

1907 K-FORD HERE FOR CENTENNIAL

PRIZE WINNING ANTIQUES ARE FEATURED IN CAR PARADE

The Antique Car Show and Parade is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Friday, August 7, in Gatesville, will feature approximately 50 old cars from around Central Texas.

Centennial Publicity Chairman, Charles Wise and Antique Car Owner D. W. McDonald recently compiled some interesting information on some of the cars to be in the parade.

A 1907 K-Ford with a local background and the 1st place National Winner of the Antique Automobile Club of America, a 1914 Case, will be among the cars here for the Centennial.

The 1907 K-Ford is returning to Gatesville to help celebrate Gatesville's Centennial. It will be on display at Miller Ford Company, August 3-8. Its original owner, Dr. J. R. Raby, was the well-known and remembered doctor and banker of Gatesville. It was later sold to Mr. John T. Dyson, a ginner and master machinist who was the father of Mrs. W. T. Perryman who lives at Mountainview. The owner is now Mr. Karl Binner of West.

The car will be remembered by many Coryell county people because it has traveled our streets before carrying these very interesting people.

The 1907 Ford is a six cylinder, Gentleman's Roadster. It was called the Silent Cyclone with a guarantee to sixty miles per hour. The eighty horsepower motor was one of the largest horsepower in its day. The original cost of the car was \$2,750 at the factory. Dr. Raby paid \$3,000 for delivery in Gatesville with a few extras.

There were only 2,000 of them made in the years of 1906, 1907, and 1908. Most of them were touring cars. Mr. Karl Binner's K-Ford Gentleman's Roadster and one other, are the only ones known today.

This will be one of the 50 entries from the Waco Heart O' Texas Horseless Carriage Club in the antique car parade to be held 5:30 p.m. Friday, August 7 as a part of the Gatesville Centennial. Other local and out of town owners of antique autos are invited to join the parade.

