



Former teacher indicted for sexual assault of child

27 people indicted
Friday by Howard
County grand jury

A former Big Spring Junior High School teacher was one of 27 individuals indicted by the Howard County grand jury Friday, officials said.

Brian Douglas Morris, 24, was

indicted for sexual assault of a child in connection with an alleged incident with a BSISD student in March 2005.

Morris coached and taught social studies at the junior high school for a year before submitting his resignation in August. Later that month, he was arrested on the sexual assault charges.

Sexual assault of a child is a

second-degree felony, punishable by a term in prison of between two and 20 years, and a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

Also indicted Friday were three Howard County residents accused of burglarizing three homes in late November and early December.

Howard County District Attorney Hardy Wilkerson said Eugenio Martinez Arellano, 42, Jessie Lopez, 42, and Marie Pacheco, 44, were each indicted on three counts of burglary of a

habitation.

The indictments stem from a series of burglaries that allegedly occurred in Sand Springs between November 28 and Dec. 5, 2005, Wilkerson said.

Ultimately, Mr. Arellano was caught with the proceeds of one of their robberies on Dec. 5," Wilkerson said. "Based on a subsequent investigation, Mr. Lopez and Ms. Pacheco were also implicated."

Burglary of a habitation is a second-degree felony.

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Lockup logjam

Commissioners to hear
presentation on building
jail in downtown Big Spring

Howard County commissioners are expected to meet in a special session Monday morning to consider a presentation by Houston-based general contract company Tribble & Stephens concerning the design and construction of a new jail facility.

During the last meeting of the commissioner's court, 118th District Court Judge Robert H. Moore told commissioners he had been in contact with the company regarding the feasibility of locating a new county jail facility next to the district courthouse.

Moore said the company informed him it was possible, and is currently working on a design to present during Monday's meeting.

"We talked with Tribble & Stephens out of Houston," said Moore. "Mr. Stephens is a local boy and grew up here, and they have a big engineering firm. They have built jails. The county conferred with them the last time, and they've built four jails in the state of Texas. They know all the people at the jail commission."

"I've asked them whether or not they could build a jail over there. I told them to come up as close as they could to the

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Early voting goes well

2,089 make use of pre-election balloting period

Voters in Howard County finished early voting in the political party primaries strong Friday afternoon, posting more than 350 ballots and surpassing totals reached over the last several years.

According to Sandra Bloom, election administrator for the county, 388 early ballots were cast Friday, bringing the overall total for both the Republican and Democratic parties to 2,089.

"We're very pleased with the voter turnout," said Bloom. "We've actually exceeded the totals posted during early voting in the last presidential election. Friday's total is also 467 more than early voting in the 2004 primaries, and 962 — more than double — over totals in the 2002 primaries."

The Republican ballot finished early voting with 1,476 ballots, while the Democratic primary drew 542 ballots.

This year's primaries — election day is Tuesday — feature a number of contested local races.

Walter Brumley Jr. filed his candidacy to run on the Republican ticket for the Precinct 4 seat on the Howard County Commissioners Court in March, putting himself head-to-head with fellow

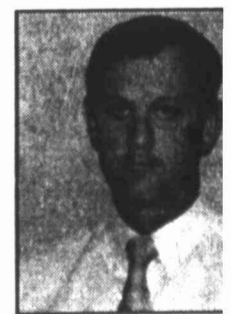

CLEVELAND (AP) — Eighty-one-year-old Myron Manders wants the Social Security Administration to know that he still is alive. The problem is, it doesn't seem to be listening.

Last November, Manders was preparing to leave a hospital where he was treated for pneumonia when a social worker said his insurance company would not pay the bill because it believed Manders died Sept. 1.

William Jarrett, a Social Security spokesman in Cleveland, said Friday the mistake was due to an erroneous document. He could not disclose the error's source.

"It was a mistake on our part and we are apologetic," he said. Manders' wife, Eunice, remem-

bered that she first reacted to the news of her husband's alleged demise with anger and laughter.

"I never laughed about it," Myron Manders said.

Jarrett said Eunice Manders has been paid a survivor's benefit, which he said is now considered an overpayment she will be responsible for paying back, although she will have a right to appeal.

Manders, who describes himself as an almost-retired architect, sought to clear up the problem by showing up at a Social Security office. The in-person appearance did not help.

The Department of Veterans Affairs, recognizing that Manders served in the Army during World War II, notified Eunice that she is a beneficiary on his Veterans Affairs life insurance policy and that Social Security had notified the VA of Myron's death.

The latest correspondence from Social Security came Monday

addressed to Eunice, advising she is entitled to monthly widow's benefits. Myron Manders would not say exactly what was going through his mind. "Curse words," he hinted.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — Restaurants, gas stations, stores and other businesses in one Connecticut city may soon face another regulation — coat hooks in all public bathrooms.

The gem show, which opened Saturday, runs through Sunday afternoon at the fairbarns.

Aside from exhibitors, the show also features rock polishing and shaping demonstrations, face-painting, concessions and entertainment for children.

The show continues Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. There is no admission fee.

GOP candidate Roy D. Beauchamp. The winner will face off against incumbent Gary Simer in November, who is unopposed on the Democratic ballot.

Simer isn't the only commissioner who is going to the polls in 2006, as the race for County Commissioner Precinct 2 drew two candidates, incumbent Jerry Kilgore and challenger Kathy Lusk, both Republicans.

The race for Howard County Judge has five candidates. Local accountant Mark Morgan is challenging incumbent Ben Lockhart in the Republican primary. On the other side of the ticket, Democratic candidates

Woody Jumper, Ron L. "Smurf" Sawyers and Mark Barr are vying for their party's nod for the November election.

The race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 Place 2, will be decided in November as incumbent Kathryn Wiseman faces off against challengers Laura Jeanne Wilson and Robert G. "Bob" Smith on the Republican ticket. The seat drew a single Democratic candidate, Bobby Roever.

The District 85 seat on the Texas House of Representatives attracted three candidates, including Big Spring businessman and attorney Drew Mouton, who is running on the Republican ticket. Mouton is being challenged by Plainview businessman Jim Landtroc. Joe Hefflin of Crosbyton is unopposed on the

Democratic ticket.

The race for the District 19 seat on the U.S. House of Representatives drew three candidates, none of whom are opposed in the primaries. Incumbent Republican candidate Randy Neugebauer is set to defend his seat in November against the lone Democratic nomination, Robert Ricketts, as well as Libertarian candidate Fred Jones.

Lockhart. "I think that would be a great idea, Bob (Moore). We can get them up here and get Phil a phone number for them so he can talk to them before they come up."

Consideration of a new jail facility began more than a year ago when Howard County commissioners identified jail overcrowding and non-compliance with state jail laws as an ongoing and long-term problem.

In a facility needs analysis from TCJS, the state agency projects an approximate increase in population of 3,000 resi-

dents by the year 2020, with only a .03 percent increase in the rate of incarceration. In that time, the jail population is expected to grow from 92 inmates to 102 inmates.

The study recommended a 144-bed facility based on current conditions, as well as those projected 15 years from now.

Cost and location has been the major points of division for the commissioners, with costs projected at approximately \$12 million to construct a joint law enforcement center.

There has been no firm estimate on how much a 96-bed jail-only facility will cost, but supporters have said it could be con-

structed for as little as \$7 million.

Commissioners tabled the jail issue in July 2005 — following several meetings with Furqueron and Project consultant Edward Spooner, justice director for the HOK Group — to concentrate on the county's budget and tax rate.

Discussions remained closed for several months, having reopened following a recent meeting between commissioners and TCJS officials that left the county with 90 days to present the commission with a detailed plan for correcting the items currently out of compliance.

Health plan merits support from Congress

President Bush used part of his State of the Union address to launch his consumer-driven health care reform. The idea is that patients can better scream about expenses once they more fully understand how much a trip to the doctor or a procedure at the hospital actually costs.

The revolution is also built around exercise, diet and other smart-living measures, which companies and insurers should encourage with incentives.

Since his address, the president has been campaigning for his plan, and recent events are helping his cause:

The American Medical Association announced last week that it will create ways for patients to judge the quality of their medical care. Yeah, you read that right. The AMA, the stodgy granddaddy of all health organizations, will produce 100 or so measures of medical work. Patients and insurers then can become better shoppers for health care.

The National Governors Association held healthy living seminars this weekend at its annual Washington meeting. The sessions featured chefs and fitness experts, including Dallas' Dr. Kenneth Cooper.

It may sound loony that governors discussed food, but several years ago, another group of them began an important movement to help parents, legislators and doctors understand how the brain develops before age 3. We hope the food-athon, which Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee assembled, will spur an equal wave in preventive care.

It's now time for Congress to join the revolution. Specifically, the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee should have hearings on the president's request for expanded use of health savings accounts. There was chatter about these accounts when administration officials came before the committees to talk about next year's budget. But no hearings are scheduled.

Health savings accounts are a key tool in this revolution. The sooner Washington can expand their use, by allowing employees to take their accounts with them from job to job, for example, the sooner the revolution revs up. Given double-digit increases in health premiums, it makes little sense for legislators to wait.

You won't be anywhere soon — ever.

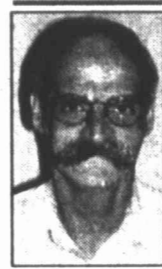
• State argument — "The Cowboys stink!" "No, they don't!" "Yeah, they do!" "Do not!" "Do too!"

Where's the logic?

TO THE EDITOR,
I am very disturbed over what I see taking place on the jail issue.

It is the sole responsibility of the Howard County Commissioners Court to gather information, analyze, and make a decision, based on the facts, on all county business. We need the input of information from Big Spring citizens and interested parties — but not to the extent demonstrated by our District Judge, Robert Moore. He and his cohort, Frank Parker, have had the front row seats at our last two Commissioners Court meetings — constantly rebutting the discussions between the commissioners. The District Judge advocates a 96-bed jail to be as close to the District Court building as possible. There is too much interference and pressure being exerted.

This being an election year for Gary Simer and Ben Lockhart, they will not take the initiative or assume any responsibility in resolving our problem. They are willing to accept the leadership of the District Judge and approve of his plans to build a 96-bed jail near the courthouse.

Commissioner Jerry Kilgore and I advocate joining the City in building a Law Enforcement Center, composed of space for the Sheriff's Department, the jail, and the Big Spring Police Department. Besides improved communication, there are significant savings to be achieved through the sharing of facilities.

The architects have submitted schematic plans for joint City/County Law Enforcement with 144 beds — with a proposed location on FM 700. So District Judge Moore has begun his campaign by exerting pressure on Commissioner Simer and County Judge Lockhart to change the size and location of the jail to downtown. They, along with Commissioner Brown, control the Court's decision. I feel this is grossly unfair to the citizens of our county and in all of my 37 years as a commissioner I have never experienced such a fiasco.

Yesterday, I had a phone call from an interested citizen — one of his questions was, "Where do you go from here?" My answer was simply to ask District Judge Moore — he now runs the Commissioners Court.

Commissioner Simer and Judge Lockhart are running for re-election. They do not want to lose votes over the jail issue — so as a consequence they are going along with the District Judge on his jail proposal.

At our last Commissioners Court meeting — by a three to two vote — the three being Simer, who made the motion, Brown, who seconded and Lockhart — voted for the motion — Kilgore and Crocker voted against — the County Judge was instructed to verify the cost on the old Leonard Pharmacy building and report back to the Court.

Commissioner Simer believes we should purchase the lot and if we don't use it for a jail we could make it a parking lot. My point is — we have not voted as a Commissioners Court on the jail issue but we are pursuing purchasing a lot by the District Court building just because it is up for sale.

I don't understand Commissioner Simer's logic.

What I didn't realize is that my bill for that visit would be \$279 for the hospital and \$179 for the doctor. If I could have seen a doctor in his office I would have only been out a \$20 copay. Since it was the ER, I had a deductible of \$500 to meet. This means that I paid the entire amount.

Where did I go wrong? What do the people who live in Big Spring do on Saturday or Sunday if their child is sick?

"One thing which I think can be done and would be positive would be on the financial literacy front. When I was on the school board in New Jersey many years ago, I argued for more economics in the schools. 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Where is Brad Bishop?

30 years later, Md. murder suspect's flight still a puzzle

WASHINGTON
Surely he's dead, right?
A lot of people think so.
All these years after
Brad Bishop, a State
Department Foreign
Service officer, allegedly
bludgeoned his mother,
his wife and his three
young sons in their
Bethesda, Md., home
and set their bodies on
fire — all these years
after a Maryland grand
jury indicted the missing
diplomat on five counts
of murder in one of the
most baffling cases in
the annals of local crime
— he couldn't still be
out there somewhere,
hiding under a phony
name, living quietly on
the lam. ...
Could he?

A lot of people think so.
Who knows, really?
"Until I can prove he's
dead," said Montgomery
County, Md., Sheriff
Raymond M. Kight, "I'm
going to assume he's
alive."

A bright-green arrest
warrant folder bearing
his name — "Bishop,
William Bradford Jr." —
contains the oldest of
nearly 2,000 open cases
(alleged traffic scofflaws,
deadbeat dads, rapists,
drug dealers and killers)
in the files of the sheriff's
office, in Rockville, Md.
Generations of deputies
have been on the lookout
for him since Gerald R.
Ford was in the White
House. Decades have
gone by. And the Bishop
warrant sits on a shelf.

Where did he go?
Why did it happen?
That distant March.
Thirty years ago this
week.

In the modern, digital,
hyper-vigilant world of
surveillance cameras and
watch lists, high-speed
computer networks and
satellite monitoring,
sneaking out of the
country is a lot more
difficult than it used to
be. In 1976, Kight said,
it wouldn't have been
hard at all, if that is what
Bishop did.

"Back in those days," he
said, "people would buy
a plane ticket, then they
couldn't make the flight,
they'd give it to someone
else. And then that person
would fly under the other
person's name."

Kight was a police officer
for five years before
joining the sheriff's office
in 1967 and was a lieutenant
in the fugitive squad
when the Bishop warrant
came in. The mystery of
the vanished diplomat
has weighed on him for
three decades.

Bishop, 39, a Yale
University graduate, a
former Army intelligence
officer and a suave dinner
guest fluent in five
languages, told his secretary
that he wasn't feeling well
March 1 and left work
early. On the drive from
Foggy Bottom to
Bethesda, he stopped at a
Sears and bought a
mallet-like metal hammer
and a gas can, which he
filled at a Texaco.

He used the hammer on
his wife first, police said.
She was 37. His 68-year-
old mother was killed

next, when she came in
from walking the dog.
Then he allegedly bludgeoned
the boys, ages 5 to 14,
as they slept.

He drove 275 miles
overnight in his Chevy
station wagon, police
said, to swampy woods in
Tyrrell County, N.C.,
where he piled the bodies
in a bathtub-size hole,
doused them with gasoline
and set them on fire.
He stopped at a sporting
goods store in Columbia,
N.C., that day, March 2.
And on March 18, his car
was found abandoned at
a campground near the
Tennessee-North Carolina
border, in the Great
Smoky Mountains
National Park.

Did he wander into the
forest, out of his mind,
and die? By accident? By
his own hand?
Then bears and wild
boars devoured his
remains.

That's one theory.
Yet no trace of him
turned up in extensive
searches — no bones, no
scraps of clothing.

So maybe ...
"A new life, a new
name, over in Europe,"
Kight said, sitting in his
office recently. He
shrugged. "I'm not ruling
it out."

With proper planning
and discipline, the sheriff
said, it's possible to
assume a false identity
and hide in plain sight
indefinitely.

It's no secret, Kight
said. "There are plenty of
books out there on how
to do it. Look in the paper
at the obituaries; find
someone near your date
of birth. Go in and get
their birth certificate. Get
their Social Security number."

Since the Sept. 11, 2001,
terrorist attacks, obtaining
false identification has
become more difficult.
Laws and procedures
have been tightened. "But
there are still ways for
someone with a devious
mind to do it," Kight said.
Then it's just a matter of
living quietly under the
radar, avoiding back-
ground checks and con-
tact with police.

Consider John E. List:
His wife, his mother and
his three children were
shot to death in their
New Jersey home in 1971
— and List (like Bishop
five years later) was
nowhere to be found.
With an assumed Social
Security number and a
driver's license in the
name of Robert P. Clark,
List remarried and lived
for nearly two decades in
Colorado and a Richmond
suburb, where he was
working as an accountant
in 1989.

He was arrested that
year, and later sentenced
to life in prison, only after
an acquaintance saw him
profiled on the TV show
"America's Most
Wanted."

