#### Speaker Gives **Details On Greens** Creek Project

> Mr. Porter's subject centered around the Greens Creek Watershed Protection program, and he showed diagrams and illustrations on the project and gave statistics on the effectiveness of such a program. He also informed the group that a district had been set up on the Bosque Watershed similar to the Greens Creek project, and that it took in an area from Stephenville to Iredell. The immediate area around Hico will be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, as the government requires a local organization to sponsor a program of this kind.

> In his talk, Mr. Porter pointed out that by building such dams to hold the run-off from heavy rains, much property, farm land, high ways, bridges, fences, etc., were prevented from being destroyed by flood waters. He stated that a survey was now in progress to determine the actual damage caused by the recent flood on the Bosque, and also pointed out that the Greens Creek program probably saved Hico from a worse disaster than was experienced in 1952.



If aldrin is used, about 2 to 3 ounces per 100 pounds of bran is good but this might have to be increased to 3 to 4 ounces. Chlordane is also good insecticide to use as a bait and it should be used at the rate of one-half pound per 100 pounds of bran. This too might need to be stepped up to a pound. In using any of these materials one should hold in mind that they are poisons and that they should not come in contact with the skin any more than possible. It is a good idea to always wash hands well after handling these.







## MANAGEMENT TIPS

Good poultry a anagement is vital to successful egg production. Here are some heipful tips that pay off:

> HOUS) NG AND EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS (per 100 hens or pullets)

- 1. Floor space-300 to 400 square feet.
- 2. Nests-20.
- 3. Roosting spare-about 60 feet.
- 4. Water-8 gallons

5. Hopper space-32 to 36 feet.

SANITATION: Scrub waterers often. Wash hoppers weekly. Prevent damp, dirty floors. Disinfect houses and equipment

PARASITES: Watch for lice, mites and worms; apply control measures premptly.

EGG QUALITY: Keep nests well littered and clean. Remove the eggs at least 2 or 3 times daily. (More often is desirable in hot weather.) Cool before packing. (Wire baskets are recommended). Pack eggs in clean cases. Store in cool room. Keep broody hens out of nests. Sell eggs at least once each week.


