VA Hospital participates in Four Chaplains Memorial Service

Gone but not forgotten — never forgotten.

U.S. armed forces veterans who died during the previous year were honored Friday morning at the Four Chaplains Memorial Service at the West Texas VA Health Care System.

The memorial service is named after four U.S. Army chaplains who gave their lives to save others when the USS Dorchester was sunk by a German U-boat in 1943.

The chaplains — George Fox, Alexander Goode, Clark Poling and John Washington — were part of a contingent en route to an Army base in Greenland when the ship

was hit on Feb. 3, 1943.

When it became apparent that the ship was sinking and there were not enough life jackets for everybody, the chaplains gave theirs to others and chose to go down with the ship.

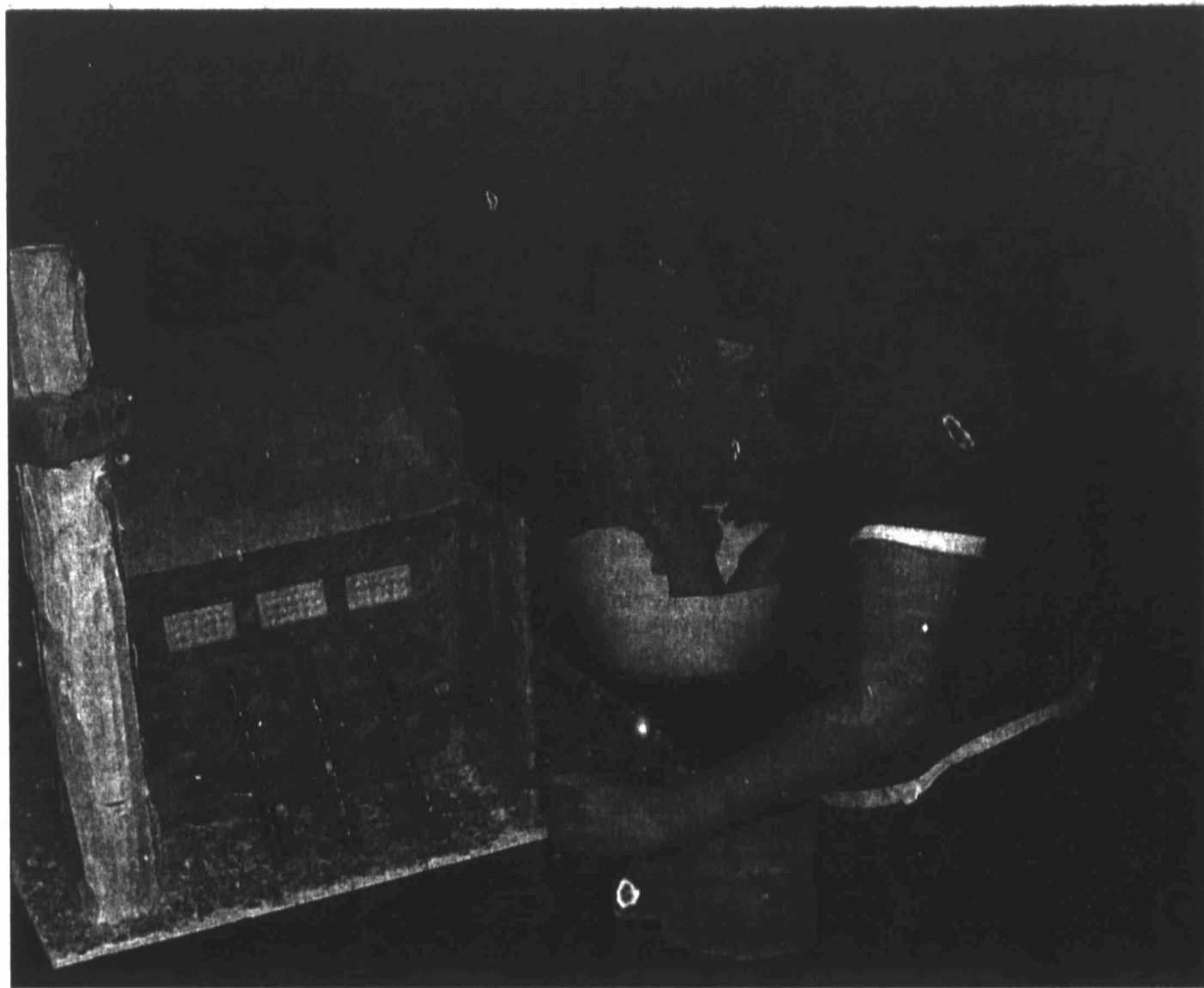
"It was," an eyewitness recalled, "the finest thing I have ever seen or hope to see this side of heaven."

The four chaplains were posthumously honored with the Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart, and VA hospitals across the country use the anniversary of their sacrifice to recall recently passed veterans.

"We are grateful to all these veterans," said Dean Thomas, chief of the local VA's chaplain service. "We are glad they were there when we needed them, and we're thankful for their service ... We can look back on the days and nights we

Voter registration period concludes Monday, office warns

More than 1,000 area voters may find themselves on the county's suspended voters list, with Monday's deadline to make changes to voter information quickly approaching.

According to Sandra Bloom, election administrator for the county, there are still many voters in Howard County who need to update their

registration information.

"The elections office mailed out approximately 16,000 voter certificates in November, of which we received about 1,500 of them back," said Bloom. "This tells us a lot of these people have moved. We sent out an address confirmation to those voters, giving them an opportunity to correct their addresses. Of those confirmations, we've received about 150 back. There are still voters out there who

need to update their voter registration information."

Bloom said voters who find themselves on the suspended list will still be able to cast their ballot as long as they meet strict criteria. "A voter that's on the suspense list — voters who have moved or had a change of address — are still eligible to vote," said

Bloom. "However, they must vote in their old precinct and fill out a statement of address indicating they still reside within the boundaries of that voting entity."

Bloom said the implementation of new electronic voting booths, coupled with new election laws, makes it even more important area residents

have their voter information ready when they head to the polls.

Early voting in the primaries begins Tuesday, Feb. 21, and will continue through March 3, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. The Republican and Democratic primaries will be held jointly, according to Bloom, with election day set for March 7.

Bloom said her office is also lining up several special dates and times for

early voting, in an effort to give area residents as many chances as possible to cast their ballots.

"On Feb. 23 and 28, we'll be staying open until 7 p.m. to accommodate voters who need to come by after getting off work," said Bloom. "We'll also have Saturday voting Feb. 25 from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m."

All early voting will be held at the Howard

Of grave concern

City cemetery getting managed care

With nearly a dozen different cemeteries — all owned by different local entities — located in and around Howard County, it may seem like a challenge to keep track of every lot and space.

Most of those cemeteries are located at Mount Olive Memorial Park, the municipally owned park on Highway 350 north of Big Spring. Since October, many of those cemeteries have been under the management of Phyllis Hogan, a counselor for Southwest Cemetery

Services. "As a lot of people already know, cemeteries don't make very lucrative businesses. They end up losing money for the cities and the counties,"

said Hogan. "We, as a management company, own different parts of the cemeteries, and part of the money we generate out there goes back into a city fund to pay for improvements to the cemetery."

Phyllis said a number of changes and improvements are in the works at the various facilities, but the most important one is the simplest — a human touch.

"Before, if you needed to buy a lot, you would go to the office out there at the cemetery," said Hogan. "You

HITCHCOCK (AP) — Eighteen bug foggers used in a two-bedroom apartment are blamed for an explosion that injured two people and caused enough structure damage to condemn the building.

A maintenance worker, who arranged the foggers, and another resident were taken to a hospital with minor injuries, Hitchcock PD officer LaDonna Sauceda said. "The fumes overtook the pilot light in the hot water heater causing an ignition," Sauceda said. Most fogger manufacturers recommend using just one fogger per room. An inspector later condemned the 8-unit complex, forcing residents in seven other units out of the building.

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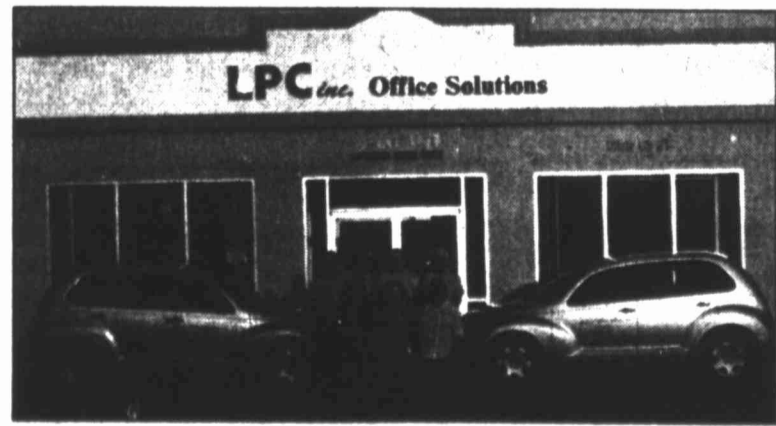
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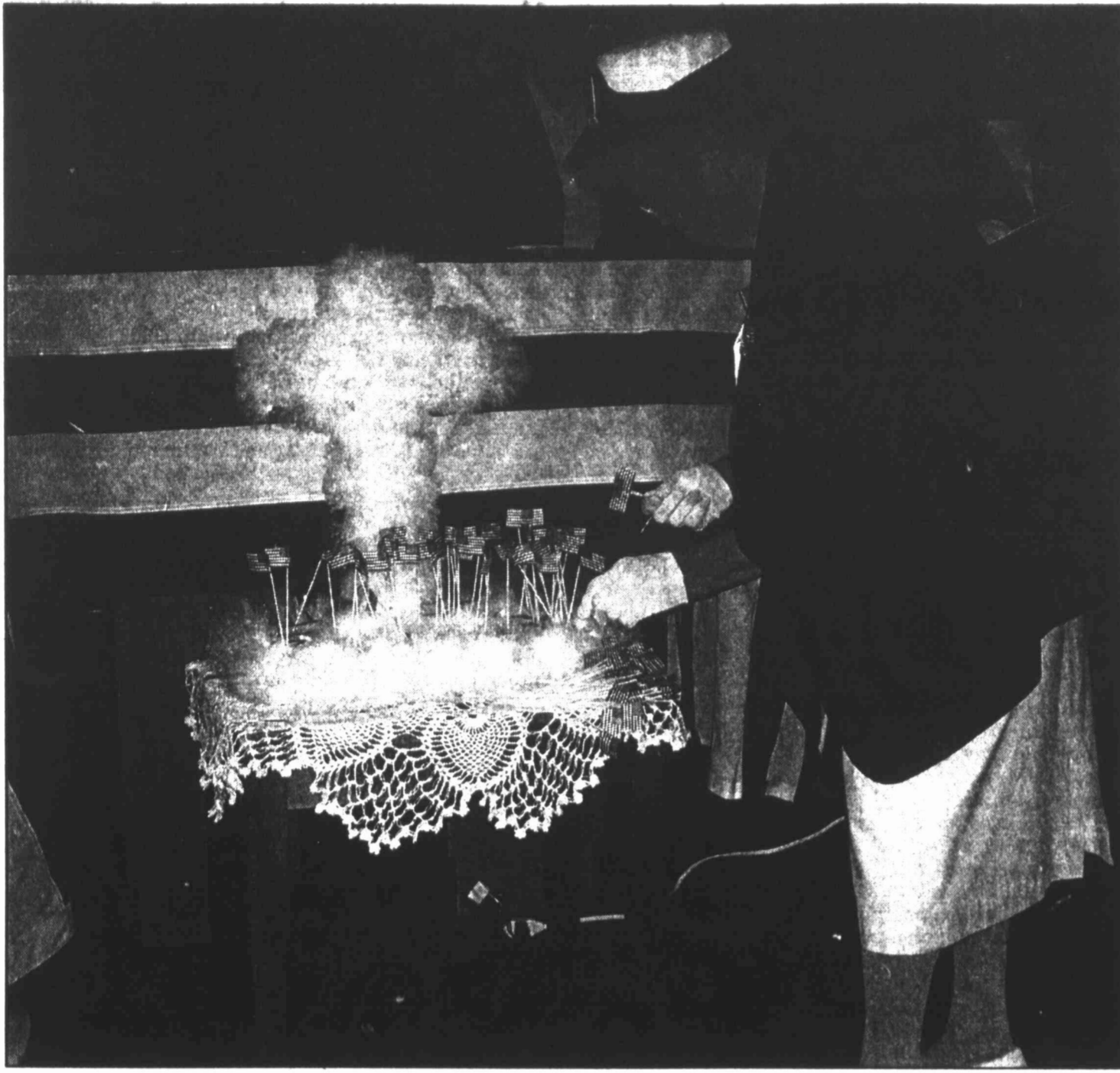

might go out there and sit for hours, and maybe someone would show up. And a lot of people just don't know who to call. It's just one of those things. Someone died, and now who do you get hold of?"

"I'm basically there to answer questions. I'm there if someone comes out and is looking for their great-uncle Billy's grave, and he died in 1946. I have a book that has the names of people who have been buried at the cemetery, and it will tell them what section, lot and what space they're in. So we're able to help people who are studying their genealogy or trying to find their loved ones,

and we do this every day."

Hogan said most people don't realize there are actually more than a half-dozen separate cemeteries located at Mount Olive, but thanks to an employee of the city of Big Spring who tends to the grounds, keeping everything straight isn't nearly as hard as it looks.

"His name is Roy Gomez, and he's the most knowledgeable person I've ever met," said Hogan. "He knows where every grave in that cemetery is, almost by heart. You can ask him if he knows where the Thompsons are buried, and he can rattle it right off for you."

Spaces can range in price from \$500 to \$900 according to Hogan, depending on what sec-

tion of the cemetery you choose.

Hogan said her office also sells headstones.

"We can actually provide a marker for any city in the state of Texas. When someone comes in and has just lost a loved one, I just don't think it's right to price-gouge them," said Hogan. "I want them to feel comfortable when they leave here, and not to feel like they've been taken advantage of. We offer thousands of different types of monuments, and the nice part about that is we can design our own, and make our own. So we're able to cut out a middle man. So our monuments are about 1/3 to 1/2 less than other vendors."

