

\$500,000 Construction Contracts Under Way Here This Week

Almost a half million dollars in construction contracts were underway in Baird this week, a survey revealed. Chamber of Commerce manager E. Elton Ables said that the projects had greatly added to the economic picture of the community during normally slow months.

Heading the list is the 16 unit public housing project which is past the half-way mark toward completion. The housing project, with Rouse and Parsons of Abilene as the contractors, is costing slightly over \$200,000.

Next in line is the City of Baird's new sewerage disposal plant being built just east of town. The plant and the new lines being built in town and connecting with the plant, will cost approximately \$130,000. Shiflet Bros. of Abilene have the contract.

The First Baptist Church is constructing a new sanctuary

designed to cost some \$55,000 when completed and furnished. The work is being done by H. P. Hibberts of Irving.

Work was progressing rapidly on the new nursing home being built by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brandon. A change in plans have added to the cost of the building. It was changed from tile construction to brick and will cost some \$50,000 when completed.

In addition, several houses are under construction and some have been completed recently. Nathan Morris of Abilene has started three new homes which will be ready for sale in about a month. Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Young have begun a new home in west Baird. Several homes are being repaired and four homes in Ross Acres have been moved to make room for I.H. 20, and are being repaired, it was reported.

Crash Claims Five Lives

Five persons lost their lives Friday in a grinding auto-pick-up crash on Highway 36 some 12 miles south of Baird, making seven who have been killed within a mile of the spot since the first of the year.

A Noodle school teacher and three of her pupils, enroute to a district meeting of Homemakers of America in Stephenville, were in one of the vehicles, a pickup. All four lost their lives in the crash. The other person killed was an elderly Houston woman who was enroute to Abilene to visit her ill husband.

Dead were Linda Kay Ritchie, 16, Carolyn Jeanette Cagle, 15, and Dora Herrera, 15, all of Noodle; Mrs. Sam Fish, 26, of Abilene who was a teacher at Noodle, and Mrs. Ralph Logan of Houston.

Highway Patrolman Bob Favor of Baird said that the accident apparently occurred when Mrs. Logan attempted to pass another west bound car and smashed head-on into the pickup which was headed east. He said that Mrs. Logan's car appeared to be out of control for some 340 feet prior to the impact. Investigations were still underway.

On January 5, two persons were killed a mile west of the site of the Friday crash. Thomas J. Ashley, 28, of Abilene and Jess M. Moore, 65, also of Abilene, were killed in a collision at the intersection of Highways 36 and 283. The seven dead in the first two months of this year lacked only two reaching the number killed in the county last year, and equalled the number killed in 1951.

Two Year Sentences In Cattle Theft

Two young Baird men were assessed two year terms in the penitentiary Monday after pleading guilty before 42nd District Court Judge J. R. Black to complicity in the theft of 14 head of cattle from the ranch of Mrs. R. L. Griggs near Baird.

Guilt pleas were given to charges of stealing five head from the Griggs ranch on July 18, 1962, and nine head on August 28, 1962. The two, Charles L. Wood, 17, and his brother, Everett W. Wood, were given sentences of two years in each case, with the sentences to run concurrently.

They still face charges of complicity in the theft of eight head from the same ranch on January of this year.

Drivers of Public Vehicles Cautioned

AUSTIN — Drivers of publicly owned vehicles were cautioned today by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, that they must comply with the provisions of the state safety responsibility law.

Garrison said this was confirmed when a ruling by the Waco Court of Civil Appeals became final early this month. The ruling, in a case involving a municipal employee, held that failure to comply with the responsibility law subjected the driver to having his driver's license suspended and denied his claim that he should be permitted to continue driving a publicly owned vehicle.

"Under this court decision," said Garrison, "the Department of Public Safety will be required to act against all drivers who have accidents if they cannot comply with the provisions of the safety responsibility law, regardless of the ownership of the vehicle."

The Public Safety Director explained that the law requires everyone involved in an accident to show his ability to pay for damages caused to others. This can be done, he said, by depositing with the department cash in the amount of the damages; by holding a liability insurance policy; or by obtaining written releases from all persons damaged in the accident.

Garrison noted that the penalty for failure to comply with the safety responsibility law in such cases is suspension of the driver's license.

The win advanced the Baird sextet to the regional tournament which is to be held in Denton this week end.

In the Tuesday night game Baird, the District 10A winner, Goldthwaite held Baird, the District 10A winner to a 14-14 score during the first quarter, but they began to fade in the final three quarters. The Baird girls outscored their Mills County opponents 19 points to nine in the second period and the intermission found Baird ahead 33-23. Baird increased the lead in the third quarter and went into the final period of play ahead 45-32. In the final quarter Baird made 15 points to eight for Goldthwaite and won handily 60-40.

Paula Corn led the Baird team in scoring and took game honors with 47 points. Miss Corn dumped in 15 from the floor for 30 points and made 17 of 28 free throws for her 47 points. Marsha Eddington was high for Goldthwaite with 15. Karen

Bearden made eight points for Baird while Elaine Hass, the team playmaker, scored five. The Baird girls made 22 of 34 free throw attempts for an impressive 64.7 per cent. Goldthwaite lost two guards via the foul route, as the team was charged with 22 infractions. Baird made 14 miscues.

Baird meets Wylie in the first game of the regional meet in Denton at 10:15 a.m. Saturday. Wylie is in Collin County, in the Dallas area. Track Team Wins 3rd At Iowa Park

The Baird Bears 1963 track team made its seasons debut in Iowa Park Saturday by winning third place in "A" division of the annual Iowa Park Invitation Track Meet.

