\$13,462.48 Sales Tax **Check Received Wed.**

A \$13,462.48 city sales tax check was received Wednesday by the city. The check is the fifth such check received by Gatesville since the tax was put into effect Jan-

uary 1, 1969. Last year city sales tax totaled \$55,250.57 with the first quarter of 1970 sales first quarter returning only \$10,433.46. For the last three quarters of 1970 sales tax receipts ranged between \$14,000 and \$15,000. Mayor Bob Miller noted

the figure does show growth over the previous year. He indidcated that not all of the \$3,029.02 difference between first quarter figures represents increased sales.

Part of the difference is retained funds in the very first quarter for expense accounts in the State Comptrollers office.

The taxable sales items have remained constant for the past year and Miller notes that a growth factor is probably reflected in the increase. New business such as Gibson's Discount Center and H. E. B. Food Store began business after the first quarter of 1969.

Miller also noted that inflation and higher prices were reflected in the figures. The seemingly unescapable econ-

Goins reported the two men then beat Cathey on the head, shoulder. and arm. Cathey reportedly knifed Raymond in the abdoman and cut Alonzo Ortega Sr. on the left arm severly.

Goins noted that shortly after the knifing Alonzo Or-tega Jr. arrived at the Snak Shak and began firing a .22 caliber pump rifle at Cathey as he sat in his car.

Summer Youth Corp **B**egins Second Year

In Program

The Summer Neighborhood Youth Corp program is beginning its second year in Gatesville with 12 Gatesville area youths presently being

employed. The program is sponsored by the Department of Labor and is administered by the Economic Opportunities Ad-vancement Corporation with offices in Waco.

David Parker, field repre-sentative for EOAC was in Gatesville Tuesda to contact public non-profit Inganizations for possible employment of local youth through the program.

Presently Farker has placed three youth with the city, eight with the county and one with the Farmers Home Administration in Gatesville. One Evant youth is now working with the Evant School and six Cove youths are working

in Copperas Cove. The purpose of the program is to encourage kids to stay in school through providing employment and training. Youths age 16 to 21 are eligible for the program.

Former Missionaries Now Working Together Here While Father Weber condict, can compare with any in

Two old friends were re-united at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church in Gatesville this week. Father Anthony Weber C.S.C., pastor, wel-comed to the parish his long-time friend Father Clifford J. Atwood C.S.C. Tuesday.

The two priests met in Austin, Texas in 1948 at Seton Hospital. Father Atwood, just ordained at Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, was at the hospital when Father Weber resided as temporary chaplin while on furlough from India. Father Weber was there helping out his brother who is also a priest now at Holy Cross Parish in Lafayette, La. From there both men went their own way.

Father Weber returned to India to complete a total of 21 years spent there during vocational life. Father Weber said he went to India with the knowledge of approximately 100 words of the spoken language, Bengali. But living there mastered the language quickly. His transportation centered around foot, bicycle, motor bike, boat, and train. His meals consisted of rice and curry for lunch and curry and rice for dinner. At certain seasons chickens and vegtables were obtainable. However, none of these elements hindered the outstanding missionsry work accomplished by Father Weber. While in Dacca, India now known as Bengal, East Pakistan since 1948, Father was in charge of the construction of a \$3 million hospital. Holy Family Hospital was built aid up to 350 patients. The hospital is now conducted by the Medical Missionary Sisters.

His work has not gone unnoticed. Taken from the book "Nowhere a Stranger" by Richard F. Long, the author states:

In charge of hospital con-struction in Fort Portal is Holy Cross missionary priest of exceptional ability who has been a helping hand to the Sisters. Father Anthony Weber, C.S.C. served with the Holy Cross Fathers in Bengal, East Pakistan for many years. He was in charge of construction of one of the. most beautiful and functional hospitals I was to see in my world trip: Holy Family Hospital, Dacca. This splendid hospital, which was built under the direction of Sister Bene-

tributed to Christianity in India and Africa, Father Atwood From Dacca, Father Webfilled his role in the priester's efforts to bring Christhood in similar ways. After

ianity into the world continued as he moved onto Mymensingh, India. There he continued his missionary work 8 years at St. Patrick's Church, the headquarters, and 20 out stations in the Garos Hills, the foothills of the Himalayas. After India, Father saw

his homelands again for 2 years while he was in Indiana at Gibaults School for Boys, then it was off to Africa where he spent 4 years in Uganda. Here under his guidance the only catholic hospital in the providence of Uganda was built.
