Buddy Teague, Hico FFA boy, won the \$2,000 Ed Odem scholarship award to Texas A. & M. College at the annual Sears, Roebuck Foundation Calf Scramble banquet Friday night in Houston.

The scholarship is awarded some farm youth every year for the best essay, best interview and grades in school.

Buddy, 17-year-old son of Mr.

and Mrs. I. J. Teague, was caught unaware as he was called to the stand by Herbert G. Turner, chairman of the Fat Stock Show's calf scramble committee, to receive the message. He was then told that he had been named winner.

"I sure appreciate it—and thank you," he managed to say.

Buddy, who has long planned to

attend Texas A. & M. will major in agricultural engineering.

About 450 persons attended the affair in the Rice Hotel, including Buddy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. I. J. Teague, to watch scores of boys receive awards ranging from \$5 to \$100 for their work with livestock and in 4-H and FFA clubs.

Buddy's 1,060 pound heifer, Proud Frances, placed third in the calf scramble competition with 33 Herefords, and fourth in the junior breeders show. He won the heifer at Houston last year in the calf scramble.

Geoffrey Holladay won a red ribbon with his Holstein heifer, rated good plus at the Houston show.

The FFA Livestock Judging Team, composed of Charles Stipe, John Ryan and Wayne Warren, tied for first place judging Herefords, with a perfect score. Sixteen teams tied and a drawing was held to see which would receive the Hereford Association Trophy, and Hico failed to win.

The Dairy Judging Team, composed of Geoffrey Holladay, Gerald Huckabee and Joe Coffman, did a good job on the dairy cattle but failed to win any awards.

In this year's calf scramble Roland Sherrard, an alternate in the contest Saturday night, failed to catch a calf although making a real effort. On Sunday evening, John Ryan caught one of the Angus calves, haltered it and led it across the finish line. He will receive a purchase certificate for \$125.00 with which to purchase a calf to enter in the 1957 Houston Fat Stock Show.

It Happened Here or Near

We are indebted to Mr. E. A. Willis for a clipping concerning the death and funeral of Mrs. Madona Holmes, daughter of an old-time Indian fighter of this area.

She died at Nocona, Montague County. She was born at Comanche in 1857, and was married to the Rev. Thomas J. Holmes at Hico in 1874, and then moved to Montague County in 1882. Her father, named Tom Deaton, was the second sheriff of Hamilton County and was well known for his courage in dealing with the Indians that frequently invaded this area and took prisoners and stole horses and cattle and burned homes of the people and killed great numbers of the men of that day. Mrs. Holmes' brother, named Frank Deaton, is reputed to have helped rescue Cynthia Ann Park-

er from the Indians. Thus do the old-timers pass from the scene. They are getting pretty hard to find now.

Texas has come a long way during these years since 1900. Once in a while we elders get to dreaming of the past and wondering how we managed to get along way back there before the turn of the century. The one thing that saved us was that what we had then was all that we knew and we managed to get through some how and were happy in spite of what now may look like impossible handicaps.

There is the matter of bacon. Our modern bacon is not of great age. 1901 when I first left home for school I used to pass a wholesale grocery house between my