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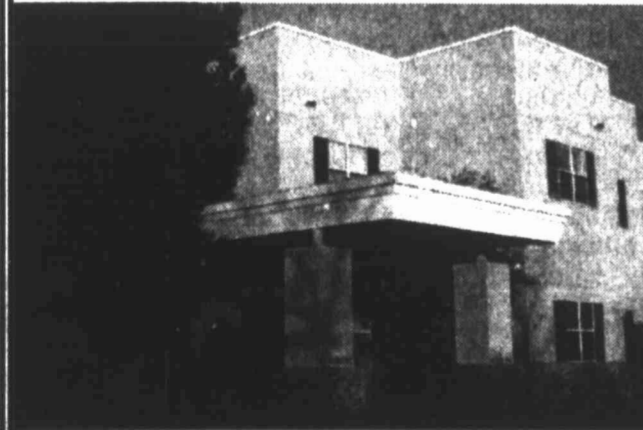
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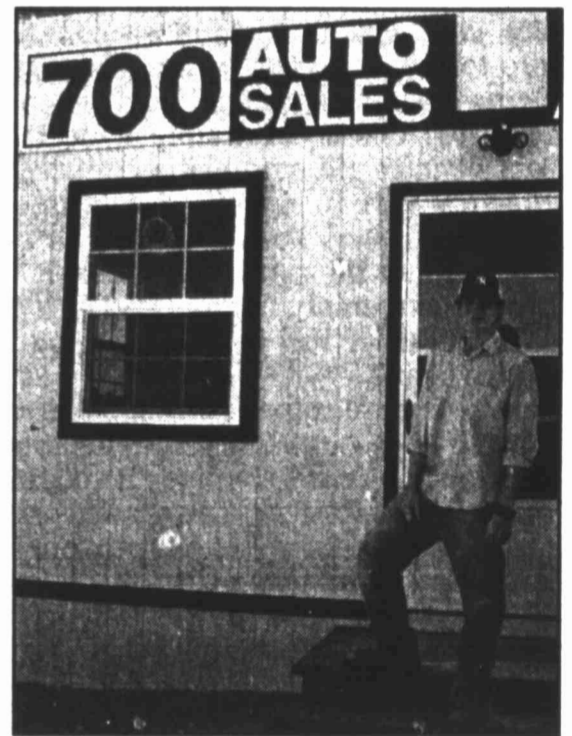

We can't put off jail issue any longer

A lot of us have never been in jail, never expect to be incarcerated and don't have a whole lot of sympathy for those who are. That said, we — by law — are responsible for providing a place to house those who commit crimes in our jurisdiction, our county.

Basically speaking, we can either put them in a facility of our own making or we can pay to have them incarcerated elsewhere. The only other choice is to not prosecute anyone and let criminals run freely up and down our streets. We don't know your thoughts, but for us, that last "solution" is not an option.

It should be pretty clear to our county commissioners court that paying someone else to take care of our prisoners is not viable either. It's just too expensive, no matter how you do the math.

That leaves putting them in a facility such as the Howard County Jail. What's the problem with that? Nothing, other than the fact that the jail is old, doesn't meet state standards anymore and isn't large enough to hold as many criminals as we need to have put away for awhile.

This past week, some of our commissioners went to Austin to visit with members of the state jails standards commission. What they were told isn't new. Howard County has been getting waivers for the jail just to "get by" since the 1970s. The commission made it clear that practice isn't going to happen much longer.

If a fire were to somehow start in our county lockup, it could be a disaster. First, the cell doors cannot be remotely unlocked. The corridors are extremely narrow and exit doors open against traffic. Fire suppression equipment is also inadequate.

None of us want to see our spouse, son, daughter or friend — or ourselves — incarcerated. But you have to realize it could happen. Certainly most of us know someone who has been locked up for whatever reason. Would you want a love one locked up in place that isn't safe? We don't want to "coddle" prisoners, but we must ensure they are confined in a place that is safe.

"These are serious, life-threatening factors, and the standards commission is very concerned about them," said longtime commissioner Bill Crooker.

We should all be concerned. The jail issue has been on and off the table for many, many months and it is a problem that won't go away. It's time for everyone concerned to take a good hard — positive — look at how to best get this done. And then get after it. Let's unlock the lockup issue and deal with it before we have a disaster that not only cost dollars but lives.

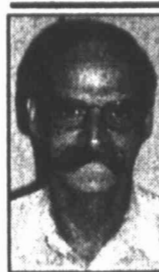

Investigators said Lonnie Shields, 37, climbed into a small vent on the roof of the New City Mart around 2 a.m. Thursday and wasn't found until store employees arrived at about 8 a.m.

Shields, who faces charges of burglary of a structure, was treated at a nearby hospital and booked into Orange County Jail on \$1,000 bond. "He was banged up and crunched up and uncomfortable from being in that pipe for about six hours," Orlando fire chief Greg Hoggatt said.

VIENNA, Austria (AP) - It wasn't bird flu, rather flying drunk into windows that killed 40 songbirds found dead in Vienna.

The birds — whose remains were carefully examined amid avian influenza fears — had livers so diseased "they looked like they were chronic alcoholics," Sonja Wehsely, a spokeswoman for Vienna's veterinary authority, told Austrian television Thursday.

All died of broken necks after slamming into windowpanes, apparently after gorging themselves on berries that had begun to rot, turning the juice inside to alcohol, Wehsely said.

Fight for freedom draws reluctant foe

If you haven't had a conversation like this yet, you probably will. Americans older than age 80 are the fastest-growing segment of the population, and at least half will eventually suffer some kind of dementia.

My chat came over the weekend. It shouldn't have been a shock, but it was. Whichever side of this dialogue you end up on — and eventually it could well be both — good luck:

"It's so lucky that you're here!"
"It isn't luck, Mom. I got a call that you were in the hospital, so I flew out."

"The last time I was in the hospital, I was having you!"
"Yes, Mom, I know."

"I'm not used to being a patient, knock wood. Would you believe that the last time I was in a hospital, I was having you!"

"Great. But listen, Mom, we're going to have to get someone to help you once you get out. You know, someone to come to your home."

"I don't want to go to a home!"
Sympathy should have flooded my soul — Mom was so scared she couldn't even hear me — but impatience got there first.

"That's not what I'm saying, Mom. Listen: I'm talking about getting a helper so you can stay in your apartment."

"I'd hate that."
"Just for a couple hours a day — someone to check in on you, help you with your medicine and stuff."

"Why didn't I get any medicine today?"

"You did. The nurse just gave you some. See the cup of water? That's why you need someone."

You can't even ... I mean ... it's hard to remember things like whether you took your pills."

"Can't I just stay here?"

Patience. Patience. Yes, a few seconds ago, she was violently afraid of a nursing home. Now she was begging to stay institutionalized. Try to stay calm, I told my

clenching chest. Try to stay calm. "MOM!" Try harder. "Mom. This is a hospital. You can't just stay here. Besides, you always said you didn't want to end up in an institution. This is an institution. I'm trying to keep you in your apartment, which is why I've been making phone calls all day, trying to find someone to help you."

"I appreciate that very much, but please, STOP. I don't need anybody! I'm not that kooky yet. I'll tell you when I am. But for right now, I think I can take care of myself."

Could she? I wondered. Was I the unreasonable one, forcing her to become one of the people she always pitied, an old lady with a caregiver? No, I told myself. Be gentle. Breathe deep.

"Mom, you are here because your leg got infected because you

forgot to take your antibiotics. Forget again, we're talking amputation." I made a giant sawing motion. "See?"

So much for gentle. "If they're so worried about my leg, why aren't they giving me any medicine?"

"They just did!"
"They did?"
"YES! See the cup?"

"I must really be getting loopy, but I've never been sick before. You know, the last time I was even in a hospital, it was to have you."

"Yup."
"I'm so lucky you're here. What would I do without you?"

I don't know — maybe go back home and try to stay independent? That's just not an option. America's added longevity comes at a price. There's a reason "home health aide" is the fastest-growing job in health care. I'm hoping to find a kindly aide, and I'm hoping Mom doesn't fire her.

I'm also hoping this was the end of the conversation. But for me — and at some point you — I know it's only the beginning.

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U.N. nuclear watchdog agency reports Iran to the U.N. Security Council

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The U.N. nuclear watchdog Saturday reported Iran to the U.N. Security Council in a resolution expressing concern that Tehran's nuclear program may not be "exclusively for peaceful purposes." Iran retaliated immediately, saying it would resume uranium enrichment at its main plant instead of in Russia.

The landmark decision by the International Atomic Energy Agency's 35-nation board sets the stage for future action by the top U.N. body, which has the authority to impose economic and political sanctions.

Still, any such moves were weeks if not months away. Two permanent council members, Russia and China, agreed to referral only on condition the council take no action before March.

Twenty-seven nations supported the resolution, which was sponsored by three European powers — Britain,

France and Germany — and backed by the United States.

Cuba, Syria and Venezuela were the only nations to vote against. Five others — Algeria, Belarus, Indonesia, Libya and South Africa — abstained, a milder form of showing opposition.

Those backing the referral included India, a nation with great weight in the developing world whose stance was unclear until the vote.

Iran reacted immediately, saying a proposal by Moscow to enrich Iranian uranium in Russia was dead.

"Commercial scale uranium enrichment will be resumed in Natanz in accordance with the law passed by the parliament," Javad Vaiedi, deputy head of the powerful National Security Council, told Iran state television in a telephone interview from Vienna.

Iran removed some U.N. seals from its main uranium enrichment facility in Natanz, central

Iran, on Jan. 10 and resumed research on nuclear fuel — including small-scale enrichment — after a 2 1/2-year freeze. Full-scale uranium enrichment can produce the fissile core of nuclear warheads.

The Kremlin had proposed that Iran shift its large-scale enrichment of uranium to Russian territory to allay world suspicions that Iran might use the process to develop a nuclear bomb.

Vaeidi also said that after approval by the Iranian council, Iran would stop honoring an agreement with the IAEA allowing its inspectors broad powers to monitor and probe Tehran's nuclear activities.

Iran says it wants to enrich only to make nuclear fuel, but concerns that it might misuse the technology accelerated the chain of events that led to Saturday's Security Council referral.

The IAEA resolution refers to Iran's breaches of the nuclear nonproliferation treaty and lack of confidence that it is not trying to make weapons.

It expresses "serious concerns about Iran's nuclear program." It recalls "Iran's many failures and breaches of its obligations" to the nonproliferation treaty, and it expresses "the absence of confidence that Iran's nuclear program is exclusively for peaceful purposes."

It requests IAEA Director General Mohamed ElBaradei to

"report to the Security Council" steps Iran needs to take to dispel suspicions about its nuclear ambitions.

The resolution calls on Iran to: — Reestablish a freeze on uranium enrichment and related activities.

— Consider whether to stop construction of a heavy water reactor that could be the source of plutonium for weapons.

— Formally ratify an agreement allowing the IAEA greater inspecting authority and continue honoring the agreement before it is ratified.

— Give the IAEA additional power in its investigation of Iran's nuclear program, including "access to individuals" for interviews and to documentation on its black-market nuclear purchases, equipment that could be used for nuclear and non-nuclear purposes and "certain military-owned workshops" where nuclear activities might be going on.

World briefs

At least 73 killed in stampede at Manila stadium

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Thousands of people lined up outside a stadium near Manila to watch a TV game show surged toward the gates in the mistaken belief they were open, and at least 73 people were trampled to death, officials said. About 500 people were injured.

About 30,000 people were waiting to get inside the PhilSports Arena for the show "Wowowee" when the stampede occurred, said Vicente Eusebio, the mayor of suburban Pasig, where the stampede occurred.

President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo, who visited the injured in hospitals, ordered authorities to conduct a thorough investigation and submit a report to her in 72 hours.

Health Secretary Francisco Duque III said 73 people were killed and at least 514 were taken to hospitals. The most seriously injured suffered fractures, deep cuts, severe contusions and "mental shock."

Survivors said the game show was to include a raffle with a jackpot equivalent to \$384.

"The raffle tickets can be obtained at the gate so everyone was in a hurry. There was pushing and people in front of the gate were crushed," said Myrna Britania, 42, who spent all night in line.

Two days of fighting across Afghanistan, Pakistan kill 41

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan (AP) — Militants attacked government offices and a police convoy Saturday, continuing a series of assaults that has left at least 41 people dead in the region over two days, government officials said.

About 250 Afghan forces fought more than 200 rebels in the area's fiercest fighting in months. At least 19 people were killed on in Afghanistan and Pakistan Saturday.

Afghan officials said U.S. forces joined the battle Friday and Saturday but a U.S. military spokesman said he could only confirm involvement in the first day of fighting.

The violence spread across the border as a roadside bomb exploded by an army vehicle Saturday in Pakistan in a northwestern tribal region near Afghanistan, killing three security personnel, an official said.

Muslim rage over caricatures continues

Leaders continue appeal for calm

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Rage against caricatures of Islam's revered prophet poured out across the Muslim world Saturday, with aggrieved believers calling for executions, storming European buildings and setting European flags afire.

In Gaza City, demonstrators hurled stones at a European Commission building and stormed a German cultural center, smashing windows and doors. Protesters also burned German and Danish flags and called for a boycott of Danish products.

In the West Bank town of Hebron, about 50 Palestinians marched to the headquarters of the international observer mission there, burned a Danish flag and demanded a boycott of Danish goods.

"We will redeem our prophet, Muhammad, with our blood!" they chanted.

The cartoons, first printed in a Danish newspaper in September and then republished in European publications this week, have touched a raw nerve in part because Islamic law is interpreted to forbid any depictions of the Prophet Muhammad.

Hundreds of Palestinians protested in the occupied territories, and the leader of the Islamic mili-

tant group Hamas, which recently swept parliamentary elections there, told Italian daily Il Giornale Saturday that the cartoons should be punished by death.

"We should have killed all those who offend the Prophet and instead here we are, protesting peacefully," said a top group leader, Mahmoud Zahar.

About 500 people rallied Saturday south of Baghdad, Iraq, some carrying banners urging "honest people all over the world to condemn this act" and demanding an EU apology. The protest was organized by followers of radical Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr, who has been among the most outspoken Iraqi clerics on the issue.

