Trustees: Drug test results validate tougher penalties

20 instances of Big Spring Independent District students testing positive for drug use during the past school year, officials said.

During their regular meeting Thursday night, BSISD trustees learned extra-curricular activities

there were 21 instances of at the two campuses. positive drug tests among students at Big Spring There were more than High School and Big Spring Junior High during the 2006-07 school vear.

> This was the second year for the drug testing program, which was instituted for students participating in competitive

The data released by BSISD did not reveal how many students tested positive, nor did it indicate whether the positive results were the result of first or subsequent offens-

In a half-year of testing during 2004-2005, BSISD reported 10 positive results, all among high school students.

The number of positive tests, which represented 3 percent of all drug tests administered in the district last year, was enough to convince officials to tighten the penalties for first time offenders earlier this year.

The new penalties include an automatic 10day suspension from the

Spending bill includes hurricane, border money

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Senate passed an emergency spending bill Thursday that would reimburse Texas counties for hurricane costs and pay for National Guard troops on the border.

The 98-1 vote sends the bill to President Bush, who had pushed Congress to keep the spending bill at the \$94.5 billion approved. The House passed the bill Tuesday. Most of the money will go to the war in Iraq and other overseas military operations.

Texas lawmakers reacted angrily in February when Bush's request did not include money specifically for hurricane relief for Texas, which absorbed hundreds of thousands of evacuees from Hurricane Katrina in August and took a direct hit from Rita less than a month later.

But they were pleased with a bill that boosts the

Highlights of funding for Texas-related items in the emergency spending bill.

- Increases amount of federal reimbursement to Texas for hurricane damage costs from 75 percent to 90 percent of total. The reimbursements are retroactive to Sept. 24. Anything already reimbursed at the lower rate since that date will be subject to the higher rate.

- \$235 million for education costs associated with Katrina students enrolled in Texas schools.

- Allows Texas to vie for a share of \$1 billion in Community

Development Block grants. - \$542 million for loans for small businesses in areas on the Gulf Coast affected by Hurricanes Rita and Katrina and declared disaster areas.

- \$227.5 million for continued production of the Boeing C-17 cargo aircraft, largely produced in Fort Worth.

- \$230 million for the V-22 "Osprey" manufactured in

— \$175 million for Army Bradley Fighting Vehicles.

\$35 million for NASA.

 \$37.9 billion for military bases providing support to Iraq and Afghanistan operations, including some bases in Texas.

 \$103 million for counternarcotics efforts in Afghanistan, some which will pay for continued training of fighter pilots at

— \$93 million for family counseling and transition assistance for service personnel returning from the Middle East.

Incentive program OK'd by ISD board

Big Spring Independent School District teachers will make more money next year. Some may make more than others.

During their regular meeting Thursday night, BSISD trustees approved a contract re-write for teachers that will allow the implementation of incentive pay for the district's instructors next school year.

Specifics of how the plan will be implemented have not been drawn up, but teachers whose students perform exceptionally well on state standardized tests could see a hefty addition to their paychecks.

Teacher incentive pay was mandated by the Texas Legislature in its recent education finance reform bill. Two programs sprang from that bill that will reward teachers whose students perform well on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test.

The first program, the Student Achievement Program, will dole out between \$3,000 to \$10,000 to qualifying teachers. Specifics on the other plan, the Academic Excellence Award Program, have yet to be announced.

To clear the way for the programs to be implemented, trustees had to approve changes teacher contracts that will allow them to receive the incentive pay, an action they took unanimously.

BSISD Superintendent Michael Downes said the incentive pay will be awarded to individual schools. At that level, a campus committee will decide how the money will be distributed.





Two indicted for rash

of West Texas artifact thefts PECOS (AP) — A federal grand jury has indicted two North Carolina men on charges they stole weapons and historic artifacts during a string of burglaries in

Kirby Loren Amlee, 35, of Robbins, N.C., and Joey Kenneth Priddy, 45, of Carthage, N.C., are charged with stealing U.S. property, transporting ammunition by prohibited persons and transporting stolen goods, according to a news release from the U.S. Attorney's Office.

