# **Consultant: Jail will fit** west of the courthouse

Rough estimate: \$5.5 million cost, a year to build



The quarter-block located at the corner of Scurry and Third Street got the thumbs up as a possible location for a new Howard County jail from Houston-based general contract company Tribble & Stephens during a special meeting Wednesday morning.

James Stephens, a former Howard County resident and representative of Tribble & Stephens, presented commissioners with a set of plans which described a one-story facility located adjacent to the district courthouse.

"Without going into all of the details, it's a 96-bed facility," said Stephens. "It has everything that is required to operate that facility, and nothing more. This is what I would say is the beginning of the thought process that should take you from here to yonder. This would be the minimum you would need to build to satisfy the requirements that have previously discussed, and you can go up you can do that."



WASHINGTON (AP) - After an election-year repudiation by a GOP-led House committee, President Bush hopes to avoid getting steamrolled in the Senate over a deal allowing a Dubai-owned company to take control of some U.S port operations.

By a 62-2 margin, the House Appropriations Committee on Wednesday voted to bar DP World, which is run by the government of Dubai in the United Arab Emirates, from holding leases or contracts at U.S. ports.

The ports provision was added to a must-pass measure funding the war in Iraq and providing new hur-

In the Senate, Democrats moved for a vote as well by trying to attach a measure blocking the deal to legislation designed to overhaul rules governing travel, gifts and their dealings with lobbyists.

Senate Republican leaders were trying to block a vote on the ports deal through a procedural vote that could occur as early as Thursday. That tactic was likely to fail, which could prompt Republicans to temporarily pull the lobbying reform bill from the floor in order to avoid an immediate defeat on the ports measure.

#### Iran threatens U.S. over nuclear program

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Iran threatened the United States with "harm and pain" if the U.S. tries to use the U.N. Security Council — which has the power to impose sanctions — as a lever to punish Tehran for its suspect nuclear program.

Washington warned that Tehran has enough nuclear material for up to 10 atomic bombs.

Hours after the Iranian and U.S. exchange Wednesday, some members of the Security Council took up the issue for the first time, with the five permanent nations holding consultations in New York.

The rhetoric reflected the intensity of the debate at a meeting of the International Atomic Energy's 35nation board in Vienna over a critical report on ran's nuclear program. The meeting ended late Wednesday, formally opening the path to Security Council action that could range from a mild statement urging compliance to sanctions or even military measures. The meeting also set the stage for a potential struggle between Washington, which seeks harsh measures against Tehran, and Moscow, which advocates a softer line.

# Congress should deal with 'flood cars'

he last thing we need coming out of the post-hurricane mess along the Gulf Coast is another horror story. But it seems thousands of flood-damaged vehicles are finding their way into the hands of unscrupulous dealers who are peddling them to unsuspecting

This has prompted automobile and consumer groups to call for a federal database on car titles to track such vehicles. This is a good idea and one that should be expanded beyond cars and trucks damaged in Hurricane Katrina.

Auto dealers joined consumer groups this week in bringing the issue to the attention of the House Commerce and Energy Committee. A vehicle's title lists its history, including damage, but because states use different language to describe the damage and some require less specific information, an unscrupulous dealer or wholesaler can easily mask the background, according to dealers and consumer representatives.

They said less reputable dealers and "chop shops can rebuild damaged vehicles, then obtain titles in states with more lenient title information laws. As a result, Katrina vehicles with corroded wiring, faulty brakes and air bag systems stuffed with rags are finding their way to buyers.

A national title system was set up in 1992 as a

result of car thefts, but only 28 states, including Pennsylvania, participate.

As noted by those who appeared before the House committee, while Katrina "flood cars" are of immediate concern, this issue really extends beyond that. Rather than the sort of voluntary system now in place, Congress should establish a federal system requiring all titles to be entered.

This issue clearly falls within interstate commerce, and it would be of great advantage in protecting consumers from vehicles that are both a financial rip-off and pose serious safety threats.



