McLaughlin To Direct Pageant

"To Gatesville with Love" That is the title of the Centennial Pageant which will depict the past 100 years of life in Gatesville.

Pageant Committee Chairman, Mrs. Richard Springton announced this week that Jerry McLaughlin, Baylor drama student, will direct, stage, and choreograph the pageant using local talent to tell the story of Gatesville. "To Gatesville with Love" will be the title song of the pageant and McLaughlin is presently putting words to music for the opening number.

McLaughlin, presently working on his masters in directing and art, will be signed to a contract to direct the pageant which will be shown August 6, 7, and 8. He is a professional dancer and has studied dance at the New York Academy of Ballet and the Guy Luis Jazz Studio.

While director of the Baylor Summer Musicals in 1968, McLaughlin choreographed "10 In The Shade." In 1969 he directed and choreographed "Where's Charlie?" at Baylor. Also last summer McLaughlin choreographed "Music Man" for the Temple Civic Productions. He conceived, staged, and directed "Life In Those Wonderful Years" at the 1970 RedStockings Follies Sponsored by the Grosebeck Study Club.

The accomplished young director has already begun work on the Gatesville Pa-

geant. Mrs. Springton describes the pageant a "Musical review depicting the last 100 years in Gatesville." Singing and dancing routines will follow the music of the era, charleston, poka, jitter bug, square dance, and other dances.

Several historical moments in Gatesville history will be presented including the Leaper Powell hanging; the Ruby Saloon Beauty Pageant; and the organization of Fort Hood.

The pageant will unfold on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights of the first week of August in the Fireman's Rodeo Arena.

Mrs. Springton noted that the characters in the pageant will all be local talent and all age groups will be needed to put on the mammoth show. Auditions for the show will be held on June 12-13.

The Gatesville High School Stage Band will handle the background music for the pageant.

Near Tragedy Follows Minor Accident

A minor auto crash Saturday morning resulted in near tragedy for several pedestrians at the scene.

The mishap occurred at 10:45 p.m. at the intersection of Texas Highway 36 and West Range Road in North Ft. Hood.

An army jeep, driven by National Guardsman Brian Hawkins, 22, of Waco was attempting a right turn onto West Range Road when an auto traveling south on Texas 36 struck the rear of the military vehicle.

WHEREAS, this brotherhood has officially invited all humans of the male species to live as men did in the time of pioneer days in attitude, spirit, and costume--a costume being the growth of a beard in full or in part, a moustache, goatee, side-burns, etc; and,

WHEREAS, it is farther made illegal for any mercantile establishment, tonsorial parlor, or other trade to market, sell, or promote instruments known to remove hair (such as razors, scissors, shaving soaps and mugs, razor straps; and,

WHEREAS, it is further hereby made legal and binding that if the aforementioned conditions are not met by the citizens of Gatesville, or by any American citizen visiting Gatesville at that time, that

City Council Approves Library, Plans Projects

The City Council approved final payment of the Library at their Tuesday night meeting. The building construction cost was \$76,843.

The new library is now open with furniture being received and installed each day. Many volumes have been stored in boxes on the floor at present, but business is normal at the new facility. Furnishings for the library have been delayed as a result of transportation hold-ups across the nation.

Mayor Bob Miller noted that some last minute furnishings and supplies are still to be paid.

In other Council action, W. F. and J. F. Barnes Inc. was awarded a contract to paint the City Hall exterior and complete several other repairs to the building. Cost of the improvement project is set at \$194,440.

The Council appointed two members of the Board of Equalizations which is to begin work in June. Buddy Biffle and A. W. Ellis will serve on the board.

The City Council has made a zoning change ordinance for Lot 1 of Block 22 of the original town from residential to Commercial. B. A. Mitchell is planning to construct a Cordavan Tire Center at the location on 14th Street and Main.

Bids are being asked by the Council for a new radio for the new fire truck which will be shipped to Gatesville in early June. City Manager, Skipper Waiace noted that specifications for the radio

are available at the city office. The new truck is scheduled to arrive here by June 16. The truck is expected to be here in time for the Rodeo parade June 4.

