



## Hornets Close Out Season With Taylor Friday Night

The Gatesville Hornets end up a successful football season Friday night against the Taylor Ducks in McKamie Stadium.

The Hornets will be after their seventh win this season with only three defeats on the record books.

The Taylor Duck game marks the end of school boy football for eleven seniors at GHS. Coach Jack Moss remarked recently that seniors have provided the leadership and the stimulation for the Hornets this season.

The eleven seniors are Mike Barr, Keith Bell, Gene Braziel, Doug Freeman, Lyn Mohandro, Randy Dunlap, Bobby Hodge, George Thompson, Danny Belf, Larry Smith and Donnie Pruitt.

The last game will not be an anti-climax for the season as the Taylor Ducks have improved from their early season performances and now pose the threat they were thought to have at the beginning of the season.

Early season projections had Belton and Taylor at the top of the heap and Coach Moss says the Ducks have finally come around winning two of their last three ballgames.

Moss reviewed his troops early this week noting "We are in good condition physically but we have got to get ready mentally to play football." The mental letdown after the Belton defeat took the sting out of many of the Hornets against Lampassas.

Coach Fred Walker noted that Taylor will be after a victory to balance their season record at 5 and 5. "Hornet Pride" has had some meaningful moments in the during tough games with Lockhart, Copperas Cove, and Belton. Lampassas does not know what "Hornet Pride" means.

The term will take on new meaning this week as pride tries to end the season with a seven win-three loss record. Taylor has come on to beat Copperas Cove and Rockdale in recent weeks. The Ducks run an offense very similar to the Hornet attack, reports Coach Moss. The familiar "I formation" "wing" and a "spread formation" are part of the Duck offense.

Scouting reports show the Ducks, the same as all other teams this season, to be faster than the Hornets. The Duck passing game is not used as often as other teams have used it against the Hornets. Halfback Valery Jackson, a 165 pounder, and Fullback Rufus Ortez, a 190 pounder provide the Duck running punch.

When the Ducks do fly, Quarterback Tim Kennedy looks for Greg Dugan and Mike Bunge

who are top receivers. Defensively the Ducks use a 5-2 which is the same as the Hornets have faced all season

long. Ernest Stiba, a 195 pound linebacker, will try to slow the potent Hornet offense.

## CITY BUYS GRADER WATER PUMP INSTALLED

The City Council called a special meeting Thursday, Nov. 13 to act on the purchase of a new road grader.

City Manager, B.R. (Skipper) Wallace along with Mayor, Bob Miller inspected the new John Deer equipment at a November 12 demonstration here in Gatesville.

The council approved the purchase of the grader at a cost of \$15,000. The city has purchased equipment in recent months to begin an active program of street improvement.

The allocation of city sales tax revenue to the street department will begin to show in our streets within the next few months.

Wallace reported that work on the Live Oak street from Bridge street to South Street is progressing with about 500 feet of curbing already poured.

Streets in the Gatesville Housing Authority complex have been vastly improved over the past two months and more work is planned for the area.

The city water department is also making needed improvements with the installation of an "in line water pump" in the Westview addition area. The pump has been tested for leaks and a concrete inclosure has

been built. City Manager Wallace reported that as soon as the concrete cures the pump will begin operation.

Wallace estimated that the pump would begin operation early next week. He explained that water pressure for the area would be improved and water usage would not cause decreases in the pressure for the area.

### Commissioners Consider Cove's Water Line Problem

County Commissioners met last Friday with representatives of the city of Copperas Cove to determine if the County and State would participate in the relocation of water lines necessary in connection with the Highway 190 widening program. City Manager of Copperas Cove, John Carrollton; Mayor George Leonard of Copperas Cove and Cove councilmen Ed Shorn and Charles Baggett attended the meeting with Consulting Engineer, Paul Gregory.

County Judge, Norman Storm said it appears that the state and county are responsible for relocation of approximately \$68,000 of the water lines. Gregory estimated the total cost of the relocation project at \$314,000, most of which will be paid by the city of Copperas Cove. Judge Storm notified the Texas Highway Department of the situation this week. The THD will review the engineers findings and determine if the state is responsible for any portion of the relocation cost.

### TWO ACCIDENTS REPORTED BY DPS

Two wrecks were reported this week by Texas Highway Patrolman J.K. Hamilton.

The first mishap occurred Sunday on FM-182, 11 miles north of Gatesville.

