A decision on what to do about \$1,167,758 of South Texas land deals said to be fraudulent was delayed by the State Veterans Land Board.

Three South Texas land com-panies had offered to assume liability on that amount of land transactions which the firms promoted during the last four years. Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, who said the land sales showed evidence of fraudulent misrepresentation, told the Land Board that acceptance of the offer would violate the State Constitution

The Board agreed to a oneweek investigation period before announcing its decision.

Fat lambs topped at \$19 at Fort A year ago good and enoted its Worth Monday and the year ago. teers and yearlings topped at \$18 the fat lambs top of a year ago. However, slaughter ewes quoted at \$5 to \$6.50 this week are \$1 behind a year earlier. Feeder lambs sold at \$12 to \$16, and load lots of fleshy shearing lambs were quotable to \$17 here Monday, this averages about \$1 under a year ago. December average prices of fat lambs have been around \$1 or more under a year earlier, along with most other sheep and lambs, but the small improvement of the past few days, coupled with a reverse at the same date last year caused



"It is quite as important," Dr. Holle said, "to check up on your physical resources as it is to look into the state of your manacial possessions. By regular care under your physician's direction, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid the accumulation of destruc tive liabilities.

"Each of us starts with a cer tain amount of physical capital Merely as a business proposition, it is worthwhile to conserve it to th best of our ability. In infancy and childhood our physical resources as a rule, are safeguarded for us As we grow older, the responsibili ty for doing so rest upon the in dividual. The critical period may come in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing re turns in the way of physical well being. A large number of the deaths reported each year in Tex as is due to the degenerative di seases of middle age. "Nearly all of these diseases have

slow beginnings, and their onset can often be recognized in the course of a thorough physical examination before they have gain ed serious headway. In the majori early detection of menacing ty, conditions with a readjustment of physical expenditures and a bel budgeting of activities, under the physician's direction, will help o shift the balance from unfav arable to the favorable side of the edger.


