



\$13,462.48 Sales Tax Check Received Wed.

A \$13,462.48 city sales tax check was received Wednesday by the city. The check is the fifth such check received by Gatesville since the tax was put into effect January 1, 1969.

Last year city sales tax totaled \$55,250.57 with the first quarter of 1970 sales first quarter returning only \$10,433.46. For the last three quarters of 1970 sales tax receipts ranged between \$14,000 and \$15,000.

Mayor Bob Miller noted the figure does show growth over the previous year. He indicated that not all of the \$3,029.02 difference between first quarter figures represents increased sales.

Part of the difference is retained funds in the very first quarter for expense accounts in the State Comptroller's office.

The taxable sales items have remained constant for the past year and Miller notes that a growth factor is probably reflected in the increase. New business such as Gibson's Discount Center and H. E. B. Food Store began business after the first quarter of 1969.

Miller also noted that inflation and higher prices were reflected in the figures. The seemingly unescapable econ-

omic inflation cost in many ways.

City Sales tax for 1970 should reach over \$65,000 as the business community continues the present growth pattern.

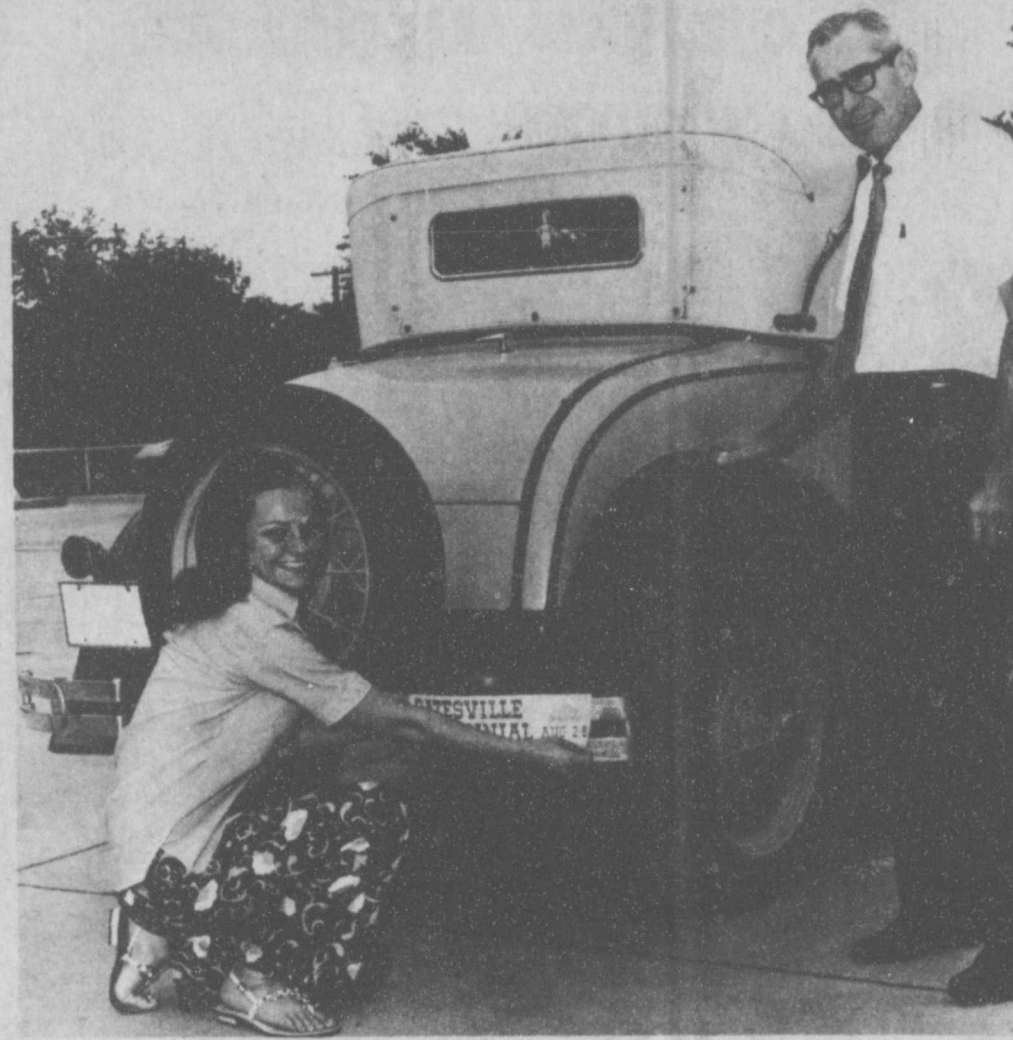

Stabbing-Shooting Results In Charges Against Three Men

A knifing and shooting incident at the Snak Shak Sunday morning sent two Gatesville

men to the hospital and charges of aggravated assault were filed against Raymond Ortega

and Robert Cathey. During the same disturbance a man fired several shots from a .22 pump rifle. He was charged with attempted murder. City, County and Department of Public Safety officers investigated the disturbance which was reported to Police Chief Gene Goins at 12:20 a.m.

