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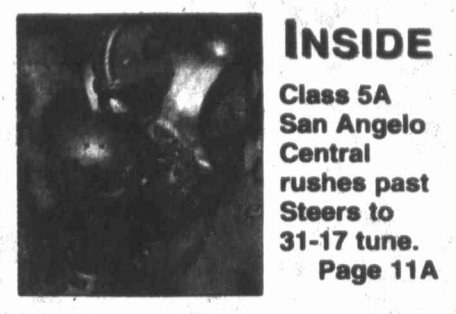

Two local events slated for 9-11 anniversary

As the nation prepares to pause and remember the tragic events of Sept. 11, 2001, on Monday, several local groups and organizations will be offering special events in observance of the solemn anniversary.
The Big Spring VA Medical Center will hold a special remembrance Monday at 7:46 a.m. near the facility's flag

pole, an event Community Relations Coordinator Iva Jo Hanslik said she hopes will help area residents renew their determination.
"We'll place our hands over our hearts and say the Pledge of Allegiance," said Hanslik. "We'll also sing the National Anthem and pause for a few moments in remembrance of the victims and to honor those that exhibited great courage. We hope to renew our determination as we remember the tragedy of Sept. 11."
"We're asking everyone in the community to wear red, white and blue Monday, and join the VA staff, Big Spring Police Department and the Big Spring Fire Department as we gather around the flag pole."
The Hangar 25 Air Museum, located on the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark, will also observe the fifth anniversary of the tragic events Monday with a special "Meet Me at the Flag" gathering at 7 p.m.

Museum Director Heather Wallace said she hopes the gathering will help promote unity during this time of remembrance.
"I ask you to meet me at the flag — remember and honor the lives lost and reinforce the meaning of American citizenship — that we stand tall, we stand proud and most importantly that we stand together full of passion and compassion but that we do so with strength," said Wallace.
"Support the memories. Support all of those who keep us safe, including military personnel, police officers, firefighters and all the other men and women that work hard to protect us."

County's tax rate hearing is Monday

For the first time in many months the situation concerning the Howard County Jail will have to take a back seat Monday morning, as commissioners are expected to examine and approve the county's 2006-2007 budget.
In addition to adopting a budget for the coming year, Howard County commissioners are slated to hold a public hearing concerning the proposed tax rate for the coming year, which is expected to be set at 48.787 cents per \$100 valuation, a 5.7 cent drop compared to last year's rate.

Jail update expected at meeting

Howard County commissioners are expected to receive an update concerning ongoing efforts to bring the jail facility into state compliance during their Monday morning meeting.
Phil Furqueron, who has been consulting with county officials on its two-pronged problem — designing and financing a new jail facility while bringing the current county jail up to state standards — is expected to make several reports to the commissioners, including reports on the stand pipe and smoke evacuation system.
Those problems, along with a door that swung in the wrong direction, were identified during a recent fire evacuation.

Although the proposed rate is several cents lower than last year's rate, County Auditor Jackie Olson said it will bring in more revenue for the county than last year's effort.
"The effective tax rate has been calculated at 45.002 cents per \$100 valuation," said Olson. "That's quite a bit lower than last year's tax rate, which was 54.546 cents per \$100 valuation. The reason the effective rate is so much lower this year is because values are up. That means tax payers who didn't see an increase in their property values will actually be paying less this year."

"The highest the court can go on the tax rate without risking a rollback election — commonly called the rollback rate — is 48.787 cents per \$100 valuation. That would amount to a \$500,000 increase (in revenues) over the effective rate."

REAP team sweeps sex offenders

Howard County sex offenders had a surprise waiting at their front door Saturday morning — and the surprise wore a badge.
Members of the Registration, Enforcement, Apprehension and Prosecution (REAP) Team — composed of personnel from several city and county law enforcement agencies — fanned out across the county to check that the area's registered sex offenders were in compliance with the law.
The sweep was conducted by personnel from Big Spring Police Department, Howard County Sheriff's Office, Department of Public Safety, county and district attorney's offices, adult and juvenile probation, parole office and Victim Services.
Police Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer for BSPD, estimated that about 25 total personnel were involved in the sweep, which was expected to be completed before noon Saturday.
The focus on the surprise compliance checks is to assure that the offenders

have kept law enforcement personnel informed of current addresses, places of employment and vehicles the offenders own, Everett said.
If any of the registered offenders are found not to be in compliance, they will face further criminal charges, he added.
Spot checks could continue for the next few days, Everett said.
"The ones we miss (Saturday), we'll go back and revisit," he said.

drill at the existing jail facility, located in the Howard County Courthouse.

Commissioners met with Texas Commission on Jail Standards in early August in an effort to show that progress was being made to bring the facility into state compliance, an effort that was met with approval from the state agency.

According to project architect and coordinator Phil Furqueron, both projects — construction of a stand pipe to provide firefighters with water in an emergency and a smoke evacuation system to clear smoke from the jail in case of a fire — were awaiting action from contractors approximately two weeks ago, a waiting game Commissioner Bill Crooker said could have dire consequences.

"The smoke evacuation system is the most important aspect of this whole effort," said Crooker. "TAC (Texas Association of Counties), which we have our insurance through, has told us they will void our liability coverage on the jail on Oct. 1 unless we've made concrete advancements in that area. So we're very

eager to see these things move forward."

As for current efforts to design and construct a new county jail facility, Furqueron said he doesn't expect to see much movement until after the November election.

"The design of the facility is basically finished," said Furqueron. "We'll go in and do some tweaking here and there, but for the most part, that part of the process is complete. We'll be at a standstill until commissioners figure out how they are going to pay for it."

That question could be answered as soon as November 7, as voters will have the final say when they vote on a \$10 million bond issue during the general election.

Commissioners voted unanimously last month to put the bond issue on the ballot, with the new facility expected to be located near the intersection of Interstate Highway 20 and U.S. Highway 87.

Consideration of a new jail facility began more than two years ago when commissioners identified jail overcrowding and non-compliance with state jail laws as an ongoing and long-term problem.

Earlier this year, commissioners voted 4-1 in favor of building a new

144-bed jail, with Commissioner Gary Simer voting against the measure, citing size and location as reasons.

The meeting is expected to get under way at 10 a.m. in the commissioners' courtroom, located on the second floor of the County Courthouse.

in taxes comes as good news for commissioners, who have been struggling with a budget that includes a \$150 per month pay increase for county employees across the board and skyrocketing utilities.

And while commissioners were adamant about the employee raises, Commissioner Jerry Kilgore said the county is still "playing catch-up" because of needs that have been pushed aside in the past.

"There have been a lot of requirements, whether they are mandates from the state or elsewhere," said Kilgore. "Especially

with the jail situation. I see us as having a larger budget in the coming year than we had anticipated. It's just like everyday living. Inflation and gasoline prices play a large role.

"It's just like the situation where we got in trouble with the county vehicles three or four years ago. It's costing us more now to make these things up, and if we don't take care of it now, we're going to pass it right along to someone next year or further down the road. It looks like we're just going to have to make some major adjustments."

Commissioners have until Sept. 25 to set the county tax rate.

Also on Monday's agenda, County Auditor Jackie Olson will present

the commissioners with invoices and purchase requests, as well as a budget workshop.

Olson is also expected to discuss setting salaries, expenses and allowances for elected officials, as well as discussion concerning the county's fuel bids and alarm and security systems.

County Treasurer Teresa Thomas is expected to present commissioners with personnel considerations, a payroll report and a retirement plan assessment for 2007.

County Road and Bridge Administrator Eddy Jameson will present the court with pipeline crossings and a report on county road maintenance.

County Librarian Hollis McCright is also expected

to meet with commissioners to discuss bids on the replacement of light fixtures at the library and request approval of fees charged for fines, copies and replacement costs.

County Attorney Mike Thomas is expected to present the court with a Big Spring journalism advertising contract, as well as conduct an executive session with commissioners concerning a claim against the county.

Local architect Phil Furqueron is also expected to present commissioners with an update on the county's efforts to correct several problems with its jail in an effort to comply with state regulations.

The meeting is expected to get under way at 10 a.m. in the commission-

ers' courtroom, on the second floor of the courthouse.

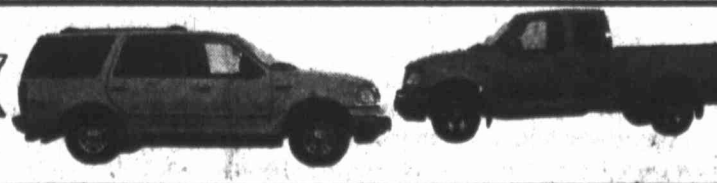

This house of cards needs fixing

The American economy has become such a precarious mix of potential disasters that it's almost impossible to worry about which way it might fall apart. While I'm generally a financial optimist who believes that our capitalist system can usually overcome the incompetence of our politicians, the sheer volume of things going wrong now scares me.

An economic collapse, slowdown, recession, downturn, pullback or the inevitable bursting of any number of bubbles concerns me in the same non-specific way I worry about pollution or the impact of hurricane season on Florida's citrus farmers. I'm not exactly sure what to fear, but it feels like something bad might happen.

Like a person concurrently afflicted with brain cancer, AIDS, cerebral palsy and smallpox, our economy has become riddled so many problems it's hard to know what to cure first. Though many of us enjoy reasonable prosperity, dark clouds have appeared on the horizon and it's hard to have much faith that the current administration — or its potential replacements — might fix what ails us.

Historically, the United States economy has actually proven fairly resilient and more than able to withstand huge blows. Having one

rotten sector or failing area has usually not tipped the nation into a depression or even done much damage outside that area.

As a country we've weathered the bursting of the Internet stock bubble, giant corporate scandals like Enron that devastated countless people's retirement funds and the saving and loan scandals of the 1980s. We've waited out economically incompetent presidents (Jimmy Carter and the first George Bush come to mind) and have survived more ridiculous economic policies from Congress than bad songs on a best of David Hasselhoff album.

Still, while the economy has shown that, much like Charlie Sheen, it prospers no matter how many bad things happen to it, our current situation might push things over the edge. The story of our economy appears to be rapidly going from mirroring the version of Mr. Sheen's "True Hollywood Story" where he puts his demons behind him and emerges triumphantly as a sitcom star to the one where he collapses under a pile of hookers, bookies and drug dealers.

It seems entirely possible that in the coming months, oil prices could skyrocket, a terrorist attack could occur in the United States and the already teetering housing market could collapse. While none of these things occurring on their own would mean too much overall, more than one occurring could push the country into a severe economic downturn.

