Basketball Girls Lose First Game at Tolar This Week

The Hico girls lost their games at Tolar this week. The grade school lost 22-14, and the inexperienced high school team was no match for the powerful Tolar team and came out on the short end of a 59-34 count. Hico used 13 players and all of them played well, giving rise to the hope that they may develop into a fairly good team by the time district play starts in January. Jerre Dunklin led the Hico scorers with 14 points. Bonnie Johnson and Jerre Dunklin are captains of the team this season.

If district play-offs are necessary they will be held the next week after the tournament. District winners for boys must be determined by Feb. 18. Girls champions must be determined by Feb. 25.

Tigers Try Meridian Tonight In Final Game of Season

Game Time Set For 7:30 at Yellowjacket Stadium There

The Hico Tigers hit the road again tonight, Friday, for their 10th and final game of the 1955 season this time journeying to Meridian where they tackle the Yellowjackets of that fair city in a crucial district game.

A win for the locals would give them an overall 7-3 record, and a 3-1 conference mark. They have dropped one district affair thus far, a 29-7 loss to Valley Mills, and have won from Cranfills Gap and Oglesby.

On the other hand, Meridian has a perfect district slate, but have the game with Hico and a game with Valley Mills remaining. Should Hico win tonight, it would more than likely give the locals undisputed claim to second place in the conference race, as Valley Mills will be a top-heavy favorite to beat Meridian and win the crown.

A good game is in store for the

many fans who will go to Meridian tonight, as both teams appear to be evenly matched. Game time will be 7:30 o'clock.

TIGERS DEFEAT OGLESBY.

Last week the Tigers invaded Oglesby and walked away with an 18-6 victory. The locals spotted the Oglesby group a 6-point lead in the first quarter and then came storming back to tie the game in the second period, and score twice more in the third stanza to notch the victory.

Oglesby hopped into an early first period lead when Sewell Terry teamed with Hollis Barton on a pass and run play which netted 71 yards and the counter.

After the following kick-off, big Sherrell Kirk started the ball to rolling for the locals with a 28-yard gallop to the 38. Jerry Needham contributed 13 yards more to Oglesby's 49. From there it took the Tigers 14 plays to cover the remaining 49 yards with Kirk lunging through for the counter from the one. Try for point was no good and the game was tied 6-6.

Not to be denied, the Oglesby team took the kick-off and marched to the Tiger 22 before time ran out ending the first half.

In the third period Hico recovered an Oglesby fumble on their own 43 to set the stage for their second TD. With Needham and Carey McKenzie alternating at carrying the ball the Tigers worked to the 12, from where McKenzie plowed his way to the one-foot line, and then carried over the goal on the next play to up the score to 12-6.

The Tigers' third and final touchdown was made on the game's most outstanding play. Oglesby kicked and Hico put the ball in play on their own 13, and on the first play from scrimmage, Sherrell Kirk broke around right end and raced 87 yards for the score.

For all practical purposes Kirk's fine run ended the ball game, as no scoring took place in the final period.

The Tigers' stout defensive play, coupled with a good running game, was the deciding factor in the game. The linemen and backs all played well, with some good, heads-up football.

In the game with Meridian tonight, fans could possibly see the best game of the year, as both teams will be putting out everything they have to win. A good strong crowd from Hico supporting the Tigers would help them on to victory in this final game of the year.

