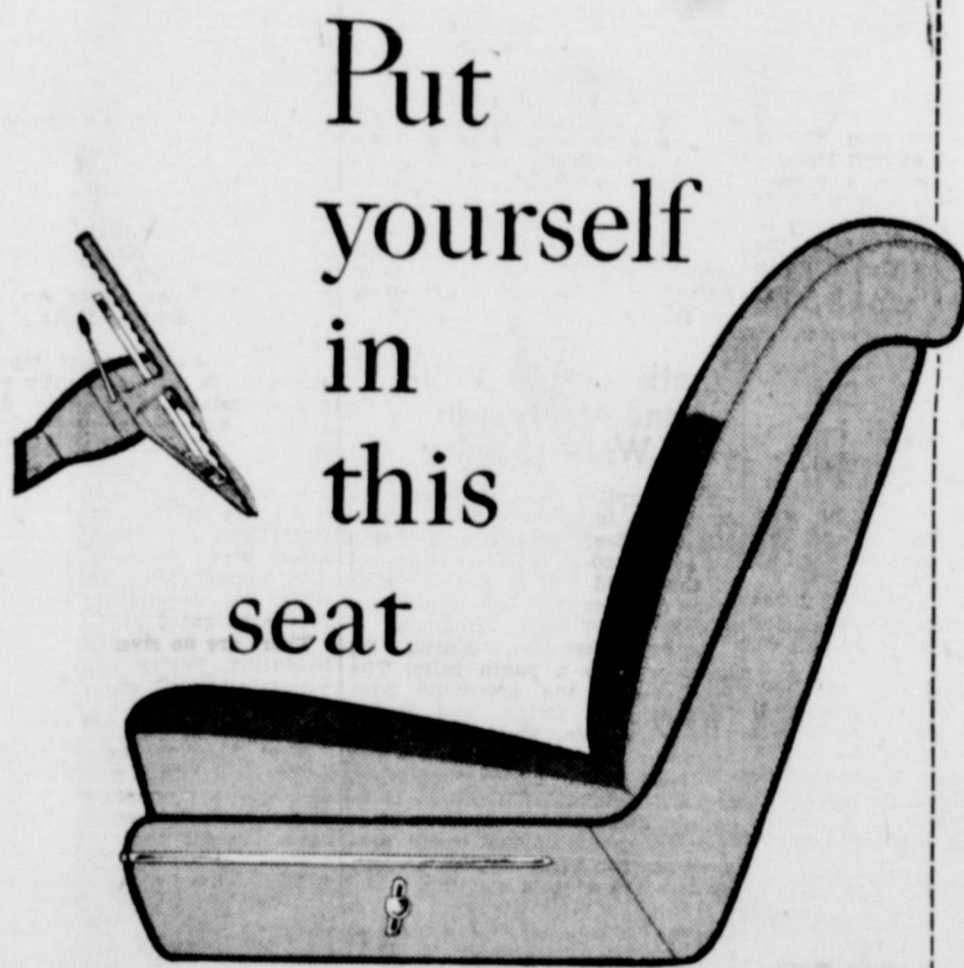
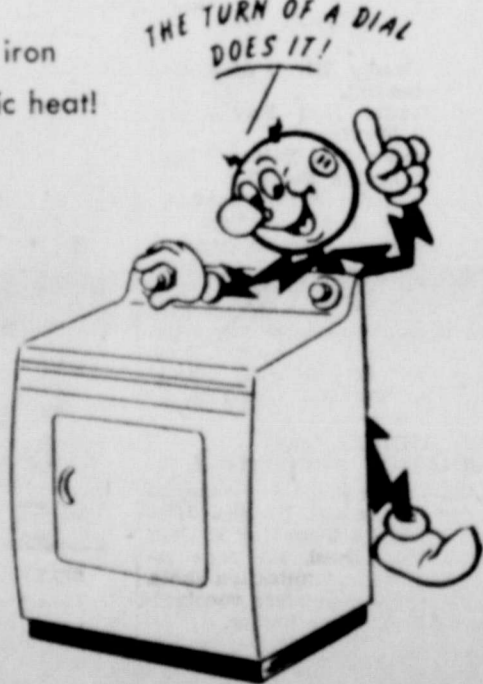

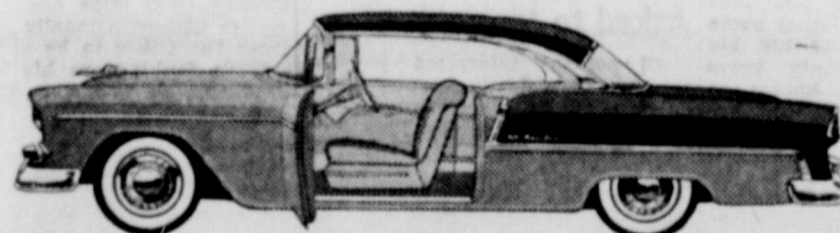

A pall of sadness fell over this and surrounding communities last Wednesday morning when the sad information was spread that Mrs. J. J. Jones Sr. had passed away about 8.30 a. m., at her home about 2 1/2 miles east of Fairy, of a heart attack.