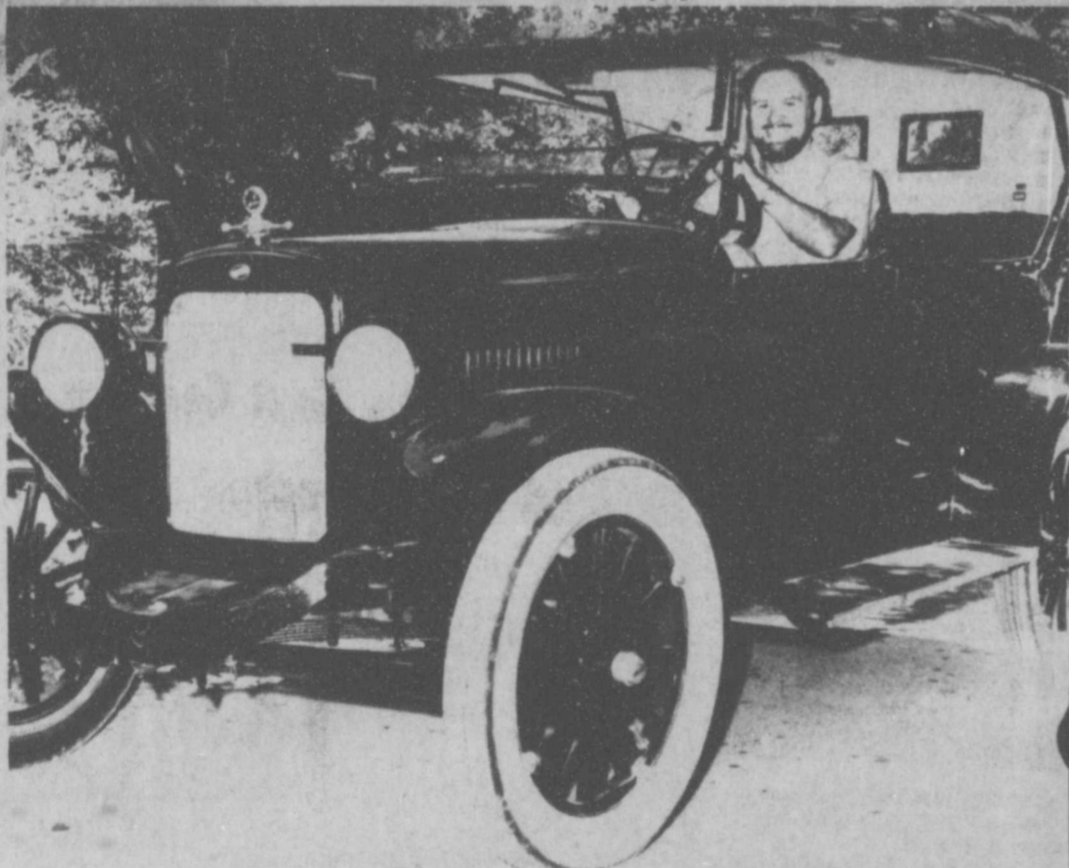

Its restoration was completed in June of 1965 after acquisition in 1956 from Mr. Henry Herring of Gatesville, Texas. It is a one-owner, Coryell County car, with only 9,257 miles on the speedometer.

more. It had insert bearings in the motor, standard transmission, 100 inch wheel base, 19.6 horsepower and was second in sales with only Ford making and selling more cars. The Willys-overland is a

rugged car with power to spare on the hills. The company was later known as the Willys Motor Company that built the famous Willys "Jeep" for the army in World War II. Some of the old model jeep

parts will fit parts of the "overland."

ROUND UP ONCE USED AS CORYELL COURTHOUSE

Many unusual historical facts will come out during the centennial celebration and this week it was noted that at the time of construction of the present Courthouse commissioners court held their meetings in the building now occupied by the Roundup Cafe.

Pat Patterson, owner of the Roundup Cafe, had heard talk of the building being used as a temporary courthouse and Tuesday, County Clerk Bubba Henson, helped Patterson search the records.

On June 28, 1897 the Commissioners court minutes noted the following: "It was ordered by the court that during the construction and erection of the new courthouse for Coryell County, that the J. B. Fauntleroy Rock business house situated west of the public square on main street in the town of Gatesville be and the same is here certified by the court as a temporary courthouse to be used for

courthouse purposes during the period of time it may be required to build said new courthouse."

The Commissioners Court minutes list T. C. Taylor, county judge; James Russell, H. A. Hoshier, R. E. Edwards, and J. H. Grigsby, commissioners present at the meeting.

COVE VOTERS APPROVE BOND

Copperas Cove voters Saturday approved three general obligation bond issues totaling \$500,000. Only 344 persons of 1,500 who were eligible voted.

The bond issues included \$325,000 to move water lines from the city limits of Killen to Copperas Cove to allow the widening of Highway 190; \$75,000 for a new library;

ASCS Payments Now Over 1/2 Million

Another \$311,427.57 in price support payments were paid out this week by the Coryell County ASCS office.

The total payment since July 1 has now reached \$596,264. Cloice Stone, ASCS executive director, noted that approximately 100 farms have still not filed reports to be eligible for payments.

The deadline for filing reports is August. Stone expects all farms to be filed by the August deadline. Processing of reports requires approximately three weeks.

Stone noted that average payments to farmers ranged between \$300 and \$700. Recent proposed legislation to limit payments to any individual to a maximum of \$20,000 would have no effect in Coryell County, according to Stone.

Recent publicity has noted that in certain areas of the country individuals have received payments as high as \$1,000,000 annually.

Bomb Scare At Post Office

A bomb hoax was discovered early Tuesday morning in the lobby of the Gatesville Post Office. J. C. Vandick found the device on the table at the east end of the lobby at about 6:05 a.m.

According to Vandick, he first thought the package wrapped in brown paper was a parcel post package that someone had forgotten to mail.

Vandick said he checked the box for addresses, "I turned the thing over and looked at the bottom. I even shook it a little." About this time he noted the ticking sound and called for Jerry Barton.

The two men quickly called Postmaster Hal Anderson and removed the potentially dangerous package to the rear of the post office. The shoe box size package was placed

between two concrete walls. Anderson notified Sheriff Windy Cummings of the suspicious package. Mail distribution came to a halt as Anderson had the post office closed and the street in front of the building blocked for a short time.

Sheriff Cummings called for a Fort Hood demolition team after a close inspection of the package.

Steve Fore, son of postal employee Zak Fore, was called over from his apartment near the post office. Fore was a demolition expert in Vietnam. Fore inspected the package and peeled the brown paper off the box and lifted the shoe box lid slightly.

At first glance the package appeared to be a bomb with a clock, battery, wiring and a tube with possible explosives inside.

