The new municipal swimming pool is nearing an opening date with final touches on the fence and bathhouse almost complete. Work on the parking lot and entrance walk are also nearing completion.

Pool Director, Mrs. Jo Lynn Jackson, indicated Wednesday that pool would not open this week end due to completion of last minute construction. The pool will have the following

rules for each swimmer:

1. All swimmers required to take shower before entering pool.
2. No one with a skin disease or communicable disease will be allowed in the pool.
3. No rough play will be permitted in pool, on runways, diving boards, or in dressing rooms. No running.
4. Failure to comply with these rules will result in expulsion from this pool.

Developers Ask City Approval On Projects

City Council heard request from housing developers and new business firms to consider developments and zoning changes in Gatesville.

Sam and Ed Powell have proposed development of a mobile home park on Osage Road. One other mobile home park has been proposed. Both projects were turned over to the City Planning and Zoning Commissioner for further study.

The Planning and Zoning Commission also will conduct a feasibility study on water and sewage requirements for a housing development planned by James Dixon. Dixon is proposing construction of a 20 or 22 unit housing development with all homes under FHA financing.

The LTC corporation representatives O.W. Lowrey and Cleo Woodard requested that the LTC Corporation be tied onto the city water supply. The Council approved the request.

A new Cordovan Tire Center is asking a zoning change for the southeast corner of 14th and Main Street. This request was also referred to the planning and zoning commission. The Council accepted the low bid of \$3,456 for construction of restrooms and kitchen facilities at the Coryell County Community Center. Boyd Lumber Company entered the low bid on the city county project.

Commissioners Advertise For Cars

County Commissioners will advertise for bids on two new sheriff office cars to replace a 1964 and a 1965 model presently in service and two new mobile radios.

County Judge, Norman Storm indicated that bids would be accepted up to June 8 with bids to be opened at 10 a.m. on June 8th. The two older cars will be traded in as part of the transaction.

One of the radios will be placed in the Wildlife Managers car presently in service, noted Storm.

Pollard Signs

Contract For LTC

Contracts were signed Tuesday night for the \$103,460 Clubhouse and three cabins at Camp Cottonwood, reports Manager Johnny Arreaga.

Billy H. Pollard, plumber-contractor, entered the low bid at a recent bid opening with two other construction companies. The work on the project is expected to begin Friday.

Contracts call for completion of the 73'x39' clubhouse and one 39'x39' cabin in 56 working days with the other cabins to be completed in 98 working days. The exterior of the cabins and clubhouse will be stone. Construction on the first stage should be completed by mid July.

Voters Will Decide \$500,000 School Bond Issue Sat.

The \$500,000 School Bond Election set for the Gatesville Independent School District May 16th has seen no opposition organize against the issue.

The voting on the issue will be in two separate boxes for property owners and non-property owners. Under Legislation passed by the 61st Leg-

islature the new voting law requires the non-property box and the election must carry in both boxes to pass.

The number of non-property owners is very small relative to the property owner box and mathematically the law almost

gives the minority group a veto power.

Voting will be conducted at the Gatesville High School in the lobby with Mrs. Oscar Russell, presiding judge and Mrs. J.B. Kemp alternate presiding judge.

Estimates of total votes expected for the school election range from 400 to 800.

Clovis King school tax assessor-collector, noted that in trustee elections usually absentee voting runs about 10% of the ballots cast. Assuming this to be a measure of voter turnout in a bond election 470 votes could be expected since 47 absentee ballots were cast by late Tuesday. Tuesday ended the absentee voting.

The school administration has noted the overcrowded condition and the need for vocational facilities has created the need for new facilities.

Recent legislation has placed the burden of Kindergarten on the public schools. Superintendent L.C. McKemie, has estimated 150 kindergarten students will be in the school system by 1973.

Over crowdedness is centered in Elementary and High School according to McKemie. He cites the fact that the elementary was built in 1950 to handle 500 students and presently 753 students occupy the building. The High School likewise was constructed for 500 students in 1959 and now it holds 600 students.

Not many years ago the high school curriculum contained only vocational agriculture and home economics. Now McKemie notes auto mechanics, distributive education, office education with several classes of each vocational program in the school curriculum.