A city program to clean up and fix up city property and do some street work is planned for this summer. The city plans to use several high school age boys to clean up lots and clean and repair streets.

Present street work on Live Oak and the Library parking lot are ready for final surfacing. Weather has slowed the project which includes work on Leon Street.

The council referred to the committee the new regulations of the Texas Water Quality Board requiring self reporting of waste water discharge into public streams. Testing and sampling of see CITY COUNCIL page 6

FENCING COMPLETE ON 190

Fencing along Highway 190 has been relocated for the proposed widening project from the Coryell County line on the east to the Copperas Cove city limits.

Coryell County Commissioners reviewed the project at their Monday meeting.

County Judge, Norman Storm, noted that only a small amount of chain link fencing still had to be relocated.

Original estimates on the fence relocation was \$9,172.85 but Storm now expects the cost to be down by over \$2,000 to the \$7,000 range.

Mrs. Swift Retires From GSSB

Twenty-six years of devoted teaching service at Hilltop School by Mrs. Gladys Swift of Gatesville were recognized Tuesday by her fellow workers, teachers, and friends at the Gatesville State School for Boys.

Mrs. Swift was guest of honor at a noon barbecue attended by 70 fellow workers. Hilltop School Principal, Satero Gomez, termed working with a teacher as dedicated and as cooperative as Mrs. Swift a privilege. During her

26 years of employment at the Hilltop complex, Mrs. Swift has shown a mastery of her subject matter and an uncanny ability to inject knowledge in a young mind. She has maintained discipline in her classroom and is respected by her students.

When she became ill last year, some of Mrs. Swift's students sent messages to her wishing her well and speaking of their deep admiration for their teacher. Three such messages follow.

"I hope you are better so you can come and teach us again. We all miss you and we would like to have you back. I hope you don't quit being a teacher because you really are a great teacher and you are the best teacher I've ever had and the nicest and the most loveable one," one student said.

Another wrote, "Well, I just can't say goodbye without telling you how much I appreciated being one of your students. I also want to thank you for letting me see a new way of life. P. S. Remember you've always been and always will be the most wonderful person in the world. I'll never forget you as long as I live."

"Sorry to hear that you might not be able to return to teach our class. I have really learned a lot from you since I've been in your class. Because you used to correct me all the time, that made me straighten out a little bit. I don't get into as much trouble as I used to. I do wish that you could return to teaching the seventh grade class, because you are a good teacher," a former student wrote her.

Anchor Plastics Completes Prelim Test On Runabout

Preliminary testing on the new hull design for the Anchor Plastic runabout have been completed and "well pleased" is the word from Anchor Plastic officials. The new 15 foot

boat went through its paces Saturday on Lake Belton with satisfactory results.

The test boat was powered by an 80 horsepower outboard engine and Price Neely, general manager at Anchor Plastic

expects specifications to call for up to an 85 horsepower outboard.

The sleek craft is a fun boat throughout with a walk-through windshield and seating for six to eight persons. Anchor Plastic's has included a hand railing much like the railing on their Deck Boat with the test ship.

"The boat is a dry Boat," notes designer Neely. It has 30 inches overall depth and rides almost on the surface of the water at cruising speeds. Production models will be in 15 and 17 foot models. The test boat is 15 feet by 6 feet wide.

Neely indicated this week that further testing would be conducted on the hull. Plans call for sharpening the kiln for better control and stability.

When testing is completed and final touches put on the boat, Neely expects the market to have a large market.

Production for the runabout will begin in time for the 1971 boating season. Neely plans to introduce the boat at the 1971 Boat Dealers Show in Detroit, Michigan.

Preliminary talk at Anchor has already begun on a fishing boat to further diversify the line of quality boats produced at the Gatesville based plant.

"Jerry has put out a lot of effort to keep the gym in good condition," noted Miller.

Sullivan noted that he has received help from many individuals on a voluntary basis. He noted this help has helped to cut down on Rec. expenses.