The Fort Hood demolition team, S/Sgt. W. L. Bledsoe and S/Sgt. Gary King took no more than 20 minutes to make the drive from South Fort Hood. The two men quickly clipped the wires and discovered the hoax bomb had no explosives.

TWO ACCIDENTS REPORTED - BOTH DRIVERS FALL ASLEEP

Highway Patrolman, David [name] reported two accidents last week in which the drivers apparently fell asleep. The two unrelated accidents involved drivers employed at Auction Commission Companies in Central Texas.

In the first one Miss Linda Jean Wehrmann of McGregor was uninjured when her 1970 Ford left the road leading into the south bar ditch and spun around ending up in the north bar ditch.

Miss Wehrmann is employed at the Gatesville Commission Co. here and was headed home after the weekly auction when the accident occurred 15.1 miles east on F. M.

Event Teachers Attend Small School Workshop

Six members of the Evant School Faculty attended the Eleventh Annual Texas Small Schools Project Workshop for Teachers and Administrators at Jester Center Halls on the University of Texas Campus in Austin on July 5-10. Teachers representing Evant were Mrs. J. E. Green, Home Economics; Mrs. Leona Walton, fifth grade; Mrs. A. L. McFadden, fourth grade; Mrs. Adelle Baker, third grade; Mrs. Jean A. Pruden, first grade; and Superintendent L. L. Pruden.

Teachers reported many new ideas were attained to make teaching more effective in the Evant Public Schools. Superintendent Pruden reported that Administrators' buzz sessions concerning problems for the kindergarten for the 70's, Teacher Certification, Racial Minorities in Small Schools, In-service Education, New Laws in Minimum Foundation Services, New Daily Registers, Prevention of Crime and Misuse of Drugs, and Special Education were both helpful and informative.

Superintendent Pruden reports that the number of Texas Small Schools joining the Small School Project has increased by 29 and the number of teachers becoming members of the TSSA increased by 104 during the 1969-70 school year. This workshop again points out the fine work being done by the small schools in Texas.

Supt. Pruden was one of the two lucky recipients to win the \$25.00 door prize given away at the final session of the 1969-70 workshop.

City Council Announces New Street Improvements

City Council voted to begin immediate street improvements on four streets just south of the downtown business district in preparation for the centennial.

Mayor Bob Miller noted that the streets would have heavy traffic during the centennial and since the construction of the new swimming pool several of the streets have been carrying more traffic.

The project includes the following streets: Bridge street from 10th to 6th street; Sixth street from Leon to Bridge; Seventh street from Leon to one block south of College street; and Eighth street from Leon to Bridge street.

Work on the project is expected to begin within the next few days. Mayor Miller estimates the cost of the project at \$10,500. Presently plans call for plowing up the existing streets and re-surfacing the roadways.

Cleo Woodard, contractor for the project, indicates to Mayor Miller that the work could be completed before the August Centennial.

On other street improvement programs the Council instructed City Manager, Skipper Wallace, to begin measurements and plans for curb and gutter work in the Westview Addition. The Westview project is expected to be started in the summer of 1971 and will include many of the streets in the Westview Addition.

Bobby Cummings presented a budget report of the Centennial Committee to the City Council and requested a \$1200 donation from the City. The Council voted to make the grant.

LOCAL GUARD UNIT HEADS FOR SUMMER CAMP SUNDAY

This weekend many Gatesville men will leave their jobs to become a part of our nation's military force. Although this duty will last only two weeks, it is part of the training these men exercise yearly.

July 19 is the date the 113th Light Maintenance Unit of the Texas National Guard will venture to Fort Hood for their two week summer camp. The men will return to their respective places August 2. Gatesville's local guard

unit which is combined with Lampasas, will send six officers and ninety men to the near-by base. There will also be several other small units and an airborne brigade at Hood for the same period.

The 113th unit is a back-up support group for the 371st support Battalion. The guards will go into the field camp portion of their training at noon on the 20th and return to base camp at 4 p.m. July 24th. They will remain in base camp until August 2.

Hospital Improvement Bids Rejected For Legal Complications

Early Wednesday, Commissioners Court voted to reject all bids received Monday on the proposed additions and improvements to Coryell Memorial Hospital.

On Monday bids were opened on the construction project with K. A. Sparks, Constructors Inc. submitting the low bid of \$75,336 and 200 calendar days working time.