The charges of aggravated assault were filed against Raymond Ortega and Robert Cathey and Alonzo Ortega Jr. was charged with attempt to murder in connection with the shooting incident.

Police Chief Goins reported that the incident allegedly started as a result of words between Cathey and Raymond Ortega. Reportedly Ortega left the scene and returned with a "night stick" and Alonzo Ortega Sr. with a "jointed metal hose."

Goins reported the two men then beat Cathey on the head, shoulder, and arm. Cathey reportedly knifed Raymond in the abdomen and cut Alonzo Ortega Sr. on the left arm severely.

Goins noted that shortly after the knifing Alonzo Ortega Jr. arrived at the Snak Shak and began firing a .22 caliber pump rifle at Cathey as he sat in his car.

One bullet lodged in the left front door about seven inches below the window level. Cathey reportedly ran into a wooded area across Highway 84 near the construction site of the new Methodist Church to escape the volley of shots.

Raymond and Alonzo Ortega Sr. were taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital. Raymond was released early Sunday and Alonzo remained in the hospital until Tuesday.

The two men charged with aggravated assault were released on \$1000 bond each and Alonzo Ortega Jr. was released on \$2500 on the charge of attempt to murder.

Are rundown unnecessary fences removed?

Is the house neat and presentable in appearance?

Is the house in good repair?

Is siding in place and secure?

Is it painted?

Is the porch in good condition?

Is the roof in good condition?

Are steps safe, free from loose boards and hazards?

PLANTS
Is all dead and diseased wood removed from trees and shrubs?

Are flower borders neat and free from weeds?

CTCOG Receives Two Grants Totaling \$100,582

The Texas Criminal Justice Council has approved two grants for the Central Texas Region (Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Mills and Milam Counties), including \$86,322.00 for a Regional Information Network and \$14,260.00 for a Peace Officer Training Program.

The Law Enforcement Training Program is to be a \$44,260.00 project, with local matching funds of \$30,000.00 to be provided.

The training and educational program is scheduled for one year and is to be a continuation of the training programs offered last year through Central Texas Col-

lege. Four planned for the year with attendance being set at 25 persons per course, also eight Special Seminars are to be conducted with 20 persons per seminar being scheduled. The exact time and date of each class and seminar will be announced by Central Texas College, Killeen.

The Law Enforcement Training Programs and Seminars last year were well received throughout the Region as 39 officers attending 2 Certification Courses received State Certification. Thirty-four attended two special seminars and received intensive training in the subjects

of Narcotics and Criminal Investigation. The future certification courses and seminars will be conducted on the Central Texas College campus and will be available without cost to law enforcement officials within the region. Law enforcement officers outside the region are invited to attend on a tuition basis.

The Regional Information Network grant of \$86,322.00 is to be matched by \$55,501.00 of local funds for a total project of \$141,823.00. Central Texas College, Killeen, is to be the Director of the project.

Former Missionaries Now Working Together Here

Two old friends were reunited at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church in Gatesville this week. Father Anthony Weber, C.S.C., pastor, welcomed to the parish his long-time friend Father Clifford J. Atwood, C.S.C., Tuesday.

The two priests met in Austin, Texas in 1948 at Seton Hospital. Father Atwood, just ordained at Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, was at the hospital when Father Weber resided as temporary chaplain while on furlough from India. Father Weber was there helping out his brother who is also a priest now at Holy Cross Parish in Lafayette, La. From there both men went their own way.

Father Weber returned to India to complete a total of 21 years spent there during his vocational life. Father Weber said he went to India with the knowledge of approximately 100 words of the spoken language, Bengali. But living there mastered the language quickly. His transportation centered around foot, bicycle, motor bike, boat, and train. His meals consisted of rice and curry for lunch and curry and rice for dinner. At certain seasons chickens and vegetables were obtainable. However, none of these elements hindered the outstanding missionary work accomplished by Father Weber. While in Dacca, India now known as Bengal, East Pakistan since 1948, Father was in charge of the construction of a \$3 million hospital, Holy Family Hospital was built to aid up to 350 patients. The hospital is now conducted by the Medical Missionary Sisters.