Passenger ship with more than 1,400 aboard sinks in Red Sea

SAFAGA, Egypt (AP) — Rescue boats picked up at least 362 survivors from an Egyptian ferry that caught fire and sank in the Red Sea, apparently so fast there was no time for a distress signal. But more than 1,000 missing passengers and crew were feared drowned, officials said Saturday.

Transport Minister Mohammed Lutfy Mansour said investigators were trying to determine whether the fire, which he described as "small," led to the sinking. He denied there were explosions.

Weather may also have been a factor. There were high winds and a sandstorm overnight on Saudi Arabia's west coast.

The ship sank in the dark hours of Friday morning while ferrying people and cars between the Saudi port of Dubah and Egypt's port of Safaga. Survivors said a

fire broke out, got out of control and an explosion was heard.

Egyptian rescuers had pulled 340 people out of the sea by Saturday morning, Bakr el-Rashidi, the governor of Egypt's Red Sea province, told The Associated Press.

Saudi vessels searching in their waters have retrieved another 22 survivors — 20 Egyptians and two Saudis, a Saudi government official told The Associated Press, speaking on condition of anonymity as he was not authorized to speak to the press.

Hundreds of relatives desperate for news of their loved ones tried to push their way into Safaga, where survivors from "Al-Salaam Boccaccio 98" ferry were being brought ashore. Port officials were not distributing lists of survivor names to the crowd, which repeatedly tried to

break through a line of helmeted police with sticks.

"No one is telling us anything," said Shaaban el-Qott, from the southern city of Qena, who waited all night for news of his cousin. "All I want to know if he's dead or alive."

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Crowds greet coffin of Coretta Scott King at Georgia state Capitol

ATLANTA (AP) — Cheered by hundreds of people, the body of Coretta Scott King was carried through the streets by horse-drawn carriage Saturday to Georgia's state Capitol, where she became the first woman and first black person to lie in honor.

King's four children, Gov. Sonny Perdue and his wife Mary, and Atlanta Mayor Shirley Franklin escorted the casket inside to the Rotunda as a bagpipe played Amazing Grace.

"Coretta Scott King was a gracious and courageous woman, an inspiration to millions and one of the most influential civil rights leaders of our time," Perdue said. "She was absolutely an anchor and support for her husband."

It was a striking contrast to the death of Martin Luther King Jr. in 1968, when then-Gov. Lester Maddox, an outspoken segregationist, was outraged at the idea of state flags, then domi-

nated by the Confederate Cross, flying at half-staff in tribute to a black man. He ignored King's death, refusing to authorize a public tribute.

Coretta Scott King died Monday at an alternative medical clinic in Mexico at the age of 78. Immediately after, the state flag she helped to change — no longer bearing the Confederate battle emblem — was ordered lowered by Perdue.

For most of Monday, King's casket will lie in Ebenezer Baptist Church, where her husband preached in the years before his death. Her funeral will be held at New Birth Missionary Baptist Church in Lithonia, where the Kings' youngest child, Bernice, is a minister.

Few details have been released about the funeral, including who will deliver the eulogy. However, the American Jewish Committee said the King family invited the executive director of its Atlanta chapter to deliver remarks.

Papers reveal similar debate over U.S. wiretaps 30 years ago

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House was eager to protect its ability to gather foreign intelligence. Congress was eager to rein in executive power.

What sounds like a new debate over the president's ability to eavesdrop without warrants occurred 30 years ago.

Documents from the Ford administration reflect a remarkably similar dispute between the White House and Congress a generation before President Bush acknowledged that he authorized wiretaps without warrants on some Americans in terrorism investigations.

Senate Intelligence chair: Bush can spy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Intelligence Committee Chairman Pat Roberts said Friday the Bush administration's domestic spying is within the president's inherent power under the Constitution, and he rejected criticism that Congress was kept in the dark about it.

The program is "legal, necessary and reason-

able," the Kansas Republican wrote in a 19-page letter.

"Congress, by statute, cannot extinguish a core constitutional authority of the president," Roberts wrote.

Presidents from George Washington to George W. Bush have intercepted communications to ascertain enemy threats, Roberts said.

Kenneth C. Bass, a former senior Justice Department lawyer who oversaw such wiretap requests during the Carter administration.

CIA Director Porter Goss told lawmakers this week that recent disclosures about sensitive programs were severely damaging, and he urged prosecutors to impanel a grand jury to determine "who is leaking this information."

The National Security Agency earlier asked the Justice Department to open a formal leaks investigation over press reports of its terrorism wiretaps.

NASA sued over loss of Columbia module

HOUSTON (AP) — Spacehab, a commercial space company, has filed a lawsuit seeking \$80 million from NASA for a research module destroyed when space shuttle Columbia disintegrated over Texas in 2003.

The Webster-based company says it filed the federal lawsuit Friday after NASA failed to offer a timely response to a claim filed with the space agency in 2004 under the Federal Tort Claims Act.

Spacehab also has appealed \$8 million NASA paid the company for the module in 2004.

An investigative board concluded Columbia suffered damage from the impact of insulating foam against vulnerable areas of its left wing during launch. The shuttle broke

apart on re-entry, killing the seven crew members aboard.

Spacehab alleges in its suit that NASA ignored its own rules, failed to fix the problem and improperly allowed Columbia to launch without addressing the danger.

U.S. District Judge Kenneth Hoyt will conduct a teleconference hearing on May 8.

"We have throughout this whole process been willing to work with NASA to come up with what would be equitable or a fair solution," said Spacehab spokeswoman Kimberly Campbell.

James Hartsfield, a NASA spokesman at Johnson Space Center, said he couldn't comment, citing the pending litigation.

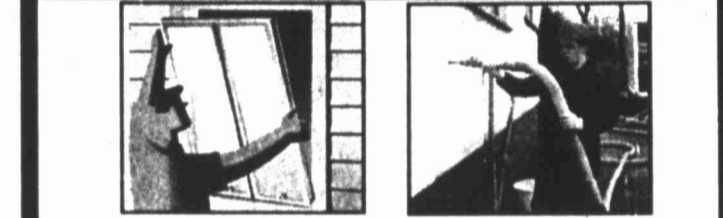
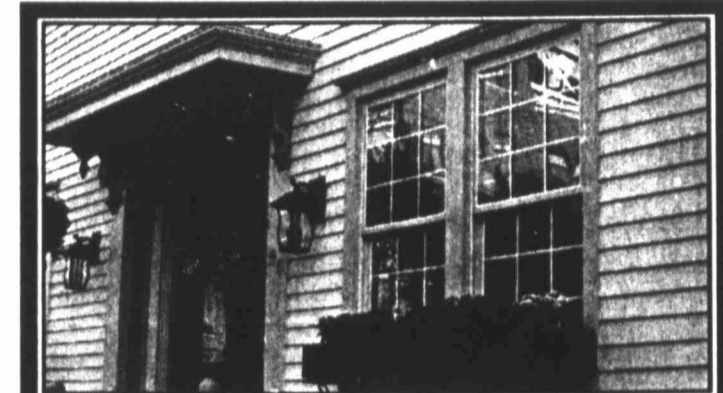

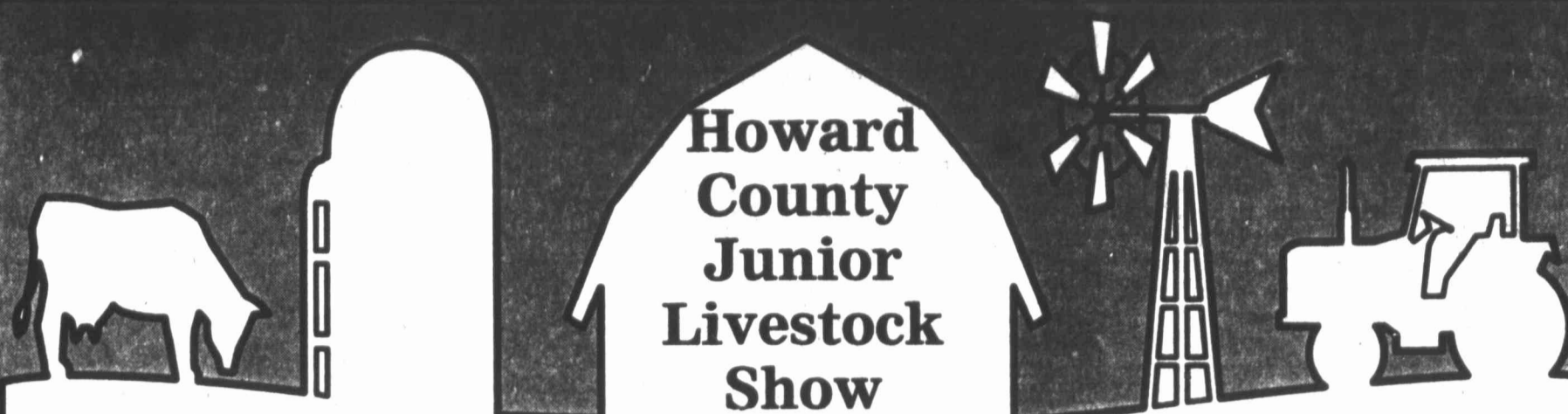
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Family's slaying remains Texas' longest unsolved mass killing

LOMA ALTA (AP) — When the tire on their 10-year-old Buick went flat in this rugged, isolated stretch of West Texas about 40 miles north of the Mexican border, it seemed merely an inconvenience for Manuel Arellano and his family.

Arellano fixed the flat, but had another a few miles farther north. They relied on a Good Samaritan to take them another 30 miles up the lonely road to Sonora to get that tire repaired.

What happened next has baffled authorities for nearly 40 years. A mile-long stretch of U.S. Highway 277 became a killing field, with family members shot, stabbed, raped and robbed. In all, five people died in what remains Texas' oldest unsolved mass slaying.

But thanks to an anonymous tip that reinvigorated the stalled investigation, a Texas Ranger assigned the case now believes authorities are close to cracking it.

"I couldn't give you a numerical value on our chances of solving it," said Sgt. Brooks Long, who is responsible for a four-county area of vast West Texas. "But I can tell you this: In 1998, law enforcement wasn't even in the ball park. And today we're on third base."

It was April 16, 1968, when the Arellano family piled into the blue four-door 1958 Buick Special for a 190-mile drive to San Angelo from Villa de Fuente, just inside the Mexican border south of Piedras Negras, to visit a relative who had just given birth.

Along with Arellano, 25, was his wife, Monica, 25; their children, Manuel Jr., 5, Leticia, 2 1/2, Eduardo, 15 months; and Arellano's sister, Rosa Elia, 19.

It wasn't expected to be a difficult journey. Arellano was familiar with the United States, spoke fluent English and had been a migrant farm worker in Iowa. The couple had other relatives in Texas, and their car carried Texas license plates and election stickers promoting a relative running for sheriff in Zavala County.

By daybreak, though, the family was dead. A ranchhand discovered the carnage — Arellano's body was found near a water trough, inside a barbed wire fence line not far from the highway. His wife's body was in a ditch about a mile south. Her sister-in-law's body was in some brush a few feet away. The children were nearer their father, in the rocks and shrubs usually occupied by goats, snakes and armadillos. The car was found about eight miles away, still with a flat tire.

Amazingly, Leticia, shot twice between the eyes, was alive. So was her brother, Manuel Jr., also shot in the head and stabbed. Leticia died two days later. Manuel Jr. survived, but underwent multiple brain surgeries.

Some two weeks after his attack, the boy was able to tell authorities about a white man, "a big cowboy," who was helping them, then killed his father.

Based on information from a Sonora service station attendant who

repaired the tire for the family, police distributed a sketch of a possible suspect — a tall, sandy-haired man in his 30s, wearing a straw cowboy hat, who was accompanying them. He was driving a pickup truck.

Several people were brought in for questioning. The attendant couldn't identify any of them as the man he saw. No charges ever were filed.

The .22-caliber murder weapon was never found. Investigators weren't even certain how many suspects to hunt.

By 1982, the investigation had turned cold after producing thousands of pages of documentation, Long said.

"It had been worked to exhaustion," he said.

That's how it stayed until 1999, when a caller told the Texas Department of Public Safety he knew the identity of the killer.

Detectives traced the caller and eventually dismissed him as an unreliable source, but the tip renewed interest in the case.

"We had to go look, start digging things up, find reports and start piecing things together," Long said. "We came to realize this is a case that needs to be looked at" again.

Rangers tracked down the ranchhand, an illegal immigrant, who found the bodies, but he had nothing new to add. Long looked for two years for the old Buick, finally convincing himself it was destroyed in a salvage yard.

The lead investigator at the time, Ranger A.Y. Allee Jr., died in January, but Long has a sworn statement from him that could be used in court.

The investigation has taken Long all over the country and to Mexico, where he found Manuel Jr. He was taken to Mexico after recovering from multiple brain surgeries and raised by his grandmother. He's now about 42 years old, married, a father, and working in the financial industry.

Long said Manuel Jr.

wasn't sure what to make of authorities contacting him decades after he lost his family.

"You can only imagine what went through this gentleman's mind," Long said. "Initially he was skeptical. After I was able to meet him in person, I think he realized we were for real."

But he could provide little help, even after questioning under hypnosis.

"His memory of the incident was basically nonexistent, except for what he has been told or read," Long said.

He did, however, lift his shirt and show Long the five or six scars from stab wounds he suffered, Long said.

Long, who is about Manual Jr.'s age, said authorities did collect some physical evidence years ago, like pieces of the victims' clothing. Some has been submitted for DNA testing that wasn't available in the late '60s and early '70s.

Long believes more than one person was involved in the slayings, which differs from the beliefs of his peers decades ago.

"Back in '68, I think with the information they had, probably they looked at a hate crime as the motive. Sexual assault was secondary, thirdly would have been theft," said Long, referring to the rape of at least one of the women.

