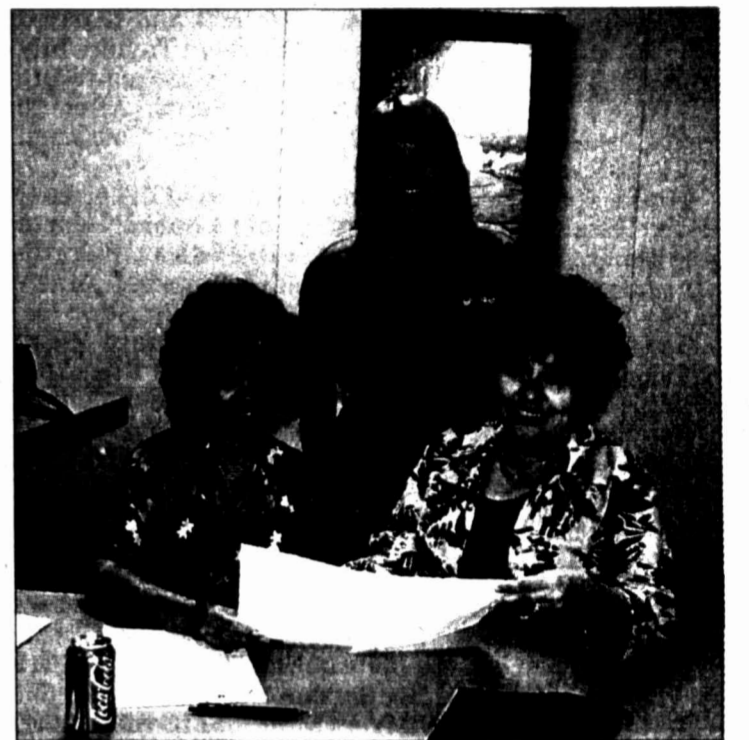

## Voters get some extended time in city election

Early voting polls will be open 12 hours Tuesday and Thursday.

New election laws in the Lone Star State will give area voters even more time to cast their ballot during early voting in this year's municipal elections, according to local officials.

Sandra Bloom, election administrator for the county, who has been contracted to handle the city election, said the law provides for a couple of extra-long voting days during early voting, which begins Monday.

"It's a new law that only affects the city elections," said Bloom. "We're now required to provide two 12-hour days of early voting during the early

voting period. We've scheduled these days for Tuesday and Thursday. It's good for people who can't get to the polls between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. because they have to work."

Bloom said her office is gearing up for the election, which will be the first her office has been contracted to perform since it was created by the county.

"It's going to be a little differ-

ent for the voters," said Bloom. "Everyone is so accustomed to going to city hall to cast their ballots, it's going to be a real change to have them come to the county courthouse."

Bloom said the continued implementation of electronic voting booths, coupled with new election laws, makes it even more important for area residents have their voter information ready when they head

to the polls.

"If a voter needs a certificate or has a question about their registration they can contact us," she said.

The trio of Big Spring City Council seats up for election this year has been pared down to just one, with council members Gloria McDonald and Greg Biddison making it through the

### A \$1.7 MILLION SPANKING

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — A woman who was spanked in front of her co-workers in what her employer called a camaraderie-building exercise has been awarded \$1.7 million.

Janet Orlando, 53, was subjected to sexual harassment and sexual battery when she was paddled on the rear end two years ago at home security company Alarm One Inc., a jury ruled Friday.

Jurors awarded Orlando \$10,000 for economic loss, \$40,000 for future medical costs and \$450,000 for emotional distress, pain and suffering.

They awarded her \$1.2 million in punitive damages.

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# Woodruff claims Jack Y. Smith Award as State Hospital honors its volunteers

Longtime volunteer and retired Big Spring State Hospital nurse Cyneather Woodruff raised her Jack Y. Smith plaque above her head and let out a cry of excitement after being named the top volunteer of the year during the hospital's April 20 luncheon.

"Never in a million years did I ever dream I would receive this," Woodruff said as she sat down in disbelief.

The hospital hosts the yearly luncheon to honor and thank the hospital's 100 volunteers for their more than 68,000 combined hours of dedicated service over their careers.

Big Spring State Hospital is a 200-bed psychiatric healthcare center for people with mental illness in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle.

Each year, the hospital presents the coveted Jack Y. Smith award to a volunteer who has shown an extraordinary amount of dedication and compassion. Smith was one of the hospital's earliest and most dynamic volunteers and began presenting the award in 1973.

Since his death, his son, Steve, and his widow, Edna Faye, have presented the award to a deserving volunteer.

"Volunteers are ordinary people who reach beyond themselves," he said. "This year's winner is quiet and unassuming and completes the job. She has enlisted her church, started monthly bingo games, helps with employee blood drives and is involved in all fund-raising activities."

Woodruff has contributed 755 volunteer hours during her career after retiring from the hospital where she began her career as a nurse on the medical unit.

Keynote speaker Olivia Flournoy, the hospital's acting superintendent, applauded the volunteers who were honored by the more than 200 employees in attendance.

She told the audience about her unenthusiastic initial response to being enlisted as a volunteer during what she had hoped would be a lazy summer vacation from high school. But her summer as a teenage volunteer at Wichita Falls State Hospital where her mother worked as a social worker turned her life around.

"As you can well imagine, I was not the most enthusiastic volunteer. But after a short time, I was hooked. In fact, the rewards of that experience led me into a career."

Assistant Superintendent Jok Simons presented Lucy Flores with the

Rookie of the Year Award.

Flores began assisting with accounting duties more than a year ago but expanded her duties to serving on the Nursing Scholarship Committee, assisting at The Chalet resale shop and with the organization of the Valentine's and Denim and Diamonds fund-raisers. She was unanimously selected as treasurer for the Volunteer Council Board and contributed 110 hours in her first year.

Shirley Bodin earned Outstanding Volunteer of the Year Award at the state level during the recent convention. This is the highest award a volunteer can receive statewide, Big Spring State Hospital Director of Community Relations Billie Christie-Morgan said.

Bodin has donated 3,664 hours since beginning her volunteer career eight years ago and currently serves on the Volunteer Services Council's Board of Directors. She has also been recognized as Regional Volunteer and State Star Volunteer.

Flournoy praised the volunteers for their countless hours raising money for a group of patients who desperately need the assistance. Big Spring State Hospital volunteers have purchased a tram for safe patient transportation, sponsored the Family Lodge, distributed luggage and grooming supplies and hospital birthday parties and holiday celebrations.

"Ghandi said, 'The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others,'" Flournoy quoted. "Another great philosopher, Dr. Seuss, said, 'Unless someone like

you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better.' It's not."

First Christian Church Minister Ken McIntosh praised volunteers during his invocation telling them that "Volunteers don't necessarily have the time, but they have the heart."

filing periods uncontested.

Donna Gamboa, owner of the San Franciscan Bar and Grill; Internet technology specialist Manuel Ramirez; and health-care professional Cindy Lopez will face off for the District 2 place on the council. Incumbent Woody Jumper did not file for re-election to the seat.

In Stanton, two of four spots on the city council will be contested this year.

Mayor Lester Baker, a 14-year incumbent, has drawn two opponents, officials said. Randy Koonce, a computer programmer, and Robert Teveni, an office manager and paramedic, will seek to unseat Baker.

Also contested is the District 1 race, in which incumbent Ronnie Christian will face a challenge from registered medical assistant Rosalinda Mindling.

Early voting in Stanton will be held at the Martin

County Courthouse, according to city officials, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. each day. The city of Stanton will also be observing the two 12-hour days during early voting, but have not yet decided on the dates.

Three candidates filed for three spots on the Coahoma City Council. Incumbents Ronnie Dodson and Paulette Lindsey, along with newcomer Dan Shelburne, will go uncontested. According to Coahoma city officials, the city's election will be cancelled due to the lack of challengers.

Better news is the announcement that Solitaire Homes is re-opening and that Fiber Glass Systems has created new jobs," said Gregg.

As the number of jobs in the area continues to increase, so has the size of the civilian workforce, which increased from 12,953 in February to 13,021 in March. March's total is still down from totals posted the same time in 2005, when the civilian workforce was reported at 13,249.

The number of employed people in Howard County increased by more than 100, however, with 12,283 employees reported in March compared to

the 12,182 in February. These figures are still down compared to March 2005, when the total in Howard County was 12,480 employees.

"The Texas unemployment rate is 5 percent, while the Permian Basin Workforce Development Area is listed at 4.3 percent," said Gregg. "Our unemployment rate is one of the highest in the Permian Basin. The national rate is listed at 4.8 percent."

Similar trends have been seen in surrounding counties, with unemployment rates reported at 3.5 percent in Midland County; 4.2 percent in Ector County; 5.3 percent in Martin County; 7.2 percent in Dawson County; 5.1 percent in Borden County; 5 percent in Glasscock County; 4.1 percent in Andrews

County; and 3.9 percent in Upton County.

"We have a critical demand in our area for heavy equipment operators, correctional officers, diesel mechanics, oilfield workers, journeyman plumber, electricians and welders," said Gregg. "Employers and job seekers should be reminded that a Howard County Job Fair will be held May 17 at Howard College. Employers are encouraged to participate and talk to job seekers about career opportunities in our community."

"Employer interest in our workforce is very important if we want to maintain a quality workforce for our economy. Every effort to demonstrate that they are needed has to be made. Therefore, Howard College, Workforce Network,

Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce, the area media, the Big Spring Independent School District and Moore Development for Big Spring have united to repeat last year's event. Job seekers of all ages and skill levels will attend the job fair in hopes of finding employment and gathering information about the career opportunities our community has to offer."

Gregg said good news travels fast in the Big Spring area, having a positive impact on the local job market.

"The local Workforce Network has more than 127 jobs listed today," said Gregg. "This is 27 more than last month's number. Job seekers are encouraged to use WorkinTexas.com to find

employment, or visit the local office at 310 Owens for assistance. New job orders are being received every day.

"Since the announcement that the VA Medical Center will remain open, and that Solitaire Homes and Fiber Glass Systems are hiring, businesses are feeling confident that the area economic climate is right for new job creation. Other employers recruiting aggressively are StarTek, which is seeking customer service representatives, and Cornell Corrections, which is seeking correctional officers. Job seekers interested in any of these employers can contact Carla Gross or myself for more information."

Hansen said. "And over the years, the crowd has continued to grow. 