Judge Norman Storm indicated Wednesday that a "legal complication" was noted

by A. A. Underwood of Dallas. The technicality, explains Storm, involves the wording and procedure used in advertising for construction bids and time warrants.

The time warrants and construction bids were advertised separately. Underwood pointed out at a meeting with Judge Storm on Tuesday that bids and time warrants must be advertised at the same time.

Despite the "technicality"

Storm expects no delay in awarding a contract, noting that Commissioners Court had 30 days to award a contract. The Commissioners plan to re-advertise for construction bids and time warrants with bid opening set for August 10. Actually Commissioners could have held awarding the contract until August 13.

The action by Commissioners is aimed at protecting the lender legally. The court will advertise for \$120,000 in time warrants for the hospital and \$150,000 for purchase of right of way for the Highway 36 by-pass.

Originally Commissioners advertised \$115,000 in time warrants to finance the hospital project but decided to raise the amount by \$5,000 to assure adequate funds.

Construction of the hospital addition is expected to cost between \$70,000 to \$80,000. The \$25,000 to \$35,000 in additional time warrants will be used to equip the new facilities.

Four bids were opened at the Monday meeting of Commissioners. Along with Sparks apparent low bids were Linden Coone Construction Co. at \$87,753 and 120 days; W. C. Lam General Contractors at \$79,000 and 180 days; and Dixon-Pollard at \$89,640 and 180 days.

"There will be no talks before the audience nor a talent contest," Mrs. Cummings said. Apparently some

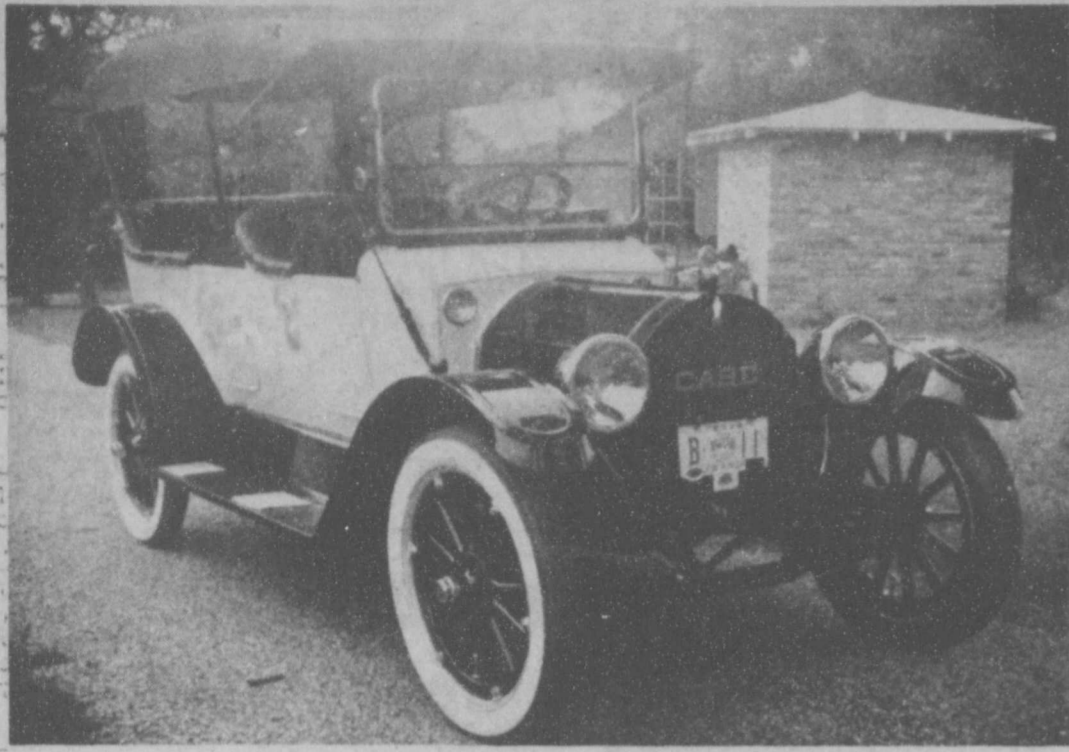
very good candidates have been reluctant because of the two latter requirements.

