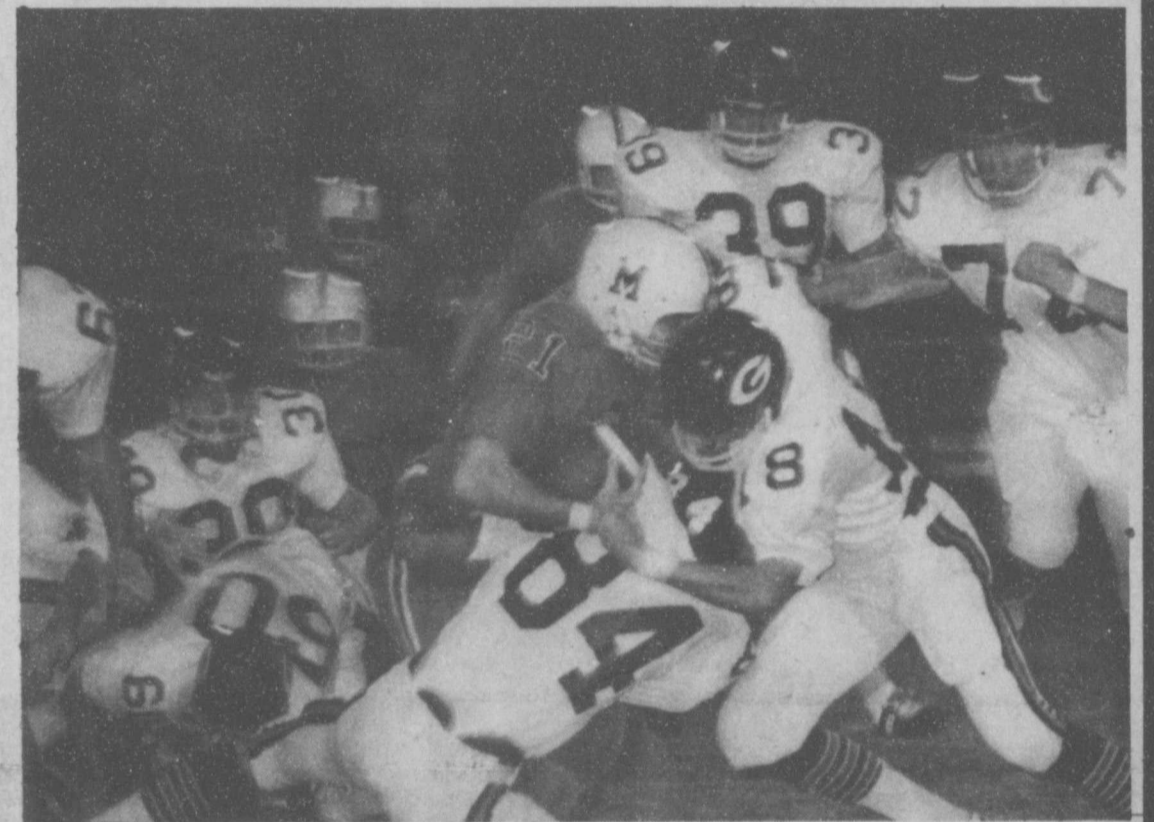

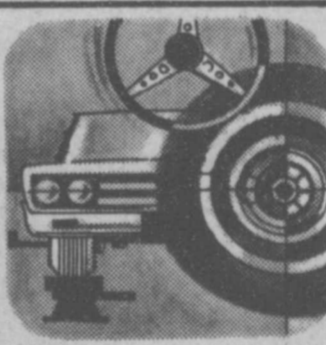
