But there is no indication the high court will rush to consider the Big Spring test case ahead of its normal schedule.

District court there ruled invalid that part of Texas law which requires public schools to be segregated. Appeal is being made by the Texas Citizens Council in an effort to prevent payment of state money to non-segregated schools. Both sides had expressed hope for an early decision before the Supreme Court's October term.

Meanwhile, towns such as Waco and Laredo, which had planned to begin desegregation this fall, backed off rather than take a "legal risk." Others, like San An-Hico, Texas tonio, decided to go ahead, but reserved the right to review the policy in the light of new state level decisions.

- Place lamp 15 inches to left of work center and 12 inches from front of desk.
- Cover desk with a large pastel blotter to absorb indirect glare - and place desk against a light-colored wall to reflect more light on the work.

Many shrubs and trees are dying at this time of year as a result of cotton root rot. Where this sociation meeting and a unique occurs, it is not wise to replant the same kind of shrub or tree. Select varieties resistant to disease.

Trees resistant to root rot include: liveoak, hackberry, sycamore, bois d'arc, hickory, mesquite, cedar elm, holly, wild black cherry, wild plum, and palms. Recent tests indicate that the silk tree or mimosa tree is also resistant, although observations on this are not yet complete. Shrubs and hedge plants that survive in root-rot areas are: pomegranate, Pfitzer juniper, yaupon, Douglas pyramidal arborviate, coral berry, and snowberry, elematis, agarita, Texas Mahonia or blue agarita shrubby blue sage

About one-third of all acciden tal deaths and almost one-half of the non-fatal infuries reported in the U. S. occurred in the home, a recent study shows. Most of the burns, scalds and explosions, well as many of the falls, took place in the kitchen. These precautions will make your kitchen a safe place:

1. Locate light switches near room entrances to prevent falls. 2. Invest in a firm foot stool. Never use chairs or furniture as a ladder.

3. Keep equipment in good repair-use it correctly.

4. Never use electrical appliances while standing on a wet floor or handle electrical connections or appliances with wet hands.

5. Prevent burns by having a firm table top on which to set hot pans. Handle hot water carefully. Keep matches out of reach of children. Keep pot holders near the stove as well as salt and soda to extinguish grease flames. Keep medications for burns handy.

6. Turn handles of cooking utensils away from the edge of the

7. Mop up spilled food or water. Pick up toys, skates or other items on the floor.

8. Use moist cotton to pick up particles of broken glass. Treat cuts quickly.

9. Use kitchen knives that have a sharp edge. They are safer than dull ones.

10. Keep a well equipped firstaid kit handy at all times. Learn to use it effectively through courses in first-aid and home nursing.

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS

4 large green peppers

4 or 5 green onions 21/2 cups cooked lima beans

1% cups cooked ground ham

1/4 cup dry bread crumbs

% cup canned tomatoes 1 teaspoon prepared mustard


