

### Exceeds goal of \$175,000

The Howard-Glasscock Relay For Life fund-raiser exceeded its goal and the expectations of many over the weekend.

The largest non-profit effort in Howard and Glasscock counties with the exception of United Way - had this year's goal set at a "modest" \$175,000.

"We kept in mind the impact of (Hurricane) Katrina and the hard times that are upon us," said Vicki Stewart, Relay For Life committee chairperson. "We tried to be real this year

Over the past 10 years, the local Relay For Life has raised close to \$2 million for the American Cancer Society. The money is used to develop educational programs and for the continuing research for a cure for cancer.

According to Stewart, smaller communities like Big Spring and its rival San Angelo continue to far exceed larger communities when it comes to raising donations. Her theory for this phenomenon is simple.

# **Jail** woes

#### Proposed and old on county's mind

As the Howard County Commissioners Court prepares to meet Monday morning, the county jail will once

again take center stage. Several agenda items pertaining to the jail situation including the design and

Walker construction of a new facility and needed improvements to the existing one - are expected to, be entertained by the court.

Sheriff Dale Walker and Big Spring Fire Marshal Carl Condray are slated to discuss problems with the existing facility problems that could possibly have the jail shut down if certain state requirements aren't met.

The Texas Commission on Jail Standards issued a 90-day deadline for commissioners to correct problems identified during a recent fire drill, according to Walker.

"The letter from the jail commission is advising the commissioners court that our jail once again remains in non-compliance status," said Walker. "That's due to the smoke and fume detection system and the evacuation of the smoke during our live fire drill last month.

"The commission said without these things being addressed in a timely, written and documented manner that pleases the fire marshal, they will revoke all variances and close the jail.







It should be noted that both "God from Chicago" and "Jesus

from Columbus" were pretty much on the same page. They rambled on and on in almost incomprehensible fashion. Pretty much what you'd expect.

Whatever their motivation, they were most certainly devout.

Now I realize that first class postage wasn't as expensive as it is now, but both of those guys were spending more than \$1 a letter on stamps. They kinda stood out, if you know what I mean?

But today, with the Internet, zealots — from the ridiculous to the sublime — have a tool to get their message out to the world.

Last week it was some clown in Elk River, Minn., who sent out missives entitled: "Apostle Edward says Da Vinci author is right: Jesus was just human and the church lies about it!"





# Bush pushes lawmakers to pass immigration legislation

WASHINGTON -President Bush urged Congress Saturday to find a middle ground between mass deportation or instant U.S. citizenship for the estimated 12 million illegal immigrants living already America.

Bush's radio message was the third time this week he has spoken out about immigration.

Monday, in a televised address from the Oval Office, Bush said he would order as many as 6,000 National Guard troops to secure the U.S. border with Mexico, and urged Congress to give millions of illegal immigrants a chance at citizen-

Bush said the National Guard troops would fill in temporarily while the nation's Border Patrol is expanded. He asked Congress to add 6,000 more Border Patrol agents by the end of his presidency and add 6,700 more beds so illegal immigrants can be detained while waiting for hear-

However, Homeland Department Security Inspector General Richard L. Skinner said in a report Friday that the administration hadn't budgeted enough, and that it will take nearly 35,000 more jail beds to detain all high-risk aliens.

"This week I asked Congress to provide funding for dramatic improvements in manpower and technology at the border." Bush said Saturday. "We'll hire thousands more Border Patrol agents. And to help these agents do their jobs, we will deploy advanced technologies such as hightech fences in urban areas, infrared cameras and unmanned aerial vehicles."

Many congressional Republicans said they supported Bush's plan to National Guard troops at the border. But he ran into criticism from some border state governors, Democrats and some other Republicans.

In the Democratic radio response, Rep. Mike Honda of California said Bush should denounce the approach of House Republicans, who won passage of a tough immigration bill that would erect fences along the Mexican border and treat people who sneak across as felons to be deported.

#### Parents offended by 'God' removal on cover

COLLEYVILLE (AP) — A yearbook cover that omits the words "In God We Trust" from a picture of an enlarged nickel has angered some parents.