Involved in the noon crash was Norris Fleming of Gatesville. Fleming was unhurt when he fell asleep, ran off the left side of the roadway and struck a culvert.

Hamilton estimated damages to Fleming's 1969 Ford pickup at \$300.

Monday night, Janis Daniel of Evant was slightly injured in a one car mishap on U.S. 84 two miles west of Gatesville.

Miss Daniel was traveling toward Gatesville when she lost control of the car.

The car ran off of the left side of the road way and turned over twice.

Miss Daniel was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital for treatment: after the 7:15 p.m. crash, Hamilton set damages to the 1965 Plymouth at \$1,000.

When we arrived the girls were busily working on three quilts, one of which was centered with an 80 year old star pattern.

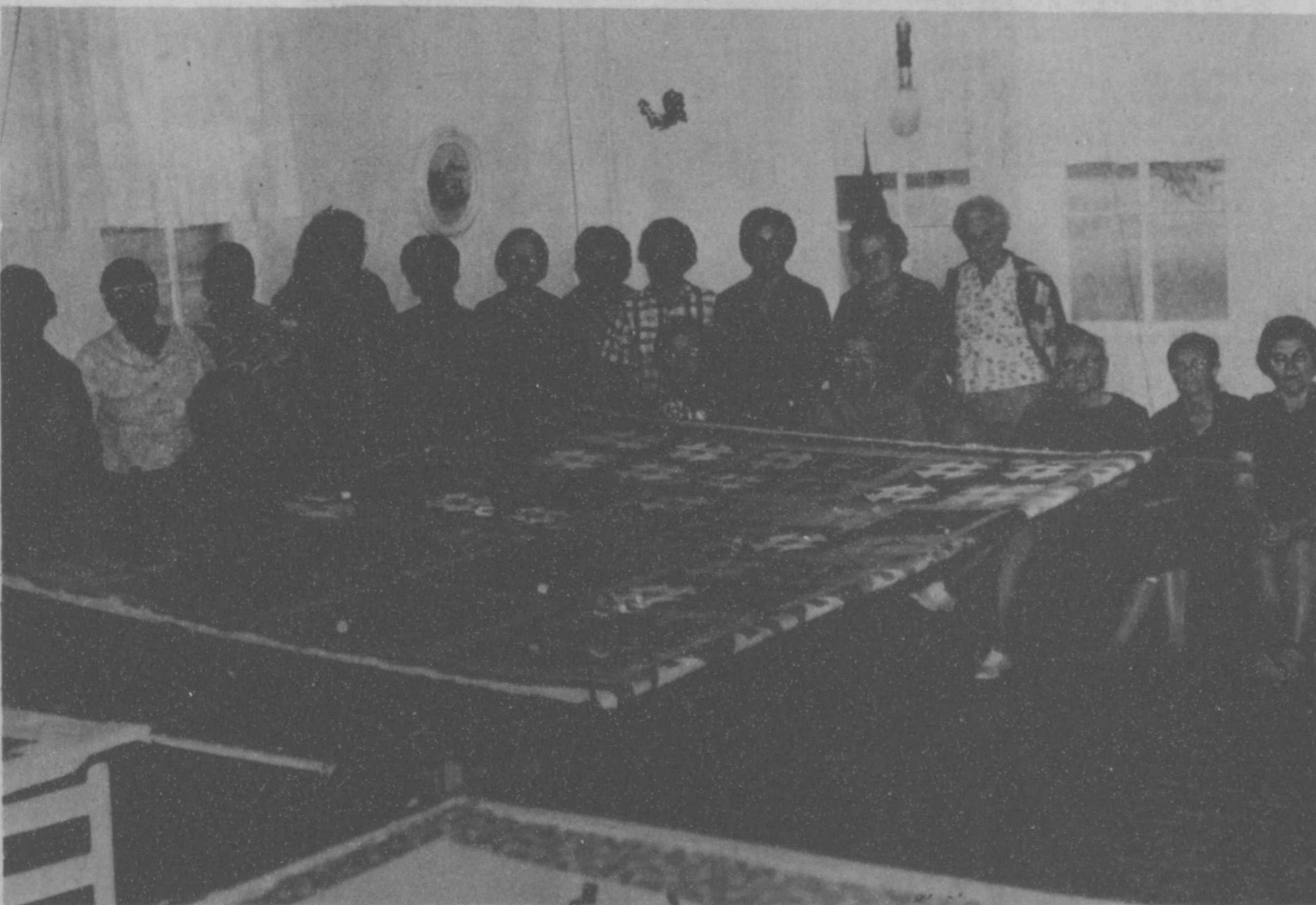
The Ater Club can boast of almost 50 years of quilting at their meetings.

