YMCA begins testing program for safety of young swimmers

This year, the YMCA is celebrating the 100th anniversary of group swim lessons. Tens of millions of people have learned how to swim at their local Y since George Corsan of the Detroit YMCA revolutionized the teaching approach by starting instruction on land and in groups.

In February, the YMCA of Big Spring began a testing program in the spirit of Corsan's vision. For all persons using

the pool who are age 17 or under, a test is required before they are allowed to swim in the YMCA pool.

"They have to swim a distance of 75 feet, which is the length of the pool or across and back," said Barry Barnett, program director.

Those who pass will be given a green arm band signifying their successful completion of

Rebates!

Sales tax rebates see 30 percent increase for Howard County

Sales tax rebates for March were up statewide and throughout the Crossroads area again, according to the State Comptroller's Office. The good news includes Big Spring.

Big Spring received \$387,877.23 for the month, pushing the year's total past the million-dollar mark already. The rebate was an impressive 30.28 percent increase when compared to the \$297,706.46 the city received in March 2005. For the year, the Howard County seat has received \$1,301,717.33 — up 25.78 percent compared to a year ago.

Coahoma enjoyed a 28.15 percent hike in sales tax rebates, comparing the \$5,048.02 received this month to the \$3,938.98 taken in for March 2005. So far in 2006, Coahoma has received \$16,180.83, up 27.38 percent.

Forsan's sales tax rebates took a dip last month of just under 9 percent, but soared for March to an increase of

159.25 percent. The city received \$12,887.40, compared to \$4,970.99 for March 2005. For the year thus far, Forsan has received \$22,989.33, a figure ahead of last year's pace by 27.49 percent.

Abilene brought home \$3,540,745.29 this month, up 11.21 percent compared to the \$3,183,663.58 that came in for March 2005. Abilene has received \$5,815,384.00 this year, up 11.46 percent.

Andrews, which increased its sales tax in November, witnessed another expected hike of 137.54 percent, comparing March 2006 rebates of \$177,389.34 to March 2005 rebates of \$74,676.28. For the year, Andrews has received \$578,489.72, up 136.83 percent.

Brownfield took in \$73,991.04 this month, a 23.59 percent increase when compared to the \$59,867.71 taken in for March 2005. Through three months of 2006, Brownfield has received \$258,011.24, up 23.71 percent.

April 13 deadline to register for city, school vote

Big Spring, Stanton boast contested elections in May

Area residents planning to cast their ballots in the May 13 elections must be registered to vote by April 13, as contests in Big Spring, Coahoma and Stanton begin to take shape.

April 13 will be the last day for area voters to register with their respective counties to take part in municipal and school board elections, according to Sandra Bloom, election administrator for Howard County.

"The registration deadline for any election is 30 days prior to the election day," said Bloom. "If they haven't received their card or aren't sure if they're registered, all they have to do is come by the office. They can fill out the voter registration card and their card should be mailed to them in time for the May 13 election."

Unemployment up slightly

Unemployment was up a bit in January for Howard County, according to statistics from the Texas Workforce Commission.

Unemployment was at 5.9 percent, calculated from figures showing a county labor force of 13,061, or which 12,295 were employed. The

rate is up from 5 percent in December, but slightly lower than the January 2005 rate, which was at 6.2 percent for Howard County.

Mary Gregg, assistant area manager, said the increase from December to January could be attributed to holiday seasonal jobs ending after Jan. 1.

Neighboring county unemployment rates include

Andrews, 4.1 percent; Borden, 4.4 percent; Dawson, 6.8 percent; Ector, 4.3 percent; Glasscock, 4.6 percent; Martin, 5.7 percent; and Midland, 3.5 percent. The Permian Basin rate for January was 4.4 percent, while the rate statewide was 5.3 percent.

"At present, we have 86 job openings in the WorkInTexas.com system

that we are trying to fill for Howard County employers," said Gregg. "Some of these positions offer good opportunity for training and advancement."

"Unemployed workers are encouraged to register for services in our office or at WorkInTexas.com," she added. "Those receiving

Bush urges stead cours

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush Saturday urged Americans in Iraq to end recent civil strife motivated by warring tribal factions to quickly set up a tentative government.

"Our ambassador in Iraq, Zalmay Khalilzad, reports that the violence has created a new urgency among leaders to form a new unity government quickly as possible," Bush said in his radio address.

"I urge them to continue their work to put their differences to rest out across political and sectarian lines and to form a government that can confront the terrorist threat and ensure trust and confidence in Iraq."

Bush's broadcast in advance of a special session of the U.S. House of Representatives on Monday is the second in a series of remarks marking Sunday's 30th anniversary of the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq. In the speech, Bush discussed how the United States is working with various sectors of

Bombs, bullets kill Shiites on pilgrim

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The Muslim pilgrim road to the holy city of Karbala was a high-bullet and bomb-riddled zone Sunday as Shiites and roadside bombings killed or wounded 19 people, ratcheting up the sectarian fighting in Iraq.

Security forces in Iraq Sunday morning, girded for more bloodshed as the Shiite shrine was up to Monday's Shab-e-Nehd. And not far from Baghdad, in the Triangle, a two-operation involving U.S. and Iraqi forces swept through a near-Samarra insurgent base.

It was in Samarra the insurgent bomb killed a Shiite shrine last week, igniting days of violence between Shiite and Sunni Muslims. More than 100 people died.

Authorities had new attacks as thousands of people dressed in white and carrying banners, converged on Karbala, 50 miles from the capital, for the 30th anniversary of the final mourning for Hussein, the Prophet Muhammad's grandson.

Bush urges steady course

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Saturday braced Americans for more bloodshed in Iraq but said recent civil strife has motivated warring political factions to move quickly to set up a representative government.

"Our ambassador to Iraq, Zal Khalilzad, reports that the violence has created a new sense of urgency among these leaders to form a national unity government as quickly as possible," Bush said in his weekly radio address.

"I urge them to continue their work to put aside their differences, to reach out across political, religious and sectarian lines, and to form a government that can confront the terrorist threat and earn the trust and confidence of all Iraqis."

Bush's broadcast came in advance of a speech he plans to deliver in Cleveland on Monday, the second in a series of talks marking Sunday's three-year anniversary of the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq. In the speech, Bush will discuss how the United States is working with various sectors of Iraqi

society to defeat terrorists, restore calm and help rebuild homes and communities.

The president said victory in Iraq will come when terrorists and loyalists of former Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein no longer threaten Iraq's democracy, when Iraqi security forces can ensure safety for citizens and terrorists can't call Iraq home.

"More fighting and sacrifice will be required to achieve this victory," he told listeners.

Democrats are calling on Bush to provide more leadership to unify fighting political sectors in Iraq and prevent the nation from spiraling into civil strife. The Feb. 22 bombing of a Shiite mosque and subsequent violence led to the deaths of hundreds of people and pushed the country to the brink of civil war between rival sects.

According to the latest AP-Ipsos poll, more than three-fourths of Americans, 77 percent, say they think a civil war

is likely in Iraq. Seventy percent of Republicans and 90 percent of Democrats felt that way. People are evenly split on whether they think a stable, democratic government will be formed in Iraq.

Bush has said that as Iraqi security forces step up, U.S. troops will be able to stand down. But critics of the administration's handling of the war say that the Iraqis must be told that the American military will not be in Iraq forever.

Protests mark 3rd anniversary of Iraq invasion

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Anti-war protesters marched in Australia, Asia, Turkey and Europe on Saturday in demonstrations that marked the third anniversary of the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq with a demand that coalition troops pull out.

Around 500 protesters marched through central Sydney, chanting "End the war now" and "Troops out of Iraq." Many campaigners waved placards branding President Bush the "World's No. 1 Terrorist" or expressing concerns that Iran could be the next country to face invasion.

"Iraq is a quagmire and has been a humanitarian disaster for the Iraqis," said Jean Parker, a member of the Australian branch of the Stop the War Coalition, which organized the march. "There is no way forward without ending the occupation."

Opposition to the war is still evident in Australia, which has some 1,300 troops in and around Iraq. Visiting Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice was heckled by campaigners in Sydney this week, who said she had "blood on her hands."

But Saturday's protest was small compared to the mass demonstrations

that swept across the country in the buildup to the invasion — the largest Australia had seen since joining U.S. forces in the Vietnam War.

The turnout also was lower than protesters had hoped in Britain, whose government has been the United States' strongest supporter in the war.

Authorities shut down streets in the heart of London's shopping and theater district for the demonstration, which organizers had predicted would attract up to 100,000 people, but police estimated the crowd was about 15,000 people.

Some protesters carried posters calling Bush a terrorist and other placards pictured Prime Minister Tony Blair, saying "Blair must go!" Britain has about 8,000 soldiers in Iraq but plans to pull out 800 by May.

"We are against this war, both for religious reasons and on a humanitarian basis, too. No one deserves to be bombed," said one marcher, student Imran Saghir, 25. In Tokyo, about 2,000 people rallied in a downtown park.

"The war is illegal under international law," said Takeshiko Tsukushi, a member of World Peace Now, which helped plan the rally.

Bombs, bullets greet Shiites on pilgrimage

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — The Muslim pilgrims' road to the holy city of Karbala was a highway of bullets and bombs for Shiites. Drive-by shootings and roadside and bus bombs killed or wounded 19 people, ratcheting up the sectarian tensions gripping Iraq.

Security forces, including U.S. armored reinforcements, girded for more bloodshed leading up to Monday's Shiite holiday. And north of Baghdad, in the Sunni Triangle, a two-day-old operation involving 1,500 U.S. and Iraqi troops swept through an area near Samarra in search of insurgents.

It was in Samarra that the insurgent bombing of a Shiite shrine last month ignited days of violence between Shiite and Sunni Muslims. More than 500 people died.

Authorities had feared new attacks as tens of thousands of Shiites, many dressed in black and carrying religious banners, converge on Karbala, 50 miles south of the capital, for Monday's 40th and final day of mourning for Imam Hussein, the Prophet Muhammad's grandson.

Mourners gather to bid Milosevic farewell

BELGRADE, Serbia-Montenegro (AP) — Tens of thousands of mourners packed a square in front of Belgrade's federal parliament building Saturday to bid a final farewell to Slobodan Milosevic, who died while on U.N. trial for some of Europe's worst atrocities

since World War II.

A crowd estimated by authorities at around 40,000 people — many clutching photographs of the late Serbian leader and shouting "Slobo the Serb!" — gathered around a large, red-carpeted outdoor stage.

As Milosevic's coffin was placed on a bier draped in a burgundy cloth, the crowd erupted into chants of "Slobo! Slobo!"

Many wept uncontrollably in an outpouring of collective grief as a death march blared from loudspeakers. About 200 supporters rushed the stage in a scramble to get closer to the coffin before they were restrained by security guards.

Some carried Serbian flags or banners of Milosevic's Socialist Party, which organized his private funeral after authorities refused to approve an official state ceremony. Others held photos of Bosnian Serb wartime leader Radovan Karadzic and Gen. Ratko Mladic, who top the U.N. war crimes tribunal's most-wanted list.

Judge admits evidence in Moussaoui trial

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — The death-penalty trial of al-Qaida conspirator Zacarias Moussaoui is back on track after a judge reversed course and agreed to admit some evidence about aviation security.

U.S. District Judge Leonie M. Brinkema relented Friday from her earlier order barring all such testimony. She had issued that ruling Tuesday as punishment

for the alleged misconduct of Transportation Security Administration lawyer Carla J. Martin, who coached witnesses.

"It would be unfortunate if this case could not go forward to some final resolution," Brinkema told trial attorneys in a telephone conference. Moussaoui is the only person charged in this country in connection with the al-Qaida terror network's Sept. 11, 2001, attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

The trial, begun March 6 and suspended for a week to deal with the misconduct, is to resume Monday with the jury back in court.

Ex-con charged in S.C. 'dungeon' rapes

HARTSVILLE, S.C. (AP) — Exhausted and thirsty after apparently hiding in woods for four days, a convicted sex offender was captured about one mile from his home, where police say he bound and raped two teenage girls in an underground room.

As the manhunt took its toll on Kenneth G. Hinson, he emerged at the back door of a relative's home Friday and asked for water. The relative gave it to him and then called 911. One minute later, Hinson, who was carrying a loaded handgun, was arrested without incident.

Hinson, 47, assured authorities his relatives had not tried to hide him. "No, they're not harboring, I just come up to the back window," Hinson said in a videotape of his arrest that aired on WIS-TV in Columbia.

The two 17-year-old girls were taken from their nearby home late Monday and assaulted in a room under a shed on Hinson's property, police said. The girls were left bound inside the room but managed to wriggle free and walk to safety.

Woman crashes truck into N.M. clinic

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — In an instant, stunned witnesses watched as a pickup truck plowed through a plate glass window into the waiting room of a medical clinic at a strip mall, triggering screams inside and sending debris everywhere. Three people were killed in Friday's crash, including the receptionist and a mother and her teenage son.

Eight others, including the driver, were injured, police said.

"That truck was flying," said witness Jimmy Ramsey, who was heading out of a nearby coffee shop when he saw it smash through the store front.

Ramsey, the manager of a dry cleaning store in the strip mall, said he "could

see stuff flying everywhere. It was a very hard impact."

