



ONLY RUBBLE REMAINS---Charred rubble and smoldering ashes were all that remained Saturday from an early morning fire which completely destroyed a dwelling at Mills and 16th Streets in Gatesville. The single story frame house belonged to the Ollie Mayberry Estate. Gatesville Fire Chief Pat Patterson said the dwelling had been unoccupied for 15 years. The local fire department received the call at approximately 1:15 a.m., said Chief Patterson. When the city and county trucks arrived, the dwelling was completely destroyed. The two-truck, five man team, headed by Assistant Fire Chief Curtis Lipsey, extinguished the blaze in about 30-40 minutes, reported Chief Patterson. The cause of the early morning fire has not been determined. One month prior to the Saturday morning blaze, the local firemen extinguished a grass fire at the same location.

Bicycle-Pick Up Crash Injures One Eight Year Old

A bicycle-pickup accident narrowly averted serious injury to Marty Gordon, 8, son of Mrs. Betty Cummings of 118 Hillcrest Drive.

Police Chief Gene Goins reported the accident involved a 1961 Chevrolet pickup driven by Francis Lee Powell. Goins said the accident occurred at 8:10 a.m. Friday at the intersection of Golf Course Road and Hillcrest Drive. Powell was traveling south on Golf Course Road when young Gordon rounded the corner headed along Golf Course Road. Goins said Gordon failed to make the corner and struck the rear end of the pickup about ten inches from the rear bumper.

Gordon was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital by Erwin Ambulance. He was treated and released with cuts and bruises on his head, arm and leg.

HORNETS LOSE OPENER TO BULLDOGS 30 TO 20.

After five years of football peaceful co-existence between Gatesville and McGregor, Friday night the rivalry was re-opened with the Bulldogs winning 30-20 in a hard fought contest. The Hornets showed early season problems losing three fumbles and execution troubles at times. Meanwhile, the relatively simple singling machine was in mid-season form with James Daniels leading the Bulldogs offense. McGregor opened the game's scoring when tailback Daniels picked out David Cooper on a 25 yard touchdown pass with 8' 25" remaining in the first quarter. McGregor's drive covered 66 yards in eleven plays for the score. Daniels gained 34 yards in the opening drive. He also ran the extra point by giving the Bulldogs a 8 to 0 lead. One of the Hornet fumbles set the Bulldogs to work at the Hornet 37 yard line in the next series of downs. However this time the Hornets held with the help of a 15 yard penalty and the Hornets took over at the 20 yard line. On first down, a fumble was alertly picked up by the Bulldogs. Four plays later Daniels scored from the one yard line. Daniels carried all four times on the second scoring drive. Again he crashed through the Hornet line for the two extra points. The Hornets scored next on a 60-yard drive with Ronald Brown slashing across on a 16 yard run. The drive took 12 plays and the score came with 11:26 to play in the second quarter. Daniels again went to the air with 5:43 to play and found Eugene Wiethorn on a 49 yard pass and run for another touchdown. Daniels picked

his 12th point with a successful extra point try. With 5:08 remaining in the half, McGregor lead 24 to 6. On the next series of downs the Hornets stalled and a fourth down penalty set the Hornets up with a first down at the McGregor 48 yard line. Jim Saunders, Hornet quarterback, pitched wide to Brown on first down and the speedy halfback picked up 16 yards. Next play was Saunders time and the shifty runner carved out a 25 yard run to the McGregor 7 yard line. With first-and-goal, Saunders gave Brown the call and the power runner blasted for six yards to the one yard line. Ray Ortega then smashed over for the Hornets' second score on second down with 3:11 left to play in the half. Saunders picked up two extra points on a running play to narrow the McGregor lead to 24 to 14. The Hornet defense then held off the Bulldogs' attack and went into halftime with a 24-14 score. The two teams had played equally tough on defense but the offensive execution by McGregor was the difference in the first half. The Hornets received the kick-off to start the third quarter with a new outlook and determination. On second down from the Hornet 32 yard line, Saunders blasted for eight yards to set up an easy third-and-one play. Steve Palmer, Ortega and Brown, the "mini backfield" then each got the call on successive plays for 19 yards. Saunders then kept the ball on an option play and reached the 21 yard line. Then, on the same type option play, Saunders turned up field and made a late pitch to Brown who traced, untouched, into the end zone for the Hornets' third touchdown. The tide had turned and the Hornet defense reflected the new level of play as they stopped Daniels and Company cold for the third quarter. Meanwhile, the Hornet offense moved into scoring position one more time in the third quarter behind an explosive 38 yard run by Palmer to inside the Bulldog 10 yard line. The Bulldogs stopped the drive which could have given the Hornets a lead. Midway in the fourth quarter, the Hornets began another drive on their 18 yard line. A fumble at the Hornet 42 yard line set McGregor for an "icing-on-the-cake" score. Nine plays later Daniels scored from the five yard line to give the Bulldogs a 10 point lead. The Hornets were unable to mount another threat.