His work has not gone unnoticed. Taken from the book "Nowhere a Stranger" by Richard F. Long, the author states:

In charge of hospital construction in Fort Portal is a Holy Cross missionary priest of exceptional ability who has been a helping hand to the Sisters, Father Anthony Weber, C.S.C. served with the Holy Cross Fathers in Bengal, East Pakistan for many years. He was in charge of construction of one of the most beautiful and functional hospitals I was to see in my world trip: Holy Family Hospital, Dacca. This splendid hospital, which was built under the direction of Sister Bene-

dict, can compare with any in the world.

From Dacca, Father Weber's efforts to bring Christianity into the world continued as he moved onto Mysen-singh, India. There he continued his missionary work 8 years at St. Patrick's Church, the headquarters, and 20 out stations in the Garos Hills, the foothills of the Himalayas.

After India, Father saw his homelands again for 2 years while he was in Indiana at Gibaults School for Boys, then it was off to Africa where he spent 4 years in Uganda. Here under his guidance the only catholic hospital in the providence of Uganda was built.

While Father Weber contributed to Christianity in India and Africa, Father Atwood filled his role in the priesthood in similar ways. After his ordination in 1947, and he completed his duties at Seton Hospital, Father was sent to San Jose, Texas where he spent 5 years. After San Jose, Father was pastor at the Santo Domingo Parish in Chile, along the Pacific sea coast. Father said it was a beautiful sight to see the Pacific waters rolling in over the rocks, which they named the "rocks of St. Dominic." Speaking Spanish fluently, Father's duties at his parish included missionary work and teaching English grammar to the Spanish speaking people. After spending a total of 14 years in South America, Father Atwood returned to Texas. This time to St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Killeen. He was there from 1966 to 1967 positioned as teacher and principal of St. Joseph's School.

In 1967 he was relieved of his duties in Killeen and moved on to New Orleans Louisiana, as assistant superior of Sacred Heart. Here Father's duties entailed working with the Latin Americans and saying the mass in Spanish once a month.

Now after 22 years of outstanding missionary and parish work on the part of both men, the two dedicated advocates of the church will work once again together. In addition to his role of pastor, Father Weber holds the title of Chaplain and counselor at the State School for Boys. Father Atwood will hold similar duties at the school.

The purpose of the program is to encourage kids to stay in school through providing employment and training. Youths age 16 to 21 are eligible for the program.

Today, the surest means of a book becoming a best-seller is for the author to highlight and denounce bitterly the faults of this country. The same can be said of television and the movies, which prefer in these modern days to depict the seamier side of life in America.

But there's hope. As I have moved across this state, I have sensed that our people are growing weary of gloom. It's becoming easier to strike up a conversation on what's right about America.

But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind. I've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their government.

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assurance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970's with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old politics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.

Melinda Anderson To Attend Family Seminar

GEORGETOWN -- Two hundred and two students, their parents, and members of their families will attend the Family Seminar at Southwestern University on June 26 and 27. Each summer Southwestern hosts families of students who will enter the university as freshmen in September at an orientation seminar during which families meet administrators and faculty, are briefed on various programs and services of the university, and enjoyed the recreational facilities of the campus.

During the Family Seminar incoming freshmen are administered the CLEP examinations (College Level Examination Program) through which they may earn college credits by scoring above the 85th percentile on the tests, or receive permission to waive certain freshmen courses normally required. Tests are based upon national college sophomore norms. Southwestern was one of the first colleges in the country to make use of the CLEP examinations to determine the level at which students should enter college work based upon their own achievement. In the class entering Southwestern in the fall of 1969, three or more credits were awarded to 36 percent of the students, with 19 receiving 12 or more credits.

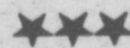

Bright and early Monday morning, Mrs. Fred Dyer, Sr., called to let me know that 7-UP is a great part of that recipe--in fact without the pop the cake won't rise! As our investigation continued, we discovered the 7-UP was accidentally left out of the recipe. Not knowing enough about cooking, I didn't know to question the concoction's ability to rise. After all, there were 7 ingredients, so I questioned nothing.

You good readers will have the correction before you in the next few lines. I hope in time, if you have already attempted the cake, don't worry, my 7-UP cake probably won't rise either--WITH THE POP! Here's the recipe on another take.

