

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

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

LAW REQUIRES FULL STOP BEFORE PASSING HALTED SCHOOL BUS

School busses over the state have board the bus. Most of such accidents could be avoided if motorists would adhere strictly to the letter of the law pertaining to the passing of school busses.

law which requires a driver ome to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a rchood bus, he is then allowed by law to or discharge school children. law. For instance, when passing right under most ordinary condi tions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-

way street with two or more lanes upon a four-lane highway. However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion

of the roadway. Even when not engaged in passing another vehicle, a driver is prohibited from driving to the left of the center of the roadway at all times except in a few speci-fied instances. The few exceptions where the center may ordinarily be crossed do not apply in the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Neither may you cross the cen ter line for any purpose when approaching within 100 feet of any bridge, viaduct or tunnel. prohibition also applies when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.