Sullivan remarked that pride and a genuine interest in the Rec. Center by most of the participants has helped to make the project a success. He noted that participants generally take good care of the equipment at the gym.

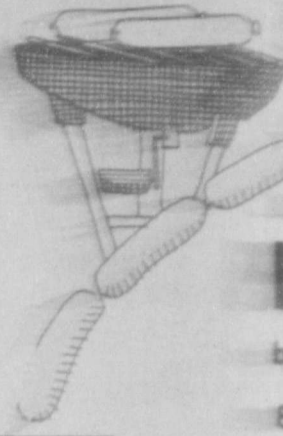
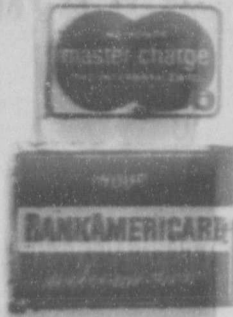

Jund. Approximately five minutes before investigating officers arrived at the wreck scene, an auto approaching the wreckage slid out of control on the slick pavement and struck the disabled auto and three pedestrians.

William Drees, occupant of the auto involved in the first crash, was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital by Erwin ambulance. He was treated for a broken left arm and other injuries. Drees was transferred to a Kerrville hospital Tuesday.

Guardsmen James W. Jones of Marlin and Barry Hawkins of Waco were flown by helicopter ambulance to Darnell Army Hospital at Ft. Hood. The Guardsmen were treated and released.

Investigating Patrolman Jund listed the driver of the second auto as Khalil Showky Taraman of Lubbock. Taraman told officers he did not realize the autos in the southbound traffic lane were stopped. The Egyptian Tech student applied his brakes but his auto slid on the wet pavement and crashed into the rear of the damaged Drees auto and the three men. Seven men were standing in the area, but four were able to jump to safety.

Taraman was unable to use the northbound lane because of on-coming traffic. He was charged with failure to control speed to avoid collision.

Patrolman Jund estimated damage to the jeep at \$300 and damages to the Drees auto at \$200 in the first crash and \$300 in the second. Damages to Taraman's auto were set at \$200.

Taraman was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital for treatment for shock.

A third Ray "branch" returned to Gatesville from San Angelo State University Friday. Jean is a junior at the San Angelo school.



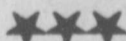

Ghosts of Indian warriors fallen in battle, some call the beautiful creamy spikes of Yucca now dotting the country side. In the bright sunlight the waxen bells are a creamy white color, but brought to the half-light indoors, their color seems to change to a pale shimmering green. At night the tall stalks of blossom seem to have a luminescence that makes them glow in the moonlight or when caught in the gleam of headlights. Because of this unearthly glow they are known in many parts of the Southwest as Our Lord's Candles.

The several varieties of Yucca are members of the wide-spread lily family and have long been used by Indians and other wandering people of the Southwest for many purposes. Some have fibers used for baskets and mats, some have roots which yield a soapy lather reported to be especially good used as a shampoo, and some are used to make a distilled liquor.

Those asparagus like stalks are really as edible as their more prized relative. The bloom stalk may be cut when it is less than a foot high, cooked in two waters and served in any way asparagus is liked. It has a slight mucilaginous quality like okra and is more bitter than asparagus, but would make an interesting vegetable to serve at a "wild" dinner.