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# Immigrants across Texas prepare for Monday boycott

HOUSTON (AP) — Mexican immigrant Marcos Garcia will get the day off Monday from his job at a Houston landscaping company so he can participate in the "Day Without Immigrants" protest.

Immigrants across Texas and the nation will stay home from work and school, and boycott the purchase of American products for one day to protest legislative proposals aimed at cracking down on illegal immigrants.

While some immigrants worry about losing their jobs if they miss work, or losing vacation or sick time to participate, Garcia said his boss gave him his blessing.

"He understands what this means for us. He told us, 'This is going to benefit you,'" said Garcia, who illegally entered the U.S. in 1980.

Garcia wouldn't identify his employer, but other Texas businesses appeared sympathetic to the boycott and rallies

planned in Houston, Dallas, Lubbock and other Texas cities.

Malone's Cost-Plus, a chain of nine Dallas supermarkets and over 800 restaurants owned by Malone's Food Stores Ltd., will close Monday in a show of support for a community the company has served for 30 years, general manager Rick Gomez said.

He said the company's work force is 95 percent Hispanic and the store's customers are about 90 percent Hispanic.

Cozymel's Restaurant, a Tex-Mex chain with at least two stores in Texas, said it will remain open, but give all the day's profits to Hispanic charities.

"As a company, we had to decide what the best course of action was for us to take," Cozymel's co-owner and CEO Jack Baum said. "We needed to balance our desire to stand together with our responsibility to make sure that those who needed to work could do so."

Immigrants will be

encouraged to petition lawmakers for permanent residency during the Houston rally, organizer Maria Jimenez said.

Jimenez was concerned about the turnout, though. She said many illegal immigrants have indicated they will take the day off from work, but won't attend rallies because they fear immigration officials will come and arrest them.

Their concerns come after federal raids on IFCO Systems, a crate-and-pallet company whose plants were raided across the country last week.

In Texas' Rio Grande Valley, which is about 90 percent Mexican-American, illegal immigrants were urged to protest by displaying white ribbons and limiting their spending, not by missing school and work.

"This isn't to hurt business, but it is to recognize that we are contributing greatly to the economy and one way of doing that is by withholding our dol-

ars," said Nathan Selzer, co-director of Proyecto Libertad and the Valley Movement for Human Rights.

But workers in El Paso — an 80 percent Hispanic border city, with more than 450,000 Latinos — worry about being fired or losing a vacation or sick day if they participate, said Ana Gonzalez, a spokeswoman with the El Paso Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

Others are concerned that protesters in Mexico will block the city's international bridges, making it difficult to get to a job in El Paso from Mexico, Gonzalez said.

While an all-out boycott could have a significant economic impact in El Paso, where downtown businesses rely on daily border crossers, local business leaders and immigrant advocates don't think the protest day will take hold.

Ruben Garcia, director of Annunciation House, an immigrant charity, said he is not aware of

any specific plans to organize a citywide boycott in El Paso. And because other large-scale protests were held just last month, Monday's boycott may be too soon, he said.

"One of the things that you have to look at is the whole aspect that it means a day of work, coming on the heels of April 10 where people also were asked to give up a day of work," he said, referring to a massive protest across Texas.

Mike Breitinger, executive director of El Paso's Central Business Association, said Monday is a national holiday in Mexico, and border-area

residents usually spend the day visiting and shopping in El Paso.

"It's always been a strong weekend," Breitinger said. "It's tough for the Mexican shopper to not shop that day."

Ruben Garcia said he is encouraging opponents of immigration reform proposals to wait a little longer before protesting again.

"My own personal preference would be that people think very seriously before not going to work, not going to school, and instead wait to see what the indications are from the Senate," he said.

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## Proposed gas boycott divides community

BEEVILLE (AP) — In many ways, Beeville is a typical slice of rural America, a city of about 33,000 that was built on farming and ranching.

It has all the fast food places and a Wal-Mart, but things like malls and specialized medical care are at least an hour away — more than just an inconvenience with gas prices hovering at about \$3 a gallon.

"It's hurting everybody; everything is going up except the pay," said Debbie Ponce, a 35-year-old hairdresser who no longer makes the lengthy trip in her sport utility vehicle.

It was such inconveniences that prompted Bee County commissioners this week to call for a boycott of Exxon Mobil Corp., because, according to County Judge Jimmy Martinez, the world's largest oil company is making record billion-dollar profits while consumers suffer.

"I understand free enterprise. I understand we live in America. But, by golly, just because they have a license doesn't mean that they can

and supply for crude oil

and petroleum products and local supply and demand for gasoline, followed by federal and state taxes."

That doesn't matter much to many people who have blamed big oil companies, including the folks in Beeville.

"They're coming into my office, they're having to make a decision whether to drive for dialysis in Corpus Christi or whether they want to put food on the table," Martinez said.

The Beeville Bee-Picayune Web site ran a poll showing 72 percent of

those surveyed planned to boycott Exxon.

Kurt Rossow, a 20-year-old student who was fueling up at an Exxon station in town, said he heard a lot of people were going to do it.

"Gasoline is real expensive, but it's kind of not very smart," he said. "The commissioners are going to end up targeting the family who owns the station."

County Commissioner Susan Stasny, the only dissenter in Tuesday night's 4-1 vote, noted the irony of the boycott coming from the heart of oil country.

This deal occurred in a high-stakes rubber bridge game. South's five-club overall was certainly a good tactical measure. Not only was there a good possibility he could make the contract on its merits, but there was also a good chance that by cramping the bidding, he would make matters extremely difficult for the opponents.

As expected, West had a tough decision to make. He thought five spades was by no means certain to be made (it would probably have gone down one) and felt he simply couldn't afford to pass with the A-K of hearts as potential tricks.

A spade lead would surely have defeated the contract, but West wanted to first "take a look" at dummy and so led the king of hearts. West had his look, but it was short-lived. Declarer ruffed the heart and proceeded to reel off every one of his trumps, on the last of which East had to choose a discard in this position:

If East discarded a heart, South would next lead a spade, compelling East to return a diamond from his king after he cashed his second spade. And if East discarded a diamond, South would cash the ace and queen of diamonds.

If East discarded a spade instead, declarer would simply lead a low spade, establishing his queen as a trick. South would then discard his diamond loser on East's forced heart return and so take the last two tricks.

Once West led a heart, there was simply no way the defenders could prevent declarer from scoring 11 tricks.

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# School funding package winding through Legislature

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Legislature moved closer to a school funding fix on Friday, as Gov. Rick Perry's proposal for an expanded business tax won approval from a key Senate committee and legislative leaders tackled a school improvement package.

The tax plan is the centerpiece of legislative attempts to lower property taxes while addressing the Texas Supreme Court's order that the state fix its unconstitutional school funding system before June 1.

The expanded business tax, approved earlier this week in the House, would raise \$3.4 billion by overhauling the current loophole-ridden business tax to require more businesses to pay. The committee also approved a change in the way used vehicles are

reported for taxing purposes.

Money generated would be used to offset school property taxes, which lawmakers want to cut by a third.

The measure next will be up for debate by the full Senate.

Also Friday, House Speaker Tom Craddick said he and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst have reached a tentative agreement on education improvement measures that would include a \$2,000 pay raise for every Texas teacher and some other school employees.

The plan also would institute a new \$1,000-per-teacher bonus-pay system for educators who are able to make improvements in test scores of minorities.

Agreement between the two Republican leaders,

who are notorious for not seeing eye to eye, will make passage of such legislation much easier when lawmakers begin to negotiate a compromise.

Perry has said that he would not allow lawmakers to take up education reforms until they approve a new tax structure.

"We've been trying to work on some kind of a reform type bill for the last month or so," Craddick said. "The idea was to come up with something we could say to the governor ... this is what we've agreed on."

The school reform package would cost about \$1.5 billion a year, which could be drawn from the state's \$8.2 billion surpluses, Craddick said. The surplus also is expected to be tapped for at least \$2.4 billion to help meet pro-

jected property tax reductions next year.

Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, has questioned whether enough money exists in the surplus to give both promised property tax relief and the teacher pay raises after other obligations are met.

They may also disagree on the amount of money that can be spent on high school students to prepare them for college, said Craddick spokeswoman Alexis DeLee. The amount proposed by Dewhurst may have to be reduced to stay within spending limits, she said.

A stumbling block could be emerging in a measure that would dedicate all the money raised from the new taxes to property tax relief. The committee approved the measure despite some heated

debate.

Craddick has said the proposed business tax would have a hard time winning final approval from tax-averse House Republicans without assurances that revenues will only be used for future property tax relief.

But Democrats argued that the measure would tie the hands of future lawmakers working to address state needs.

"It's pretty much guaranteeing we'll have to raise the sales tax in the

future years," said Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston.

Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, said homeowners might see even lower property taxes — and schools might be held more accountable for their spending habits — if the new money were dedicated to education.

"The Legislature would be kind of controlling that spending from here and not putting it on the back of local taxpayers," he said.

## Jury convicts Washington state teen

EPHRATA, Wash. (AP) — A jury convicted a 15-year-old boy of first-degree murder Friday for a brutal attack on a developmentally disabled playmate more than three years ago.

Evan Savoie faces 20 to 26 years in prison for the slaying of 13-year-old Craig Sorger, who was found beaten and stabbed to death Feb. 15, 2003, in a recreational vehicle park.

Savoie, 12 years old at the time of the killing, was among the youngest murder defendants in Washington state to be tried as an adult. He had repeatedly proclaimed his innocence, saying Sorger fell from a tree and that he left him injured on a wooded trail but did not kill him.

Prosecutors alleged Savoie planned to go on a

killing spree and beat and stabbed Sorger 34 times.

Another playmate at the park that day, Jake Eakin, pleaded guilty last year to second-degree murder for watching the attack and doing nothing to stop it. He is serving 14 years in prison and testified against Savoie during the trial.

Sentencing was set for June 5. Savoie's lawyer Randy Smith said he was "a little shocked" by the verdict and added it would be appealed.

"I really thought we had created some reasonable doubt," Smith said. "... I thought at the very least

that the state had not come close to even proving premeditation."

Savoie's mother, Holly Parent, said jurors were limited in the information they had to consider.

"He's innocent," she declared, "and I hope the prosecutor's real proud of himself for just convicting an innocent boy."

