The test, which was started three weeks ago, and which reached a depth of 2700 feet, was developed through the "sand-fracturing" method, and was treated with approximately 480 barrels of oil and 5 tons of chemical sand. A quantity of acid was also used to separate the mud from the sand. Mr. Schlueter pointed out that equipment valued at more than half a million dollars was used on the finishing touches of the well.

Actual outcome as to whether the gas will be in sufficient quantities to produce, awaits tests by the Railroad Commission, which will be made shortly. Gauges on the "Christmas Tree" at the wellhead showed 740 pounds of pressure Thursday morning.
