



*Recommendation by go-vernor's aide John Shanahan Jr. for tighter rules over oil industry operating in state waters and legislative designation of responsibility for oil spill contingency planning.

COURTS SPEAK -- In dis-trict court cases at Houston and El Paso, Att. Gen. Crawford C. Martin won first judicial orders checking air pollution by trash burning and industrial smoke. Civil penalties were assessed in the Robert's Dump case, Houston, An El Paso smelting and refining firm was given deadlines for installing anti-pollution devices.

Commissioner John C. White also proposed in a meet-ing of the Interim Legislative Study Committee on Land Use and Enviormental Control that the legislative regulate dis-

posing of pesticides and chemical compounds that are no longer needed, no longer used or banned from use. called the

Committee meeting following a report on cumulative effects of the pesticide DDT on animals, White repeated his previous statement that he knows of no case in which numans have been harmed as a result of the use of DDT in agriculutral.

Same Committee was told by a Florida biologist that oysters taken from the Arroyo Colorado area of Laguana Madre had the highest DDT concentrations of any in the nation. This, the biologist said, is a reflection of intense agricultural activity in the Rio Grande Valley. Oysters, according to the same authority, are not killed by DDT, but fish that eat them are.

A Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman said hydrocarbons (such as DDT) cannot continue to be used without serious degradation of the world ecological



It seems that Al's recipe for last week was not "ye ole kid pleaser oatmeal cookies" but Oatmeal cake! So if when you pour that taste-tempting batter into that oven pan--don't expect it to break up into thinly sliced cookies because it won't do it. ONCE A CAKE, NEVER A COOKIE!

I do have some expecially nice recipes from some veteran cooks from Coryell County this week. For you readers with sweet tooths we've some real scrumptious pie recipes to make your mouth water.

Mrs. Mildred Price of Gatesville, known for her fine cookery among Gatesvillites and county residents too, sent in two pie recipes.

CUSTARD PIE

3 eggs 5 tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt

Philsi e II.

21/2 cups milk 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg or l teaspoon flavoring

Beat eggs lightly, add sugar, salt and milk. Add flavoring if it is used. Pour in a 9 inch unbaked pie shell. Bake in a moderate oven until firm. Sprinkle nutmeg on top before baking if nutmeg is desired.

FROZEN STRAWBERRY PIE (2 Pies)

2 egg whites (beaten stiff) l cup sugar or 2/3 if wanted not so sweet l teaspoon lemon juice (more if desired) 1 - 10 oz. pkg. strawberries frozen

Put all in a large mixing bowl and mix at high speed for 15 minutes. Then stir a little after mixing to smooth. (It beats up like meringue.) Fold in 1/2 cup whipped whipping cream. (Can substitute Dream Whip.) Freeze until ready to serve.

BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES (old fashioned pickle slices)

4 quarts thinly sliced unpared cucumbers 6 medium white onions (sliced) green pepper cut in strips 3 cloves garlic crushed 1/3 cup coarsely-medium salt cups sugar 30.3 cups white vinegar 2 table spoons mustard seed 1/2 teaspoon of celery seed 1/2 teaspoon turmeric

Combine vegetables with garlic and salt. Cover with ice cubes and mix thouroughly. Let stand for 3 hours.