It's also a bit of a concern that

the people in charge of our economy — the Republicans and the Democrats — seem entirely unfit for the job. When your version of economic policy consists of arguing about which secondary tax you might tweak, it betrays a clear lack of understanding of the things that actually determine economic success or failures.

With a major election cycle approaching, perhaps it's time that we stop putting career politicians into office who will simply rearrange the same broken pieces. Instead, we need a president and congressmen who actually seek to release the pressure on the economy by fixing some of the potential failure points.

Righting the economy and removing the impending sense of doom felt by so many of us does not require fixing everything or even most things. If the next administration delivered lower oil prices and kept mortgage rates from rising, than most of us would stop worrying and begin feeling optimistic.

Instead of political hacks whose economic policy consists of telling us how great the economy is, we need leaders who actually deliver a strong economy. You can't fill your car with a press release about lower gas prices, but I'd drive a long way to vote for the guy who actually delivers them.

Why are most fire trucks red? On Sept. 11, 2006, five years will have passed and we will all remember how a tragic event affected us personally, and as a nation.

On Sept. 11, 2001, I, as many of you, watched as firefighters, law enforcement, and EMS personnel responded to the World Trade Center as they would do in any call for help, never knowing if this is the one that they would not return from. As I watched the first tower collapse, I knew that the loss of life would be high. I lost 343 members of my family, not my first family (wife, children, parents, brothers or sisters), by my second family — brother and sister firefighters. When a man or woman join the fire service they enter a brotherhood rich in traditions that was started more than 100 years ago.

Our red fire trucks are part of this tradition, the red color on these apparatus stand for PRIDE (in fire service traditions) and HONOR (for those firefighters that came before us).

In the fire service we display the Maltese Cross on our apparatus (fire engines, ladders or trucks) and clothing. The cross is your symbol of protection. It means that the firefighter who wears this cross is willing to lay down his or her life for you, just as Crusaders sacrificed their lives for their fellow man so many years ago.

The Maltese Cross is a firefighter's badge of honor, signifying that he or she works with courage — a ladder-run away from death.

On this, the fifth anniversary of that tragic day, remember the lives lost, the survivors and our military personnel who are making the ultimate sacrifice because of that day.

The next time you see the fire department responding in its red fire trucks, I want you to think about our traditions and the PRIDE and HONOR that they represent and feel comfort in knowing that the men or women wearing the Maltese Cross on their shirts are willing to lay down their lives for you.

I would like to commend the Big Spring City Council for passing the first reading of the smoking ban for Big Spring businesses. Thank you for following the lead of progressive communities like Midland, Lubbock, Odessa, Austin, Dallas and Houston (just to name a few); thank you for your concern for the health and well being of Big Spring's citizens; and thank you for undertaking this very controversial initiative.

I know that some residents in our community think private business owners should be allowed to make this decision since passing the smoking ban would be the equivalent of telling the business owner how to run his or her establishment. What some citizens do not understand is that once a business owner opens his or her business to the public it is no longer "private." The health and safety of those that frequent and work in that establishment must be considered priority.

I am a former smoker with little tolerance for cigarette smoke and I sometimes avoid restaurants that allow smoking because of my reaction to second hand smoke. We often eat out with our grandchildren and don't want them exposed to this health hazard either.

I wonder why some business owners are not more concerned with the welfare of their employees and patrons. I am positive that there are many waitresses, waiters, bus boys (and girls), cooks, cashiers, etc. that would rather breathe clean air but can't because of where they work. I am thankful that my place of employment has been smoke free since the early '90s. All workers are entitled to the same protection from this very real health threat.

I found a forum on the Internet for young people (ages 11-17) in the UK to express their views on the subject of banning smoking in public places. Out of the mouth of a babe comes: "If there was a workplace which was dangerous because of chemical fumes, you wouldn't dream of saying that we don't need to do anything about it because people can also choose to work somewhere else — you would say that the health and safety of whoever worked there was important and should be protected. The same surely applies to passive smoking."

In case you still think passing this ban isn't a good idea, please consider these facts:

• "Second hand smoke has been classified by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as a known cause of cancer in

humans. Second hand smoke causes approximately 3,400 lung cancer deaths and 22,700 to 69,600 heart disease deaths in adult nonsmokers in the U.S. each year. Nonsmokers exposed to second hand smoke at work are at increased risk for adverse health effects. Levels of environmental tobacco smoke in restaurants and bars were found to be two to five times higher than in residences with smokers and two to six times higher than in office workplaces." — American Lung Association.

• "The current Surgeon General's Report concluded that scientific evidence indicates that there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke. Short exposures to second hand smoke can cause blood platelets to become stickier, damage the lining of blood vessels, decrease coronary flow velocity reserves, and reduce heart rate variability, potentially increasing the risk of heart attack." In other words, those that would have you believe that a little second hand smoke is not harmful don't know what they are talking about." — American Lung Association.

• "In the U.S., 21 million, or 35 percent of children live in homes where residents or visitors smoke in the home on a regular basis. Approximately 50-75 percent of children in the U.S. have detectable levels of cotinine, the breakdown product of nicotine in the blood." Obviously 15-40 percent of those children are inhaling secondhand smoke somewhere other than in their homes. This quote was

also taken from the American Lung Association website.

• There are over 240 municipalities in Texas with anti-smoking regulations. Other states have many cities that have enacted similar bans.

• The following states ban smoking in all restaurants and bars: California, Delaware, New York, Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington and Georgia (in Georgia establishments that do not serve minors are exempt). Several other states have smoking bans of some description.

• The difference between restaurants and bars (and casinos) is obviously the fact that children are included in the group inhaling secondhand smoke in eating establishments.

• The Marriott hotel chain (to include Renaissance, Residence Inn, SpringHill Suites, Fairfield Inn, TownePlace Suites and Marriott ExecuStay) will be smoke free in the U.S. as of next month; there will be no such thing as a "smoking room" and smoking in all areas of the hotel will be prohibited.

Cigarette smokers are in the minority in our society. I find it odd that they are allowed to pollute the air the majority breathes. We have a chance to make Big Spring a healthier place for everyone. Let's embrace that chance and voice our support for this ban and for members of our city council.

Vet of the Month: Hebrew Jones recalls Vietnam

Hebrew Jones Jr. spent the entire day of his 21st birthday fighting in a Southeast Asia jungle over six trucks carrying C-rations.

That story was one of many the U.S. Army veteran, who served a tour in the Vietnam War, recounted Thursday, Aug. 29, during a reception given in his honor at Hangar 25 Museum's Veteran of the Month.

A packed audience filled the museum's briefing room for the reception during which Jones received a commemorative plaque from museum board member Clarence Hartfield Jr.

Jones was part of the first build up of the U.S. Army in Vietnam by President Lyndon Johnson in the summer of 1965 and he spent his entire 12-month tour sleeping, fighting and dodging all types of danger in the jungle.

In 1963, Jones enlisted in the U.S. Army at Midland and was sent to Fort Polk, La., for basic training. During this period of time, the Viet Cong was not the only obstacle the young man from Stanton had to face.

"During that era things weren't integrated — blacks on one side and whites on another," he said.

Following basic training, Jones was assigned to artillery for the First Infantry Division, nicknamed "The Big Red 1," and was sent to Fort Riley, Kan., to learn how to fire 105 mm howitzers. Training was intense, Jones said, and included a three-month stay at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., where the soldiers trained for jungle warfare.

"They were preparing us in case we went to war," he said.

After returning to Fort Riley, the soldiers were

given some special instruction before being granted leave.

"They called muster and they told us we were going to Southeast Asia," he said. "They didn't say Vietnam. They told us to tell our parents that we were going to Southeast Asia — not to say Vietnam. They didn't want our parents to get upset."

After leave, his group flew to Oakland, Calif., where they were to board the ship that would carry the entire division, all its supplies and equipment on a 23-day voyage to Cam Rahn Bay, Vietnam.

"We marched through the airport with our full army gear on," he recalled. "People looked at us like we were crazy."

Once docked in Cam Rahn Bay, then considered the safest place in Vietnam, the soldiers were picked up by armored personal carriers. Swiftly, the Southeast Asian weather gave the U.S. soldiers a proper welcome.

"The first day there it was pretty," Jones recalled. "There wasn't a cloud in the sky. We pitched tents and the clouds came up and rained something fierce. I've never saw anything like that."

Leaving Cam Rahn Bay, the soldiers quickly came under sniper fire. Jones remembers freezing before one of his "army buddies" knocked his legs out from underneath him. "Anyone who tells you when they go to war they're not scared — don't believe them," he said.

The soldiers were in Saigon for about three weeks before they started having casualties, Jones recalled.

"Some guys would be killed by anti-personal mines," he said. "Some would be shot and die from the shot."

Jones' stay in Southeast Asia was marked by all-day fire missions, sleeping on hard and wet ground, avoiding a variety of poisonous snakes and various traps laid by the enemy.

"One day we were on a search and destroy mission and we were going through a field," he recalled. "The field was booby trapped. The captain found the first mine. We were lucky. If the Viet Cong had come that day we'd have been wiped out."

And booby traps were numerous, Jones said — thanks to the enemy.

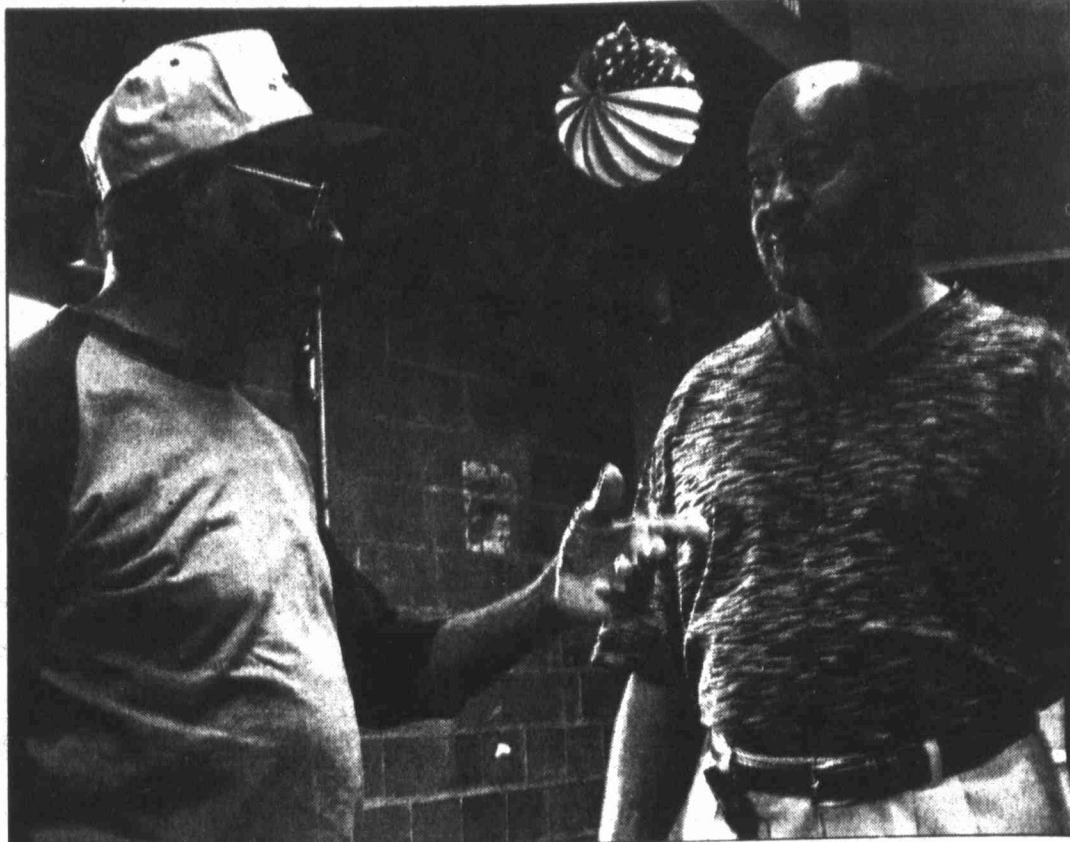
"There were areas in the trees where they'd stretch copper wires. Those wires were so thin and could take the head off a soldier," he said. "If we didn't get to a body first, they'd booby trap the bodies.... The Viet Cong had all kinds of techniques to kill the U.S. soldier."