Lisa Sorger, the victim's mother, was not in court when the verdict was read, but hugged prosecutors outside immediately afterward.

"Nothing's going to bring Craig back, but at least we've finally gotten justice," she said.

Deputy Prosecutor Ed Owens told jurors in his closing argument there was no evidence Sorger had ever fallen from a tree.

Savoie had blood on his clothes, access to knives and deliberately lied to investigators both after Sorger's disappearance and after his body was found, he said.

The defense told jurors that police offered no DNA evidence linking Savoie to the murder and failed to interview everyone at the park that day. Smith also said Savoie did not have enough time to kill Sorger that afternoon and walk home.

### Richards hospitalized in New Zealand after falling out of tree

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Rolling Stones guitarist Keith Richards was hospitalized for a mild concussion he suffered while vacationing in Fiji, reportedly after falling out of a palm tree.

Richards, 62, was injured earlier this week and flown to a New Zealand hospital for treatment, band spokeswoman Fran Curtis said in a statement Saturday.

"Following treatment locally and as a precautionary measure, he flew to a hospital accompanied by his wife, Patti, for observation," Curtis said.

The statement did not elaborate on Richards' condition or explain how he was injured.

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# Mexico votes to decriminalize possession of small amounts of drugs

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexicans would be allowed to possess small amounts of cocaine, heroin, even ecstasy for their personal use under a bill approved by lawmakers that some worry could prove to be a lure to young Americans.

The bill now only needs President Vicente Fox's signature to become law and that does not appear to be an obstacle. His office said that decriminalizing drugs will free up police to focus on major dealers.

"This law gives police and prosecutors better legal tools to combat drug crimes that do so much damage to our youth and children," said Fox's spokesman, Ruben

Aguilar. The Senate approved the bill Friday in the final hours of its closing session. Mexico's lower house had already endorsed the legislation.

The measure appeared to surprise U.S. officials. State Department spokeswoman Janelle Hironimus said the department was trying to get "more information" about it. One U.S. diplomat, who requested anonymity because he was not authorized to speak publicly, said "we're still studying the legislation, but any effort to decriminalize illegal drugs would not be helpful."

Some worried the law would increase drug

addiction in Mexico and cause problems with the United States. Millions of American youths visit Mexico's beach resorts and border towns each year.

"A lot of Americans already come here to buy medications they can't get up there ... Just imagine, with heroin," said Ulisis Bon, a drug treatment expert in Tijuana, where heroin use is rampant.

In off-the-record chats and through their communications with U.S. officials, Mexican officials tried to depict the drug bill as a simple clarification of existing laws. But the changes are clear.

Currently, Mexican law leaves open the possibility of dropping charges

against people caught with drugs if they can prove they are drug addicts and if an expert certifies they were caught with "the quantity necessary for personal use."

The new bill drops the "addict" requirement, allows "consumers" to have drugs, and sets out specific allowable quantities, which do not appear in the current law.

Those quantities are sometimes eye-popping: Mexicans would be allowed to possess 2.2 pounds of peyote, the button-sized hallucinogenic cactus used in some Indian religious ceremonies.

Police would no longer bother with possession of up to 25 milligrams of

heroin, 5 grams of marijuana (about one-fifth of an ounce, or about four joints), or 0.5 grams of cocaine — the equivalent of about 4 "lines," or half the standard street-sale quantity.

The law lays out allowable quantities for a large array of other drugs, including LSD, MDA, MDMA (ecstasy, about two pills' worth), and amphetamines.

However the bill stiffens penalties for trafficking and possession of drugs — even small quantities — by government employees or near schools, and maintains criminal penalties for drug sales.

Sales of all those drugs would remain illegal under the proposed law,

unlike in the Netherlands, where the sale of marijuana for medical use is legal and it can be bought with a prescription in pharmacies.

And while Dutch authorities look the other way regarding the open sale of cannabis in designated coffee shops — something Mexican police seem unlikely to do — the Dutch have zero tolerance for heroin and cocaine.

Sen. Miguel Angel Navarro of the leftist Democratic Revolution Party argued against the bill.

"This authorizes the consumption of opium, morphine, heroin, cocaine, and a variety of drugs that can only be bought illicitly."

# Security Council appears headed for replay of divisive debate over Iran's nuclear ambitions

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.N. Security Council headed for a replay of its divisive debate over Iran's nuclear ambitions, with the United States, Britain and France at odds again with China and Russia. But this time the stakes are higher.

A new report Friday from the International Atomic Energy Agency, the U.N. nuclear watchdog, confirmed what diplomats and the world already knew: Iran has refused to stop enriching uranium as the council demanded a month ago.

The council's three veto-wielding Western nations immediately announced plans to introduce a new Security Council resolution next week that would make Iran's compliance with their demands mandatory. To intensify pressure, they want the resolution under Chapter 7 of the U.N. Charter, which means it can be enforced through sanctions or military action.

China and Russia, the two other countries with veto power, oppose sanctions and military action and want the Iran nuclear issue resolved diplomatically, with the IAEA taking the lead, not the Security Council.

Iran's enrichment program has come under intense scrutiny because enriched uranium can be used to fuel civilian power plants, which Tehran says it wants, or to produce nuclear weapons, which is what Western nations suspect the Islamic country wants.

It took weeks of painstaking negotiations to craft the March 29 council statement giving Iran 30 days to stop enriching uranium, and the result was much

weaker than the West wanted.

With the possibility of sanctions or military action on the horizon, the upcoming negotiations are certain to be even more divisive.

At least for the moment, the five permanent members all agree on one key point: The best way to resolve the nuclear standoff with Iran is through diplomacy.

But the initial reactions to the report by IAEA Director General Mohamed ElBaradei, which also accused Iran of blocking U.N. attempts to find out whether it wants nuclear arms, showed how far apart the key players are.

Iran's president, Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, remained defiant, saying no Security Council resolution could make Iran give up its nuclear program.

"The Iranian nation won't give a damn about such useless resolutions," Ahmadinejad told thousands of people Friday in northwestern Iran before the IAEA report was issued.

"Those who resort to language of coercion should know that nuclear energy is a national demand and by the grace of God, today Iran is a nuclear country," state-run television quoted him as saying.

Iran's U.N. Ambassador Javan Zarif was more conciliatory Saturday, saying "there are a multitude of possibilities for reaching a solution" if all parties agree that while Iran should not develop atomic weapons, it has the right to nuclear power.

"I believe if you start from these two assumptions and not draw arbitrary red lines then we

will be able to reach a mutually acceptable negotiated solution," Zarif told the British Broadcasting Corp.

He accused Western nations of lacking political will to resolve the problem and creating "an unnecessary crisis" by bringing in the Security Council.

"We have said from the very beginning that bringing the Security Council into the picture does not help because Iran does not respond well to pressure," he said.

Iran's deputy nuclear chief, Mohammad Saeeidi, said uranium enrichment would continue and announced the country was installing two more 164-centrifuge cascades at its enrichment plant in Natanz. Iran successfully enriched uranium for the first time earlier this month, using 164 centrifuges.

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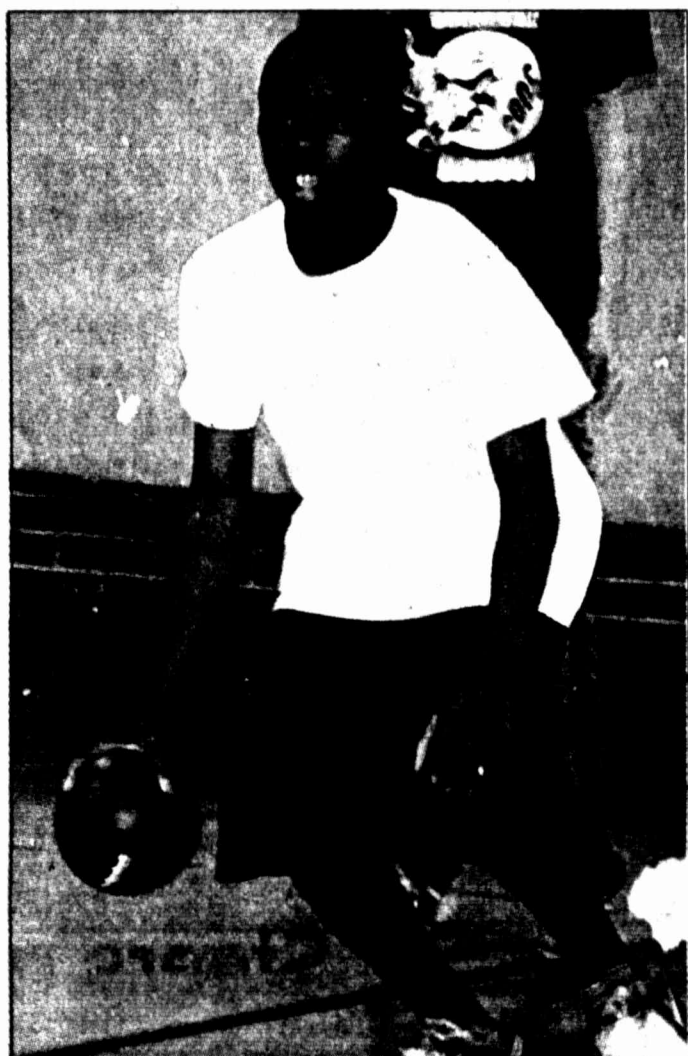

SAN ANGELO — Big Spring juniors Chris Martinez and Katy Abner reached Saturday's finals of two running events after successful runs Friday at the Region 1-4A track meet in San Angelo.

Martinez tried to advance to state in the 800-meter run Saturday, but final results were unavailable at press time. He ran a personal-best 1:59.79 Friday to SALAZAR qualify sixth in the event. The top two finishers in each event advance to the state meet.

"I felt so good, but I hit a rail near the end of the race and that kind of slowed me down," said Martinez. "Man I felt good though."

The race was rather close after that as five runners were within 00.78 seconds apart.

"I am going to try to draft the Fort Worth kid and let him pull me around the track," said Martinez. "And whatever happens, happens."

