Texas' Calf Crop

The USDA figures just released in Texas' calf crop in 1954 indicrop on record, according to the department

Expressed percentage-wise as the umbers of cows and heifers two years old or older, it meant that the crop was 87 per cent. This unusually high percentage came about despite drouth. Calf crop was 85 per cent in 1953, and average for the past ten years was 80 per cent.

In the United States 42,210,000 calves, or 3 per cent more, were raised in 1954. The 1953 total was 40,947,000. It was also an all-time record.