Johnny Higgins made 18 of his team's 58 points to take high point honors for Baird. He was third high in his division in the meet. Higgins set a new meet record of 12 feet in the pole vault as he and Joel Mosley of Joshua tied in that event. He took second in the high jump with an unimpressive 5' 10" which is several inches under his normal height. He added a new event to his string when he entered the broad jump for the first time in his career and took sixth place with a leap of 17' 7".

Wally Harris, Kelton Jones, Tensil Scott and Corton Barnes ran a 45.5 in the finals of the 440 yard relay to come in second to Merkel who won the "A" division of the meet. They had been clocked at 44.9 in the prelims. The relay unit had worked out together only three days prior to the meet.

Thomas Robbins and Tensil Scott had outstanding times in the 440 yard dash for this early in the season. Robbins was clocked at 52.7 and Scott at 52.8 for second and third place respectively.

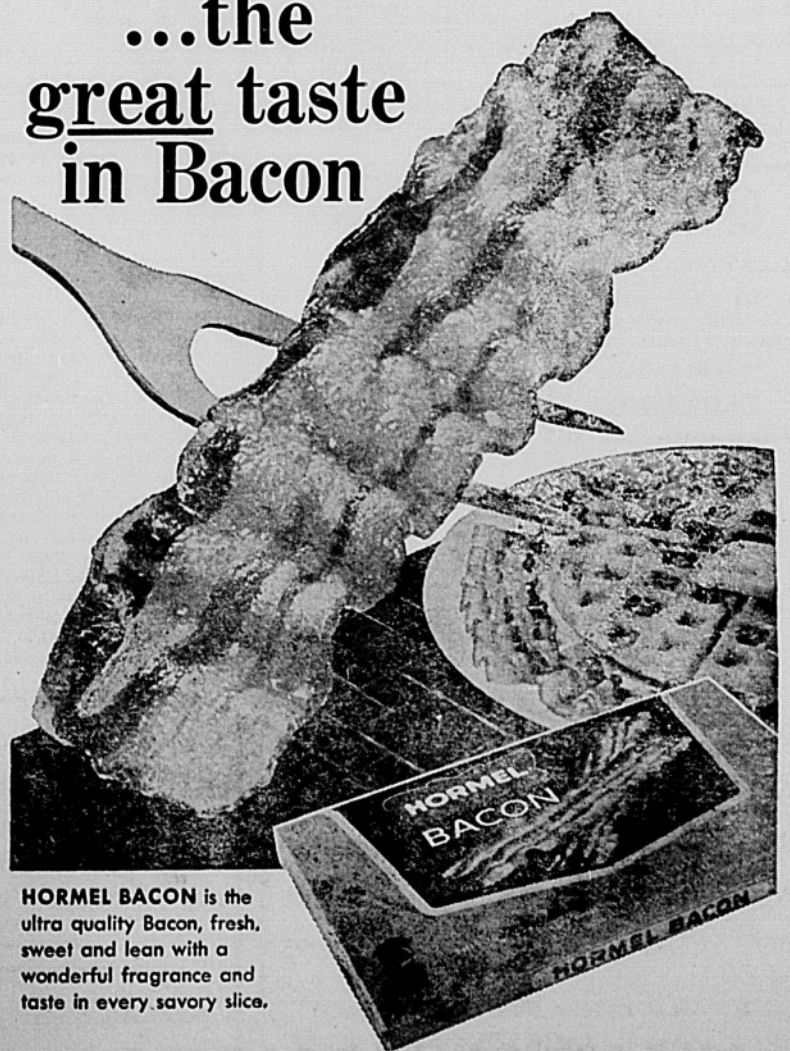

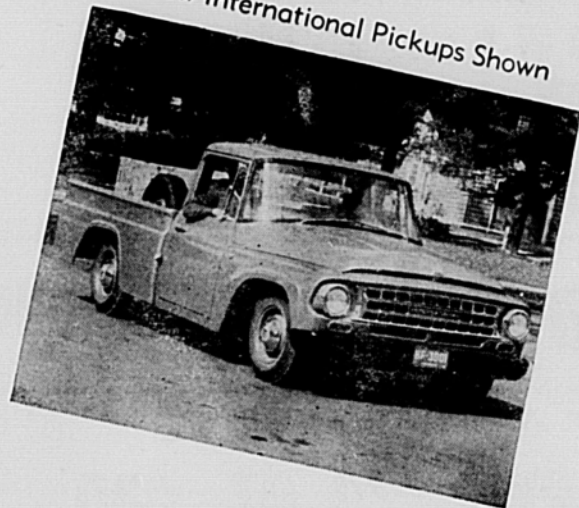

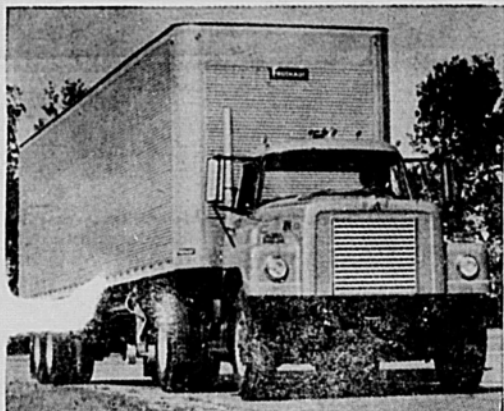
