## Precinct's 2 And 4 Lead Voter Registration Totals

Voters in Commissioners Precinct No. 2 and No. 4 lead registrations this year with 2,430 registrants and 1,856 registrants respectively, according to figures released this week by County Tax-Assessor Collector, Jack B. Whigham.

The fifteen voting precincts were set up in a county-wide redistricting in November of 1968. The redistricting was aimed at complying with a court ruling calling for one man-one vote. Total registration for the county was set at 7709.

The three voting boxes which entered Gatesville totaled 3626 voters and constitutes 47% of the eligible voters.

The largest single voting box was No. 4 which is in Commissioners Precinct 4 with 1548 registered to vote.

Registration at the Copperas Cove courthouse annex totaled 2195 with the two voting boxes No. 1 and No. 5 splitting the registrations close as possible with only one registration difference. Voting Precinct No. 1 had 1098 and voting Precinct No. 5 had 1097. The two Cove

boxes amounted to 28.5% of the total voter registration for the only other sizeable block of voting strength.

# National Bank Purchase Site For New Banking Facilities

The National Bank has acquired a site to build a new 50,000 square foot single level bank building in the near future.

Chairman of the Board, Andrew Kindrick and Bank President, W.D. Cooper, announced in a news release this week that "The National Bank has purchased the Mrs. Pat Potts and Mrs. W.A. Melton property fronting on Main Street just East of Miller Motor Company and the Roy Catelett and Thurmas Estes properties adjoining. The bank officials explained in the release that

"This gives a 170 foot front on Main Street, a corner on North 10th, and an outlet to both North 9th and North 10th Streets.

"We have outgrown our present quarters. Approximately two years have been spent in talking with architects and specialists to perfect plans for a new and larger quarters. We were cautious to take action that would be of the most benefit to all our customers and to the business stability of the community," explained the release. "Our architects will start

immediately on plans for a building to fit the site that will give us ample working space an enlarge drive-in facilities with plenty of parking," explained the bank release. "We have faith in the continued growth of our town and community and the large site will allow space for future expansion. It is estimated that it will take about six months to complete plans and let a contract for the building."

Cooper estimated Tuesday that actual construction would require from 15 to 18 months.

Accordingly, contract signing could be in August with the building to be completed late 1971.

The National Bank of Gatesville is the outgrowth of the consolidation of the Gatesville National Bank and the First National Bank on February 21, 1938. At that time the bank had \$888,000 in deposits and \$1,256,000 total assets. The last published statement, covering a span of 32 years, shows deposits of \$9,229,000.00 and assets of \$10,045,000.00. According to the release

"The National Bank of Gatesville is ever aware of its duty to Gatesville and the surrounding area. With all the changes constantly taking place in our economic environment we want to live up to our claim of a Full Service Bank."

The cost of the property was not disclosed. No plans have been made as to disposition of the present banking quarters.

## Rain Soaks Coryell Three Day Total Is 2.14

A general rain soaked Coryell County over a four day period early this week as 2.14 inches fell at the local weather bureau station for a four day period.

The rains covered most parts of Texas in what has been described as a Million Dollar rain for agriculture and livestock all over Texas.

Rain was recorded Saturday as 0.1 of an inch fell before a measurement was taken early Sunday morning. Sundays total was .45 inches, Monday .73

The heaviest rainfall came at noon Tuesday as heavy skies dumped almost thunderstorm quantities on the area. In fact, thunder and lightning did accompany the noon rain. According to old sayings this means we will have a freeze on the same day in April.

By early Tuesday night the rain had ended and Wednesday morning brought clearing skies and sunshine to the area.

### Rain Causes Wrecks On Highways

Rain soaked highways were a contributing factor in several minor wrecks this week reports DPS Patrolman David Jund.

On Feb. 22, five miles south of Pearl a 1965 Chevrolet driven by James Earl Lewis of Lampasas and a 1968 Pontiac driven by Brenda Marwitz of Route 1 Copperas Cove collided as they topped a hill on a gravel county road.

Patrolman Jund estimated damage to the Lewis vehicle at \$300 and the Marwitz vehicle \$850. Lewis was filed on for driving on the wrong side of the road not passing. There were no injuries.