Missouri drama teacher resigns in play flap

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — A central Missouri high school drama teacher whose spring play was canceled after complaints about tawdry content in one of her previous productions will resign rather than face a possible firing.

"It became too much to not be able to speak my mind or defend my students without fear or retribution," said Fulton High School teacher Wendy DeVore.

DeVore's students were to perform Arthur Miller's "The Crucible," a drama set during the 17th Century Salem witch trials.

But after a handful of Callaway Christian Church members complained about scenes in the fall musical "Grease" that showed teens smoking, drinking and kissing, Superintendent Mark Enderle told DeVore to find a more family-friendly substitute.

Random thoughts while alphabetizing my DVD collection:

You know Big Springers are used to expecting the worst when good news comes as a surprise.

It's not that we don't have our reasons to feel pessimistic every now and then. This town, God bless its soul, has been on the receiving end of more than its share of bad news the past few decades.

Webb closing, the oil bust, drought, businesses closing, population declining ... stop me if you've heard all this before.

So, what to make of all this good news all of a sudden?

Three news items in the past few weeks — two on the economic front and one in the sports world — have folks around town feeling a little bit better about things.

The first bit of good news came on the farm front. Just in case you're not a farmer, or don't know a farmer or don't know anyone who knows a farmer, let me be the first to clue you in on a news flash: This year's cotton harvest is a doozy.

It's big. Huge. Record-breaking.

All that and a bag of chips, too. After years of talking to area farmers, I have learned that they are second to none when it comes to bad-mouthing their fortunes.

Again, this is understandable. After the last few years of steady drought, sub-standard cotton harvests have become the rule, rather than the exception.

But even on the rare year when the harvest was good, farmers I

talked to would always bemoan the fact that "it could have been better," or "we could have used a little more rain" or "prices could have been a little higher."

However, when I began my annual round of telephone calls this year, asking farmers how things were going, comments ranged from "things are looking pretty good" to "this is the best crop I ever had."

That's when I knew we had a tremendous cotton crop on our hands.

And "tremendous" is entirely appropriate in describing this year's harvest. It is, quite simply, the best on record.

Ever. Fine, I hear you saying, whoopie for the farmers. What does that mean to me?

Lots. After Webb Air Force Base closed in the 1970 and the oil boom went belly up in the 1980s, this area became critically dependent on agriculture. As the cotton crop, so went we, in other words.

I'll leave the economists to decide exactly how many millions of dollars a good cotton crop means to a community, but suffice it to say that when farmers in this area are smiling, the rest of us should follow suit.

Then there's the Heritage Square deal.

Announced recently, the project aims to reconvert a number of downtown buildings into a variety of uses such as apartment complexes, condominiums, restaurants and other commercial venues.

Developer Ralph Mahoney said the project will do no less than "revitalize downtown." And, if you've driven through the area recently, you know it's in desperate need of revitalization.

The news was greeted with a healthy dose of skepticism. After all, we've heard more than our

share of "pie in the sky" promises from various developers over the years.

What makes me optimistic this time is that Mahoney and his group are financing the project completely through private donations.

No public money is involved. None.

OK, that still doesn't mean that anything will come from the project, or that Mahoney's promises will bear fruit. But it does mean that, if worse comes to worse, we'll be in the same shape as we were before the announcement.

And if this thing works? Hoo, boy. You won't be able to wipe the smile off people's faces with a sledgehammer.

And finally, there's the news about the Hawks. I don't even have to preface that by saying Howard College. Or mention anything about basketball. You know what I'm talking about.

The Hawks, for those of you just emerging from your bomb shelters, are heading to the national junior college basketball tournament for the first time in more than 30 years.

Imagine, a team from Big Spring, competing for a national title. Ain't that a kick in the head?

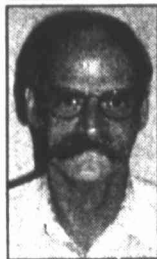
Regardless of how the tournament goes, you just know they'll do Big Spring proud.

Frist shifts focus to health care

Even with the ill-fated Dubai ports deal now sinking out of sight, Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist

is bracing for a difficult few months. The Tennessee Republican faces

more pressure to post legislative victories, because the GOP congressional majority is running out of time to improve the political climate before the November midterm election.

His ability to produce may be diminishing, as President Bush's low poll numbers encourage more Capitol Hill Republicans to demonstrate independence from the White House — as Frist himself did in denouncing the Dubai takeover.

"With the president right now being down, I expect there will be more separation," Frist said over breakfast in his Capitol office. "That makes my job a lot harder."

As he navigates these crosscurrents, Frist wants to steer the Senate toward four issues: lobbying rules, immigration, the federal budget and military spending. But Frist is stepping down from the Senate at year end, fulfilling his pledge to serve only two terms. As he looks beyond the Senate, toward the possibility of a bid for the GOP presidential nomination in 2008, he is shifting his sights toward another issue long slighted in Washington: a fundamental revision of health care.

Frist, a heart surgeon, is one of the few practicing physicians to serve in the Senate. His medical background hasn't always been a political blessing. It led last year to his lowest moment in office, when he challenged the diagnosis of doctors who said Terri Schiavo was in a "persistent vegetative state," only to see their assessment confirmed by the autopsy performed after the brain-damaged Florida woman died.

But with his interest and expertise, Frist has left a mark on issues from the fight against AIDS in Africa to the Medicare prescription-drug bill. Often on these projects he's teamed with Democrats; last year, the Senate approved legislation he sponsored with Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, D-N.Y., to

promote greater use of electronic medical records that can follow patients through their lives.

Now Frist is pursuing bigger changes. In a recent speech to the Detroit Economic Club, Frist urged a comprehensive restructuring of Medicare, the federal program that provides health care to about 42 million seniors.

He proposed reshaping it around six basic principles.

Three are political apple pie: increasing prevention efforts, improving management of chronic diseases and updating information technology.

His next two ideas are only somewhat more controversial: He wants to apply greater means-testing so that more affluent seniors pay more for care. And he wants to tie doctors' compensation to the results they produce for patients. His last idea throws down the gauntlet: Frist wants to

allow private insurers to compete more directly with the government in providing health care to seniors.

Frist says that approach, which he's been touting since President Clinton's second term, will increase "choice ... value and quality" while restraining costs. Critics say it would convert Medicare from a program in which Washington guarantees seniors a defined benefit to one in which it guarantees only a defined contribution that could leave many with inadequate care.

Washington isn't likely to provide private insurance companies a larger role in Medicare until they prove they can smooth out their administration of the new prescription-drug benefit.

But the sweep of Frist's Medicare agenda is a sign that he's thinking big on an issue like-

ly to loom big in 2008. The same is true on the broader problem of covering the nearly 46 million people in America without health insurance.

Frist likes Bush's emphasis on tax-favored health savings accounts that aim to make patients more careful consumers by encouraging them to pay more routine medical costs out of pocket. But, he says, such accounts are not the answer for the uninsured. "Most people don't want to make too many choices in health care," Frist says.

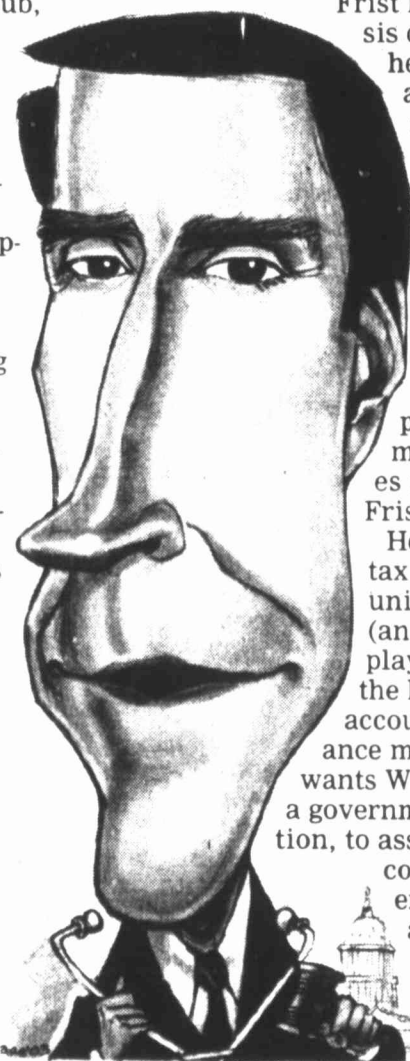
He wants to provide tax credits to help the uninsured buy coverage (an idea Bush has played down to focus on the health savings accounts). To make insurance more affordable, Frist wants Washington, through a government-backed corporation, to assume most of the cost for the most expensive patients — an idea Bush denounced when Sen. John F. Kerry, D-Mass., offered a variation on it in his

2004 presidential campaign. Frist says any health-care overhaul won't succeed unless the nation can control costs by "decreasing the burden of disease." Toward that end, he wants Congress to loosen the restrictions that Bush imposed on stem cell research.

On health care, the challenge for all Republicans is to find solutions that express their faith in the free market without unraveling the collective safety net of public and private social insurance that most Americans have shown that they prize.

Frist has a surgeon's steady hands, but he will need a politician's supple touch to thread that needle.

Willful, Jeez! What more proof do we need than to question the validity of the TCJS executive

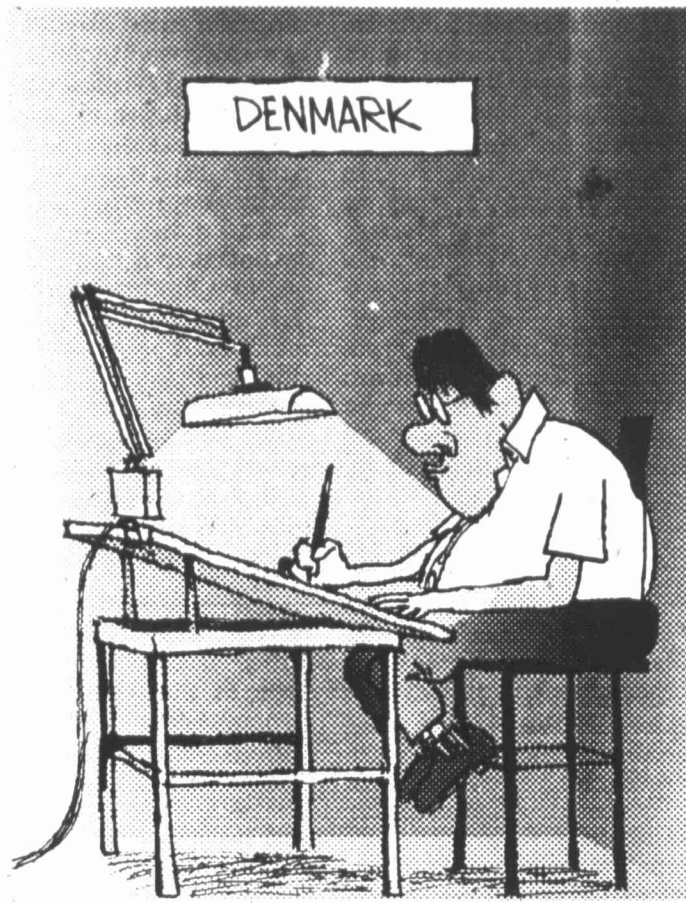
director, Terry Julian, when he tells them that in essence, the 96-bed proposal amounts to a Band-Aid fix? This is a man who has crunched the numbers and projected into the needs of our very near future. The concrete won't even be dry before those beds are filled and we will be looking for space to house the overflow.

I guarantee you that housing these inmates out of house will be more costly than it is today. We are not the only community experiencing this, and so space will go at a premium. It would also be interesting to know how much higher construction costs have escalated since they started hemming and hawing about doing this. Had they been as conservative as they want to appear they would have made plans when they were first given a pass on this failing jail. Instead, they squandered those passes into a mandate today.

I wonder if citizens are aware of the past attempt by the city to go in together on a combined law enforcement center. In the mid 90s when I was on the city council under city manager Lambert, he attempted to negotiate but Commissioner Bill Crooker gave him a resounding "no."

Time and space are limited but someone needs to ask questions of both governing bodies about what the savings would mean to all of the citizens. I am not in the jail business but I have a great respect for what they represent and the job they do. I think I know enough to realize that some county inmates go through the city jail before being transferred to county. In the same building, all transactions would be handled without using gasoline to transfer. I don't know about you but in this economy gasoline prices are becoming prohibitive. Also, 911 would be housed in the same building at a savings of tax dollars for both city and county. If what I heard from other citizens is true, Mr. Lambert's attempt to open up dialogue was not the only time. I can only be positive about my own experience.

There is no doubt that space will have to be created. Another concern of mine is the suggested location. If all goes as commissioners would like, it will be across from the courthouse in what was once a pharmacy. We have a project that involved a donation of \$8 million and the works are under way as I write. The idea is to bring people in

The training classes, which are scheduled for March 27 through April 1, provide 40 hours of classes that will teach the volunteers how to respond in a crisis call as well as crisis intervention in the event of all areas of violent crime, from domestic violence to sexual assault to adult and child sexual assault to robbery and homicide.

intensive training on how to answer crisis calls for the shifts they will man as a part of the Victim Services team.

"We really make our volunteers part of our team; they are that important. They need to have good listening skills, because more than 80 percent of what they do is answer calls and listen to a person who might not be ready to take that next step, a person who just needs someone to listen," Perez said.