In order to stay alive, soldiers had to harden quickly, said Jones, who saw an 18-year Army veteran lose his mind one day on a mission. Jones said he knew men who began to let their guard down as the end of their tour neared — a mistake, he added, that would cost them their lives.

"After being over there during the course of the war and seeing your friends killed, you kind of harden your heart," he said. "You can't let those things get to your emotions or you make mistakes."

After his tour, Jones was shipped to Fort Sill, Okla. He was the only one in his unit with combat experience.

"One day we were firing 155s and a gunner in my section would not fire because I was black," Jones said, noting that he was a section chief at the time. "I gunned it myself. When we got back, they

asked me were I learned to set up and gun that fast. I said I learned that in Vietnam. They'd never seen a gun fire so fast. When you go to war and fight like that in combat, you learn a lot of things they don't teach you in training."

The soldier who refused to fire was soon shipped out, Jones said, but added he didn't know where he was sent.

Still at the rank of an E-4, Jones was doing the job of an E-5. The Army decided not offer a promotion — at least until it was time for him to reenlist. By then, Jones said he had decided to part ways with the military.

"I might have stayed if they had offered the promotion to me at the beginning," he said.

Former school chief pleads guilty to charge of false identification

ODESSA (AP) — A former West Texas lawman pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of false identification as a police officer and received a probated sentence.

Former Ector County Independent School District Chief Henry Leester Jackson Jr. on Friday received deferred adjudication, a \$500 fine and was ordered to pay court and probation costs.

If he fulfills those requirements, his record will remain clean, County Attorney Cathy Linch said.

Jackson was accused of allowing his stepson, Andrae LaCoy Wright, to pose as a district police officer in order to obtain after-hours security jobs.

Jackson is still employed by the district as the emergency management coordinator, and he receives the same salary he did as police chief, ECISD director of communications Mike Adkins said.

"I thought Henry was an excellent officer, and I also think he was very dedicated as a chief of police — really genuine and concerned about students," Superintendent Wendell Sallis said. "I really appreciated his work and his time as chief of police."

Dallas school secretary accused of misusing district credit card

DALLAS (AP) — A longtime secretary with the Dallas Independent School District faces felony charges for allegedly using a district-issued credit card for personal purchases.

Marsha A. Ollison, 42, was arrested Friday and charged with three felony counts of theft from an organization receiving federal funds. She faces up to 30 years in prison and a \$750,000 fine if convicted.

According to the U.S. attorney's office, Ollison used the credit card to embezzle and steal merchandise valued at \$15,000 or more over the past three years.

Ollison, who was suspended following her arrest, could not be reached for comment.

The 20-year employee of the district's central office was released on her own recognizance Friday but ordered to stay in Texas and pay \$1,500 toward the cost of a court-appointed attorney. Her plea hearing is scheduled for Sept. 18.

Her arrest is the first in an ongoing FBI investigation into the possible misuse of district credit cards by DISD employees.

Alleged serial molester from Arizona arrested by lawmen in Grand Prairie

DALLAS (AP) — An Arizona man accused of molesting at least eight Phoenix-area children since 1990 has been arrested in Texas, authorities said Friday.

Arthur Vitasek, 43, was wanted by Mesa police on 26 counts of child molestation, sexual conduct with

minors and other related charges.

Police in Grand Prairie arrested Vitasek on Thursday. Authorities said a 16-year-old boy reported last month that Vitasek sexually assaulted him after they met on the Internet.

Vitasek fled Arizona in January 2005 in a pickup truck, which was found abandoned a few days later by Texas authorities.

They said Vitasek was being held without bond and will be moved to a Dallas County Jail on Monday and booked on the Texas charges.

It was unclear if or when he might be extradited to Arizona to face the Class II felony charges and a federal warrant for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

Vitasek is accused of molesting at least eight boys ages 7 to 15 in Phoenix, Mesa and Paradise Valley.

Suit against primate sanctuary dismissed by civil district judge in San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A judge granted a motion Friday to dismiss a lawsuit against a primate sanctuary in a months long fight over the care given to seven retired Ohio State University research chimps living at the facility.

Civil District Court Judge Andy Mireles granted the motion from Primarily Primates Inc. and denied a motion from plaintiffs to adopt a report recommending that the chimps be relocated.

"We're very, very disappointed," said attorney Mickey Gayler, who represents two former caretakers of the chimps, Klaree Boose and Stephany Harris, and a California veterinarian, Mel Richardson. "Our highest concern remains the safety and welfare of the animals."

The chimps were used for cognitive research at OSU and were transferred to the 28-year-old Primarily Primates in a more than \$300,000 contract earlier this year.

"I would consider it a victory," said Primarily Primates lawyer Eric Turton. "It's a vindication of our position."

Gayler said his clients will appeal and may consider separate actions. Gayler was first contacted about Primarily Primates by People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, which was not named in the suit.

"This is certainly not the end of the dialogue with Primarily Primates," Gayler said.

Lawyer Charles Jackson III was assigned to evaluate the health and welfare of the chimps and last month told the court it is in their best interest to be relocated.

Jackson's report said the facility doesn't have the proper enclosures for the social animals.

Two new enclosures are under construction, Turton said.

Mireles' order said the motion to dismiss the suit was granted for lack of standing.

The seven chimps and two monkeys, also from OSU, also were named as plaintiffs in the suit.

Two other OSU chimps, Kermit and Bobby, died within two months of their arrival at the 75-acre compound and a monkey reportedly escaped on the day of arrival.

Teenager shot by police officer at Fort Worth high school

FORT WORTH (AP) — A police officer possibly shot a student in the chest Friday when he opened fire outside a high school after a fight broke out, authorities said.

Police said the student, identified as a teenage boy age 15 or 16, was in stable condition after the shooting at Southern Hills High School.

"We're not absolutely sure that it was the officer's bullet that struck the teenager," Fort Worth police spokesman Gene Jones said. "We haven't been able to rule out (another shooter)."

The officer was also treated at a hospital for minor injuries, Jones said.

A fight began outside the school just after the lunch period, Fort Worth school district spokeswoman Barbara Griffith said.

"There was some sort of altercation, and the police officer felt he had to use his gun," she said.

Sylvia Castillo, the mother of a South Hills student, said in Friday's online edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that the fight broke out in front of the school.


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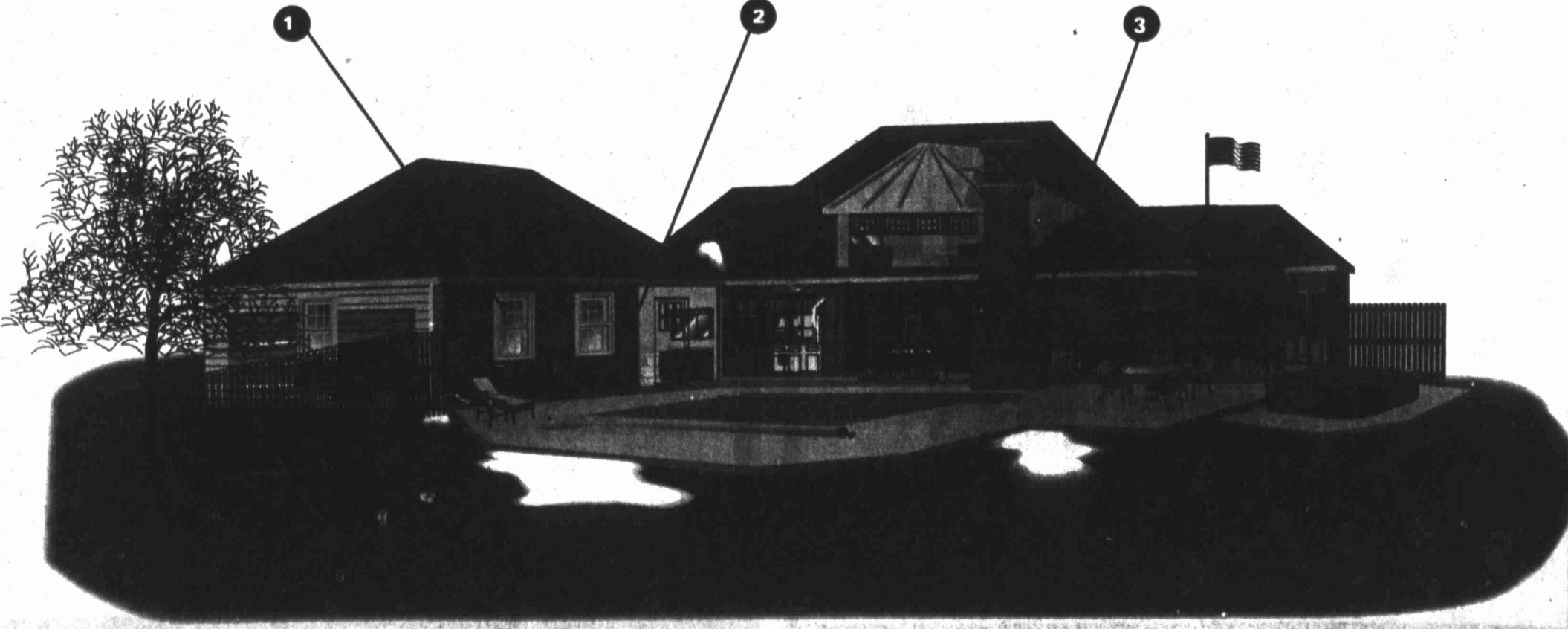
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American Airlines still recovering from terrorist attacks

DALLAS — American Airlines was flying high in 2001. Its parent company had averaged \$1 billion in annual profit for four years, it had just scooped up iconic TWA to become the world's largest airline, and its stock price was at an all-time high.

