



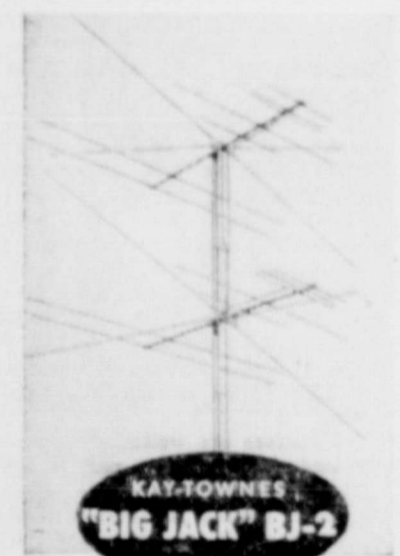

Just back from visiting with my daughter's family—and playing Grandpop to two of the cutest kids you ever saw. While there I picked up a couple of new ideas on child raising:

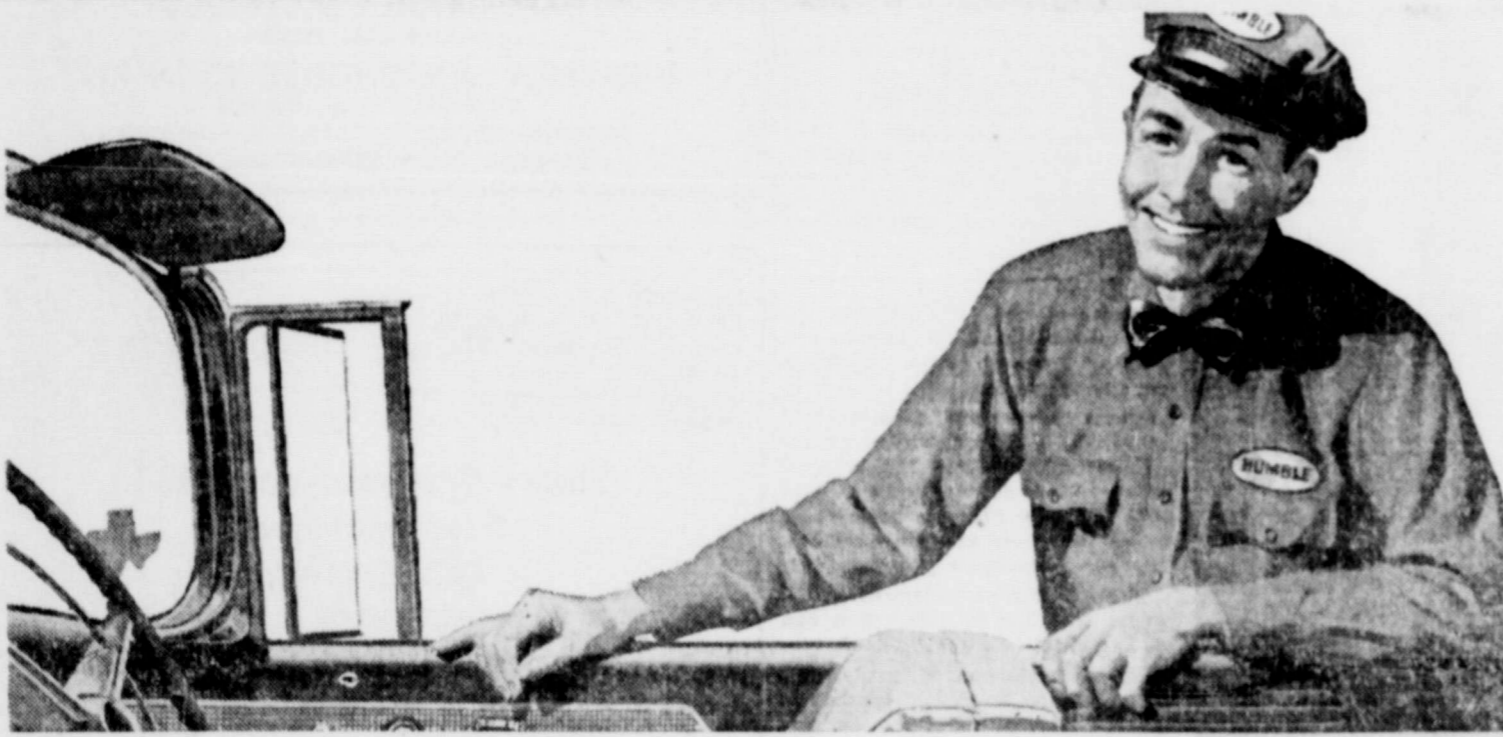
If your child's learning to use a pen, provide an old fountain pen—filled with bluing. Looks and writes like ink, but won't stain clothes or furniture.

