



Section 7: ENFORCEMENT.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be administered and enforced by the City Council of the City of Hico. All applications for building permits shall be accompanied by a plat in duplicate, drawn to scale, howing the actual dimensions of the lot to be built upon, the size of the building to be erected, the ise of the property, and such other information as may be necessary to provide for the enforcemen these regulations. A careful scord of such applications and plats shall be kept in the office of the City Council.

Section 8: CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS.

The City Council of the City of Hico may from time to time, amend, supplement or change by ordinance the boundaries of the districts herein established, or the regulations herein contained. The City Counci shall also give notice to the citizens of the City of Hico of such proposed amendment, supplement or change and of a public nearing to be held in connection therewith, by publication in the official paper of the City of Hico once a week for three consecutive weeks. Such hearing shall not be held earlier than twenty-one (21) days from the date of first publica-

tion of said notice.

The City Council shall thereafter and in accordance therewith hold such public hearing. If there
