### **Fire Destroys**

Fire completely destroyed a work shop behind the Jack Baker home just south of Gatesville on Straws Mill Road Tuesday

The blaze was reported at 6:30 p.m. while the Gatesville Volunteer Fire Department was holding their regular weekly meeting. Fire Chief Pat Patterson noted that one unit was near the rodeo arena in the southern part of town when the alarm was sounded.

A strong south wind whipped flames toward the Baker home before firemen arrived and several minor explosions were touched off by the flames.

Firemen with the first unit on the scene poured water on the roof of the Baker home as shingles on the roof had already began to curl up from the heat. The second unit arrived and began cooling the flames from the workshop which at times had leaped toward the see FIRE page 2







### Art Is Life Of Local **Art Class Teacher**

"Art-dis is my life." Yes, art is the life of Mrs. Marie Brock-Jones of Killeen, as she stated (with a definite Austrian accent) in an interview Tues-

Mrs. Brock-Jones, an artist who's speciality is mural painting, is currently teaching a class of 12 local artists each Tuesday afternoon in Gates-

Art is indeed a great part of the life of the native Austrian. Born in Steyr, Austria, Mrs. Brock-Jones studied art for six years in high school. Painting continued to dominate her life after she completed her high school studies. The promising young artist enrolled in private lessons with artists in Vienna, Austria and later under Robert Bloom in Germany.

Art is and will always be very dear to Mrs. Brock-Jones. Art opens your eyes. You see things you never saw before. You can learn the history, clothes, and habits of a people through their art, she said.

Mrs. Brock-Jones came with her family to the United States in 1947 to Fort Bragg, North Carolina. She continued her study of the art media by working with two Minnisota artist McCraig and Taube.

The family moved to Germany in 1955 and returned to America in 1957, settling down in Kil-

An accomplished artist, the Killeenite paints portraits, stilllifes, landscapes and comic in addition to her speciality-murals, "A mural" she said, "is a thrilling medium to paint in because it will remain where you paint it as long as the wall stands. A mural portrays a building and its history. It tells the observer something closely connected with the architecture and use of the building.

"A mural brings people closer together. You don't have to be able to read, write, or speak the language to know what the artist is trying to say. Time disappears, but the feeling of that time and its people re-main—in the mural."

Her murals can be found in Germany, Austria, Killeen and Copperas Cove.

She has received awards for many of her works in Temple, Austin, Killeen and one award in Washington.

After being a student under artists from Vienna to the U.S. for most of her life, Mrs. Brock-Jones began as an in-structor of art five years ago in Killeen.

The artist's students in Gatesville and in Killeen range from beginning to advanced artists. Her local class began in early November and will proceed indefinitely as the stu-dents advance. He most ad-vanced artists receive private

The painter uses only the three primary colors blue, yellow, and red, with black and white in her work. Any color can be made from those colors



When someone compliments me on some of my flowers I really find it hard to take any credit for them. I can't pretend to be a hard working gardner and when a beautiful flower results from a bulb given to me by my mother or a root from the plant of a friend feel I actually had little to do with it. If sun and rain, heat and cold each arrive at their own season and in correct amounts I have a nice garden and if one or more of these basic gardeningredients is over abundant I have miserable, scraggly plants which I can do

When I "make" a plant my-self I do feel like taking a bigger share of credit for the way it turns out. There are the three rosebushes which resulted from putting about six inches of stem, with all flowers and buds removed, in damp sand and covering with a fruit jar. This acts like a miniture greenhouse when the sand is kept moist and soon new leaves will be coming out on the stem. When this happens I like to carefully remove the jar without disturbing the developing plant and leave it to grow for about a year before transplanting to it's permanent location.

There is also the African violets grown from a leaf, begged, borrowed or stolen from a



friend. There are many ways soil to grow big enough to to root these leaves but I like bloom. Whether the hand of to use a small glass of water God or Mother Nature, I have for mine. 