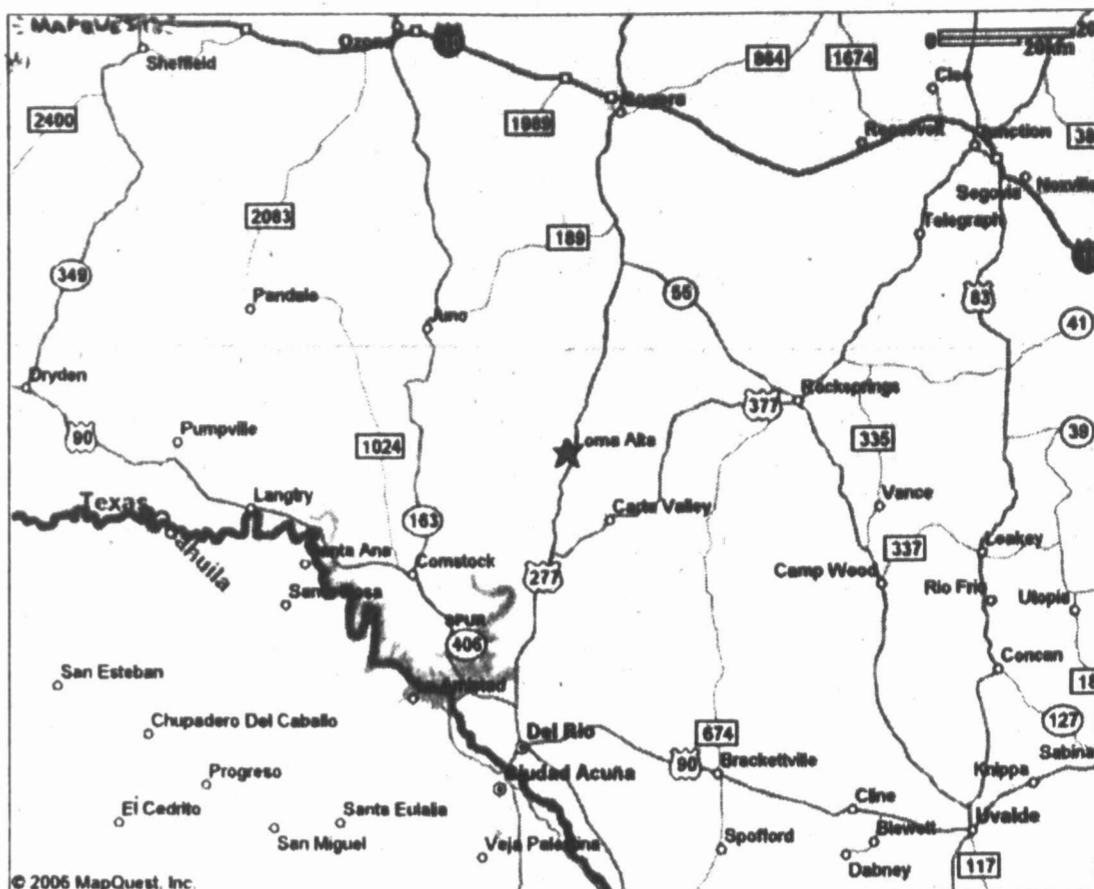
"I think now we put that reversed. I think you have a robbery that kind of gets out of hand that leads to murder and sexual assault."

Long said the attacker or attackers may have killed again.

"Experience is, definitely you don't do this and stop," he said. "And if it was just a one-time event in some individual's life, that's questionable how somebody rational could do something like this and just carry on with his normal routine in life."

Few in the sparsely populated area remember the case, though it seems to have spawned a legend from Del Rio to Mexico.

Carol Finegan, who with her husband owns the nearly 80-year-old Loma Alta store where the Arellano family repaired their first flat, has heard talk about how Mexicans won't stop there or travel the road.

"It seemed like a ghost thing they were talking about, or something like that," said Finegan, whose store is the lone oasis on the winding 90-mile highway between Del Rio and Sonora.

A preacher once came in the store "to get rid of the Loma Alta devil or ghost," she recalled. Another time she was questioned by a man who said he was a private

investigator looking into some killings, she said.

The killings are among more than 900 mass slayings in the 20th century and several remain unsolved, according to Grant Duwe, a senior research analyst with the Minnesota Department of Corrections who has studied the subject.

Among them is one that occurred only two months after the Arellano family

earlier in 1968, when a vacationing family of six was killed in a Michigan cabin.

Long said he hopes one day to get answers to what happened that day in that West Texas field.

"If anything this case did do, it showed me the importance of how not to quit," Long said. "There's always something to follow."

Buddy Holly's diamond watch to be auctioned

NEW YORK (AP) — Buddy Holly's wife, Maria Elena Holly, will auction several items of the rock 'n' roll legend's, including the watch he was wearing when he died in 1959.

Holly wore a diamond-and-white gold Omega wristwatch, a gift from his wife, "the day the music died" on February 3, 1959, when he and singers Ritchie Valens and J.P. "The Big Bopper" Richardson were killed in a plane crash in Iowa. Holly was 22.

Maria Elena Holly married the singer in August 1958, just months before the crash. Holly proposed on their first date.

She will auction the watch, unreleased music recordings, his passport and other personal items at Heritage Auction Galleries and Auctioneers in Dallas on April 14-15.

"I would like the fans of Buddy's to have something of him," she said Friday. "At least I know that the people

who are going to buy this are going to treasure it and keep it forever, and pass it down to their children. That's the reason why I'm doing this."

The watch is inscribed "Buddy Holly 12-1-58," the date she gave it to him as an early Christmas present, and was recovered at the crash site. Later, Holly's father, Laurence, wore it in honor of his son in the family's hometown of Lubbock.

Charges filed in 1990 stabbing death in Odessa

ODESSA (AP) — With the help of new developments in DNA technology, Odessa police have filed a capital murder charge against a man in the 1990 stabbing death of a 67-year-old woman.

Virginia Washelesky was stabbed to death at her home in August 1990. She was stabbed numerous times in the chest and stomach. At the time, police couldn't find enough evidence to tie anyone to the death.

Law enforcement officials announced Friday that a capital murder charge has been filed against Johnny Lee Wells, 49,

formerly of Odessa. Wells was served a warrant Thursday where he is incarcerated, said Sgt. Paul Shepherd of the Odessa Police Department.

Wells recently violated his parole and was returned to prison for the aggravated kidnapping of a woman in Ector County in 1980, Shepherd said.

Officials said at a news conference Friday that developments in DNA technology linked Wells to evidence collected in the investigation.

"Technology has caught up with the evidence," OPD Deputy Chief Lou Orras said.

Fighter jets force down small plane flying near Bush ranch

WACO (AP) — Two fighter jets forced a small plane to land after the pilot flew too close to President Bush's ranch in central Texas while he was spending the weekend there.

The Secret Service on Saturday confirmed that the pilot violated restricted air space over the ranch on Friday night, several hours after the president arrived, and was forced to land at near-

by Waco Regional Airport.

The pilot was interviewed and sent on his way, said Tom Mazur, a spokesman for the Secret Service in Washington. The matter, which appeared to be an inadvertent violation, was referred to the Federal Aviation Administration.

Bus driver in fatal Houston accident fired

HOUSTON (AP) — A Metropolitan Transit Authority bus driver who was at the wheel when a pedestrian was fatally struck has been fired, a Metro spokeswoman said.

Romain Alexandre, 56, was fired Friday for "unsafe and careless action and disregard for established safety procedures" in the fatal accident, said Metro spokeswoman Raequel Roberts.

Witnesses said his bus struck Domitila Leon, 43, in the crosswalk on Jan. 20, dragging her about 20 feet and running over her.

Alexandre, who had only minor infractions on his record since being hired in 1993, was cited for failure to yield right-of-way to a pedestrian.

Deputy warns of terrorist threats on border

HOUSTON (AP) — A West Texas sheriff's deputy warned federal lawmakers Friday that drug traffickers are helping terrorists with possible al-Qaida ties cross the porous Texas-Mexico border into the United States.

Terry Simons, the chief deputy in Val Verde County, offered little evidence publicly of his claims. An FBI special agent in Houston, Shauna Dunlap, said there's "no credible evidence" that supports the warning.

Simons, part of a group that has been pushing state and federal officials for more law enforcement funding on the border, told congressmen meeting in Houston that Texas authorities have learned of newly established camps in Mexico, where so-called "narco-terrorists" are getting trained in "escape and evasion, as well as fighting techniques and combat

maneuvering." Simons also said the FBI has informed the border sheriffs that suspects with Islamic backgrounds — and possibly al-Qaida ties — are training with them.

Simons and other members of the Texas Border Sheriffs Coalition outlined the threat in a presentation to U.S. Reps. John Culberson, R-Texas, and James Sensenbrenner, R-Wis.

"We need more boots on the ground," Simons said. "The thing we're facing, it's a war."

Culberson said the FBI told him that suspected terrorists from countries "with known al-Qaida connections" have adopted Hispanic surnames and are "blending in with the other illegals coming over the border."

Sensenbrenner said protecting the border is now a national security issue. "What I learned today is

the type of people who are coming across the border have changed," Sensenbrenner said.

"Now, a lot of the people coming across the border are criminals, and potentially terrorists — people who have a mind to commit crimes against Americans and maybe to blow us all up and kill us."

In December, the U.S. House passed a border security bill authorizing \$100 million for the sheriffs in the border counties. The money can be used to hire more deputies, build detention facilities and buy equipment, including weapons. "The threat has changed on the border," Culberson said.

The bill is now pending in the Senate.

In Austin, Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas, said immigration reform and border security are "very high" on the Senate's

agenda and could be addressed as early as mid-March.

"We know in a post 9/11 world, the same vulnerability that allows people who want to come across to work can be exploited by criminals, drug cartels and those who perhaps want to come to the United States to perhaps terrorize innocent Americans," Cornyn said. Following a meeting with local, state and federal authorities in El Paso, U.S. Rep. Michael McCaul, a Republican from Austin, called the situation at the border a crisis that needs to be addressed immediately.

He said he plans to meet with the Mexican ambassador to the United States Tuesday, in advance of a hearing on border issues by a subcommittee of the Committee on Homeland Security.

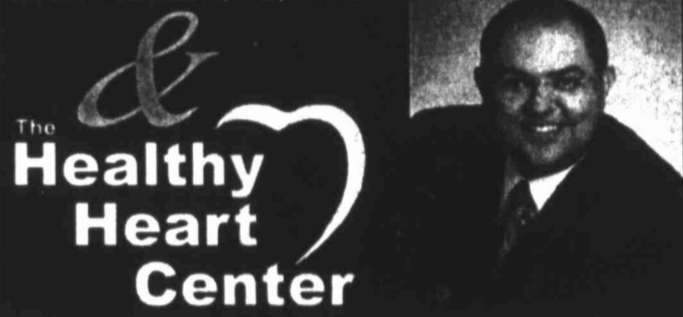
Federal officials in San Antonio Friday

Officials with the Border Enforcement Security Task Force said they had arrested 28 people and seized materials to make 33 lower-grade explosive devices.

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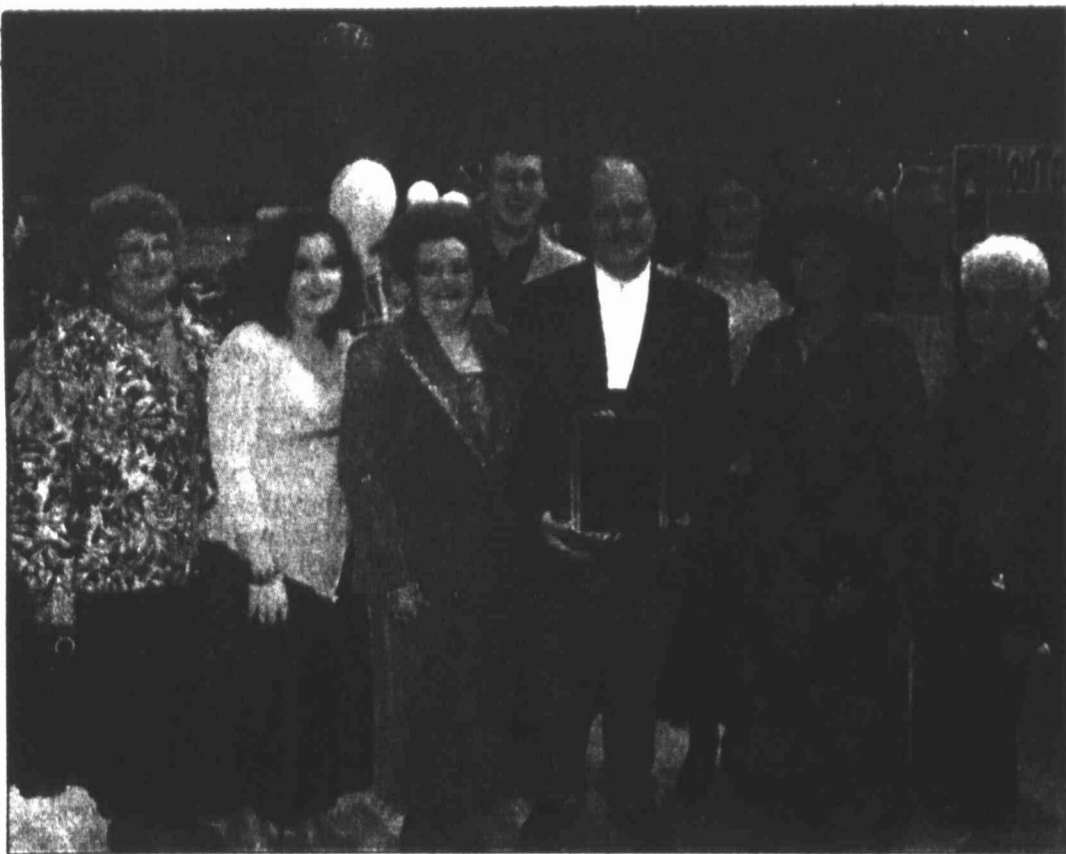

Big plans, small screen

NBC to air more than 400 hours of Games

Hol J on. NBC announced it will average 24.5 hours of coverage per day during the upcoming Winter Olympics in Turin, Italy.

Sure, the network pays a ton of money for broadcast rights to the Games, but there's no way that also bought NBC the ability to put more than 24 hours in a day, did it?

Just having a little fun. Some of the coverage overlaps, obviously, as NBC Universal — the lead network, plus USA, MSNBC, CNBC, NBC HD and Universal HD — brings viewers the whole story from Italy.