And reputed Boston
crime boss James J.
"Whitey" Bulger:
No alleged gangster in
the city was more notori-
ous than Bulger, a house-
hold name in Irish South

Boston, where he reigned
for decades. But in 1995,
after learning he had been
indicted, he managed to
disappear with hardly a
trace because of years of
careful planning, investi-
gators have said. Eleven
years later, he remains in
the wind, a fugitive from
racketeering charges and
18 counts of murder.

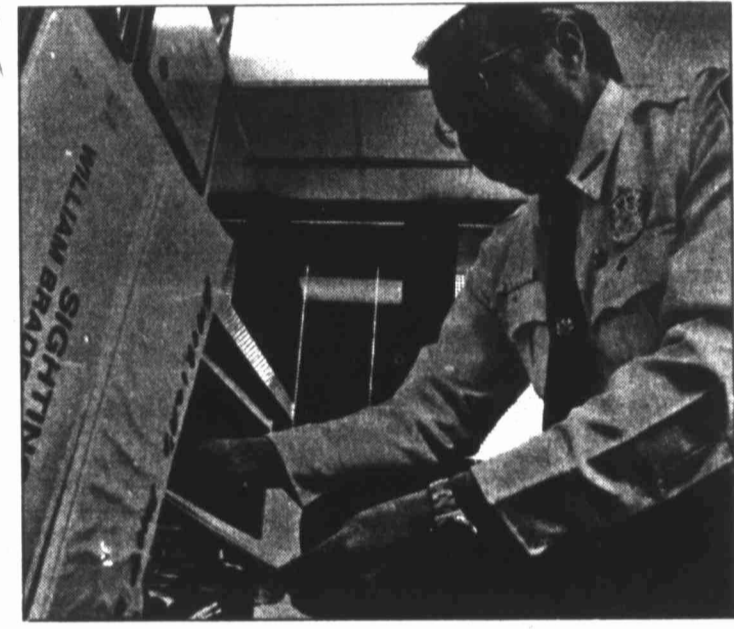
Bishop had the advan-
tage of being an experi-

enced international traveler,
fluent in Italian, Spanish,
French and Croatian. He
had served tours at embassies
in Italy, Ethiopia and
Botswana. He had military
intelligence training.
He understood the arcane
ins and outs of overseas
immigration bureaucracies.
With his know-how,
Kight said, Bishop could
easily have melted into a
foreign society under layers
of false paperwork.

Long before the killings,
for example, "he could
have issued himself
numerous passports in
any number of different
names, and we'd never
know."

Plus, if his plan was to
flee the country, he had
a head start. The burned
bodies weren't identified,
and Bishop wasn't
missed, until a week after
the slayings.

Tapping Into an old niche

LOS ANGELES — James Allan, whose red neon sign announcing his unusual profession beckons from the second-story window of a modest stucco building in Los Angeles' Marina del Rey section, is aware that he is one of the few guys left who actually types for a living.

On an actual typewriter. A 14-year-old Panasonic KX-7000. Not that he doesn't prefer a computer, as he'll be the first to admit.

"The typewriter's a nightmare," he says. "I really hate the thing."

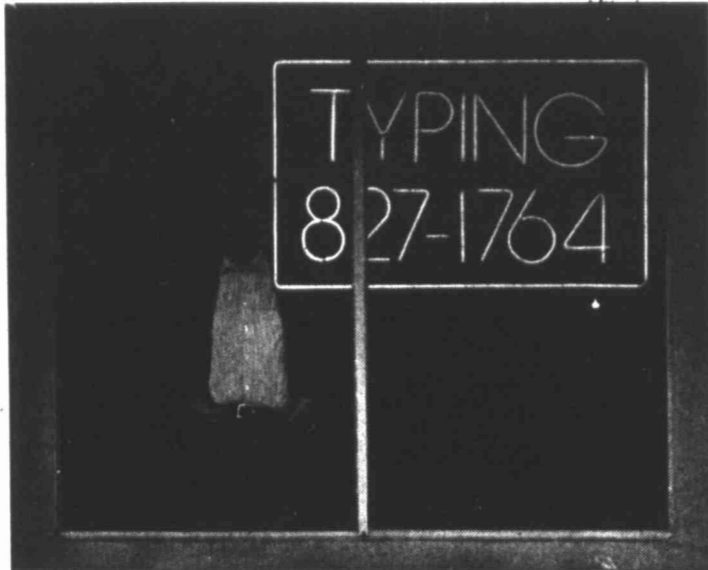
Sometimes, though, even in a day when everyone seems to have a computer, access to the Internet and email, it's nice to know that somewhere out there is a guy who sits at a desk, scrolls a piece of paper into the carriage and gets the type to fit just so.

"People cannot go to their neighbor anymore and say, 'Well, wouldja mind typing this?' Or 'Can I borrow your typewriter?' 'Cause they don't have them," says Allan. All very true, but the world hasn't changed entirely when it comes to certain things — bureaucracies, for instance, will always require paperwork. Bureaucracies that can't or won't figure out how to design computer-friendly forms will still require that they be typed.

"There are all kinds of forms that have to be filled in on the typewriter," says Allan, the wonder in his voice tinged with irritation. "I don't know why, but universities are one of the worst for insisting on forms. There is absolutely no sense to it. They insist on putting all the information into a little box."

Operating a stone's throw from the Venice Pier and the high-rise apartments of the marina, Allan saves the day for students applying for graduate school, police and fire department candidates, people filing small claims cases and assorted others who have a form to fill out and a need for neatness.

"There's a story every day in this place," says

Allan. "Some of them are comical and some of them are tragic. I've had producers tell me they could do a sitcom about what goes on in this office." He's typed up psychiatric reports for schizophrenic clients, paperwork for divorces, the life story of a closeted gay man who wanted his children to know, finally, what his life had been like.

A few of his clients are very famous, says Allan, but he takes his motto seriously ("Accuracy. Confidentiality. Personal Attention. Reliability.") and won't disclose names.

Nor will Allan, nattily clad in a dress shirt, navy sports coat and gray slacks, disclose his age. He looks pretty good considering he's a dying breed.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 1996 there were approximately 1.1 million jobs that were classified as "typist" and "word processor." By 2004, that number had dwindled to 525,000. And

it's only going to get worse: "Employment of word processors and typists is expected to decline because of the proliferation of personal computers," says the bureau's Occupational Outlook Handbook.

When he first opened his doors 18 years ago, there were at least three other professional typists in the immediate area, people to whom he would refer work he didn't have time for. They are all gone now.

Allan started out as an attorney in Mississauga, Canada, a town outside Toronto. He moved to Southern California to work as a franchising company executive.

He opened his business, Allan's Secretarial Centers Inc., with the idea of franchising it. But it soon became clear, as Allan puts it, that "it was my own skills that were making it work, not something you can franchise." Those skills involve much more than typing. Allan also functions as a

kind of home office for business professionals who travel and still want a permanent Los Angeles business address for their correspondence, phone calls, receipts and expenses.

While straight typing brings in only \$40 an hour, for these services, Allan charges up to \$150 an hour. "You can't make money at typing," he says.

Besides the typewriter, there are a couple of things Allan hates about his business: people who condescend to him because he types for a living, and people who won't allow him to correct their appalling grammar.

Of the first sort, he says, "When they come in, they talk down to me. They don't understand the type of business that's going on here. It's, 'Here, boy.

Type this. I'll be back tomorrow to pick it up.'"

Here's another story. It involves a man whose business proposal he'd typed up: "He said to me, 'Don't put it in real good English, because that's not me.' So I wrote the whole thing in this convoluted English, like, 'Why you no like me?' And he came in and he read it and he sat here and cried. He said, 'That is so perfect. That is so beautiful.'"

Although Allan is listed in the phone book under "secretarial services," very often it is the simple neon sign that draws people in. Typing. It's actually a word for which people have nostalgia. "I could have put 'word processing' in the window," he says, "but 'typing' is one word that everybody understands."

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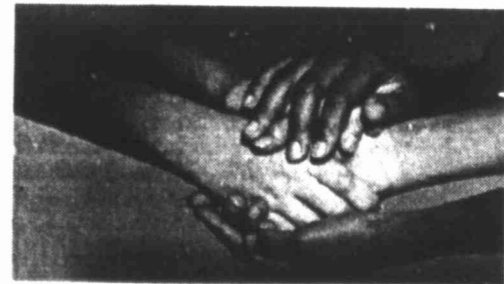
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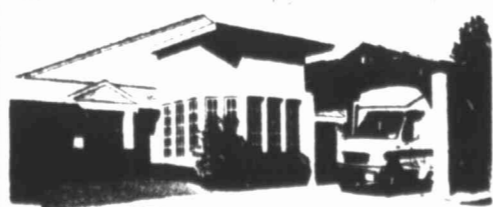

Yep, just give me a basic cup of joe at a reasonable price and I'm a happy guy.

Give me your Nescafe and Taster's Choice and all the other tasty, unpretentious brands millions of Americans have enjoyed for years.

If there's an emblem on my Styrofoam cup, let it be of Juan Valdez and his mule — assuming the longtime symbol of 100 percent Colombian joe hasn't ditched coffee-farming in favor of coca-growing and narco-trafficking.

But the problem is: it's getting harder and harder to find a basic cup of coffee at a decent price — especially on the road.

Now, God help us, even McDonald's is getting into the act.

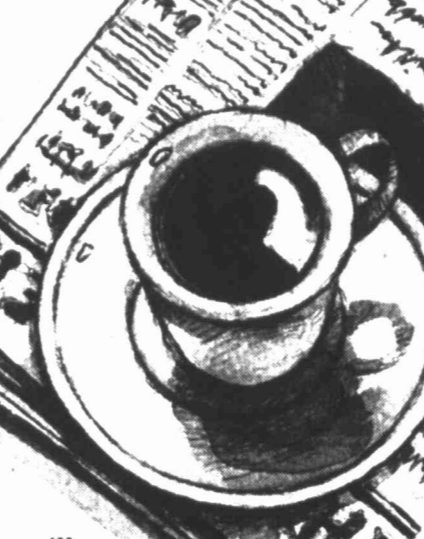

mixed-up world, where even what kind of coffee you drink becomes this politicized statement of . . . OK, forget all that for a moment.

Look, I've got to get something off my chest here.

You know what ticks me off

most about Starbucks? It's not the whole We-Know-Coffee-Like-No-One-Else-mentality it cultivates so aggressively.

It's not the supercilious attitude of some of the employees, who act like they've been sent down from Great Coffee Heaven to educate the heathens.

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Do you know your rights?

If life were a university, Americans would do better majoring in popular culture than in history, a survey released this week shows.

The McCormick Tribune Freedom Museum poll found that Americans' knowledge of television shows such as "The Simpsons" and "American Idol" far surpasses their familiarity with the First Amendment.

Only one of the 1,000 adults polled in the telephone survey could name all five freedoms guaranteed under the First Amendment. Yet more than one in five (22 percent) could identify all five major characters in Matt Groening's cartoon family.

Similarly, only 8 people

in 100 could name at least three First Amendment freedoms. Four in 10 surveyed (40 percent) could name two of the three judges on the star-making show "American Idol," and one in four (25 percent) could name all three.

"These survey results clearly demonstrate that many Americans don't have an understanding of the freedoms they regularly enjoy," Dave Anderson, the Chicago museum's executive director, said in a written statement.

The new museum, which will open its doors in April, wants to help people understand their constitutional freedoms, especially those protected by the First Amendment.

There is a lot of work to do.

Survey respondents wrongly said that the First Amendment guarantees rights to own and raise pets (21 percent), to drive (20 percent) and of women to vote (36 percent). The first two are not rights at all, and women's suffrage was not enshrined in the Constitution until ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1920.

Grab your pen. The First Amendment guarantees freedom of speech, the press, and religion, as well as the rights to peacefully assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

The survey was conducted Jan. 20-22 by Synovate, a research firm, and had a margin of error of plus or minus three percentage points.

Appellate court orders new trial of death row inmate

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal appeals court has ordered a new trial for a death row inmate convicted in the slayings of a woman, her daughter and four grandchildren.

A three-judge panel from the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals found prosecutors withheld two statements that could have swayed jurors during the trial of Anthony Graves.

"If the two statements had been revealed, the defense's approach could have been much different and probably highly effective," Circuit Judge W. Eugene Davis wrote in the unanimous opinion released Friday.

Graves, 40, was convicted in 1994 for the deaths of Bobbie Joyce Davis, 45; her 16-year-old daughter, Nicole; and four grandchildren between ages 4 and 9. The victims were shot, stabbed and beaten on Aug. 18, 1992 and their home was set on fire to conceal the crime.

The only evidence linking Graves to the crime was the testimony of co-defendant Robert Earl Carter.

On the night before the trial, Carter told then Burleson County District Attorney Charles Sebesta: "I did it all myself, Mr. Sebesta. I did it all myself." However, Sebesta didn't tell Graves' attorney about the statement.

Carter implicated his wife, Theresa, as an accomplice in the deaths, but Sebesta also failed to disclose that.

Carter also was convicted of the murders and executed in 2000. He proclaimed Graves' innocence before his execution.

The appellate court's decision gives the Texas Attorney General's Office 180 days to appeal or schedule a new trial.

Jury finds man guilty in slaying of parents

FORT WORTH (AP) — A 21-year-old man who prosecutors say conspired with friends to fatally shoot and stab his parents so he could collect on their \$1.65 million estate has been found guilty of capital murder.

A jury found Andrew Wamsley guilty Friday in the December 2003 deaths of his parents, Rick and Suzanna Wamsley, at their Mansfield home.

The sentencing phase is set for Monday. Wamsley faces life in prison or the death penalty.

In closing arguments Friday, prosecutors said Wamsley had his parents killed and might have gotten away with it had it not been for an accomplice who became a witness.

Wamsley's friend Susana Toledano, 21, admitted shooting and stabbing Wamsley's parents. Toledano has testified that Andrew Wamsley and his girlfriend, Chelsea Lea Richardson, 21, pressured her into shooting and stabbing the Wamsleys.

Last year, Richardson was sentenced to death for her role in the killings.

Toledano, who has pleaded guilty to murder in the deaths, she testified this week that she expects to receive a 30-year sentence in exchange for her testimony.

Chertoff, Mexican officials pledge to battle border violence

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — Department of Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff and two top Mexican security officials announced an agreement Friday to work together to stop increasingly violent border smuggling operations.

Chertoff, Mexican Secretary of Governance Carlos Abascal and Mexican Secretary of Public Safety Eduardo Medina-Mora said the agreement formalizes existing cooperative efforts that have resulted in arrests and reduced crime in "our joint neighborhood."

"We have found that when we work together we can accomplish great things," Chertoff said. "We have today signed a memorandum of understanding, an action plan, which will quite specifically give us the means to go forward and combat violence on both sides of the border."

He said the plan commits both nations to "high-level and operational" exchanges of information, points of contact, and training so that criminal gangs can be attacked on both sides of the border.

Abascal said the cooperation would help both nations fight violence plaguing residents of border communities and allow the region to prosper.

Texas, four other states sue government over Medicare

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas and four other states sued the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services on Friday, alleging they are being forced to help fund the new Medicare prescription drug program in violation of the Constitution.

In the lawsuit filed in the U.S. Supreme Court, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott argues states shouldn't have to relinquish control over how they budget taxpayer dollars to pay for an entirely federal program.

"The federal government has placed what amounts to a direct tax upon Texas and other states in violation of the U.S. Constitution," Abbott said in a statement.

Gary Karr, a spokesman for the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, an arm of the Department of Health and Human Services, said states are going to save billions of dollars under the new program.

"That's why very few states decided to join this lawsuit despite requests for them to do so," Karr said.

The attorneys general of Kentucky, Maine, Missouri and New Jersey joined Abbott in the lawsuit, while 10 other states filed a friend-of-the-court brief supporting their argument.

Since Jan. 1, states have

been required to send the federal government monthly payments to help cover the cost of the Medicare Part D program, which is designed to provide more seniors with affordable prescription drugs.

Medicare, the federal health insurance program for the elderly and disabled, traditionally did not pay for beneficiaries' prescription drugs. A 2003 law added a prescription benefit to be operated by companies with Medicare contracts.

The program went into effect Jan. 1 for those who signed up early and for millions who previously were covered by state Medicaid programs.

Under the so-called "clawback provision," states are required to pay the federal government a portion of the money they are expected to save because they no longer will have to pay for prescription drugs for people enrolled in both Medicare and Medicaid.