Also on Feb. 22, a 1953 Chevrolet pulling a trailer went out of control on Hwy. 84 West of Gatesville on the Dadds Creek Bridge. Patrolman Jund reported that the trailer came loose from the car driven by Donald Glissen of McGregor and struck the rear of the car. The trailer passed the car as they both continued down the hill. The auto was totaled. There were no injuries.

## WALLS' WORK FORCE TO DOUBLE SOON

With construction already begun, Cleburne based Walls Industries, Inc. announced that the Gatesville sewing plant is to be doubled. The additional construction will give Walls 30,000 square feet in Gatesville, plans call for the work force to be expanded to 150-200 operators as fast as training schedules will permit.

Bobby Vidler, Gatesville plant manager, said that presently some 100 operators are employed in Gatesville. The

Gatesville plant produces a variety of coveralls for work and sports activities and has been in operation since January 1969. Walls Industries also has sewing plants in Cleburne and Clifton with central offices, shipping and cutting facilities in Cleburne.

In late October, 1969, Walls completed a public offering of its common stock with an underwriting headed by Dallas Rupe & Sons, Inc. of Dallas. The stock is traded in the over the counter market.

### Back Tagging Planned For Auction

Back tagging will begin soon at the Gatesville Auction according to Texas Animal Health Commission. The Back Tagging will be done on animals going through the sale but only the ones that are bought for slaughter will be blood tested for Brucellosis at the slaughtering plant to which they are consigned.

A representative of the Commission states this is being done so that Coryell County can be recertified as a Modified Certified Free County.

The recertification of a county must be done by law every three years. If the county does not use the Back Tagging Method at the local Auction to recertify then retesting of a percentage of the cattle herds would be tested for Brucellosis every three years for the county to remain a Modified Certified Free County.

Under the Back tagging program each animal tested at a slaughtering plant sold from this county will be credited toward recertifying of Coryell County.

themselves alone the right to make and break all rules of procedure. I have not been able to identify one single worthy act on their part, and yet, all across the Northeast part of this country there were demonstrations and riots, with vague and undefined objectives, but most often organized and led by college students and professors who, of all people, should be most knowledgeable about our "government under law."

While I think we should pay for the education of children brought into an area by the Federal Government, I fear that the \$80 million increase above the amount the President said he would accept may well result in another veto. At the same time it seemed to me that the amount finally agreed upon should be acceptable as a compromise and I voted for it. We simply must accept some cuts in appropriations if we are to have any hope of stopping the ver-rising cost of living.

There was a disgusting mob assembled outside Attorney General Mitchell's apartment here in Washington. The police properly broke up the riot and arrested some of the ring leaders, but in Boston, it is reported, that although the police were out in great numbers and although the mob, composed in large part of MIT students, broke thousands of dollars worth of windows and did other damage, and finally stoned the police themselves, no arrests were made. This is but an open invitation to anarchy. We cannot allow each individual to decide for himself what, if any, laws he will obey and whose property and personal rights, if any, he will respect. Unfortunately, we must mete out strict punishment in order to secure obedience to the law on the part of altogether too many people.

Last week the trial of the trouble-makers at Chicago resulted in a jury verdict, finding five of them guilty. Certainly from their own admission these individuals had done much to disrupt the public peace in Chicago at the time of the Democratic Convention. Whatever their motives or objectives, they had created a situation which cannot be allowed to exist in any civilized society.

During the trial these same individuals gave every indication by their action and by the action of their attorneys that they had no respect for our judicial system and that they reserved for themselves and for

