### **Dove Population Booming For Coryell Hunters**

Tuesday, September 1, at noon it's open season on the dove population in Texas' 'north zone'. Coryell Coun-ty hunters are expected to be out in numbers to track down

the plentiful game birds.

Abundance of doves in this area, expeically around farm tracts has been reported by Game Warden, Jerry Noles. If present weather conditions stay the same, this year's season has all possibilities to exceed last year's hunt. Farm tank and farm pond areas should prove to be excellant hunting plots due to the long dry spell the county has experienced. Changes in the weather, such as a general rain, however, can scatter the fowls or move them out.

Noles pointed out a few laws governing game bird hunting for Coryell County. He specifically mentioned that the \$4 per gun per day hunting

Other reminders to local marksmen include the fact that no hunting is to be done from public roads or from a motor vehicle. It is illegal to hunt these game birds with a rifle and the gun used by the hunter can have no more than 3 bullets in it. This calls for two bullets in the magazine and one in the chamber. Failure to comply with these laws of the Texas Game and Fish Commission will result in penalty for the guilty

Game Warden Noles also asks the hunter to be sure that he has permission from a land owner to hunt on the owner's property. In past experiences he pointed out that there have been cases of loss of livestock and damage to property due to hunt-ers' carelesness. He asks for the cooperation of all to make this a successful and sportfilled season,

## Home Gutted By Fire Friday, **Rekindles Friday Evening**

Local firemen were summoned twice Friday to answer a call at the old Lowrey Place on the Golf Course Road, A small house occupied by

Paul Santos, caught fire in the early afternoon and was gutted by the blaze. Fire Chief, Pat Patterson, said all contents of the dwelling were a total loss. He stated that Santos told him he didn't know how the fire started. The walls of the frame structure were left standing by the first giant blaze and grass fires surrounding the house were quickly extinguished by the volunteer force.

Chief Patterson reported that the units had just returned to the station and were being refilled with water when the alarm came. A grassfire on the Hershel Britain property between Coryell City

and Osage had given the firemen quite a battle prior to the house fire. It was estimated that 75 acres had been

destroyed in rural blaze. Then at approximately 7 p.m. Friday a second alarm was answered at the Lowrey Place. The same structure

had apparently rekindled its earlier blaze and this time, the remaining walls of the house were engulfed in flames. The structure could not be saved, but several volunteer firemen were on hand to keep the blaze under

#### DPS Says 49 **Will Die Labor Day Weekend**

AUSTIN--Texas Department of Public Safety Director Wilson E. (Pat) Speir said today indications are that 49 persons will be killed in Texas traffic crashes during the 78hour Labor Day holiday weekend from 6 p.m. Friday, September 4 to midnight Monday, September 7.

The estimate is based on numerous indicators and past experience on similar holiday periods, Colonial Speir said, adding that he hopes it will prove to be too high.
The Public Safety Direc-

tor said numerous activities will be undertaken to hold down holiday tragedies on the streets and highways, "but, inevitably, the drivers them-selves hold the solution in their hands.

"That is why we constantly and repeatedly appeal to drivers to remain continually on the alert for situations that can spell disaster and make driving a full-time job while they are behind the

"Department of Public Safety officers will be out in full force during the holiday period, as will local police officers within the cities, for



study indicated that without a doubt, most of these fatal accidents could have been avoid-

ed," he said,
"It also is perhaps significant to note that most of the accidents involved only one vehicle, indicating that in most cases there was nobody else to blame but the driver himself. The study also revealed that in nearly half of the fatal crashes, the driver himself was the victim. There were nearly as many cases of vehicles running off the roadways as there were incidents involving more than one vehicle. In most cases where pedestrians were killed, the records indicate that it was the pedestrian who was at fault."

The record also reflects that there were numerous accidents caused by drivers failing to negotiate curves, again indicating speed too fast for conditions, he continued, pointing out that "imprudent speed' is a violation of the law. In some cases drivers ran off roadways on straight stretches, indicating driving while drinking or excessive fatigue, another important factor, said Speir.

"Although it is difficult to pin-point, vehicle defects such as worn-out tires, bad brakes, etc., undoubtedly are contributing factors in bad accidents, particularly when the weather is extremely hot. We would therefore urge motorists to see that their vehicle is in top condition when they take off on the road for a holiday."

#### **Air Activity Increased At** Fort Hood During Late August

Ft. Hood, Texas--(USSTRICOM)--Air activity in the Ft. Hood began increasing early August 27 as the US Strike Command exercise Bold Shot/Brim Fire 2-71 begins initial operations.

Heavy military aircraft use of the area within a 50-mile radius of Ft. Hood, particularly Federal Aviation Agency designated areas 6302A, 6302B and 6302C, will begin at 6:00 a.m. and continue through September 4.

The aircraft will be conducting operations as part of the exercise, which will involve more than 7,000 Army and Air Force personnel. The objectives of the exercise are to examine the rapid reaction capability and operational readiness of US Army and Air Force forces assigned to the US Strike Command, and to provide training in joint operational techniques, US Strike Command is head-quartered at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida.

Nine Army field kitchens moved in to support relief efforts and served over 160,000 meals with food provided by the Red Cross. In all, Red Cross provided more than 540,000 meals. One and a half million pounds of ice were passed out to sweltering residents as temperatures hovered near the 100 degree

Now the job of recovery is under way. Former Texas Governor John Connally has estimated Red Cross may need spend as much \$10,000,000 on relief for Celia victims. Connally heads up a Texas fund campaign task force for American Red Cross.

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

AUSTIN, Tex. -- More than 2.7 million Texas students soon will be heading back to public schools again.

There will be a lot of changes in store for them, although most probably will fast adjust or barely recognize the differences.

Teachers will begin work a little earlier, and classes in some areas will start ear-

School year will stretch out from 175 classroom days

Teachers will be on duty 10 more days of non-teaching work for in-service training and to help with school opening and closing

For 224,500 little ones, the school experience will be brand new. They are the first graders and (30,000) fiveyear-olds in a new statesupported kindergarten pro-

gram. A drug education program also will be initiated, seek ing an effective two-way communication between youth and adults. Utilized in the effort will be modern techniques and teaching methods which encourage students to express themselves rather than relying on lectures, preaching or moralizing. Training of local teaching teams in 1,206 school districts is slated to start

in September and October. Twenty-two school districts in major population and geographic areas will be pilot testing three key facets of the state's emerging plan for special education. These districts will serve as a proving ground for efforts in comprehensive special edu-cation, early childhood programs for exceptional children and teaching tailored for children with language and/or

learning disabilities. Even broader changes may be in store for pupils of 16 school districts sued in federal courts in Austin and Tyler for racial segregation. Districts held conferences at Texas Education Agency last week to prepare plans for conversion to non-discriminatory systems. Plans are due to go to courts by Friday (Aug. 21). Hearings may begin Monday.


