Minor League action is in full swing now but still rained out games are being sandwiched in to catch up on the schedule.

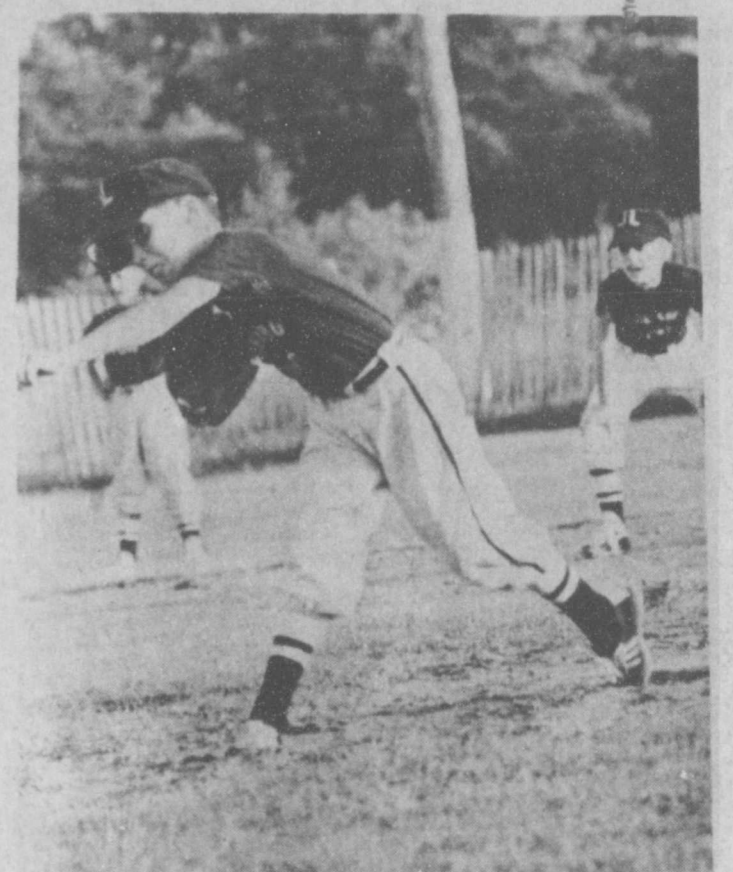
Powell Supply won two games this week to take an early lead in the pennant race. First Powell stopped Miller Motor 15 to 4 Friday night.