The indictments were handed up Thursday.

Authorities say the robberies started April 11 at the Stillwell Museum in the Big Bend area when the suspects stole items including arrowheads, a tomahawk, money from a donation box and several guns, including an 1895 Winchester rifle.

Also victimized were the Fort Davis Historical Site Museum and the Lajitas International Airport.

Mother fights hospital to keep baby on life support

DALLAS (AP) - A woman has been given two more weeks to find a facility willing to take her 11-month-old son, who is on life support at Children's Medical

Last month, the hospital's ethics board agreed with the child's doctor that continued treatment would be futile. A lawyer for Dixie Belcher said Thursday that they reached an agreement with Children's to extend a temporary restraining order for

another two weeks. Children's confirmed the agreement Thursday.

"We've been making a lot of contacts and things look promising," said Belcher's attorney, Brian Potts.

Potts said that Daniel Wayne Cullen II is in stable condition and exhibiting some brain function, but not at normal levels. He's also on a ventilator and feeding tubes, Potts said.

Daniel was hospitalized in early April after suffering from a lack of oxygen when he pulled out a tube that was helping him breathe. He had a tracheotomy after his premature birth.

Deputy killed; house-to-house manhunt in New Orleans suburb

RIVER RIDGE, La. (AP) — Heavily armed police with dogs searched house-tohouse in this suburban New Orleans community Friday for a suspect in the early morning shooting death of a St. John the

Baptist Parish Sheriff's Office commander. St. John Sheriff Wayne Jones said two officers working a drug assignment in the parish attempted to stop a car with Texas plates around 1 a.m. He said that when the car stopped and officers tried to approach, shots were fired. One officer was wounded in the leg before the car sped off.

Deputies caught up with the car again later, and at that point Cmdr. Octavius Gonzales was fatally shot, he said.

"He was my narcotics commander, 40 years old. Just an outstanding officer," Jones said.

The suspect was identified as John Lee Cheek of Harrison County, Texas, he said.

Question: Is it a religion or a cult?

ith all the controversy surrounding Ann Coulter's new book "Godless: The Church of Liberalism," some might overlook important substantive points she has made.

Critics may say, "Precisely. That's our complaint with Ann. Her insulting remarks deflect attention from the points she's try ing to make.

Not so fast. Whether she intended it this way or not, the "harsh" remarks she made in the book have proven one of her theses in a way the book alone could not have done — at least not as effectively.

The New York Times columnist Maureen Dowd said as much when she wrote that it's "inhumane" for Bush not "to understand that the moral authority of parents who bury children killed in Iraq is absolute" (cited by Coulter, p. 127).

Sorry, but that presumably wellmeaning statement is just flat wrong, and wrongheaded. If it were true, we could delegate authority over the nuclear "football" to grieving parents of soldiers killed in action and let them unleash our ICBMs (intercontinental ballistic missiles) on suspected terrorist strongholds. Forget "collateral damage," their moral ₄ authority is absolute. Let's start out with the truism

that Cindy Sheehan and the 9/11 widows are entitled to an abundance of sympathy because of their losses. Perhaps they should even be given some slack for saying offensive things in the height

of their grief.

But what about when they deliberately and repeatedly inject themselves into the public vortex by issuing vitriolic, malicious slander against the president of the United States, such as calling President Bush a terrorist, or embracing foreign, America-hating dictators like Hugo Chavez? Do Americans have a right to call them on it? Can Sheehan or the "Jersey Girls" say anything, no matter how detrimental to America's image or national interest, without fear of

Should we nod with feigned approval at the irresponsible statements of Congressman John Murtha or Senator John Kerry because they were in combat? Conversely, should those with no military background be foreclosed from the public debate on the war, as "chicken hawks"?

Preposterously, liberals answer yes to both questions.

But the more important point is: Liberals don't really believe that the opinions of veterans or family members of war victims are entitled to deference or "absolute moral authority.