## Girl Scout Cookie Sale Set

More than six thousand girls, ages 7-17, Girl Scouts of the Bluebonnet Girl Scout Council, a Girl Scout Council of thirteen central Texas counties, are preparing for the annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale, scheduled to be held February 27-March 7. P.L. Stanley of Temple, chairman of this year's annual sale, stated that 15,560 cases of cookies have been ordered, or 186,720 boxes of cookies. Five varieties of cookies will be offered for sale. The profits from the sale go primarily for the improvement of the Girl Scout Council camps, Camp Kachina, which is located at Lake Belton, and Camp Howdy, which is located at Bryan. Five cents of each box of cookies a girl sells is kept in the Girl Scout troop, Brownie Junior, Cadette, or Senior of which she is a member. This money goes for troop activities and programs. C.L. Sligh of the Camp Committee for the bluebonnet Girl Scout Council has said improvements to Camp Kachina this spring will be a tri-level tree house, connected by ramps and with ladder and rope entrances. The tree house will be built through a grove of oaks at the 245 acre Camp Kachina site. Other tentative projects are a new unit shelter, and preparation for a camp swimming pool. At Camp Howdy, Bryan, a unit shelter improved and winterized with a fire place as well as new bridges are in the plans to access to more remote camping areas of this 45 acre Girl Scout troop camp. The annual Girl Scout cookie sale is the one all-out Council sale approved by local united funds. No proceeds of the sale go for the support of the local program and budget, but are only used for camp.

## New Teaching Techniques

---New teaching techniques (field trips which take the classroom out into the community, or bring "expert witnesses" from the community to the classroom). "Team teaching" is just what the name implies: The teaching of a subject to a class by several teachers working together, rather than one alone. About this method, one Texas teacher said: "I used to be very traditional, but I made a complete about face when I saw how some of the new methods of teaching English brought results. The change was worth the effort. Teachers can do so much more as a team than they can do individually." Many Texas school systems, both large and small, have found that "teacher aides" can make great contributions to the school program. These classroom assistants are not trained to teach, but they are invaluable for such time-consuming tasks as giving tests, grading papers, running duplicating machines; securing setting up and operating audio visual equipment; assisting in libraries and labs, keeping order while teachers work individually with students, and in many other ways limited only by the resourcefulness of the teacher and teacher aide.

## Women's Forum Hears Ford-Neeley

The Woman's Forum met Monday in the National Bank Civic Room. The program was on the theme of Feminine Progress. Mrs. Raymond Ford spoke on "Is It Just An Illusion" and Mrs. Price Neeley on "Women Who Get Things Done."

Mrs. Ford gave excerpts from an article by Maria Manis who said that behind every great man there is a woman. For many centuries men have controlled the world, and women were considered inferior. Now, however, women raise their voices for equal rights. They are capable of assuming power in our society, but are thwarted. At the decision-making level, women have less representation than the black race. Yet it is said that money is mostly in the hands of women, especially elderly widows, but men make the decisions as to how it will be spent. Only in the arts do women achieve places equal to men.

James Fix asks the question, "Where do women go from here?" Women are trying to enter into sports, want to get equal pay, and attend all-male schools. This is a period similar to that in the 19th Century. Questions are raised: What is the new feminism? Where does it come from? What is likely to achieve? The basic answer to all of these questions is the right of the individual. Each woman must do what is right for her, not do what everybody else is doing. Not all men will be disappointed if women want to be "just" housewives.

Mrs. Ford told how the writer Bill Blas said that the most desirable image a woman can have is to be herself. The

woman of 1970 wants to be treated as a person. The wise man recognizes this and respects it.

Mrs. Neeley told how the old image of a club woman was one who joined clubs in order to kill time. This is not so now. Most women are dedicated to whatever cause they have joined. They have the ability to do club work and raise a family. In answer to the question, "Why do women doers do what they do?" Mrs. Neeley said, "Because it is there." By this she meant that women see a need to be met, and they set about meeting that need and doing something about it.

Many examples of this kind of thing is seen in hospital volunteers, raising money for educational programs, on T.V. taking senior citizens to ball games, tutoring in ghettos, and work on pollution and conservation. Women are untying their apron strings and are streaming into communities to help others. Some have become mayors and government officials, workers in day care centers, and savers of historical homes as the woman in San Antonio. Another woman is known for the job program she set up for disadvantaged teen agers.

Not everyone, however, appreciate the woman who gets things done. Some have had bombs placed on their doorsteps because of what they have tried to accomplish. The United States Human Rights Commission is headed by a woman whose job it is to promote human rights.

Mrs. Neeley closed by citing examples of women here in Gatesville who get things done.