# An MP3 player for the teacher

olorado high-school sophomore Sean Allen couldn't convince his father that his geography teacher was as over-the-top as he contended. So Allen taped one of his teacher's ants on his MP3 player. Too bad for Jay Bennish: His

20-minute lecture ended up on talk radio. As aired on Mike

Rosen's show, Bennish said Bush talks like Hitler: "I'm not saying that Bush and Hitler are exactly the same," but that the two share "eerie similarities." Peruvians



The Cherry Creek School District placed Bennish on paid administrative leave as it investigates whether the teacher failed to provide a balanced look at the issues. They won't find balance. I listened to the rant, and what I heard was a semi-educated selfimpressed petty tyrant using the classroom as a soapbox, secure in the knowledge that a bunch of teenagers couldn't out-argue him. Still, I hope the district allows

Bennish to return to the classroom.

The school district policy sounds reasonable. The school board recognizes, "Each teacher has the right and the obligation to teach about controversial issues." The district also notes the teacher's obligation to present various views on issues. And, "Although he has the right to express his own viewpoints, he does not have the right to indoctrinate students to his views."

The problem is, there is no good way to enforce that policy. The line between passionate argument and indoctrination is a thin divide. When I was a kid, some of my best teachers were highly opinionated. They didn't necessarily provide balance when they talked about literature or history, but they did provide passion, and that fired up their students.

In an age when many teens mainly are absorbed with going to the mall and text messaging, it's better to have a teacher who instills passion - Amole tells me Bennish is a "passionate" teacher — than a teacher who provokes yawns. Do I see this episode as a typical educrat romp — with a liberal teacher forcing his ideology down the throats of students, willing or not? Yes, but any rule used to silence Bennish can and will be used against another teacher who is actually informative. It can and will be used against conservative teachers.

So let Bennish back in the classroom. Even Allen's parents don't

want to see the teacher fired. They want the district to admonish Bennish, and they want Bennish

to learn a lesson.

Perhaps in time, Bennish will grow into a teacher who appreciates geography — and social studies, which he also teaches — to the extent that he can get excited about topics, even if they don't readily pass through his heavy filter of America-hating.

In the meantime, he's likely to educate a small army of future conservatives. A few years ago, I heard from a teacher whose class was reading Sophocles' "Antigone." He had assigned his students to write about how the play's characters — and my columns — dealt in "false dichotomies."

I was enraged. First, my column is not in the league of Sophocles. More important to me: It was clear this teacher did not appreciate or understand a jewel of Western literature — if he did, he would have stuck to the play. False dichotomies? Please. That's academese for: I don't understand it.

Well, at least it beats being compared to Hitler.

# SOS: We should not sink our sovereignty in a sea of globalism

Editor's Note: A House panel voted overwhelmingly Wednesday to block a Dubai-owned firm from taking control of some U.S port operations.

o be or not to be? That is the question about American sovereignty in the wake of the tempest over port security. Quite unexpectedly, port security has become the critical issue at the intersection of national interest and globalism. The issue has captured national attention and united public opinion as nothing else has since Sept.

The immediate problem concerns the \$6.8 billion sale of a British firm to Dubai Ports World (DPW), a state owned entity located in the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

But, in all of the furor, the key issue of maintaining U.S. sovereign interests tends to be neglected. Making a distinction between British and UAE operation of our ports misses the mark. In this post-9-11 period, no foreign entity should operate our ports. They should be managed by American

Trade and commerce are vital national interests. Relinquishing aspects of control over them to foreign operators (or governments) is a negation of U.S. sovereignty.

**New Jersey Senator Robert** Menendez, the emerging leader of the opposition to the deal, is on record stating that "Turning over control of operations at our ports to a foreign government is an abdication of our responsibility to protect this nation's critical security assets.'

The Constitution of the United States requires our sovereign government to provide for the common defense. How can this be done properly and efficiently if the federal government turns over port operations to foreign entities or governments in these perilous times?