Then on Sept. 11, 2001, the unimaginable happened, when two of American's planes were seized by terrorists and crashed, plunging the airline industry into a long and deep slump.

American has lost about \$7 billion since 9-11, and it's easy to see a simple cause-and-effect. But analysts who follow the com-

pany say the truth is more complicated.

"Sept. 11 and its aftermath is probably the largest single cause" of American's struggles, "but not the only one," said Philip Baggaley, an analyst for Standard & Poor's.

American and other major carriers opened the door to new, low-cost rivals when they cut flight schedules to save money after the attacks. That accelerated a trend toward lower fares and less revenue per passenger for carriers like American, Baggaley said.

As 9-11 has receded further into the past, high fuel costs have become the leading scourge of the airline industry, some-

times spelling the difference between profit and loss.

American was already struggling with a downturn in lucrative business travel before 9-11. It lost money in the first six months of 2001.

Ray Neidl, an analyst for Calyon Securities, said parent AMR Corp. was headed for a milder cyclical downturn even without the attacks.

"Trying to separate 9-11 from all of that is pretty much impossible," Neidl said. "But 9-11 devastated the industry."

Neidl believes that 9-11 paradoxically could produce long-term benefits for the traditional airlines like American because it forced them to cut costs

and improve efficiency, "which they should have been doing all along."

American's first reaction to the post-9-11 downturn was perhaps predictable: It laid off thousands of workers and grounded airplanes.

Eighteen months later, it won \$1.6 billion in wage and benefit concessions from union workers to keep the company out of bankruptcy. It improved efficiency at hub airports in Dallas and Chicago.

Most importantly, passengers have returned. At American and other carriers, planes are more crowded than ever. That's partly because contraction in the industry has left fewer flights for passengers to choose.

The strong demand has led carriers, sometimes led by American, to raise fares more than a dozen times since early 2005.

Mike Boyd, an airline consultant who just completed a report on American for its pilots' union, said management deserves high marks for steering the company through the aftermath of 9-11 without filing for bankruptcy.

"They've done more to get costs down and revenue up than any of the airlines," Boyd said.

Unlike rival United Airlines, which also lost two planes in the 9-11 attacks, American "took a more honorable course because they didn't file for bankruptcy and their employees still have a pension," yet it still has lower costs than United as a ratio of capacity, Boyd said.

The airline has, however, made missteps, Boyd said, especially in making large payments to executives as part of a manage-

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Terrorist attacks changed border mindset

BROWNSVILLE — Fatigue-wearing National Guard members stand by in the inspection bays. Mexican boys peddle sweets to a new market of backed-up motorists. Fewer Mexican students cross the border for English lessons at the university just a city block into Texas.

Five years later, the outcome of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks is visible here on the international bridges.

And it's felt in the way many in the almost binational region at the tip of southeast Texas have seen the back-and-forth part of their culture threatened, if not shut down.

The only documented terrorism arrest at the Texas border involved a U.S. citizen crossing at El Paso in 2004. Wyoming college student Mark Robert Walker was accused of trying to go to Somalia to help overthrow the Somali government. Walker pleaded guilty last year and was sentenced to two years in federal prison.

Department of Homeland Security spokesman Jarrod Agen said the absence of terrorist arrests at the border is a testament to security improvements and not a sign that there is no threat.

"When we are apprehending (immigrants) at the border, we are vetting everyone," Agen said. "We do checks through our systems to find out if there is some sort of (terrorism) hit."

Meanwhile, illegal immigration came to symbolize the porous border and U.S. vulnerability.

For border crossers, it's meant the line through Customs can stall at any time as a CBP officer asks questions to determine

whether a foreigner should be sent to "secondary" inspection for more questioning. Word has spread among foreigners that a CBP officer can revoke their \$100 laser visas on suspicion they don't intend to return home when the visa expires. CBP officers are on the lookout for document fraud.

New technology, such as drive-through X-ray machines and radiation detectors, means suspicious shapes or devices can be detected and motorists truck drivers are more likely to be asked to stop for further inspection.

Criminal databases are now linked and accessible to CBP officers, which means they are more likely to find a record on a traveler.

Wait times to cross into the United States can vary from as little as 15 minutes to an hour or more.

"I think it would be fair to say that pre 9-11 the area of the border that I know of was fairly laid back," University of Texas-Brownsville anthropologist Tony

Zavaleta said.

"In the post 9-11 world that's changed. The reality of the border is that it's much more serious.... It's an interesting activity when you come back and you're asked your citizenship and you're challenged," he said.

Immigrant advocates like the Rev. Mike Seifert, who ministers to a poor church in Brownsville and an even poorer church across the Rio Grande in Matamoros, Mexico, say the war against terror has somehow morphed into a national hysteria about immigration, with the victims being the poor along the border.

Illegal immigrants working as maids in his parish earning \$100 a

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Until Sept. 11, 2001, both Americans and Mexicans could go to and from the other side within a lunch hour. Customs and immigration agents were fewer and more lenient than they are today.

But now, border agents see themselves on the front line on homeland security, with every entrant not just a possible visa violator but a potential terrorist.

Before 9-11 the priority was detecting narcotics and of course illegal immigrants," said Rick Pauza, spokesman for the new Customs and Border Protection agency. "Our primary mission became to deter the entry of terrorists and weapons of mass destruction."

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Perry urges task force to limit property taxes

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry urged a panel of tax experts Friday to find a way to limit the amount of money Texas counties and cities can squeeze from homeowners while still providing basic services.

Perry, a Republican running for re-election, appointed the panel to address the "silent tax" caused when tax appraisers increase the value of homes without raising the tax rate.

The state ordered school districts to reduce their rates by about 12 percent this year, but that tax relief is expected to be diminished in many parts of the state because of

higher home values.

"I wish I could tell you it's going to be a piece of cake, but it's not," Perry told the task force. "You have an immensely difficult task that involves balancing the needs of local government to raise enough revenue, the demand of taxpayers to stop skyrocketing appraisals and, in some jurisdictions, runaway spending."

Current law caps the amount that taxable appraisal values can increase each year at 10 percent.

Several proposals to lower that cap have withered in the Legislature.

Some lawmakers viewed rising home values as an urban problem or feared caps could shortchange

schools or cities in fast-growing areas of the state.

Residential appraisals are going up by an average of 4 percent to 7 percent in Dallas and Tarrant counties this year.

Capping the amount would lead to inequities in real estate market, said Frank Sturzl, executive director of the Texas Municipal League, which represents city governments in Austin.

"I think most Texans want appraisals to be based on market value," Sturzl said. "What we would be saying to appraisers is, 'Go out and do your appraisal, make sure it's accurate and once you've got them accurate, then change them.' I just don't think

that's what most Texans want to see happen."

Perry's task force will be led by lawyer Thomas Pauken, a former Reagan administration official and state Republican Party chairman.

The group plans to hold hearings throughout the state in the coming weeks.

Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, who is running against Perry as an independent, has said she would give Texans the opportunity to reduce appraisal caps by putting the issue to a public vote. Her campaign criticized the Perry's panel as an election-year ploy.

"After 10 sessions of the Legislature, 60 days before an election and the governor decides we need

appraisal reform. What do Texans get? Another blue-ribbon panel to study the problem," said Strayhorn spokesman Mark Sanders.

"When Carole Keeton Strayhorn is governor she is not going to waste six years in office and 10 legislative sessions studying problems. She will fix them."

Kinky Friedman, another independent candidate for governor, said he would reduce appraisal caps from 10 percent to 3 percent.

Perry has previously proposed a 3 percent cap, but would not set a target limit for the commission.

A spokeswoman for Democratic candidate Chris Bell said the task force is political posturing and shouldn't be taken seriously.

Bell "has repeatedly said he's all for finding a way to offer property tax relief to folks, but he's also not going to tie the hands of municipalities," said spokeswoman Heather Guntert.

ment-retention plan. Union leaders protested when the size of the bonuses — a few topped \$1 million — was disclosed earlier this year.

The bonuses are still a sore point with pilots, who are about to begin contract negotiations and believe they are owed something for contributing to the airline's turnaround. And that puts management in a bind.

"Labor negotiations are always tricky," said Neidl, the analyst. "Just because (the company) made money for a couple quarters, they still have to be diligent at control-

ling labor costs."

AMR's balance sheet is another imposing challenge, with \$13 billion in long-term debt and more than \$9 billion in other liabilities. Its debt carries junk status — it was investment-grade before 9-11.

That means AMR could end up paying more or have to issue new stock to finance an upgrade of its fleet, which Citigroup analyst Andrew Light said is the second-oldest in the industry.

Then, of course, there is the fear of another terror attack.

Continental Airlines Inc. says its August revenue as a ratio of capacity was hurt modestly by the news of a thwarted terror-

ist plot to bomb trans-Atlantic flights. American's occupancy gains slowed in August, but officials said any fear-related loss in travel was limited to London flights. Analysts say any effect is likely to be temporary, although security and baggage-handling costs could rise.

American and AMR are smaller than they were before 9-11. AMR, which also owns the American Eagle regional airline, has shrunk from nearly 130,000 employees to fewer than 90,000.

American officials declined to be interviewed, saying they didn't wish to talk about 9-11. But in recent public comments, they have por-

trayed American as a transformed airline with lower costs and a keener eye for new sources of revenue.

Chief Executive Gerard Arpey said recently that airline industry revenue "fell off a cliff in 2001," and the people at American "have been scrambling to adjust to this new reality."

"Like all airlines, we have a lot of work left to do," he said. "But that said, we are charting a path that is unique among traditional carriers."

week haven't seen children in Mexico in years, because smugglers' fees are higher now that they have to combat tighter security. Others have been jailed after returning for a family funeral. They always come back for that \$100 a week job, he said, but each time the trip gets more dangerous.

"It's like Homer's 'Odyssey' each time — just to earn \$100 a week," Seifert said.

Even those who applied and paid for documents to enter the United States as a tourist or shopper risk having the documents confiscated by a Customs and Border Protection official who doesn't believe their story.

At UTB it means the campus's language institute is no longer packed with "walk-across" students from Mexico using the short-term rather than student visas to go to classes.