Mrs. Jones had remarked that she hadn't felt as well as usual the previous afternoon, but was up and about as usual and did the family ironing before retiring. Ola Noeva Jones was born Oct. 18, 1881 to Saxton and Sara Jones of Rusk, N. C. She was married to John J. Jones on Sept. 18, 1906, at Rusk, N. C. To this union five children were born, two dying in infancy.

She is survived by her husband, two sons and one daughter, as follows, J. J. Jones Jr. of Fairy, Harold Jones of Houston, and Katy Lee, Mrs. O. T. Wren of Brownwood. Also surviving are four grandchildren, two brothers, O. F. and D. W. Jones of Oglesby.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones came to Texas a few years after their marriage purchasing their farm in this community where they resided until 1920, when they moved to Hamilton. They lived in Hamilton until 1928, moving back to their farm here where they have since resided.

**Rabies Control Measure  
Currently in Force In  
Texas Is Ineffective**

Austin, March 17.—Rabies con-  
trol measures currently in force  
in Texas are ineffective, the State  
Department of Health said today.

The department said a study re-  
cently concluded by Bureau of La-  
boratory officials reveals "current  
control measures have proved in-  
effective in eliminating rabies  
from the state's dog populations."

"But," the department added,  
"morbidity statistics indicate those  
control have been effective in  
preventing human cases of the dis-  
ease. Only 29 human deaths have  
been recorded in the period be-  
tween 1944-1955."

Rabies abatement work in Tex-  
as should be in the hands of local  
authorities, the health agency  
pointed out.

"Although there has been con-  
siderable fluctuation in the num-  
ber of rabid dogs from year to  
year, the overall state level of in-  
fection has remained consistently  
high."

"Remedial measures have not  
been uniformly or consistently ap-  
plied. Under the stimulus of a  
sharp increase of animal rabies,  
most cities have enforced existing  
ordinances providing for compul-  
sory vaccination and the collection  
of stray animals. But with a de-  
cline in incidence, municipal or-  
dinances have frequently been on-  
ly perfunctorily enforced."

The effectiveness of a control  
program in a given city is limited  
"without county-wide coopera-  
tion," the department said.

Complicating factors in dog rab-  
ies control have been the mark-  
ed increase in rabies in wild ani-  
mals, particularly foxes and  
skunks.

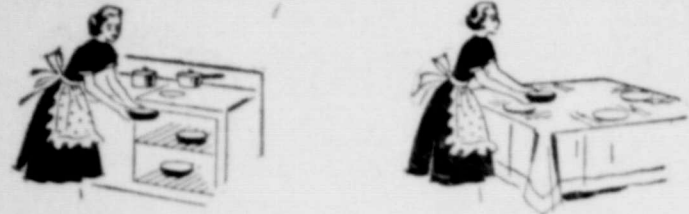

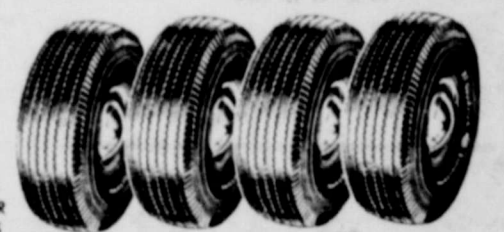

## Slaughter Cattle Steady to 50 Cents Off.

Fed steers and yearlings were weak to 50 cents lower and cows also sold around 25 to 50 cents lower at Fort Worth Monday. Yearlings and heifers sold mostly at the longer end of the decline. Fat cows were under more pressure than boning classes. Stocker trade gained strength with the greening pastures and both calves and older replacement cattle were selling actively at strong to 50 cents higher prices. Bulls sold steady.

## Dickens Club Steers Top Market at \$25.

The feature of the day's trade at Fort Worth Monday was the fed steers from Dickens County 4-H and FFA boys which topped at \$25. Commercially fattened cattle sold from \$23 down. Common, medium and fairly good butcher cattle sold from \$12 to \$20.

Fat cows sold for \$11 to \$12.50, with canners and cutters \$7 to \$11. Bulls sold from \$10 to \$13.50. Stocker calves of the better kinds sold at \$20 to \$22, and steer yearlings mostly \$21 down. Fat calves scored \$17 to \$21 in a fully steady trade.

## Sheep and Lambs Open Week Steady.

One of the largest runs since early last Summer was at hand Monday in the sheep barns at Fort Worth and prices held steady. Top milk fat lambs topped at \$23.50 and old crop shorn fat lambs sold from \$20.50 down. Woolled fat lambs topped at \$21, and feeders cashed at \$16 to \$20. Slaughter ewes sold for \$6 to \$9, and old bucks sold from \$5 to \$6. Slaughter yearlings were quotable from \$12 to \$17, and old wethers at \$10 to \$14.