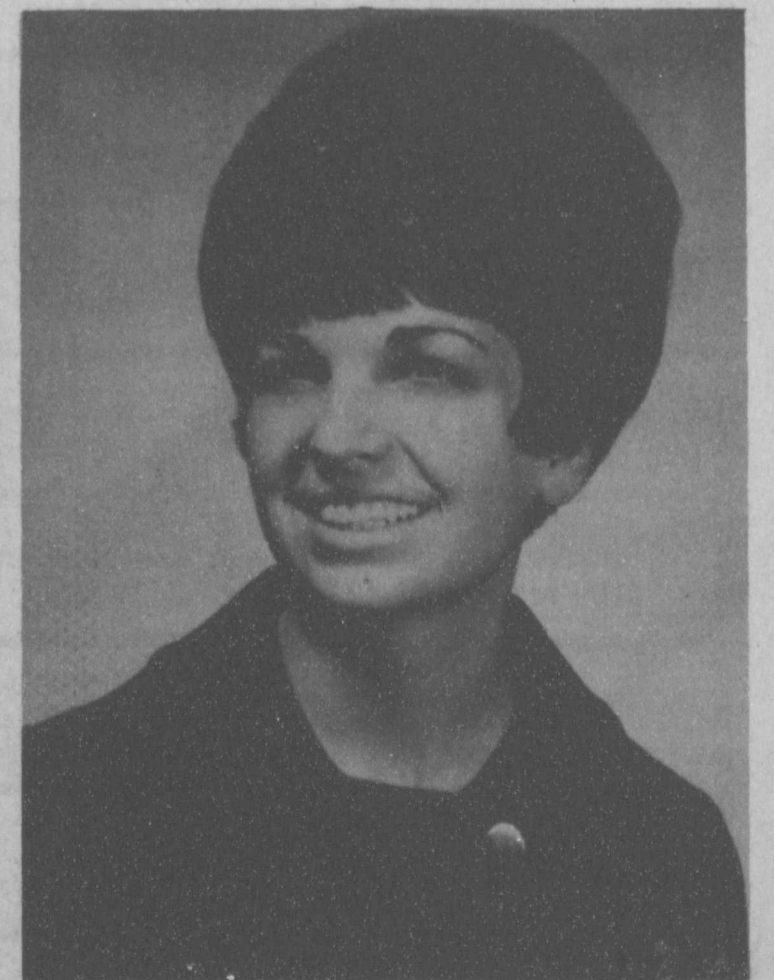

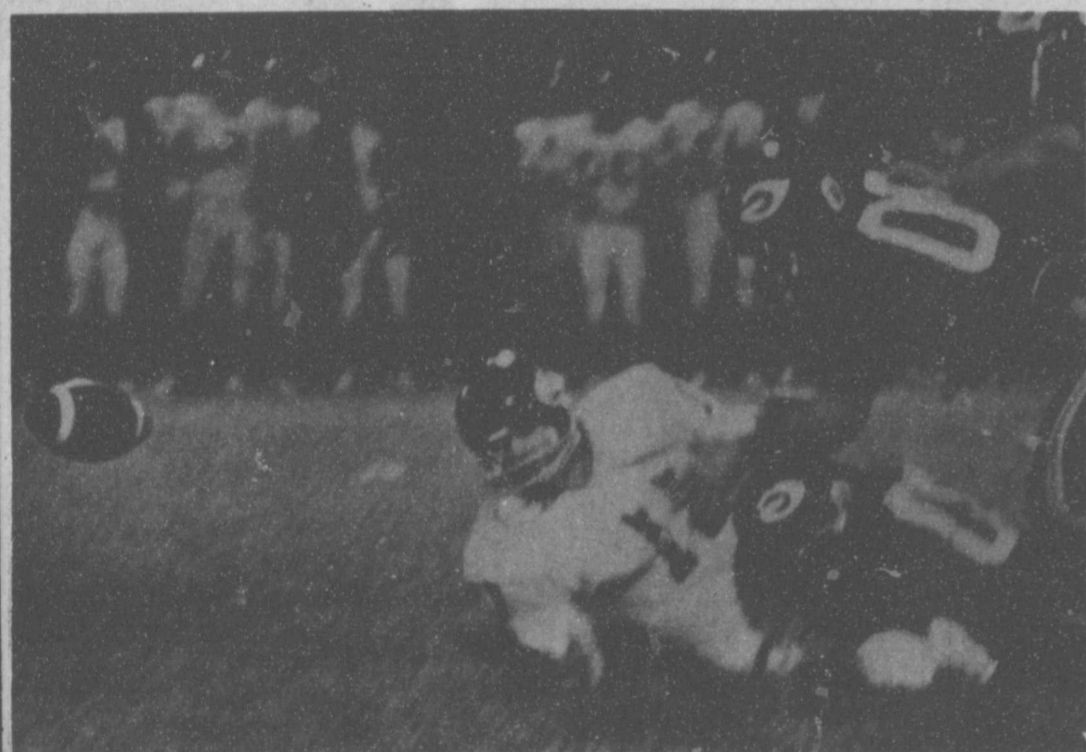

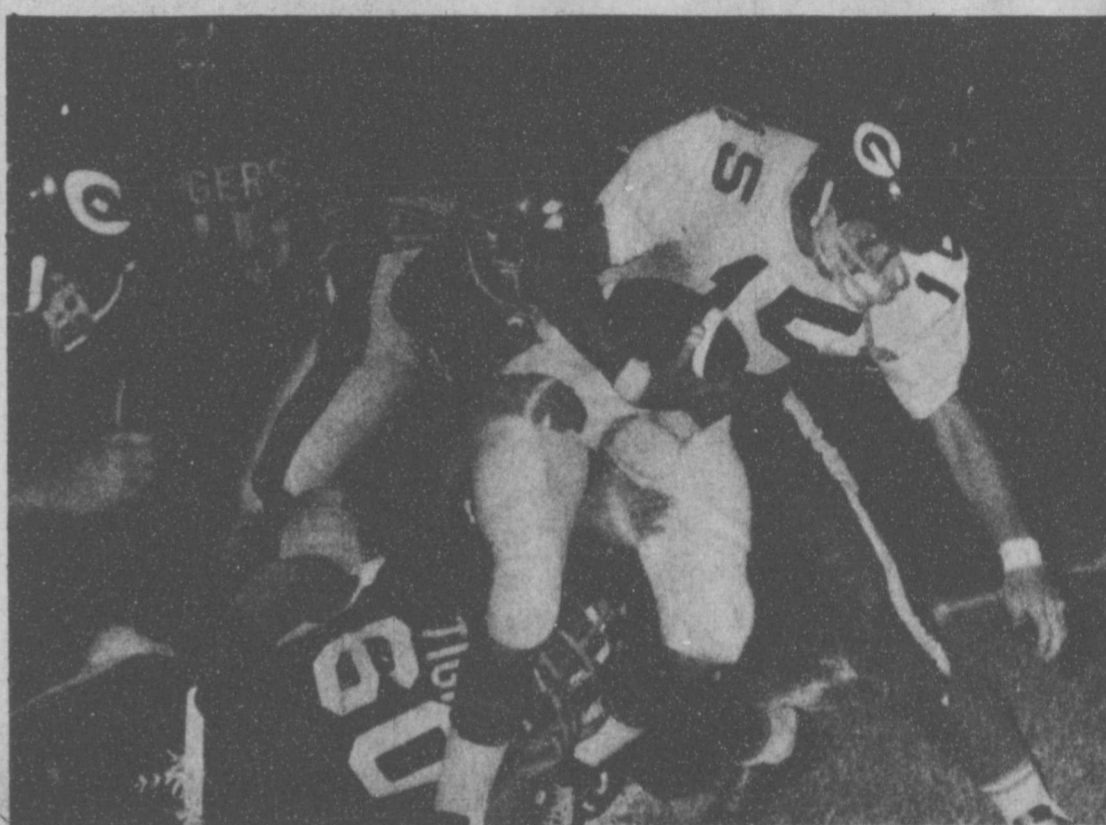

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period. The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1 1969, upon or allocable to the

bill that may be applicable to such bill. Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter. The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect. Section 2, The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office. Section 3, The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor. 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