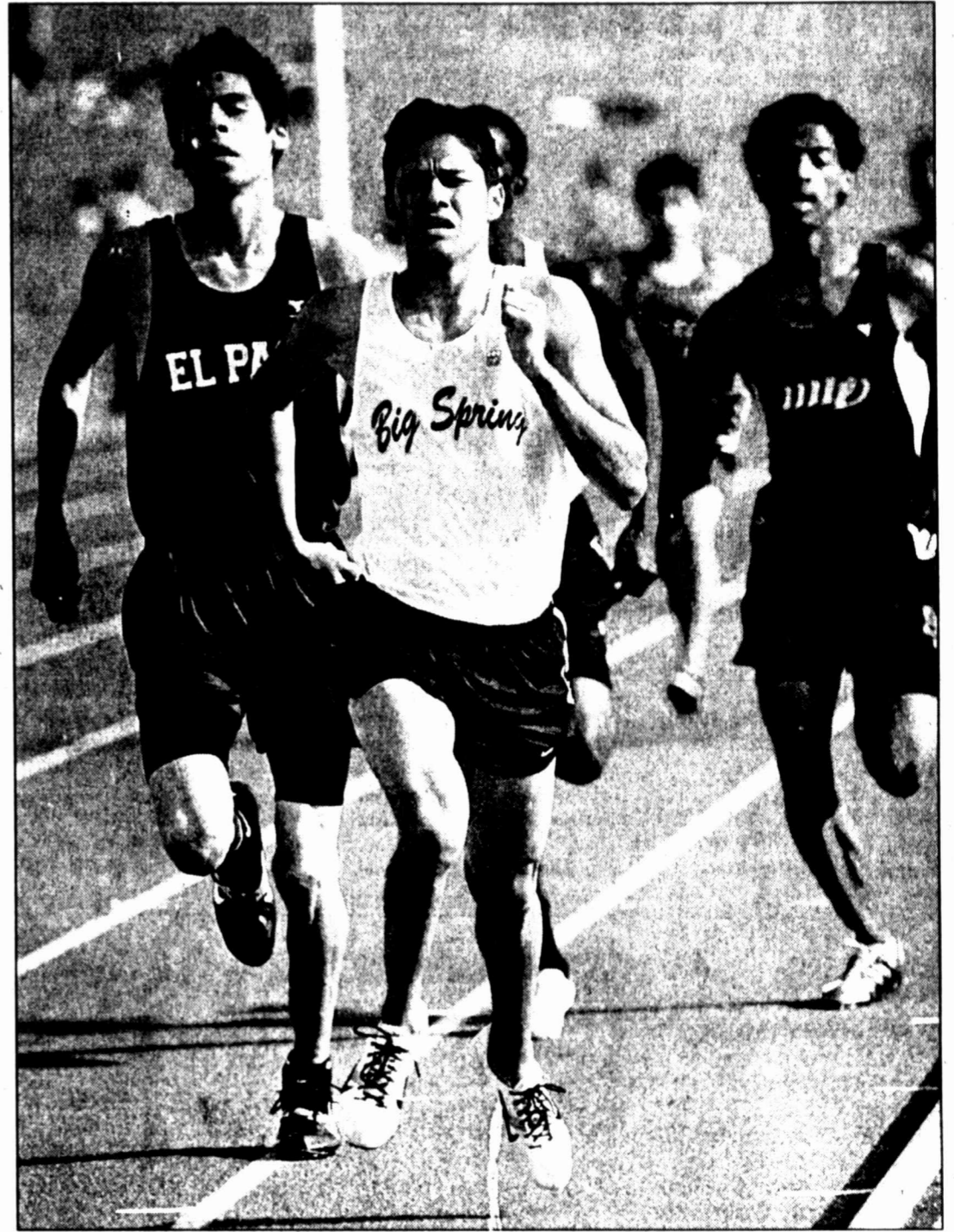
Chris Salazar also ran in the 800-meter run Friday, but despite running a personal best, he failed to qualify for the finals after crossing the line in 2:02.

"My back stretch was too slow," said Salazar, who just started running 800s this year. "I didn't expect to qualify for state, but I am still disappointed I couldn't qualify for the finals."

The biggest reason: head coach Tim Holt wanted more workouts — plain and simple.

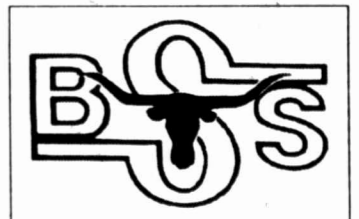
"School is starting earlier and earlier these days and this year if we didn't have spring workouts we would almost have no two-a-day practices," said Holt, who will begin his second year as head coach after guiding the team to a 4-8 record and playoff berth last season.

"We are getting 18 days in the spring and trading in the six days we would have had in the fall."

Holt wants the community to be heavily involved with what they are trying to do at the school and said the workouts will be open to the public. He added that he is almost positive having spring workouts is the best thing for any team.

"We always seem to be ahead of the game entering the fall after having workouts in the spring," said Holt. "The spring will be used to narrow down who the starters are going to be so we can go right to work in the fall. Things can change over the summer, but we should have a pretty good idea of where we are during the spring."

The practices will begin Monday at 6 p.m. and run through May 27. Practices for the four weeks will be at 4:30 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. The first Saturday prac-



tice will be at 9 a.m. and 7 p.m., the second Saturday practice will be at 10 a.m. because of prom and then the final two Saturdays will begin at 7 p.m. The final Saturday (May 27) with the spring game.

"We want the community to be involved so we are inviting anyone who wants to come watch to do so," said Holt.

Holt said he isn't going to make changes to the offense which was run last year, but the defense will most likely be simplified.

"I am excited about this year," said the second-year coach. "We're trying to raise expectations on work ethics, academics and self-discipline and we want to have the chance to be successful."

A lot of last year's impact players should be even better this season, according to Holt. Ryan Tannehill, who will be a senior at the start of next year, returns at quarterback and is stronger than a year ago.

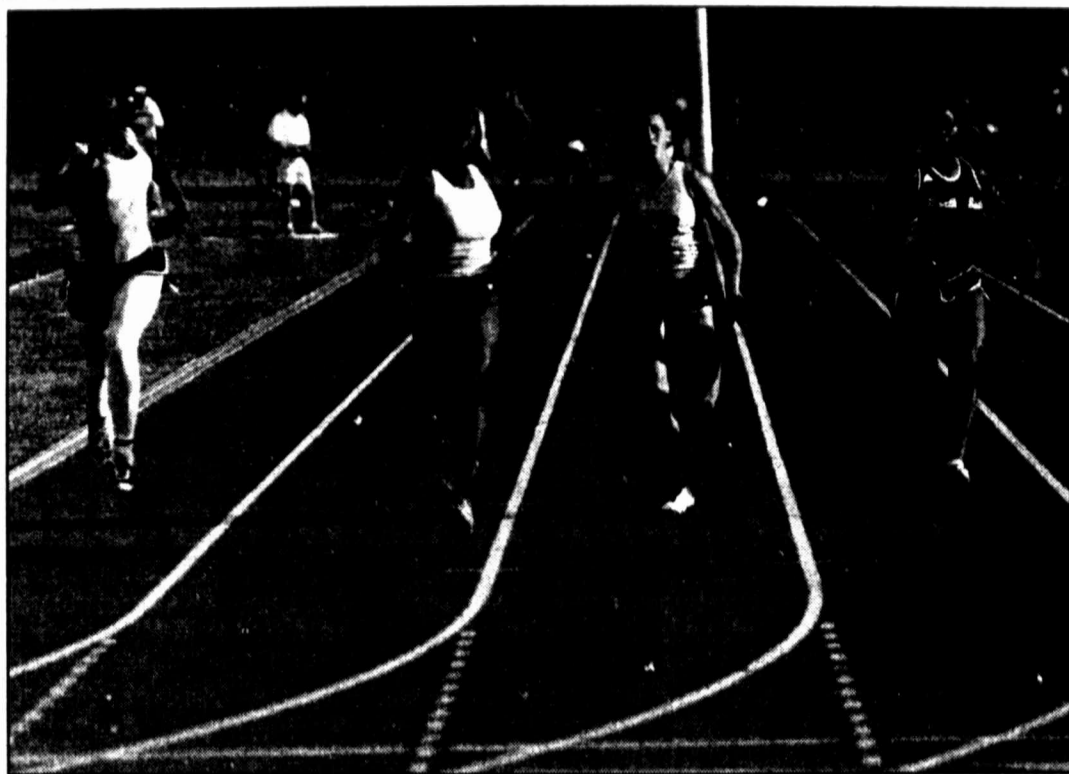

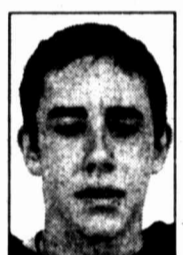
same position, but we as a coaching staff will find a way to get them on the field. The goal for us is to get the best 11 guys on the field."

Texans pass on Bush, take Williams

NEW YORK — Mario Williams, Reggie Bush and Vince Young all went in the top five of the NFL draft Saturday as expected.

Not Matt Leinart. The 2004 Heisman Trophy winner took a slide to No. 10, finally picked by Arizona after several teams in desperate need of a signal caller passed on the Southern California quarterback.

"I went No. 10. There could be worse things in life, you know?" Leinart said, cracking a smile. "I

think things happen for a reason, I fell to Arizona for a reason, and I look forward to going there. ... I think it's a good fit for me."

Williams went No. 1 overall to Houston, one day after the North Carolina State standout defensive end signed a six-year, \$54 million contract. Bush, who teamed with Leinart at USC and was projected to be the top pick overall, next went to New Orleans.

The Titans went for a younger, faster version of the aging Steve McNair, taking Young of national

champion Texas at No. 3. And the Jets, who have Chad Pennington recovering from his second rotator cuff injury, pleased their large, loud contingency by choosing Virginia left tackle D'Brickashaw Ferguson fourth.

Leinart then dropped out of the top five when Green Bay selected Ohio State linebacker A.J. Hawk, and slipped further when San Francisco — which has its future quarterback in 2005 No. 1 pick Alex Smith — took Maryland tight end Vernon Davis.

And Leinart kept falling — past Oakland, Buffalo and Detroit.

It was something of a surprise, considering he would likely have been the top overall pick last year if he left school early as a junior. The left-hander, who has played in a pro-style offense, succeeded Pro Bowl quarterback Carson Palmer at USC and fits the classic drop-back model.

But there have been questions about his arm strength that might have contributed to his slide.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — When Kevin Martin got the bounce, the Sacramento Kings got new life in the playoffs — and the San Antonio Spurs got a taste of the empty disappointment that comes when a fairly lucky shot goes against you.