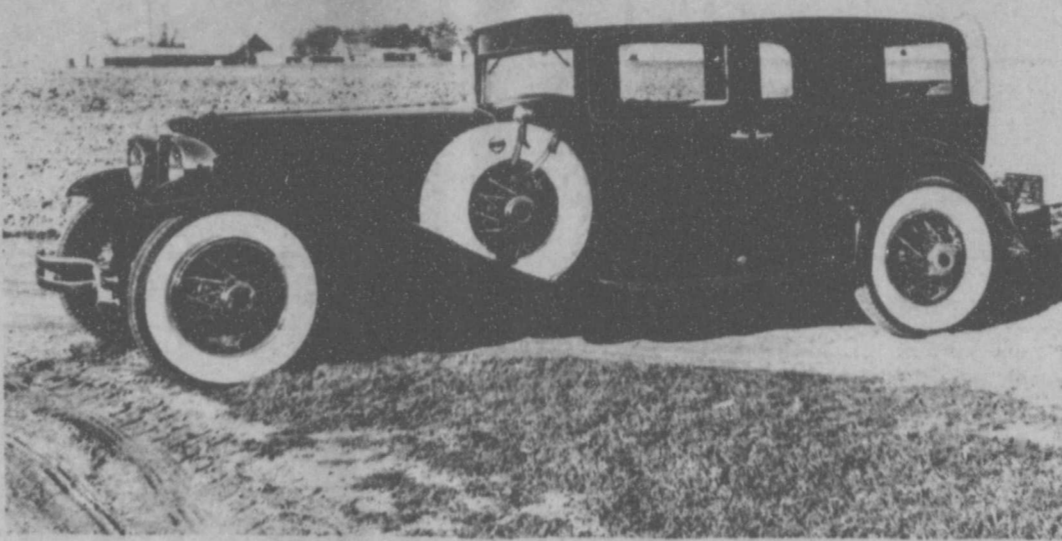
The 1914 Case Automobile is a model 25, four cylinder, with a T-Head motor. It sold for \$2,100.00 when new.

The owner, Mr. Karl Binner, of West, bought the car in 1966 with only 4,007 miles on the speedometer.

The story behind this low mileage is a very different story from the driving we know today. The car was bought in San Antonio in 1914 by a wealthy man who lived alone with an unmarried daughter who drove the car. In 1922 the daughter bent the front fender. She was 35 years old, but it made the father so mad that he put the car up on blocks in the garage and took off the wheels.

The car stayed there until forty four years later in 1966 when Mr. Binner bought the car. The Case Company now builds only tractors and farm equipment, but the case model 25 was a car the company was proud of as well as the people who drove them.

AUSTIN, Tex.--Cold figures submitted in major agency budget proposals left topstate officials and legislators little room for optimism about the amount of next year's tax bill.

Texas Education Agency calculated public school operations during the next biennium will cost about \$2.3 billion -- \$2 billion in state money alone. This is an increase of about \$377.1 million over the present level.

Nobody was surprised about that, but the Texas Public Welfare Department came up with a shocker.

Welfare staffers figure that the rising assistance rolls will require a budget of nearly \$2 billion overall for the 1972-73 fiscal period. That represents an increase in state welfare funds of \$300.4 million over the current biennium.

So, two vital functions of state government alone--public education and welfare--are seeking some \$677.5 million in additional revenues. It is expected that most of the other agencies will request more than their present appropriations instead of less.

Welfare requests, as large as they are, do not take into consideration larger grants for the needy and ill.

However, a Senate committee has recommended the \$80 million a year ceiling for state spending on categorical assistance be abolished and aid payments be matched to actual need. If enacted by the Legislature, this would mean millions more in welfare spending.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes expressed grave doubts that legislators would accept tremendous increases in welfare spending without "substantial reform" of the entire welfare system.