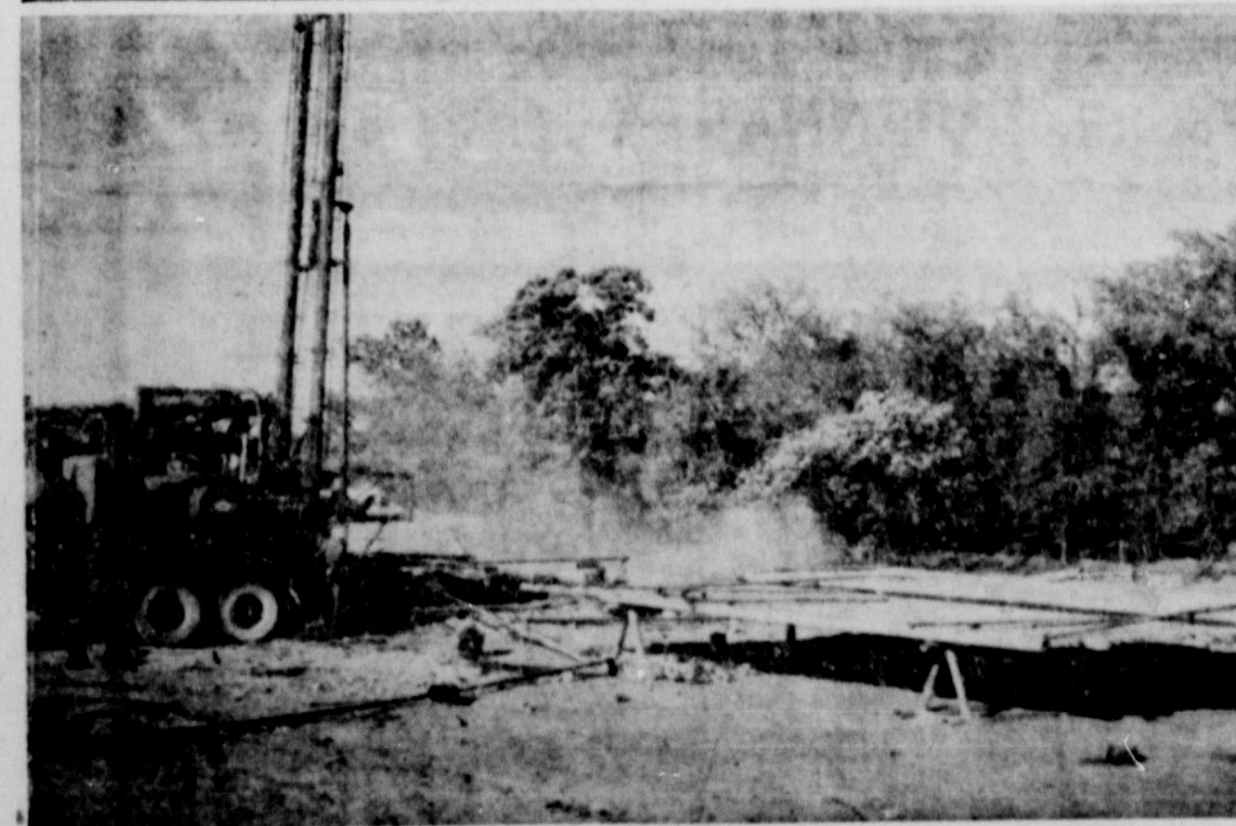

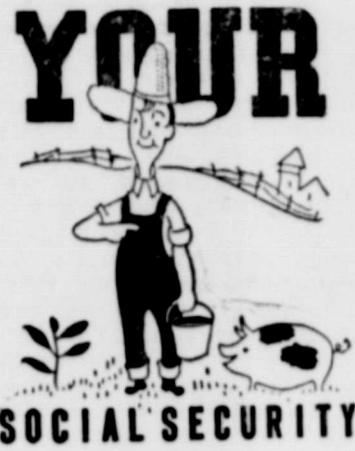
Newspapers Being Used to Push 'Car For Life' Contest