States also will save money because the program is slowing the growth of prescription drug costs, Karr said.

But New Jersey Attorney General Zulima V. Farber said the provision undermines her state's ability to control its own destiny. She said she can think of no other federal law requiring states to help fund a federal program.

"We believe, constitutionally speaking, the

clawback provision takes us into uncharted waters as a nation," she said.

The provision could cost Texas \$100 million by 2009 and leave it and other states "wallowing in red ink for several years," Abbott said.

The startup of Medicare Part D has not gone smoothly. Pharmacies and patients have complained about jammed phone lines, inaccurate computer lists of who was eligible for the program, and patients being charged hundreds of dollars for prescriptions instead of the set co-payments of \$1 to \$5.

Texas is among about two dozen states that have agreed to temporarily pick up the cost of prescription drugs for low-income seniors and others turned away at pharmacies because of problems with the system.

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Texas seeking federal help for hurricane recovery

WASHINGTON — Texas officials are putting a full-court press on Congress to try to win \$2.02 billion in hurricane recovery money for the state, including sending Gov. Rick Perry to testify before a Senate committee on the state's primary election day.

The state still has more than 100,000 students in its K-12 public school system and thousands of relocated families in need of worker training, housing, medical care and other assistance as a result of Hurricane Katrina, which hit the Gulf Coast Aug. 29.

Many Texas families are living in government trailers, have homes without roofs or their towns remain littered with debris because of Hurricane Rita, which swept into Sabine Pass on Sept. 24.

"We have to continue to remind people we got hit by a hurricane too," said Railroad Commissioner Michael Williams. Williams was in Washington several days this week to lobby federal officials on the state's behalf for the money. He has been designated the state's hurricane recovery czar by Perry.

He said Perry would testify Tuesday — the day Texas voters go to the polls to vote in party primaries — before the Senate Appropriations Committee. Perry cast his ballot during early voting and faces only minor opposition in the GOP primary.

"The governor thinks it's a very important issue to be in D.C. to testify before the committee on all of the actions Texas took between Hurricane Katrina and Rita and the financial impact those actions had on our state and continue to have on

our state," spokeswoman Kathy Walt said.

The state spelled out its money request in a fresh-off-the-presses, bound report titled "Texas Rebounds." The report's cover is a color satellite photo of Hurricane Rita as it bore down on the Texas coast.

The state is still receiving money from a request made last year for recovery assistance. But Williams said its latest request is what the state calculates it still needs even if it receives all possible assistance from appropriations made last year.

The most important need listed by the state is \$367 million for housing assistance, including \$322 million for housing repairs and reconstruction in areas affected by Hurricane Rita.

That request is followed by one for \$18.7 million for public safety to help

pay for additional law officers and overtime of the increase in new residents in parts of the state, particularly Houston and \$412.6 million for education, including \$338 million for a second year of school for Katrina students.

Williams said the cost per student is about \$6,000, more than originally believed.

President Bush sent a request last month for \$65 billion for operations in Iraq and Afghanistan and at least \$18 billion for Gulf Coast hurricane relief. The request specifically included \$4.2 billion for Louisiana, but did not include a special request for Texas.

Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, said the state's failure to provide a timely itemized list of the state's needs may have hurt the Texas effort to get money set aside in Bush's request.

But Williams said Friday it is unusual for hurricane relief money to be included in such legislation, known as a supplemental appropriations bill.

"There is some concern about providing precedent for what some may consider to be a typical run-of-the-mill garden

variety disaster and not to get in the supplemental business for every hurricane, every wildfire, every mudslide that occurs in the country," Williams said.

"We would argue that what happened to the state is not a garden variety hurricane," he told reporters.

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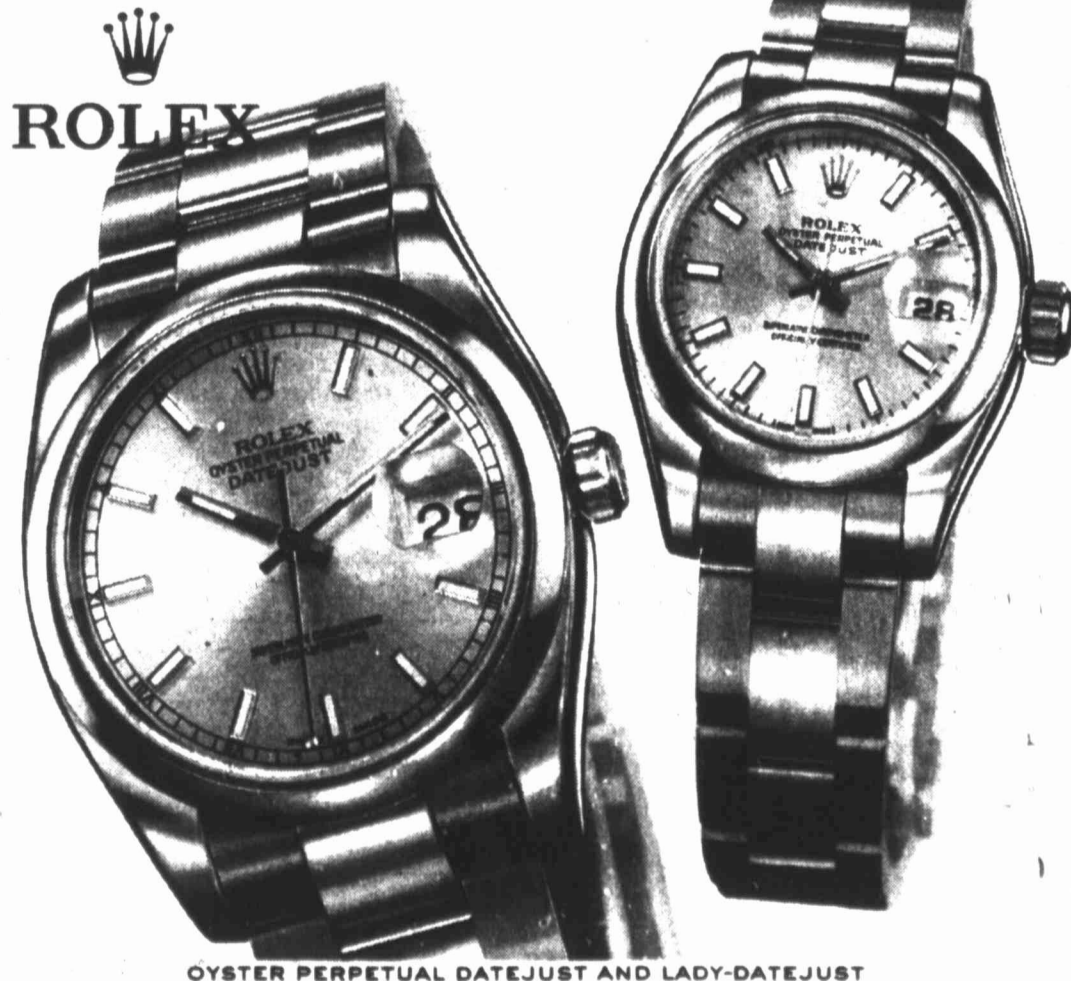
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SUV plows through crowd at UNC

No one killed, driver held for attempted murder

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Authorities planned to charge a former University of North Carolina student with attempted murder after he allegedly drove a sport utility vehicle through a popular gathering spot on campus Friday, clipping and scattering startled bystanders.

No one was seriously hurt.

Mohammed Reza Taheri-azar, 22, who graduated in December after studying psychology and philosophy, was in the custody of campus police. They intended to charge him with attempted murder

and assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, said police Capt. George Hare.

Taheri-azar called police to surrender and then awaited officers on a street two miles from the campus, authorities said.

The FBI joined the case because Taheri-azar, a native of Iran, "allegedly made statements that he acted to avenge the American treatment of Muslims," said agent Richard Kolko, an FBI spokesman in Washington. "The ongoing investigation will work to confirm this."

Local investigators declined to discuss a motive.

The incident happened just before noon near the center of campus in an area known as The Pit, a sunken, brick-paved area

surrounded by two libraries, a dining hall and the student union.

"I see everyone kind of part because there's a car coming through, and the next thing I know, I'm on his windshield," sophomore Jeff Hoffman, his arm in a bandage, told The Daily Tar Heel, the campus newspaper.

The Pit is a center of campus activities, with students perched along walkways and steps. Friday's noontime crowd included candidates for Black Student Movement elections.

"He slowly came in, and I thought he was going to stop or something," sophomore Scott Wilson, a candidate, told the newspaper. "But then he sped right through."

Five students and a visiting scholar were treated

at UNC Hospitals for minor injuries. Five were released, and the sixth person was not expected to be admitted to the hospital, the university said in a statement.

Three other people declined treatment at the scene, police said.

A bomb squad searched Taheri-azar's apartment in nearby Carrboro and declared the building safe. Taheri-azar encouraged authorities to check the apartment after he was arrested.

"He said it almost in a baiting type of way," Carrboro police spokesman Capt. Joel Booker said.

Investigators declined to say what they found in the apartment and continued searching it Friday night for other evidence, Booker said.

Minister officiating same sex marriages found not guilty of misconduct

SANTA ROSA, Calif. — A longtime Presbyterian minister who was the first of her faith to be tried for officiating at the unions of gay couples was acquitted Friday of violating her denomination's position on same-sex marriage.

A regional judicial commission of the Presbyterian Church (USA) ruled 6-1 that the Rev. Jane Spahr of San Rafael acted within her rights as an ordained minister when she married two lesbian couples in 2004 and 2005.

Because the section of the faith's constitution that reserves marriage for a man and a woman "is a definition, not a directive," Spahr was "acting within her right of conscience in performing marriage ceremonies for same-sex couples," the tribunal said in a written ruling.

A tearful Spahr, 63, a longtime activist who could have faced sanctions ranging from a rebuke to removal from the ministry, rejoiced at the verdict. Flanked by her lawyers and the two couples she married, Spahr said she would continue performing same-sex weddings.

"The church said God loved everyone, and for years I believed it," she said. "Today, for just one moment, to hear this is remarkable."

The marriages are not legally recognized.

In its majority opinion, the tribunal of the Presbytery of the Redwoods, which oversees 52 churches from

north of San Francisco to the Oregon border, noted that Spahr's actions were consistent with the "normative standards" of the region.

Sara Taylor, one of Spahr's defense lawyers, said the ruling presumably means that all ordained clergy associated with the presbytery's member churches are free to preside at same-sex weddings if they choose.

Robert Conover, the regional body's stated clerk, said Friday that it was too soon to say whether leaders would appeal the ruling. Many local Presbyterians, conservative and liberal alike, complained about the cost of the trial.

Acting on a complaint brought by a minister from Bellevue, Wash., the presbytery charged Spahr with official misconduct last year for marrying the couples from Rochester, N.Y., and Guerneville, Calif.

The verdict came after six hours of deliberations and a day and a half of proceedings.

The Presbyterian Church is among several Protestant denominations embroiled in debates over what role gays should have in their churches.

Former congressman sentenced to more than eight years in prison for corruption

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Former Rep. Randy "Duke" Cunningham began his first day in prison after being sentenced to eight years and four months for taking \$2.4 million in homes, yachts and other bribes in a corruption scheme unmatched in the annals of Congress.

Cunningham's sentence Friday was described by attorneys for both sides as the longest prison sentence ever given to a member of Congress. U.S. District Judge Larry Burns spared him the 10-year maximum after the defense asked for six years.

"Your honor I have ripped my life to shreds due to my actions, my actions that I did to myself," Cunningham said before the sentence was announced. He also asked to see his 91-year-old mother before going to prison.

Cunningham, 64, who resigned in disgrace late last year, was immediately taken into custody.

He was ordered to pay \$1.8 million in restitution for back taxes.

He also must forfeit an additional \$1.85 million for cash bribes he received, plus the proceeds from the sale of his mansion.

Burns said Cunningham must pay the restitution at a rate of \$1,500 a month while in prison and \$1,000 monthly when he's released.

The judge credited Cunningham for his military service and for standing in front of a courthouse in

November and taking responsibility for his crimes and resigning from Congress.

Looking at Cunningham, the judge told him: "You weren't wet. You weren't cold. You weren't hungry and yet you did these things."

"I think what you've done is you've undermined the opportunity that honest politicians have to do a good job," the judge said. "The amount of money involved emasculates prior bribery crimes."

The judge recommended the sentence be served at a federal prison in Taft, Calif., subject to the approval of the Bureau of Prisons. The judge said Cunningham would be eligible for good behavior reductions of as much as 15 percent of the sentence.

Cunningham was taken to Metropolitan Corrections Center in downtown San Diego and was to undergo a medical exam Wednesday.

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U.S. offers rare glimpse into Guantanamo

GUANTANAMO BAY NAVAL BASE, Cuba (AP)
— Offering a glimpse into the top-secret world of Guantanamo Bay, the Pentagon has released the names and home countries of many detainees who have been held at the isolated military prison for up to four years.

A Freedom of Information Act lawsuit filed by The Associated Press forced the Department of Defense on Friday afternoon to turn over some 5,000 pages of transcripts from closed-door hearings on the detainees, most of whom were accused of having links to the Taliban or al-Qaida.

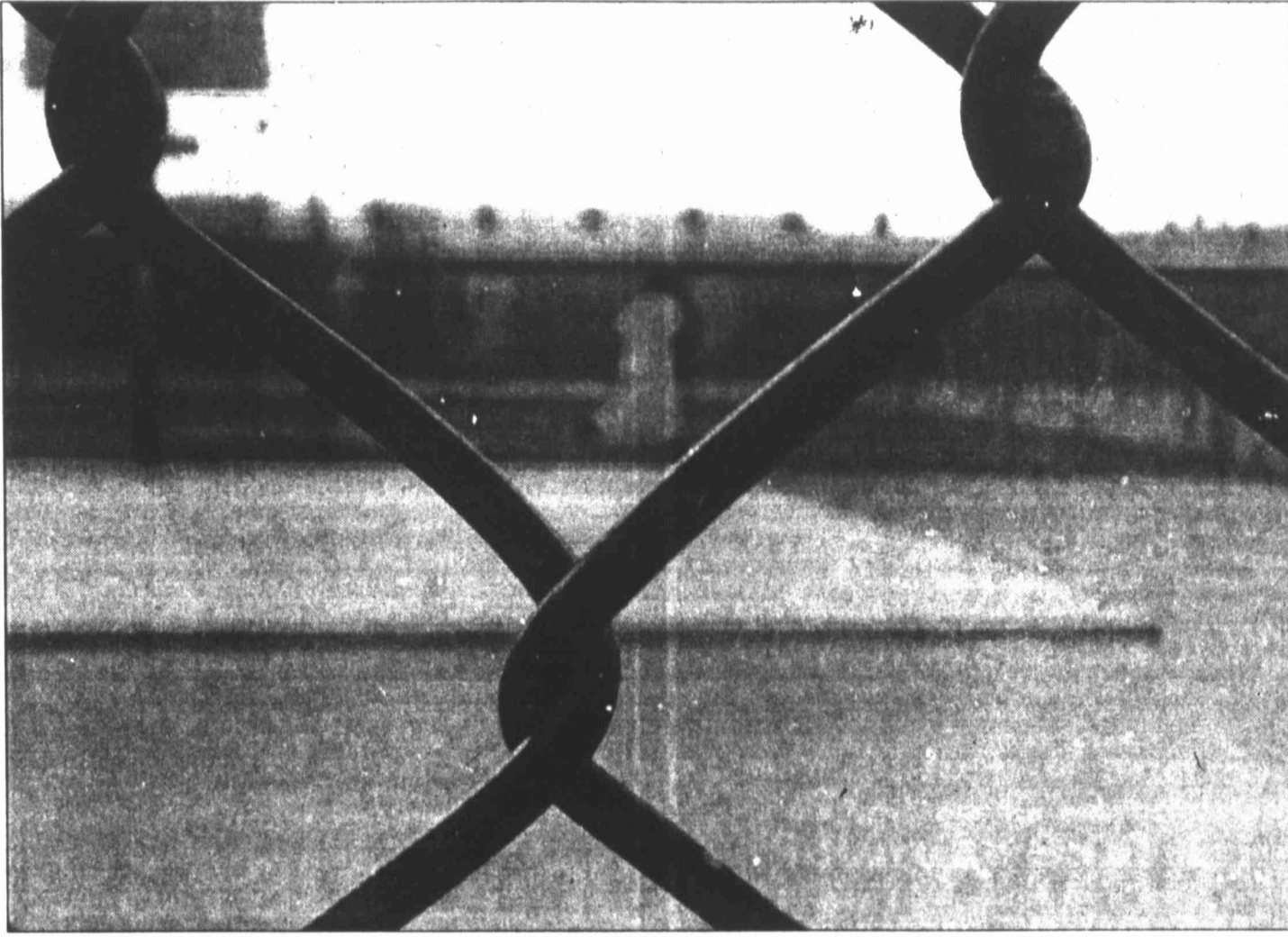
While the Pentagon has not provided the full roster of detainees, the transcripts give the most detailed picture to date of who has been held at the prison on a U.S. base in eastern Cuba, which has become the focus of international criticism in part because of the government's shroud of secrecy.

