Bertrand is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Bertrand of Purmela and brother of Mrs. Antonece of Oglesby. He was born in the Purmela community and was reared in the area on his parent's farm. attended Gatesville Bertrand attended Tarleton College in Stephenville and Texas A & M University. His college career was interrupted by World War II and Bertrand dropped from school to serve in the army. After the war, he returned to A & M and received his bachelor's degree. He and his wife returned to Gatesville where he taught in the Veterans Vocational Program and his wife taught in the Turnersville school system.

To further his education. went to the University of Illinois where he received his master's degree and from there he attended Purdue University and received his PhD. After obtaining his doctorate, he taught for many years at

the Purdue institution. Bertrand joined forces with the United States Department of Agriculture and became Chief of the Piedmont Division, a geographical area including nine southeastern states and Puerto Rico. His work here included agronomy research which called for extensive travel.

Dr. Bertrand resigned his post with the USDA to become chairman of the Agronomy Division at the University of Georgia. At the present time





Home accident deaths totaled approximately 27,000 in 1969. Four million persons were disabled in home accidents, at a cost, including wage losses, medical expenses and administrative and claim settlements of insurance, of \$1,6 billion.

There are about 12,000 people who die annually, just from household falls alone, and countless others are seriously injured each year.


Two of the most common household hazards that result in disasterous falls are a slippery bathtub and an uncarpeted stairway. A small investment in nonsid tapes could prevent or lessen the danger of slipping. The tape comes in rolls, strips or patches. Some is very decorative in bright colors and

Stairs of tape protect effectively, especially when applied at right angles to the probably direction of the fall. Both strips and patches can be used in bathtubs. Many people prefer the patches as they seem to give somewhat better protection and are more attractive.


Few tapes will adhere to a damp, porous surface, so before applying strips or patches to a bathtub, clean and apply them dry to the tub. It should be allowed to stay dry for seve al hours after applying

Tests have shown that tape agners best to varnished or sealed wood surfaces, and tape of a textured surface with embedd' particles of grit are the most slip resistant for slippery walking surfaces.