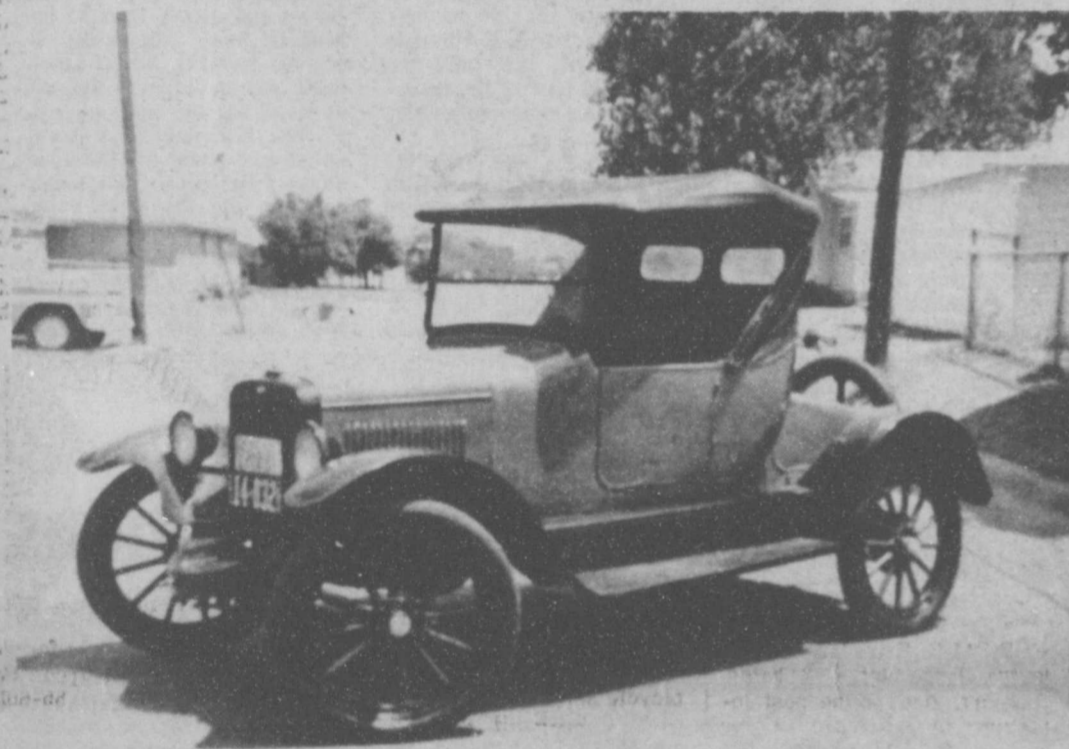
Welfare officials note that assistance rolls continue to expand uncontrollably (due largely to federal court rulings and rising population). COURTS SPEAK--Supreme Court upheld tough rules defining guests and required food service at private drinking clubs. In another decision involving the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, the Court refused to outlaw the purchase of liquor by "agents" for the private lockers of members of dry area clubs.

In a Texarkana-area case, the Court held that victims of uninsured drivers must prove there was no insurance coverage on the other motorist before he can collect on his own uninsured motorist policy.

A Houston nurse, who claimed purchases were charged against her on a bogus credit card, lost her appeal to the top court in her effort to collect damages from a discount house and bill collection service which persistently tried to make her pay.

EAGLE RULING NEAR--Railroad Commission soon will rule as to whether the famed Texas Eagle passenger train can be discontinued by the Missouri-Pacific Railroad.

Eagle is one of three passenger haulers now operating across the state. M-P claims that the train is losing money and wants to cut it off. Railroad attorneys argued that the Commission has no right to force it to continue to lose money. Contending that the train

HAMILTON-CORYELL S.C.D. NEWS

There are a number of benefits the stockman receives from the deferment of his rangeland. The most obvious benefit is the increased cover of grass that shows up. With a deferment system set up and applied there will be a steady increase of the more desirable plants. This deferment also increases plant vigor by giving the plant a stronger, deep root system.
A benefit, though little thought of, but very desirable is the eventual elimination of internal parasites. According to Dr. R. R. Bill of the School of Veterinary Medicine of Texas A & M University, after sixty days without a host the stomach worm and eggs start a rather rapid deterioration. So, if clean animals are turned in a pasture that has no internal parasites the drenching could soon be eliminated. This in itself is enough to justify a good sound deferment system.

