



To the extent that it is necessary to limit the use of these chemicals by American Farmers we are making it more difficult for our farmers to compete with foreign production. On the other hand, it seems so clear to me that if a certain chemical is dangerous to public health when used on a farm in Central Texas, that that same chemical is dangerous to public health when used in New Zealand, Japan, or Canada. I have, therefore, introduced legislation which would require the Secretary of Agriculture to make a finding that the country of origin had comparable regulations to those imposed in the United States before any edible products could be imported from that country. I think it is clear that this is necessary both to protect the American public and to deal fairly with the American farmbut I anticipate that we will hear loud cries of anguish from the State Department and from some of our own



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



This is because fish are at prime quality when first taken from the water, at the peak of their natural flavor, oil, and texture.

Fish are cooked to develop flavor, to soften the small a-mount of connective tissue pre-sent, and to make the protein easier to digest. Cooking fish at too high a temperature or for too long a time toughens them, dries them out, and destroys their fine flavor.

How can you tell when fish are cooked? Raw fish have a watery, translucent look. During the cooking process the watery juices become milky colored, giving an opaque, whit-ish tint to the center of the thickest part of the fish. At this point the fish are completely cooked, and the flesh will easily separate into flakes. If bones are present, the meat will come away from them read-

Most cooked fish tend to break up easily, and consequently should be handled as little and as gently as possible during and after cooking.

Prepare this delicous recipe, "Savory Baked Drumfish", and experience the quickness and ease of preparing seafood.

Savory Baked Drumfish-

2 pounds black drum fillets or otherfish or other fish fillets, fresh or fresh frozen

Legs are made from six pieces of corrugated: 241/4" by whatever height you'll want the table. Each 241/4" piece is bent twice. The shape is $9^{1/4}$, bend, $5^{3/4}$, bend, and $9^{1/4}$.

The easiest way to form the legs together is to use an electric glue gun. Apply glue to 91/4" portion of two "legs", and bond. Senator Tower Reports On Drug Abuse

I know many of you are concerned, as am I, with the problem of drug abuse in our naespecially among our young people. The uncontrolled use of drugs for non-medical reasons has increased substantially over recent years. Arrests for narcotic drug law violations quadrupled between 1960 and 1968. And a survey by the National Institute of Mental Health has indicated that in some areas of our nation as many as half our high school students have had at least some experience with marijuana, let alone more dangerous drugs and

You may have heard recently of the so-called "no-knock"

provision of this legislation. This provision would allow a law enforcement officer to enter premises unannounced, if he has reason to believe such entry would allow him to seize material evidence with which to support a drug-violation conviction, and if he has previously been able to impress these views upon a judge with sufficient support to enable him

to obtain a warrant. While the provision was carefully limited in order to protect the constitutional rights of individuals, it nevertheless provides a valuable tool for law enforcement officials in obtaining legal proof of drug violations. Under present circumstances, a violator can literally flush evidence down the lavatory while the law enforcement officer is knocking on the door, identifying himself and producing his search warrant. The new legislation would enable a law enforcement officer to surprise a drug pusher or user and thus obtain the evidence

necessary for conviction

Thus the judge being asked to grant a so-called "no-knock" warrant must be satisfied that there is probable cause to believe that if notice of entry were given, it would be ex-tremely likely that the evidence needed for conviction would be destroyed. This provision is extremely important in my opinion. It will prevent a police officer from acting on his own unsubstantiated suspicion; yet at the same time, it will enable him to obtain the evidence necessary for conviction. al worthwhile provisions in this drug abuse control bill. The legislation seeks to improve the administration and regulation of the manufacture, distribution, importation and exportation of drugs. The legislation also classifies drugs into four schedules according to chemical properties, psy-chological and physical effects and abuse potential. These schedules correspond to the penalties applicable to viola-

Also, the bill substantially revises the penalty structure which now exists for durg law violations. An effort has been made to provide sufficently effective penalties for the real criminal, such as the drug pusher and the traffickers in hard narcotics such as heroin; while at the same time limiting the mandatory minimum sentences for first offenders who may have been caught in their first experience with the use of drugs. I believe this is a sound approach. It seems unreasonable to impose the same stiff penalities on the professional pusher of hard narcotics as on the young first offender who has made a mistake and may, under present law, spend 10 years in prison regretting every minute of it. I am hopeful that these more reasonable sentences will result in more convictions andact as a more effective deterrent to drug abuse.

The legislation also provides for the creation of a committee which will make an in-depth study of all aspects of marijuana Marijuana is the drug most commonly subject to abuse by our young people. It accounts for the majority ofarrests of. persons under the age of 21, for drug violations. Marijuana has been the subject of great controversy. Many have argued that smoking of marijuana eads to habitual use of hard narcotics which can enslave the user and even lead to death. Some have argued that the use of marijuana is no more injurious to one's health and well being than the smoking of tobacco. Actually, we know very little about the effects of the use of marijuana on a long-term basis. Does it affect our thought processes or our ability to function? Does it cause can-cer or other terminal disease? Does it contribute to birth defects? I believe that a complete study of marijuana and its effects on human beings is vital in order to provide a better understanding of the substantial dangers associated with its

CHECK POINTS FOR PUTTING

According to pros on the PGA Tour, George Archer is one of golf's finest putters. Before his match in Sao Paulo, Brazil, we asked George for his secret.

"Well, before I get around to my style of putting, let me just say, that I, like most pros, consider putting to be probably the most important part of any round of golf. Touring pros spend hours on the putting green, because we all know that's where the money is usually won or lost. As for the mechanics of my

putting, well, I've got to be comfortable. That's important for anyone, but especially for someone who's 6'6". Like all the pros, I try to eliminate all movement and remain just as solid as possible. As for stance, I believe in keeping everything square to the hole. Everyone should have a few checkpoints as they prepare to putt. I have three; my shoulders, hips and toes. Once I've got them lined up, I feel as though I've got the line. Now, I'm in position to take the putter away, keeping it on line and returning it square to
