Gary Kafer Wins AAU Junior Olympic's High Jump

Gary Kafer added the National AAU Junior Olympic High Jump crown to his list of consecutive first place last week in championship Knoxville, Tenn. Kafer reached the National AAU Junior Olympic with vic-tories at the district AAU in Fort Worth by out jumping

some good state competetors at 6' 8''. Mext Kafer jumped 6' 9'' at the AAU Associational Meet in Forth Worth to win. At the Region Nine AAU Qualifications in Abilene Kafer matched his best jump of the year to win over eompetetors from Texas, La., and Mississippi at 6';0"

Kafer has piled up 20 consecutive first place finishes this year despite leg injuries, colds and stiff competition

Kafer, a high jump spec-

ialist at GHS, made history by becoming the first GHS athelete to ever win a national title. Plans are underway to honor Kafer in the mear future.

Kafer, a senior, has met the challenge of the nations top high school jumpers this summer and has not been beaten yet. The methodical jumper has won 20 consecutive high jumping contests starting in the summer of 1969. The heavy spring and summer schedule this year was probably the toughest competition any high schooler faced this year.

At Knoxville, Gary jumped against 13 of the nations best jumpers. Starting at 6' 2" Kafer advanced up the scale and missed once at 6' 6". At the 6'6" height only Kansas' Randy Smith was able to maintain a "no miss" per-formance, Kafer cleared the height on his second attempt.

According to jumping competition this put Smith in the lead on fewer misses but he was unable to clear 6'8" and Kafer flew over the 6'8" mark

on his first try.

With the Junior Olympic title in hand Kafer watched as officials checked the bar height. It measured 6'9' and will go down in the record book at 6'9".

Kafer took three jumps at 6' 10 1/4 " but failed to clear the height.

While in Knoxville Gary received encouragement from local 113 supporters who signed a telegram sent Tuesday. The athletes lived in the dormatories of the University of Tennesse during their three

Kafer described the three days as "just like the olym-pics." He explained that each of the 13 regional AAU teams were uniformed and marched in a pre-meet parade around the track. Part of the ceremony included champion sprinter Darwin Bond car-

rying an olympic style torch a position in the stadium. Many of the competetors including Kafer, are the future olympic stars.

It has been a long season for the track and field specialist, starting back in

Kafer is not planning any-more competition this year but conditioning and development exercises will not end. He has scheduled himself for

weight training and running exercises this fall. Competition is always an important developing tool and Kafer is planning to play basket-ball in the winter months. Spring will hold another track season and Kafer is already eying the Astrodome Relays in February.

In the spring competition Kafer will run the high hurdles and intermediate hurdles in the continuing effort to develop leg strength,

"Swifter - Higher - Stronger" reads the Junior Olympic Championship medal Kafer won and it is encouragement for him in the future. He plans to step up to amature athletics facing college competition next summer. Such meets as the "Golden



Last Chance To Nominate ASCS Committeemen Today

Today is the last day for eligible farm voters to circulate and sign nominating petitions for ASC community committees. August 17 is the final date petitions may be filed at the Coryell County ASCS office. Mail elections are set for the second week

in September.
"I want to re-emphasize to farmers who are eligible to vote that nominating candidates by petition is of prime importance. If six or more eligible candidates are nominated by petition in an ASC community, no other names will go on the ballot. In the past, the incumbent community committee also had the privilege of making nominations. Now, a community committee may nominate only if fewer than six eligible condidates are nominated by petition -- and the committee may nominate only the number of candidates needed to make up a full slate of six nominees, " Robert L. Miller Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee,

No special forms are required for a petition -- only a sheet of paper naming the candidate and the ASC community. Signatures of at least six eligible voters in the community are required on each petition. Only one candidate may be named on a petition but voters may sign as many petitions as they want. In general, to be eligi-

ble either to become a candidate or to vote, a person must have a farm interest in the community and must be eligible to participate in one or more programs admin-istered by the County ASCS Office. Full details on eligibility requirements for con-didates and voters are avail-able at the County ASCS Of-fice, along with a list of known eligible voters in the county. Each year eligible famers

CTCOG APPROVED FOR TWO LAW COUNCIL GRANTS

Governor Preston Smith today approved two grants to the Central Texas Council of Governments, Belton, for a peace officer training program and for services to juvenile courts and juvenile probation departments in the sixcounty Central Texas region,

grants recommended by the Council at its regular monthly meeting. The 29 grants totaled \$733,575. Judge Joe Frazier, ex-ecutive director of the Coin-

cil, said a grant of \$7,740 represents a revision and addition to a recent grant for \$14,260 for a peace officer training program. This grant will be used to pay 60 percent of the salary of a training program coordinator, whose position is made necessary by unanticipated demands for training and by other factors.

recommendation of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, which administers funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U. S. Department of Justice.