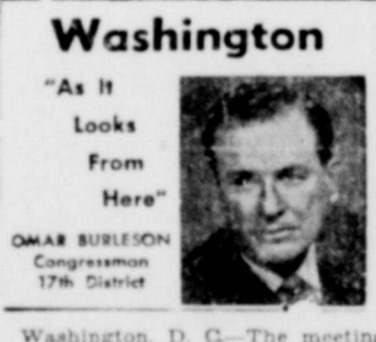

Creek, was sick in bed one late fall night when two high-jackers walked into the room where sick man lay and demanded money. They did not get any money, but they abused Mr. Malone and his wife considerably. The men were later arrested at Waco and held in jail there for Hamilton County authorities. Uncle Dave Barrow was the deputy sheriff at Old Hico and he trekked down to Waco in his wagon and got the prisoners and brought them back, three days and two nights, camping out at night, were consumed on the return journey. Uncle Dave was ill with a cold at the time and when he got home he had pneumonia. He deputized eight men of the community to guard the prisoners over night. The men were put in a cabin and the guard stood outside. Then things happened. Men appeared with six-guns and shot the prisoners to shreds, the story says. It is presumed that the culprits were going under assumed names, for the gave the names Barker and Parker. The remains of the outlaws were buried in an unmarked grave in the Old Hico Cemetery.

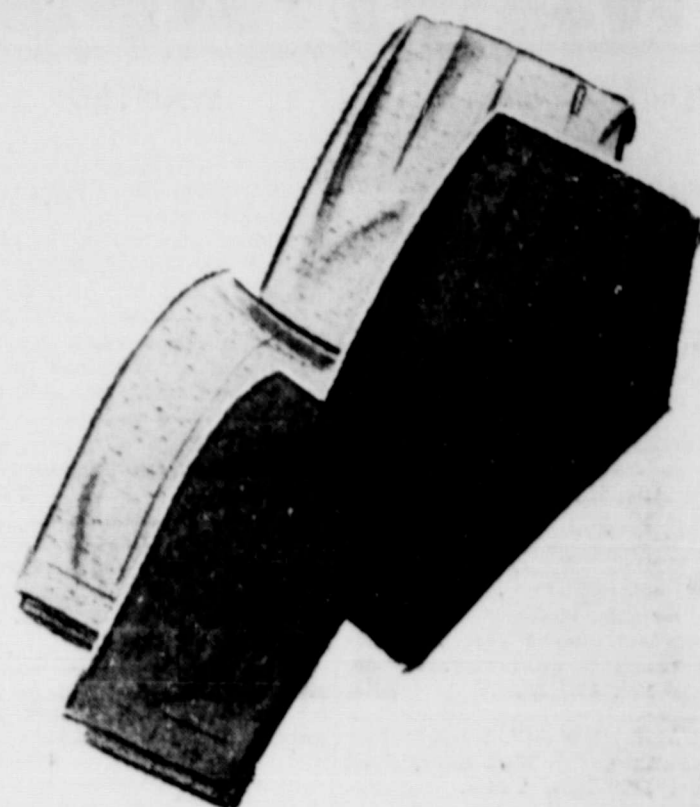
