It Happened Here or Near

Last Sunday's Star-Telegram editorial page has some good things on it that I hope you did not miss. But least you did overlook them some of the matters discussed there are repeated here.

First, there is Edgar Guest's poem, a daily feature of the editorial page, and always in keeping with the season. Last Sunday's poem was entitled, "New Year Resolutions." We quote it verbatim:

"To save a little money,
To praise a little more;
To smile when days are sunny
And when the tempests pour;
To pay less heed to sinning
And more to kindly thought;
To see beyond the winning
Just how the fight was fought;
To be a little kinder,
A little braver, too;
To be a little blinder
To trivial things men do;
To give my hand to labor,
Nor whimper that I must;
To be a better neighbor
And worthier of a trust.
To play the man, whatever
The prize that is at stake;
God grant that I shall never
These New Year pledges break.

Now you just can't beat that for a good resolution as you enter a New Year. There are a lot of things about Edgar Guest that I like. For one thing, he is forever telling something about his grandchildren. That strikes a responsive chord in every Grandpa's heart. No one ever knows what the word "grand" means until he or she becomes a grandparent. Edgar Guest has "Grandpaitis" just like I have. The Star-Telegram has featured Guest's poems a long time, and that is one good reason I have been reading it so many years.

Then on that same page last Sunday appeared Gaston Foote's weekly column, entitled, "Footnotes." Mr. Foote is the pastor of the First Methodist Church, Fort Worth. Once in a while I hear his sermons on Sunday over radio. I am not much of a radio-sermon fan. One sort of radio preacher I abominate; that's the shouting, rapid-speaking, fanatical sort who knows everything, and believes everybody that disagrees with his declarations is on the way to the bottomless pit. When you listen to

Gaston Foote you get a sane, appealing, common-sense discourse that uplifts you. But to his last Sunday's column:

"As I look over my past life I find that I have been plagued by all kinds of tyrants which have at times, made my life thoroughly miserable. I am here and now resolving to slay the tyrants which have sought to enslave me. Here are some of them:

"1. WORRY. I've found that worry is a bootlegger of trouble, the illegitimate child of ambition and a serpent that will ruin any Eden on earth. Worry compels me to cross bridges that were never built and fight battles with phantom antagonists that were never born. I've probably spent a solid year in my lifetime worrying, but never did help me write an editorial, preach a sermon, avoid a cold, or wash the dinner dishes. Henceforth, I'm going to do the best I can during the day and turn the night watch over to God. He's more experienced in keeping the world revolving on its axis than I am.

"2. SELF-PITY. I've had my share of heartaches and disappointments. Mine has, by no means, been a sheltered life. Quite often I've indulged in a little self-pity and sympathy from my friends. But I'm through. I'm going to laugh over my bumps and bruises and spend my time helping other people rather than crying on my own shoulder. Instead of being sorry for myself I'm going to be ashamed of myself and thank God for my blessings.

"3. THEY. Did you ever think about the terrible tyrant 'they' is? 'Why don't they do something about it?' 'What will they think if I act the way I feel?' 'Why don't they let me alone?'

"If a thing needs to be done I'm going to be among the first to roll up my sleeves and begin regardless of what 'they' do. I'm going to act natural if it kills me no matter what 'they' think. I'm tired of being pushed around by 'they'.

"4. PREJUDICE. Prejudice is a terrible tyrant for most of us. Religious prejudice keeps people fighting each other rather than evil. Political prejudice sacrifices

Pork, beef and grapefruit top the list of plentiful foods for January. Shoppers will find a wide variety of kinds and cuts of pork and beef to suit the taste and family budget. Fresh and cured pork will continue to be a good buy and all kinds of beef will be plentiful especially the higher grades. Grapefruit is important in the daily diet for it is rich in Vitamin C, a vitamin that everyone needs each day. Shoppers are also reminded that tangerines are a good buy as are winter pears, oranges, potatoes, pinto beans and peanuts. Eggs are on the plentiful list for the first time in several months and are an excellent source of several needed food elements. If more calcium is needed in the diet, milk and other dairy products should be considered. Rounding out the January 1956 list are canned tuna and the vegetable fats and oils. Food prices will stay high in 1956. This means that homemakers will have to buy wisely and plan carefully to keep within the family food budget.

For amateurs, winter time, when plants are dormant, is the safest time for transplanting. Plants that drop their leaves are dormant after leaf fall. Others usually are dormant immediately after the first two freezes. After that, plants may be moved anytime before spring growth starts. Prepare for the job ahead of time so plants will be out of the soil for as short a period as possible. If the ground freezes, do not attempt moving plants until it is thawed. Make the holes large enough so that roots need not be crowded or twisted. Good drainage is important. If water will stand in the hole for several hours, additional drainage is needed. Try breaking through the hard pan below, drain off to the side or make the hole deeper and fill partially with loose rubble and stone. Never plant a shrub or tree deeper than it grew in the nursery or woods. Place carefully, firm top soil about the roots or ball. Avoid air spaces by pouring water into the partially filled hole. Prune tops of deciduous plants at planting time to

compensate for root loss. Apply heavy mulch around the plants to guard against freezing, and keep soil moist during the winter.

Both outdoor and indoor home gardeners and those who like flowers in the home will find information on the subject in three recently released Extension publications. "Foliage Plants in the Home" describes the place of indoor plants in the modern home. Suggestions on plant selection, care and watering are major topics discussed.

"Flower Arranging is Easy," is the second one and it covers such items as equipment needed by the flower arranger; making cut flowers last longer; basic rules for arranging and design terms for flower arrangements. "Propagation of Ornamental Plants" covers the methods and how of propagating ornamental plants. The publications may be obtained here in the Extension Office.

 - Fat for frying
- Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Add eggs beaten with milk. Stir in ham and shortening. Drop by spoonfuls into deep hot fat (365 F.) which is hot enough to brown a cube of bread in 60 seconds. Fry until brown and serve with processed cheese melted together with milk.