The purpose of a volun-

teer/advocate for Victim Services is to help reduce the trauma of a victim and their family members, to provide emotional support and information and to make referrals to the proper agencies, whether it is law enforcement or medical professionals.

The volunteers also provide crisis intervention techniques for callers and may also provide on-hand support through medical, law enforcement or criminal justice procedures.

A VS volunteer is

required to be on call for two shifts each month, or more, and shifts are 6 a.m. until 6 p.m. and 6 p.m. until 6 a.m. A staff person is always on call with the volunteer.

"And a volunteer never responds to a home without law enforcement and the approval of a staff member. The majority of the position is phone intervention," she said.

The 40-hour training is set in the evenings, from 5:30 p.m. until about 9 p.m. Monday through Friday, March 27-31, with

the training concluding Saturday, April 1 from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m.

Once trained, the volunteers carry cell phone provided by VS for their shifts each month. Evenings are when most of the shifts occur, as staff members are at the center during the day.

"And I also do the training at night, so those individuals who work can attend to become a volunteer," she said.

There is no cost for the training and those completing the training

receive a certificate of training from VS. Along with the application, prospective volunteers are also interviewed by VS staff and a criminal background check is conducted.

"Even if a person goes through the training and decides this is not for them, the education is so important. So many people do not know we're here or what we do until they need us," she said.

the test. A red arm band will be given to those who don't pass or refuse to take the test and they will be restricted to the shallow end.

"The arm bands help the lifeguards know who can and cannot swim," said Barnett.

Once a child has passed the swim test, his name is added to the YMCA data base and is issued an identification card.

The pool rules also stipulate that non-swimmers (those who haven't taken the test) or children under 8 must be accompanied by a person at least 16 years old and will have to remain within arms reach of them at all times when they are in the pool.

The test is free and if the first attempt fails it can be taken again until the child passes.

"They can take it again at any time, but it is usually best to wait four to six weeks," said Barnett.

State will argue to restore dropped charges against DeLay

AUSTIN (AP) Embattled Rep. DeLay will move a closer this week resolving felony charges against him, but the appeals court hearing may remind voters about his legal troubles at a time when DeLay is trying to win election to Congress.

Wednesday, prosecutors will try to convince the 3rd Court of Appeals to restore the criminal conspiracy and laundering charges against DeLay that he lost his post as majority leader last year.

DeLay also has other money laundering charges against him. State District Judge Pat Priest dismissed conspiracy charges, saying the conspiracy law allegedly violated the time-off prosecutors say DeLay did. Both sides argue their cases in the court Wednesday.

Richard Murray, director of the Center for Public Policy at the University of Houston, said the prosecution appeal helps "draw a case out and the congressman really doesn't need that."

"Tom DeLay in this case to move forward to a favorable resolution before the November election," Murray said.

DeLay faces a re-election bid for Rep. Nick Lampson's Nov. 7 general election. It's the first time in years he's faced a serious contender for voters sent him to Congress in 1984.

Richard Murray, director of the Center for Public Policy at the University of Houston, said the prosecutors' appeal helps "drag this case out and the congressman really doesn't need that."

"Tom DeLay needs this case to move forward to a favorable resolution before November," Murray said. DeLay faces former Rep. Nick Lampson in the Nov. 7 general election. It's the first time in years he's faced a serious contender since voters sent him to Congress in 1984.

Lampson, a well-funded Democrat, was ousted from office two years ago after congressional voting districts were redrawn to favor Republican candidates.

DeLay designed the voting map and his charges stem from a campaign finance scheme that helped the GOP gain control over the Texas Legislature, which in turn adopted the map and helped Republicans tighten their grip on Congress.

Prosecutors allege that DeLay and two associates funneled \$190,000 in restricted corporate money to seven state Republican legislative candidates in 2002. The scheme allowed them to circumvent Texas law prohibiting spending corporate money in campaigns, prosecutors allege.

Perry calls special session on school finance

AUSTIN — With a court-ordered deadline looming, Gov. Rick Perry on Friday announced a 30-day special session starting next month to devise a new way for Texas taxpayers to pay for the \$33 billion public education system.

The session will start April 17, giving lawmakers a narrow time frame to find a solution. Last year, the Texas Supreme Court ruled that the state's dependence on local property taxes is unconstitutional and must be changed by June 1.

If the June deadline isn't met, the court ordered the state to stop sending money to Texas' 1,037 public school districts until a new tax plan is implemented.

"This special session provides legislators of both parties a rare opportunity to significantly reduce property taxes, make substantial reforms to the franchise tax so it is fairer and broader, and

ensure our schools have a reliable and constitutional stream of revenue," Perry said.

It will be the fourth special session Perry has called on the issue in the last two years. All have ended in gridlock and failure.

"We are confident that when we convene for the upcoming special session, we will meet the threshold of the Texas Supreme Court in solving the public school finance, and we are looking forward to working closely with the governor and lieutenant governor on this issue," said Chris Cutrone, a spokesman for Republican House Speaker Tom Craddick of Midland.

A special commission appointed by Perry is preparing recommendations for the Legislature, which include a revised business tax, a new cigarette tax and use of \$1 billion from the state budget surplus. Former comptroller John Sharp, who leads the panel, has said an increased sales tax

would not be necessary to generate enough new money.

Those recommendations are expected to be presented by the end of March.

The money generated from the new taxes will offset more than \$5 billion that would be lost if school property taxes are cut by a third, as most lawmakers hope.

The court determined that school districts do

not have discretion to set their own property tax rates because the legal limit was the necessary rate in most cases. That makes the property tax cap a statewide tax, which is unconstitutional in Texas. Replacing the property tax money with funds from various new taxes would allow school districts more freedom to set tax rates, thus satisfying the court.

Perry said he will issue a proclamation later that outlines specific topics that lawmakers will be allowed to address during the session. The scope is expected to be limited to taxes rather than school reform efforts, despite the wishes of some other key Republicans.

"While I support lowering local school property taxes, which I believe is the right thing to do for the working families of Texas, we should not simply cut property taxes without improving our schools," said Republican Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst. "We favor tax relief and improved education. We

know we can do both."

School advocates have been lobbying for more state money in Texas K-12 schools, but lawmakers are not required by the court ruling to give schools any more money than is necessary for growth.

The new business tax could be another sticking point for lawmakers, many of whom might be hesitant to adopt a politically dangerous tax bill ahead of re-election challenges in November.

Already, the special session is being used as political ammunition.

"This should have been done months ago to give lawmakers the time they need to fix our unconstitutional school finance system," said Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, who plans to challenge Perry as an independent candidate. "In a Strayhorn administration, the children and the teachers will come first. In the misplaced priorities of a Perry administration, the special interests come first."

\$4 million in cocaine in trailer's support beams

LAREDO (AP) — A search of a tractor-trailer rig at an international bridge yielded \$4 million worth of cocaine, Customs officials announced Friday.

The nearly 280 pounds of cocaine turned up Thursday night in the support beams of a flatbed trailer being hauled into Texas,

authorities said.

The cocaine was found by officers during a secondary inspection, using special imaging tools, at the World Trade Bridge in Laredo.

Nobody was immediately arrested, said Customs and Border Protection spokesman Rick Pauza.

The federal investigation continues.

Film documents scout troop's efforts to break cycle of crime

AUSTIN — "Mommy!" Jessica yelps, as she yanks the letter from her mailbox. She leaps onto the chain-link fence that surrounds her yard and quickly climbs over, running inside to tear open the note.

"It's not easy thinking about you all the time," she reads aloud. "Send me some pictures. Tell everyone I said hi. I love you. God bless you. Mama."

Watching that scene, the opening of a documentary airing Tuesday on PBS, Ida Sutter can hardly believe she and her daughter survived the emotional rollercoaster of her three-year incarceration for heroin possession and driving under the influence.

She credits Troop 1500, an Austin-based chapter of Girl Scouts Beyond Bars that aims to break the cycle of crime in families through counseling, mentoring and fun activities. The scouting program was created in Maryland in 1992, and now serves about 900 school-age girls in about 40 troops in 22 states.

"I don't know what I would have done without the program," said Sutter, 42, who was released on parole in December and is now a stay-at-home mom. "They came up with some really good ideas of stuff to do together, to open up feelings and to deal with emotions that you're trying not to show."

Sutter and her 11-year-old daughter are one of four families profiled in "Troop 1500," airing

nationwide as part of PBS' Independent Lens series.

The film takes viewers inside the Hilltop Prison in Gatesville, about 80 miles north of Austin, where the girls visit their mothers once a month. It also follows the girls home, where their fathers, stepfathers and grandmothers try to rebuild family lives fractured by drugs and violence.

The girls capture the most poignant footage with their own cameras, interviewing their mothers with innocent yet provocative questions like "Why are you in prison?"

"It's not just the answers to the questions ... it's the gestures, it's the silence," filmmaker Ellen Spiro said. "It's the relationship between the mothers and the daughters that you really see in a way unfold that wouldn't have been possible had it just been the asking questions."

While anecdotal evidence suggests the children of inmates are more likely to end up in prison themselves, little research has been done to prove that.

A 1989 study by the American Correctional Association found about half of the girls in the nation's juvenile detention centers had a parent

who had been incarcerated, said Denise Johnston, director of the California-based Center for Children of Incarcerated Parents.

Other studies have found that prisoners' children are more likely to have low self-esteem and depression, to struggle academically and to behave inappropriately at home or at school, according to the Urban Institute, an economic and social policy research group.

But, Johnston pointed out, the children of inmates face an array of challenges, such as poverty, discrimination and educational barriers, making it hard to discern the effect of the parent's criminal record.

Troop 1500 provides several services designed to help its 25 active members overcome those obstacles. Group therapy is an integral part of most meetings — held three times a month at either at the University of Texas at Austin, the Hilltop Prison or on an Austin-area field trip — and the girls receive one-on-one counseling at school.

The moms engage in group therapy with and without their daughters, and participate in workshops on life skills such as building credit and writing a resume. Even after the women are released from prison, counselors help them find

work or get back their driver's licenses.

And every girl can participate until she's 18, whether or not her mom is behind bars. About 15 girls who don't need the intense therapy only come to holiday programs and summer trips.

It's a costly program, with the local area council spending about \$150,000 a year on the active members and their moms for counseling, transitional services and trips to places like Galveston or Six Flags Fiesta Texas. Funding mainly comes from individual donors and grants from local foundations.

But troop leader Julia Cuba sees the rewards every time she hears from one of the 25 girls who have outgrown the troop and begun building crime-free lives as young adults. None of them have been to prison.

"They're married, they're in school, they're having babies and starting families," Cuba said. "They're coming back to the program and providing mentorship and tutoring and role modeling for the other girls."

"Many of the girls have recognized where their mothers made mistakes and they have embraced their mothers but are deciding what they're going to do for themselves."

If you purchased a motor vehicle from a car dealership in the State of Texas between January 1, 1994 and December 27, 2005, you may be eligible to participate in a class action settlement.

What is this Notice About? This Notice is to inform you of a proposed Partial Class Action Settlement of a lawsuit pending against a number of Texas car dealerships. Plaintiffs claim that the Defendant car dealerships conspired to misrepresent the nature of ad valorem taxes when they recognized those taxes from customers by imposing a charge on the buyer's sales documents described by one of 29 specific items: (1) "Vehicle Inventory Tax" (2) "Veh. Tax" (19) "Veh. Inv. Tax" (20) "Inv. Tax" (21) "Veh. Inventory Tax" (22) "Ad Val. Tax" (23) "Ad valorem inventory tax" (24) "County ad valorem tax" (25) "State tax vehicle inventory tax" (26) "Special vehicle inventory tax" (27) "Value inventory tax" (28) "VIT" (29) "V.I. vehicle inventory tax". Some of the Defendants ("Settling Dealerships") have reached a settlement agreement with Plaintiffs. A list of the Settling Dealerships is available in the claim packet described below. The Settling Dealerships deny any wrongdoing and will vigorously defend the lawsuit if the Settlement is not approved. Nevertheless, to avoid the costs, risks, and uncertainty inherent in litigation of the Settling Dealerships have agreed to settle the lawsuit.

Who is Affected? With a few limited exceptions, customers who purchased new or used motor vehicles from Texas car dealerships between January 1, 1994 and December 27, 2005 and whose sales documents reflected a charge described by one of the 29 items above may be eligible to recover under the proposed partial class action settlement. If you did not pay an amount that was labeled using exactly one of those 29 terms, you are not a member of the class and not entitled to relief pursuant to this settlement.

What Are the Terms of the Settlement? The proposed settlement is with some but not all of the Defendants in this action, and it does not resolve any claims against the non-settling Defendants. The proposed settlement is the result of months of arm-length negotiations as well as the substantial investigation and discovery conducted by Plaintiffs' Counsel for all parties to the proposed settlement. Have fully approved the facts of this case. Eligible Class Members are entitled to relief as follows:

Category One Relief: Generally, customers who purchased from a Settling Defendant that was originally named as a defendant in the litigation and customers who purchased from other Settling Dealerships if the purchase was made after December 27, 2003 or later if the Settling Dealership became the name of the dealership after that date are eligible. Such Class Members, upon timely submission of a properly completed Claim Form (included in the claim packet described below) and the original or a copy of the Class Member's Retail Settlement Contract(s) or Purchase Order(s), will be entitled to receive a cash payment from the Settling Dealership that sold the vehicle at issue equal to 150% of the amount labeled with one of the twenty-nine terms listed above.

