# Hornets Close Out Season With Taylor Friday Night

The Gatesville Hornets end who are top receivers. up a successful football season Friday night against the Taylor Ducks in McKamie Sta-

The Hornets will be after their seventh win this season with only three defeats on the record books.

The Taylor Duck game marks the end of school boy football for eleven seniors at GHS. Coach Jack moss remarked recently that seniors have pro-vided the leadership and the stimulation for the Hornets this season.

The eleven seniors are Mike Barr, Keith Bell, Gene Braziel, Doug Freeman, Lyn Mohandro, Randy Dunlap, Bobby Hodge, George Thompson, Dan-ny Belf, Larry Smith and Donnie Pruitt.

The last game will not be an anti-climax for the season as the Taylor Ducks have improved from their early season performances and now pose the threat they were thought to have at the beginning of the season.

Early season projections had Belton and Taylor at the top of the heap and Coach Moss says the Ducks have finally came around winning two of

their last three ballgames. Moss reviewed his troops early this week noting "We are in good condition physically but we have got to get ready men-tally to play football." The mental letdown after the Belton defeat took the sting out of many of the Hornets against Lampassas.

The City Council called a special meeting Thursday, Nov. 13 to act on the purchase of a new road grader.



County Commissioners met last Friday with represen-tatives of the city of Copperas Cove to determine if the County and State would participate in the relocation of water lines necessary in connection with the Highway 190 widening program. City Manager of Copperas Cove, John Carrolton; Mayor

George Leonard of Copperas Cove and Cove councilmen Ed Shorn and Charles Bagget attended the meeting with Consulting Engineer, Paul Greg-

ory. County Judge, Norman Storm said it appears that the state and county are responsible for relocation of approximately \$6-8,000 of the water lines, Gregory estimated the total cost of the relocation project at \$314, 000, most of which will be paid by the city of Copperas Cove.

Judge Storm notified the Texas Highway Department of the situation this week. The THD will review the engineers findings and determine if the state is responsible for any portion of the relocation cost.



Earlier this year, I intro-duced legislation in another field of consumer protection. My bill would prohibit the use of our postal system for the distribution of unsolicited merchandise which is actually being offered for sale. My bill would not affect the mailing of free samples or legitimate mail or-der sales. The purpose of the legislation is to protect the consumer from having to either return the merchandise, which

would be a burdensome task or be held liable for payment after a specified period of time. My bill has received support from the Post Office Department, the Consumer Federation of America and the President's Special Assistant for Consumer Affairs, Mrs. Vir-ginia Knauer. I look forward to its consideration in Con-

gress. I have also co-sponsored legislation which would transfer the responsibility for the evaluation of drugs, antibiotics and medical devices from the Fed-eral Drug Administration to a new Federal Medical Eval-uations Board. The FDA would retain enforcement jurisdiction Presently the FDA acts as both prosecutor and judge in the medical area. I believe that it is necessary to separate these functions in order to insure fairness and to provide essential protection of the public health. I believe that each of the legislative matters I have dis-

cussed here is a legitimate area for government concern. There are many other consumer needs which government should also meet. There is much work to be done and I pledge my energy to it.