Before Sept. 11, the institute had nearly 1,500

students enrolled, he said. Since then, enrollment has been as low as 200, with students saying they are afraid bridge inspectors will seize their visas.

"Everybody knew they were doing it and it was ignored," Zavaleta said. "Afterward that was enforced and it is enforced today. There's a certain fear factor that didn't exist before. ... The word runs through the community and then we're afraid to do this or to go there or to go to school."

One of the Valley's key marketing strategies has been both its cultural ties with Mexico

and the financial interdependence of Valley officials helping lure companies to set up factories on the Mexican side, with managers buying homes and becoming part of the community on the U.S. side.

But there's resentment when a Reynosa, Mexico, restaurant owner has his visa revoked at the border or when a well-heeled Mexican coming to shop feels talked down to by a border inspector.

"It's strained our relationship with our friends in Mexico," said Bill Summers, head of a regional chamber of commerce known as Valley Partnership. "They're not the cause of our problems but they're having to partake of these things."

There are positives to the heightened security.

Summers said that change was always difficult, but both business people and officials he spoke to on both sides of the border recognized the threat of terrorism had changed the world.

"They don't want things to come through there either," he said.

And Zavaleta's commute down the southernmost country road in Texas has gotten a little more comfortable now that heightened security means drug dealers aren't loading their trucks on the side of the road, and boats of illegal immigrants aren't stepping down on the shores of the Gulf of Mexico.

"It's a confusing conflict of feelings over whether it's good or bad and for whom," he said.

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
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Female U.S. Air Force major is found in Kyrgyzstan

BISHKEK, Kyrgyzstan — A U.S. Air Force officer found alive three days after she went missing near the Kyrgyz capital was abducted by someone who put a purported bomb object in her pocket, a top government official said Saturday.

Maj. Jill Metzger, 33, disappeared Tuesday from a department store in Bishkek while on temporary duty there from her base in Georgia.

Shortly before midnight Friday she knocked on the door of a house in Kant, a town about 22 miles from the capital, and told its residents she had been abducted,

Kyrgyz Deputy Interior Minister Omurbek Suvanaliyev said.

Metzger told Kyrgyz law enforcement agents she had been seized by three young men and a woman in a minibus and held in a rural area about 30 miles from the capital, Suvanaliyev said, citing local police in Kant.

She was exhausted and her hair had been dyed, he said.

Metzger's disappearance had baffled investigators, and the military had 22 special agents looking for her.

A Kyrgyz police official, Kemilbek Kiyazov, said Metzger told police that while she was in a popular department store someone placed an

unspecified object in the rear pocket of her trousers. Writing on the object said it was a bomb.

The message also gave detailed instructions telling her where to go in Bishkek, which she followed, Kiyazov quoted Metzger as saying.

"Metzger stated that it was as if she were in a trance," he said.

She was then met by three men and a woman who put her into a vehicle, took her to a residence and placed her in a dark room. According to Kiyazov, Metzger managed to escape after an abductor brought her food and she struck him.

Kiyazov, who personally saw and talked to Metzger, told the AP her

hair had been dyed dark brown and her hands were stained with dye.

This account differed from one given by Metzger's father-in-law, Kelly Mayo, who told The Associated Press in Colorado Springs that the Air Force's Office of Special Investigations said she was found on the side of the road with her head shaven. He also indicated she had been kidnapped and beaten.

"I know she's coherent, and whoever had her let her go," Mayo said. "We've got her back. Praise the Lord."

It wasn't immediately clear why the two accounts differed.

Capt. Anna Carpenter, a spokeswoman at the U.S.

air base at Bishkek's Manas airport where Metzger had been temporarily stationed, said Metzger was in "stable condition." She was taken several hours later to another base in the region, Carpenter said, but declined to give the name of the base. Manas is the only U.S. base in Kyrgyzstan.

The U.S. Embassy in Kyrgyzstan said in a statement that "it now appears that Major Metzger had been abducted," but added that she was now "safe" and thanked Kyrgyz officials for their efforts and close cooperation.

Mayo said Metzger's husband, Air Force Capt. Joshua Mayo, was over-

joyed when he was told Friday that his wife had been found.

"I can't even describe it. He's just beside himself, just unbelievable joy," Mayo said.

Metzger was serving a four-month stint at the Bishkek base with the 376th Air Expeditionary Wing. She had been scheduled to return to her U.S. base in Georgia.

Metzger is a newlywed and is to travel with her husband to Jamaica for a belated 10-day honeymoon after she returns home to the U.S.

The U.S. military has maintained an air base at Kyrgyzstan's main civilian airport since 2001, backing operations in Afghanistan.

Life for Muslim-Americans has been drastically different following 9/11

HOUSTON — Attorney Alamdar Hamdani used to represent multimillion-dollar corporations. Now Hamdani represents cab drivers and convenience store owners who are called in for questioning by the FBI.

Nohayia Javed was a college student who never thought of herself as different from her classmates. Then Javed was beaten up and had hot coffee thrown in her face.

Many lives changed after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. But Muslim-Americans say that as a group, the change for them has been dramatic, generally negative and certainly long-lasting. Overnight they became an enemy in their own country.

How this played out for individuals is as varied as the Muslim-American community itself. The 6 million people who practice Islam — 3 percent of whom live in Texas — are American-born and immigrants; they're converts and those born to Muslim families; they're Democrats, Republicans and independents; they're

neurosurgeons, waiters, CEOs and firefighters.

The backlash has primarily been focused on those with ancestries in the Middle East and Southeast Asia.

"We feel embarrassment, frustration, anger on a daily basis," said Farha Ahmed, general counsel for the Muslim American Republican Caucus, at a recent symposium on racial profiling at the University of Houston Law Center.

Ninety-nine percent of Islam's adherents are nonviolent, said Ahmed, a Libyan-American, but "that doesn't seem to be enough."

Hamdani realized the day of the attacks that there would be a backlash against fellow Muslims. So he joined the American Civil Liberties Union and started representing, pro bono, people who were being detained or questioned by the government.

It's one thing for the general public to look at Muslims with a jaundiced eye, said Hamdani, 34, an American citizen raised by Indian parents. It's something else for the government to do that.

"Just because I worship

a god named Allah doesn't mean the 1st, 4th, 5th amendment doesn't apply," Hamdani said, citing the rights to free association and speech, against unreasonable search and seizure, and to due process.

Houston FBI spokeswoman Shauna Dunlap said her agency's work in the Muslim community benefits both sides and resolves questions.

"No lead can go uncovered in a post-9-11 world," Dunlap said. Some issues are very simply resolved, she added — a misunderstanding or a name similar to a suspect.

The agency does not investigate people based on their religion or ethnicity, Dunlap said. The FBI has proactively reached out to Muslim leaders in the area to build relationships and clear up misconceptions, she added.

Javed, a senior at Baylor University in Waco, is a neuroscience major planning on going to law school. This spring, a stranger approached her on campus, threw her to the ground, kicked her, pulled at her hijab and made

remarks.

Javed, 20, whose parents are Iranian and Pakistani, was in high school when terrorists hijacked four jetliners and flew them into the World Trade Center towers and the Pentagon, with the fourth crashing in a field in Pennsylvania. Less than a week after the attacks, she was at a gas station with her mother when another customer gave her an evil stare and threw hot coffee in her face. Another customer pushed the man and asked him what he was doing. The man then left.

"Muslims are not what they're made out to be, and if you have any doubt in your mind, you should get to know a Muslim," Javed said. "We're normal just like you."

Tarek Hussein, a physical therapist who's active in the Houston Muslim community, has unwittingly gotten himself on a no-fly list. This summer after vacationing in his native Egypt, Hussein was told by airport officials in Cairo that his name was flagged and that they needed to call the U.S. Embassy before letting him travel.

decisive third, one on a 9-yard run and the other on a 22-yard pass from quarterback Alex Halfmann.

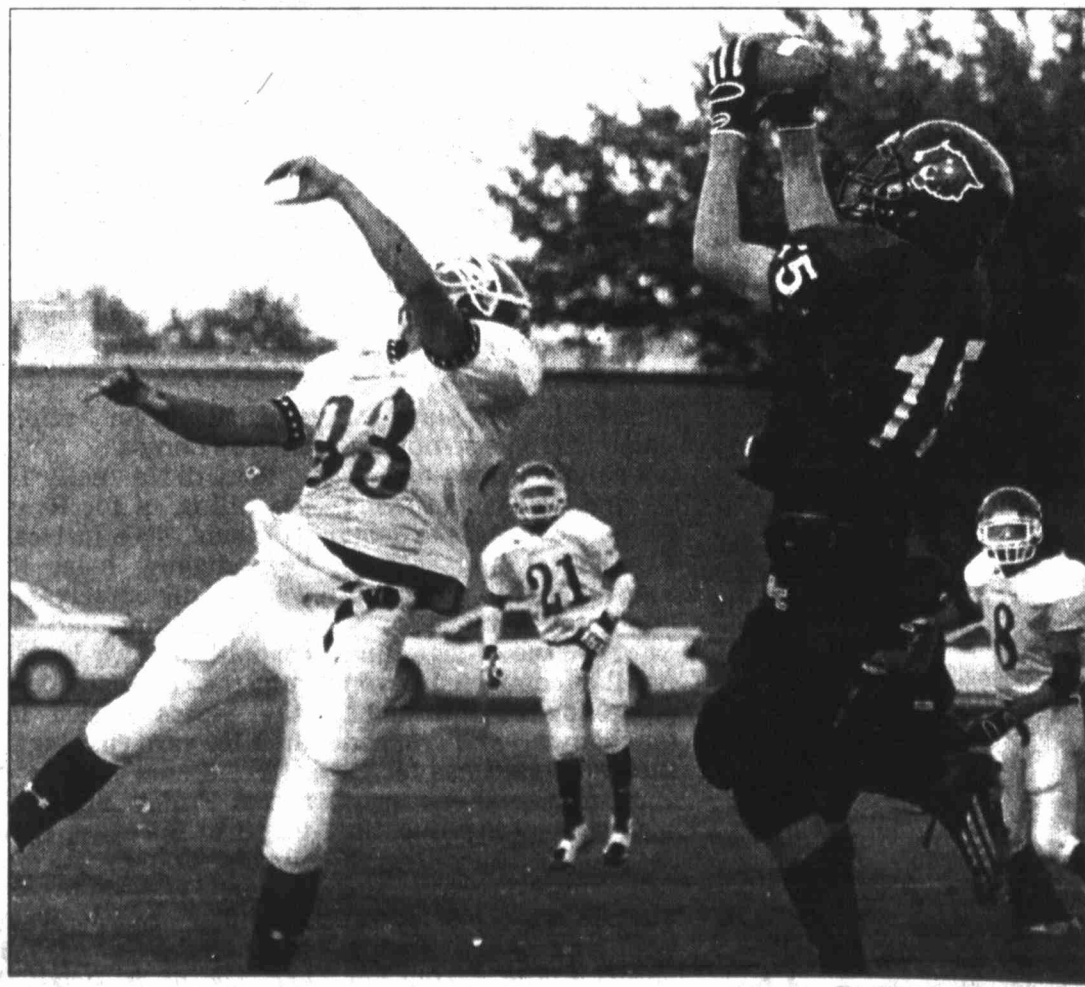

Out of the spotlight, Hall Sutton moves on

FREDERICKSBURG — In his final act as the Ryder Cup captain, Hal Sutton rose before dawn to meet the European team in its hotel lobby, giving the winners a gracious send-off by shaking the hand of every player. That was two years ago. Sutton has barely made a peep in public since then.