## Wool Growers Can Borrow On Payments.

USDA announced last week that wool growers could assign their incentive payments to financing and marketing agencies, and thus get funds for current operations pending government payment. It requires that growers make only one assignment, and that a record of it must be filed with the growers county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

## Hogs Open Steady To 25 Cents Lower.

Butcher hogs topped at \$16.25 Monday at Fort Worth, steady to 25 cents lower than last week's closing prices. Sows were steady at \$13 to \$14.50. Less desirable weights and grades of hogs cashed at \$14 to \$16.

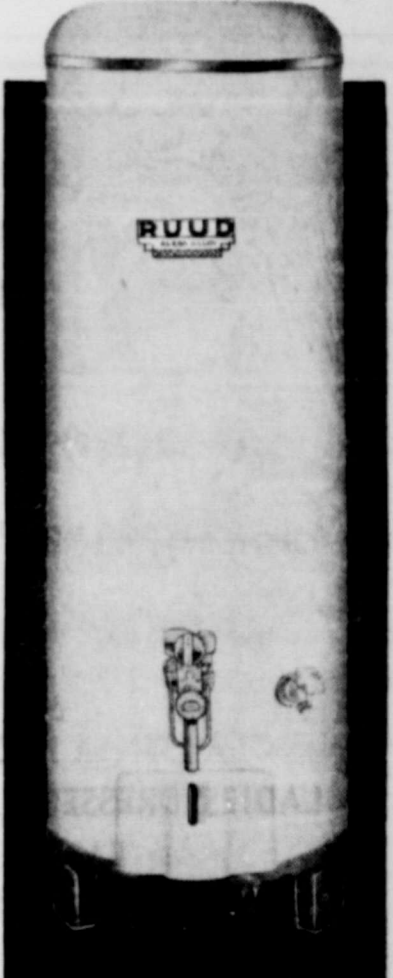

**It Happened Here or Near**

Spring must be right around the corner—a very near corner. How do I know? By the signs, that's how. What signs? I'll tell you right here and now.

The first sign is inner. It comes to me every year as soon as spring is in the offing. It is Spring Fever: spelled with a capital. I want to yawn all the time. My hands want to lie idle in my lap. My feet rebel at movement and insist on just keeping still. I don't eat even with very much relish. It is a sure sign.

The second sign is what I saw in front of a store last Saturday: a pretty girl, really pretty. She stood just out front of a store where she had blown her nickel for a piece of her favorite confection and was eating it with utmost relish. She was a farm girl and there was the look of spring about her. Her pretty dress was evidently made by a doting mother just so she could match the colors of spring. I was so absorbed in watching her that I almost ran over Stanley Giesecke, and but for his big friendly arms encircling me at the opportune moment we certainly would have collided. The girl? Oh, she was four, five, possibly six, one of nature's choicest creations. Girls of that age have not yet learned to put on false airs, and their minds are clean and friendly. They are really charming in a high degree.

The third never-failing sign also showed up last Saturday. It was three big flocks of cranes moving toward the north in the thermal they rode high above the earth. You know what thermals are: those updrafts of warm air rising in spirals, on which cranes and kites and other birds, mostly

waders, ride in the spring toward their nesting areas in the far north, and ride again as they move southward toward their winter quarters in the fall of the year. The air holds them up and they have to use their wings only a little to maintain their elevation, and the lateral movement of the thermal bears them at the rate of perhaps ten miles an hour. These cranes of last Saturday were doing a lot of talking as they passed over, probably discussing Texas politics and not too well pleased about the GI land scandal.

A fourth sign, and it never fails either, is Grampa and Gramma and Uncle Pud and Aunt Greenie and numerous others of the five generations of toads 'hat live in the twenty-foot drain the last unclesides two sides of our patio. These toads go into hibernation in October and do not wake up until the mercury gets steady around seventy degrees in the first or second quarter of the year. Now they are coming out each night and so heralding 1955's spring.

Last Sunday's Star-Telegram is another sign, with its nursery aids and offers of flower seeds and gardening implements and ads of Do-It-Yourself tools of all sorts. And then the seed catalogues have been arriving for days. So spring must be here.

Finally, there's the calendar. It says that spring will arrive next Monday, rain or shine, hot or cold. And the calendar ought to know. So get your winter undies laundered and folded and stored, and hunt up your work gloves, and grease the wheelbarrow and file the hoe and whet up your resolution. Now go into the living room and stretch out on the lounge and give way to a good long nap and let the world slide. And if the wife wants flowers and vegetables, let her do it. Better not say it.

Postscript And this is important: if a cold snap shows up and the mercury slides down toward the vanishing point, I'm just going to console myself by saying that I've always been told that all signs fail in Texas anyhow.