Category Two Relief: Class Members who are not entitled to Category One Relief will be entitled to a non-transferable Discount Certificate good for either \$40 or \$60 (depending on the time and location of original purchase) towards the purchase of a vehicle from the Settling Dealership upon timely submission of a properly completed Claim Form and an Affidavit of Entitlement to Discount Certificate (included in the claim packet described below), in which they must attest that they paid an amount described by one of the twenty-nine terms listed above. The Discount Certificate will be valid for a period of three years from the date of Final Approval of the settlement by the court.

Attorneys' Fees and Expenses: Counsel for the proposed

Exclusion: If the Settlement receives final approval from the Court, class members who do not request exclusion (see below) will release all claims related to the Settling Defendants' recoupment of their ad valorem taxes.

What Are My Options?

(A) File a Claim. Contact the settlement administrator in writing to request a claim packet which will provide you with the necessary materials and instructions to submit a claim to receive the appropriate compensation under the settlement. Address your request to Texas VIT Settlement Administrator, P.O. Box 4349, Portland, OR 97208-4349. You may also call to request a claim packet. The number is 866-833-6642.

(B) Request Exclusion from the Settlement Class. If you do not wish to be a Settlement Class Member, you must timely and properly submit a written request, which must include your name and address, and a statement that you want to be excluded from the Settlement Class. The request should be mailed to the Settlement Administrator (see address in previous paragraph). Please write or type the words "CLASS EXCLUSION NOTICE" on the lower left of the front of the envelope. The exclusion request must be postmarked no later than March 20, 2006. The Settlement, if approved, will bind all class members who do not request exclusion by this date.

(C) Hire Your Own Lawyer and Enter an Appearance. You may hire an attorney to appear in the lawsuit. You will be responsible for the fees and costs of your attorney.

(D) Object to the Settlement. Any Class Member who does not request exclusion may appear at the Fairness Hearing (see below) and show cause, if any, why any aspect of the proposed Settlement Agreement should not be approved as fair, reasonable, and adequate. To object and be heard at the Fairness Hearing, you must submit a written notice at least 30 days before the Fairness Hearing stating your intention to appear and providing all grounds for your objection, together with all supporting papers and briefs, if any. Include "Case Nos. 30-95 and 150-96" at the top of your notice and send it to: Marion County District Clerk, P.O. Box 628, Jefferson 75657, with copies to John Smithke, 320 S. Park, Ste. 1000-LB-5, Amarillo, TX 79101; and Beth Lewine, 725 12th St., W.W., Washington DC 20005. FAILURE TO FOLLOW THIS PROCESS WILL RESULT IN A WAIVER OF ANY OBJECTION.

The Fairness Hearing: The 115th District Court will hold a hearing on June 8, 2006, at 9:00 a.m., to determine (i) whether the proposed settlement is fair, reasonable, adequate and in the best interests of the Class, (ii) the reasonableness of the attorneys' fees sought by Class Counsel, and (iii) whether a Final Judgment should be entered approving the Settlement. The Court's decision is located at 102 W. Austin St., Jefferson, Texas 75657.

How Do I Get Additional Information? This is only an abbreviated summary of the proposed settlement. Complete information about your rights as a Class Member, how to make a claim or exclude yourself from the Settlement, and continuing litigation, and important dates and deadlines are available in the claim packet. VETERAN OF THE MONTH Flip of the coin keeps Morris out of combat

Virgil Morris didn't see combat during the Korean War, but it was close — coin-flipping close.

Morris, who is known as "Hoss" by his friends, was honored by the Hangar 25 Air Museum as its Veteran of the Month Tuesday night.

Morris is a retired welder who, well, welds in his spare time these days. But, back in 1947, he was a wide-eyed 17-year-old who joined the Air Force to see the world.

That lasted about 18 months, he said.

"My daddy got me out of the service because he couldn't get anyone to help him work the farm," Morris said.

So, it was back to the family plot in King County for Morris.

So much for military life, he thought.

It seems however, that the armed forces weren't finished with him just yet. In 1951, he received his draft notice and switched Air Force blue for Army green.

After completing basic training in Fort Dix, N.J., he went across the state to Fort Monmouth, where he served as a supply clerk in the Signal Corps.

The Korean War was raging at that time, and it looked like Morris might get called into action in that conflict.

"They told us ... that it was between me and

another supply clerk to see who went to Korea," he said. "I didn't want to volunteer, and neither did the other guy ... so I flipped him for it."

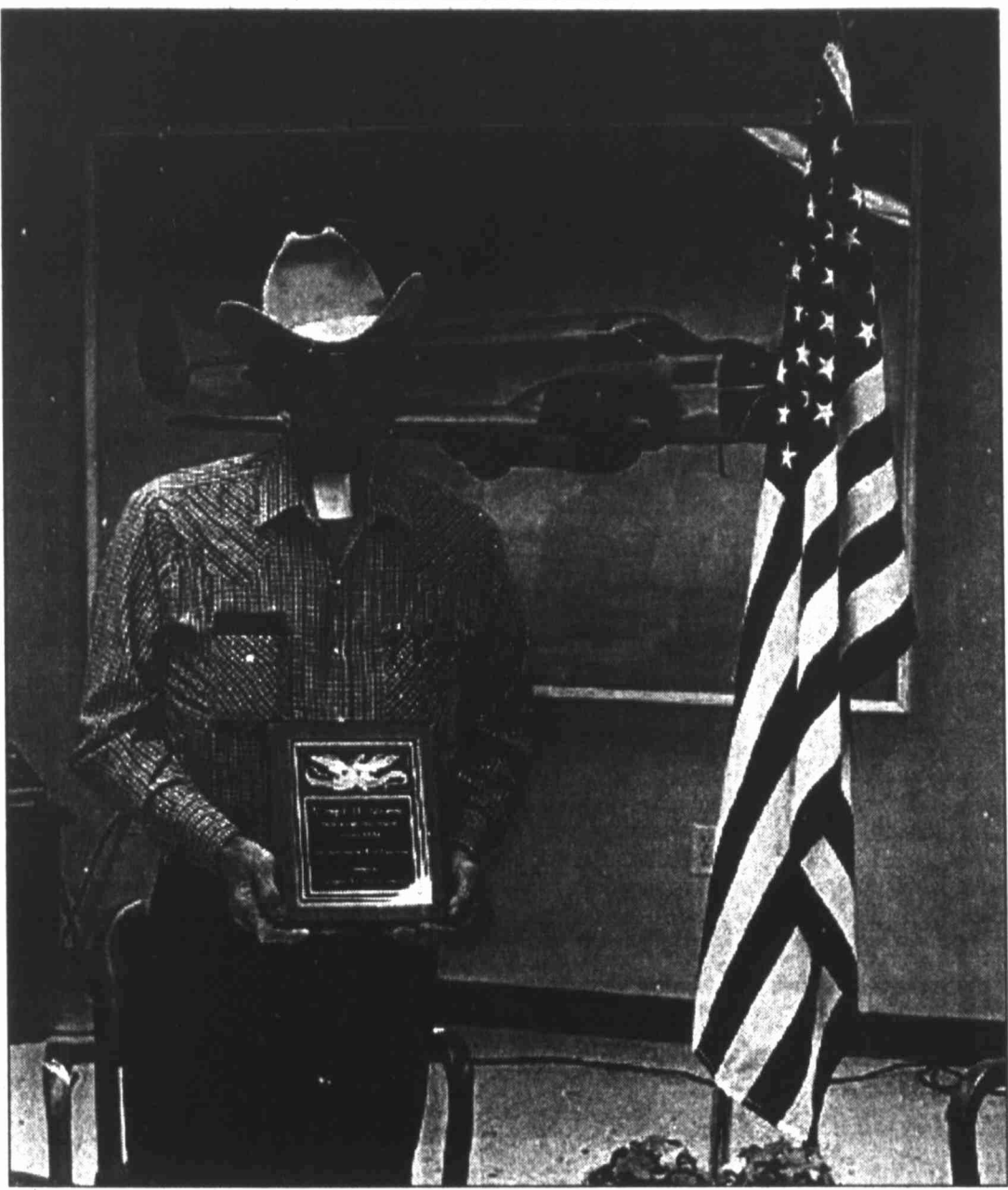
Morris won the toss, and the other supply clerk shipped out to Korea soon afterward.

"I don't know what happened to him," Morris said.

After his two-year second stint in the military,

Morris returned for awhile to King County and learned the welding trade.

That led him to Big Spring in the early 1980s, when he became a welder for OIL Co. during the height of the oil boom. When oil prices collapsed later in the decade, he went to work for the city of Big Spring, where he worked until he retired in 1995.

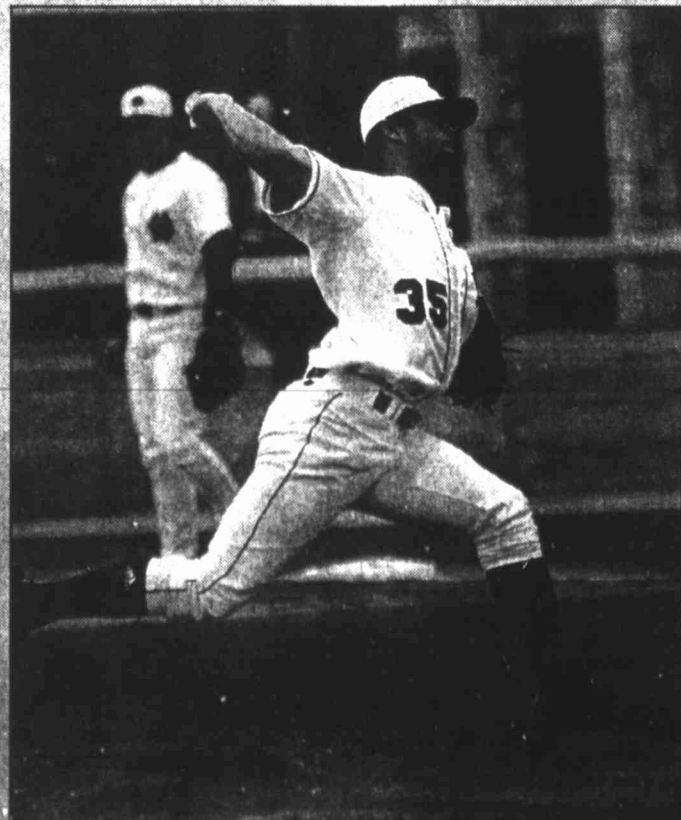

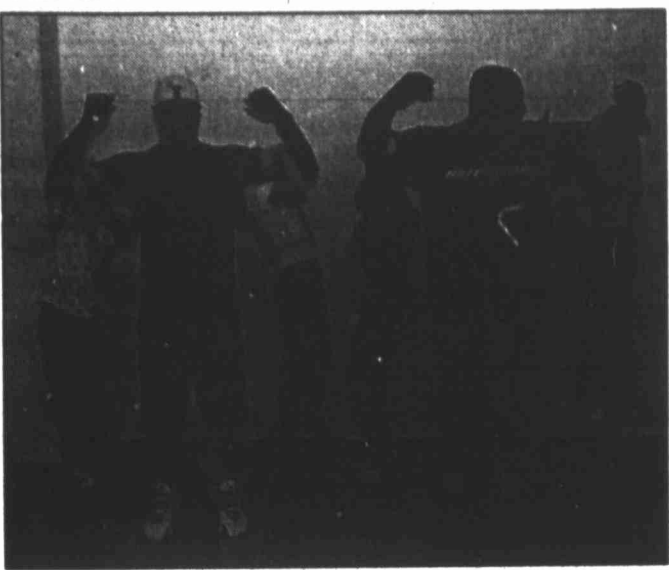

Cowboys close to signing WR Owens

IRVING — Jerry Jones built a billion-dollar fortune by taking big risks. Now he appears ready to take one of the biggest chances of his 17 years as owner of the Dallas Cowboys.

The Cowboys were close to completing a deal with volatile receiver Terrell Owens, an official involved in negotiations told The Associated Press on Saturday.

"It's headed in that direction," said the official, who requested anonymity because the contract wasn't finished.

Jones has been on vacation in the Caribbean, which could be part of the holdup. Neither he nor team spokesman Rich Dalrymple immediately returned messages left Saturday by The Associated Press.

Owens' usually talkative advisers are doing nothing to douse the story, adding to speculation an announcement is

imminent. Agent Drew Rosenhaus refused to comment Friday and didn't respond to repeated messages left Saturday.

Owens is among the best receivers in the NFL, but he's also been among the most divisive personalities in the game. He left San Francisco on bad terms and was released by Philadelphia last week after causing more turmoil.

The idea of Owens wearing a star on his helmet infuriates some Cowboys fans. They're fearful he will divide the locker room, and they're angry at Jones for pardoning Owens for the way he's treated the franchise.

Owens launched his flamboyant persona in September 2000 when he celebrated each of two touchdowns at Texas Stadium by running to the team's star logo at midfield. Safety George Teague secured a spot in team lore by decking Owens after the second one.