With 30 percent of all American port operations run by foreign firms, it is time to review the entire situation relating to control of our infrastructure. We should look at who runs our various utilities (gas, electric, water) and communication systems

(telephone and cable TV). Foreign investment in these operations is fine, but foreign control/management is not in our national interest.

A second infringement of our sovereignty is implied in the global corporate deal now under scrutiny and delay.

Indeed, Homeland Security Secretary Chertoff has cited U.S. obligations in the global economy as a reason to honor the agreement. But the global economy, as currently structured, includes international treaties, free-trade agreements and trans-national corporate adventurism that may frustrate our national ambition as expressed in federal, state and

local laws. Although the general public doesn't know it, America may have to rescind laws that may give American entities an advantage over European firms in contract bidding. Such "unfair advantage' might involve: 1) Inappropriate use of U.S. laws assisting women or minority-owned businesses, 2) Local tax incentives given to a U.S. business that wants to relo-

cate, 3) Tax exemptions given to a university or non-profit agency if it happens to bid for a contract against a foreign competitor without benefit of such exemption.

In this global economy, who knows what actions might be taken against U.S. laws and what repercussions may extend to each and every hometown in the land?

American citizens simply have

had no clue as to how the global economy can work. The port controversy has provided the public with a smoking cannon for a clue! Gov. Jon Corzine of New Jersey will sue the federal government, contending that his State's sovereignty is infringed by the federal

government's forcing it to comply with the new port operations agreement. A question comes to mind. Can

citizens sue our federal government for impairment of national sovereignty? We may have to do this to recover our rights, which we have vested in our government.

At the very least, the American people are now alerted to the dangers to national sovereignty implicit in the current form of the global economy. Henceforth, we must continually impress upon Congress our desire to Save Our Sovereignty, for it is the legislature that most closely embodies the popular will in our system.

If we lose our national sovereign ty for posterity, the fault will not lie in cruel fate or outrageous fortune, but with us.

Orange, Almond and Buckwheat Pancakes

Prep time: 20 minutes Cook time: 50 minutes

Makes: 6 servings, 2 (4-inch) pancakes each

- 1 cup sliced almonds\*, divided
- 1 whole orange 1 egg
- 2/3 cup 100% orange juice
- 1 cup 2% reduced fat milk
- 2 tablespoons grapeseed oil or canola oil

Combine egg, orange juice, milk and oil in medium bowl and mix well. In large bowl, combine both flours, baking powder and salt with reserved orange zest. Add liquid to dry ingredients and mix thoroughly, being sure to leave some lumps. Set aside 1/4 cup almonds for syrup, then gently mix remaining 3/4 cup into batter until ingredients are combined, but still lumpy. (Do not over-beat or stir until smooth, as this will make pancakes tough.)

Ladle batter onto hot, non-stick skillet coated with cooking spray and cook until some bubbles begin to appear on top, about 3 minutes. Flip cake over and cook 2 minutes. Serve immediately with Orange-Almond Syrup (recipe follows), and garnish with orange segments.

\*Note: While almonds provide a healthy fat, this ingredient may be removed to reduce the recipe's fat content by 18 grams.

# Can you say tax break? Mariner Hybrid comes with perks

For The Associated Press Get a new Mercury Mariner Hybrid this year, and get a tax break.

The estimated \$1,950 hybrid vehicle federal tax deduction for the Mariner isn't the only perk that comes with this compact sport utility vehicle with gasoline-electric power.

With only a standard four-wheel drive, the Mariner rates a bit better in gasoline mileage — a combined 31 miles a gallon for city and highway travel - than Toyota's hybrid SUVs, according to the federal government.

The purchase also can be satisfying for shoppers who prefer a domestic vehicle, because the 2006 Mariner Hybrid is built alongside its twin, the Ford Escape Hybrid, at a Kansas City, Mo., assembly plant. Toyota's hybrid SUVs come from overseas plants.

But the price for this Mariner isn't low.

five-passenger Mariner Hybrid, which uses' a four cylinder engine mated to an electric motor starts at \$29,840, including delivery charge. That's nearly \$6,100 more than a base four-cylinder-powered, gas-only Mariner with four-wheel drive.