NBC televised just its second Winter Games four years ago in Salt Lake City. If that set a standard, this time the network hopes to be even better. If nothing else, it's offering more: a total of 418 hours compared to 375.5 from Utah in 2002.

There is nothing in the industry that compares to the production scale that is required now for the Olympic Games. The Summer Olympics have many more sports and venues to keep track of, but the Winter Olympics offer special challenges.

"I would say that the biggest one is the weather," said David Neal, an executive producer for NBC Sports and veteran of multiple Olympic telecasts.

"We have built into our plans fall-back contingencies if we lose an event to the weather on a given day. We were blessed with almost ideal weather in Salt Lake four years ago.

"The terrain is also a big challenge. When you send a camera crew and technicians onto the face of a mountain ... that's going to be an undertaking that's far different than taking them into a track and field stadium. And with the Winter Games, these sports are less familiar, so we have to make sure we've done our homework."

NBC will have a total crew similar in size to the 3,000 people the network had working in Salt Lake City. Along with the increased hours of coverage, NBC will offer simulcasts in high-definition from some of the venues and for the opening and closing ceremonies. The "gadgetry" the network used four years ago is similar but improved.

NBC will use all of its properties as part of the coverage of the Games. Some of the "biggest-ticket" items, such as figure skating, alpine skiing and speed skating, as usual will be tape-delayed to be shown on the main network in primetime in the United States. But there will be a great deal of live coverage, too, despite the six-hour time difference between Turin and the East Coast of the United States.

HD technology has improved even in the two years since the Athens Games. From Turin, there will be HD broadcasts from indoor events such as figure skating, speed skating and hockey, plus the freestyle acrobatics. Two years from now, in the Beijing Summer Games, it's expected every sport will be broadcast in HD.

In a nod to figure skating's immense popularity during the Games, an additional show is being added to the already blanket coverage the competition will get. It's called "Olympic Ice" and will be shown on the USA network nightly from 6-7 p.m. ET.

"The show will be the perfect forum to offer up a primer on how scoring works," Neal said. "And as the Games continue, it will be a way to go back the day after the competition and break down what happened."

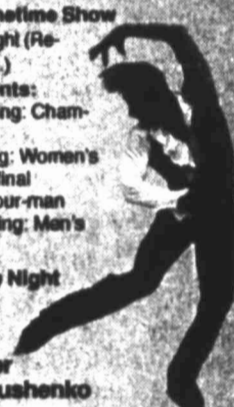

For lucky Lampley, Turin is No. 13

After all these years, the opening ceremonies of the Olympics still are truly uplifting for Jim Lampley.

"There's nothing in sports or in life that's as inspiring to me as an Olympic opening ceremony," Lampley says. "At least for a few hours, we get to see that it could work."

Amid the egos and politics of the Olympics, Lampley says he is moved by seeing people from all over the world gather in a peaceful setting.

Lampley knows his Olympics. As the daytime and late-night host for NBC's telecast of the Winter Olympics, Lampley, 56, will be working his 13th Olympics, surpassing the esteemed Jim McKay in most Olympics worked on television.

While Lampley's work with the Olympics is highly respected, neither he nor anyone else compares him to McKay as an Olympics broadcaster. For years, ABC's McKay was the voice of the Olympics.

"I've kind of flown under the radar a little because I've never been the primetime host," Lampley says. "I guess I've been successful the way Bob

But Lampley is still proud of the work he has done on the Olympics.

"I've been fortunate that the twists and turns of my career have continually taken me to the Olympics," Lampley says. "Dick Ebersol (NBC Sports & Olympics chairman) has been very loyal to me in his support of my continuing desire to be part of the Olympics. It's a labor of love for me."

Lampley's first association with McKay was at the Winter Games in Innsbruck, Austria, in 1976. Just a few years out of the University of North Carolina, Lampley served as a features reporter for ABC.

"I did a couple of features that were controversial enough that we had to run them by Jim and Roone (Arledge, who ran ABC Sports and News)," Lampley recalls. "I got a closeup look at (McKay's) style as an Olympic host. ... His thoroughness, his meticulous preparation were amazing."

McKay's adaptability also impressed him.

"You have a fairly tightly scripted Olympics broadcast now," says Lampley, who also is a respected boxing announcer for HBO. "Back in the day, when Roone was in the control room and Jim was on the set, that wasn't the case. It wasn't until 1984 that they developed the system for coordinating television with the (event) schedules to make everything fit."

Work as many Olympics as Lampley has and you have countless highlights. One, however, stands out for him: Lake Placid, 1980, and the "Miracle on Ice."

playing the Soviets in the hockey semifinals, Lampley was preparing a feature in an editing bay when the phone rang.

"The red phones were called the 'Roone phones.' Only Roone had the number," Lampley recalls. "In 6 years of working at ABC Sports, I had never seen a red phone ring."

"About 20 seconds after Mark Johnson scored to make it 2-2 (at the end of the first period), the red phone rang in our edit bay. The editor and producer and I all looked at each other. I answered the phone. It was Arledge. He asked what I was doing."

When Lampley told him, Arledge said, "Drop that and get over to the hockey arena."

ABC was taping the U.S.-Soviet afternoon game to show Friday night. Arledge wanted a live element to close the show.

One problem: Lampley told Arledge he didn't have the right credentials to enter the arena. "Jim, you'll get in," Arledge replied.

Lampley talked his way in and, following the Americans' 4-3 upset victory, did a live interview with captain Mike Eruzione and goalie Jim Craig.

Lampley's father died when he was 4. Growing up in Hendersonville, N.C., Lampley said his mother

instilled in him social consciousness.

When he was 11, he watched the 1960 Rome Summer Games on television. Abebe Bikila, an Ethiopian, won the Olympic marathon running barefoot. Near the finish line he passed the Obelisk of Axum, a monument that had been taken from Ethiopia by Italian troops during their conquest of the country in 1939.

"From that moment, because of what my mother gave me," Lampley says, "I understood the special importance of the synthesis between sports and society that the Olympics represent."

"The Olympics has ebbed a little, in terms of public impact, in the years since the Cold War went away. But whether people in this country realize it or not, politics are coming back to the Summer Olympics with giant impact 2 1/2 years from now."

"The biggest sociopolitical event of our lifetime is going to take place in Beijing. Americans are going to be presented, all at once, with a glimpse of the future. That's going to re-ignite the political backdrop of the Olympics, which helps to give them their flavor (and) impact."

Lampley sounds as if he can't wait to get to Beijing.