Jamie Fellner, director of the U.S. program for Human Rights Watch, said the disclosure represents a "major breach" in that secrecy.

"It will add to our understanding of who is there and what are the reasons that the U.S. alleges they are there for," Fellner said.

The Pentagon released the documents after a federal judge rejected arguments by the administration of President Bush that releasing names, home countries and other information would violate the detainees' privacy and could endanger them and their families.

"These detainees, many of them are anxious to have the fact of their confinement at Guantanamo known," said David Tomlin, the AP's assistant general counsel. "So we appreciate that the court sought fit to rule that the government is not a good custodian of the privacy interest of people who don't want secrecy, where they them-

selves are concerned."

The names are scattered throughout the transcripts of hearings, and it was unclear how many names the documents contained. In most of the transcripts, the person speaking is identified only as "detainee." Names appear only when court officials or detainees refer to people by name.

In some cases, even having the name did not clarify the identity. In one document, the tribunal president asks a detainee if his name is Jumma Jan. The detainee responds that no, his name instead is Zain Ul Abedin.

The men were mostly captured during the 2001 U.S.-led war that drove the Taliban from power in Afghanistan and sent Osama bin Laden deeper into hiding, and the newly released documents shed light on some of the detainees' explanations.

In one unedited transcript, Zahir Shah, an Afghan accused of belong-

ing to an Islamic militant group and of having a rocket-propelled grenade launcher and other weapons in his house, admits having rifles. He says they were for protection — he had a running feud with a cousin — and insists he did not fight U.S. troops.

The only time he shot anything, he says, was when he hunted with a BB gun.

"What are we going to do with RPGs?" he asks, adding: "The only thing I did in Afghanistan was farming. ... We grew wheat, corn, vegetables and watermelons."

In another document, a detainee identified as Abdul Hakim Bukhary denies he is a member of al-Qaida but acknowledges he traveled from his native Saudi Arabia to Afghanistan to fight U.S. forces, and says he met Osama bin Laden about 15 years ago while fighting Russian forces in Afghanistan. He praises his captors for running a good prison.

"Prisoners here are in paradise," he says. "American people are very good. Really. They give us three meals. Fruit juice and everything!" Still, he says, he wants to return to his family.

It was not clear whether Shah and Bukhary are still being held. The documents do not name all current and former Guantanamo Bay detainees. And even when detainees are named, the documents do not make clear whether they have since been released.

The documents do contain the names of some known former prisoners, like Moazzam Begg and Feroz Ali Abbasi, both British citizens. A handwritten note shows

Abbasi pleading for prisoner-of-war status.

Most of the Guantanamo Bay hearings were held to determine whether the detainees were "enemy combatants." That classification, Bush administration lawyers say, deprives the detainees of Geneva Convention prisoner-of-war protections and allows them to be held indefinitely without charges.

Documents released last year — also because of a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit by the AP — included transcripts of 317 hearings but had the detainees' names and nationalities blacked out. The current documents are the same ones — this time, uncensored.

A U.S. military spokesman in Guantanamo Bay said the Pentagon was uneasy about handing over the transcripts.

"Personal information on detainees was withheld solely to protect detainee privacy and for their own security," said Lt. Cmdr. Chito Pepler. He said the Defense Department remains concerned that the disclosure "could result in retribution or harm to the detainees or their families."

Buz Eisenberg, a lawyer for a detainee, said he hopes the uncensored documents can help clear his client.

"We have been trying to litigate a case without ever knowing what the allegations were that the government claimed justified his continued detention," Eisenberg said. "Thanks to the AP's successful lawsuit, we're looking forward to receiving that evidence so that we can properly prepare our client's substantive case in court."

Eisenberg did not want to name his client because he had not asked the man for permission.

U.S. District Judge Jed S. Rakoff of New York ruled in favor of the AP last week, a major development in a protracted legal battle. In the ongoing litigation, the AP has also asked the Pentagon to release a complete list of all detainees ever held at the prison on a U.S. Navy base in eastern Cuba.

"This is extremely important information," said Curt Goering, senior deputy executive director of Amnesty International USA. "We've been asking ever since the camp opened for a list of everyone there ..."

Hamas leader sets conditions for dealing with Israel

MOSCOW — The leader of the militant Palestinian group Hamas rejected pressure to soften hostility to Israel Friday, saying the Jewish state must first withdraw from territories occupied in 1967 and allow refugees to return if it wants peace.

Embarking on the group's highest-profile diplomatic mission ever, Hamas political chief Khaled Mashaal said that if Israel took these steps, "our movement will have taken a big step toward peace."

That statement could be significant, because Hamas in the past has called for Israel's elimination altogether.

Mashaal also welcomed the outcome of high-level talks with Russian officials, who had said before the meetings that they would pressure Hamas to recognize Israel and abandon violence.

The talks were "good, constructive and open," Mashaal

said after meeting with Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov and other Russian officials.

Lavrov was quoted as saying that Hamas was ready to honor all the agreements the Palestinian administration had undertaken as part of the Middle East peace process if Israel made steps to meet it halfway.

He said Russia and Hamas had also agreed to pursue contacts, according to the RIA Novosti news agency.

"I won't give overly optimistic forecasts, but this is a step in the right direction," Lavrov was quoted as saying. He cautioned that "there is a long way to go to resume the peace process."

The Russian Foreign Ministry said later Friday that Hamas also promised to maintain a year-old cease-fire if Israel refrains from force.

Mashaal could not be reached immediately for comment.

Hamas has largely stuck to the informal truce, though

other militant groups have carried out attacks against Israel.

Russia's invitation to Hamas, extended by President Vladimir Putin, was the first crack in an international front against the group.

Hamas won a majority of the seats in the Palestinian parliament in January.

The invitation provoked anger in Israel and surprise among the other members of the so-called Quartet of Middle East mediators, the United States, the European Union and the United Nations, which had agreed to withhold international recognition from the radical Islamic movement until it moderated its stance.

Israel's acting Prime Minister Ehud Olmert said Friday that the international community must maintain a united front against Hamas as the militant group prepares to form the next Palestinian Cabinet.

Hamas' election victory prompted threats from the U.S. and the EU to cut off \$1 billion

in aid to the Palestinians unless Hamas recognizes Israel and renounces violence.

Mashaal struck an uncompromising stance.

"If Israel officially announces its readiness to withdraw from all territories occupied in 1967, the return of Palestinian refugees, the closure of settlements, the dismantling of the dividing wall, the release of all prisoners, then our movement will take a big step toward peace," he said. The Israelis have rejected such conditions.

Lavrov said the Hamas leadership had agreed to allow international officials to monitor their budget funding, according to Interfax and RIA-Novosti.

"They are ready to create a mechanism of international oversight," Lavrov was quoted as saying. No further details were provided.

Ahead of the talks with the Hamas delegation Lavrov warned that it must become an essentially political movement

whose militant wing could be subsumed into the recognized Palestinian "security structures."

Lavrov used careful language in his meeting with The Associated Press and several U.S. media outlets.

"I don't think Hamas would have any serious future if Hamas doesn't change," he said.

Lavrov said Russia understood the change would take time, and compared it to the peace process in Northern Ireland, where the Irish Republican Army gradually was compelled to disarm and embrace a political process in which the front stage was occupied by Sinn Fein, its political wing.

Hamas needs "to reassess its new role, for which maybe it wasn't ready when the elections took place," Lavrov said.

"It will be a process, hopefully not as long as the process in Great Britain regarding Northern Ireland," he said.

Official: U.S. forces to stay in Iraq as long as needed

BAGHDAD, Iraq — President Jalal Talabani on Saturday underscored the need for a unity government in Iraq after a spasm of sectarian killing and said he had been assured U.S. forces would remain in the country as long as needed — "no matter what the period."

His comments came after a bomb exploded at a minibus terminal during morning rush hour in a southeastern Baghdad suburb, killing seven people and wounding 25, one of a string of explosions in the capital and elsewhere.

The violence shattered the relative calm brought by Fridays' driving ban in Baghdad and its outskirts, which helped avert major attacks on the day Muslims congregate for

the most important prayer service of the week.

Talabani spoke to reporters after meeting with Gen. John Abizaid, chief of U.S. Central Command.

Abizaid said he was "very, very pleased with the reaction of the Iraqi armed forces" during the crisis unleashed by the Feb. 22 bombing of a sacred Shiite shrine in Samarra and reprisal attacks against Sunni Muslims that pushed Iraq to the brink of civil war.

"We should understand that the terrorists are trying to create problems among the Iraqi people that can lead to difficulties between various groups," he said after a separate meeting with Prime Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari. "We should not fall into their trap. We are

stronger than they are. We will ... prevail."

The surge of attacks, which have killed at least 500 people since last week, has tangled negotiations to form a new government after December parliamentary elections and threatened American hopes of starting a troop pullout this summer.

Talabani said Abizaid assured him that U.S. forces "are ready to stay as long as we ask them, no matter what the period is."

He said the U.S. commander also stressed that "a strong national unity government made up of all blocs in parliament will help in stabilizing Iraq and bringing peace."

However, Talabani said his Kurdish followers and their allies will fight against a second term for al-Jaafari.

Deja Vu: Howard wins two in final at-bat

• Lowenstein, Brown deliver game-winning hits in Hawk victories

Sophomore Darby Brown and freshman Barrett Lowenstein stayed after practice Thursday afternoon for about an hour to work on hitting as both were a bit disappointed in their efforts of late.

Friday against Weatherford, when the Howard offense looked dead in the water, both came through at the plate in different games to lead the team to two much-needed victories.

It was Lowenstein walk-off RBI single in Game 1 which led Howard to a come-from-behind 5-4 win and Brown's bases loaded triple tied the game for Howard in the bottom of the seventh inning of Game 2 and his run on a past ball lifted the Hawks past Weatherford, 8-7, at Jack Barber Field.

"It was good to see (it) from those guys because they stayed after the other night just for this reason," said Howard head coach Britt Smith. "It's nice to see the extra work pay off for the guys."

Both wins were taken in come-from-behind fashion.

The Hawks were down 4-1 heading into their final at-bat in Game 1 and trailed 7-2 in the second game with three outs to go. Both times the Hawks found ways to get on base and score runs with not much room for error.

"If this team played every inning like they

played the last ones today, then we wouldn't need the last inning," said Smith.

Weatherford got four runs off Howard Game 1 starter Bobby Gonsoulin, who struggled early before settling down in the latter stages of the game. Weatherford scored one run in the first inning as the first three batters reached base and added two in the second with two hits and two walks and a runner also reached on an error.

The Hawks got on the board in their half of the second inning as freshman catcher Ryan Pruitt got on with a double and eventually scored on an RBI groundout by sophomore Jeff Storms.

Both teams went in order in the third, fourth and fifth innings and Weatherford went three up and three down in the sixth inning as well. Brown walked in the sixth for Howard, but was stranded at first.

Gonsoulin ran into more trouble in the top of the seventh inning as Weatherford led off the inning with a bunt single and then Gonsoulin was pulled after walking the second batter.

Sophomore Parker Sisk entered the game and got three straight outs, but Weatherford added a run on a sacrifice fly.

The Hawks' big seventh inning started with an out by sophomore Will Basom. Pruitt followed the ground out with a single and advanced to second after Storms was hit by a pitch. Storms left the game and was replaced on the bases by sophomore Gabe Marchant, who did not bat and did not play

The Hawks got just two runners on base the entire game. Freshman Jessica Garcia walked and freshman Alisha Rams reached on an error.

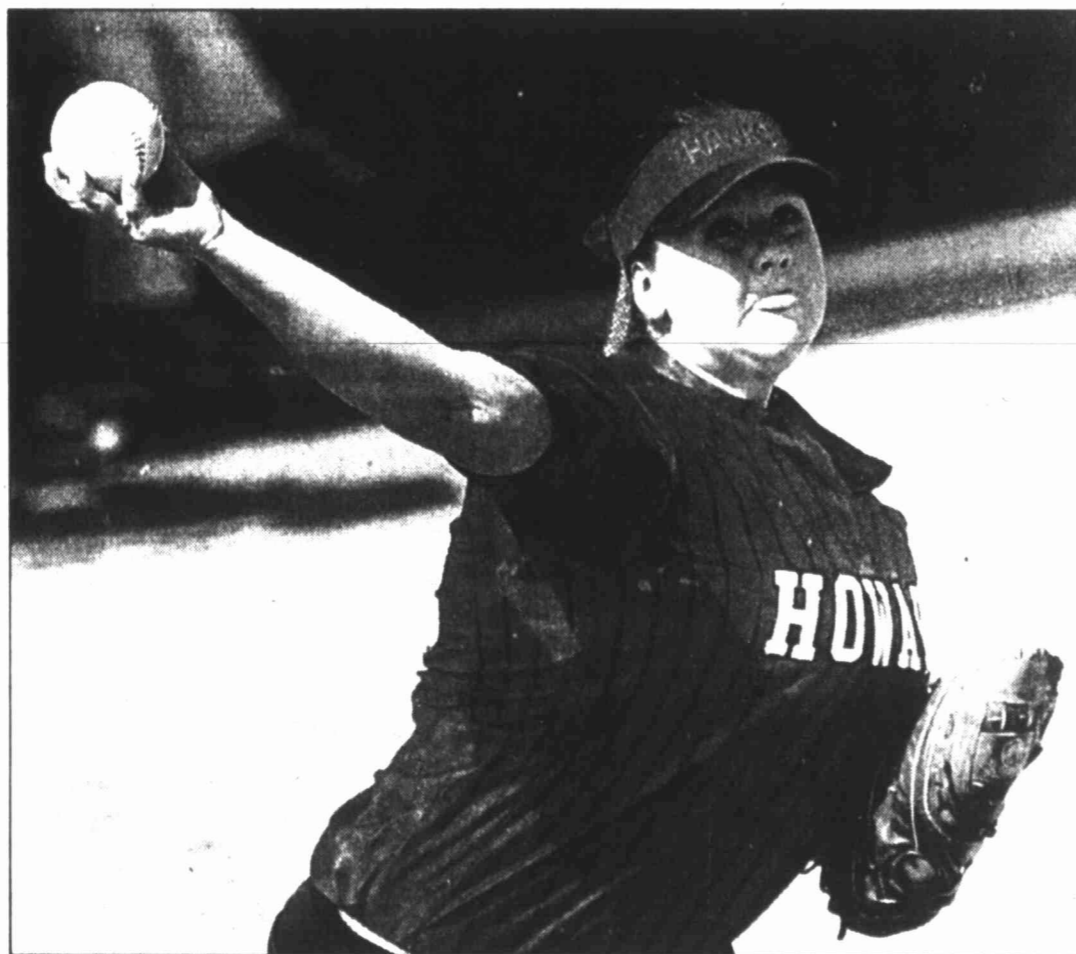

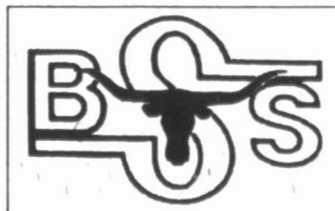
BSHS girls in 8th after Round 1

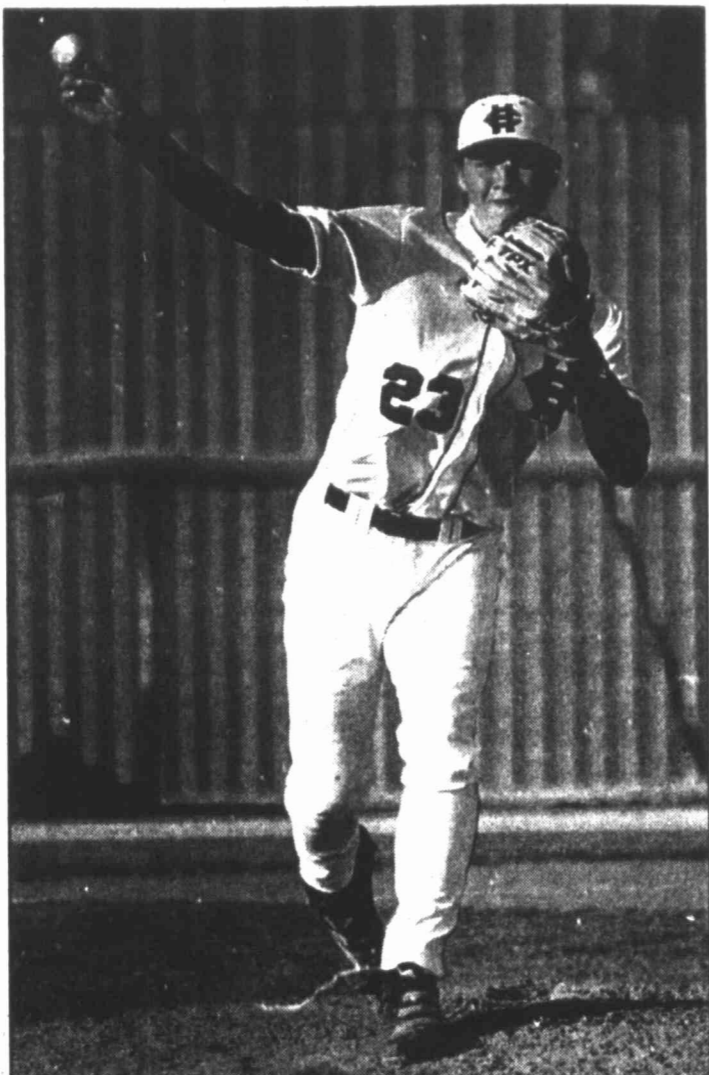

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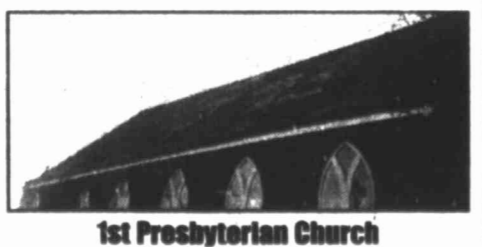