It's almost as if he put on his cowboy hat and rode into the sunset, tail between his legs, after being at the helm of an 18 1/2-9 1/2 loss that ranked as the worst ever for an American team in the Ryder Cup.

He used a one-time exemption for career money to keep his PGA Tour card this year, but only because he wanted to play the Nissan Open at Riviera, one of his favorite courses. Sutton missed the cut in February, sticking around long enough to see a lot of strange faces, wondering who they were and what were they doing in the locker room.

"Or maybe they were wondering who I was and what I was doing in their locker room," Sutton said with a belly laugh, the sure sign he's living large again. "I'm OK with that."

Sutton can count on one hand the number of players who have called him in the last six months.

He's OK with that, too. Sutton has moved on to what he calls the second stage in his life, things he wanted to do as a younger man but never took the time because he thought golf was all that mattered, that success was mea-

sured only by the score on his card.

He opened Sutton Children's Hospital in May, an 80-bed facility in Shreveport, La. The project was inspired by the death five years ago of 7-year-old Reagan Little, the daughter of longtime manager and friend Gilbert Little.

"I chose to think golf was everything, that I had to perform, that that's where your self-worth came from," Sutton said. "That was your identity, and you protect that. But the last five years taught me that's not nearly as important as I thought it was."

When he isn't at the hospital, Sutton can be found at Boot Ranch, the opulent golf club he is building in the Hill Country of Texas, a rugged piece of nature about 60 miles north of San Antonio and 60 miles west of Austin.

Sutton has spared no expense. The name plates on the lockers are made

of sterling silver. The benches are covered with hides of ostrich, alligator and longhorn. Each member — former President Bush among them — gets customized boots to be worn on property, much like members in their green jackets at Augusta National.

The only evidence of his Ryder Cup captaincy is in the far corner of a garage below the clubhouse, where the red golf cart he drove around Oakland Hills is collecting dust.

The Ryder Cup is a distant memory, not necessarily a good one.

That much was clear when Sutton was asked whether he enjoyed his two years as captain, and the answer was prefaced by a long pause.

"I'll look back on it as a positive experience," he said. "I think it's the greatest marketing event in the world. It's a big to-do."

"And if somebody thinks you did something wrong, well, that's why it's a big to-do. If somebody badmouths something I did, if in some people's minute opinion they think putting Tiger and Phil together was a mistake ..."

His voice grew loud, thick, determined, just as it was that Thursday before the matches when he announced Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson would be partners for the first time.

They lost both matches. "Here's the truth," Sutton continued. "Do you think they were going to get through their whole career on the same team and somebody wasn't going to put them together?"

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Jags' defenders believe they have T.O. covered

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — If cornerbacks Rashean Mathis and Brian Williams could have chosen any team to play in Jacksonville's season opener, they agree it would have been Dallas.

After all, what would have been better — and potentially more rewarding — than trying to shut down receiver Terrell Owens in his much-anticipated Cowboys debut?

"I love the challenge," Williams said. "I wouldn't want to go out there and have an easy opponent. You want to go out there and play the best. If he's the best, we want to play him."

Mathis and Williams will get the chance Sunday when Owens officially begins his Cowboys career against Jacksonville and returns to Alltel Stadium for the first time since the 2005 Super Bowl.

"He's a good receiver," Mathis said. "He deserves all the respect given to him, all the hype. He makes plays year in and year out. But our defense is up to the task. Whoever we go against, we're going to hit him and hit him hard."

Mathis and Williams were given hefty contracts to be lockdown cornerbacks.

Mathis, a second-round draft pick in 2003, signed a five-year, \$25.5 million contract extension in August 2005. Williams

was the team's biggest off-season acquisition, signing a six-year, \$32 million deal in March that included a \$10 million signing bonus.

The duo will get its first — and maybe biggest — test against Owens and fellow receiver Terry Glenn.

"I was made for this," Mathis said. "I'm a cornerback and striving to be a great cornerback. If I didn't have that mentality, I'm at the wrong position."

Mathis played high school football in Jacksonville and probably would have been offered a scholarship to play at Florida State. But he broke a leg as a senior and ended up at Bethune-Cookman.

Instead of pouting, Mathis worked hard and finished his college career with 31 interceptions. Mathis probably would have been a first-round pick had he been at a more prominent school. But coming from a small, predominantly black college in Daytona Beach, Mathis was available to his hometown team in the second round.

He earned a starting spot as a rookie, then made a seamless transition to cornerback midway through the season and has started 42 consecutive games there. Mathis has 12 interceptions in

three seasons, including five in each of the last two years.

Williams, a fourth-round draft pick from North Carolina State, started 48 games in four seasons with Minnesota and had 262 tackles and 12 interceptions. He had started 33 consecutive games for the Vikings before losing his starting spot to Fred Smoot last season and moving to nickel back.

Williams responded by skipping the team's off-season conditioning program and vowing not to return to Minnesota. Despite his displeasure, the Vikings designated him their transition player in February.

The tag would have allowed Minnesota to keep Williams by matching any outside offers, but it also guaranteed him a \$5.5 million salary this season. The Vikings eventually lifted the tag because they couldn't justify paying a backup that much.

He signed with Jacksonville on the opening day of free agency.

Now, the Jags feel they can better match up with any opponent, whether it be Marvin Harrison and Reggie Wayne of Indianapolis, or Andre Johnson and Eric Moulds of Houston.

"They have two good corners," Owens said. "I feel like we've got some weapons on the offensive side of the ball to really make some things happen."

Eagles, healthy McNabb give Texans tough test in opener

HOUSTON — When Texans No. 1 pick Mario Williams plays against Donovan McNabb on his Madden video game he can't catch him.

He's hoping for a bit more success against the real McNabb when the defensive end makes his regular season debut for Houston against the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday.

"It's going to be a challenge," Williams said. "We as a unit have to contain him or slow him down at least."

It will be a day of challenges for the young and revamped Texans when they face a healthy McNabb and the ready-to-rebound Eagles.

Philadelphia went 6-10 last season, when it was hit with myriad injuries and forced to take part in the soap opera that was Terrell Owens.

"With everything that happened last year, it doesn't make me any more eager to go back out to prove a point," McNabb said.

"It's all about winning football games and not about stats. I think if we all continue to have that mind-set of doing the right things and having that confidence that the guy next to you is going to do his job, then good things will happen for us."

Houston didn't have any similar drama, it just couldn't win. The Texans lost their first six games en route to a franchise-worst 2-14 record that got coach Dom Capers fired and several players released.

Besides Williams, the Texans will start four other rookies as they look for their first win in an opener since 2003 in the inaugural season under coach Gary Kubiak.

But the question for the Houston is, can a team win while developing young players?

"I don't know. Maybe I'm about to find out," Kubiak said. "If you don't have a vision in this business, if you don't know where you're going and what you're trying to get accomplished,

you can spin your wheels fast. We do understand we have a lot of young players, but we won't use that as an excuse."

McNabb should get a boost by the addition of Donte Stallworth, who was recently traded from the Saints, and a healthy Brian Westbrook. Stallworth is prepared to immediately contribute to the offense, McNabb said.

"He has an understanding of the West Coast offense. He knows exactly what we're doing," McNabb said. "It's just important that we begin to reach out to him and let him know about the approach, the attitude and what we plan on to get done."

While Westbrook seems to be recovered from a foot injury that kept him out of most of camp, the Texans aren't so lucky in that department after recently placing Domanick Davis on injured reserve. Davis, Houston's leading rusher for the past three seasons, will be replaced in the starting lineup by rookie sixth-round pick Wali Lundy.

Lundy, who grew up in Philadelphia and speaks with reverence about McNabb, could get some help from 1999 Heisman Trophy winner Ron Dayne, claimed off waivers by Houston after being released by Denver.

More interesting than how the running game will perform is how David Carr will execute Kubiak's new offense. He has more ammunition than ever with the addition of Eric Moulds, who signed a \$14 million contract after being traded from Buffalo in April, to complement emerging star Andre Johnson.

The offense looked sharp in preseason, but things will certainly be tougher against the Eagles' defense, which features a secondary with three perennial Pro Bowlers.

The starters allowed only three points in exhibition play and defensive end Darren Howard, also from the Saints, joins the Eagles after getting 14 1/2 sacks combined in the last two seasons.

"I think even more so in this offense, you're seeing his athletic ability," Eagles coach Andy Reid said of Carr.

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Sculptor leaves family his massive works

BLUE MOUND — Take a drive north on Blue Mound Road and you can't miss them, peering from the front and back yards of a ramshackle little building.

A life-size statue of the second coming of Jesus stands straight and strong. Angels hover nearby. Moses carries the Ten Commandments tablets, one in each hand. The Virgin Mary watches over.

Strategically placed, the statues conjure images of cemeteries and churches, where such larger-than-life figures are the norm. But this was where Yon Sim Pak lived, and this is what he has left behind.

Pak, who died on April 15 at age 78, was a sculptor for whom the past few decades were devoted to chiseling biblical, and a handful of Hollywood-inspired, statues. The South Korea-born artist wanted to create 100 biblical statues and place them in a "holy garden statuary," says his son, Kwang Pak of Fort Worth.

Yon crafted the statues by hand, using homemade tools and a material he referred to as "Pakstone," a mix of cement and secret ingredients.

"This was his life," Kwang says. "More than 12 hours a day. He never took a trip or vacation. All of his energy, all of his time."

When Yon Pak died, he left behind not only these enormous and intricate pieces of art but also a slight predicament: What would his son do with them?