Competitors include the 2006 Ford Escape Hybrid, which starts at \$27,515, and the 2006 Toyota Highlander Hybrid, which starts at \$33,635 for a two-wheel-drive model. All Highlander Hybrids have a V6 engine.

The Mariner Hybrid is basically an upscale version of the Escape Hybrid, which is in its third year on the market.

The interior appointments are ritzier in the Mariner.

On the outside, styling

is attractively mainstream. But my neighbors said they had no idea that I was driving a hybrid because the styling differences between the hybrid version and the regular, gas-only Mariner are so minor.

They didn't notice the hybrid badging but they sure noticed the difference during the drive. The Mariner was often quiet at stoplights as the gasoline engine shut down to conserve fuel. The engine started right up when it was time to get going again.

As in the Ford Escape Hybrid, the Mariner Hybrid uses a 2.3-liter four-cylinder inline, engine mated to a 70-kilowatt electric motor for its power. The matching and mixing of the power sources are all controlled electronically, and the driver doesn't do anything but drive.

The electric part of the

system is monitored and start — as opposed to replenished via regenerative braking and onboard power production. The power is stored in an hydride battery pack.

Maximum horsepower is 155, which is nearly the same as the 153 horses in base, gas-only Mariner with 2.3-liter four cylinder.

But where the gas-only Mariner with four-wheeldrive is rated at 21 mpg in the city and 24 mpg on the highway for a combined 22.5 mpg, the fuel-conrated at 33 mpg in the city and 29 mpg on the highway for a combined 31

A final note: The hybrid tax deduction was part of the U.S. Energy Act of 2005 and applies to hybrid vehicles purchased as of 1. Deduction amounts vary by vehicle - Ford officials estimated the \$1,950 amount for the Mariner Hybrid — and have some limitations.

## Pedestrians, watch out: Quiet hybrids are here

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Jenny Sant'Anna was so excited. She had waited months for just the right hybrid, choosing a Toyota Highlander because, though she wants great mileage, she also needs space to cart around her two elementary school kids and three classmates.

It was during her first trip out of the driveway on a warm August morning that Sant'Anna learned about one of the dangerous drawbacks of driving a hybrid: It's so quiet that pedestrians can't hear it when it's starting up or idling, and they often walk right into the path of the moving vehicle.

As hybrid sales skyrocket, there's a growing concern that the batterygas powered vehicles pose a risk because they aren't as noisy as gas-powered engines.

When idling, hybrids run on the quiet electric battery. Most, with the exception of GM and Honda hybrids, can also operate on the battery until the car reaches higher speeds, when the gas engine kicks in.

What follows is silence at locations where drivers are likely to tangle with pedestrians and bicyclists, crosswalks, turning lanes and parking lots.

In Sant'Anna's case, an elderly man enjoying a morning walk didn't hear her coming as she backed into the street. She lunged for the brake, stopping just short of hitting him.

"He was in my blind spot on one side," said Sant'Anna, 41. "Then I turned to look back on the other side and saw him clearing the corner of my car. I don't think he heard me and my heart almost stopped." Tom Battle recalled his

own near-hit as he walked to his car in the parking lot at Symantec in Mountain View, Calif., where he is the director of engineering.

"I had to jump out of the way of a hybrid, which suddenly, and completely silently, moved toward me," he said.

"The car was a brand new Prius, which I remember because it was still very shiny."

Local traffic officials and police do not know of any cases in which pedestrians were harmed by the popular hybrids. Collision reports don't have a provision for considering whether the quiet nature of the car is a factor.

But Bond Yee, San Francisco's parking and traffic director, said his city may start indicating such causes.

"It could become an issue as hybrids become more popular," Yee said.

Sales of hybrids in the United States are expected to grow to 277,642 this year, up 31 percent from a year ago when 211,875 were sold in this country.