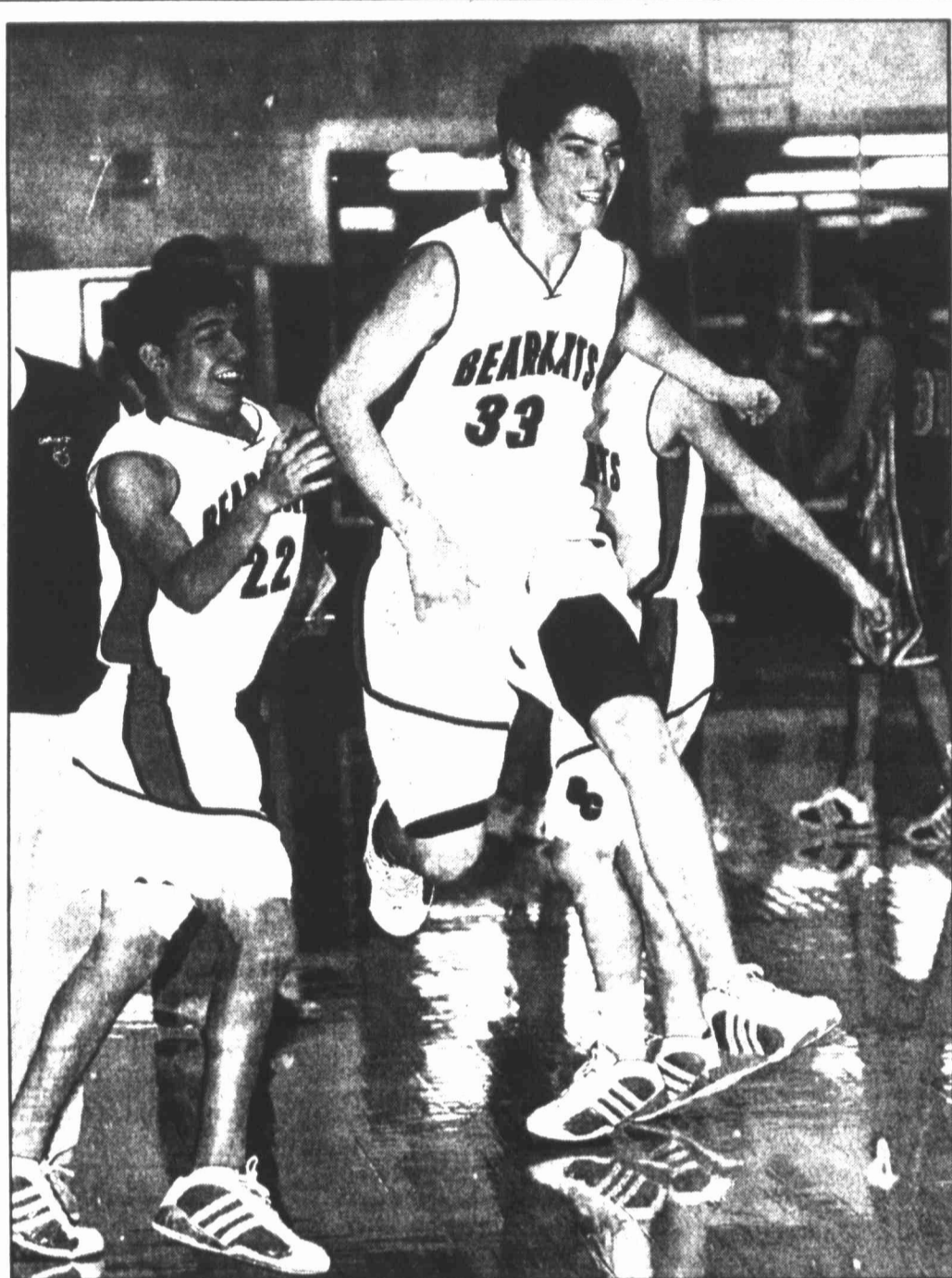

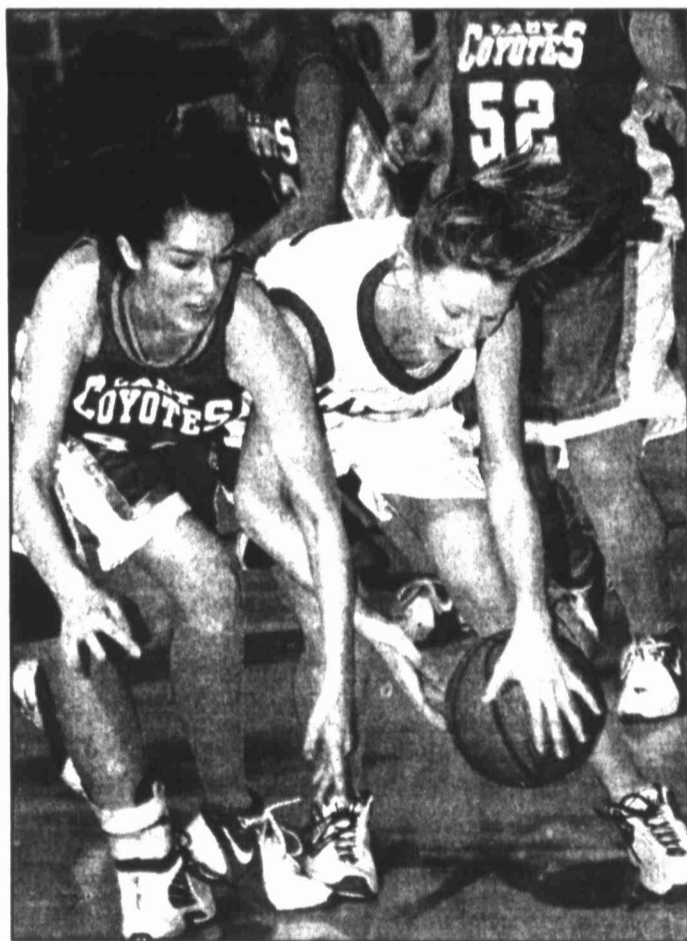

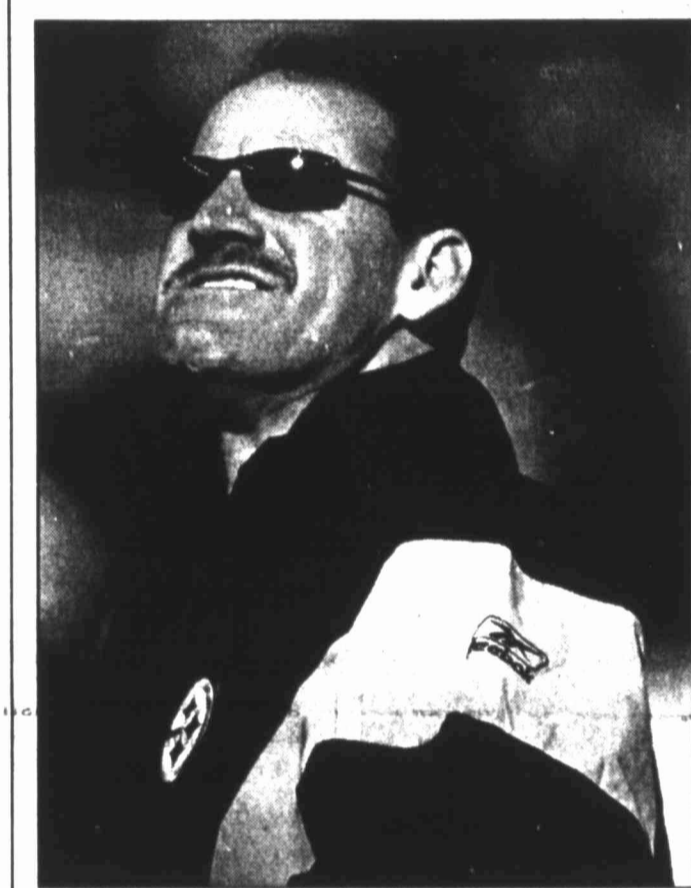

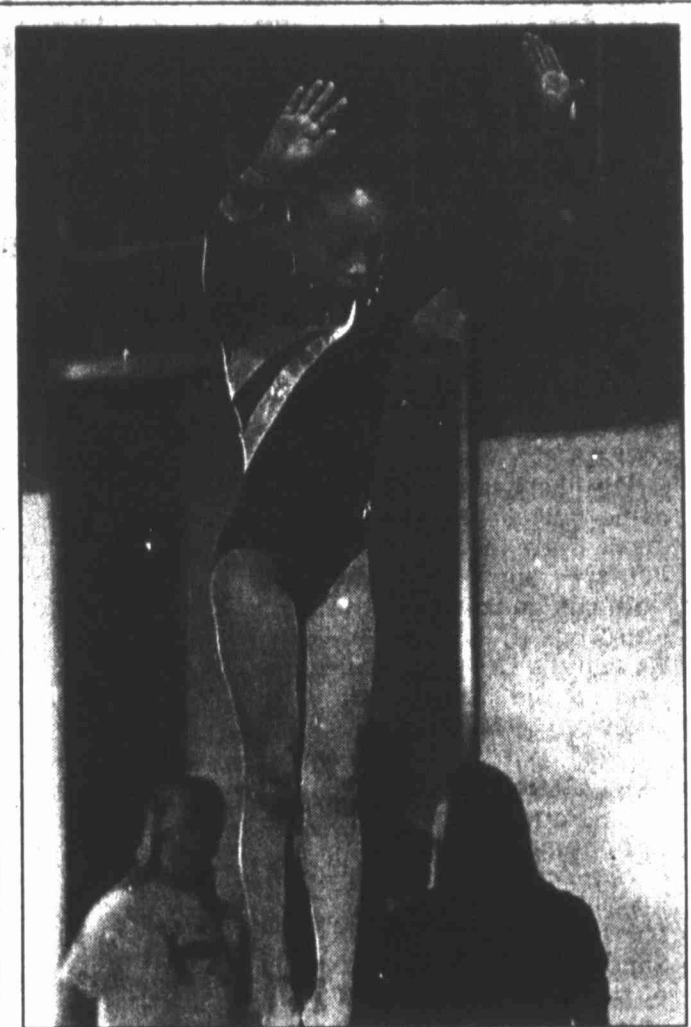

Beauty in Big Spring

Remember Dippity Do, Aqua Velvet, Remington Shaves, Blue Waltz perfume and pink sponge rollers?

A chance to indulge nostalgia for page boys hair cuts and even a Farrah Fawcett mane is available Saturday at the Heritage Museum.

The exhibit opening continues until 6 p.m.

"This all started with one little hair dryer that was donated. Then we found some other items and decided to do a beauty exhibit and have a day of beauty at the museum," said Tammy Schrecengost, curator of Heritage Museum.

The exhibit features old barber's chairs, salon-style hair dryers and mannequins wearing beauticians coats from the 1960s.

A modern day exhibit, designed and constructed by Uptown Salon and Day Spa, depicts what beauty means today, from coloring procedures to hair stylists.

"It is really interesting how hair has changed through the years, from the different cuts to the difference between foil and cap coloring. Once we all had shampoos and sets and today's styles are easier to manage and easy to maintain," said Schrecengost.

The industry has changed dramatically through the years, with sterilization a key component today versus no sterilized equipment in the early years.

Rat tail combs and teasing hair have also passed into the annals of history, although frosting hair has been transformed into highlights.

"And at one time this was very much a man's industry, as barbers and barbershops were gathering places for the men in town. Now there are more beauticians or hair stylists than there are barbers," she said.

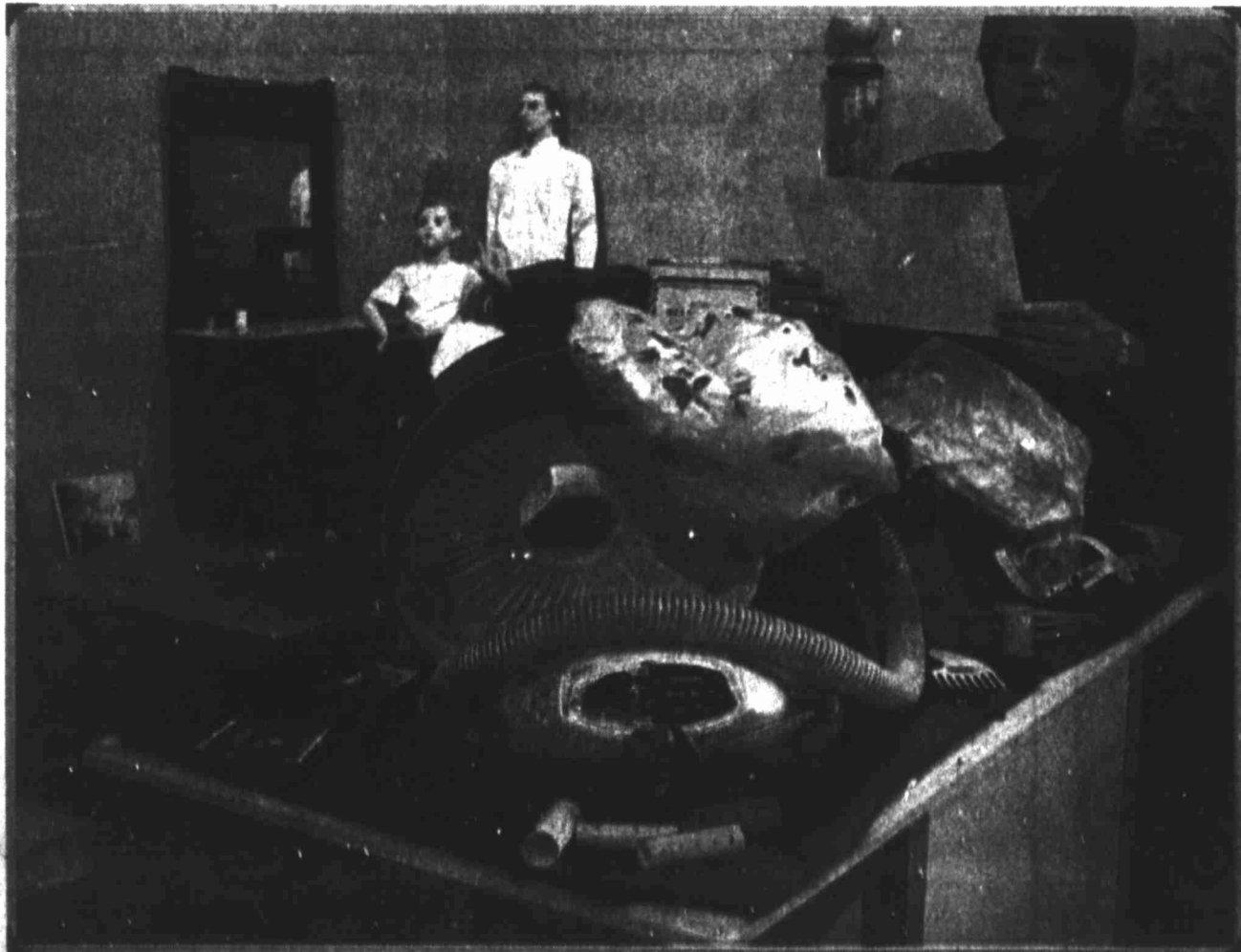
The exhibit will remain open until April 16.

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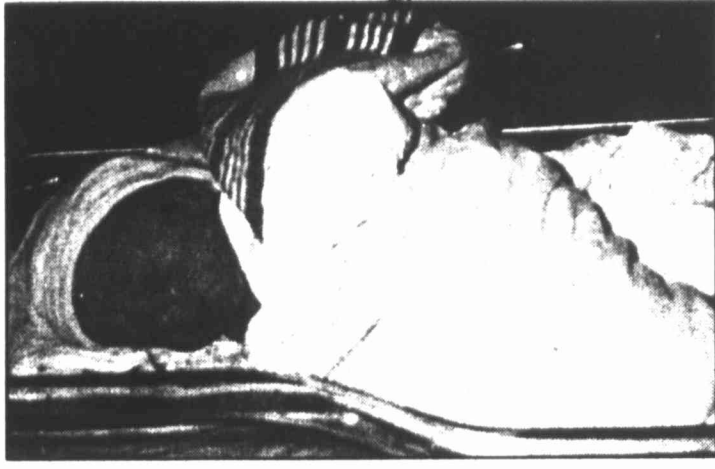

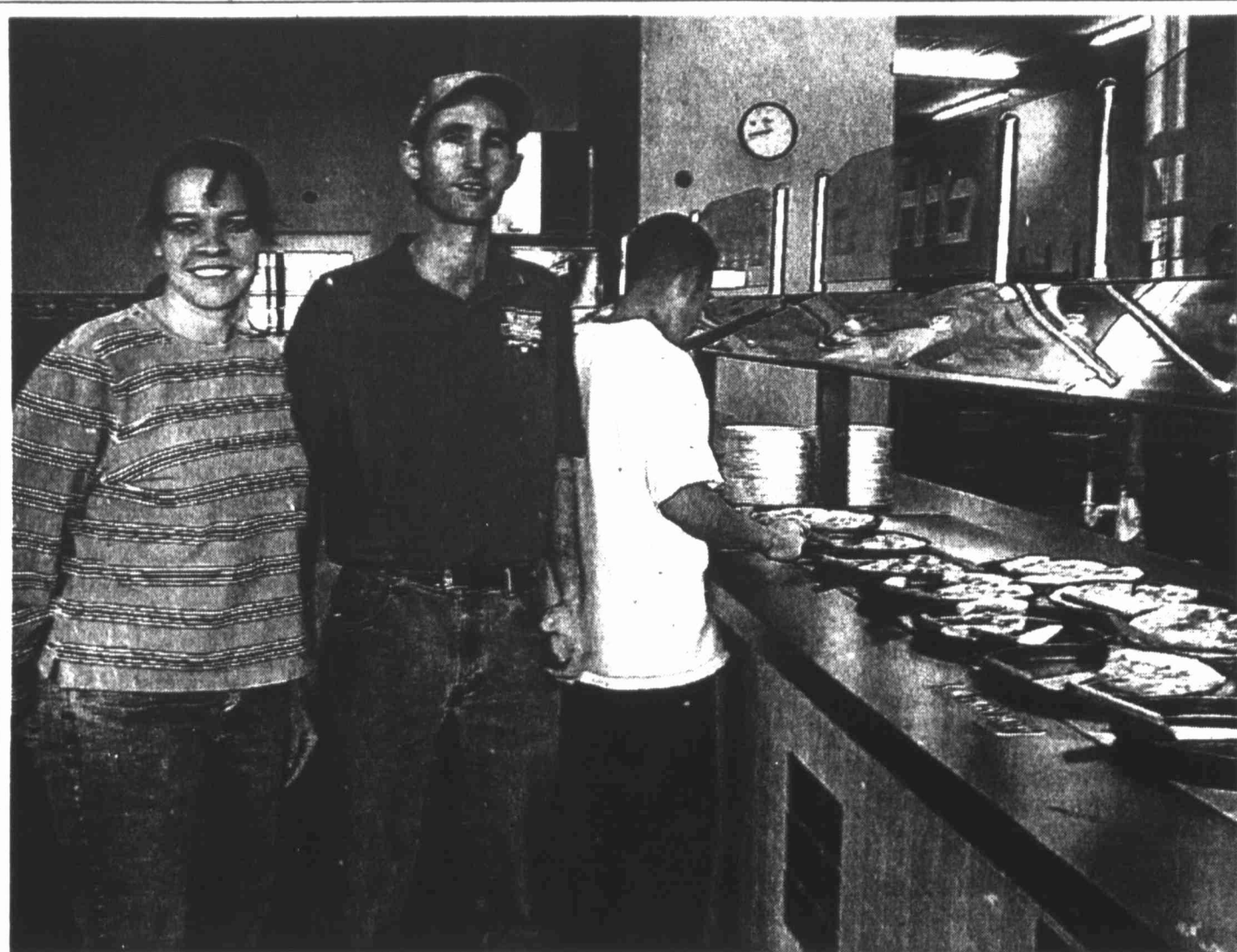

Commission adopts new rules for barbers and cosmetologists

The Texas Commission of Licensing and Regulation has adopted new rules for the cosmetology and barbering professions that are designed to better protect the health of the consumers who use their services.

The rules mandate a risk-based inspection schedule for beauty salons and barbers shops and, for the first time, require sterilization of the implements used by manicurists and pedicurists. The new rules also make it a violation for cosmetologists and barbers to possess as well as utilize implements and substances that are pro-

hibited for use on customers.

Under current rules it is a violation only if a Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) inspector observes the substances or implements being used.

"Our primary consideration is the health and welfare of the consumers," said Gina Parker, chairman of the Commission. "During the last legislative session, when these programs were transferred to our agency, lawmakers expressed great concern about sanitation issues at these establishments that could result in the trans-

Sponsors will provide promotional materials including notification information for their companies, safety related brochures and other safety reminders.