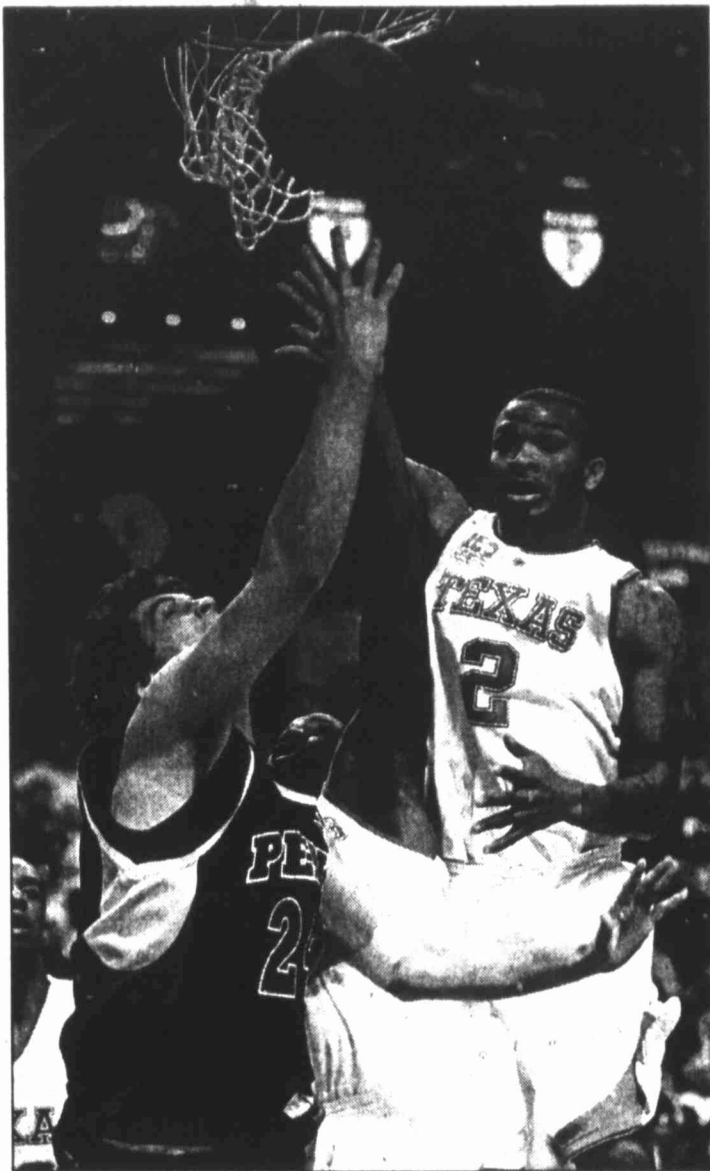

Four years ago, Texas advanced to the round of 16 as a No. 6 seed after winning its first two games in the same arena. The following season, the Horns used a weekend in San Antonio as a springboard to the Final Four.

Aldridge was recovering from a hip injury and Tucker was academically ineligible last March when the Longhorns lost to Nevada, only their fourth first-round loss in 15 NCAA trips since the tourney field expanded to 64 teams in 1985.

Undersized Penn seemed intent on making it two first-round losses in a row for the Longhorns.

The Quakers were unfazed by the crowd filled with burnt orange shirts, and were often deliberate with their shots.

"We were able to control the tempo and get the shots we wanted," said Mark Zoller, who had 13 points for Penn. "It came down to them making big plays."

Still, Penn gave its own contingency of only a couple hundred fans so much

to cheer about early that they even drowned out the Texas pep band during one timeout. The Longhorns faithful were quietly concerned.

Ibrahim Jaaber, the Ivy League's player of the year and top scorer, was only 5-of-19 shooting for 15 points.

Jaaber made only two of nine shots before halftime, but his free throw with 6 seconds left gave the Quakers a 23-22 lead.

Gibson was the first Texas guard to score, hitting a 3-pointer to open the second half before David Whitehurst scored a tying basket inside — all in the first minute. The Longhorns finally broke the 25-all tie, and went ahead for good on Aldridge's breakout layup with 16:37 left.

The Texas fans came to life, though they were cautiously enthusiastic until the consecutive layups by Gibson.

"I don't know what you guys expect. This is the NCAA Tournament," Barnes told a reporter who asked the coach if he was relieved or disappointed.

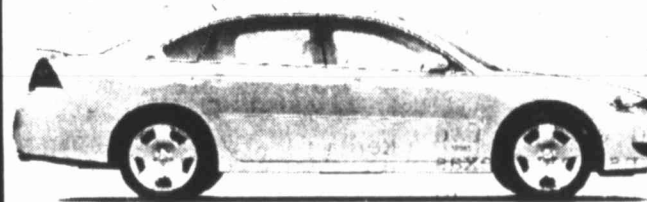

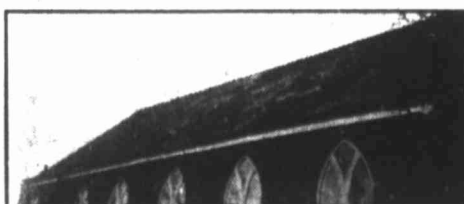

Jets acquire Ramsey from Skins, Dallas cuts Rogers

(AP) — The New York Jets obtained quarterback Patrick Ramsey from the Washington Redskins Friday for a sixth-round pick in next month's draft, giving them insurance if Chad Pennington is slow to recover from his second shoulder injury in two years.

Meanwhile, the NFL acted on behalf of the Seattle Seahawks, that requesting Minnesota's offer to All-Pro guard Steve Hutchinson go to arbitration. It will be heard by a special master Monday, meaning that Seattle's deadline to match the \$49 million, six-year offer will be extended past Sunday's deadline.

In his four seasons, Ramsey has started 24 games, throwing for 34 touchdowns with 29 interceptions.

The Jets also are trying to trade disgruntled defensive end John Abraham to the Seattle Seahawks. A person familiar with the negotiations, who didn't want to be identified because the talks were ongoing, said Friday the Seahawks have presented the best trade package for Abraham: a first-round pick.

Atlanta, which has also been talking to the Jets, is only willing to give up a second-rounder. Abraham agreed to a contract

with the Falcons worth between \$15 million and \$18 million, but no trade with New York is complete.

Atlanta signed veteran safety Lawyer Milloy, cut earlier this month by Buffalo, as they try to bolster a defense that was shredded late last season.

As for Hutchinson, the Seahawks and the league challenged a clause in his contract with the Vikings that requires that if he's not the team's highest-paid offensive lineman after the first year, the final six years of his contract must be guaranteed. That would be difficult for the Seahawks, because left tackle Walter Jones is the team's highest-paid lineman.

The NFL Players Association said it will challenge the appeal, which could go to arbitration.

In other moves Friday: —Green Bay signed former St. Louis defensive tackle Ryan Pickett and had Adam Vinatieri in town for a visit.

—New Orleans signed former Minnesota RB Michael Bennett as insurance for Deuce McAllister, who injured a knee last season. The Saints also signed former Seattle linebacker Anthony Simmons and safety Omar Stoutmire.

—Kansas City signed former Denver running

back Quentin Griffin, giving it a backup for Larry Johnson if Priest Holmes decides to retire.

—Pittsburgh re-signed cornerback Deshaun Townsend, its last remaining unrestricted free agent. The Steelers also signed veteran defensive lineman Rodney Bailey.

—Baltimore made tender offers to two restricted free agents, running back Musa Smith and defensive lineman Jarret Johnson.

—Buffalo re-signed Josh Reed, who has been its third wide receiver for the last four seasons.

—Miami signed cornerback Renaldo Hill, a former Raider, to a three-year contract and re-signed running back Travis Minor.

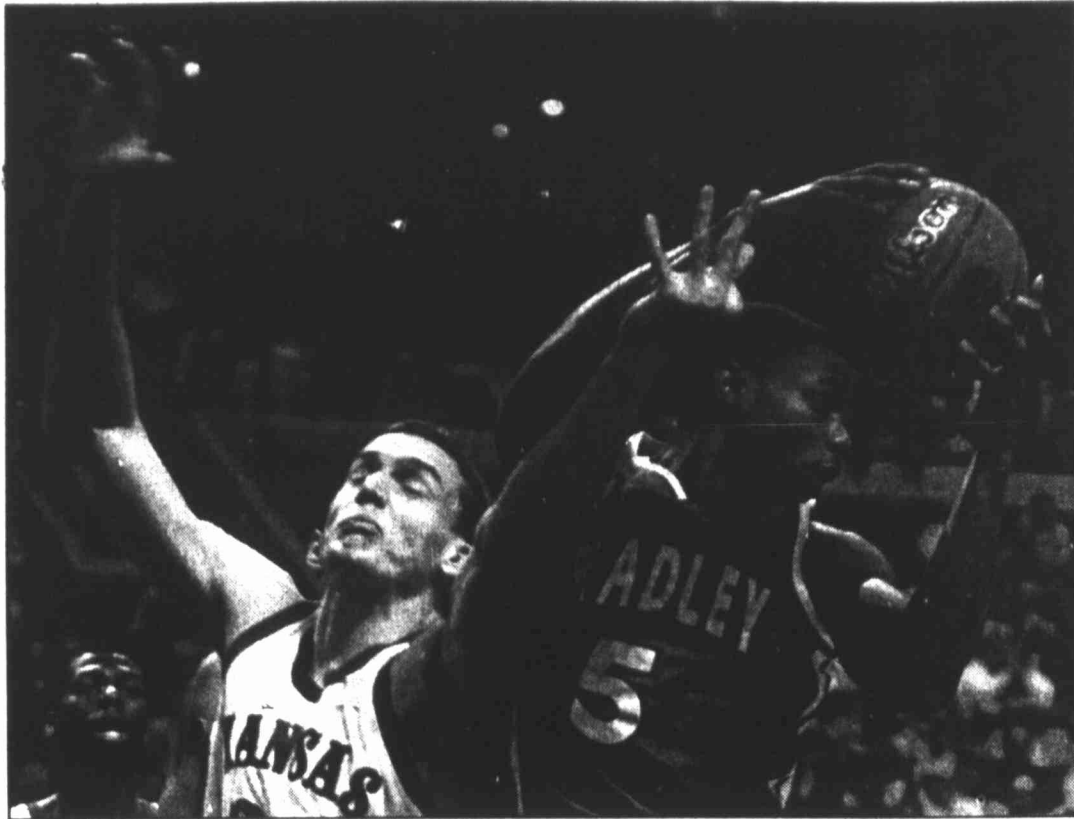
—Dallas cut offensive tackle Jacob Rogers, who never played in a game because of injuries.

—New England signed free agent receiver Reche Caldwell, who spent his first four seasons in San Diego.

Deja Vu: Kansas falls in first round

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. — Now Kansas has a "Bradley Bummer," too.

Marcellus Sommerville scored 21 points and made five 3-pointers and 13th-seeded Bradley handed the fourth-seeded Jayhawks their second straight first-round exit with a 77-73 victory in the Oakland Regional Friday night.

The Braves picked up their first NCAA tournament victory in 20 years and advanced to play fifth-seeded Pittsburgh in the second round on Sunday.

Unlike the "Bucknell Bummer," a year ago, when Wayne Simien

missed a 15-footer at the buzzer to give the 14th-seeded Bison an improbable victory, Kansas looked unprepared and overwhelmed from the start in this one.

The Braves (21-10) led by 14 with 15:38 to go, but let the Jayhawks back in the game with three straight turnovers with around the five minutes left. By the time the inexperienced Jayhawks finally got acclimated to the NCAA tournament pressure and intensity, however, it was too late.

Mario Chalmers made a 3-pointer after one of the takeaways, a three-point play after the second and a runner in the lane after the final one that cut

Bradley's lead to 65-62 with 3:45 to play.

But the Jayhawks (25-8) committed three of their 18 turnovers down the stretch, and Jeff Hawkins missed an open 3-pointer in the corner that would have tied it with 1 minute to play.

Will Franklin hit two free throws and broke free for a wide open layup, and the Braves sealed the stunner at the free throw line for their first NCAA victory since 1986.

Chalmers scored eight of his 15 points in the final five minutes for Kansas, which has lost in the first round in back-to-back seasons for the first time in school history.