Kwang, Yon's only child, says that his father's wish was for the 14 biblical pieces to be moved to a park, church, cemetery or statuary garden, where they could be appreciated. He wanted, in other words, to expand what he had done up until his death: show the statues for either a small fee

or for free. For many years, the elder Pak led visitors on tours of his house and yard, usually for two quarters. An old sign that reads, "Pakstone Museum" hangs in front of the house, in disrepair. Yon had hoped that selling the statues would provide enough money to

fund a college education for Kwang's son, Kwang says. Selling them has been more difficult than Kwang expected. Some of the larger pieces weigh tons and cannot be moved without machinery, which is not cheap. Also, the property does not belong to Kwang or his family; the house is

rental property owned by the proprietor of a neighboring Mexican restaurant. Kwang continues to pay the rent.

Kwang has been in contact with at least one auction house, Ransberger Auction in nearby Watauga. Kwang and the auction house have yet to seal a deal, says Jim Ransberger, who runs the auction.

"It would be a massive undertaking, but we'd love to do it," Ransberger says. "Those are beautiful pieces."

Kwang says the only problem with auctioning the statues is that there would be no guarantee that they would go to one home. Yon also created statues of Marilyn Monroe, Elvis Presley and John F. Kennedy, but those are manageable and movable; Kwang says his father was proud of those works but was not as emotionally attached to them as he was to the religious figures.

Yon sold some of his smaller statues to pay for more materials.

"He liked those, but he was most proud of the (big) statues," Kwang says. "He wanted them to stay together."

The statues are meticulously detailed, down to fingernails and hair.

"He studied a lot about the human brain," Kwang

says. "He did research on how the human brain, particularly our visual reception, reacts to artistic works. That's why he paid attention to small details. He knew (those details) would get strong reactions."

Yon came to the United States after his wife died of stomach cancer about 20 years ago; he wanted to be closer to his son and two grandsons. For years, Yon lived in Oklahoma. As a resident artist at Rogers State College in Claremore, Okla., he created large statues of George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln, which were displayed on the campus.

Eventually, he moved to Blue Mound, where his son found him a home on Glenn Drive, within eye-shot of Blue Mound Road. It was here that he created the biblical pieces.

"People always (would) drive by the house, slow down, to look at him work," Kwang said. "Summertime, wintertime, always working on them. He says he did it for my mom, his wife. He wanted to dedicate a whole garden of them to her memory."

Assume you are declarer at six spades and West leads the queen of clubs. How would you play the hand?

If you don't give the matter much thought, you might win the club, draw trumps and eventually end up down one, losing a club and a diamond when the diamonds divide 4-2 rather than 3-3.

You can make the slam, however, if you follow a more promising but less obvious line of play. After winning the club with the king and playing the ace of trumps, you lead a diamond to the queen and another diamond back to the ace.

After both opponents follow suit, you lead a trump to the ten, producing this position:

You now lead dummy's last diamond, and East is helpless. If he ruffs, you follow low and later discard dummy's club loser on the king of diamonds. Your third club can then be ruffed in dummy.

If East discards instead of ruffing the diamond, you win with the king, ruff the eight of diamonds with dummy's jack and later lose only a club to make the slam.

Symposium: Pronghorn lessons in the Trans-Pecos

ALPINE — Approximately 130 participants attended the Pronghorn Symposium at Sul Ross State University to learn about the history, biology and management of the unique pronghorn in far West Texas.

"This symposium was a great forum to get a combination of Texas Parks and Wildlife, the NRCS, landowners and hunters all together to discuss pronghorns," said Dan McBride, a veterinarian from Burnet. "There was a broadening of knowledge that came from getting those four groups together."

"That is the most important thing we can take from this," he continued. "We can all go forward from here."

McBride has spent many years hunting and studying pronghorns, as well as helping landowners and wildlife specialists learn more about the animals and develop their habitat.

The pronghorn's scientific name, *antilocapra americana*, means "American antelope goat." The pronghorn is the only animal in the world

with branched or pronged horns, hence the name. They are also the only animal in the world to shed its horns each year, as if they were antlers.

Found only in North America, pronghorns occupy relatively arid climates, such as that found in the Trans-Pecos area. Some of the best places to see pronghorn are just south of Marfa and between Alpine and Fort Davis. They can often be seen grazing alongside cattle on the plains north of Alpine.

However, current pronghorn populations are just a fraction of their historic numbers. Symposium attendees learned that primary causes for population and distribution declines include loss of habitat, artificial barriers (fences and highways), isolation from other populations, predators and natural climatic fluctuations (drought).

Symposium presentations were delivered by professionals from USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas Cooperative Extension, Sul Ross State University, The Caesar Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute, Arizona Game and Fish Department, Arizona

Bush administration proposes deal to settle Lay estate claims

WASHINGTON — The Labor Department proposed a \$12 million agreement on Thursday with the estate of Kenneth Lay, the deceased founder of Enron Corp., to settle claims involving mismanagement of workers' pension plans.

The proposed settlement on behalf of participants covered by Enron's pension plans is subject to approval by the U.S.

District Court for the Southern District of Texas, the department said.

Even if the settlement is approved, it is unclear whether all of the money would ultimately be collected.

"Although the proposed settlement provides a \$12 million claim against the estate, the final recovery will depend upon the total amount of assets available for distribution from Lay's estate," the department said.

The money collected would flow to the participants in Enron's pension plans, said a Labor Department attorney.

Charles Prestwood, 67, a former pipeline operator who retired from Enron in 2000 and later lost \$1.3 million in retirement savings, said he would have liked to have seen a bigger settlement. He also wondered whether he would actually get a slice of the money.

"I really hope I do see some of it," Prestwood

said. "But it doesn't sound like much. I wish we would get more than \$12 million."

Lay died of a heart attack in July. He faced the prospect of the rest of his life in prison after his conviction May 25 of fraud and conspiracy in one of the biggest financial debacles in American corporate history.

The Labor Department sued Lay and others in 2003 for mismanagement

Regardless of how economy lands, stocks could decline

NEW YORK — Will the economy make a soft landing, or will it hit the ground hard?

Wall Street is preoccupied with that question now because they think the result could make or break the stock market in the months ahead.

While it's true that a recession

increases the likelihood of big portfolio losses and lower corporate profits, investors shouldn't assume that negative economic growth will be the only thing that rocks the market.

New research from Bear Stearns shows that lower equity returns are likely even when economic growth slows in an orderly fashion.

"Soft landing or recession, it's a lackluster environment for stocks," Bear Stearns chief investment officer Francois Trahan said.

He draws that conclusion by tracking how the Institute for Supply Management's leading indicators for the service and manufacturing sectors have correlated with the Standard & Poor's 500 index in recent

years. In those reports from the Tempe, Ariz.-based research group, a reading of 50 or more indicates economic expansion, while levels that fall below 50 indicate contraction. Trahan believes that a level around 50 is considered a soft landing, while between 40 and 45 is a hard landing.

According to his research,

when the ISM's index historically has come in around 60, then the S&P 500 gains on average 17 percent year over year. A 55 reading has yielded a 5.2 percent average gain, a 50 reading shows a 6.5 percent decline and a 40 reading comes in with a 30 percent average loss in the S&P 500.

The good news is that there isn't much to worry about on that front just yet: In August, the service sector activity index came in at a level of 57, while the manufacturing index was at 54.5.

Other economic data mostly show a similar picture. While the housing market is clearly deteriorating — with sales and prices growth on the decline in some overheated regions — the retreat isn't everywhere.

In the April-to-June quarter, economic activity grew at a 2.9 percent annual rate. That was below the 5.6 percent pace in the first quarter — the fastest in 2 1/2 years — but the second-quarter readings were revised up from the 2.5 percent growth rate that the Commerce Department had previously estimated.

Helping to fuel growth are higher wages, strong corporate profits and growth overseas. Even consumers, who could have pulled the plug on their spending when gas prices jumped to \$3 a gallon over the summer, are hanging in. Non-auto retail sales are up nearly 5 percent over the last year.

With growth moderating and inflation not spinning out of control, many economists believe that the Federal Reserve will hold interest rates steady at its meeting later this month. The Fed raised rates 17 consecutive times since June 2004, but

stopped at its August policy-making meeting when it held its overnight bank lending rate at 5.25 percent.

Still, the Fed, in its latest survey of America's business climate released this week, acknowledged some deceleration in growth. It used the word "weak" to describe the economic backdrop no fewer than 50 times in its survey, up from 40 in July and the most since January 2001, two months before the start of the last recession, according to Merrill Lynch.

No doubt the Fed is closely watching each piece of data, and investors should too.

Clearly, focusing on the housing market is a no-brainer. Smart investors won't just size up what's happening in residential sales or prices, they'll also watch how the pullback affects everything from commercial real estate to consumer spending.

Since inflationary concerns are always something on Wall Street's radar, pay close attention to unit labor costs. They rose at an annual rate of 9 percent in the first quarter and 4.9 percent in the second quarter — both much higher than had been expected. That could indicate that prices are heading up or corporate profits are going down.

Investors should watch how much price-earnings multiples contract. When that happens, it has forecast an economic slowdown 70 percent of the time since 1950, according to Merrill Lynch.

of Enron's pension plans. The department alleged that Lay failed to properly oversee the fiduciaries he appointed to run Enron's pension plans.

The department also contended that Lay misrepresented Enron's financial condition to employees and plan officials by encouraging them to buy Enron stock when he knew it was imprudent to do so. Lay also was sued as a

member of Enron's board of directors for failing to properly appoint and monitor a trustee to oversee the employee stock ownership plan.

The department said Thursday's agreement does not settle the government's claims against Jeffrey Skilling, former CEO of Enron.

Like Lay, Skilling also was convicted of fraud and conspiracy for lying to employees and investors about Enron's financial health.

State University and New Mexico State University. Topics included historical perspectives on pronghorns, life history and behavior, feeding habits, habitat requirements, habitat management, permits and harvesting, and current population status.

The impacts of habitat fragmentation, predation, grazing management and riparian and grassland restoration on pronghorn were also discussed. An important habitat characteristic that impacts pronghorn health and productivity is the freedom to make occasionally long-distance movements to locate quality forage, water and shelter. The ability to move about freely is especially important in times of drought.

One large factor that affects pronghorn herds in West Texas are net-wire fences that once managed sheep herds. Pronghorn do not normally leap fences, like deer can do, so fenced rangeland has hampered their migration and survival in the past century. The unrestricted movement of

the pronghorns during all seasons is a key factor in maintaining a healthy and productive herd.

"Modification of net-wire fences to allow greater access to forage will help maintain an adequate food supply for the pronghorns," Steve Nelle, a NRCS wildlife biologist, noted. "Maintaining access to good water is also important."