Former local basketball coach Taylor wins 600th game with Lady Hornets

When Ron Taylor took the court last Friday night in Post to lead his Aspermont Lady Hornets against the Lorenzo Lady Hornets in the Area round of the playoffs it would have been a safe bet that the farthest thing from his mind was the fact that he was playing for his 600th career win.
The unassuming, take care of business combination of old school and new theory coach has said and continues to say, "Let's just take one step at a time."
And for Taylor the step was to get his team to the next level.
Aspermont ISD is understandably proud of Coach Taylor's accomplishments.
"Six hundred career wins puts him into an elite group of coaches around the state," said Aspermont ISD Superintendent John Godfrey. "I've known Ron for a number of years and found him to be com-

petitive and a hard worker."
Godfrey had the opportunity to get to know Taylor up close and personal as they went head to head a number of times when Godfrey coached girl's basketball at Iraan.
"I've followed Ron's career over the years and kept in touch with him and developed a friendship with him," said Godfrey. "I was very glad that we were able to get him for Aspermont ISD."
Taylor's career spans 31 years of coaching with 27 of those as a girl's basketball coach. In those 27 years his combined record now stands at 600 wins against 167 losses for a better than 78% winning average.
Upon graduating from Tarleton State in Stephenville, Taylor began his career in Forsan where he took over as head girl's coach in 1979. He quickly made his girls a perennial playoff team compiling a 103-19 record. Taylor's girls went 161-55 during his

stint at Reagan County. His girls were the bi-district champions and the first-ever girls team to advance to the playoffs in the school's history.
In 1991 Taylor took over a program at Big Spring that won only five games the previous season and led them to a district championship. His girls lost in the area round to eventual Class 4A state champion Canyon Randall.
Taylor was named 4A Coach of the Year, South Plains Coach of the Year by the Lubbock Avalanche Journal, West Texas Coach of the Year by the San Angelo Standard Times and Big Country Coach of the Year by the Abilene Reporter News.
While at Big Spring, Taylor's girls were in the playoffs every season, six times as district champs compiling a 136-57 record. Taylor was named West Texas Coach of the Year three times and 4A coach of the year five times.
Taylor's career took him to Post next where he continued his pursuit of round ball renowned with a win loss record of 89-24 over four seasons.
In his first season, his girls made their first playoff appearance in 30 years. The next season gave the school their first district championship since 1970.
In 2003-2004 Taylor left Post and took on the job as DeLeon head girls coach and girls athletic director. He compiled an

82-10 record and led his girls to the first district championship since 1987.
The next year his girls were regional quarterfinalists and his girls were district champs and area finalists the following year.
Taylor decided to leave DeLeon and with Godfrey's coaxing came to Aspermont.
"I just called Ron to chat with him and touch base with an old friend," said Godfrey. "It turned out to be perfect timing for us. Ron and his wife and son came to Aspermont and liked the opportunity and decided to stay."
Taylor and his wife D'Aun and son Tad now make Aspermont their home and are off to another great start. Taylor's celebrated 600th win came after his girls won their 29th game of the season in the area round against Lorenzo, needing overtime to get the job done for their coach.
Ron Taylor is pleased with his accomplishments over the years, but you get the idea from talking with him that the win held as its most significant point in his career the fact that his team would advance one more step in the playoffs.
So what's Taylor's secret? What separates him from the pack and makes him a winner?
"I've been lucky and blessed to be surrounded by great kids," said Taylor. "Great kids who are of the same mind set as me."

Banks was a noted antique car specialist for many years in Big Spring.

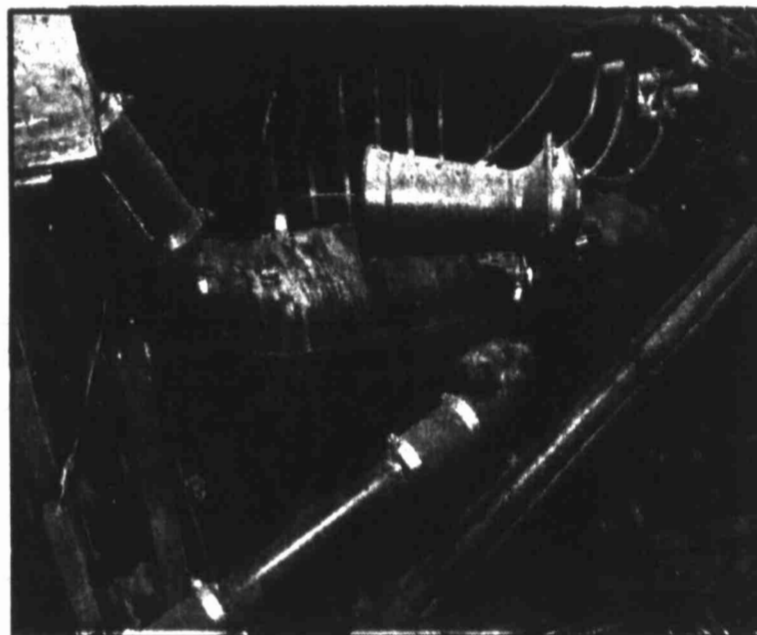
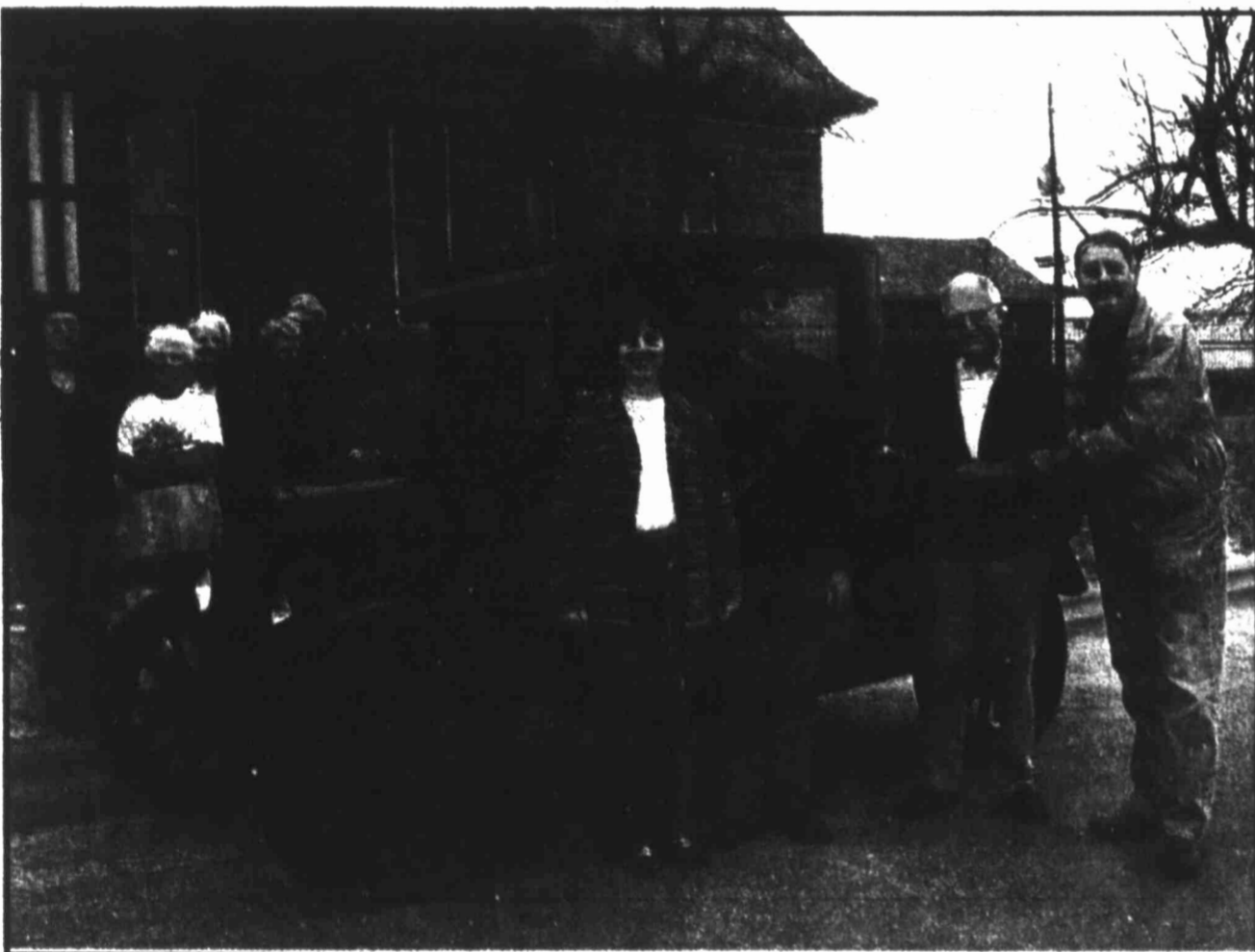
He completely restored the vehicle to its 1925 condition, with the exception of installing an electric starter and mounting brakes.

The restoration took two years.

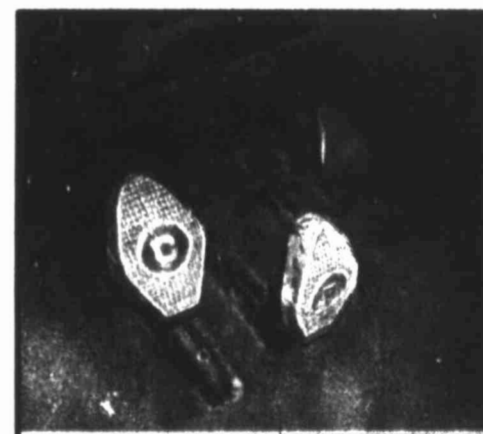
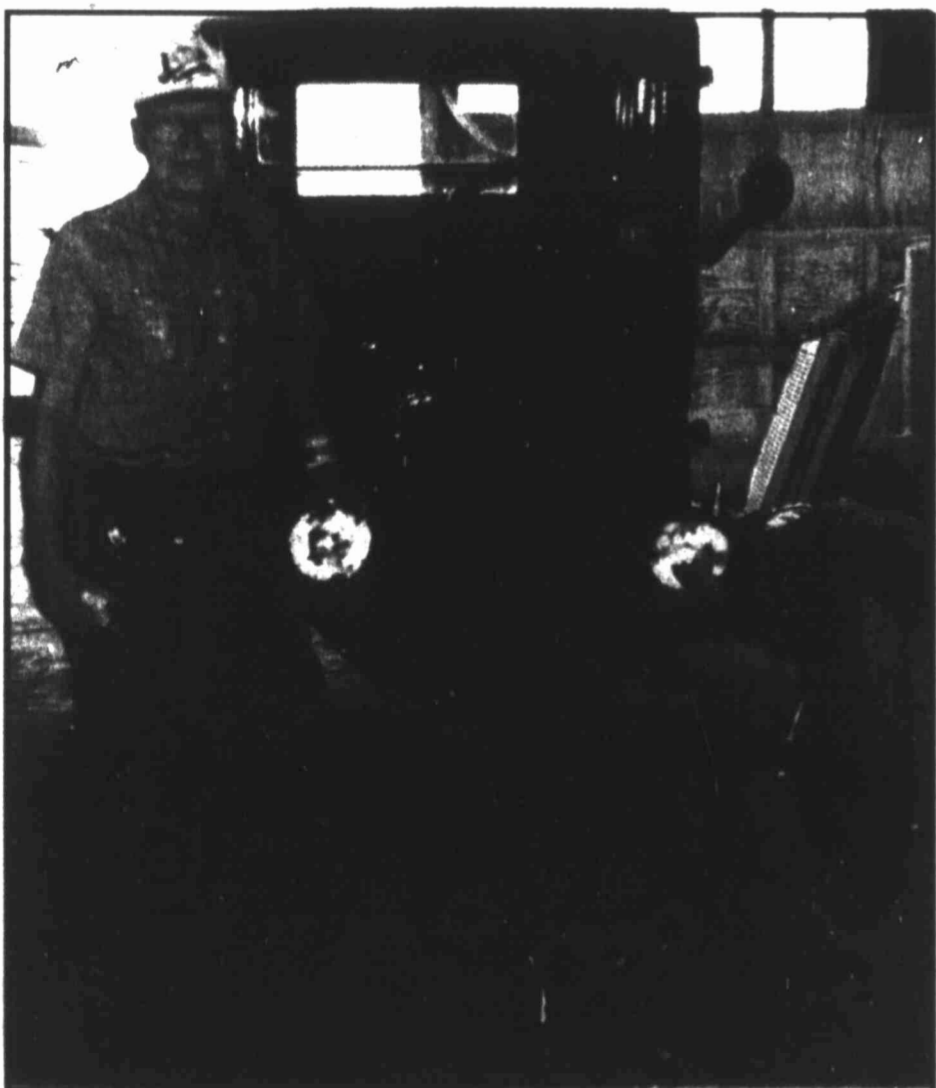
Just before the Murphys gave the museum the car, Don Stabeno completed the restoration, making sure the museum received an automobile that is in running condition.