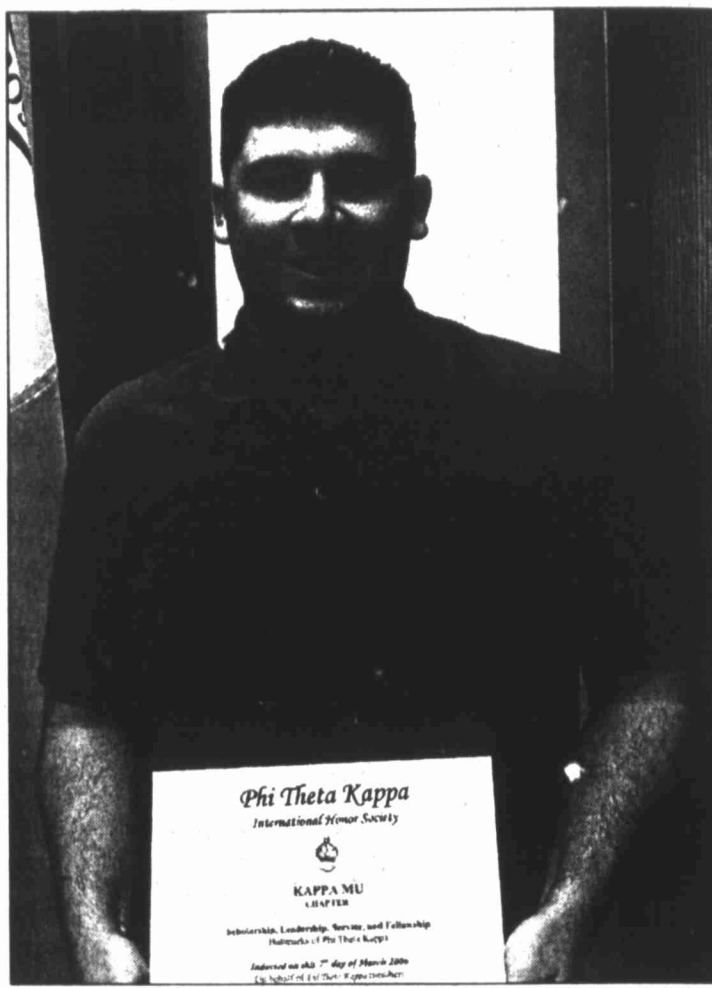

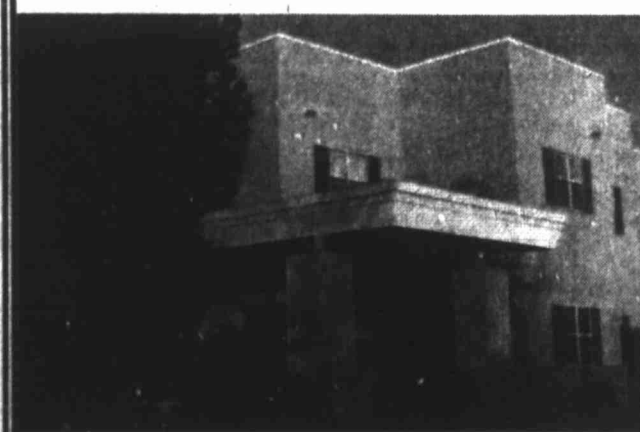

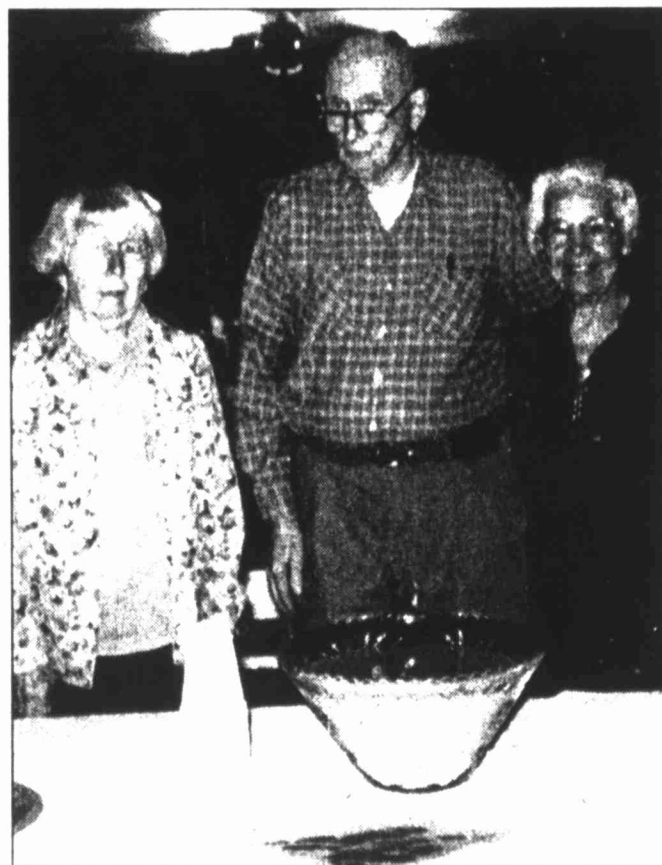

Information technology

Versatility to be crucial for IT workers facing a changing workplace

DALLAS — Bob Schmidt remembers a time 20 years ago when his boss at Frito-Lay Inc. called together members of the information technology department to issue a warning.

With personal computers rapidly becoming ubiquitous in the workplace, she told the staff, "Knowledge of COBOL is no longer going to be enough to survive." To stay in the game, she said, staff members would need to broaden their skills.

Although most observers are calling 2006 a good year for the information technology job market, at least one research firm predicts another major upheaval

within just a few years. And the firm is giving out the same advice that Schmidt heard 20 years ago.

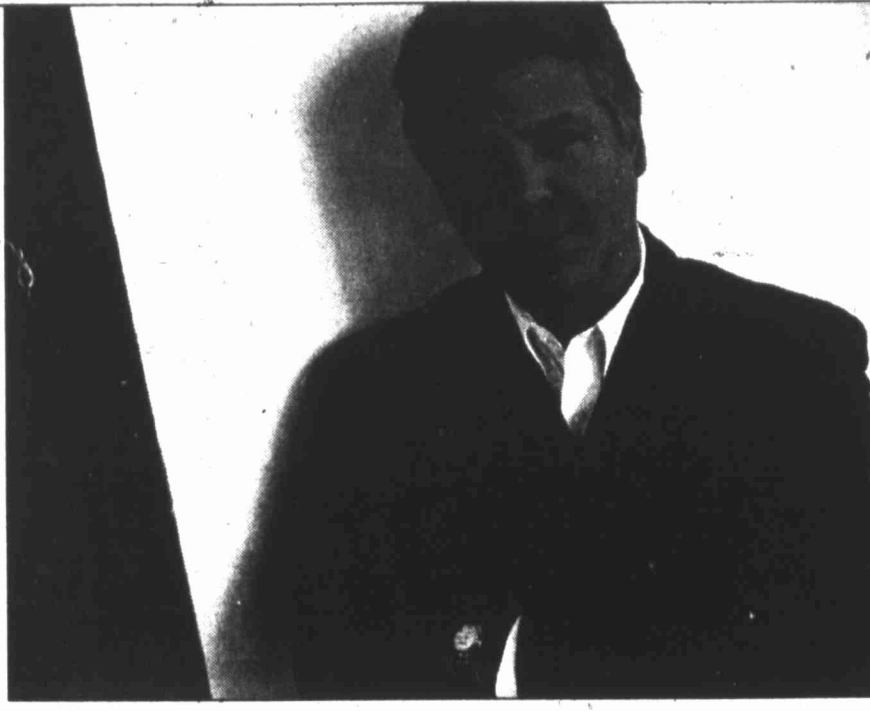
An analysis by Gartner Inc., a research firm based in Stamford, Conn., predicts that the IT job market will shrink by a whopping 40 percent by 2010. IT folks who specialize in a single technology will be the most vulnerable to job cuts.

"Make no mistake: If you are an IT specialist who ignores or downplays the demand to develop business-oriented competence, you are at risk of being unemployable within the next five years."

"Versatility will be crucial. By 2010, IT professionals will need to possess expertise in multiple

domains." Morello wrote the report, "The IT Professional Outlook: Where Will We Go from Here?" The report says the warning is equally relevant to IT professionals in user companies as well as those with technology vendors and service providers.

Through 2010, 30 percent of top technology performers will migrate to IT vendors and IT service providers.

By 2010, IT organizations in midsize and large corporations

will be at least 30 percent smaller than they were in 2005.

What's behind all this bad news? Gartner identified four "megafactors" for change: global sourcing, IT automation, consumer IT savvy and business reconfiguration.

"The window of opportunity for business process design will start to close by 2010," the report says. "By then, emerging business process modeling tools in the hands of business leaders will do more to align business and IT objectives than will the evolution of IT specialists' business competence."

In other words — as technology advances, the tools of the IT trade will become more accessible to people throughout any organization, and that could cut into the franchise of IT specialists.

"There's definitely been a 'demystification' of technology,"

Patterson-UTI concludes its embezzlement investigation

SNYDER (AP) — Patterson-UTI Energy Inc. said Friday it has finished an investigation into the alleged embezzlement of \$77.5 million by its former chief financial officer and that no other officials knowingly took part in the scheme.

The oil and gas drilling company also said it earned about \$2.15 per share in 2005, compared to 56 cents per share in 2004. Analysts expect the company to earn \$2.16 per share, according to a poll by Thomson Financial.

Patterson-UTI included the profit forecast in its request for a 15-day extension to file its 2005 financial report with the Securities and Exchange Commission. It said it expected to file the report by March 31.

The company described the results of the embezzlement investigation in an amended financial report for 2004, which it also filed Friday with the SEC.

The company said former CFO Jonathan D. Nelson used phony invoices to divert \$77.5 million from 1998 to November 2005. Authorities say he spent the money on an airplane, an airfield, a cattle ranch, a truck stop, homes and vehicles.

Nelson resigned in November and is scheduled to go on trial in May. The SEC obtained an order freezing his assets. Nelson's lawyer did not immediately return a call for comment.

The company acknowledged that it failed to maintain effective internal control over financial reporting at the end of 2005, repeating a finding it made for 2004.

March Madness fouls out with bosses

WASHINGTON — March Madness is being treated like a weapon of productivity destruction. Several company executives in the nation's capital say they have closed employees' Internet access to CBS SportsLine.com and its free coverage of the NCAA men's basketball tournament. "When we started to look at it, once you get past the bandwidth issue, it's also a business focus issue," said Derek van Bever, research officer at Washington's Corporate Executive Board. The prospect of the company's 1,400 employees watching games over the 19-day tourney was just too much. "Is there any good reason to run this risk?" van Bever told the *Washington Post*. "The answer is no." Another employee, at a major defense contractor, told the *Post* his firm has also cut access to the March Madness portal on CBS SportsLine.

Companies better get used to this kind of thing, according to Raul Fernandez, chairman of Object Video, which uses video technology to assess threats to critical operations such as airports and oil refineries. "It's a phenomenon that businesses have to live with forever now," he said. "It's not just basketball; it's also 'Desperate Housewives.' For me, it falls into the category under trusting employees to get their work done." A spokesman for Lockheed Martin Corp. said he wouldn't be upset "if my guys want to get a sandwich and during their lunch break watch a game. However, if some are screaming and shouting" when they're supposed to be working, that would be a problem. Nationally, distractions caused by the NCAA tournament will cost the economy an estimated \$3.8 billion in lost worker productivity, said John Challenger, chief executive officer of Challenger.

said Schmidt, who is now director of laser technology for Rapp Collins Worldwide in Irving, Texas. "Once upon a time, the terms that IT people used would freak people out. Today, we all have BlackBerries and TiVos and cell phones that take pictures. Now that it's been demystified, that value has been deflated as well." In an interesting bit of synchronicity, Schmidt gave a talk last fall on the same subject before seeing the Gartner report, entitled: "Is the IT Profession Dying in the U.S.?" His short answer: "No, but the skill sets have changed." Schmidt drew on his 22 years in the IT business for

the October presentation to the Dallas chapter of the Association of IT Professionals. Although he thinks Gartner's numbers may be overstated, Schmidt concurred with the research firm's prediction that business knowledge and leadership, and skills in communication, negotiation and networking are becoming imperatives for IT careerists. "Many times, people will discount these as 'soft' skills ... which are treated as not important," he said. "But pure techies are not going to survive." Schmidt says he thinks the effects of outsourcing may not prove as devastating as some have predicted. "Enough people have been burned by outsourcing," he said. "It takes a pretty patient individual to manage an offshore project."

But, that said, it's clear that global competition won't go away. "The 'do as you are told, crank out the code' development is becoming commoditized," he said. So how to handle the next wave of churn in the job market? Morello's advice for IT professionals: Choose an area of expertise, develop habits of ongoing learning and build strong relationships that will help cement employability. Schmidt's colleague, Mark Zahorik, who is Rapp Collins' chief information officer, has his own maxim for long-term survival in the IT business. "People who know 'how' will always work for those who know 'why,'" he said. To survive, tech folks will need to understand the answers to questions like, "Why is this technology going to enable a business objective? Why is this technology

needed to differentiate the company in the marketplace?" Zahorik adds that he's honed his business skills at Rapp Collins, particularly as the market research firm began offering some of its proprietary technological applications to clients. By selling the IT component as a product on the open market, rather than simply a staff function, he's sharpened his business understanding of the function. Schmidt offers this litmus test: "Ask yourself, 'Would I patent myself?' If you define yourself as a specialist in a single technology, then you're not really patentable," he said. "All you're doing is placing your bet on a specific technology or application, rather than your own unique abilities."

Dear Annie: My 84-year-old mother was recently admitted to a nursing home after a fall. Mom has lived alone for 15 years, but in the last

few years, she's gone downhill. I am 500 miles away, but my brother lives nearby, and he did everything possible to help Mom stay in her apartment. When she fell down, she was taken to the care center for rehabilitation. After evaluating her, the doctors came to the conclusion that she can no longer live alone.

Mom is not aware that she is in the facility permanently. She knows she needs 24-hour care, but she believes it's temporary. Mom refuses to use her walker and waits for a nurse to take her wherever she needs to go. Therapy is the only place she gets exercise. She cries and carries on that she wants to go home, asking us to come get her. When we tell her she cannot leave, she threatens to walk home.