Hico Elementary School Places In Fairy Tournament

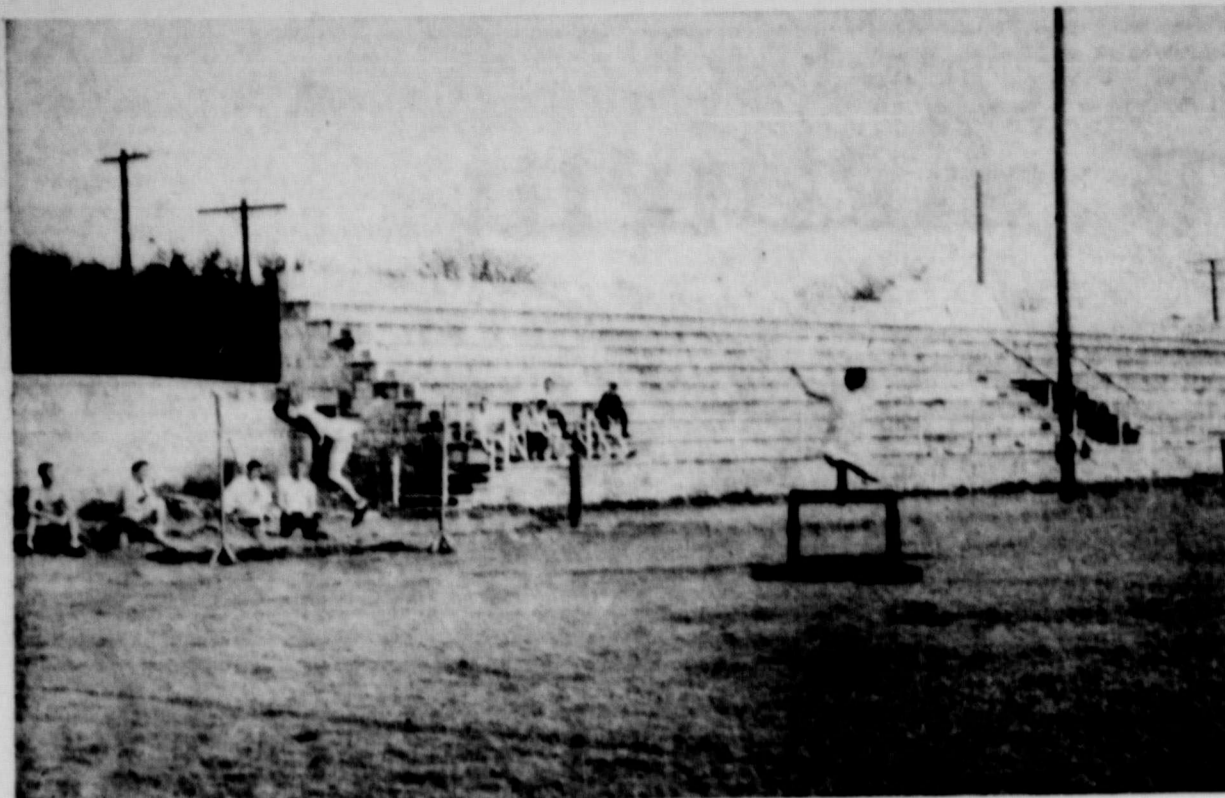
The Fairy Grammar School held an Invitational Basketball Tournament the week of Feb. 29-Mar. 2 with the following schools represented by both boys and girls teams.

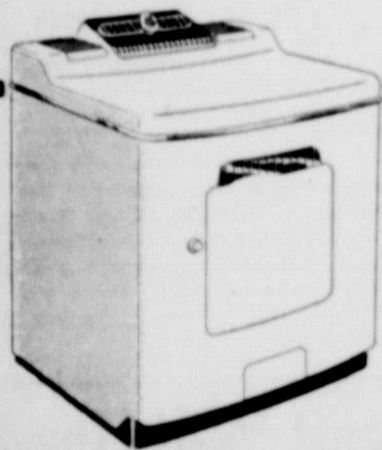

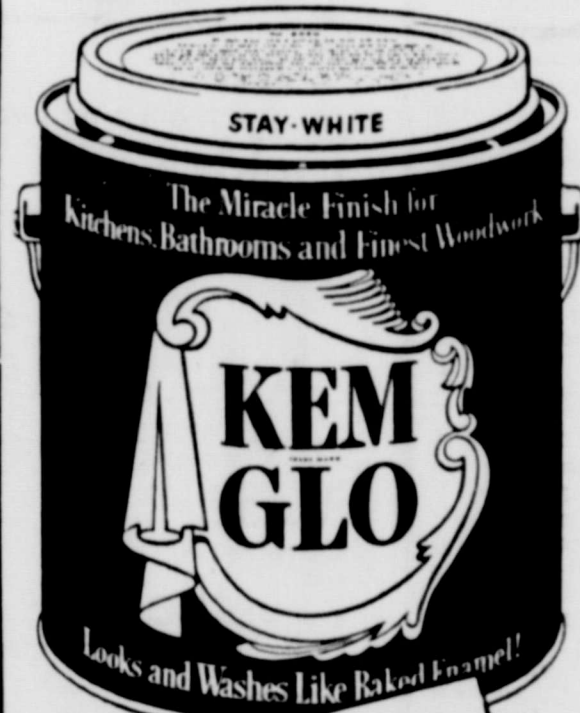

Eielson AFB, Alaska.

