9. You start going on benders. Now begins the acute stage of your "compulsive drinking." You are, in fact, a true alcoholic. This step usually comes one to three years after you begin drinking in the morning. A bender is a period (usually several days) during which you drink blindly, helplessly with just one goal: to get drunk During this period you utterly disregard family, friends, job, even food and shelter. You feel no sense of responsibility; to get more liquor you wi'l lie, pawn your best possession-even steal.

Going on benders is called "compulsive" because you seem compelled to drink, and keep drinking, by something beyond your control. Perhaps you sense all this. If so, you try to stop your drinking or change its pattern. In the first case you "go on the water wagon." (This works if you stay on for life, but usually you set it for a given period-a week, a month, six months-and then fall back into your former rut). In the

In both cases you tell yourself the planned periods of sobriety will give you a chance to recuperate-make a fresh start. But in neither case do you really intend to stop drinking. If you only knew it, your framework of alibis and self-deception has grown until fan-

Working against it is the deep-seated conviction that your drinking is blameless-that you have good reasons for it, but that nobody tries to understand them. 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