Law Suit Looms

Special Meeting Call By School Board On Tax Question

A notice of a special session of the school board for Tuesday night, September 15, at 7:30 was placed on the bulletin board at the County Courthouse Friday and filed at the County Clerk's office. The notice indicates that the special meeting is "To take under consideration employing or not employing a tax appraisal firm for the equalization of tax values in the district."

The school board has been considering the tax valuation problem since late July when school board action interrupted the work of the 1970 Tax Equalization Board. An outcry for equalization of the school district's tax values has risen since that time with the threat of a law suit to enjoin the 1970 tax roll.

Last Tuesday night at the school board's regular meeting, the board proposed a three year locally appraised program to Attorney Bob Cummings and asked Cummings to take the proposal to his clients for a reaction. Cummings reported his clients' reaction to the proposal to Superintendent L. C. McKamie Friday morning asking McKamie to call a special meeting for Tuesday to head off the filing of an

enjoining suit in District Court on Wednesday morning. Cummings clients are maintaining the fight for outside appraisal firms to be hired to equalize the 1971 tax roll. The school board's proposed three-year program is exactly the same program that Clovis King had undertaken in 1970, which was overturned in late July. The Tuesday, September 15 meeting will be held in the board room of the Gatesville High School.

A PROBLEM

TAX EVALUATION

Gatesville's School System appears to be headed for a real financial setback this week with a group of local taxpayers planning to file a law suit Wednesday unless the Gatesville School Board makes a genuine effort to equalize taxes for 1971.

Ultimate responsibility for the events Tuesday night and Wednesday morning will be the Gatesville School Board's. Attempts to blame the taxpayers filing the suit are unfounded. Just as the 1970 Equalization Board has had to bear responsibility for the 1970 tax roll and all its inequalities, so the school board will have to bear the responsibility of what happens this week.

The collision course is set and as of Saturday, it appeared likely that the school would suffer a \$650,000 setback. It does not seem necessary to this writer that the taxpayers of the GSID should have to wait to have taxes equalized. Especially in light of the fact that over \$150,000 annually is left uncollected due to underappraised property in the school district.

We voted for a \$500,000 building program this year and everyone was happy. If instead we had voted to collect taxes equally, starting in 1971, in three years we would have collected \$450,000 in new taxes with no interest expense and no long-term obligation. I think we voted on the wrong thing now. Without the actual mathematic figures here, I would still estimate that interest on \$500,000 would be more than the \$50,000 difference.

A few people still have a "legal vote" to cast in the matter and I support their demands that the school undertake a complete district wide appraisal for 1971.

Climaxing the week will be Sunday morning offerings by departments to aid the state missions.

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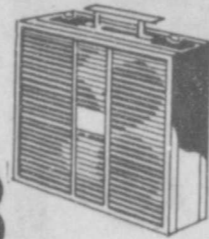
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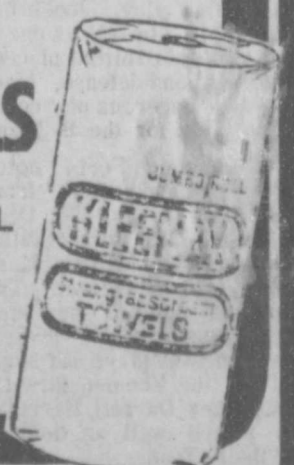
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Oglesby Wins In Come From Behind Battle With Star

In their season opener the Oglesby Tigers came from behind to beat a big team from Star, 19 to 6.

The two teams played scoreless football for almost two quarters before Star posted a six point play on a 20 yard pass play.

Rain had marked the first part of the game and the wet field slowed down the speedy six-man football action. In the first quarter both teams penetrated one time but failed to score. Star moved first to the one yard line without scoring. Next the Oglesby Tigers headed for "pay dirt" but stalled out at the ten yard line.

Star was forced to punt at the start of the second quarter and the Tigers began a drive from near mid field. Using a tight formation, the Tigers pounded out the yardage to the one yard line and tried to pass for the touchdown. A Star defender stopped in front of the touchdown. Leos then threw a receiver Charles Vandiver and intercepted in the end zone.

With the ball placed at the 15 yard line, following the interception, Star went

right to work moving the ball on the ground and in the air to the Oglesby 20 yard line. From the spread formation a quick pass to the end zone gave Star their six points.

The first half was a defensive battle as the Oglesby line held off the charge of the tiger Star team. Coach Gary Fox praised his defense for controlling the game.