A grant of \$36,640 will be used to provide diagostice and treatment services to the juvenile courts and juvenile proation departments of Bell,Cor-yell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam and Mills counties. which comprise the Central Texas Council of Governments. This program is expected to result in better decisions by the court. It also is designed to increase sig-nificantly as rehabilitative resources available to the court and cut down on detention while hearings are oend-

Implemer ation of the project will be through the Bell County Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center at Belton.

The Criminal Justice Council, responsible for statewide planning, administers such grants to units of state and local governments to assist them in carrying out projects for improving the criminal justice system.





ITS A FAMILY AFFAIR ... If you dropped by the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Lipsey, Diana and Tom, you'd probably ask the question "Who's getting married?" any time you called. The Lipsey kitchen is buzzing with activity these days since Mrs. Lipsey has began making cakes for all occaisions.

The Lipsey baking history began over a year ago when Mrs. Lipsey made novelty birthday cakes for her family and friends. Her baking interest was boosted by encouragement from Mrs. W. A. Melton of Gatesville who is synonomous with confectionary artistry in the Gatesville area. One afternoon Mrs. Lipsey answered her telephone and Mrs. Melton asked her to drop by; she was making rose buds. After a delightful afternoon of cake talk and lessons on hand making roses petal by petal, Mrs. Lipsey was hooked on cake baking and

She ordered books and catelogues to aid in her learning and visited a home bakery in Jacksboro where cakes from \$75 - \$500 are made. That particular weekend the Jacksboro baker was making five cakes. Mrs. Lipsey "soaked-up" all the information she could while she watched the bakers decorate a \$150 cake which measured 22 inches across the base tier. In baking circles a code of cooking secrecy prevails and no measruements or ingredients are passed on. According to the Gatesvilleite, a \$500 cake may have from three to five giant tiers. Her search for "tricks of the trade" continued to bakery shops in Central Texas and continues

Her first wedding cake was baked in January 1970 and took 30 hours to prepare, decorate and mount. She made ceramic icing flowers by hand, petal-by-petal, unique sugar bells and tiny baskets of flowers to adorn her cake. When asked about her icing and its particular qualities, Mrs. Lipsey replied "That's a secret."

Working along with Mrs. Lipsey are her husband Jack and daughter and son Diana and Tom. Diana assumes the second biggest part in the "family affair." She and Mrs. Lipsey decorate the massive cakes. Tom and Jack cut the heavy cardboard bases for the tiers.

Since June of 1969, when Mrs. Lipsey began her cake making for gifts, practice and profit, she has made 106 cakes for a host of occasions including weddings, birthdays, anniversaries and plain cakes for folks with company 'a coming. She has made cake fingers and cake squares for a score of teas for Gatesville area girls.

cup White Sugar	2 1/2 cu
cup Brown Sugar	1 tsp. S
Eggs	1 tsp. V
tbsp. Hot Water	

Blend the Crisco and sugars. Beat in eggs, hot water and peanut butter. Combine the dry ingredients and stir into mixture. Roll into little balls and place on a cookie sheet. Press flat with fork after dipping in cold water. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes.



Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation News

There is a lot of time and expense involved in the pre-paration of land for establishing an improved pasture. In the Hamilton- Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District this improved pasture generally consists of Coastal Bermuda grass. Klein grass, Ermelo Love, and T.A.M. wintergreen Harding grass look very promising. However, we still need more plots planted before we can tell how these grasses are going to produce on the different soils in this

To utilize this improved pasture to the fullest requires the best quality livestock available. The maintenance requirements of an animal at-the same regardless of his quality. Any feed utilized above this goes to produce gain in the form of meat or fat. The better the quality of the feed and animal the better and faster the end product will be produced. As a rule the best quality feed available is one of these improved pastures properly fertilized and harvested