Approval of the bond issue is hoped to take care of plant construction for the 70's. The high school would be changed to handle three grades, junior high would also have three grades as would both elementary schools under the proposal.

Kindergarten would be incorporated into the old elementary building as state requirements became effective. The School Board and Administration have allocated enough funds to match federal funds on a vocational building to further release overcrowdedness in the high school.

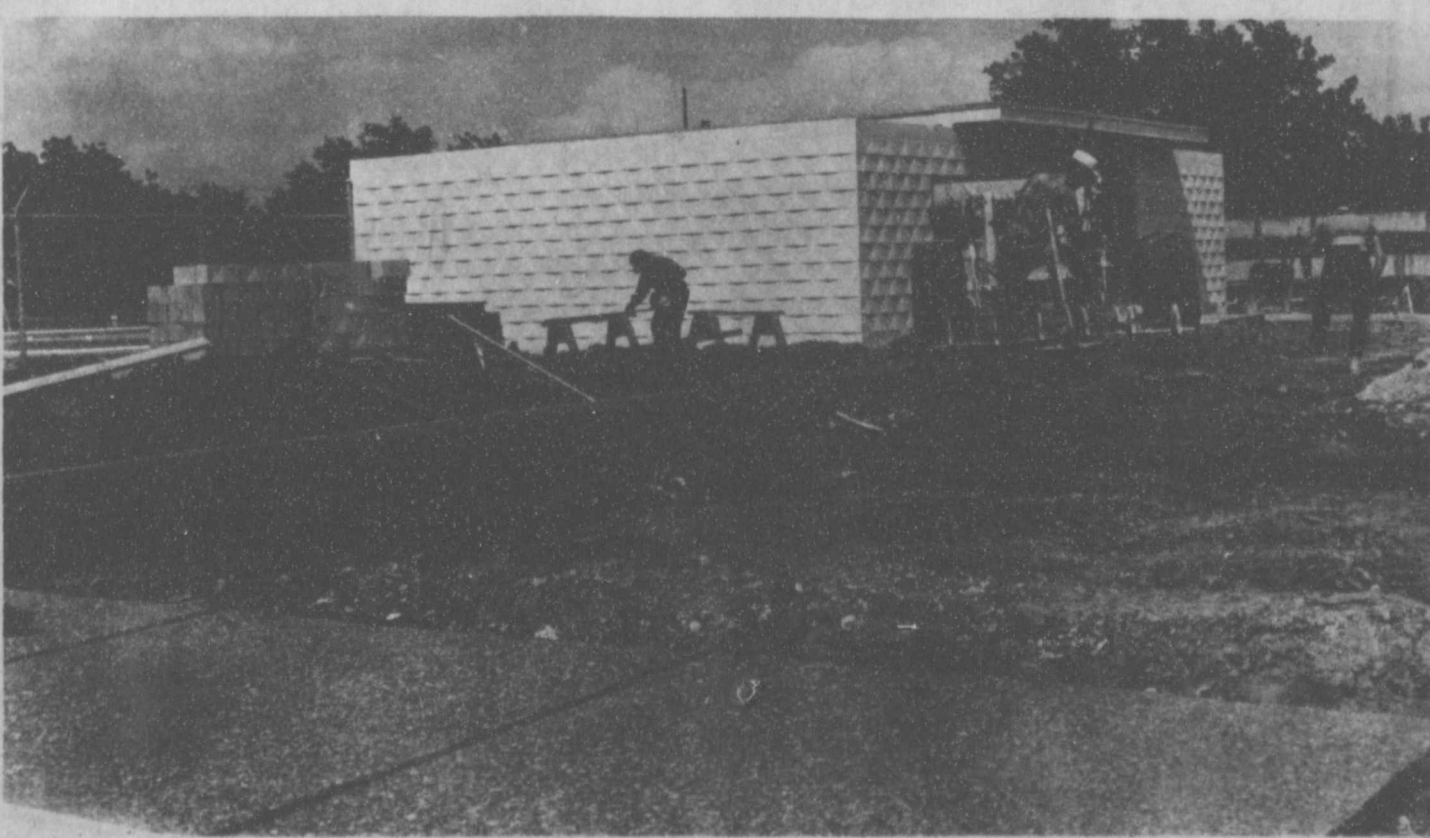

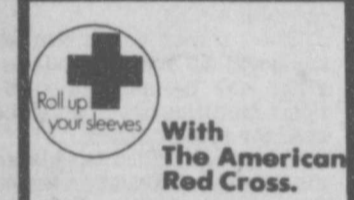

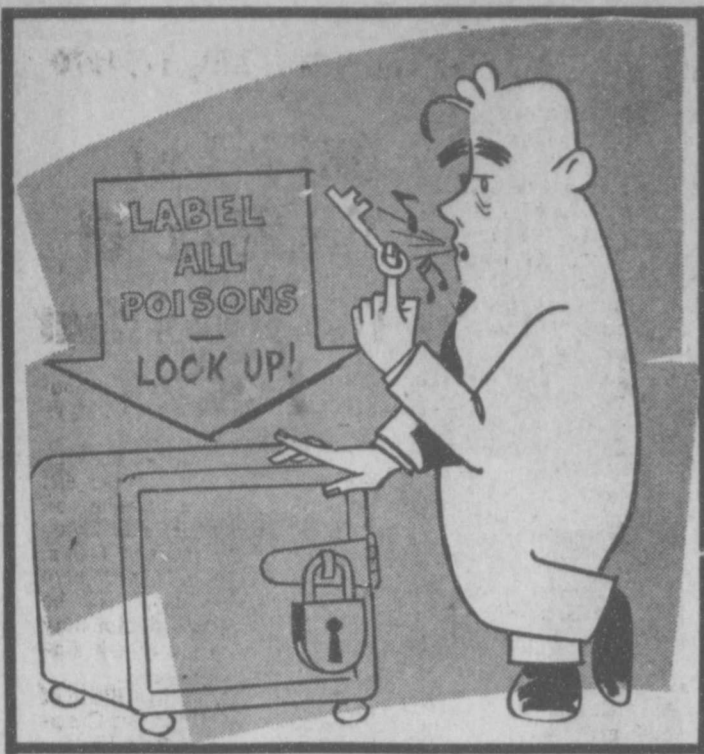
GATESVILLE PUBLIC SCHOOLS BOND ISSUE

Several have asked for further information showing needs for the Gatesville Public Schools. The following reasons will assist in clearing up some of the questions:

1. The present elementary building was completed in 1950 for 500 students. There are now 753 students enrolled in the first 5 grades.
2. Under a new law passed by the last Legislature, schools must make room for kindergarten students. Part of this law takes effect next school year. Requirements will increase each year and our estimate is there will be 150 kindergarten students by 1973.
3. The first three grades will be moved from the present elementary building to the new building. This will leave room to transfer back 160 students from the Junior high (6th grade) and leave room for the kindergarten.