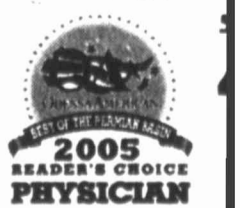

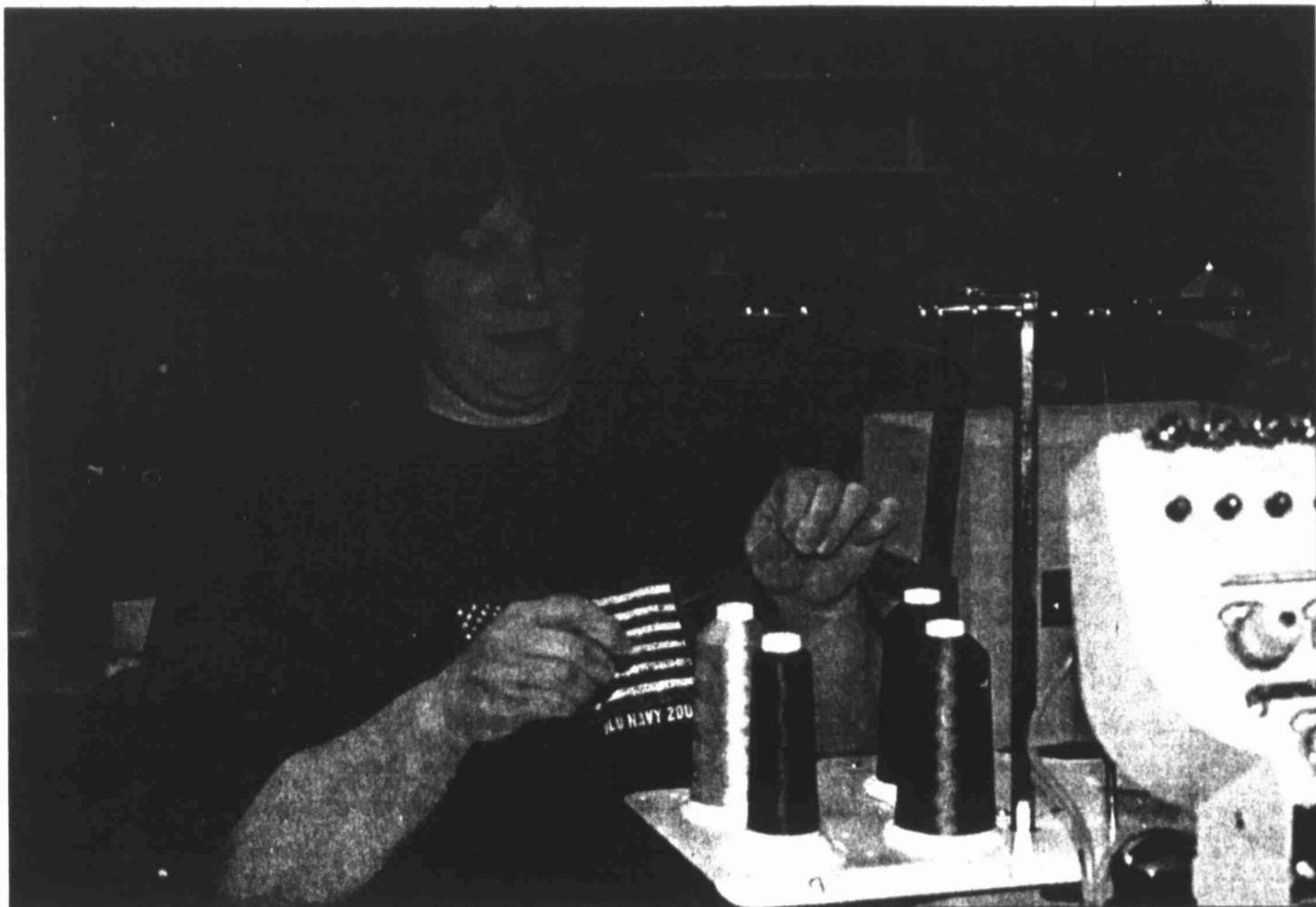

Growing business fills empty nest

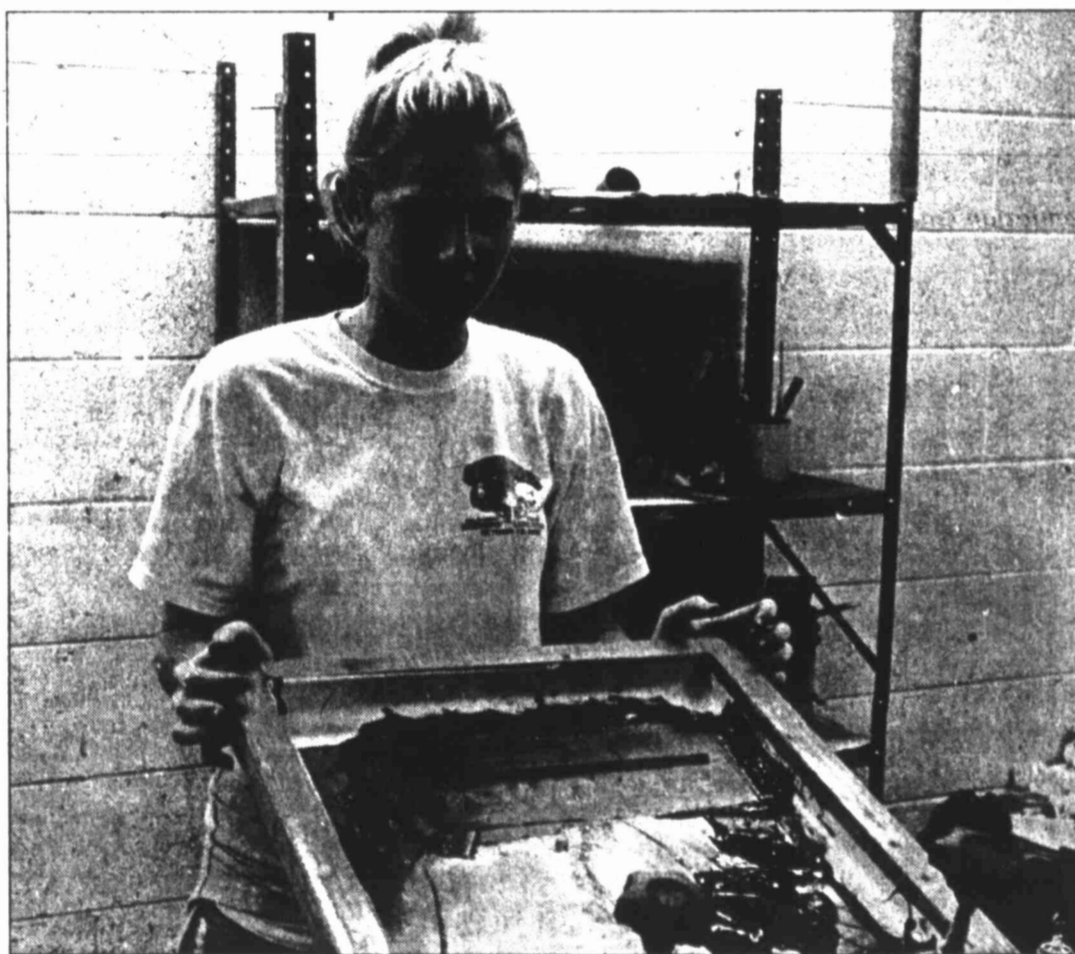

Embroideryco.com may very well be the best kept business secret in Big Spring — until now.

Owned and operated by the husband and wife team of Bobby and Carolyn Duncan, what started out as a way for a mother with an empty nest to stay busy has become a growing business with several locations in West Texas, including the businesses plant located on 11th Street.

Bobby Duncan is anything but shy when it comes to discussing the decision that brought his business to West Texas with a plethora of ideas and business models. And while it might spur the imagination to picture such a decision being made in a large corporate board room, Duncan said Embroideryco.com's beginning was much more humble — and unexpected.

"My wife and I raised our children in San Antonio for 20 years," said Duncan. "Carolyn was a stay-at-home mom, and she got involved with the kids' school, in the band and dance team. She sewed their costumes. She was basically a constant fixture at the high

After praise and mania, CFOs are feeling down

WASHINGTON — The age of the rock star chief financial officer is over.

From 1998 to 2000, CFO magazine handed out 23 Excellence Awards to finance chiefs who had won praise from auditors, analysts and investors for innovative approaches to what had traditionally been a buttoned-down job. Many of the winners were public figures, regulars on CNBC and in newspaper business sections.

Nowadays, two of the winners — WorldCom Inc.'s Scott D. Sullivan and Tyco International Ltd.'s Mark H. Swartz — are in prison. A third, David M. Willey, formerly of Capital One

Financial Corp., is fighting civil insider-trading charges filed by the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Next week, the best-known of the creative corporate money men, Andrew S. Fastow of Enron Corp., is scheduled to testify in federal court in Houston at the criminal trials of his former chief executive Jeffrey K. Skilling and chairman Kenneth L. Lay. Fastow agreed to cooperate with prosecutors as part of a plea bargain that resulted in a 10-year prison sentence for two counts of conspiracy.

Fastow, who was honored by CFO in 1999 for helping "his company thrive by creating and using unique financial techniques," had been charged with 98 counts of fraud, conspiracy, insider trading, money laundering and other offenses for his

Animal identification system in the works, just a matter of time

The USDA and the Texas Animal Health Commission are in the process of implementing a proposed national animal identification system.

The first step in this system will be the registration of premises where livestock are "produced, handled or co-mingled." Examples of premises might include ranch, auction barn, order buyer pens, feedlot, 4H/FAA barn, exhibition arena, rodeo grounds, etc.

After July 1, a \$10 annual fee has been proposed in order to obtain and renew a premises ID number. Currently, registration remains as a free service.

Premises ID registration is currently on a voluntary basis and applies to all species of livestock. At the Feb. 16 Texas Animal Health Commission meeting, the commission voted to postpone taking action which would make premises registration compulsory as of July 1, 2006. Thus, the July date

remains as a proposed date until further action is taken by TAHC — which will occur at a future meeting.

The purpose of the proposed National Animal ID system will be to provide animal health authorities (USDA-APHIS and TAHC) with the ability to trace animal movement within 48 hours of a catastrophic disease outbreak. It will have three components: 1) Premises ID, 2) Individual Animal ID, via radio frequency ear tags (for many, but not all livestock species), and 3) a national data base that tracks animal movements. It is proposed that the latter two components (individual ID and tracking) will be mandatory sometime in 2008-2009. Right now, it is not necessary to use individual tags or readers — as parts of those systems remain to be finalized. However, it is recommended that producers stay informed, as future developments will no doubt occur.

In most cases, only one premises number will be needed. For example, ranch owners with several properties would only need one number if livestock (even different species of livestock) are

Belo approves \$475,000 bonus to CEO

WASHINGTON (AP) — Belo Corp. approved a \$475,000 cash bonus to Chairman and Chief Executive Robert W. Decherd for 2005.

The Dallas-based media company, which publishes *The Dallas Morning News*, said in a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission that it also granted Decherd 59,500 restricted stock units.

Belo said its compensation committee will use consolidated net income to determine bonuses to be granted to senior executives for 2006.

Belo, which also publishes *The Providence Journal* in Rhode Island and *The Press-Enterprise* in Riverside, Calif., and owns a number of TV stations, cable news channels and Web sites, had 2005 sales of \$1.52 billion.

Northwest pilots reach pay-cut deals

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Pilots reached a tentative pay-cut deal with Northwest Airlines Corp. on Friday, a major step toward ending a showdown that put the bankrupt airline's future in doubt.

The Northwest branch of the Air Line Pilots Association announced the agreement but didn't release details.

The deal would still have to be approved by the union's leadership and members. The union said its leaders would meet later to consider the agreement.

Pilots were the last Northwest union without a deal. Northwest had been seeking to reject its contract with pilots if they didn't agree to pay cuts and changes in work rules. Intense negotiations took place in New York all week. The stakes rose on Wednesday, when a judge could have ruled on Northwest's request but chose to wait to give negotiators more time.

The bankruptcy law would have allowed Northwest to impose its terms even without the judge's ruling, but pilots threatened to strike if that happened.

was 5 years old, sitting on the couch with my mom watching the Ed Sullivan Show, and she was embroidering a pillow case. I thought it was nuts.

"We went to Dallas — and about \$20,000 later — we came back with one of those machines out there," he said, pointing to a row of embroidery machines. "We put it in our kitchen, and that's how it started."

Four years after setting up shop in the Duncans' kitchen, another unexpected decision would forever change the direction of the company.

"Misty graduated from Texas A&M University. I went to work at seven in the morning, and I came back at nine o'clock — not in the evening, but in the morning — and Carolyn asked me if I forgot something," said Duncan. "I told her no. Then I told her I worked for her now. She looked at me and said, 'What? What did you do?'"

"After 15-odd years with U.S. Global Investors, I told her I was going to work for her. Of course, after picking her up off the floor, she was just in a state of shock. There was uncertainty in her voice. How are we going to do this? We need a paycheck, how are we going to do this? And I told her not to worry about it, that we'd figure it out."

Duncan, who likens his business relationship with his wife to that of Velcro, said an idea proposed by an unlikely source convinced the couple they could leave the commercial safety of San Antonio behind, opting for the laid-back atmosphere of West Texas.

"My car is like a rolling university. I'm listening to tapes all the time in hopes I'll pick up some little tidbits of wisdom," said Duncan. "I was listening to a Harvard professor, and he was talking about the migration of baby boomers approaching retirement moving from suburban areas to ex-urban areas, made possible by cellular technology and the Internet. These places would no longer be remote."

"He said if you can get ahead of the baby boomers, who will be searching for quality of life and climate, you'll do well... There's this microclimate in far West Texas that is unique. So we bought property in West Texas. That's when the other shoe dropped. I said what we should do is take this business and go to West Texas. She looked at me and said, 'No way.'"

She was really in shock. "Part of our business model, in my mind, was to serve under-served areas. And if I can serve and under-served area, I think we'll do very well. So we did a test. We didn't just jump up like a bunch of renegade gypsies. In the end, we made the joint decision to move to Marfa."

That idea has turned into much more than just embroidery, providing screen printing and a number of other promotional items.

"We're serving primarily commercial clients throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico," said Duncan. "We have relationships with more than 200 apparel suppliers. You can get Bobby Jones polo shirts from us. You can get the Port Authority brand from us... The list goes on and on. We do caps, shirts, jackets, bags — basically anything you can embroider on, we'll do it. We handle baseball teams, soccer teams, high schools, booster clubs, and we're licensed to do a number of Universities and Colleges."

Duncan said locating his plant in Big Spring was not only a wise investment from a corporate standpoint, but has also begun to develop into a great relationship with the community.

"We have a lot of employees," said Duncan. "We want people to grow and learn, to better themselves. And we have such shining examples of that. Our plant manager, Houston Rutledge, is an ace. Everywhere I go and visit with people, they tell me he's an ace. Evelyn Petrosky is our production manager, and she moved here from Marfa just for this job."

"I look at Big Spring as a diamond. Big Spring is the gateway to the Hill Country, and it's a gorgeous community. If we had the Pacific Ocean out here, we'd be looking at Sonoma, Calif. We don't just want to have a business here. We want to be a part of the process to help Big Spring become more than what you see."

"We're not just the kind of people that take," he added. "We believe we have a duty and a corporate responsibility to give back to our community, and to not do that is selling your community short."

Bush concedes outsourcing hurts U.S. workers

But says trade barriers aren't the answer

WASHINGTON (AP) — You lost your job. It's probably one of the most dreaded things you'll ever hear from your boss. Then you find out that your white-collar position moved to the other side of the globe — to India. President Bush says he feels your pain and that education — not trade protectionism — is the answer to deal with the increasing globalized world in which we live and work.

Bush discussed the politically sensitive issue in New Delhi Friday, wrapping up a three-day stay in India. The country's rapid growth has created anxiety among Americans, especially as they have seen call center jobs, back-office administrative work, software programming and other white collar jobs move

there. "It's painful for those who lose jobs," Bush said. "But the fundamental question is, how does a government or society react to that. And it's basically one of two ways. One is to say, losing jobs is painful, therefore, let's throw up protectionist walls. And the other is to say, losing jobs is painful, so let's make sure people are educated so they can find — fill the jobs of the 21st century," he said.

Last year, 11,375 U.S. workers were laid off because their jobs were moved overseas, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. In many of those cases, Mexico and China were cited as the place where the jobs were going, a bureau official said.

In 2004, 16,197 workers were laid off because their job was moved overseas. The figures don't capture all layoffs — only the bigger ones, the official said.

For American compa-

nies seeking to compete on a global scale, India is a magnet — especially for white-collar, service-sector employees — because of the lure of lower-wage, highly educated workers who also are fluent in English, experts say.

India's outsourcing industry alone is expected to bring in \$22 billion in revenue this fiscal year, much of that generated by U.S. companies.

Blue-collar factory jobs in the United States, meanwhile, have been more likely to be moved to China or Mexico, experts say.

Although many Indians live on less than \$2 a day, the country's middle class has swelled to more than 300 million — which represents an attractive market for U.S. companies to sell their goods and services.

The United States should see this rapidly growing nation as a land of opportunity instead of a threat, Bush said. America's best response

to globalization is not to erect economic barriers to protect workers, but educate them to make sure they can compete on any stage, Bush said.

Economists and other experts agree that education — especially in math and science — is a critical way for workers to stay competitive.

"The United States has a lot of catching up to do," said Jacob Kirkegaard, an economist at the Institute for International Economics.

In 2004, China graduated about 500,000 engineers, India, 200,000 and the United States, 70,000, according to a report called "Rising Above the Gathering Storm" issued last fall by an advisory panel of the National Academies.

The report also found that 12th graders in America performed below the international average on a test of general knowledge in math and science.

Even with an emphasis on education, workers'

can't be guaranteed that their jobs will stay in this country, some economists said.