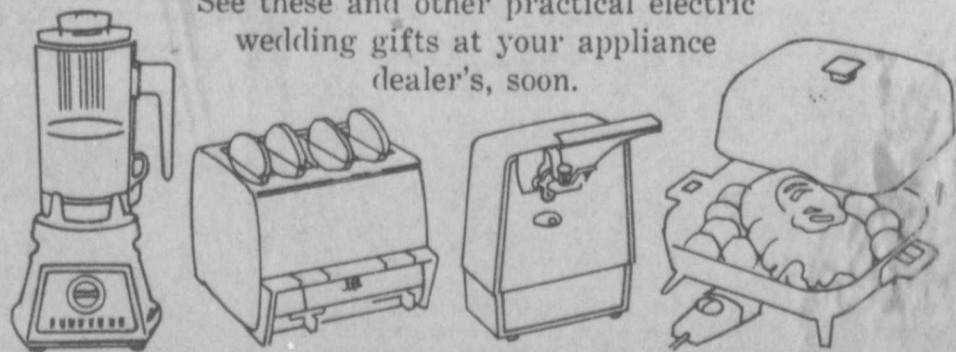

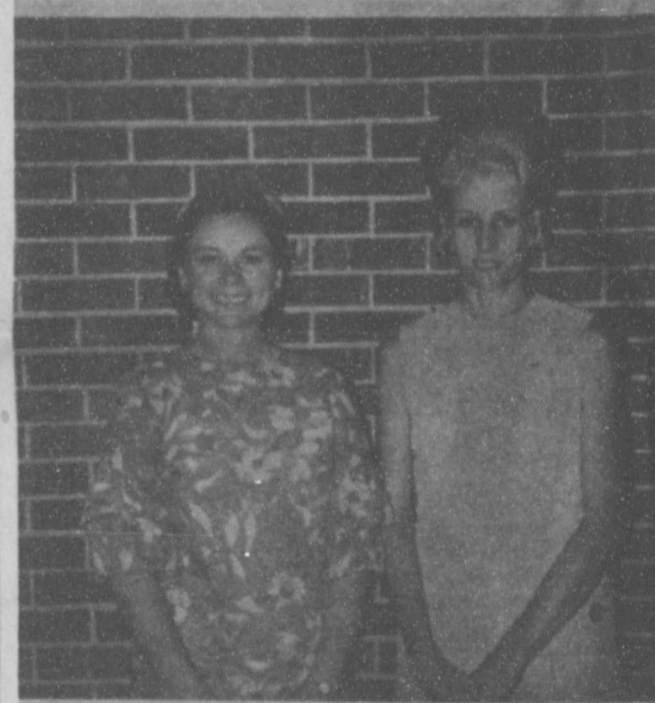

BASEBALL WEEKEND SET FOR ALL THREE LEAGUES

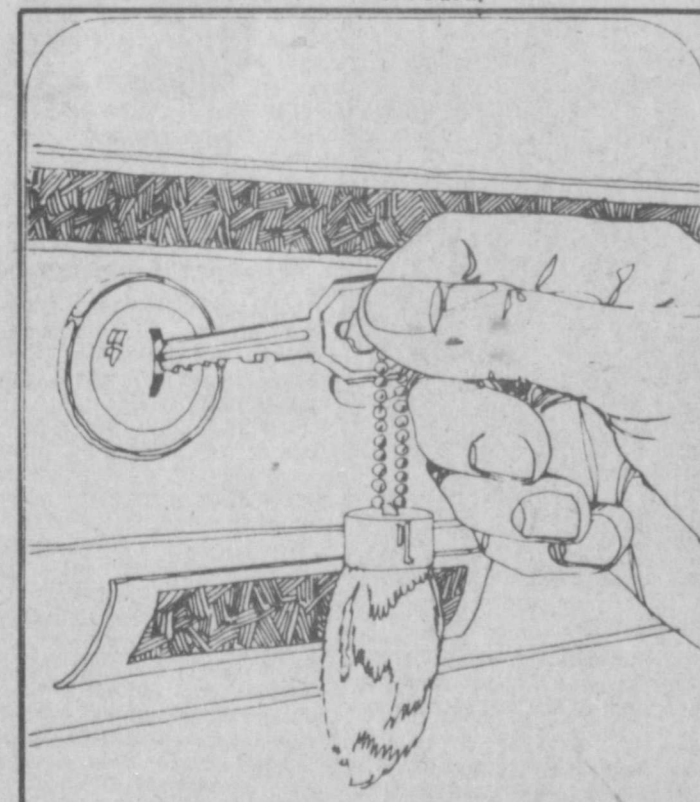
Baseball Commissioner, Jim Miller, has inserted some make up games in all three leagues due to the rainy weather which all but stopped the season openers.