Martin tossed in a twisting, three-bounce, wrong-handed layup over Tim Duncan as time expired, and the Kings grabbed a 94-93 victory in Game 3 Friday night, cutting the Spurs' lead in the first-round series to 2-1.

After just three games, this series already has more than its share of dramatics. The top-seeded Spurs won an overtime thriller in Game 2, with Brent Barry's game-tying regulation 3-pointer bouncing twice on the rim and backboard before falling through.

"Now they know how we felt after that game," said Bonzi Wells, who had 19 points and 14 rebounds. "The ball was bouncing on the rim, and went in. Hopefully that's on their mind going into the next game."

Game 4 is Sunday in Sacramento, with Game 5 back in San Antonio on Tuesday.

Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said it all: "Great game. What goes around comes around, I guess." Mike Bibby's pass to Martin on the Kings' final fastbreak led to an improbable finish to the second straight game in this series — and it made an unlikely hero out of Martin, who had just 10

points and six rebounds in a game dominated by Duncan and the Kings' veteran starters until his clinching bucket.

"The ball finally bounced our way," said Martin, who claimed he was simply trying to draw a foul on his remarkable drive to the hoop. "I knew once Mike gave me the ball, there were only 4 seconds left. I had to go to the rim. There was no choice. I had to go for it."

Neither team led by more than four points in the fourth quarter of Game 3. Michael Finley hit a go-ahead 3-pointer for the Spurs with 41.1 seconds left, and Ron Artest turned the ball over with 27 seconds remaining in his return from a one-game suspension.

The Spurs ran down the clock until the final seconds, and the Kings didn't foul despite a mere 3-second difference between the shot clock and the game clock. But Manu Ginobili capped a terrible game by losing the ball on a drive for his seventh turnover.

"I just kind of lost it," Ginobili said. "It was the worst turnover of my career. I really don't know what happened. I'm just very upset right now. We had the game, and of course I let it go."

Bibby, who had 25 points, rushed the ball to midcourt and fed Martin. He drove the lane and lofted a right-handed shot from the left side over Duncan, who blocked six shots in a dominant performance also featuring 29 points and 12

Titans select Young with third pick

• Tennessee passes on USC all-American Leinart in favor of Texas all-American Young in NFL draft

AP Sports Writer NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Tennessee Titans had their choice of quarterbacks Saturday, and selected a younger and faster version of the man who has started for them in that position the past nine years.

Vince Young will succeed Steve McNair, the man who has mentored him on and off the field in recent years.

That relationship may not continue as teammates with the Titans, though, because the team wants to rework McNair's pricey contract for relief from his \$23.46 million salary cap number.

The Titans, with the third pick, had three outstanding quarterbacks to

choose among. Matt Leinart had worked under Titans offensive coordinator Norm Chow at Southern California, and Jay Cutler of Vanderbilt was the sentimental pick locally.

But the Titans have experience gambling on athletic ability — they

made McNair the No. 3 pick overall in 1995, then watched him take the franchise to its only Super Bowl and two AFC championship games.

That helped lead them to make the 6-foot-4, 229-pound Young the choice.

He is faster than Leinart or Cutler, running the 40-

yard dash in 4.57 seconds. The crowning moment of his Longhorns career came Jan. 4 in the Rose Bowl when he passed for 267 yards and ran for 200 more, including an 8-yard scramble on fourth down for the winning touchdown and the national championship.

Along came Arizona, which needed a quarterback to learn behind Kurt Warner. The addition of Leinart is another huge piece to offense for the Cardinals, who signed Edgerrin James as a free agent and have the best receiver tandem in the NFL in Larry Fitzgerald and Anquan Boldin.

Vanderbilt's Jay Cutler, the final quarterback of the "Big Three," went to Denver at No. 11 after the Broncos traded up four spots to get St. Louis' pick. The Rams get Denver's No. 15 pick, and also got a third-round selection (No. 68 overall).

Though the suspense was already gone by the time the No. 1 pick was announced — and with the crowd booing and chanting "overrated" — Williams proudly hugged commissioner Paul Tagliabue after his name was called at Radio City Music Hall, home to the famed Rockettes.

"I came from behind. I'm an underdog, basically," Williams said. "There's kind of a chip on my shoulder."

Though Bush was projected as the top selection, the Texans made the surprising and bold move for Williams. The defensive disrupter got a deal worth \$26.5 million guaranteed.

Williams, who has been described as a cross between Julius Peppers and Lawrence Taylor, saw his stock soar after his amazing performance at the NFL combine in February. The 6-foot-6 1/2, 292-pound Williams ran the 40-yard dash in 4.73

seconds and had 35 reps on the 225-pound bench press.

He becomes the first defensive end taken No. 1 overall since Courtney Brown went to the Cleveland Browns in 2000, and the 12th defensive lineman to be picked at the top of the draft. The Texans, who haven't had a winning season in their four-year existence, got the first pick after going 2-14 this past season.

"He can be another Reggie White," Texans owner Bob McNair said. "That's what our people think."

Throughout the college football season, Bush dazzled with his electrifying moves and stunning speed en route to the Heisman Trophy.

Now the running back will bring his act to New Orleans, teaming with newly signed free-agent quarterback Drew Brees and running back Deuce McAllister, who is rehabilitating a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his knee.

"I'm coming in there strong, I'm coming in there to help win some games," Bush said.

Bush has had more on his mind than the draft after questions were raised concerning who paid the rent for a home his parents lived in, and whether an agent was involved, which could violate NCAA rules. He's adamantly insisted there was no wrongdoing.

The 6-foot, 200-pound Bush, who wore San Diego's 619 area code painted underneath his eyes during USC games, had 1,740 yards rushing and 2,890 all-purpose yards this past season for the Trojans as a junior.

He decided to leave school early to enter the draft after USC lost to Texas in the national championship game.

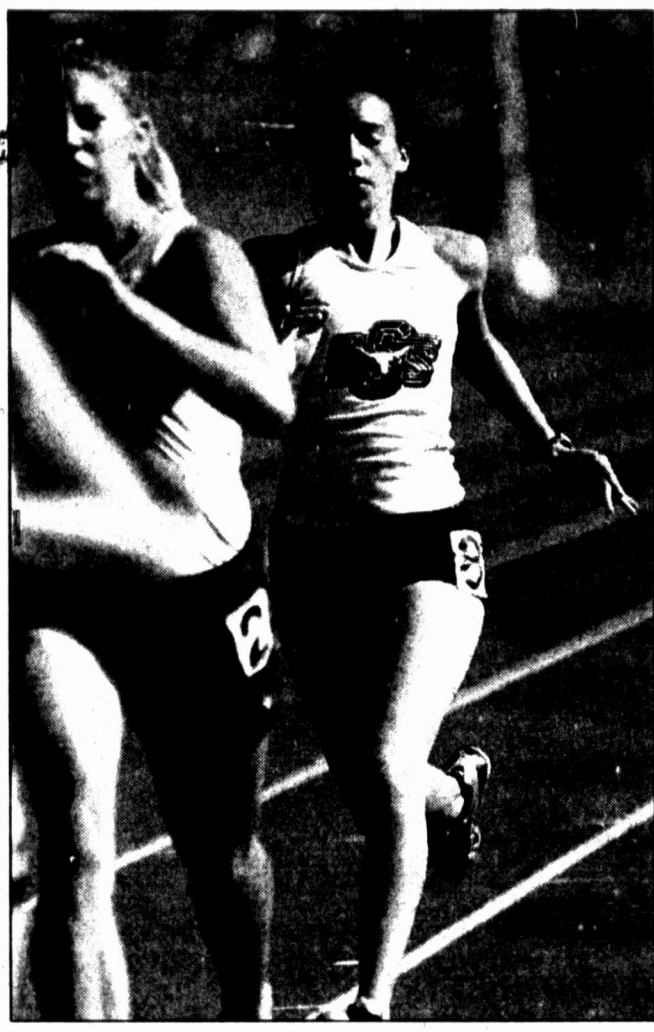
Bush averaged 8.9 yards per carry this season, caught 37 passes for 478 yards and led the nation in all-purpose yards with 222.3 per game. Bush shared the tailback position for three years with LenDale White, and the two combined for 99 career touchdowns to break the NCAA record of 97 set by Army's Glenn Davis and Felix "Doc" Blanchard from 1943-46.

Though Leinart played for Titans offensive coordinator Norm Chow at USC, general manager Floyd Reese was said to prefer Young, who passed for 267 yards, ran for 200 more and scrambled 8 yards on fourth down with 19 seconds left for the winning touchdown in a 41-38 win over Leinart and USC in the Rose Bowl. Though he has terrific running ability and a great arm, many are unsure how he will fit into a pro-style offense.

The Titans are in messy negotiations with McNair, who was told to stay away from team headquarters until talks to reduce his salary cap number are resolved.

Though Green Bay needs a replacement for Brett Favre, the Packers must be content with backup Aaron Rodgers, who was their first-round pick last year.

Oakland took Texas defensive back Michael Huff at No. 7, Buffalo chose Ohio State safety Donté Whitner eighth and Detroit finally went for a defensive player, taking Florida State linebacker Ernie Sims at No. 9.

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# Hospitality House

### Big Spring's big heart opened to visitors

**T**hey travel to Big Spring from all over the world, including Canada, Amsterdam, New York City, Columbia, Costa Rica and California, as well as from Texas communities such as Dallas, Lubbock and San Juan.

And while they arrive at the Hospitality House virtual strangers, intent upon securing their position in the visitors waiting line at one of the local prisons, they leave the house each weekend with new friends and close bonds of family.

"If it weren't for the Hospitality House, I'd still be sleeping in my car or staying in a hotel when I could afford it. This place is a God send. I couldn't afford to keep coming if it weren't for the Hospitality House," said Plainview native Vanessa Mijares, 46, who has been traveling to Big Spring to visit her husband for nearly four years.

And other women who frequent the local ministry use phrases like 'blessing' and 'restful' and 'thank God for the Hospitality House.'

"They make us feel right at home and I rest better here than I do at home. It's always so clean, cleaner than a hotel, and it is so nice to have a Christian environment," said Marcell McDave, who has made the trip from Lubbock to Big Spring for almost four years.

The Hospitality House is a local Baptist ministry that provides shelter and lodging for families who have a loved one incarcerated in a local prison. Now in its 11th year, the facility houses up to 39 adults every weekend except for a handful of holidays each year, such as Christmas and Easter.