4. The high school building was completed in 1959 for 500 students and there are now around 600 in the high school building. If a new elementary building is constructed, the 9th grade with 150 students will be transferred to the Junior high building. The 6th grade or approximately 160 students will be transferred out of the Junior high to the elementary building. Therefore, a new elementary building will relieve the over crowded situation from the 1st grade through the 12th.
5. The high school has added new courses such as; auto mechanics, general mechanics, vocational office education, distributive education as well as other expansion of courses. More room is needed for these new courses. Two classes in auto mechanics are transported each day to an old building which is approximately two miles from the high school. A new shop wing is needed for these courses.

Saturday, May 16, 1970 is the voting date for the bond issue. Investigate the needs of the school and remember to go vote.

Evant Brooks, Evant Native, Rites Held

On Sunday May 3, 1970, death claimed one of Evant's most prominent citizens, Mr. Evant Thomas Brooks, 78, passed away in Coryell Memorial Hospital, at 5 a.m. on the mentioned date, following a period of illness.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. J.W. Sellers, former pastor and Rev. S. Ross Grace pastor of Evant Methodist Church of which Mr. Brooks was a member in the sanctuary, at 4 p.m. on Monday, Evant Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements with burial in Murphee Cemetery, Pallbearers were O.Z. Wilson O.J. Lee, Clyde Thompson, Melvin Horton, Jack Elam, and Bill Price.