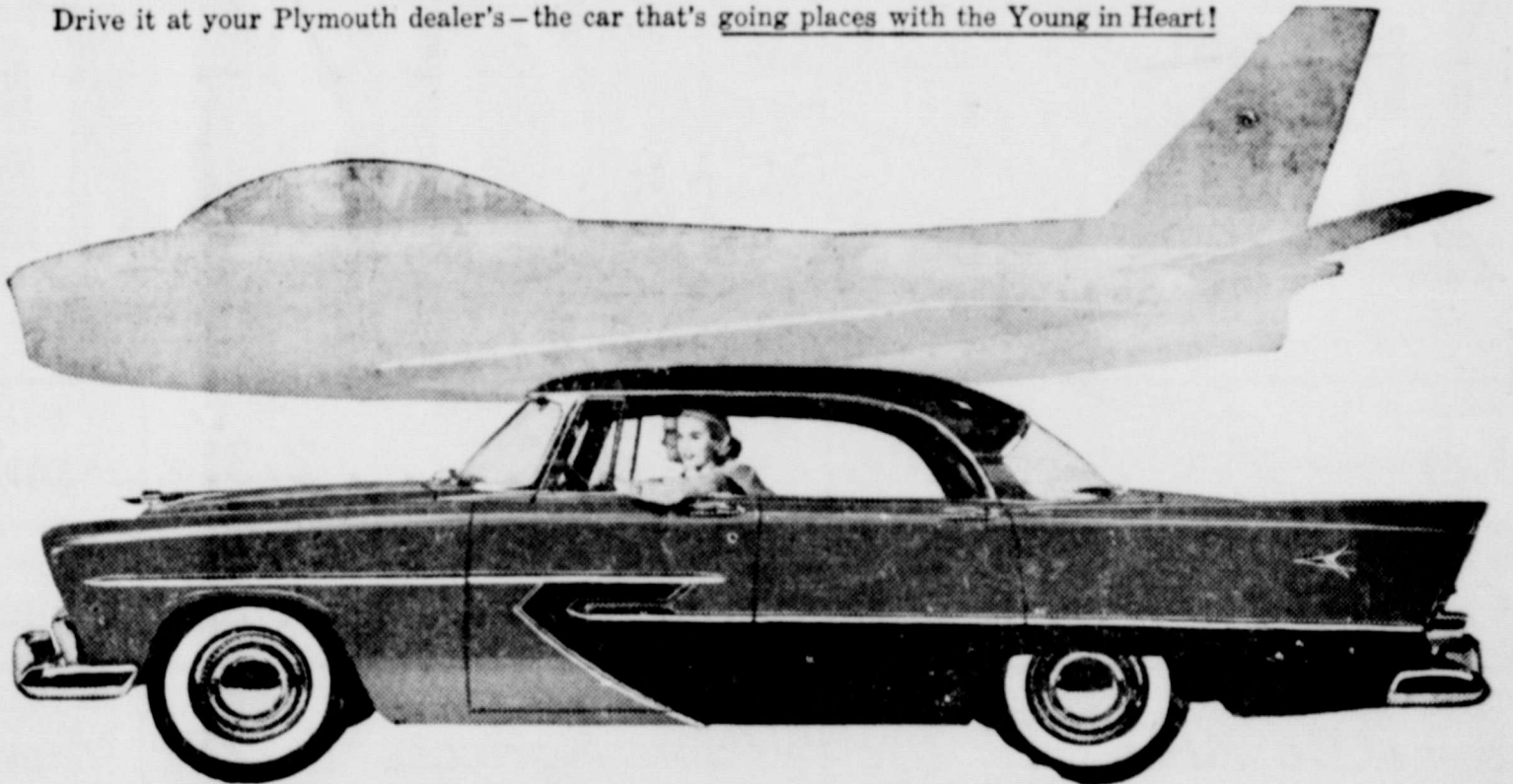

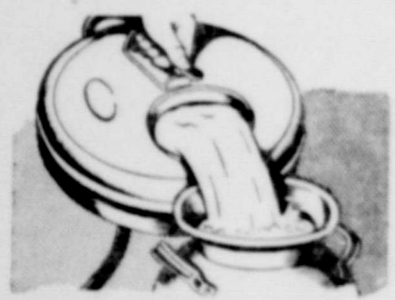

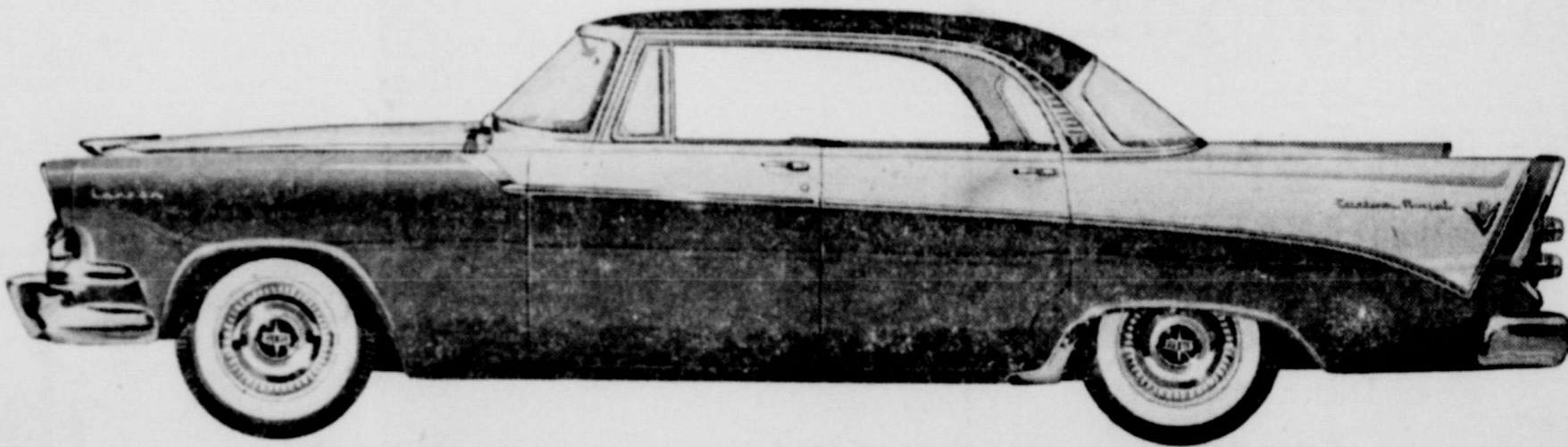

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK



The Monday morning line on salable receipts of livestock around the major market circle this week showed about 21,000 fewer cattle and calves, about 10,000 fewer hogs and 9,000 fewer sheep and lambs.