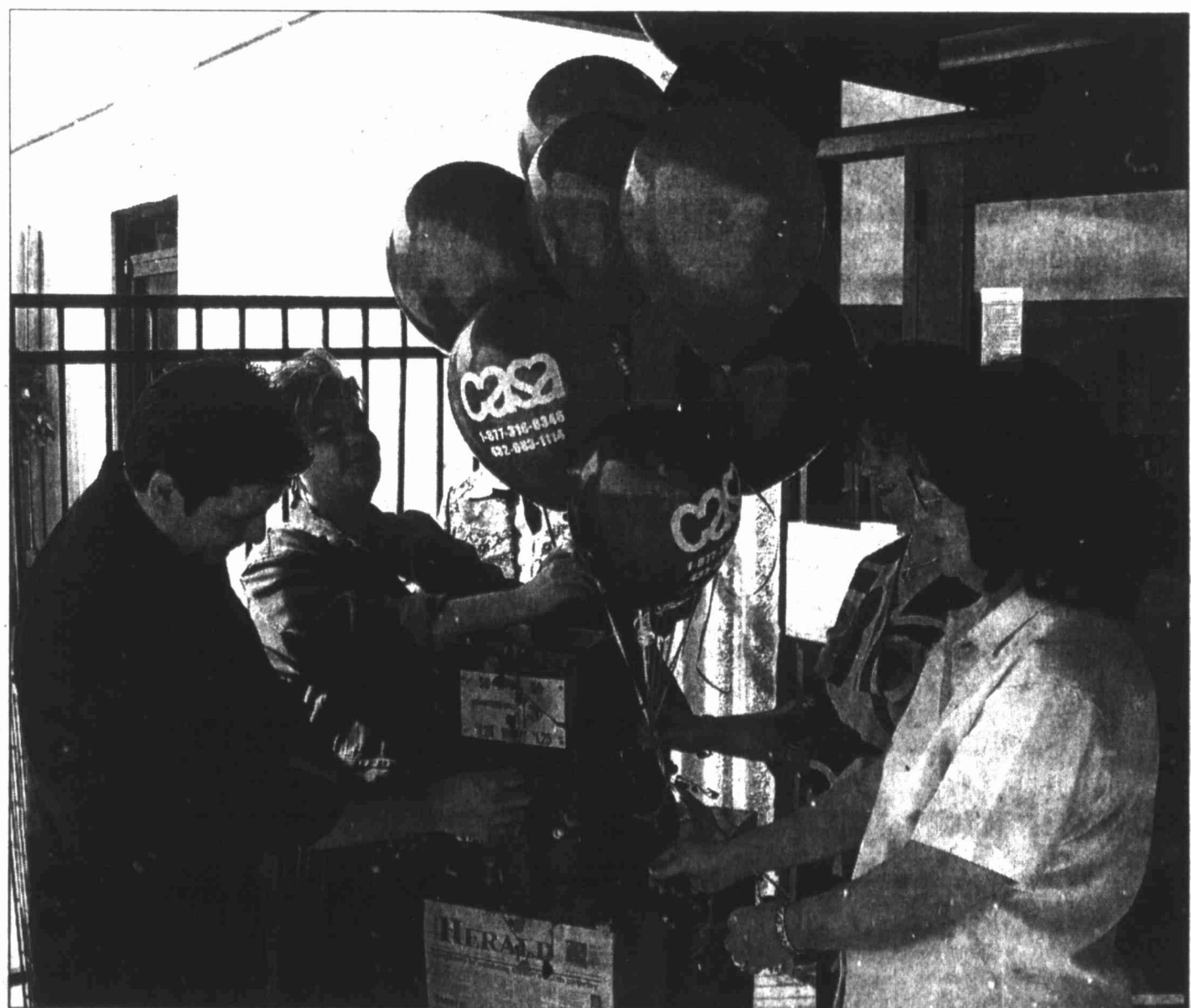

mission of disease, particularly with foot spas. These rules address those concerns.
The new rules were developed in consultation with the State Barbering Advisory Board and the State Cosmetology Advisory Board, which represent the interests of

the industries. Both boards recommended that the rules be approved. TDLR also conducted a series of public meetings on the rules, gathering comments more than 1,000 cosmetologists and barbers.
Currently, salons and shops are subject to annual inspections. Under the new rules, shops and salons need only be inspected every other

year, but new emphasis will be placed on establishments in which sanitation issues are discovered. If sanitation problems are found during an inspection, the shops will be subject to a much more rigorous inspection schedule, up to four times a year.
Also under the new rules, the implements

manicurists and pedicurists use must be cleaned, disinfected and sterilized by use of an autoclave, ultraviolet light or dry heat to minimize the risk of the transmission of communicable disease. Current rules require only that the implements be cleaned and disinfected.
In addition, the newly

adopted rules prohibit the use of certain substances or implements on customers. These include razor blades to remove calluses or MMA-based adhesives to attach acrylic nails. Under current rules, only the use of banned substances or implements is a violation. The new rules also will make possession of prohibited substances and implements a violation.

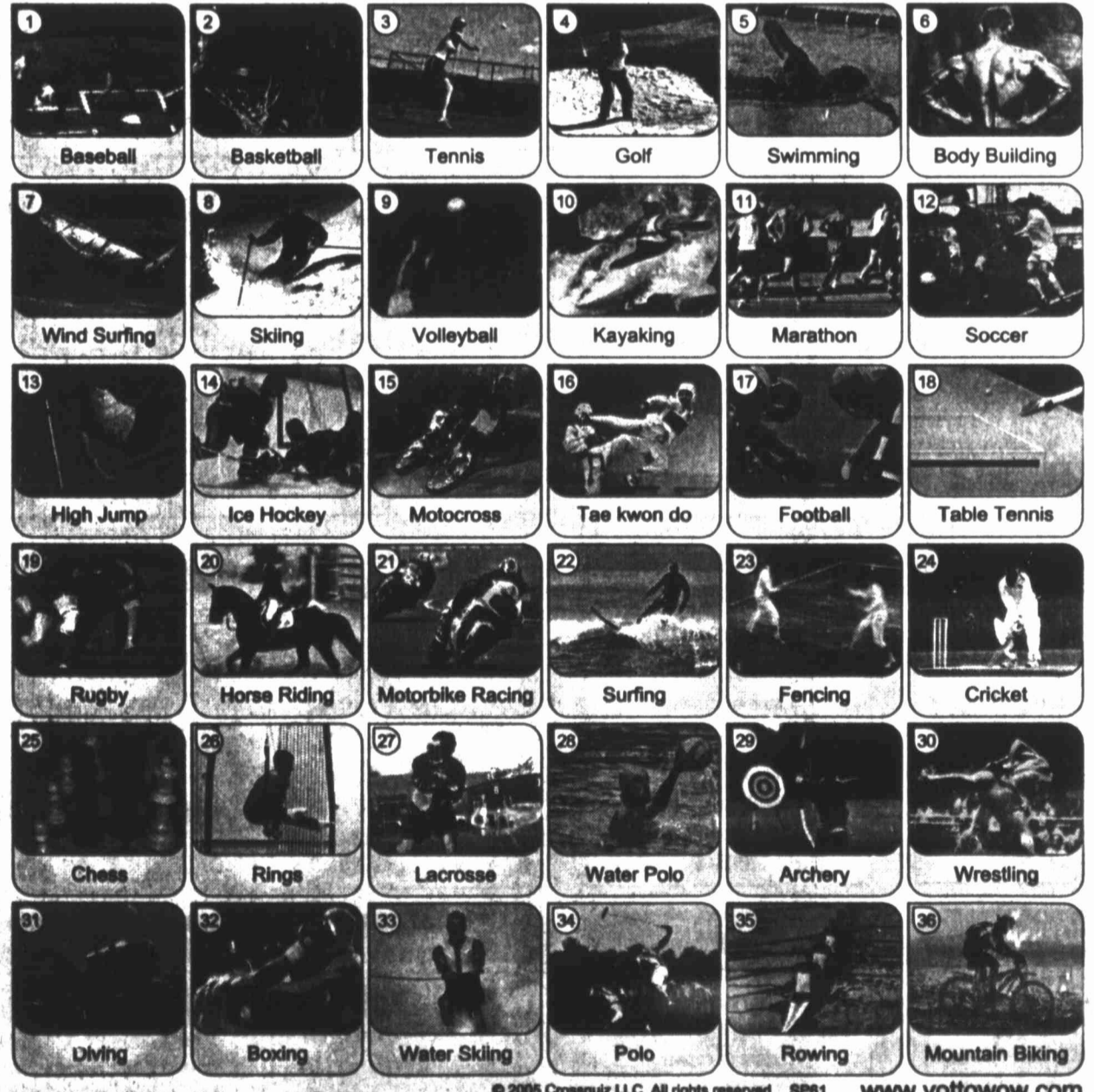

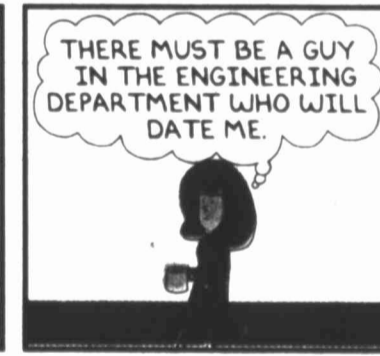
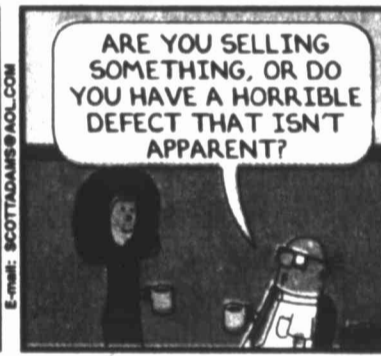
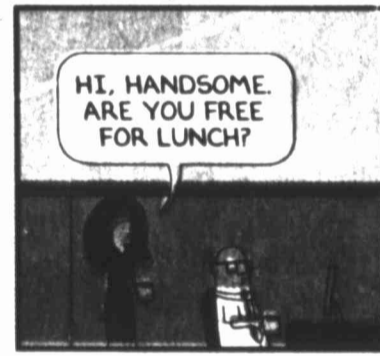
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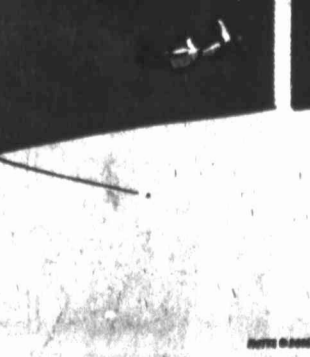
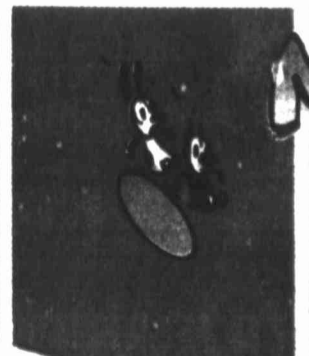
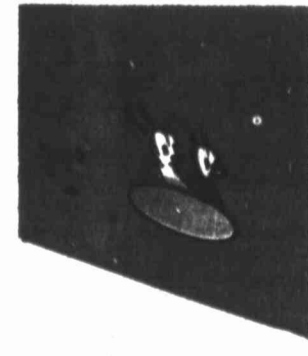
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Stallone and Rocky have something to prove

That also happens to be why Sylvester Stallone is in Philadelphia. Rocky's creator is giving the big lug one last shot as he directs and stars in "Rocky Balboa," the sixth in the epic series. Stallone also wrote the screenplay.

Filming began Jan. 9 and is expected to wrap by next week. The film is not expected in theaters until February 2007.

Although Philadelphia settings also figured into all previous "Rockys" except for "IV," Stallone said he had to come back to do all the exterior work on "Rocky Balboa."

"The city itself is the co-star," said Stallone, sucking on a cigar between takes.

Stallone owes the city a lot.

In December 1975, he was a broke young man — New York-born, Philadelphia-raised — with something to prove when he shot his gritty story of an up-and-coming club fighter who goes the distance.

And now with "Rocky Balboa" revisiting many of the same haunts from the Oscar-winning first movie, Stallone might be a wealthy guy on the brink of 60, but he has something else to prove:

Don't count out people just because they're getting up there.

If 1976's "Rocky" was a story for the ages, "Rocky

Balboa" is a story for the aging.

Stallone is among the oldest of the baby-boom generation, and in this installment — where we pick up his story 15 years after "V" — Rocky is not ready to pack it in as he gets into the ring against a guy two decades his junior.

"I think that it's a philosophically sound piece," Stallone said. "People that are on the cusp of wanting to just give up and really not participate in life would recognize maybe a sense of optimism."

"In my generation, it seems that no one wants to go away gently anymore. They're staying healthier, they're looking out for themselves ... They're driving race cars ... climbing mountains. I think that's the wave of the future. Rocky kind of typifies that sense of adventurousness at the cost of looking foolish, but he's willing to pay the price."

"I think that people should be willing to walk on thin ice because it's really rewarding if you happen to get across that lake that's frozen."

Here's how it goes: The long-suffering Adrian — the girl Rocky met in the pet shop in the original — is dead. Rocky owns a restaurant in South Philadelphia. He's pals with Adrian's brother Paulie (Burt Young), but he's distant from his son, Rocky Jr. (played by Milo Ventimiglia), who goes by Robert as he lives the yuppie life in Philadelphia's Center City.

He's friendly with Marie — played by Geraldine Hughes — who was a kid in the first Rocky. She's a

single mother living on the edge of poverty.

The world has changed, but Rocky hasn't.

One day, ESPN simulates a boxing match between a computer-generated Rocky and the current champ (Mason "The Line" Dixon, played by boxer Antonio Tarver).

Dixon's people want a fight.

Rocky accepts, then balks.

"He's called upon to (do this), almost as a publicity stunt that turns out to be a foolish gesture, but it starts to spark something in him," Stallone said.

"What starts out as an outlet for his grief becomes a magnet for all the people around him who have given up in life and they start to bond with him," Stallone said.

"If the mountain is there, why not try to climb it? He's being just scourged by the press, scourged by his friends, 'You're nothing' ... Just because you've had a few too many birthdays, you should stop trying things? That's what Rocky would say. 'Time goes by

for everybody. Especially if you're standing still.'"

The state boxing commissioner — played by Philadelphia lawyer Jimmy Binns, who played Rocky's lawyer in "Rocky V" — is against it, too, until Rocky convinces him otherwise.

But fight Rocky must, and he gets into the ring with Dixon. Stallone and Tarver shot their ring scenes last month in front of a full house at Las Vegas' Mandalay Bay Resort & Casino. "Those were real blows," Stallone said balefully.

If Stallone owes the city a lot, he's paying it back with this film.

Sharon Pinkenson, head of the Greater Philadelphia Film Office, said that the shoot — with a local and Hollywood crew of 120 — would put \$20 million into the local economy. She and civic boosters are cheered by recent shot-in-the-region film projects including "In Her Shoes," "Annapolis" and "National Treasure."