A hybrid emits less than three decibels of noise when starting up, a level hard to pick up with the human ear.

A hybrid clipping along at 35 mph emits 75 decibels — quieter than a vacuum cleaner.



> yle Busch and Kurt Busch are not twins. There are differences between the sons of Tom Busch, who raised his boys in Las Vegas where they'll race in Sunday's UAW-DaimlerChrysler 400. But, beginning with the strong family resem-

blance, there's a lot more about them that's the Both, of course, have demonstrated their talents at an early age in NASCAR's Nextel Cup

When Kyle won the first of his two Cup races in 2005 on Sept. 4 at California Speedway, he became the youngest driver to win a Nextel Cup

He was 20 years, 4 months and 2 days old four days younger than Donald Thomas when he won a race in 1952

Kurt now has 14 career victories. Seven of them came before his 25th birthday, the same number the legendary Richard Petty won by that age. Only Jeff Gordon, who had 15 wins before turning 35, had more.

But it's not only success that the Busch brothers share. Controversy seems to follow them both, too

Already this season, Kyle Busch has felt singled out for criticism about his driving style in the season's opening events at Daytona. Then, last weekend in a Busch Series race in Mexico City, he drew the ire of fans there for an incident with Michel Jourdain.

There have been some instances where I've put my car in situations where maybe I should have thought a little bit differently about," Kyle Busch said. "But that's any driver. ... It's all about trying to gain respect, that's something that's important to me. I hope I've done a great enough job on that. I'm only in the start of my second year, so there's still a little bit more to

has his own situation to deal with. Roush Racing suspended him for the final two races of 2005 for an incident near Phoenix International Raceway in which he got a traffic citation. Kurt agreed to do community service as a result of that incident, but also finds himself dealing with the public relations backlash of that now that he's in his new ride, the No. 2 Dodges owned by Penske Racing

"I've tried so hard to try to fit in but I have kept kicking my own self in the shin," Kurt said. "I'm just trying now to develop relationships.

"I was just here to race race cars. I came up through the ranks so fast that I never really developed relationships with people because I bounced from one series to the next. Now that I'm here (in the Nextel Cup series), I realize that this isn't just about racing anymore. It's about

the relationships around you.'

The one relationship Kurt doesn't have to worry about, though, is the one he has with Kyle.

"Kurt and I have a tremendous amount of respect for each other," Kyle Busch said. "But there is always a sibling rivalry there, of course. The younger brother always wants to go out and outdo the older brother, so I've had that on me for a-long time.

"Kurt kind of paved the way for me to get up here and knocked down a bunch of trees for me. Now that I am (racing in the Nextel Cup), I have to be able to make sure that I can do the job at hand as well as anybody else can."

In November 2005, as Kurt sat out, Kyle won at Phoenix International Raceway and in victory lane dedicated his performance to his brother and his family's name. Later, he walked out of a postrace media session when questions about the incident that led to Kurt's suspension ticked him off, although he later returned to complete the in-

With wins at Phoenix and California, nothing would please Kyle Busch more than to complete a sweep of the West Coast ovals by winning on his hometown track this weekend.

"It means a lot to us that Kurt and myself ca c from basically nowhere," he says. "Nobody has ever heard of a race car driver who was born or grew up in Las Vegas. It's a little different story from the older NASCAR days were, where everybody was on the East Coast. I think

One of the pictures that Kurt has kept from his adolescence shows him and his hobby stock car sitting in a gravel parking lot outside a short track on the grounds of what is now Las Vegas Motor Speedway.

Behind him, you can see the construction cranes and part of the shell of the 1.5-mile superspeedway's grandstands going up.

"Las Vegas is a unique town to represent," Busch says. "It has a different feel. Everybody knows about Vegas, but the tough part with it is that everybody is shipped in from different areas. Nobody's 'from' Vegas. But I am."

ple tell me is that this is, and has been from the start, a done deal. The NASCAR Hall of Fame? Kansas City, here it comes.


So, yes, I was wrong about the outcome. I also apparently was