Wayne and Frances Bristow are the directors of the house. Their on-site job means they work every weekend, keeping the doors open and the facility welcoming to the individuals and families seeking shelter.

"We do not charge for the weekend, but most do leave a donation. We really don't question them about why their loved one is in jail, that's very stressful. We just make them feel welcome," Wayne said.

Frances Bristow said the week is spent preparing the house for the weekend guests. She makes beds, does laundry, cleans, stocks and otherwise maintains the property for the families she feels are like her own family.

"At first, I did it all by myself and I can tell you, it takes a long time to do the laundry. Now I have two volunteers, Beverly Johnson and Bonnie Wheat, who come help once a week. After you learn how to do this, it's not so hard," Frances Wheat.

What's not so hard is making 29 bunk beds, three full size beds and one queen bed each week, as well as the laundry. While the house does not supply groceries for the families, a kitchen is equipped with beverages and staples for the weekend visitors.

"These families go through so much and they sacrifice a lot to come here. We have several women and families we have just fallen in love with," Frances said.

Funded through the Big Spring Baptist Association, the Bristows said the work is a real mission of love for them.

"We really feel we were led to do this. Frances expressed an interest to me after the other directors retired and they couldn't find someone to take over. We prayed about it and accepted," Wayne said.

And a large component of the ministry, aside from providing shelter, is the church service, conducted in Spanish at 5 p.m. every Saturday, by the retired Rev. Andres Rodriguez.

April 21 the guests threw a birthday party for Rodriguez, preparing for him a traditional Mexican meal of molé.

The Rev. Dwayne Wheat said in the course of the nearly 11 years of operation, there may have been as many as 300 professions of faith made at the house. And the Bristows said they know the service provides refuge to these families,

as evidenced from the cards, letters, phone calls and e-mails they receive.

"We realize the families who come here are facing serious problems and while we don't ask for the details, we do our best to sympathize and listen if they ask us to," Frances said.

The Hospitality House is open for tours in an Open House from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m., Sunday, May 7 to allow the Big Spring community to see the facility and meet the Bristows. Renovations are being done now to expand the bathrooms of the house as well as create a children's playroom and additional bedrooms.

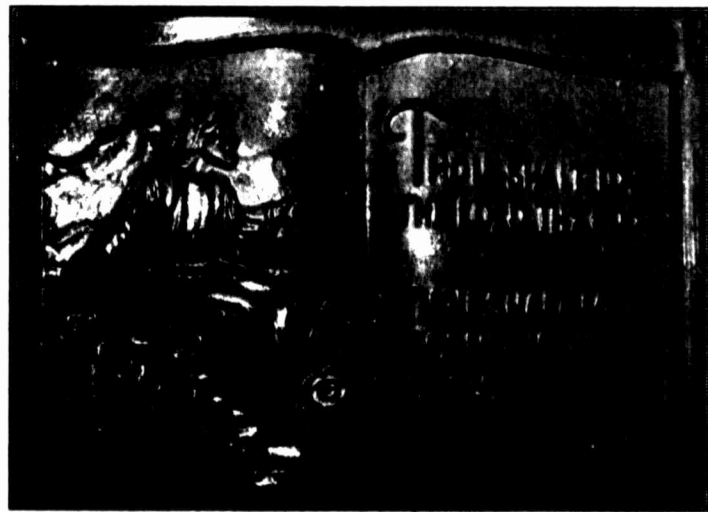

## Across the country, gas prices affect the cost of pizzas and flowers

The rising price of gasoline could do more than drive up the cost of commuting or taking a vacation. It could also force you to pay a little extra to have your lawn mowed, send flowers to your sweetheart, get a pizza delivered or have a flat tire fixed.

Around the country, from a florist in Delaware to a pizza maker in Chicago, businesses that use lots of gasoline to make deliveries and service calls are raising their prices — or seriously thinking about it — to cover their costs.

In many cases, these businesses are also being hit with fuel surcharges by their suppliers. And that, too, is putting pressure on them to pass the costs along to their cus-

tomers. The situation demonstrates the many small ways in which \$3-a-gallon gasoline could affect ordinary people.

Leigh Sorrells, owner of a bike shop in Danbury, Conn., said that because of higher fuel prices, bicycle makers are charging him an extra \$3 to \$5 for each bike shipped. He said he has yet to raise prices, but is giving customers fewer freebies, such as bike accessories.

"It's all going to come around, and that's the downside," he said. "Whether it's food, my stuff, this stuff, that stuff — everything is going to get more expensive."

In Dover, Del., Jen-Mor Florists, with a fleet of six trucks that generally handle 100 deliveries a

## EDS wins \$1.7 billion contract from Kraft Foods

PLANO (AP) — Electronic Data Systems Corp. said Friday it received a seven-year, \$1.7 billion contract to handle technology needs for Kraft Foods Inc., the world's second-largest food and beverage company.

EDS will manage data centers and manage desktop workstations and servers for more than 60,000 Kraft employees around the world.

EDS partners including Dell Inc., Microsoft Corp., Cisco Systems Inc. and EMC Corp. will play a key role in providing

hardware and software to Kraft.

EDS said the deal was the biggest contract of its kind that the company has won in the consumer and retail sector.

About 670 Kraft employees worldwide will move to EDS, a technology-services company based in Plano.

Kraft, based in Northfield, Ill., said it will record unspecified asset impairment and implementation costs related to the transaction, which are part of its previously announced restructuring program.

# Summer is almost here - does your teen want a tan?

Summer time is almost here, and that means thousands of teens are hitting the tanning salons to get that perfect tan for that important night. But before your teen gets a tan, consider this: tanning isn't as healthy as it looks.

Tanning beds have been marketed as a "safe" alternative to sunbathing outdoors; however, tanning is actually an unhealthy habit. In spite of popular beliefs, tanning salons may not be a good alternative to tanning in the sun, say experts from Texas Cooperative Extension and the Texas Cancer Council. Research from the American Cancer Society indicates:

- Women who visit a tanning salon at least once a month have a 55 percent greater risk of developing melanoma, the most serious type of skin cancer than women who don't go to tanning salons.

- For women age 20-29, the risk of developing melanoma is two and a half times greater if they visit tanning salons at least once a month than for women who don't go to salons.

Do you still think it's OK for your son or daughter to visit a tanning salon or to lay outside to get that "perfect tan"? Tanning, whether outdoors or indoors, is caused by UV-A (ultraviolet-A) radiation. This radiation causes damage at an even deeper level than sunburn and changes underlying skin structure in a way that can lead to skin cancer at a later time. Since UV-A damages the skin at a deeper level; it took scientists longer to determine that it did cause changes that could

be precancerous. That is why tanning beds were once marketed as being safe — science had not caught up to them.

Current figures from the American Cancer Society show twice as many cases of melanoma in Americans than were reported 30 years ago, and the numbers are still going up. Researchers are looking for a science-based alternative way to tan safely. In the meantime, tanning salons advertise a "base tan" that can offer protection from sunburns, and young women seem to be buying it. A recent study showed that by age 19, nearly half (47 percent) of white women had used a tanning booth three or more times. "There's a whole tanning industry that's trying to promote ultraviolet exposure as a good thing, and that's a problem," says Dr. Martin Weinstock, chair of the American Cancer Society's

skin cancer advisory group. The problem is because the radiation that causes tanning also causes deep skin changes that can lead to skin cancer.

A tan is a sign of skin that has been injured. And this kind of injury accumulates, so every suntan further damages the skin. In addition, tans speed up the aging process and increase the risk of skin cancer. You don't wish old-looking skin on your son or daughter at a younger age. If you were a "sun worshiper" in your younger days, think about how your skin might look better if you hadn't tanned. You have influence over your children's behaviors. You could also be saving your child from developing some kind of skin cancer in the future. This year alone, about 2,200 people will die of nonmelanoma skin cancer, and 7,400 will die of melanoma. One day, your child could be a part of these statis-

tics. If your son or daughter would like a little more color in their skin, promote a safer alternative and try one of the many self-tanning lotions on the market. Texas Cooperative Extension and Texas Cancer Council encourage you to take charge of your child's health now, which will lead to a healthier tomorrow. Companies want to make you a star — in ads at least.

You might have heard that some marketers are using ordinary people like you to make ads to get the word out about their products. Now, marketers are taking the concept of consumer-generated ads a step further and getting average Joes to star in ads and other promotions.

This is just the latest way advertisers such as McDonald's Corp. and WRIF-FM are trying to stop people from ignoring or avoiding their ads by using devices such as digital-video recorders. By getting consumers involved in their marketing, advertisers hope they'll buy or use their products and services — and encourage others to do the same.

To that end, McDonald's this month began an online global casting call for consumers to be featured on its cups and bags. The Oak Brook, Ill.-based fast-food chain solicits consumers to submit digital photos and personal stories of up to 100 words about what they love to [www.mcdglobalcasting.com](http://www.mcdglobalcasting.com) through May 31.

McDonald's said it will pick as many as 25 consumers to be

the stars on its packaging based on their entries on the Web site, which is available in 16 languages. Winners are to be notified in August.

"We're thrilled to bring these personal images from around the globe literally into the hands of our 50 million customers in a unique and fun way," said Mary Dillon, McDonald's global chief marketing officer.

At a time when reality television sheds light on the ordinary lives of everyday people, advertisers are finding ways to similarly shine the spotlight on their customers.

Unilever's Dove soap and beauty products company got lots of attention last year when the company began using women of all shapes and sizes in its ads as part of its global Campaign for Real Beauty. The company followed up by using little girls — not models — in its Super Bowl XL spot.

To be sure, using everyday people isn't new but rather a twist on an old idea. Bentonville, Ark.-based Wal-Mart Stores Inc., the world's biggest retailer, has

day, has scaled back last-minute deliveries at the edge of its territory to just one run per day.

"We've had a lot of waste, like running 15 miles for one delivery. We've had to open our eyes to some of those things," said florist John Zimmerman.

Several months ago, he said, he raised his delivery charge by as much as \$1 — the cost is now \$6 to \$10 — but that doesn't cover his costs, and he may have to increase it again.

In Greenville, Texas, Crew Cut Lawns, a landscaping and lawn care service with \$180,000 worth of equipment and four gas-guzzling

Suburbans, has raised prices 5 percent and stopped offering free irrigation estimates to outlying callers.