Liberty Elementary, a new school in suburban Fort Worth, chose the coin because the nickel's new design prominently features the school's name in cursive.

The coin also has "In God We Trust" along the right edge, but the phrase was removed from the yearbook. Instead, the \$16 book came with a sticker that gave students the choice of putting the phrase back on the nickel.

Some parents say the school's decision was political correctness gone too far.

"I think it's really ridiculous," said Debi Ackerman. who has a 10-year-old daughter at the school. "Now it has come to this...when is it going to end?"

Keller ISD spokesman Jason Meyer said a parent's group at the school approved the decision before the book was published. Liberty Principal Janet Travis wanted to avoid offending students of different religions, Meyer said.

"It's not always easy to make everybody happy when we are making decisions," Meyer said.

#### Man found quilty in scheme to defraud FEMA

DALLAS (AP) — A man accused of recruiting the homeless to pose as hurricane evacuees in a scheme to obtain relief funds has been convicted on conspiracy and fraud charges.

Kenneth Reven McClain, 33, of Dallas was found guilty Thursday, according to a statement from U.S. Attorney Richard B. Roper. He faces up to 133 years in prison and a fine of several hundred thousand dollars.

Officials said McClain conspired with others to submit false claims to the Federal Emergency Management Agency, fabricating names and addresses to secure hundreds of thousands of dollars in relief aid. At least one person submitted claims totaling more than \$10,000.

McClain allegedly hired a Dallas homeless man to stay in a hotel room and collect the relief assistance packages and letters.

McClain was arrested in November. Authorities then discovered he had several active warrants for his arrest and at least 27 known aliases.

#### Perry signs bill banning protests at funerals

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry signed into law Friday legislation that bans protests or disruptive behavior at funeral and burial services.

The law, which takes effect immediately, makes it a Class B misdemeanor to protest within 500 feet of the site of a funeral service from one hour before to one hour after the service.

The measure, sponsored by state Rep. Brian McCall, R-Plano, and Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, does not specifically mention the protests of Westboro Baptist Church, a church group in Topeka, Kan., that claims God is killing U.S. soldiers who fight for a country that tolerates homosexuality. But the bill was designed with that group in mind.

McCall made it clear during debate in the Texas House last week that the ban applies to any type of protests at funerals, including non-military funerals.

The legislation does not prohibit patriotic displays at funerals, Perry's office noted.

"There is a time and place for protests, but it is not at funerals and burials for U.S. soldiers who died to protect the freedoms we hold so dear," Perry said. 'This bill takes immediate effect, so not another day goes by that someone could callously disrupt the services of a fallen soldier."

#### Anson pays some of IRS debt, gets extension

ANSON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service has extended the payment deadline for this West Texas town that owes \$230,000 in taxes.

Anson Mayor Tom Isbell gave a \$50,000 check to an IRS agent Thursday afternoon as part of an agreement that the city pay that amount now and the remaining \$180,000 by June 9.

The entire payment was due Friday before officials reached the extended deadline agreement Wednesday for the town of 2,500 residents about 25 miles northwest of Abilene.

Isbell said Anson had to shift money from other accounts to come up with the \$50,000. He said the money would be replaced and that the city frequently moves money from one account to another to make payments when needed.

Wayne Lisenbee, the former Anson city manager who Isbell said is responsible for the delinquency of the unpaid taxes, now works in Abilene's Water Utilities Department. He declined Thursday to explain why he did not send the payroll taxes to the IRS, but he said Anson city officials know the reason.

However, Isbell said Lisenbee never told the city why the payments weren't made.

Lisenbee served as Anson's city manager for about five years until he was fired last year, Isbell said. By June. Anson owed the IRS about 15 months' worth of unpaid FICA, or Social Security, taxes.

#### Man convicted of murder in fatal accident

GEORGETOWN (AP) - A drunken-driver who was going the wrong way on an interstate when he smashed into a Mennonite migrant farming family's van was convicted of murder in the wreck that killed one person and hospitalized nine.

Fermine Castillo, 23, who has three drunken driving convictions, faces up to life in prison. The jury also found him guilty Thursday of intoxication manslaughter for the 2005 crash that killed 20-year-old Isaac Dyck. The sentencing phase of his trial began Friday.