How can we get through to her that the nursing home is best? Her quality of life is so much better there. Not only does she have daily care, but there are people around her constantly. My brother visits every day, as do other family members. I'm not sure she appreciates it. Should we be doing more? — Helpless in North Carolina

Dear Helpless: Your mother may recognize her need to be in the home, but the sudden permanence of her situation

requires that she receive some help adjusting to her new surroundings and dealing with any possible depression. Some nursing homes have a social worker on staff, and also an independent ombudsman assigned to help address such issues. The phone number for the ombudsman should be posted in the office, but if not, ask the administrator. You also can speak with the admissions coordinator or one of the nurses to find out if the home has an arrangement with any outside organizations to provide therapeutic services.

Dear Annie: I have coached high school sports for 15 years. At the end of every season, we have an "Awards Night" where we recognize each student-athlete, and we also honor a few students who have given their all to the sport.

The problem is that there is always at least one person who complains that his or her child didn't get one of these "special" awards. This season, we had two parents who were particularly upset, yet both their children had lackluster years and lost all enthusiasm for the sport. When their children didn't receive honors, the parents labeled me as unfair and retaliated by encouraging their kids not to compete on our team next

year.

Please tell parents they do their children a disservice by teaching them that they are always entitled to the top award. Being gracious when one loses and being happy for a teammate who has accomplished something special are qualities that express more maturity and team unity than grabbing a trophy to fulfill the vicarious needs of a parent. — Caring Coach

Dear Coach: There always will be parents who expect their children to get better grades and higher honors, deserved or not. These children often go through life thinking they are entitled to special treatment or convinced they are failures. You are right — the parents do them no favor.

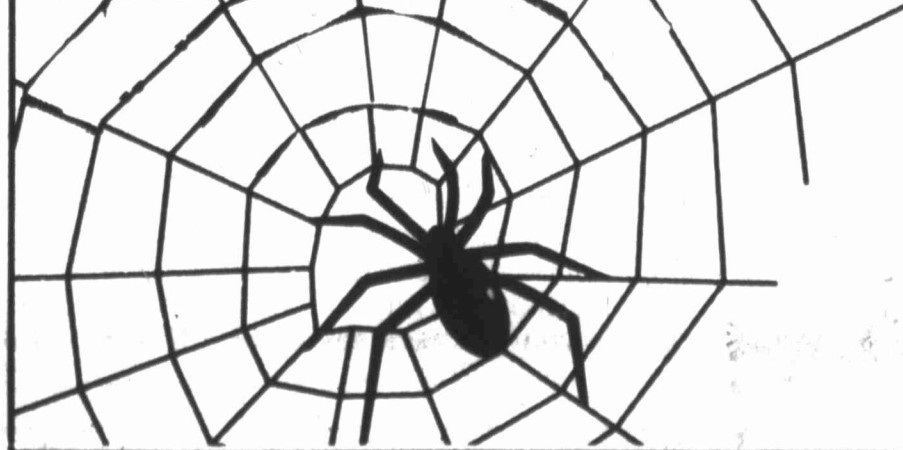

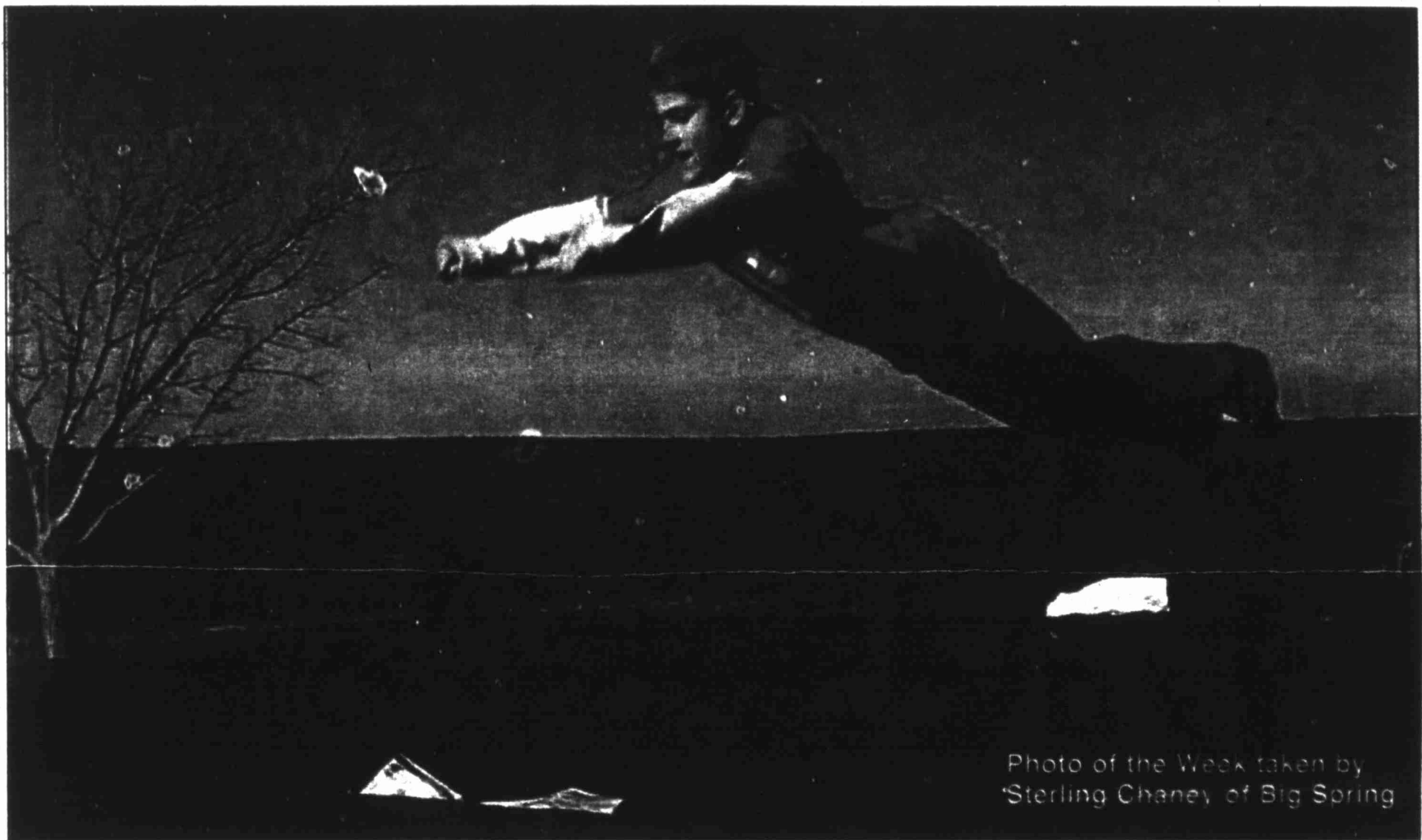

'Ask the Dust' is worth the effort

When exiting the theater showing "Ask the Dust," don't tell anyone, including yourself, what you thought of the movie.

Give it time to grow on you. And it will. "Ask the Dust" becomes more impressive every time you think about it. Even viewers who never think about a movie will connect with those aspects of this LA eulogy that carry universal resonance.

Director and screenwriter Robert Towne's longtime dream was to bring the late John Fante's atmospheric novel of 1930s Los Angeles to the screen. The once-forgotten, now-revered novelist created an indelible portrait of lonely people on the fringes of LA's literary and cinematic circles. None of his characters would have a 90210 zip code, but they are fascinating individuals.

Obviously, the City of the Angels, in this case tarnished angels, fascinates Towne. His earlier screenplays for "Chinatown" and "Shampoo" captured the essence of Los Angeles in different decades. As expected, he and Fante prove complementary creative bedfellows.

In adapting the Fante novel, Towne accomplishes an extremely difficult feat: He actually makes writer's block seem exciting. Towne is one of the most literary yet accessible of filmmakers, and every frame of "Ask the Dust" indicates his respect for writers. Even the opening credits have a background of turning pages.

The writer in question, Arturo Bandini (Colin Farrell), has traveled west to make his name in American literature. Like Philip Seymour Hoffman's Truman Capote, he's absolutely certain of his genius, but Farrell's Bandini is easier to like. Still, he's plagued by the self-absorption that consumes many writers.

To his dismay, he discovers that he can hardly create a sentence. He also discovers that 1930s Los Angeles is rife with prejudice. His landlady (sharply played by Eileen Atkins) crisply informs him that she does not accept dogs, Hispanics or Jews. Bandini is relieved that she at least has no pronounced prejudice against Italians.

The two women who become vital parts of his LA scene, smolder-

ing Mexican waitress Camilla (Salma Hayek) and desperate Jewish caregiver Vera (Idina Menzel), have long been familiar with prejudice. Somewhat to his surprise, Bandini discovers that he is not entirely free of prejudice, and his treatment of both women fluctuates between reluctant tenderness and harsh insensitivity.

Bandini, it seems, is nearly a total innocent. His passion is for words rather than any form of personal contact, but he ultimately proves responsive.

Farrell is surprisingly convincing at registering innocence. But he never shies away from Bandini's less endearing traits. He also captures the character's arrogance, petulance and social limitations.

Hayek reveals Camilla's sensuousness in every gesture, proving more than a match for Bandini in several important areas. She also registers occasional vulnerability and neediness. Menzel, who won considerable praise on Broadway for her roles in "Wicked" and "Rent," wrenches your heart as the frantic, wounded Vera. Donald Sutherland is eerily effective as Bandini's shadowy, possibly shell-shocked neighbor. You may think you're watching his "Day of the Locust" character 30 years later.

Most of the film's action is internalized, but director Towne creates an exciting earthquake that plays an integral part in the story. He and superb cinematographer Caleb Deschanel create haunting visuals of retro Southern California.

Whether or not you're familiar with John Fante, if you like novels, you'll like "Ask the Dust." It's melancholy and leisurely, and it's worth the effort.

A come-from-behind winner

'Dreamer' is far-fetched, but a warm tale of determination

Stories of hard-luck horses and the people who love them have galloped across movie screens for decades. From "National Velvet" to "My Friend Flicka" to "Seabiscuit," the horse that comes from behind is beloved by Hollywood.

In "Dreamer," the horse is an elegant chestnut thoroughbred named Sonador, Spanish for "dreamer." Her young cheerleader is Cale Crane (Dakota Fanning), whose father, Ben (Kurt

Russell), trains racehorses. When Sonador suffers a potentially career-ending injury in a race, her owner fires the trainer and orders the horse destroyed. Instead, Ben Crane takes Sonador as part of his severance pay, hoping to rehabilitate her for breeding.

Cale befriends the horse and learns to read the "Racing Form" with her grandfather (Kris Kristofferson), a trainer whose relationship with his son is chilly, even as he funds Ben's hopes of breeding a champion. Sonador proves infertile, but her injured leg heals enough for her to run again.

Crane puts the horse in his daughter's name and conditions the filly for a return to racing. In the tradition of storybook horses, Sonador's comeback is at the Breeder's Cup Classic, one of thoroughbred racing's most prestigious events.

The slow-motion race action shows how Sonador threads her way through a rugged field of horses toward the finish line.

The film was inspired by the true story of Mariah's Storm, a promising horse who broke her shinbone in a 1993 race but returned to the track a year later, winning eight more races.

The DVD includes a fea-

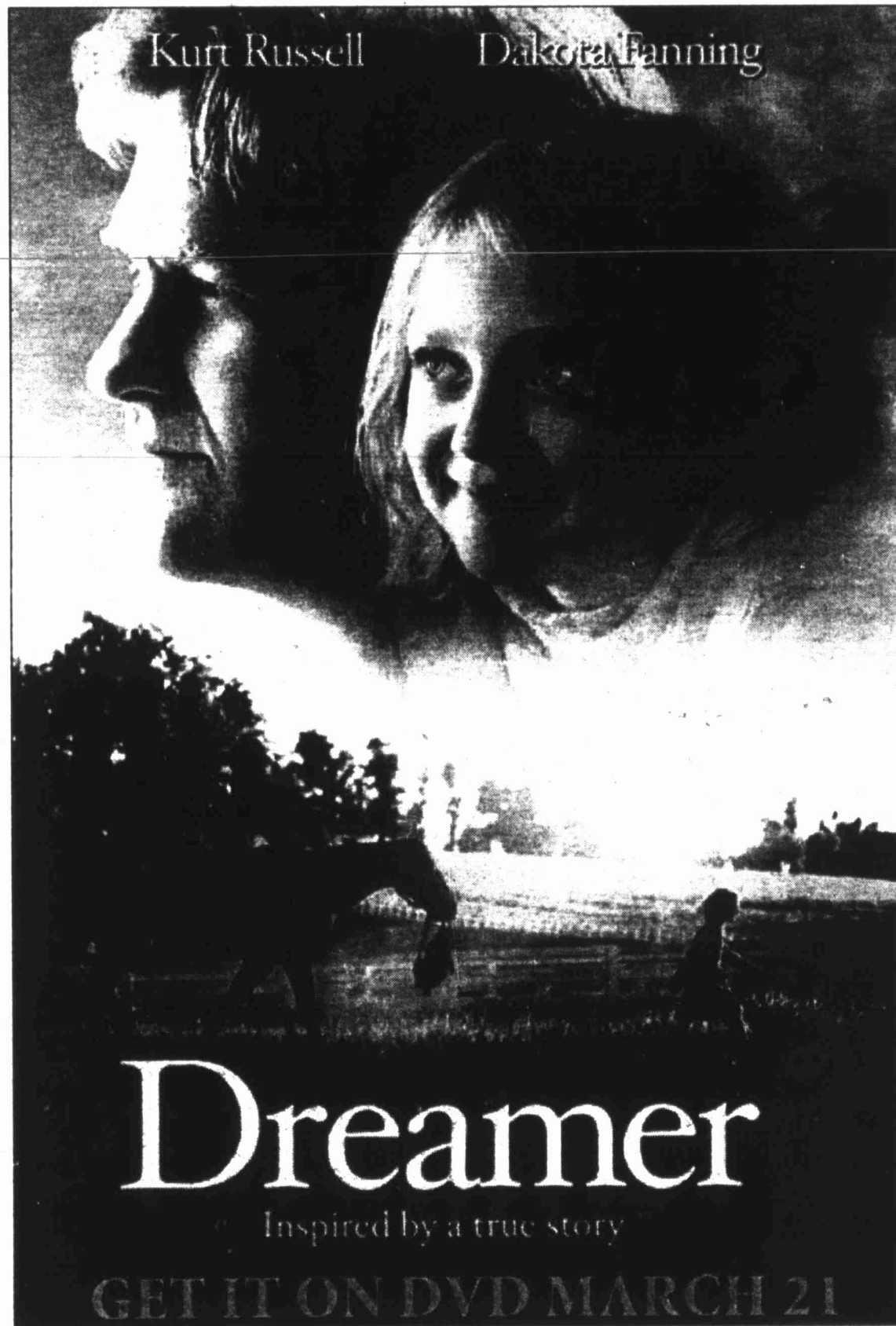

ture on Mariah's Storm and a segment on taking care of a horse, featuring Fanning and many of the film's 40 horses. Another bonus illustrates how the race scenes were filmed, with cheering crowds and careful choreography of the running horses. Russell, Kristofferson and Fanning also offer commentary on their roles.