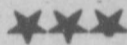

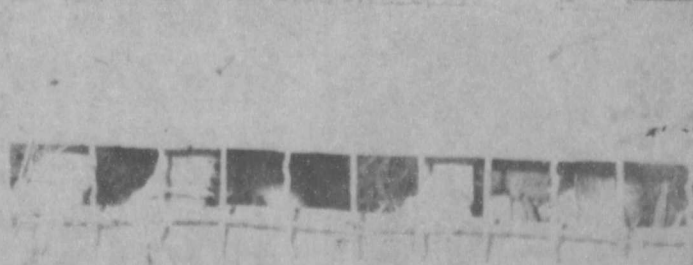
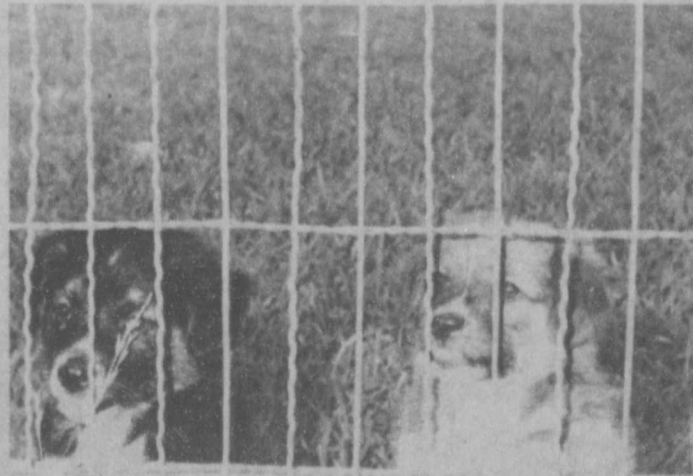

Following a wedding trip to San Antonio, Austin and Waco, the couple made their home in McAllen.

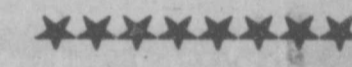

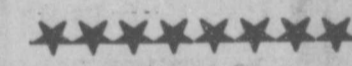

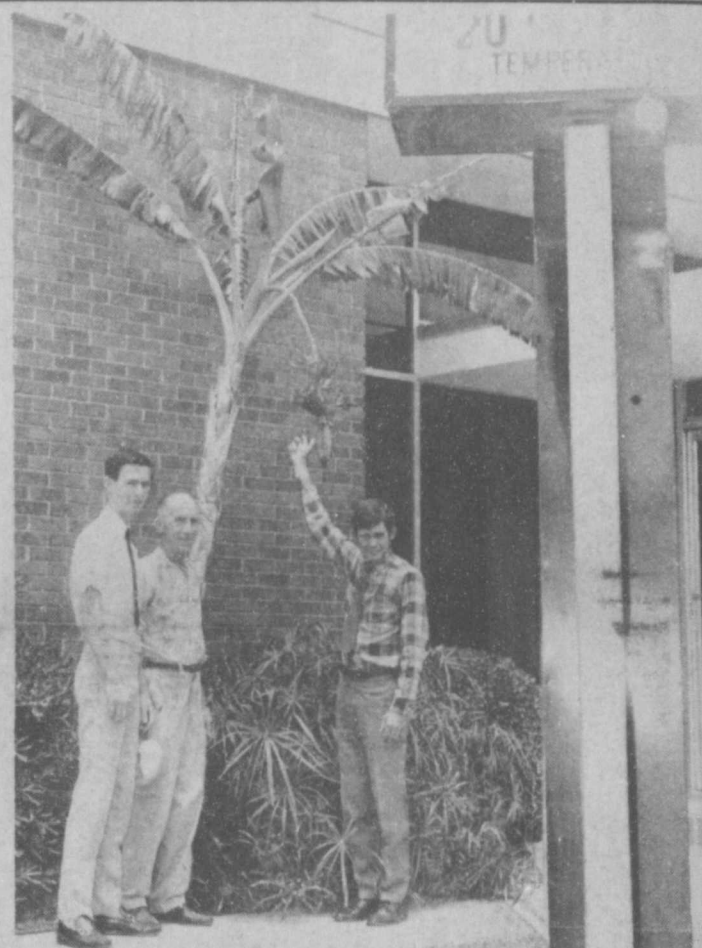

GONE BANANAS? Not really--but bananas is an interesting topic around the Guaranty Bank on these hot summer days.

The front wall of the building, near the bank's entrance, proudly supports a tree bearing the long yellow fruit. Of course, at this stage of the game the bananas are still in the young green era of their lives.

The tree itself is about 1 1/2 years old and right now is sporting about 25 fruit specimens. This is the first year the establishment has had such luck, reports the grounds caretaker Bud Cook.

Cook obtained the tropical plant from Eddie Winfield who is known locally for his "green thumb."

Winfield reported that he had kept the tree in his garage during the winter and it was brought out in the spring for planting. He interestingly noted that the plant can't survive frost, but that they can be stored away during the cold, by only being wrapped in a protective covering. The trees can remain dormant four or five months. 12 to 18 months of growth is required for a banana plant to bear fruit and afterwards, the tree will die.