Since this followed a definite tapering off of receipts in the closing days of last week, it clearly indicated that the farmers had taken a hand in righting the upset caused by near record amounts of meat being marketed this season.

There was an uneven sort of stability in the cattle and calf trade reported at most points. At Fort Worth salesmen tried hard to recover some last week's losses but did little better than get steady prices on most kinds.

Comparative prices showed: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$17-20-21.50; common and medium grades \$10-16.50. Fat Cows \$9-11; canners and cutters \$6-9.50; bulls \$9-12.50, odd head \$13; good and choice slaughter calves \$15-16.50, few fancy heavies \$17-17.50, and above; common and medium \$11-14.50; culs \$8-10. Stocker steer calves \$19.50 down; steer yearlings \$18 down; replacement cows \$8-12.

October 15 Prices Far Below Effective Parity.

The USDA reported Monday that effective average farm prices on October 15 were far below effective parity. Here's how they were reported:

Incentive Payments to Be Very Important. Current low offers for wool, which reflect the world-wide decline of around 25 to 30 per cent in fine wools and 15 to 20 per cent on crossbred wools (USDA Wool Situation Oct. 20, 1955), make the certificates the sheepmen needs to present to his local ASC office for payment doubly important.

To save time and trouble the producer should get certification at the time he sells. At a recent meeting at Fort Worth approved forms for use in establishing the claims of the seller to get these incentive payments were worked out and are in use at Fort Worth. Unless the information needed is shown the producer might be unable to qualify for his incentive payment.

Hogs Sell Better As Marketing Lighter.

Butcher hogs opened 50 cents higher at Fort Worth as receipts here and in the Cornbelt were lighter Monday. The advance was not maintained all the way, some late sales being steady to 25 cents lower, and top hogs sold from \$14.50 to \$15.25, late sales \$14.75 down. Sows were steady at \$13.70 down.

Both of these classes were selling 50 to 75 cents above the low time last week when hogs reached the lowest point since 1942 at the market.

Lambs Under Pressure: Ewes Sell Higher.

Fat lambs topped at \$17.50 in

the wool and \$17 for shorn lambs at Fort Worth Monday. This represented a 50c lower market than last week's close. Prices were around \$1 to \$1.50 under prices a week or so earlier, despite continued small receipts here and all around the market loop. Old ewes sold better, most ewes at \$5 to \$6, some fresh shorn cull ewes down to \$4. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12. Yearling muttons sold from \$10 to \$15.

It Happened Here or Near

Some old-timer is reputed to have said, "Biography is the most instructive reading in all the realm of literature." I am inclined to agree. Biography reveals principles and impulses revealing character, and is far more instructive than any textbook of a savant, however wise he may be. This is a bit of a biography of a most excellent man, a true soul, a gentleman by any standard, a Christian whose every movement manifested the genuineness of his profession: Jesse Herman Baldrige, Methodist minister and our former beloved fellow citizen.

Our worthy citizen, H. H. Ramage, told me this story of Brother Baldrige. He said forty-seven years ago, one day in the late autumn, just after the Annual North Texas Conference met, he was in Uncle Jesse Ramage's home, in the Duffau community,

and he saw a man drive up in front of the home in a buggy to which was hitched a bay horse. The young man got out and tied his horse to the fence and came in through the front gate and up on the porch and knocked, and as the door was opened he said, "I am Jesse Baldrige, and the Conference has sent me to be the pastor of the Duffau Methodist Church. I was told to come to your home and you would get me started off right. And I want to get started right, for this is my first charge and I want to make a success." He was invited in and engaged board with Mr. Ramage and his sister, Lee, an old bachelor and a maiden lady.

Now Mr. Ramage and his sister Lee did get him started off right. They not only gave him sound advice about the membership of the circuit, but they introduced him to a young lady named Lena Mc-

Clure, a cousin of Mr. H. H. Ramage. Miss Lena later became Mrs. Baldrige, now a wonderfully preserved woman of outstanding appearance. She still abides to bless the world.

That first circuit was no sinecure. It was wide-spread, consisting of Duffau, Clairette and Alexander. There he remained for two years and then was moved on to a larger charge. He was on the way up and continued that way and held some excellent pastorates in Texas. Among them we pick out there: Ennis, Riverside, Fort Worth, Central, Brownwood, Mexia, and Meadowbrook, Fort Worth.

In his mature years, he became a District Superintendent of the Gatesville District, which includes the Hico Church. The fact that he held such positions in his communion is proof of the worthiness of his character, for Methodists are not in the habit of promoting their ministers through political maneuverings, but by reason of
