

RUN-OFF IN PRECINCT 2

SET SATURDAY

The June 6 Second Democratic Primary will feature only one race in Coryell County with the run-off election of Commissioner, Precinct 2.

Luke Austin and Cloyce Duncan made it to the runoff election in the May Primary as the two top vote getters in a five man race for the Commissioner's job.

Austin, a Copperas Cove businessman, received solid support in Copperas Cove in the May Primary. Duncan was the only one of five can-didates in the May election to receive support in both cities

County Clerk, Bubba Hen-son, is estimating 800 voters will turnout for the election. Henson estimates 325 voters will mark ballots in Voting Precinct 5 (Copperas Cove) and 475 voters will mark ballots in Voting Precinct 2, (Gatesville).

Both voting boxes contain over 1,000 registered voters. Henson estimates call for about 40% of the eligible voters to make the trip to the polls.

In absentee voting Henson termed the activity as "average for a two man run-off election. Voting had reached 31 by the end of personal appearance voting Tuesday and three mailed ballots ar still out. The mailed vote must be received before S: turday, June 6 through re gular mail service.

week, The Grand Jury, foremaned by Paul Bromser, is Judge Truman Roberts last grand jury as he will become Judge of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals in January of 1971.

In their report to the Judge the Grand Jury cited Roberts for his clear concise and direct instructions of the grand jury on their duties. The grand jury inspected the jail and found it to be very clean, orderly and apparently well kept. Local law enforcement officers were cited for their

work, The jury wished Judge Ro-berts a fond farewell. Foreman Bromser said "we feel that our community is a better place to live due to your work over the years."

Judge Roberts answered the jury noting mixed emotions and feelings about taking the new job. The 52nd District Court was Roberts post for the past nine years.

He noted to the grand jury that Coryell County has had a good growth factor over the past 10 years and due to increase crimes in the last three to four years probably the grand jury would have to be recalled later this year.

Roberts noted that Coryell's growth might cause changes in the district court. "With that growth factor the time will come when Coryell will be a district itself," he predicted. The present district covering three counties, Coryell, Hamilton and Commanche was drawn up in


Gribble has been workin? on the police course for the past four weeks. The 160 hours of instruction includes instructions from DPS, FBI, Killen Police, and professors at CTC.



PUBLIC INFORMATION

The people in the Gatesville school area have shown great interest in our schools, and the recent bond election. Many complications are envolved in voting vonds and actually getting construction under way. The following time schedule is given for your information:

- I. After a bond issue is approved by the people nothing can be done for 30 days. This is the law. It is allotted time for contests.
- 2. After 30 days expires the district can present to the Attorney General and to an approved Bond Law Firm for validation of transcripts, field notes of district, platt of district, board orders, bond orders and other forms or "redtape".
- 3. If all legal angles are cleared the bonds will be printed.
- 4. Bonds will be advertised for sale. This requires 20 days.
- 5. If the school board accepts a bid on the bonds the architects will advertise for building bids. This requires 20 days lay-over.
- 6. After the 20 day period the board will meet with the bidders and architects to consider construction bids.
- 7. If the school board accepts a construction bid the contractors usually requests 30 days to get on the job.

If no problems are encountered that would cause a delay construction could begin in September or early October. If interest rates are too high or building bids too high this could cause further delay. It is hoped by all concerned that the above schedule will work without any conflicts.

from page 1 the cowboy rides events. (hopefully) a mount rigged with a double-thick pad cinched around the horse--no reing nor stirrups. The rider grips the rigging with one hand and the

other hand must remain free. Then he must ride the animal for eight seconds plus show good form for the judges. The main point of judging is 'how they ride' not if they ride.

The wild Brahma bull riding is one of the rodeo events that did not originate as a part of the cowboy's ranch work. It started as a rodeo event some 30 years ago. It is probably the most exciting and dangerous event of the entire rodeo, and it is the one event that everybody waits to see.

The rider is required to stay on the bull for eight seconds. He does not have to spur the bull like the bronc riders do, but he does get extra points if he is able to. Just staying on the bull is a monumental effort, since

back across the finish line. One of the most outstanding examples of precise team-work in the world of sports is the steer wrestling; or Bull-dogging, as it is more commonly known. The training and discipline of the horses and the skill of the riders are both of paramount importance. If either horse 'jumps the gun'

and breaks the barrier, the 'dogger' gets a ten second penalty, This is one of the poten-tially fastest events of the rodeo, with times as low as two to three seconds being possible. If you don't watch

his utmost for the final run

closely, it may be all over before you notice it has start-In team roping, also known as 'head'n and heal'n' two male contestants participate in the

buddy system' of roping. The action starts just like steer wrestling, but the cowboy ropes the steer instead of dogging it.

The other team member, already in the arena, ropes one heel of the beast as the 'header' as he is called, ropes the head of the animal. The header then dismounts as his horse holds the north bound part of the steer taught with the south bound part. The cowboy runs to tie the back legs of the steer together while the opposing pulls finally pull the animal to the ground. As in steer wrestling, there is a penalty for breaking the barrier. This year's rodeo will also feature the hilarious wild cow milking. In this event two cowpokes team-up to milk a wild cow. One team mem-ber ropes the 1500 pounds of beef and the other member tries to get milk into a bottle. When the white fluid is bottled the "leg man" runs to the finish line to stop the clock,

These bulls offer many possibilities for injury to the rider. These include the possibility of being stomped, kicked, gored, or even injured in the chute before the gate is ever opened

the

These bulls are extremely powerful, and it's been said that they can throw a cowboy high enough for the Jaybirds to build a nest in his hippocket before he hits thd ground.

Among the timed events, the most popular is calf roping. Calf Roping originated on ranches as one of the cowboy's daily tasks. As he rode the pastures in the days

before fences, he would have to rope and brand any calves that had been missed during


the round-up. Calf roping started as a rodeo event at the first organized rodeo in Pecos, Texas, in 1883. The cowboys from several of the big ranches decided it was time to see who was the best roper and who was the best talker. The main street was roped off, and the question

was settled. Since that time, calf roping has become a much more precise art. Horses must be better trained, ropers must practice constantly, and then the two must combine to form a well coordinated team in order to take home any prize money. Every year faster times are required to win, with nine to twelve seconds

being the time to beat. Barrel racing, another timed event is the only event that is exclusively for girls at the 1970 show.

Barrel racing is the most glamorous of the girl's rodeo events. This event takes complete teamwork between horse and rider in order to circle the three barrels at top speed without knocking one down. This is a timed event in which the rider turns her horse around three barrels set in a cloverleaf pattern. She may start with either the right or left barrel, but she must then follow a prescribed pattern. The contestant may touch a barrel, but knocking one down adds a ten-second penalty to her score for each barrel she

busts a shin on, A barrel horse must be able to start at top speed, turn and leave each barrel as fast as possible, and give