Moreover, U.S. workers also face the challenge of trying to figure out what the jobs landscape will look like in the future.

"Any attempt to forecast what skills will be needed 10 years from now is just folly," said Josh Bivens, economist at the Economic Policy Institute, a liberal leaning group. "If 10 years ago someone told you financial analysts were a job that was going to be exposed to intense global competition, a lot of people probably would not believe it but that definitely seems to be a possibility today."

Thus there's much risk on the shoulders of individual workers, he said.

Global competition — while painful to people who lose jobs — has economic benefits, economists said.

As the global market

grows, there are opportunities for U.S. companies to create new jobs.

The addition of millions of lower-wage workers from China, India and Eastern Europe has helped to hold down labor costs and thus make inflation lower than it otherwise would be in the United States and elsewhere.

For Americans, that has meant the Federal Reserve hasn't had to be more aggressive in raising interest rates to keep inflation in check.

Depending on the job, an Indian worker's wage will be 10 percent to 15 percent lower than what he or she would make for the same job in the United States, said Kirkegaard.

"But they are not going to remain that cheap for very long," he said.

"That's something that companies have to factor into their equation when they are thinking about whether they should outsource a particular task."

not able to get enough information" about how well the finance chiefs were really doing, said editor in chief Julia Homer.

But the rise and fall of the awards mirrors a broader change in the role of the American finance chief. In the 1990s, CFOs won praise and publicity for finding creative ways to massage their companies' finances to improve the bottom line and "create shareholder value." They were lauded for their ability to invent financial instruments and for their ionally approach to mergers and acquisitions.

Newadays, corporate boards and institutional investors are inclined to value a straight-shooter with expertise in accounting who plays more of a supporting role. While the ability to communicate with investors remains an important skill, analysts said, corporate boards are also

insisting that finance chiefs focus strongly on compliance and bedrock accounting skills.

"What is important is their credibility, as opposed to their charisma," said Eisha Tierney Armstrong, managing director of the CFO Executive Board, a membership organization for top financial officers. A 2005 survey by her organization of the Fortune 1000 companies found that 45 percent of finance chiefs were certified public accountants and 70 percent had risen through the ranks of their company's finance department.

From 2000 to 2004, prosecutors indicted 27 chief financial officers on some sort of fraud charges, up from six from 1995 to 1999,

according to a survey by Manu Gupta, a finance professor at Southern Illinois University.

Among them was Ira H. Zar, former chief financial officer at Computer Associates International Inc. who pleaded guilty to securities fraud. Zar had shared the executive suite with the company's two top officers.

Much of the change comes as a direct response to the 2001-2002 Enron and WorldCom scandals, in which finance chiefs pleaded guilty to engineering much of the fraud that caused those companies to collapse.

The Sarbanes-Oxley legislation passed in the wake of the scandals imposed new duties on


boards and top company executives. As a result, accounting skills are now at a premium, and the stakes for falling short of the new standards are much higher. "We frankly had expected CFOs to subsidize more into the background in the wake of Sarbanes-Oxley," said CFO magazine's Homer. "Instead, they have more visibility with the board than they have ever had because boards are more concerned with compliance than ever before."

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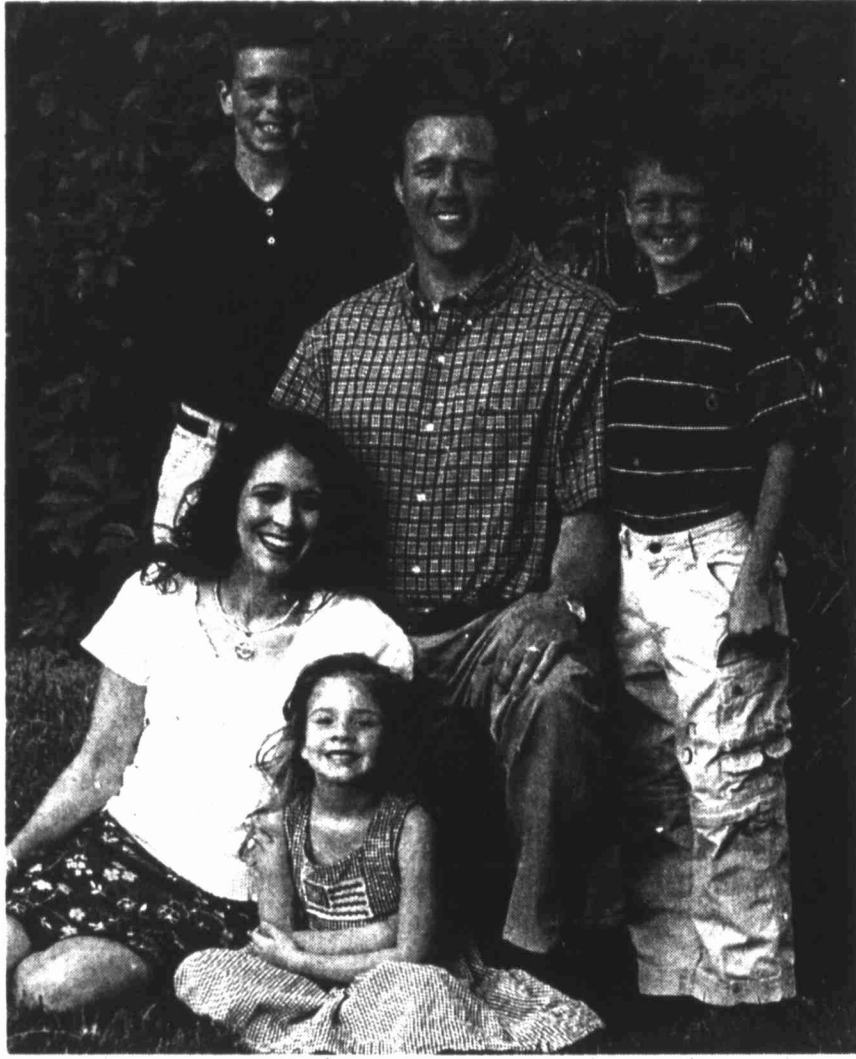

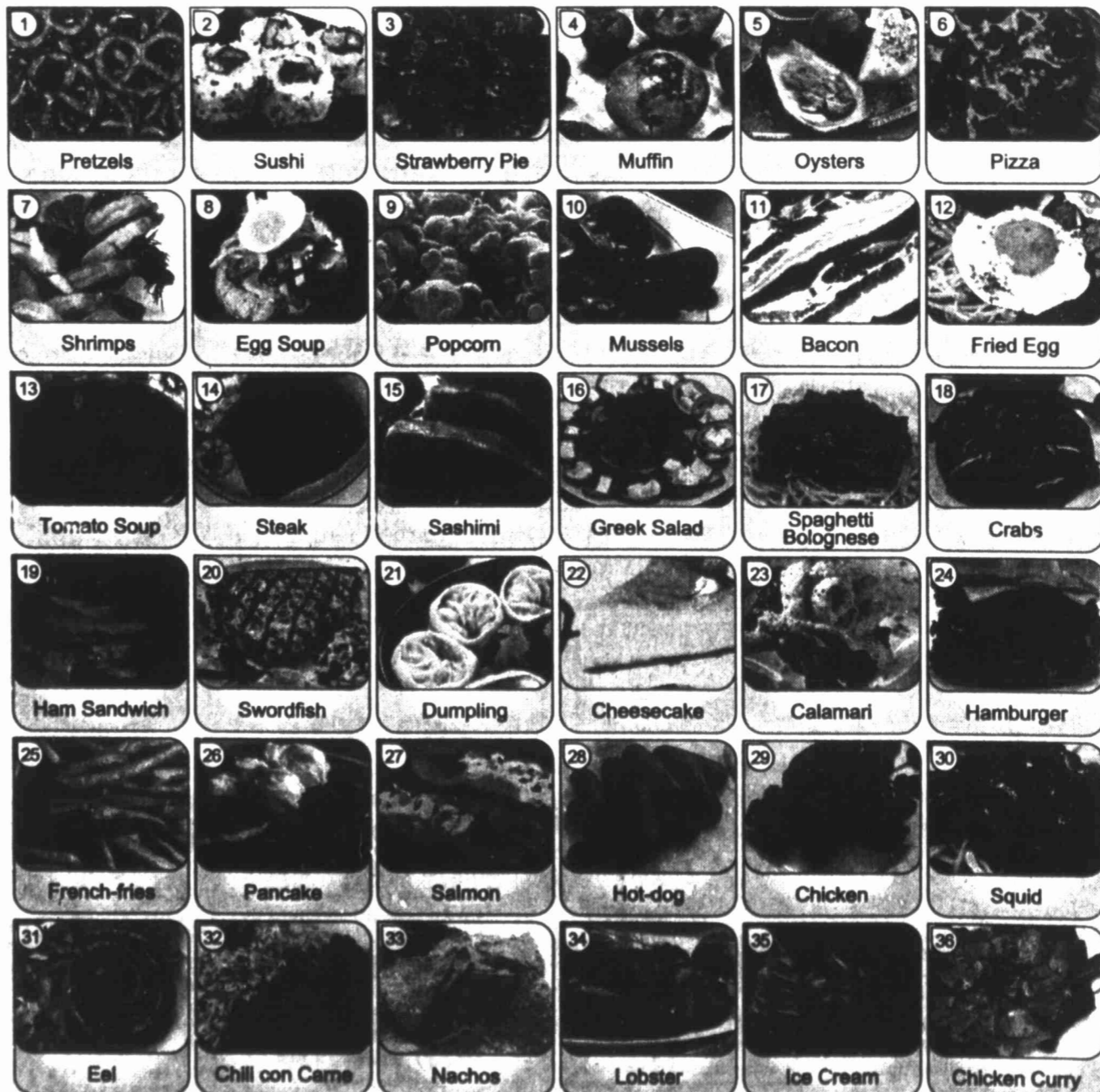

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OSCARS ROUNDUP

We predict who will ride off with the Academy's top honors this year

Are the Oscars about satisfying dreams or shattering them?

When informed of his best-actor nomination, "Hustle and Flow's" Terrence Howard said, "From the moment ... you decide to be an actor, whether you are 6 or 15 or 20, you watch the Oscars, hoping they will call your name. Right now, I am a physical manifestation of that hope and dream." But what happens to that dream when you lose, as roughly 80 percent of the nominees will when the awards are handed out March 5?

The Academy Awards try to downplay the losing thing, having eliminated "and the winner is" several years ago for the less competitive "and the Oscar goes to," but there's no getting around the fact that a lot of energy is spent in an attempt to be one of the lucky one-fifth. They used to be a little Hollywood affair, but now the Oscars are huge, and campaigning is as much a part of the race as expert prognostications.

In that spirit, here's my guide to who will win the 78th Academy Awards. But don't think of them as winners. Think of them as manifestations of a hope and a dream.

BEST PICTURE

Since audiences first saw it at the Toronto Film Festival last September, "Brokeback Mountain" has looked like a front-runner for the big Oscar, and none of the subsequent contenders seem likely to change that. "Capote" boasts a performance everybody loves, but it's a movie nobody does. "Good Night, and Good Luck" lacks the scope and ambition of a best picture. For a time, the Steven Spielberg pedigree made "Munich" look like a contender, but its hopes faded the minute it opened, when it became clear it was a thorny, complicated film, not the sort of easy-answers melodrama Oscar voters usually go for. "Crash" is that sort of movie — but the super-aggressive awards campaign that took it from minor contender to major player smells a little desperate, like an attempt to convince voters they loved a movie that they just kinda liked. Meanwhile, "Brokeback" remains the same classy, plainspoken powerhouse it was in September.

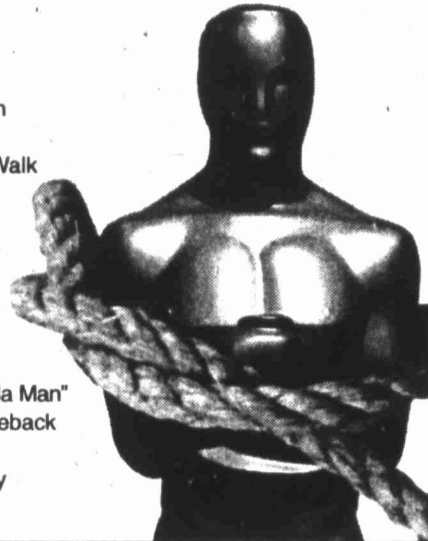

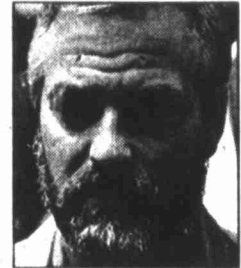

Jake Gyllenhaal? He's in the opposite situation from Hurt — his role is so huge that he would probably be in the best actor category if "Brokeback's" studio hadn't campaigned for him in supporting. Will it be Matt Dillon, a long-time actor/first-time nominee who's in last year's little movie that could? Will it be Paul Giamatti, a sentimental favorite whose previous slights (he should have been nominated for both "Sideways" and "American Splendor") seem to be overshadowing his performance in the not-beloved "Cinderella Man"? Will it be George Clooney, who went the attention-getting gain-ton-of-weight route while making "Syriana"? I'm torn between the last two, but I'm thinking Clooney, since Oscar voters obviously want to give him something and since this category may be his clearest shot at victory.

Rule out Judi Dench, nominated for a charmingly lightweight performance in "Mrs. Henderson Presents." Forget about recent winner Charlize Theron in "North Country," a movie that didn't light the world on fire. And Keira Knightley will have to consider it an honor just to be nominated for "Pride and Prejudice." Despite the brevity of her film resume, Felicity Huffman has a shot at the Oscar because her performance as a man in the midst of becoming a woman in "Transamerica" is both a showy stunt and a subtle, deeply felt piece of acting. But Huffman may not be a formidable enough contender to stop Reese Witherspoon, who is viewed as a future-of-Hollywood nominee, gives a great performance and has done a tireless job of giving interviews that remind Oscar voters how hard she worked to learn to sing.

BEST SUPPORTING ACTRESS

Frances McDormand has one thing in her favor: Other actors love, love, love her. But she might be quitting the business altogether, doesn't care about the Oscars and didn't even do publicity when "North Country" was released. The second-most-liked actress in this category must be Catherine Keener, who snagged a nomination for "Capote," despite having almost nothing to do in the film. She won't snag a trophy. Amy Adams is the sort of fresh face who has often scored an upset in this category, and her performance in "Junebug" probably has the biggest impact of any in this category, but the movie has no profile whatsoever. Michelle Williams' performance in "Brokeback Mountain" is a model of subtlety. But the buzz from Hollywood is that Rachel Weisz was a classy fixture on the pre-Oscar party circuit, giving one gracious speech after another as she soaked up the affection for "The Constant Gardener," a movie that deserved more nominations than it got.

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Aging bluesmen fear for the fate of their music

GRAPEVINE — David "Honeyboy" Edwards sits in a chair atop the modest stage at a restored theater in downtown Grapevine, working his slide guitar like few can and singing, almost shouting, the blues standard "Going Down Slow."

The song is about a bumpkin who leaves country life for an urban metropolis. He blows all of his money before landing on skid row.

Edwards is from rural Mississippi, but he's no fool. The Chicago guitarist with the pronounced Delta style has been playing his brand of blues for more than 70 years, spending most of that time in juke joints, dance halls and corner taverns. These are places where artists can get hurt or killed, as was the case with Robert Johnson, whom a jealous husband presumably poisoned 68 years ago.

Edwards was one of the last people to see Johnson alive and today is one of the few remaining purveyors of the mysterious bluesman's sound.

"I like to do it," Edwards says. "I'll either get bored or get to the point where I don't want to just do nothing. So I play the blues."

On Feb. 10, pianist Joe Willie "Pinetop" Perkins, guitarist Robert Lockwood, guitarist-pianist Henry Townsend and Edwards gave a rare blues concert at the Palace Arts Center theater in Grapevine. Each artist is more than 90 years old; the show could be the last time the quartet performs together.

The men carry with them a once popular style of blues that has given way to the more polished, perhaps

less soulful sounds of modern rhythm and blues and rock. When they fade from the scene, it's unclear whether the music that defined their careers will survive - at least in the way they play it.

What's more, many so-called successors are white performers with rock influences who are far removed from the harsh Delta life that spawned American post-World War II blues.

"There are a lot of young people, young white boys playing the blues," Edwards says. "They can't sing, but they can play."

Perkins, who replaced the great Otis Spann in the Muddy Waters blues band, says he thinks about the future of his music.