As usual, the liberals' outrage is highly selective. It is not the people or their circumstances that are sacrosanct, but their liberal positions. Liberals accorded none of their precious war-hero deference to John O'Neill and the Swift Boat Veterans for Truth. Indeed, they called them liars — when they weren't — and much worse. They have savaged combat-decorated Marine Ollie North. They have no use for retired generals supporting

Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld. Not on their lives would they defend 9/11 widows or mothers of war victims in support of President Bush's war effort.

Nor is it harshness, offensiveness or insulting tones that bother them; otherwise, they'd have to denounce 90 percent of the Democratic Party's leadership for the vicious slander they've hurled at George W. Bush for six years or at Justice Clarence Thomas. They would excommunicate from their movement cartoonists for their racist depictions of Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. They would condemn Michael Moore and the entire lineup at Air America. And they would be outraged at the defamatory drumbeat against Ann Coulter herself and portray her as a victim. One major newspaper called her book "pornography," a magazine called for her to kill herself, a major news anchor said she had trampled on something "sacred," and New York Daily News featured her on the cover as "Coulter the Cruel.'

Coulter's comments pale in comparison to the nastiness that routinely comes out of liberals' mouths about conservatives, as when Sen. Harry Reid called President Bush a liar and Alan Greenspan a hack. So please, spare us the indignation.

What really bothers most liberals is not Ann Coulter's tone, but the substance of her criticisms. You dare not challenge liberal orthodoxy; otherwise, you are fair game for the very kind of mistreatment, abuse and intolerance they profess to decry in others. All of which further proves the thesis of Ann's book: Liberalism is a religion whose sacred tenets may not be challenged; for some, it might even be a cult.

Moms rush in where Bush fears to tread

Then scientists finally discover a cure for juvenile diabetes, what do you say we officially name it the "No Thanks to George W. Bush Treatment"? Come to think of it,

a "No Thanks to **Bush Cure for** Parkinson's" sounds about right, too. So does a "No Thanks to **Bush Spinal Cord** Injury Repair Regimen," a "No Thanks to Bush Vaccine tor Alzheimer's" and -

Cheney Cure for Heart Disease." Whom might we thank, at least in part, if and when these great advances are made?

I nominate two New York moms: Susan Solomon and Mary Elizabeth Bunzel. Spurred by their sons' juvenile diabetes, these ladies managed to round up a dream team of top-notch scientists. Then, last month, they opened the country's first independent, nonprofit stem cell research lab. The lab is dedicated to precisely the kind of cutting-edge medical research Bush brought to a near standstill five years ago, leaving sick people and their loved ones in the lurch.

"It's as if someone said, 'We can treat your cancer — but only with the drugs that were available in August, 2001," says Solomon of the executive order signed by Bush.

That order banned federal funding for the study of new human stem cell lines. (Stem cells are cells so young and unformed that they have not yet differentiated into the cells that will form, say, a heart or a pancreas. Scientists study their growth to see at what point a disease develops. They also hope to grow these cells into healthy replacements for those damaged by illness or injury.)

It all sounds very promising. But the Bush ban has had what Harold Varmus, president of Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, calls a "chilling effect."

Some grad students started avoiding the field, says the Nobel laureate, knowing that they wouldn't be able to get federal grants. Some institutions did the same. The dampening effect was so great that even in New York, a city of more than 25,000 scientists, Varmus estimates there are only 30-50 labs studying new stem cell

This was driving the two moms crazy

"We looked at each other and

said, 'This is ridiculous!'" recalls Solomon, who quit her media consulting job to start the New York Stem Cell Foundation.

After she and Bunzel figured out the big names in the field, they started inviting them to conferences. The idea was to rekindle excitement about a field in danger of stagnating.

"These interactions were extremely effective," says Varmus. So were the moms. "We called everyone we know," says Solomon, and hit them up for money. It took less than \$10 million to open the lab that now serves as a safe haven for scientists - in an undisclosed location. Call it an underground railroad

for stem cell research. The lab's first project? Understandably, it's a study of diabetes. The moms deserve that much. After all, they have given the city, and science, and all of us who will ever be touched by illness, so much more.