At American Tire Inc. shop in Wheeling, W.Va., Tom Fredericks has doubled his \$5 charge for road service calls to fix flat tires. He said he may also have to increase prices for tires, which are made from oil.

Connie's Pizza, a Chicago-based chain that makes about 10 million pies a year, has a fleet of 60 delivery trucks that use a total of \$10,000 to \$12,000 in gas per week, president Marc Stolfe said.

The company charges a \$2 delivery fee. But because of the run-up in gasoline prices, that no longer covers the overhead costs, Stolfe said. So far, he has yet to raise the

delivery charge for fear of losing business.

"We're trying to find other ways to reduce costs," he said. "If this is permanent, I don't know where else you can go."

While filling up his four-wheeler at a gas station in East Peoria, Ill., Jason Johnson, 36, said that if pizza shops start charging more for delivery, he will stop having pizza delivered.

"I'm just the kind of person that if I'm paying for it, I'm not going to pay them to bring it to me," he said.

But Roland Lahne, 70, is resigned to the prospect of paying higher prices for all sorts of products. "We don't have a choice. You can't do without. You have to pay the price," he said. "If it costs more, I have to pay more."

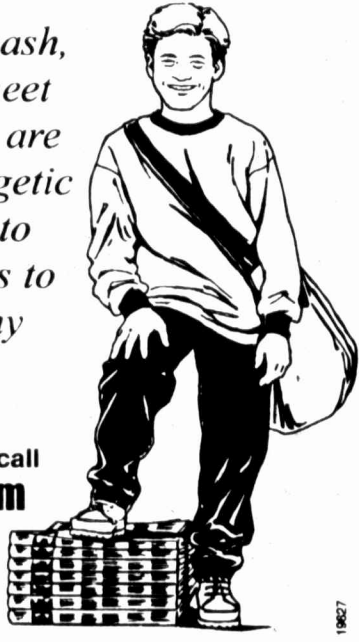

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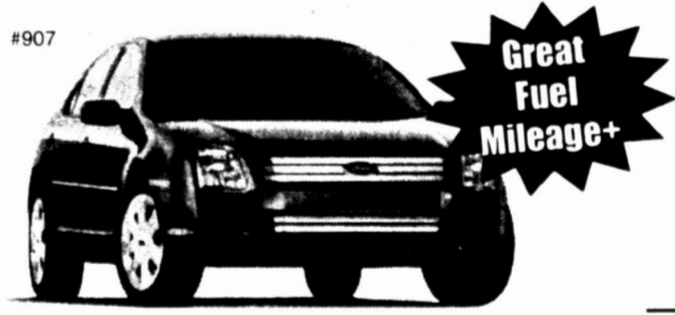

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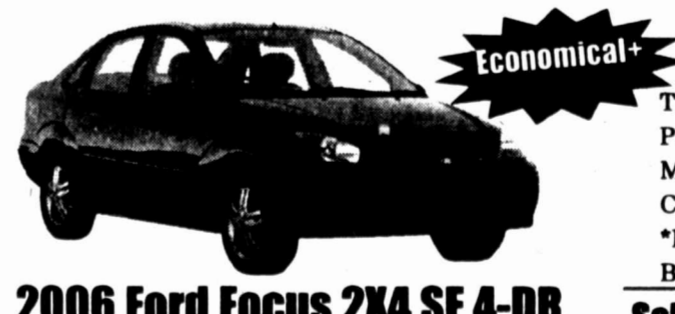

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# United 93

David and Peggy Beamer don't think it's too soon for Hollywood to be turning out movies about the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001.

The Beamers' son, Todd, perished in a field near Shanksville, Pa., after he and other passengers overwhelmed the four men who had hijacked their Boeing 757 and thwarted a planned assault on the U.S. Capitol.

They've seen "United 93," the movie that sparked national debate in the media, and they think the rest of America should see it as well when it opens Friday.

"I can't speak for every family member, but as far as I know, the family members who have seen the film are unanimous in their support of 'United 93,'" said David Beamer. "This is an important story about real people fighting a real battle in a real war. This story needs to be told factually and accurately for this generation, and generations to come."

The Ohio couple said the movie was very difficult to watch — it was easy for them to recognize the actor portraying their son because he was wearing an Ohio State cap similar to the one Todd Beamer was wearing that day — but they still felt it was worth it.

"Maybe it would have been too soon in the first two years," Peggy Beamer said. "But this is the right time. If Hollywood had waited any longer, the evidence would have been hearsay. This way, the families had a lot of input."

British filmmaker Paul Greengrass, who wrote and directed the film, said he did not make "United 93" to end the debate on whether it was too soon, but rather to join a larger

debate that has been ongoing since the attacks.

"It was the most important event of our lifetime, and a great debate has been going on since then about how our world was changed, and how we should react to our new world," he said. "The debate has been at times angry, but always passionate."

"Every newspaper, magazine, TV station, radio station, bookstore and Internet site has been involved in the debate," he added. "So, isn't it time that filmmakers joined that debate?"

Greengrass, who has a Hollywood blockbuster on his resume ("The Bourne Supremacy"), is better known in filmmaking circles for his documentary-style film "Bloody Sunday," about the 1972 civil-rights march in Northern Ireland that resulted in the deaths of 13 people when British soldiers fired into a crowd of protesters.

He approached "United 93" with the same style of filmmaking. The story of the doomed 91-minute flight is told in real time after some early footage of the flight crew arriving for work, passengers idly passing the time before boarding and the terrorists saying their morning prayers.

But before a single frame was shot, Greengrass and his associates spent the better part of a year meet-

ing with the families of every passenger on the flight. During extensive interviews with the families, personal histories of the victims were collected, and anxieties were calmed.

"Paul was very sensitive to our feelings," David Beamer said, "and the movie reflects that sensitivity."

Greengrass said he received the approval of every family member, which he said was an important factor in deciding whether to proceed with the project.

"I explained to each family member that in my other films about terrorism, I always tried to maintain the dignity of the victims' families. I also tried to ask why a certain event happened. I think I was able to build a foundation of trust by making myself accountable. I feel an accountability to the families, and to the audience."

"But talk is cheap, and I told them that they would be the first ones to see and judge the completed film, and that if they didn't like what they saw, they were free to disassociate themselves from it."

With the families in his corner, Greengrass said he began compiling research beyond the family histories, using transcripts of voice recorders on the plane, as well as phone calls made from the plane,

and declassified documents that recounted what happened in the control towers and at various government facilities.

"From all that, you can deduce a very clear picture of what happened aboard that plane," the director said.

Greengrass also relied on the expertise and recollections of many airline and government employees who were hired to play themselves in the movie.

"We used an identical 757 as our set," Greengrass said, "and I had a real flight attendant and two real pilots in my cast to keep me on track."

"An example of how they helped was in showing the attack on the hijackers. There seems to be this widespread idea that the passengers ran a serving cart down the aisle at the attackers. But the airline people were unanimous in disagreeing with that theory. They said it would be impossible to do that, given that it is difficult enough to move those carts at a slow pace."

"So, using their professional judgment, I made a rational deduction that the passengers rushed the hijackers on foot. Later, I depict them using the serving cart to try to break through the cockpit door, but that is based on recordings in which you hear thumping and crockery breaking that

is consistent with a cart being pounded against a door."

One of the "actors" in the film who is playing himself is Federal Aviation Administration official Ben Sliney, who was working his first day as the FAA's national operations manager on Sept. 11, 2001.

Originally, Sliney was invited to be an adviser on the film, but at a dinner in London, where the film was shot, he was asked who he would like to play him.

"My wife said George Clooney, but that's just because she wanted to meet him," Sliney said. "Then they asked if I thought I could play myself, and I said: 'I've been playing me for 60 years, so a couple more hours shouldn't make much of a difference.'"

Sliney, a former attorney who is now FAA operations manager in the New York City area, said he agreed to participate in the film because he wanted to make sure Greengrass got the control-tower scenes right. He said he is pleased with the film's accuracy, and added his support to the argument that it is not too soon for movies about 9/11.

"In 1950, five years was not a long time," he said. "But today, all of our lives are condensed. The whole

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# What you expect from Williams; even more the film

You know what to expect from a Robin Williams vehicle. "RV" is better than what you expect.

The movie is funny enough to temporarily divert Robin's further drowning in Chevy Chase quicksand. That's qualified praise, without a doubt, and the praise grows even fainter in retrospect. The slapstick moments are completely predictable, but director Barry Sonnenfeld stages them with finesse. And some of the dialogue is sprightly and even witty.

Then there's Williams himself. He's a gifted physical comedian, and his vulnerable presence suits his sad-sack role. You know that somewhere along the line the titular vehicle's plumbing will go awry, and Williams will wind up with a feces facial. A runny joke, but Robin manages to swim through it.

He plays soft drink executive Bob Munro, who's losing job security as his dishonest boss favors younger talent. Bob's un-

grateful family is chagrined when he suggests an RV road trip to Colorado in hopes of regaining the intimacy they once shared.

They would be even more indignant if they knew

Bob's real reason for the summer trip: to deliver a sales pitch that might save his job. The plot mechanics are tired, with Bob repeatedly juggling personal and professional calamities. But the Williams-Sonnen-

feld execution is better than the gags deserve.

Also superior to the material are Jeff Daniels and Kristin Chenoweth as kind-hearted hicks with their own RV. Chenoweth, in particular, is a delight as a

voluptuous variation of Dogpatch's Daisy Mae from the old Li'l Abner comics. Their first interaction with the Munro clan rekindles some of the chemistry of Jack Nicholson's similar episodes in "About Schmidt." Don't expect any other "Schmidt" echoes.

By comparison, Cheryl Hines, JoJo Levesque and Josh Hutcherson have little to do but look skeptical and petulant as, respectively, Bob's wife, daughter and son.

The film begins promisingly with Bob imitating Sylvester Stallone as a Tickle Monster to his adoring pre-school daughter. In the next scene, the daughter has turned 15 and denounces dad as a total dork.

Not to worry. It has a happy, sappy ending.

world saw 9/11 happen, and the way the media and communications work these days, five years is a very long time. Besides, it's important to have movies like this because I think the world is getting too complacent."

David Beamer seconded that notion, saying that the film is not only inspirational, but also a "reminder that there is an enemy out to destroy us."

