

The article is as follows: Practically every noted economists has indicated that 1970 will be something less than that period of boom and growth that we have experienced since 1960. These forecasts indicate a real growth rate from zero to 2.5 per cent plus 4 per cent inflationary growth.

Some economists even predict a recession. It is my opinion that 1970 will be as good as 1969 for the general economy and the marine industry. I do feel that the consumer dollar will only go to those persons and companies that do something to earn that dollar.

In the marine industry the agressive and progressive dealer will do well--the fellow that has survived the past 8 to 9 years merely because he was there will have two choices get with it, or (2) get out, Merchandising will be the criteria of success and I don't mean price cutting. To many, merchandising is sort of a nebulous word, but successful merchandising is created by combining the many facits of business. Advertising, display facilities, service, inventory control, pricing, personnel, etc. Just doing a good job in one department does not insure suc-

cess as all facits must be combined to create the total package. The dealer that does this will

dominate his market while the other fellow will have a hundred excuses as to why 1970 was a bad year.

For THE NEWS Belf projected the economic outlook down through the decade. He acknowledged the fact that actual information concerning the consumer market for boats is not validated.

Belf said "I do not believe that inflation will be control-led to less than 3 1/2 % per year over the next decade." He cited inflationary industries where presently demand expects price increases without question. Each segment of the economy will ultimately be effected by the price increases



AUSTIN, TEXAS--Industrial development continued at a record breaking pace throughout 1969, with plant locations and expansions 20 per cent above the all-time high previous year.

"Texas closed out the sixties very impressively, with economic development spiralthrough continued growth in industry in almost every possible sector," James Har-well, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission mental publications. said in a year-ending report. Harwell said most of the record growth came in the first

six months of the year, with 198 new plants locating in the state and 264 existing industries undertaking substantial expansions. This compared with 126 new plant locations and 251 expansions for the same period of 1968. The most activity came in the areas of chemical, metal and transpor-tation industries.

However, despite the rising costs of construction and tight money, Texas continued to net a substantial amount of new industries in the last half of 1969. Although final figures are not yet available, officials estimate new plant locations for 1969 will number about 350, compared with 291 last year ind expansions will reach the 65 mark, compared with
