

#### PAID IN FULL

John owed Fred \$200 which he had borrowed several years back. John had been having a hard time and owed many bills. Because of his situation he thought Fred might accept less than \$200 as full payment. He sent Fred a check for \$125 marked "In full for balance due o nloan" on the face of the check. Fred cashed the check and started action to recover the other \$75. Can he collect?

Yes, he can, as a promise or agreement is unenforceable unless supported by consideration or by giving of value by the other party. John did not give Fred anything he was not obligated to give and hence there was nothing to bind any agreement to accept the \$125 as payment in full.