Veteran actor Christian Clemenson plays 38-year-old businessman Thomas Burnett, one of the leaders of the passenger revolt.

"Yes, I hesitated for a long time before accepting the role," Clemenson said. "The last thing in the world I wanted to do was to



be part of an exploitative movie that didn't respect the victims, their families and the event itself.

"But when I heard that the families were behind the project, and then I met Paul, so I knew this was not going to be a cheesy Hollywood version of Sept. 11."

Clemenson said Greengrass created such a realistic set (the actors were

even served the same meal as the passengers of Flight 93) that he found the work unsettling.

In fact, he said, he was unable to speak to the actors portraying the hijackers until two weeks into filming.

"Paul kept them away during the rehearsal period, and then had them separated from us during filming," the actor said. "As a

result, I couldn't talk to them, or even see them as human beings. I think I was one of the last people who broke down and talked to them. It was a different atmosphere than any film set I've ever been on."

Greengrass makes no apologies for his attempt at realism.

"Honestly, I don't know if

people are ready to watch a movie like this," the filmmaker said. "But if they are ready, then I want them to see an honest account of what happened. That's the least I can offer to this debate."

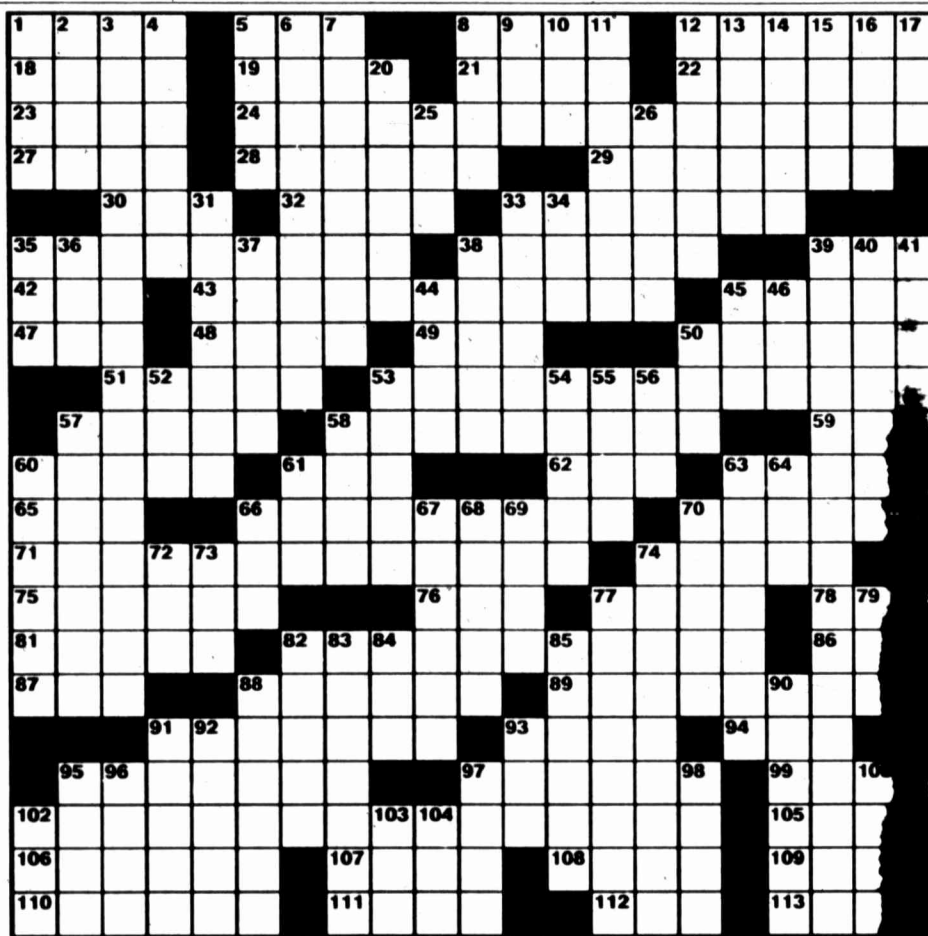

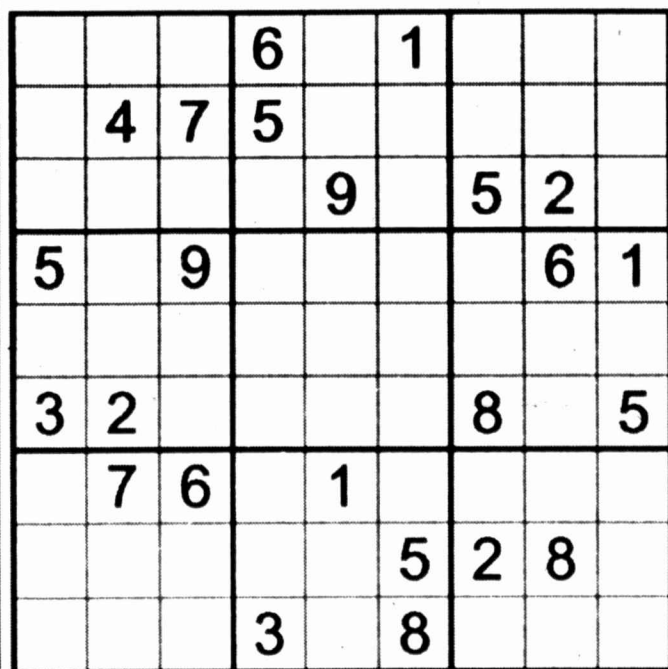

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# Bodog Battle: Only for best, brightest

**H**ow do you go from a music business nobody to the toast of the industry in a little more than a month? Just ask Calvin Ayre.

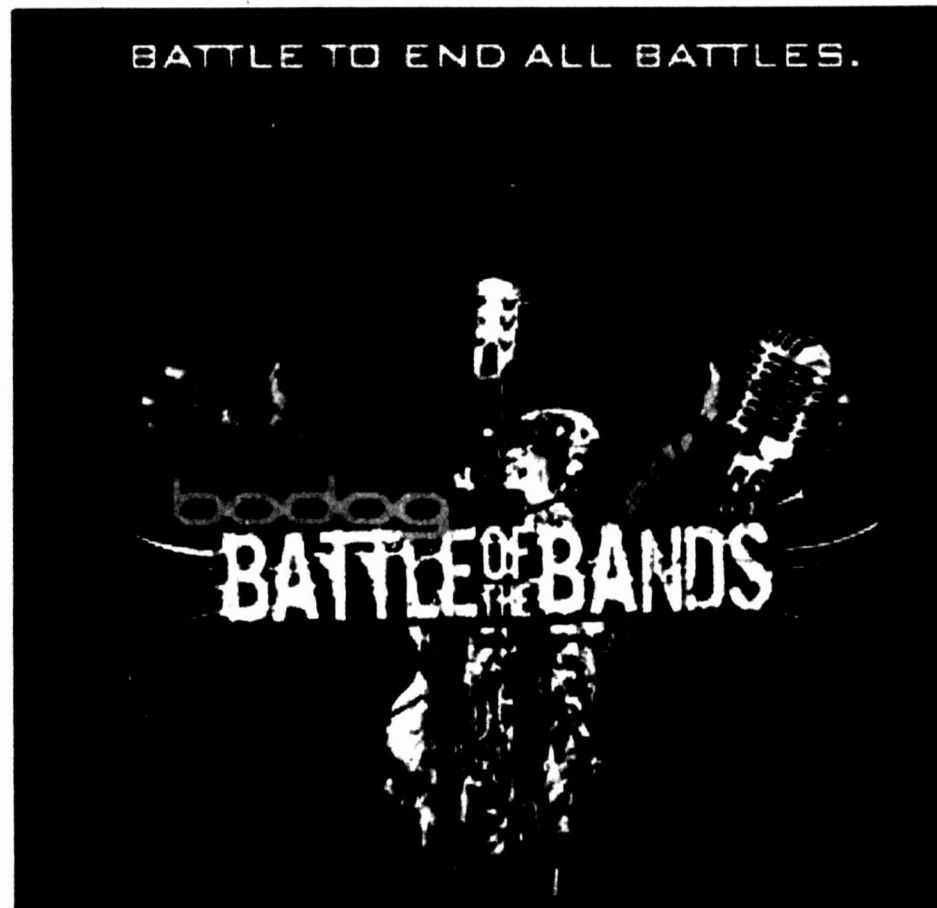

Once bands reach that stage, fans will pick the top two acts by filling out a ballot at the show, with a third-place "wild card" band getting a bid based on online voting. The 12 bands in the Trenches will then battle for just two spots in the next round, "City Wide Warfare," in which they will face off against the top 12 vote-getting bands in their town. Got all that?

The simple part is this. Each city will crown just one winner and that champ will move on to "The Battle to End All Battles." The winner gets a record deal with Bodog Music, cash, prizes and some guaranteed marketing muscle to get their name out there. Easily, every unsigned bands' dream.

Only the strongest, most talented, fiercely aggressive and hardest-working bands will make it to the semifinals and-finals. With a slew of international sponsors aboard there are several prizing

levels still to be announced, but only the best of the best will win the grand prize.

Bands can register on the official Bodogmusic.com Web site. Once a band signs up, a profile is created and made available to the public. These profiles are the bands online identities. They contain the band name (with logo), location, genre, a bio, streamed mp3s and pictures.

Also available is a section for band stats where friends can be added, page hits viewed and messages received. A unique peer-to-peer network has been especially created for voters to register. Here, fans of the Bodog.com Battle of the Bands can also create their own profile and will be able to add links to their favorite bands in the competition and find friends on the network.

This unique community will link bands to fans and the entire competition to the masses, including interactive message boards and more.

Of course, for those that know of Ayre, this battle should come as no surprise.

A self-made billionaire, Ayre has been making aggressive moves in television and pay-per-view entertainment. Last year he launched Bodog Music, an international music label with offices

in the U.K., Germany, the U.S. and Canada.

Ayre is the head of the digital entertainment powerhouse Bodog.com and has emerged as the face of online gaming. Having built a billion-dollar, truly 21st Century empire, he is now determined to find the "Best Band in America."

And as states already known for close music ties — California, Tennessee and New York, just to name a few — have certainly made their presence known in the contest, the Lone Star State refuses to be left out.

Touting designated markets in Dallas and Houston for the purposes of the contest (and later serving as locations for the competition concerts), Texas bands have certainly taken up the call for "the best band in America."
