SBA Approves \$150,000 Rec. Loan For LTC Golf Camp

The telegram announcing the financial loan noted that "SBA" approved the Gatesville Development Corp. for \$150,000 to assist LTC in the operation of a sporting and recreational ." The remainder of the \$250,000 was provided by the Gatesville Savings and Loan for \$75,000 and the Gatesville Development Corp. with \$25-

The Camp Cottonwood Golf Camp has been in the construcstages for nearly six months and is expected to be

completed and ready for operation by mid-July.

LTC is headed by Dr. O.W.
Lowrey, president; Cleo Woodard, vice president; David Shackleford, secretary; Johnny Arreaga, treasurer; Tom Williams and A.G. Patterson, diliams and A.G. Patterson, directors.