From the play thus far, it is clear that South's opening notrump bid (16 to 18 points) included the ace of hearts, ace of diamonds and A-K-J of spades (your partner cannot have the ace or king of spades, judging from his play at trick one). It follows that South cannot have the king of clubs.


The only time this line of play fails is when North has been dealt the singleton jack or queen. If you alternatively attacked the clubs by first cashing the king or ace, you would go down if the next player was either void of clubs or held a low singleton. These cases outnumber those where North holds a singleton honor.

Associated Press Writer PITTSBURGH Steelers Ben star Roethlisberger was released from the hospital after being treated for facial injuries from a bloody motorcycle accident two days earlier.

Roethlisberger left Hospital Wednesday night a little before midnight. It was unclear where he went, team spokesman Dave

Lockett said.

A second round of tests again showed no brain injuries, although the quarterback has a concussion, broken jaw and nose from the accident in which his motorcycle collided with a car at an intersection Monday morning.

Montgomerie overcame a rugged start by relying on his strength — fairways and greens — and his 1-under 69 was the only round under par.



Golf according to the LAW

By T.J. TOMASI Universal Press Syndicate

Over the years, research showed me that golf swing mechanics (ball position, foot flare, etc.) must change from player to player based on golfers' different body types. So, along with two co-authors, I developed the LAWs of the golf swing, a teaching model recognizing that the way a person swings his or her golf club is dependent on the person's body type, strength and flexibility.

LAWs is an acronym for the three most common swing types: Leverage, used by golfers of average build and flexibility, such as Annika Sorenstam and Steve Elkington; Arc, for players who are tall, thin-chested and have high flexibility, such as Davis Love or Phil Mickelson; and Width for players with a thick torso, short arms and less flexibility, like Craig Stadler and Laura Davies.



THE GOLF DOCTOR

Imagine this

Images cue up your golf swing. Instead of swing mechanics and negative thoughts, you need to occupy your mind with images of success centered on what you want your body to do. You have to create images that are so real to your brain that it responds by automatically recruiting your muscles to get the job done. Below is a helpful image for releasing the golf club.


Imagine a horse and rider moving away from a wall with one end of a coil of rope tied to the saddle and the other end anchored securely to the wall. The horse gains speed, and the rope rapidly uncoils until, in a bonejarring tug, the rope goes taut and the horse stops dead in its tracks.

As you can imagine, the rider is flung (released) from the saddle, continuing alone in the direction that he and his horse were traveling together only a millisecond before.

Now reverse the situation so that the horse and rider are approaching a 6-foot wall at full gallop, and just as they get to the wall, the horse stops dead. Once again, our hapless rider continues on alone over the wall.

In the first image, the wall represents your back leg. The second wall of your golf swing is your front leg. The rider is your club head, and his separation from the horse is the release of your club head through the hitting zone.

Q: You wrote about something called "over-the-bottom" recently, and I may be doing that. All of a sudden, I'm hitting a huge pull, but my friends tell me it looks the same as any other swing. — J.K., from the Web

A: Here's the problem: During your downswing, your shoulders are too level, i.e., you're losing your shoulder tilt. It's very hard to feel, and even the tour players have trouble with it.

I call it "coming over the bottom" because about halfway down, you lose your shoulder tilt by raising up slightly with the spine. This causes too rounded a swing path, and since you started down OK - you didn't come "over at the top," which is easy to see the problem is hard to spot.

First, check your aim and make sure it's not to the right of target (lay down two clubs, one on body line and the other along target line).

During your downswing, your left shoulder should work up and around, not forward and around. If your left shoulder moves toward the target, you'll straighten up and pull the shot.

Here's a drill: Take a 7-iron off a tee and work on starting your downswing by making your left shoulder move up. Don't raise your spine up, just let your left shoulder re-trace its path - at address it was up, then it went down during the backswing and now it must go back up during the downswing. Hit a bunch of shots until you've got it, and resist the temptation to go to the driver too soon.

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