Murder is punishable by up to life in prison while intoxication manslaughter carries a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison.


Castillo was driving his Jeep Cherokee on Interstate 35 near Jarrell when he slammed into the Mennonite migrant farming family's van. Castillo's blood alcohol level was 0.199 an hour after the wreck. The legal limit in Texas is .08.

A Texas Department of Public Safety trooper testified that the crash evidence showed Castillo probably had a beer bottle in his hand at the time of the crash.

Castillo's defense attorneys had argued he should not be convicted of murder because he had not intentionally or knowingly caused Dyck's death.

The Dycks spent about two months recovering in a hospital in Temple before continuing on to Canada where they live part of the year. The family speaks a dialect known as Low German, which required interpreters during the trial.

Castillo is the fifth person in Texas to be tried on murder charges for a fatal wreck involving alcohol.




DALLAS Duncan was in foul trouble, Tony Parker was in a shooting slump and Michael Finley was getting an earful from the crowd.





# For Bonds, home run 714 remains elusive

Bonds strikes out to end game, extending homerless streak to nine

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) Barry Bonds stepped to the plate with San Francisco trailing by one run with two outs in the ninth inning.

In the past, that would have been a situation calling for an intentional walk to one of the game's greatest home run hitters. But with Bonds struggling through a ninegame homerless slump, the Oakland Athletics went ahead and challenged him.

Huston Street struck out Bonds to finish Oakland's 1-0 win Friday night over the Giants, keeping the Francisco slugger stalled at 713 home runs, one behind Babe Ruth for second place on the career list.


"He's scuffling a little bit," said Oakland manager Ken Macha, who added that he discussed with his coaches before the inning whether the A's should walk Bonds.





It's also premature. Kournikova had years to prove herself and never was quite able to get over the hump. From the amount of ink the Russian got in the tabloids, she was more into self promotion than winning tennis matches.

Danica is a very different person, with a very different focus: succeeding in her sport.

The May 28 Indy 500 will be Patrick's 20th IRL start. Statistics compiled by the IRL show the average driver's first win comes in his or her 33rd start. With the current 14race schedule, that would be sometime next season, Patrick's third.

Her many fans don't seem to care that Patrick is still learning her trade.

Wherever she goes at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway this month, fans follow. She is on the cover of magazines that feature everything from racing to cooking to fashion — and she is in demand for TV interviews by network gurus

#### **Beware of unproven** remedies for wrinkles

an cosmetics reduce the signs of aging? The evidence for the use of over-the-counter (OTC) cosmetic products that claim anti-aging effects is not yet clearly substantiated. So, it is recommended to go on what we do know

 Sunscreen qualifies as both a cosmetic and a drug and is regulated by the FDA as such. Sunscreen should be your first tool in your defense against skin damage and aging skin. You should use sunscreen on a daily basis, either as part of a cosmetic or on the skin underneath other cosmetic products (unless advised otherwise by your doctor). Make it a habit to apply sunscreen first thing in your day. Choose a "broad spectrum" sunscreen with at least SPF 15, preferably water-resistant. Check your cosmetics to be sure levels of sunscreen are at least SPF 15, and don't forget to use an SPF 15 or higher lip balm.

 The only products that are currently FDA approved and proven safe

and effective to reduce signs of photo-aging (i.e., aging skin caused by sun damage) are retinoids. These products are only available by prescription. Talk with your doctor or dermatologist about whether or not this treat-

skin. Note: OTC cosmetic products containing retinol or retinal are not the same as retinoids. Retinol and retinal are a different form of vitamin A than retinoids. This form has not been proven effective (they have not yet been substantiated to penetrate the skin or convert to a biologically active form on/in the skin). Cosmetic formulations also typically use low concentration levels of retinol or retinal.