7-UP CAKE (with 7-UP pop)

- 2 sticks oleo
- 1/2 c. Wesson Oil
- 3 c. sugar
- 5 eggs
- 3 c. flour
- 1 teaspoon each of vanilla and almond extracts
- 1 8oz. bottle of 7-UP

Beat all ingredients together well. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Bake one hour and fifteen minutes. (in a tube pan) Remember the 7-UP cake will freeze well for strumptuous eating later!

CARROT CAKE

- | | |

| 3 cups sifted flour | 1 1/2 cups salad oil |
| 2 teaspoons baking powder | 1 teaspoon vanilla |
| 2 teaspoons baking soda | 4 large eggs |
| 2 teaspoons cinnamon or 1 if you do not care for cinnamon | 3 cups of finely grated or shredded raw carrots |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | |
| 1 cup raisins | |
| 1/2 cup coarsely chopped nut meats | |
| 2 cups sugar | |

On wax paper mix all dry ingredients. Then mix the raisins and nuts in a separate bowl, using 2 tablespoons of flour over the mixture. In a large mixing bowl, beat together one at a time sugar, oil and vanilla (thoroughly) in eggs.

Stir in alternately sifted dry ingredients and carrots until smooth. After each addition stir in flowered raisin mixture. Turn into a flowered angel-food cake pan (10 X 13 in.) Batter will not come up high. Bake in pre-heated 350 degree oven about 1 1/4 hours. Cool on wire rack 10 minutes. Turn out on rack and frost with ride side up with cream cheese frosting.

CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

- 1 pkg. 3 oz. cream cheese (soft)
- 2 tablespoons light corn syrup
- 2 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

In a medium bowl stir until blended cream cheese and syrup. Gradually stir in confectioner's sugar then the vanilla. Keep smooth. Makes enough for top of 10 inch cake.

Pearl tied the game in the sixth inning with five runs on three hits.

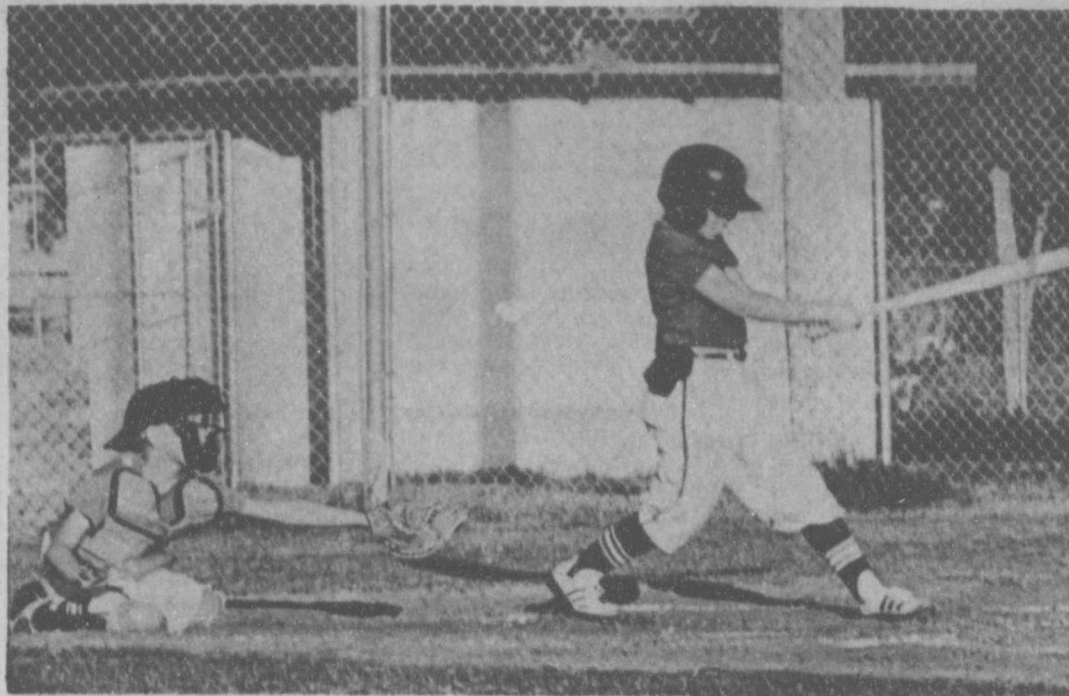
The final duel between Scott's Furniture and National Bank is slated for Wednesday, July 15, and both teams will be concentrating on main-
