

### \$750,000 Loan Closed for Coryell City

The Coryell City Water Supply Corp received \$170,000 in construction funds from the Farmers Home Administration Tuesday afternoon.

The loan closing was the eleventh water system to receive funds from the FHA and ranks as the largest water system loan in the county.

The system will service 160 families in the Coryell City-Osage area. A 10,080 foot well has been completed and tested at 80 gallons of water per minute to fill the needs of the communities.

The recent decision to route Highway 36 east of Gatesville by the Texas Highway Department has placed a "question mark" on the site.

The County Commissioner's Court requested last summer that in routing the highway the Court wanted it to stay west of the ground level reservoir and east of the city limits. The Texas Highway Department recently allocated funds for purchase of right of way when a route has been selected.