Winfield stated that it was odd for the tropically originated plant to grow in this area, but he added that if all goes well, this particular plant will produce mature bananas around November, prior to the first autumn frost.

Despite the Messenger play the powerful Scott's team won their 12th game.

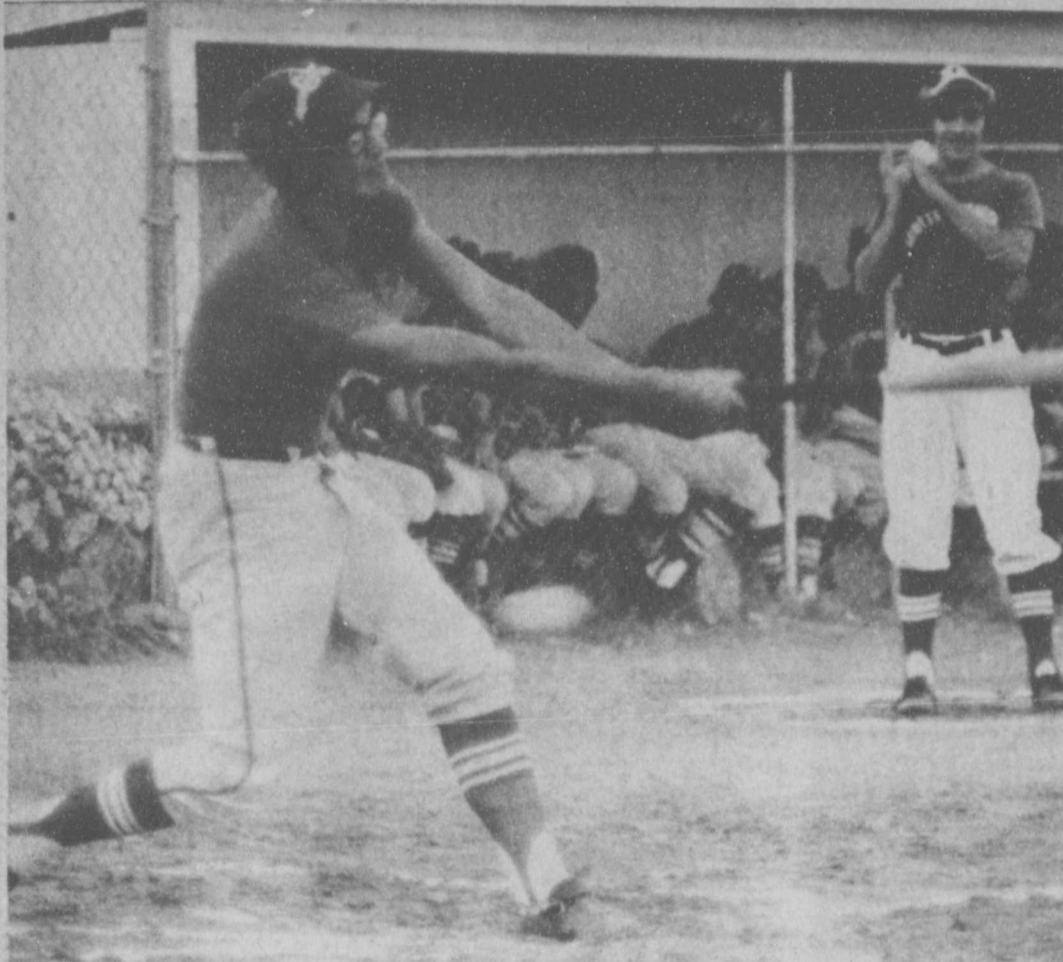

and \$100,000 for street improvements.

Of the 344 who voted, all but 11 were property owners. Cove councilmen conducted the vote with one box for property owners and another for non-property owners. Although a recent Supreme Court ruling stated that all persons legally registered and living within a city were eligible to vote on general obligation bonds regardless of whether they were property owners, councilmen decided to have two boxes to satisfy the Texas State Constitution which specifies only property owners are eligible. The Supreme Court ruling superseded all municipal, county and state laws which separated property owners and non-property owners in such a vote, including the Texas Constitution.

In Saturday's vote, property owners passed the water line moving issue 219-103; the library facility 215-103; and the street improvements 221-198.

Non-property owners voted for the water line and library proposals 9-2 and approved street improvements 10-1.