Local landowners and managers participated in discussion panels and shared how they include pronghorn management in their operations. Pronghorns prefer the grasslands, but access to brush is also important. The diet of pronghorns consists almost entirely of forbs (non-woody flowering plants) and brush. Grass makes up a very small part of the diet, making them very compatible with cattle. Pronghorns do not fit very well with sheep or goats, since their food habits are somewhat similar.

"On most ranges in the Trans Pecos, the most feasible method for maintaining an adequate supply of perennial forbs is to practice conservative stocking rates and pasture rotation," Nelle advised

Pronghorns can make significant use of browse (shrubs) when forbs become less available, even eating cholla and prickly pear when necessary to survive. Pronghorn have the unique ability to eat plants that are poisonous to livestock, such as paperflower, groundsel, broom snakeweed and goat head.

Predation has been identified as one of the factors which affect pronghorn population levels. They typically graze in open prairies, making them vulnerable to predators such as coyotes, bobcats, mountain lions and golden eagles. Fawns are especially vulnerable, making fawning cover an important aspect of their habitat. Increasing pronghorn populations is dependent upon fawn survival, making interspersing of shrubs or other hiding cover (10 inches to 22 inches high) within grasslands an important factor in pronghorn survival.

The second day was held in the field on a local ranch, where comparative necropsies were conducted on a pronghorn and heifer. The thorough examination of the body design and digestive sys-

tem illustrated the influence of morphological differences on feeding strategy and behavior. Samples were taken from the rumen of both animals, and the contents were analyzed and discussed. The rumen of the heifer contained nearly 100% grass, while the rumen of the pronghorn contained nearly 100% forbs which confirmed what the speakers had said the previous day about feeding habits and the compatibility of cattle and pronghorn. The crowd then divided into smaller groups led by NRCS and TPWD personnel, and looked at examples of habitat and plants important to pronghorn.

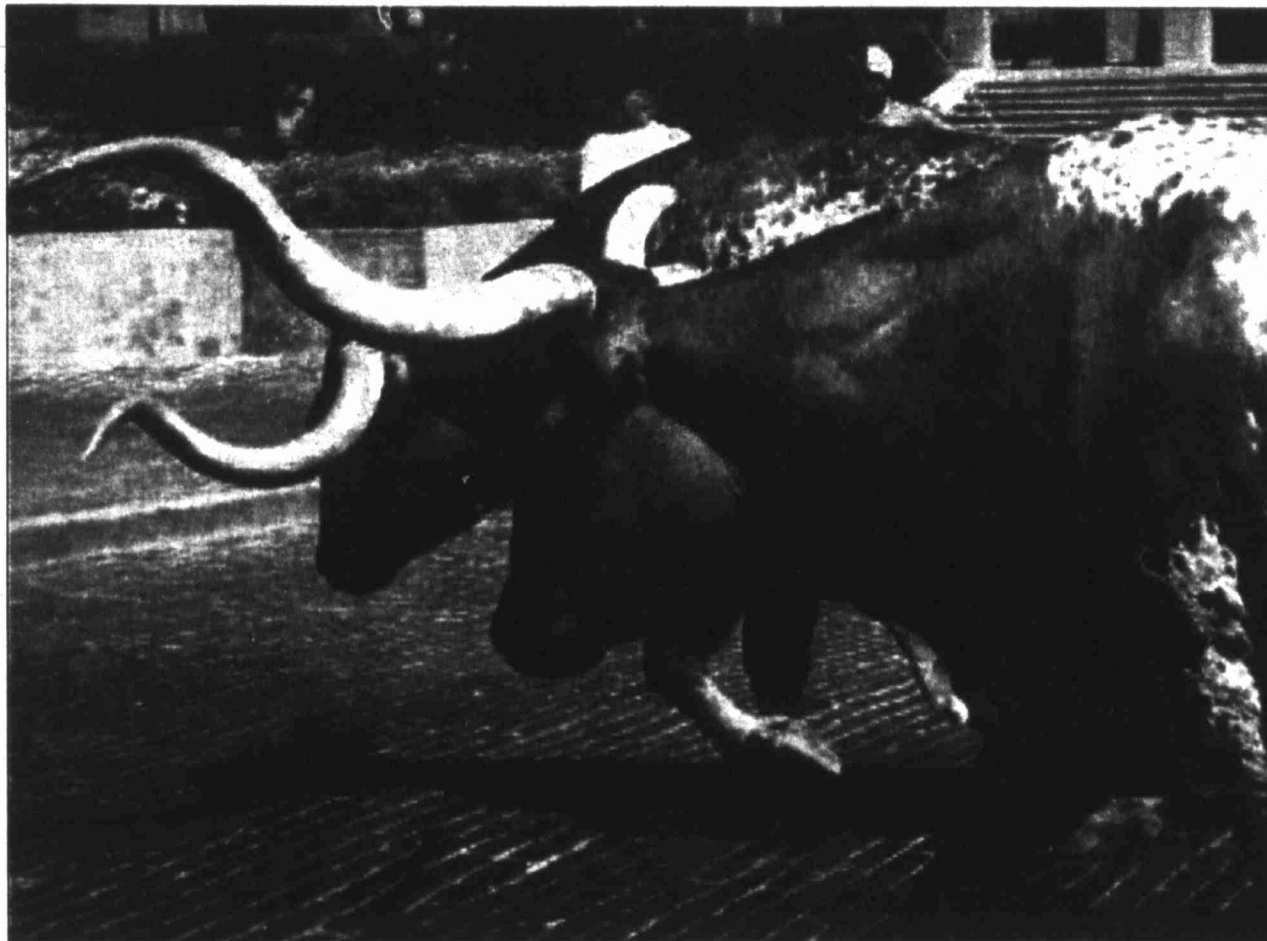

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'Final Destination 3' a thrill ride

Roger Ebert, the celebrated movie snob, may have coined the phrase "dead teen movie," but it's the cast and crew of the "Final Destination" film franchise that have taken the DTM to a whole new dimension.

And while the premise of the movies is certainly enough to make you think, it's the basic structure of the films — most recently "Final Destination 3" — that is most amazing.

You tell the audience which characters are going to die. You even tell them in what order. And then they sit back and enjoy the mayhem.

That's how the "Final Destination" films work, and if it seems counterintuitive to give away so much up front, the series has made it work with macabre humor and devilishly clever setups. There's not much suspense over who will die, but you can thrill in trying to guess how.

The premise is simple. Fate dictates when you die, and if you somehow cheat Death — you know, the dude with the scythe and the black robes — and miss your time, Death will come back around for you, presumably the next time he's in your neighborhood. Or maybe he makes special trips. I honestly have no idea.

This chapter begins with a Pennsylvania high school's "Grad Nite" trip to an amusement park, where a responsible, controlling senior named

Wendy — Mary Elizabeth Winstead

have died if they had stayed on the ride. Isn't that convenient?

have snaps of all the survivors — photos that seem to herald the manner of their impending doom.

It would seem there's no way to outsmart Death, and that is indeed part of the film's

when Death is so good at turning ordinary events into unforeseeably fatal accidents?

"Final Destination 3" is a return to form for the series. FD2 was a pale imitation of the original, done by newcomers who clearly missed the subtle touches that had made the first one work. FD3 has the original filmmakers back onboard — director/writer James Wong ("The One," "X-Files") and his television co-writer Glen Morgan ("Willard," "The One") — as well as much of the original sense of humor and more of those elaborate deathtraps that result in such unexpectedly entertaining demises.

Unlike the first film, FD3 lacks some of the talent that helped carry the idea several years ago. Texas Battle ("One Tree Hill," "Coach Carter") turns in a ragged performance as the group's un-killable teen, while Sam Easton ("The Butterfly Effect") leaves you thoroughly unsure what his part would have been like without the pimp-like wardrobe and greasy smile.

These shortcomings are

As if it's not eerie enough to survive such an accident, now Wendy and the others have this to contend with: Death is going to swing by and kill them all anyway, in the same order they would

Wendy's friend Kevin — Ryan Merriman ("The Ring 2," "Halloween: Resurrection") — notices the trend after the first few survivors are bumped off in bizarre accidents, and finds an account of similar events that occurred six years earlier — in the first "Final Destination" movie, of course.

What's more, Wendy was taking pictures for the yearbook during Grad Nite, and she happens to

very dark philosophy. Where most horror films have a specific killer, monster, force or virus, the "Final Destination" franchise has only Death itself.

You can barricade your house against zombies, or take a vaccine for a plague, or simply run fast to escape Jason Voorhees. But how do you escape Death — which is merely an idea, a concept — and especially

easily forgotten, however, after just a few minutes of watching Winstead, who turns in a solid and encouraging performance. For an actress as talented as she obviously is, it's hard to turn in a stellar performance that captures the awkwardness of being a teen — much less a teen locking horns with Death itself — a feat she pulls off with flying colors.

The Rube Goldberg factor is the film's must eye-catching element. It's never anything as simple as a car swerving across the line and hitting you, or even a regular ol' heart attack. No, for these grudge deaths, the Grim Reaper prefers something a little more elegant.

We watch as several elements are established — that stereo is too close to that puddle, those decorative swords are not tightly affixed to that wall, and so forth — and then watch as one minor incident triggers a chain reaction among all these unrelated circumstances, culminating in someone's head being smashed.

Wong and Morgan are smart to inject the film with gallows humor, which keeps it from becoming oppressively dark. They don't dwell on the gore, either. The deaths happen, and they happen spectacularly — but they also usually happen quickly, without any lingering on the aftermath or bloody leftovers.

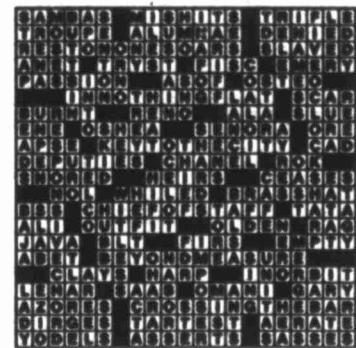
Another bright spot for this DVD is the special features. Unlike most movies today, you have to do somewhat work to get the Easter eggs out of this film. There are plenty of clues lending themselves to the ultimate demise of previous film characters, helping to sort of wrap-up the franchise in the end.

The film also gives the viewer a chance to play along, something also rare today. While most discs



will just throw alternate endings on the disc like a late-night diner cook plates your Moons Over My Hammy, again, you have to work for it. The viewer gets to make key decisions in the movie that can either move things along, change the time line (the most entertaining being the demise of Franky Cheeks) or even end it all right then and there.

If you're a fan of the Final Destination franchise, this movie is certainly a step up from FD2 and is a must see/buy. Between the gore and the language, the film earns its Rated-R from the MPAA, but it's not a rough Rated-R by any means.



If you didn't like the first FD movie, you may want to pass this over in favor of something a little less dark, like a Scooby movie or something.