"I don't know, but I would like to know what will happen to it all," Perkins says. "It's changed. They

done named it rock 'n' roll. But I'm still trying to do the best I can, old as I am. I'm still trying to make a dollar or two."

Talented, slick and hard men from Mississippi used their craft to make money and secure a better life. At the same time, they created music that eventually migrated north to Chicago and St. Louis and west to Dallas.

Robert Johnson is widely regarded as a father of Delta blues, though Muddy Waters took the sound to Chicago and electrified it. According to legend, Johnson, once a below-average performer, sold his soul at a crossroads to achieve musical success. It was short-lived. He died in 1938 in Greenwood, Miss., days after taking a swig from an open whiskey bottle that police later determined was laced with strychnine. Historians debate whether Johnson died from the poison or from pneumonia.

Edwards, who says a jealous husband did in the

Johnson's girlfriends. "He caused me to be much better than I would have been."

The feisty Lockwood describes himself as being as talented and devilish as Johnson, stopping between curse words to compliment Grapevine on its quaint downtown.

"Robert Johnson never played any jobs like this," he says. "He played street corners and the parks. He would play a street corner and make a thousand dollars. He would play the parks and make two and three thousand."

Lockwood continues to play, even as his music's popularity wanes. He and his contemporaries say it's important for the music to survive. When they can, they perform in front of young audiences.

The day before their Grapevine concert, the four played at R.L. Paschal High School in Fort Worth to standing ovations.

"That was the biggest young turnout I had," Lockwood says. "I never had that many kids."

The high school performance was part of the Blue Shoe Project. Founded in 2004, the local nonprofit group promotes blues appreciation and education.

Performances like this help kids "develop an awareness of where their music came from and have a respect for the culture," says Michael Dyson, a spokesman for Blue Shoe.

But even with such successes, most Delta bluesmen have come to grips with the knowledge that their sound is fading.

"It's been good to me, and I had no desire to change," says Townsend, who has recorded in every decade since 1920. "It's been lower than the dirt on the ground, but it bounced back, and it's going to keep doing it because it's original. It's the only music that was born in America. Everybody else brought theirs with them."

Townsend, sitting in a motorized chair and flanked by his son-manager, says blues is more honest than contemporary mu-

sic.

"If somebody sings, 'Baby I'll fly to the moon for you, I'll bring the stars down,' that's a damn lie," Townsend says. "I sing about the events of the world as it's going today. It's more like gospel than anything else."

Gospel? In the early days of blues, the music was considered anti-gospel.

"We blues singers are condemned," Townsend says. "But I let them know this: If what I'm singing sends me to hell, I don't know how to get to heaven because I ain't lying. It's in your heart, and it's what you feel."

In Grapevine, the artists say they felt like playing.

Backstage and before the show, Lockwood picked a playful fight with Perkins, who sported a custom-made walking stick with piano keys.

"What's your problem," he joked with Perkins. "He's going to be my problem if I don't get that stick from him."

Perkins, who mentored the likes of Ike Turner, still tours with a full band.

"I just love to play," he says. "What else am I going to do?"

The audience marveled at the performances of the old gentlemen.

"This is just too cool," says David Byboth, a Dallas resident who hosts small concerts at his home. "It's one of those things you will never get to see again."

During an intermission, Dallas businessman Cliff Easterling bid \$4,600 for a guitar signed by all four bluesmen.

"I just love the blues, man," he says after the show.

Myra Walker had been upset by the deaths of several bluesmen last year, most notably Little Milton Campbell.

"They renewed my faith," she says after the show. "I had lost it for a while."

Townsend told the crowd he appreciated their support.

"It's good to be here and to be seen," he says. "I'm a pretty happy old man."

blues pioneer, performed a show with him that fateful day.

"He was a nice fellow," Edwards says. "He liked whiskey and women, that's all."

Johnson influenced all four bluesmen. For most of their careers, they toiled in obscurity until their mentor's music was rediscovered and the blues revived.

It's not every day that Emma Roberts is asked to tone down her skills, but that's what she did for her latest film, "Aquamarine."

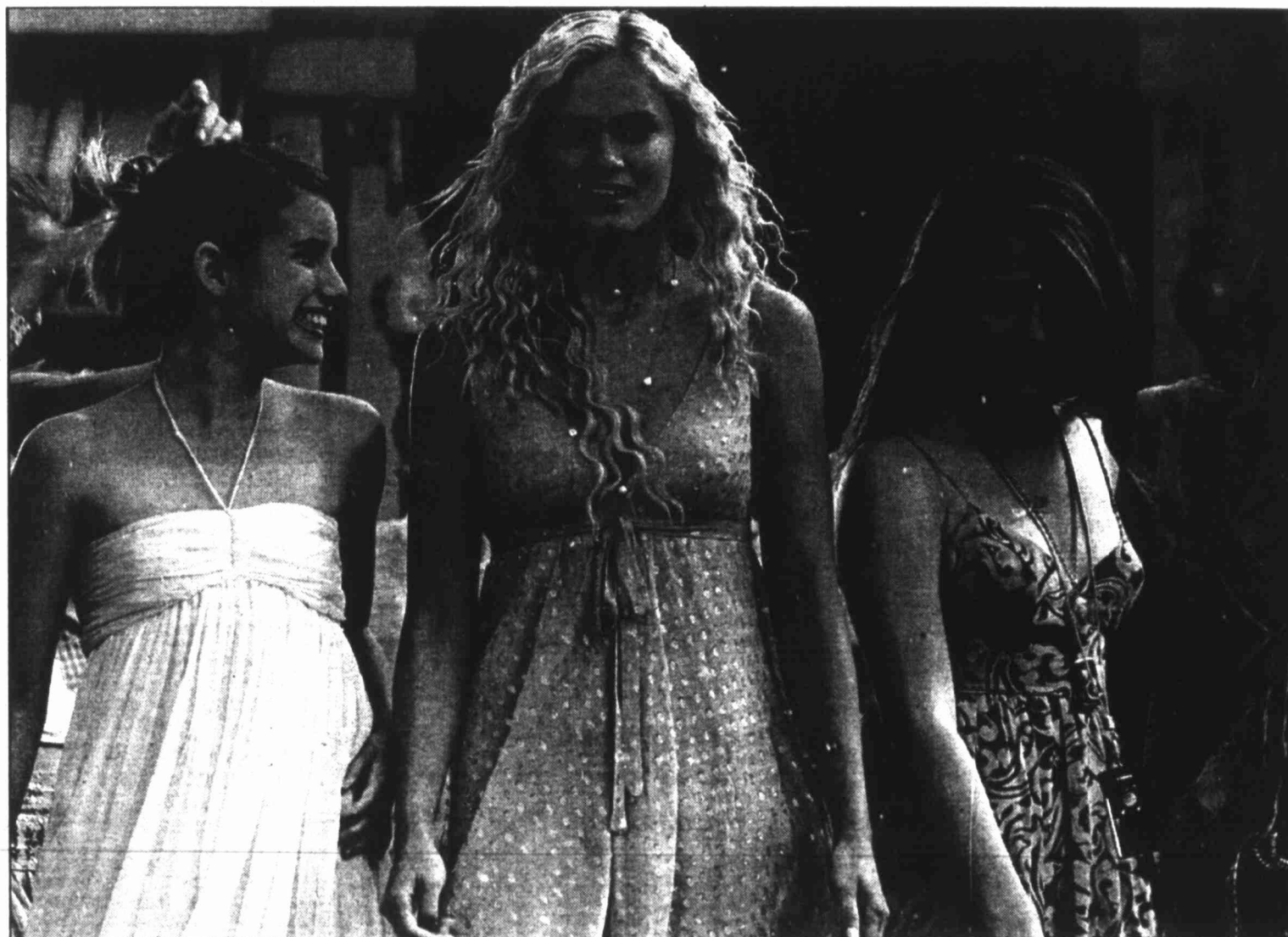
Directed by Elizabeth Adler, the comedy stars Roberts as Claire, a girl who's afraid of swimming after she loses her parents in a boating accident.

"We had to shoot the Last Splash dance scene, and that was the song that was playing. So we probably heard that song about a hundred times, and I got back to LA and they asked if I wanted to sing that song," Roberts explains.

"I was like 'Yeah, I guess.' I had heard it a trillion times so I knew it by heart already. I like Weezer, so it was cool."

Roberts is in good company. Both of her co-stars also balance music with their acting careers. JoJo is the youngest singer to debut at No. 1 on the Billboard Hot 100 with her single "Leave (Get Out)," and Paxton, who also contributed to the soundtrack, is working on her debut al-

bum "The Ups and Downs."

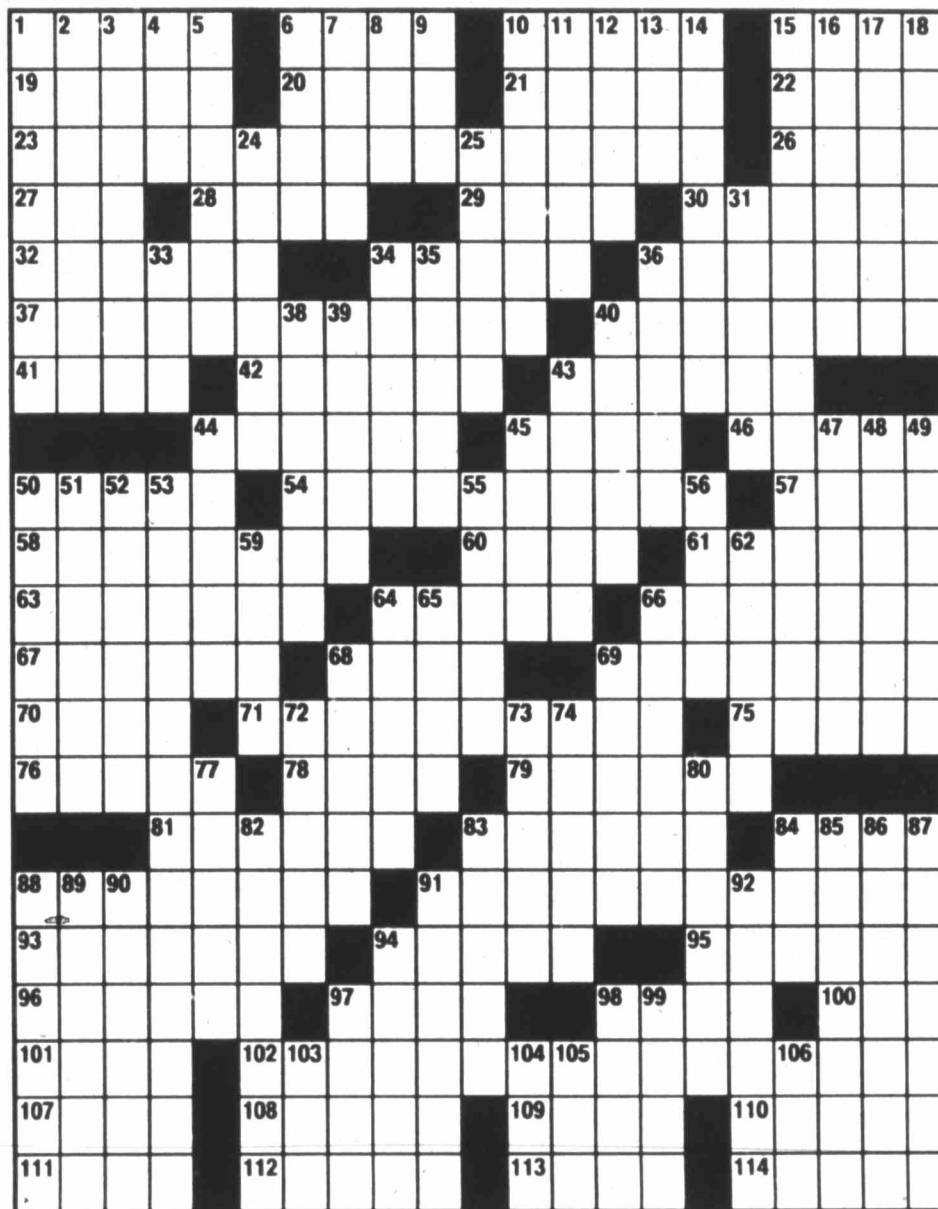

'Waiting' is better than the critics say

Do you know when you have a cult classic film on your hands? Easy. The critics hate it and the fans love it.

Such is the case with "Waiting," the 2005 sleeper starring the unlikely combination of Ryan Reynolds ("Blade: Trinity," "Amityville Horror 2005") and Justin Long ("Herbie: Fully Loaded," "Dodgeball: A True Underdog Story" and the television hit "Ed").

The movie critics — writers with publications such as the *New York Times*, *Chicago Tribune* and *USA Today* — have given the film a thorough bashing. Ebert and Roeper both gave the film a distinct thumbs-down and would have asked for their money back, had they actually paid to see the film. Despite the thrashing in the popular media, "Waiting" is steadily growing a cult following, with fans raving about the film on the Internet.

The film reminds me a lot of the early Kevin Smith ventures ("Clerks," "Mall Rats"), trading in high budget theatrics, special effects and locations in favor of something the critics seem to have missed out on — a real-life sense of humor.

Picture it. Several 20-somethings work in a chain restaurant called Shenanigan's, and while the place is seen as just a dead-end job by most of them, it at least affords plenty of opportunities to sit around talking about sex and playing food service-related practical jokes.

In an effort to stave off the boredom associated with the endless job of waiting tables, washing dishes and food preparation, the cast has developed a number of juvenile, yet entertaining games and lines of conversation that sound just like — you guessed it — what you might hear behind the scenes of any restaurant.



Don't be fooled, however. If you followed some kid around at McDonalds you're certainly not going to find the level of humor that "Waiting" portrays, driven by Reynolds' quick-witted antics and Long's lackluster attitude.

Much like "Clerks," the black-and-white low-budget film that launched the career of Kevin Smith — AKA Silent Bob — "Waiting" is a movie most people who have ever worked in the food service industry will relate to.

What makes this film work so well is the cast. Anne McCarthy and Jay Scully (credited with the movie's casting) deserve a major award for assembling one of the most diverse — and stimulating — casts I've seen since the 1995 film "Friday," which was written by rap-superstar Ice Cube.

Luis Guzman ("The Salton Sea," "The Cowboy Way") is one of the best character actors in Hollywood right now, and brings an amazing air of life to Raddimus, the horn-dog cook that leads the kitchen staff at the fictional (OK, so I hope it's fictional) restaurant.

Robert Patrick Benedict

("Kicking and Screaming," "Not Another Teen Movie") portrays the mild-mannered Calvin, who is constantly run over by a female waitress we never get to meet and has a debilitating fear of public restrooms stemming from a semi-paranoid urinal incident.

Amidst the games and turmoil of the restaurant, Chi McBride ("The Terminal," "I, Robot") plays Bishop, the introspective calm in the storm. Bishop, a dishwasher, offers the other employees his quiet, psychologically-fueled interpretations, complete with diagnosis and treatment of what ails them.

Dane Cook ("Torque," "Stuck On You"), who plays the demented cook Floyd, is hilarious in his own anti-social, non-politically correct sort of way, showing first hand why it's really not a good idea to send your food back if you've been a jerk to the restaurant staff.

With that being said, this is not the movie to watch before, during or after dinner, lunch or breakfast. This could be seriously compounded if your meal is taken at a restaurant. I don't mean to

frighten anyone, but I'm willing to bet this movie correlates with a sudden drop in business for many waiter/waitress driven restaurants.

In my opinion, this film is destined for greatness. Much like "Pulp Fiction," "Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back" and "Office Space," it offers up the kind of humor that will leave you laughing — and cringing — for days, even weeks, after seeing it.

As for the snobbish, better-than-the-rest critics that spilled their time into giving this film low marks, shame on them.

I had the fortune of seeing this film with a friend who has worked for years in the food preparation industry — that's double-talk for fast food — and could offer up what was accurate, and what wasn't.

And while several elements didn't quite match up with her experience, it was funny to

see the countdown to closing time, along with the hoping and praying by the kitchen staff that a last minute customer wouldn't walk through the doors. And while most restaurant employees aren't willing to admit it, what happens to the food of patrons that act like jerks is right on the money.

Personally, I'll never send another steak back because it's not cooked right. From now on, I'll just smile and enjoy it. Once you see this film, you'll understand why.

Strong sexual humor — including a few references that nearly made me blush — makes this movie inappropriate for small children.

Overall, "Waiting" is the best movie I've seen on video this year. Don't hold your breath for any big awards for the film, but a \$4 rental is certainly worth the overall amusement.