While "Dreamer" requires hard-core horse aficionados to suspend disbelief — an injured filly striding to victory in the Classic, a race always won by male horses? — it supplies a look at determination, family bonding and the horse of many a dreamer.

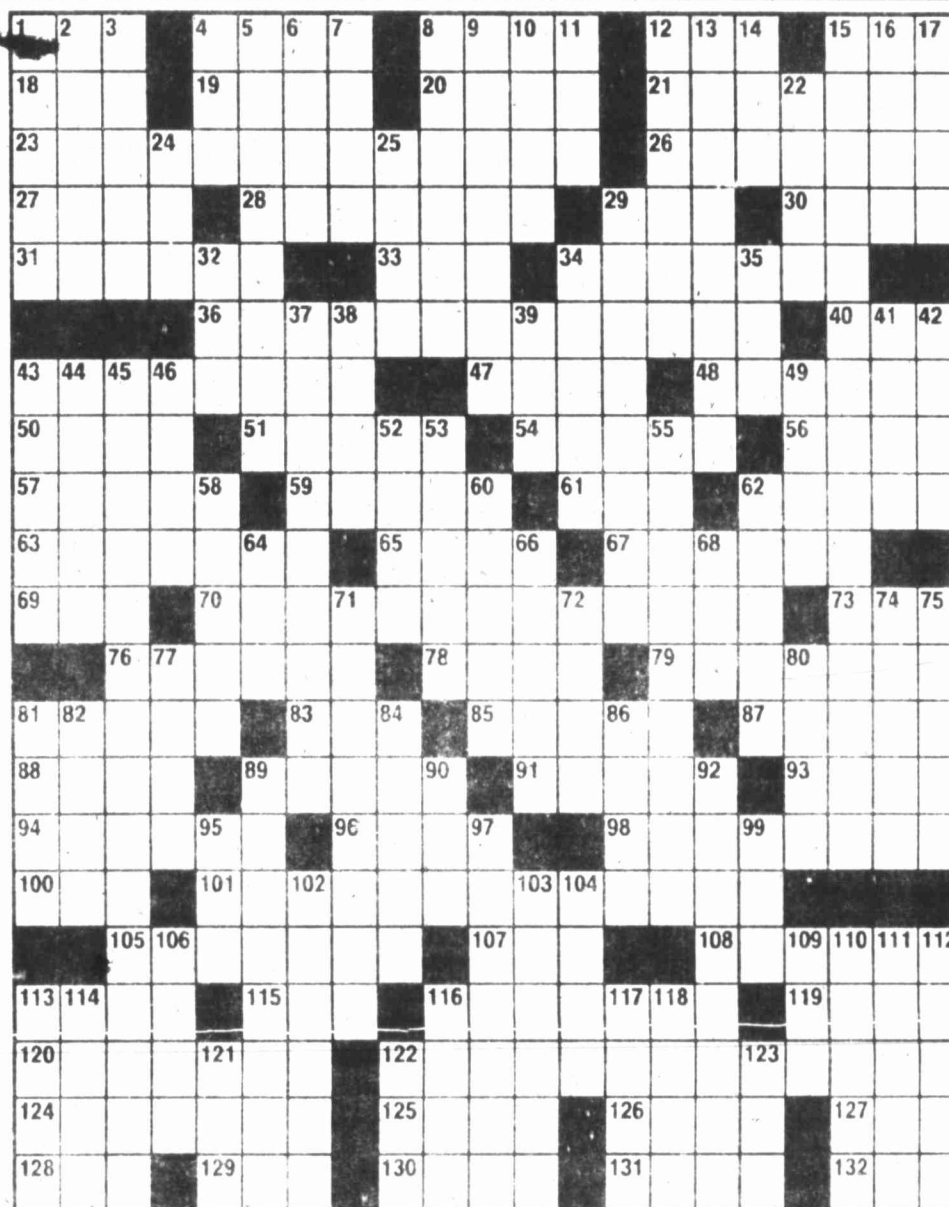

Don't ask Keith about Bush, ask him about fried bologna

Toby Keith isn't who you think, whatever that may be.

To "blue-staters," the country singer represents a barbaric, knuckle-dragging jingoism where might makes right and opposing viewpoints are unwelcome, if not heretical. To "red-staters" — arguably his core fan base — Keith is a pro-Bush, pro-war man's man who doesn't take any crap from those effete liberals on the East Coast.

To hear Keith tell it, he's an entertainer, end of story.

"You shouldn't care if I'm voting for Clinton or voting for Bush; you should care who you're voting for," Keith says during a lengthy phone conversation from a tour stop in Louisiana. (As it happens, he's voted for both: Keith says he is a lifelong registered Democrat who voted twice for Bill Clinton and twice for George W. Bush).

"The people who say the most are the people who matter the least. Just because we're entertainers or songwriters, nobody should give a damn what we have to say," he says.

Plenty of people gave a damn in 2002, when Keith released the single "Courtesy of the Red, White and Blue (The Angry American)" from the album "Unleashed." The song, a response to the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, became a cultural flashpoint as people lined up to either denounce or embrace its sentiments. Commentators were so busy stirring up controversy around the lyrics — "You'll be sorry that you messed with / The U.S. of A. / 'Cause we'll put a boot in your ass / It's the American way," — that the part most often cited — that many missed what Keith says was the point.

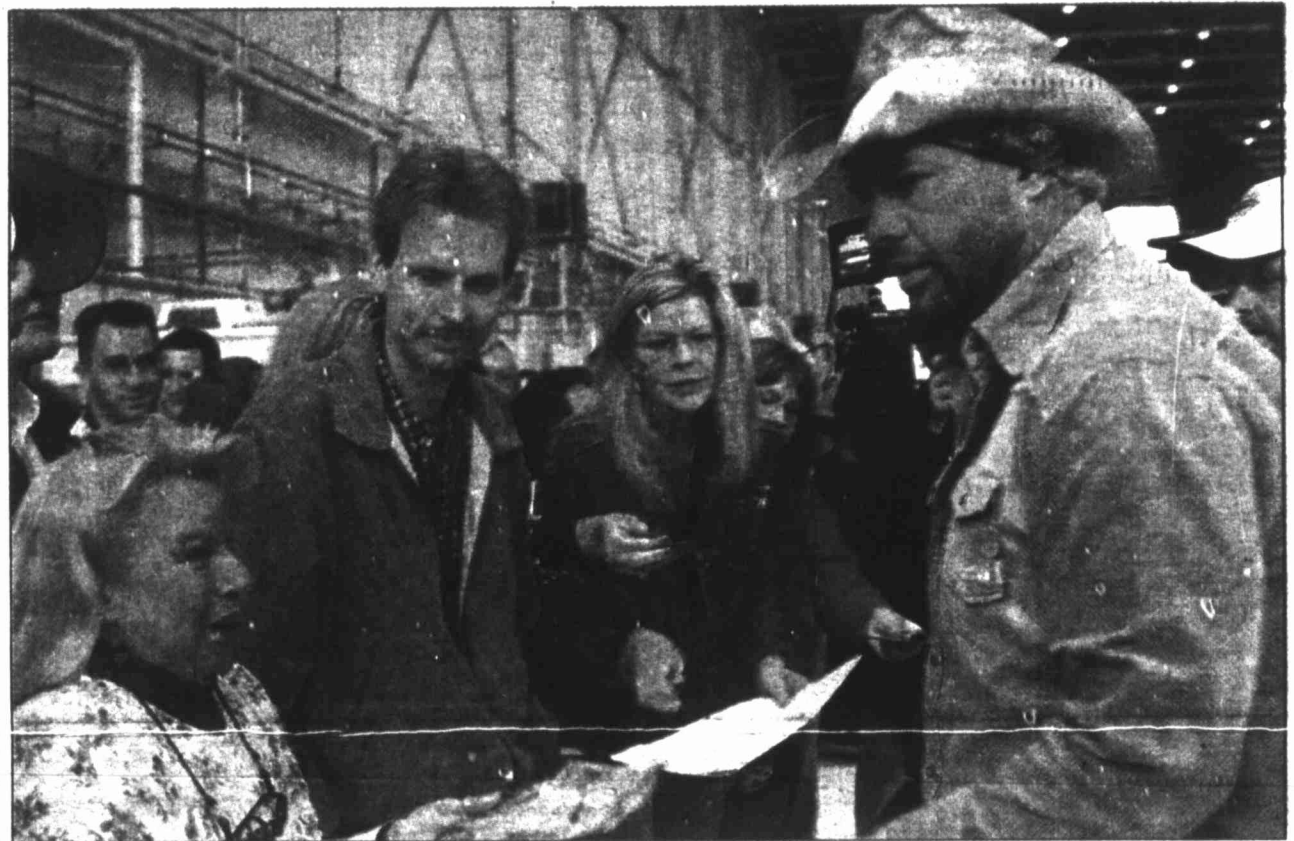
"I wrote 'Courtesy of the

Red, White and Blue' ... for the people that were going to have to go round up the bad guys who flew those planes into the towers. That was it," he says. "That's the whole point of that song. It's about justice and security, OK? But you never get a chance to tell your side of the deal. You just have to put it out and say, 'I support the fathers and daughters and mothers and brothers who are going to have to go over there and find these people, and it's going to be nasty, and God bless you for having the honor to go try to do this.'"

Although controversy over the song marked the most turbulent period in Keith's career, it also helped elevate Keith above the crowd in country music. It certainly didn't hurt his popularity — "Unleashed" and a follow-up, 2003's "Shock 'N Y'all" have each sold more than 4 million copies. His latest, last year's "Honkytonk U," has already sold more than 1 million copies while earning some of the best reviews Keith has received.

Born in Oklahoma in 1961, Keith grew up watching his grandmother play country music in a beer joint she owned — his own version of Honkytonk U — and remembers how much the music awed him.

"Listening to her band play every night, I was just mesmerized," he says. "I would sit and just think, man, how important they

are to get up there and be able to make this great music and get these people here to eat and drink and see this band."

He calls the experience "life-altering," and says he knew then, at 11 years old, that he wanted to make music.

"It was like my life was set out for me when I was a kid, that this was what I was going to do," he says. "I didn't know if it could happen, but this was the strongest urge I had, was to just follow this path. I didn't know, honest to God, if it was going to happen, but in my mind, it wasn't if, it was when."

"When" came with his first album, a self-titled effort in 1993. He has since released eight albums of new material, a Christmas record and a handful of hits compilations, and he has another studio album scheduled for release in April.

But music isn't all Keith has been working on. Instead of renegotiating his contract with Dreamworks last year, Keith left to start his own record label. He also lent his name to a restaurant at Harrah's in Las Vegas and has completed filming on a movie, "Broken Bridges," that features Kelly Preston, Burt Reynolds and Tess Harper. Due out late this summer, the movie traces the story of a singer-songwriter played by Keith who leaves home, gets strung out on fame and then liquor and returns, a has-been, to discover his old flame has been raising their child.

"It was quite an experience, and probably the most creative thing I've done in maybe a decade," Keith says.

Although Keith isn't involved in the daily operations of I Love This Bar & Grill at Harrah's, he did approve the menu, which

meant choosing food he would want to eat. Instead of pecan-encrusted catfish, he specified cornmeal. And if the restaurant was going to serve meatloaf, well, then, how about a cold meatloaf sandwich, too? Keith says he even instructed the kitchen staff how to make the restaurant's best-selling item: a fried-bologna sandwich.

"It's become a little thing," he says. "Everybody comes up and goes, 'Man, I went to your restaurant in Vegas and it's awesome. ...' I'm just sitting back here grinning."

Nevermind the political controversy. Think of Keith and think of a singer, an actor, an entrepreneur. Or just think of him sitting there, grinning.