Mr. Brooks was born in Evant December 29, 1891, son of the late Mr. William C. Brooks and Sarah N. Winters Brooks. His name was chosen from the town of his birth, and it was given to the newly formed townsite by its founder, Mr. Evans Brooks, pioneer grandfather of Mr. Evant Brooks. When it was discovered that there was an Evans, Texas already, the final letter was changed, thus the name Evant.

Investing his best interest in Evant, Mr. Brooks spent his entire life in the community in which he was born, which is memorial enough for any distinctive character. Due to failing health, in 1964 Mr. Brooks retired, selling his controlling interest in the bank to the present president, Mr. Jack Elam. At this time he closed a record of fifty two years in the bank, which is unusual itself.

In 1915, Mr. Brooks and Miss Ruth Baker, Fairview, were married. To this union was born two children, Ellen Douglas and Keith. Together they proved their first interest was their home, and in this Mr. Brooks performed the same leadership as was done in his vocation. Extending his interest from his family to his bank and other civic enterprises, he went into successful ranching operations, further proving his concern for his fellowman, by

supporting other ranchmen in their growth. All his personal investments were in Evant Community thus leaving memorials "written" in his church, the local Lions' Club and the achievement of the intersection of highway 84 and 281, as outstanding.

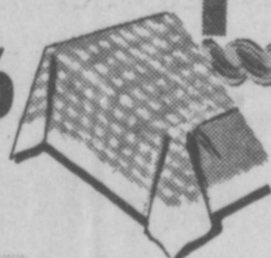

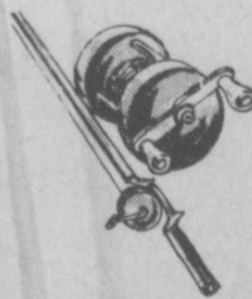

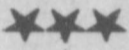

Library Moving To New Site

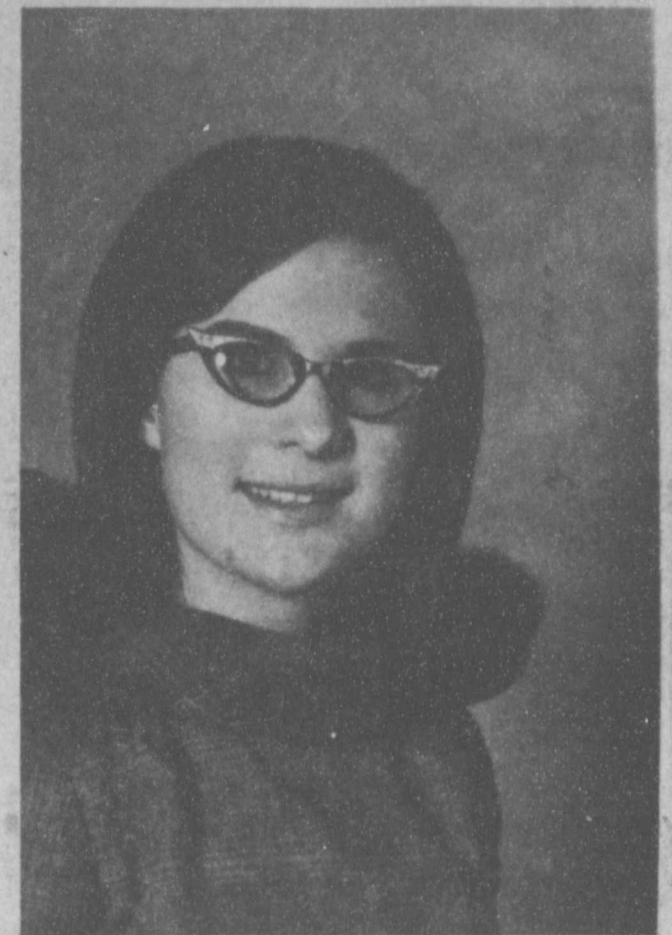

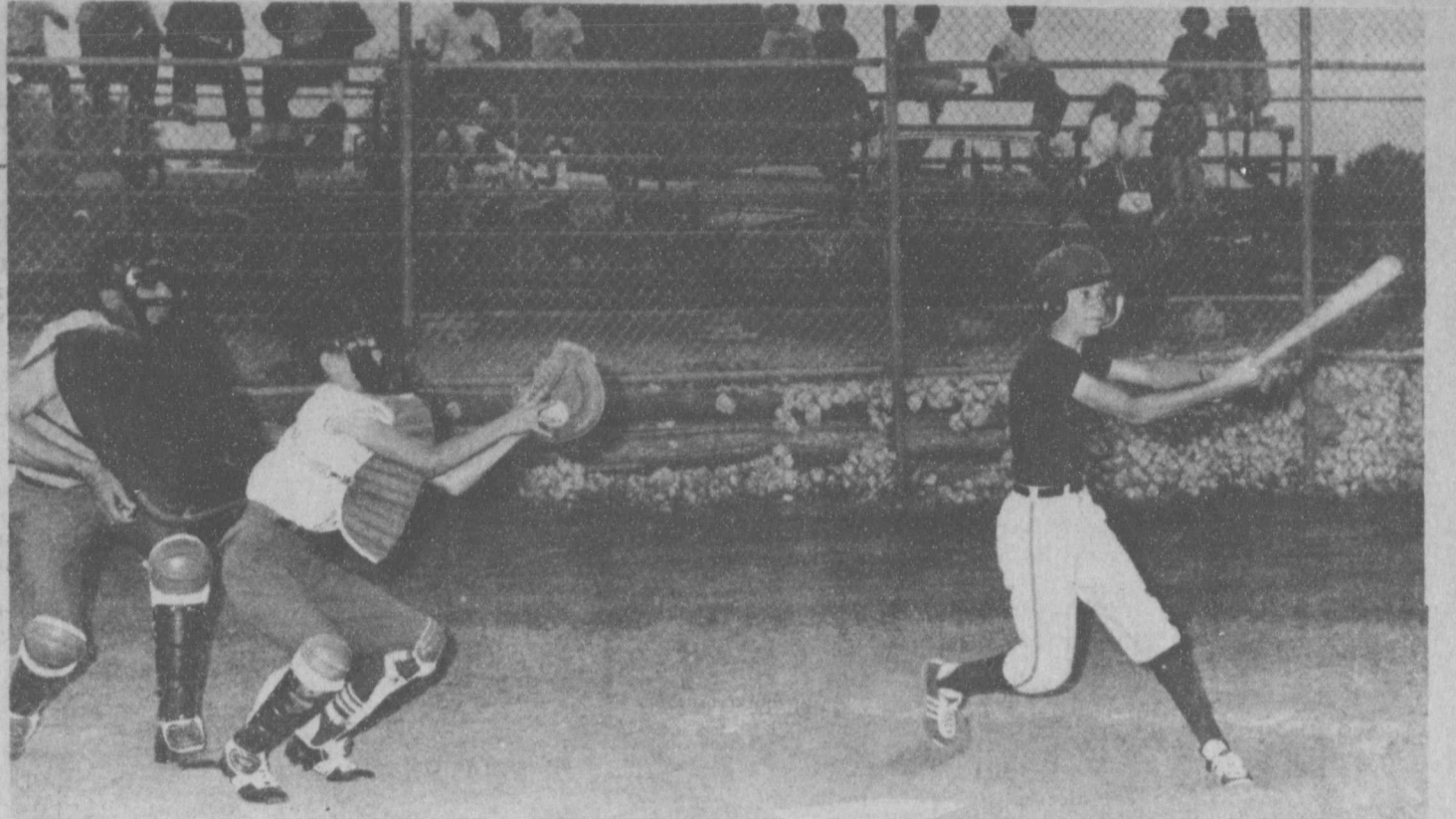

With the help of local ham radio operator Charles Wilson, the local Red Cross was able to answer the many questions asked by the victim families.

Tom Wagner, of Marlin National Red Cross Representative, and William Probes, Red Cross van operator, are in Lubbock giving aid to the storm victims, Mrs. Rogers added.

Every cent of the dollars donated to the fund is used for the victims, Mrs. Rogers continued. The top 10% raised will go to the emergency needs such as medical care, food and shelter for the victims. Next, money will be distributed for emergency purchasing such as clothes and necessities for the victims. The final allotment will be used for rehabilitation above the victims resources. The victims who are financially able to start their homes again will not receive aid, but the money will go to families who cannot build again without financial help.
