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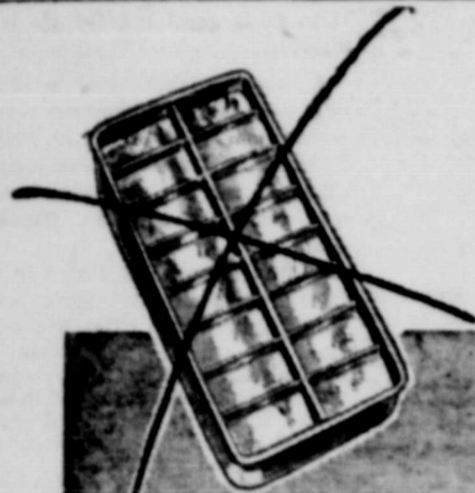

State Representative Reports From Austin On Timely Matters

Last Thursday at noon four members of the State Hospitals and Special Schools Committee and myself started on an inspection trip that ended back in Austin Sunday night. During the trip we visited state mental institutions and hospitals at Wichita Falls, Abilene, Big Spring, Sanatorium, and Kerrville. All of the institutions were clean and well run, but quite a bit overcrowded. It is not a very pleasant task to inspect and report to the Legislature on these institutions, but it is a job that someone must do at his own expense and time.

The Conference Committee members were appointed by the Speaker. They, along with five members from the Senate, will work out the differences in the two general appropriations bills of the House and Senate. There is a five million dollar difference now that includes primarily a raise for state employees.

Many local and uncontested bills were passed out of the House last week. Also, a bill to lengthen motor buses from 35 to 40 feet was passed without the much predicted fight on the floor sponsored by the railroads.

A resolution proposing a constitutional amendment for four-year local and state office terms has passed both houses. Tom Joseph's bill to increase driver license fees to facilitate the hiring of additional highway patrolmen has had a rough time, but may pass next week.

Rheumatic Fever Is Classed as Dangerous By Health Authorities Austin, March 10—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, commenting on the seriousness of rheumatic fever, today declared that this disease is recognized as one of the greatest killers among young people. Between the ages of 10 and 15, rheumatic fever causes more deaths than any other disease, the State Health Officer said, and in persons between the ages of 15 and 24, it is outranked only by tuberculosis.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that deaths in childhood from rheumatic fever have not decreased in a satisfactory manner during the past decade, and warned the parents of children to pay particular attention to the care and treatment of such predisposing diseases as tonsillitis and other upper respiratory infections.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth, March 30.—F.F.A. youths had the top fat cattle at Fort Worth Monday at \$3. The top was earned by the Burnet County F.F.A. group and the Frisco group from Collin County. The "commercial" type of feeding project is taking hold and we have seen better than a dozen such climaxed here this year, while a couple of years ago no more than a couple or three existed.

The "commercial" feeding tests teach youngsters how to fit cattle for market, instead of the show ring. It teaches how to make a profit, or how to make a loss. This year has been bitter for many young folks because of adverse price trends, high feed costs, and in many cases, feeders that cost too much. These lessons, while hard, are teaching the boys and girls the facts of economics—profit and loss—and may save them from costlier mistakes in years ahead.

We simply cannot fail to add our bit in this matter. We think commercial feeding projects are the answer to the farm youth livestock feeding program. A tiny percentage of livestock producers in adult life fit livestock for shows. Yet every livestock producer fits cattle for market whether on grass or in the feedlot.

It seems to this writer that every town, county and district can solve the headaches of show sales which in many cases were getting burdensome to merchants and local business men. It's certainly worth looking into.

Cattle were steady to strong at Fort Worth Monday. Hogs drew 25 to 50 cents higher prices, topping at \$21.25-21.75. Sows sold \$17.00-19.00; pigs \$17.00 down. Spring lambs were steady to 50 lower, topping at \$23.50. Old crop shorn lambs were steady to 50 cents higher, topping at \$20. Yearlings and two's sold for \$15.00-18.00. Old ewes \$12. Old ewes \$7.50-9.50. Shorn feeder lambs \$18.50 down.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings \$19.00-23.00, and lower grades \$13.00-19.00. Fat cows \$12.50-14.50, few higher; canners and cutters \$9.00-12.50. Bulls \$12.00-18.00. Good and choice fat calves \$19.00-23.00; common and medium kinds \$13.00-19.00, culls \$10.00-13.00. Stocker calves \$15.00-23.25; stocker yearlings \$22.50 down; stocker cows \$12.00-22.00.
