The Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives has passed a bill by Martin Dies to outlaw the Communist Party, but the action is opposed by the Attorney Gen-eral and the Department of Jus-tice, which makes it doubtful of passage in this Session.

If the bill to bring Communists from behind the Fifth Amendment could be passed, together with several measures already enacted into law, we would be much nearer to meeting the Communist threat

Vacation Drivers Urged To Make Courtesy Your Code of the Road

"Vacation Driving is big business," Col. E. E. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation, said to-

He spoke in connection with the July vacation driving traffic safety program his organization is sponsoring in Texas this month in cooperation with the National Safety Council.

"The American habit of vacation travel has grown to such an extent that tourists now spend about 10 billion dollars annually on auto trips," he said.

"Highway travel has become so heavy during the summer months that a definite traffic safety problem has been created."

"According to the American Automobile Association," Col. Tilley explained, "a total of 66 million persons, traveling in 22 million cars, take automobile vacations during the year. The average car travels 1,200 miles in 11 days of travel.

"Since about 70 per cent of vacation travel is done during the six months between April and September," he said, "a big extra load is placed on the nation's highways during the summer months."

And for years he pointed out

And for years, he pointed out, this increased summer travel has been accompanied by increased traffic accident fatalities.

"Every year, with the coming of warmer weather, pleasure driving becomes more extensive," Col. Tilley said. "When this happens, it becomes more important than ever for the motorist who wants to avoid accidents to practice alertmess and caution behind the wheel. Good planning before a trip also is important.

"And I can't emphasize too strongly the value of courtesy in preventing accidents on our streets and highways. The safe driver makes courtesy his code of the road, and also is ready always to recognize and acknowledge the courteous acts of others."

He urged all vacationists to heed the July slogan of the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council, "Vacation Time—Make Courtesy Your Code of the Road."
