**SAVINGS TO GULF FREEWAY USERS NOW EXCEED PROJECT COST BY \$6.2 MILLION**  
A recent study on the nine mile section of Houston's Gulf Freeway completed in 1948 shows savings to users equalled the projects entire \$14.8 million cost during the first four years after it was opened. Subsequent savings reflect a \$6.2 million "profit" as of March 1, 1954.  
Meanwhile fatal accidents on the Freeway averaged less than one-third the national average for all highways.  
Economic necessity of an adequate Harris County freeway system is boosting support of a \$375 million 20-year county program to be financed partly by local road-use tax levies.

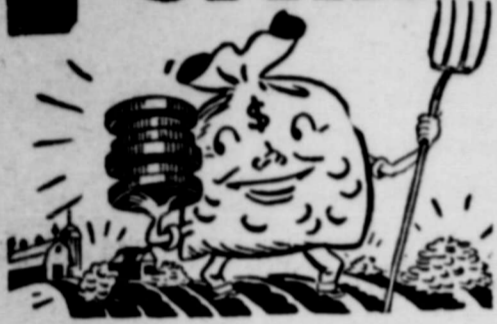

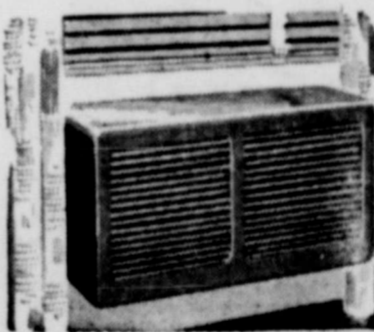

Funeral services for Houston Garnie Palmer, 78, who died Monday at his home in Hamilton, were conducted at Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel in Hico Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Bob Shotwell of Hamilton officiated. Interment was in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Palmer was born May 30, 1875, near Little Rock, Arkansas. He had been an oil field worker, and had made his home in Hamilton since February of this year. His wife preceded him in death last year, following an automobile accident. They had previously lived at Hico.

Surviving are eight daughters, Mrs. Paul Rieger, of Taylor; Mrs. R. W. Lee of Hamilton; Mrs. Earl Young of Bonham; Mrs. Don Russell of Mercedes; Mrs. R. T. Seay of Buckeye, Arizona; Mrs. Leon Mott of Portales, New Mexico; Mrs. Miles Moore of Lubbock; and Mrs. Charlie Dabbs of Post; five sons, Raymond and Robert of Portales, New Mexico, Carl of Wichita Falls, Loyd of Lubbock and H. G. Palmer Jr. of Brownwood; three brothers, Quill of Ovalo, Marion of Perrin and Ed Palmer of Fort Worth; also 17 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Austin, Texas, May 3.—All the questions having been resolved concerning who is going to run for what, a big political season is now under way.

Ralph Yarborough of Austin, who announced that he would be a candidate against Allan Shivers for governor, declared himself against breaking the two-term tradition in the chief executive's office.

Yarborough contends that Shivers actually is seeking a fourth term; the incumbent has served two elective terms in office, plus the unexpired term of the late Beauford Jester.

Machine politics and one-man domination of the state government were also charged by Yarborough as he put his name on the ticket.

Shivers had previously announced for an unprecedented third term for governor. He had stated prior to the announcement that there remain some things that need to be done, such as putting through a water conservation program.

**Water Is Topic.** Water conservation was a prime subject for the political speakers. That problem is one of the state's biggest, and influenced him in deciding whether to run for governor again, Shivers told reporters.

He said that in his opinion Texas has sufficient water if the supply is conserved, adding:

"Texas can solve its own water problems. It ought to be done in large part on the local and state level."

Backing for Shivers came from Guy C. Jackson, president of the Texas Water Conservation Association.

Jackson said he believes that the governor "plans to go all out with his usual energy to see that the

next session of the legislature dedicate itself to an intense patriotic study and ultimate solution of our water situation . . ."

Yarborough, speaking at Hempstead, said that the answer to the water problem "is action, not a continual bickering between the State and Federal Government." He added:

"The State Government is wasting its energy and killing time by continuing to call the Federal Government names."

C. T. Johnson as part of his platform, proposed the construction of 100,000 small dams in Northwest Texas to hold rainfall.

He also recommended a canal to connect 10 Texas rivers and provide an interchange of water to balance irregular flow.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson also urged thousands of small dams in the upland areas of Texas for water storage and protection against floods.

**Race for Senate.** Senator Johnson drew opposition in the person of Representative Dudley T. Dougherty of Beeville, wealthy rancher and oil man.

Dougherty cranked up his campaign by sending to Johnson in Washington a telegram asking him some questions. Dougherty wanted to know:

Does Johnson approve the use of U. S. troops in Indo-China?

Does Johnson favor sharing atomic secrets with other nations?

Will Johnson assist in the investigation of federal loans on Texas hotels and apartments?

**Close the Gaps.**

E. H. Thornton Jr., chairman of the state highway commission, told a Kaufman County delegation that the commission's policy is to complete gaps in the farm road system before beginning new routes.

Thornton's statement was in response to a Kaufman County representative's question on a local road problem.

"We will not be limited in our thinking by precinct lines," Thornton said. "We are proud of our farm-to-market road system in Texas. There is about 22,000 miles built or under construction. It is high time to start connecting these roads."

Thornton said that federal aid for roads has been increased for next year, and with matching funds Texas' highway program will expand by \$35 million a year.

**Inspection Stickers.** There are 2,650,000 vehicles in Texas that have passed the automobile inspection test—but a quarter of a million cars are going around without the required stickers according to the Department of Public Safety.

Automobiles lacking the evidence that they have been inspected will be sought out and the owners given warning tickets or court-summmons tickets.

April 15 was the deadline for the automobile inspection.

**Surplus Feed Grain.** Advantages are to be had by sale of the government's surplus feed grain, says John C. White, state commissioner of agriculture.

Such sale, the commissioner believes, would result in bringing the cost of livestock feed down and would bring relief to the cattle-men's drought problems.

Speaking at Vernon, White said further that sale of the feed would also save the taxpayers many millions of dollars because the government would get a return from products that are now merely clogging warehouses where space is needed for new crops.