Work on "Rocky Balboa" started here in October, when location scouts set out to find the haunts used in 1975. "It was kind of fun," said Patricia Taggart, who has scouted for the former CBS series "Hack" and the Oprah Winfrey film "Beloved." People had a good idea, but "no one knew where they all were." Some spots had been torn down.

This was a good thing, Stallone said. He wanted to show change.

Taggart, California-based location director Paul Schreiber and production designer Franco Carboni toured familiar places and found a few new ones — 21

in all.

Stallone has said he was down to his last hundred bucks in 1975 when he wrote "Rocky." The film had a minuscule \$1.1 million budget when shooting started that December. Cast and crew traveled from California by train to save a few bucks, recalled Frank Stallone, his brother the musician. The company rented a van to work out of and drove it to pizzerias to pick up food.

The film won three Academy Awards, including best picture. The first five "Rockys" grossed nearly \$500 million, combined.

"Rocky Balboa's" budget is a reported \$24 million — still low by Hollywood standards — but the production has 120 crew members and trailers galore. Stallone flew in by private jet and is staying at one of the fanciest hotels in town.

Even some actors were cast on the fly. Stallone, looking for a hard-edged girl in a bar scene, said he tested dozens of trained actresses. "As fate would have it, I ran into her," he said, pointing toward Angela Boyd, 20, a skinny kid with blond hair.

After shooting her scenes, Stallone hired her as a production assistant.

People will be speculating for the next year about how it all ends, Stallone hopes.

He said he's shooting three endings: over Adrian's grave, in the boxing ring, and on the Art Museum steps. Dismissing chatter on the Internet, he insisted that Rocky would live.

But Rocky will not live for a seventh movie. Asked whether the series would continue, Stallone waved his gnarled hand briskly and, with a grin, said: "No, no. I doubt it. This (movie) really puts a cap on the situation."

Word is, Stallone is itching to do the fourth "Rambo" film, anyway.

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Lathan is into 'something' good

Like many who grow up in show-biz families, actress Sanaa Lathan says some of her earliest memories are of the world of performers. The daughter of director-producer Stan Lathan, who got his start directing the PBS series "Say Brother," and dancer Eleanor McCoy, who appeared in the original Broadway production of "The Wiz," the star of "Something New" wasn't exactly rocked to sleep as a baby in a dressing-room steamer trunk, but she came pretty darn close.

"My mother was teaching dance classes when she was eight months pregnant," says Lathan, whose birth didn't put her mother out of commission for long. "She would put a blanket on the floor under the piano and have me there in her rehearsals and dance classes." Needless to say, as a child she was all too familiar with the notion of Take Our Daughters to Work Day.

"I danced through my whole childhood," remembers Lathan, 34. "I actually wanted to be a dancer, probably up 'til junior high, and then that kind of got shifted." Realizing how hard the life of a hooper can be and that "many people don't respect people in the entertainment industry all that much," the self-described "brainy kid" and "tomboy" started thinking about other career paths. "I said, 'You know, I don't want to go into the arts. I want to be a lawyer or a doctor. I wanted to have a respectable job.'"

That all changed, however, when a recruiter from Yale Drama School showed up at the University of California at Berkeley and convinced the English major, who at that point had begun working with a group called the Black The-

atre Workshop, that R-E-S-P-E-C-T could be spelled with an MFA instead of a JD.

"I think me getting in (to Yale) in a weird way validated me in terms of wanting to be an actress. I had a real strong desire to be respected." Plus, when it all came down to it, Lathan says, "I wasn't really all that interested in law. So I'm happy I got in, because, once I was there, I realized that this is what I'm supposed to do."

Though she has had an enviable Hollywood career so far, life for this up-and-coming star hasn't changed all that much since her breakout performance in 2000's "Love & Basketball." That film, in which she played a promising athlete opposite then-real-life boyfriend Omar Epps, brought her national attention, but as far as the actress was concerned, it could just as easily have been her last job in the business. "Every movie that I do," she says, "I have yet to know what I'm doing next before the movie's over."

"It can be pretty scary. There's a lot of faith involved," Lathan says, explaining her "strong intention to not take jobs for money."

Er, can we bring up 2004's "Alien vs. Predator," in which Lathan did battle against two sci-fi beasts in subterranean Antarctica?

"Listen," says Lathan, without missing a beat. "I don't know what you thought about it, but I thought that this was really special, in that this is a fierce-ass woman who is very" — and here she pauses, but only for a second, as if she's wondering whether she's about to go too far in her own defense — "mythical and heroic, if you want to just get deep with it. I mean, it's entertainment, but it's a first, in that this

is two major franchises coming together, and it's a black woman who is the sole survivor. I, just on that level, wanted to do it."

True to her latest project's name, Lathan believes her work on "Something New" is another first. There have been interracial love stories in film before, she explains, but few involving a black woman with a white man. "That really is something new," she insists, but not just for that reason alone. "Usually those films are the couple against the world, but this is about her dealing with her internal struggle about being with a white man — which is real."

It's a struggle she knows all too well. "I've even dealt with it in terms of dating interracially, where there's a certain guilt that happens, because of our history," she says. "Our history is so loaded, we're so intertwined, yet there's so much unconscious stuff that happens. Like you could be in a happy, wonderful dating situation with a white man, and then be terrified to go to a black event. I've literally talked girlfriends through this, like 'You have to go, girl' — you

know? — 'Don't worry about what they're thinking.' And one of the things that is so ironic is that the pressure that you get is from your own people. You're 'abandoning' your own."

Although she's quick to note that "Something New" is not a message movie, she believes that it does touch on some still-volatile issues of identity.

"What I find is that, because we do live in a white world, you become — it's weird — black people become more conscious of themselves being black than a white person is of being white." That's be-

cause, for white people, she says, "there's like an ownership. 'This is my world. I see myself. From the time I'm little, I see myself reflected.' " If there is a moral to the movie, Lathan says, it's that we need to step outside of these little cages of our own making.

"It's almost as if you become your own prisoner," Lathan says. "Do you know what I mean? You start to see yourself — and I don't think this is a good thing — as 'I am a Black Woman.' " Buy into that too deeply, she says, and you may end up looking at the world through a very narrow window indeed.

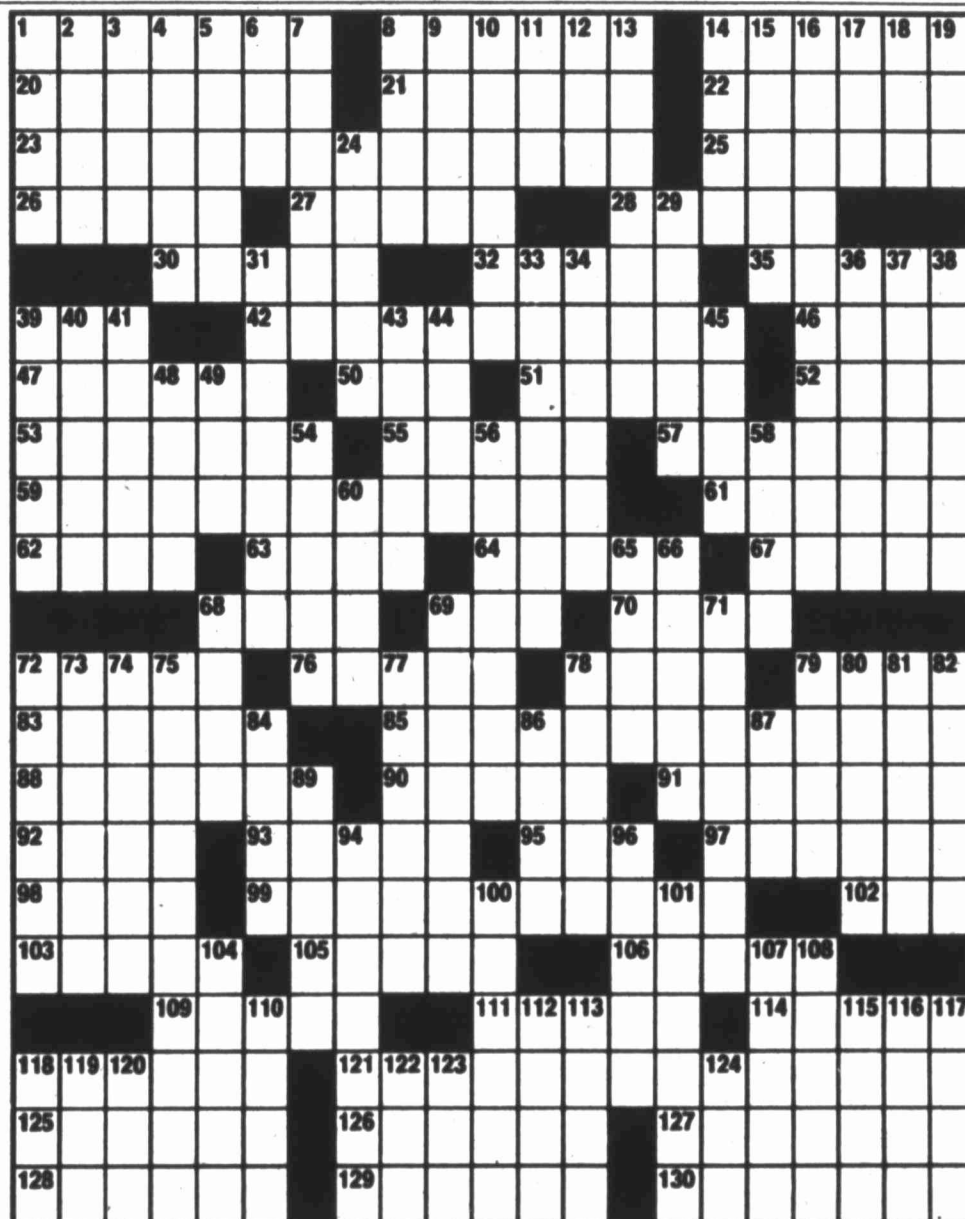

Anyone who knows me will tell you I'm a "new music" junky from the word go.

Classic rock, though nostalgic, tends to make my skin crawl. Of course, living in Big Spring for so long with nothing else to listen to on the radio except country and Tejano, you don't have to go far to uncover the root of my musical psychosis.

If it's new, I'll listen to it — at least once.

This philosophy was born out of the same type of musical tastes I see many of the people my age following. You'll find them at Wal-Mart, gathered around the discount-bargain bin, searching through copies of Motley Crue, Bon Jovi and still one of my favorites, Twisted Sister.

What can I say? Dee Snider would kick Howard Stern's... well, you get the picture.

And while I constantly search the musical world over for new tunes, some really great stuff has snuck in the back door under the guise of some old bands I had lost interest in. Bands like Megadeth, the focus of this week's column, have been putting out new and surprisingly good albums, quietly biding their time until people like me go back to see what they have missed.

Man, I've missed a lot.

First off, let's start with a little about the band that once had parents, churches and Maranatha up in arms, drawing accusations concerning explicit lyrics and subliminal messages — My "Peace Sells... But Who's Buying" album told me to burn my grilled cheese, true story — not to mention whispers of devil worship.

Luckily, all of that bologna was made up by some record executive somewhere who realized you could sell more records to your target audience — the kids — if the parents had a burning, if not misdirected, hatred for the band.

Dave Mustaine, the creator and driving force behind Megadeth, began his trek with 'Deth after being ejected from Metallica in 1983. A note to all of you rising musicians out there: If you drive your band's tour bus off into a ditch because you're drunk, it's not likely you'll be around much longer.

With a bad taste in his mouth — probably from the booze — Mustaine set out with one goal:

To create a band more successful than Metallica. And, depending on whose opinion you ask for, that's exactly what he did.

With more than a dozen albums and imports to his credit, Mustaine has become one of the most recognized and revered guitarists to ever play a heavy metal concert. The list of lead guitarists Mustaine has employed reads like a list of who's-

who in the metal guitarist world, second only to Ozzy Osbourne. It's also widely rumored that Mustaine had even planned to bring Darrell "Dimebag" Abbott into the group, but plans were spoiled when Abbott refused to join without his brother, Vinnie Paul.

Megadeth has also featured the talents of guitarist Kerry King (Slayer), Marty Friedman (Cacophony) and Al Pitrelli (Savatage).

Then, as it happens so often in this industry, tragedy struck.

In January 2002, Mustaine suffered a compressed radial nerve in his left hand and arm, making it impossible for him to play guitar. In April of that year, Megadeth was disbanded. Mustaine went through physical therapy for his injury, and began to explore other areas of the music industry, including production. However, he fully recovered from his arm injury following successful therapy.

During this time also, Dave Mustaine became a born-again Christian and has settled his demons to embrace what he deems "a more fulfilling family life." His political views still hold strong to justice rather than blind obedience to a new order. Mustaine clearly has a problem with politicians, which is evident by the caricatured political powers that adorn the cover of Megadeth's 2004 comeback release, "The System Has Failed."

Featuring a number of politically driven songs, "The System Has Failed" reached deep into current events, touching on the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and theories of corruption leading all the way to the president of the United States.

With lyrics like "Justice means nothing today, now that the courts are for sale. Pick a crime from the menu, pick a sentence and defend you and pick up the down payment called bail. The system's for sale," Mustaine once again touts his "justice versus politics" ideology on the album's track "Kick the Chair."

The album is by far a success, managing to capture the energy Megadeth had when the band was hungry and trying to make a name for itself, but it also has the sharp-edged visions of albums like "Youthanasia" and "Countdown to Extinction."

That album saw only moderate success in 2004, selling 150,000 copies, and was quickly followed up in 2005 with "Greatest Hits: Back to the Start," which represents a full-circle for the band.

Like most greatest hits albums, "Back to the Start" spans the entire Megadeth discography, featuring many of the tunes that helped Megadeth climb out of its pigeon-hole genre and move more into mainstream, such as "Holy Wars... The Punishment Due" and "Symphony of Destruction."

The album also goes back to the band's darker days, pulling "Peace Sells, But Who's Buying?" and "In My Darkest Hour" into the mix.

Overall, both albums should definitely be on the wish list of any metalhead that still has a place in their heart for Megadeth and that particular musical scene. I guess it's a good thing they didn't sell out like Metallica. I have a really hard time trying to imagine Mustaine doing a country-inspired tune or a rendition of "Whiskey in the Jar." What can I say except... Yuck!