It is recommended that we consume these vitamins through food sources, such as fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grains, as well as some oils, nuts, dairy products, and meats. Topical antioxidants, other than retinoids, however, are yet to be substantiated as

a benefit to the skin. • Both vitamin E and C show promise as protectants against ultraviolet radiation damage from the sun; however, there have not been enough studies on human subjects to substantiate claims for topical use. Vitamin C, in particular, is difficult to formulate for topical use, since it is water-soluble and breaks down when exposed to

oxygen. · Hydroxy acids show promise in helping reduce fine lines and improving skin tone and color. There are, however, concerns about side effects. The cosmetic

industry has made efforts to investigate safety of these products and make recommendations for use at appropriate concentration and acidity (i.e., pH) levels. FDA has not yet conferred such guidelines.

"No anti-aging remedy on the [OTC] market today has been proved effective" according to 51 scientists who study aging issues. "What is known is that by living a healthy lifestyle, people may be able to counter some of the effects of the

aging process and increase their longevity, if not their quality of life."

Because of the contra-

dicting information and the often unsubstantiated claims by the cosmetic industry regarding antiaging, it is important to be a wise consumer. Cosmetics, by definition, are substances that cleanse, beautify, promote attractiveness, or alter the appearance, without affecting the body's structure or function. When you go to the cosmetic aisle, be wary of products that make claims to reverse aging skin...especially those that say they do it fast (even products proven to work take time to show results and have varying results among users). Always consider the safety of the product first. Check for warning labels and safety precautions. Remember, cosmetic products are not regulated by the FDA, it is up to you to be a wise con-

sumer...it is up to you to

believe the industry's claims or not. In regards to finding remedies for facial skin problems, see your doctor or dermatologist, if at all possible. They can often help you assess your skin type and give advise about skin products based on credible research and years of experience.

Remember: "Raising kids, eating right, spending smart, living well."

# Texas labor market showing its strength

AUSTIN — Seasonally adjusted nonagricultural employment in Texas increased by 4,400 jobs in April and a total of 244,400 jobs over the last 12 months, according to the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC).

Texas employers now have added jobs for 32 of the last 33 months, for a total of 584,400 jobs since July 2003. April's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 5.1 percent is up slightly from March but down from 5.3 percent in April 2005.

Decreasing unemployment rates over the year were widespread, with nearly all metropolitan statistical areas in Texas experiencing a decline April 2006.

# Ted Turner bids media conglomerate adieu

**AP Business Writer** ATLANTA (AP) - TedTurner was uncharacteristically understated Friday as he departed Time Warner Inc., the media conglomerate that swallowed his cable network company and slowly sidelined him as a mover and shaker in the busicreate.

The CNN founder told Time Warner shareholders at their annual meeting he regrets not being able to do more for them.

"I just wish the last five, lined. years I could have made a contribution," I've done my best."

With that, he borrowed newscaster Edward R. Murrow's famous signoff, said "Good night and good luck" and left the Georgia World Congress Center after not standing for re-election to Time Warner's board of directors.

A video tribute to Turner was played at Friday's meeting in Atlanta, and later former CNN chief Tom Johnson offered a moving personal tribute, though Turner had left the meeting by that point.

"How lucky we are to have known and still know one of the most remarkable men in world history," Johnson said of Turner. Time Warner's chairman and chief executive Richard Parsons promised to get Turner a of Johnson's remarks.

Turner became a director of Time Warner in 1996 when the media conglomerate bought his

Broadcasting Turner Systems. He long held a prominent role in guiding Time Warner's affairs, but in recent years complained of being side-

In 2003, Turner resigned as vice chairman of what Turner said. "I hung in r was then known as AOL there as long as I could. Time Warner Inc. Then, earlier this year, he said he wouldn't seek re-election to the board of what is now known simply as Time Warner. Time Warner, which is based in New York, also owns Warner Bros., HBO, a large cable TV operator and Time Inc., a major magazine publisher.

Turner, 67, now focuses mostly on philanthropic efforts. He is chairman of United Nations Foundation, which he started with a \$1 billion pledge to the agency in 1997, and co-chairs the Nuclear Threat Initiative with former U.S. Sen. Sam Nunn of Georgia. He also owns a restaurant chain that serves bison meat.

At the meeting, shareholders elected 11 other directors to another oneyear term, approved the appointment of the company's independent auditors and approved a stock incentive plan. Shareholder proposals to separate the roles of the