Dear Editor: We are getting the paper about every 3 weeks or whenever a boat leaves Seattle. It's still news to us though, whenever we do get them, usually two or three papers at a time.

We are enjoying our stay here very much. It isn't such a bad place after all. We thought it would be the end of the world, but it's a very thriving country. We are about 130 miles from the Arctic Circle, which we hope to see next summer. It isn't far to Mount McKinley, the highest point in North America. We plan to go down there too, although we can see the mountain from here on a clear day.

It has been pretty cold here this winter. The lowest went to 58 degrees below zero. Believe me, it's cold then. The ice fog is so bad when it gets so cold, usually starts getting bad at 25 degrees below, and as it gets colder the ice fog gets worse. You can't see over five feet when it gets so bad. There has been over six feet of snow that has fallen here, but has settled down to about 30 inches. The snow isn't like the snow back there. It won't stick together, and you can't make a snow man out of it. It's more like walking in sand than snow, slides from under your feet.

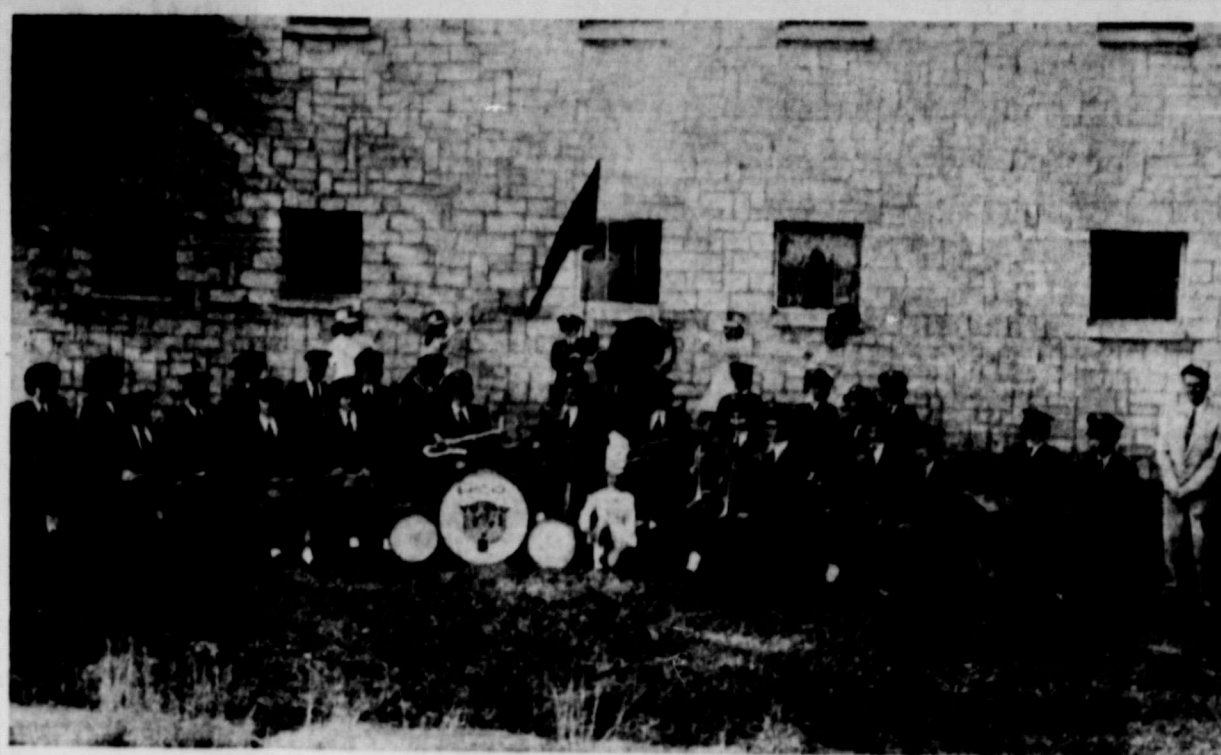

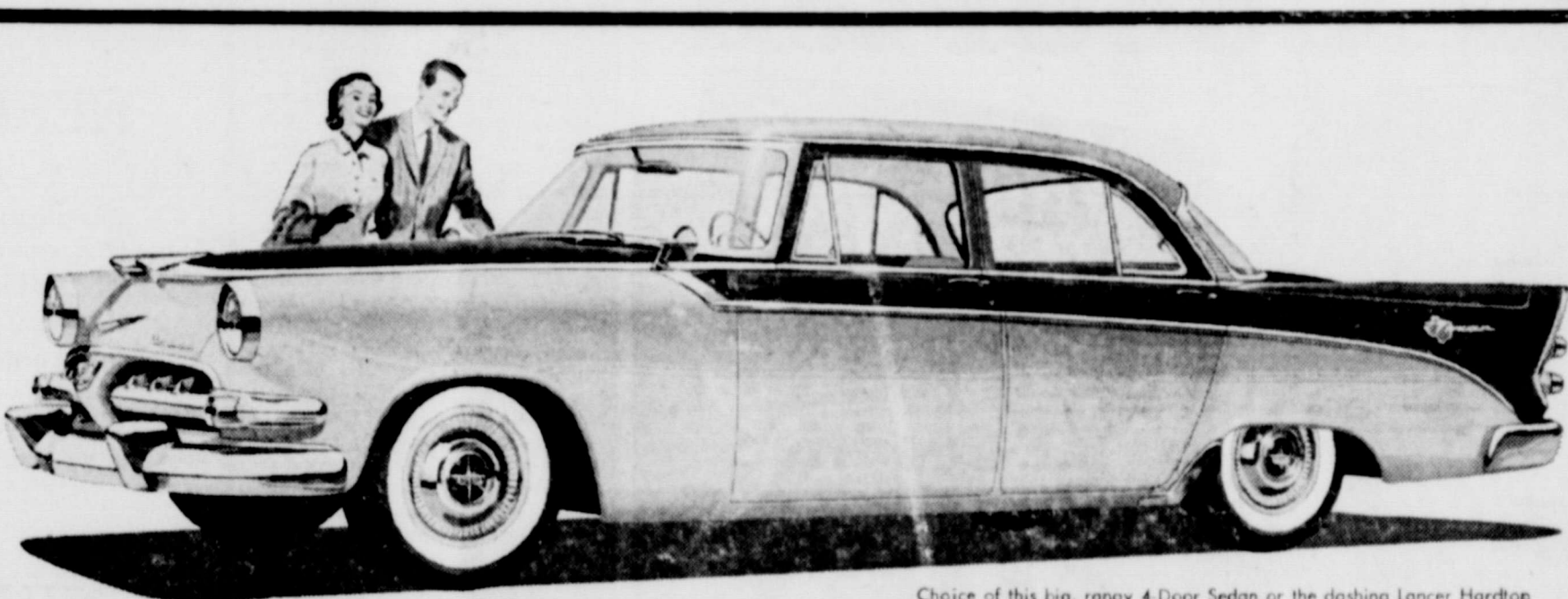

GRASS AS A CROP FOR 1956

Controlled crop production, acreage restrictions and the proposed "soil bank" program will be factors to consider by farmers in Texas this year. Perhaps now is a good time to start planning a crop that is often overlooked by many farmers—grass.

Grass is a good crop or a poor one, depending on the attention given to it. It is a cheap feed—and that's important at any time. Farmers who are short of feed or cannot afford to buy it extensively are often able to lick the problem through pasture improvement.

Dairy cows get their best and cheapest feed from pasture. A good dairy cow on adequate pasture alone will give 25 to 30 pounds of milk a day. Pastures of average quality and production will provide daily the equivalent of 8 pounds of hay, 25 pounds of silage, and 4 pounds of grain.

On the average, beef cattle obtain 75 per cent of their feed nutrients from pasture and hay. Steers started on grass and finished by dry-lot feeding will use only half as much corn per 100 pounds of added weight as those fed in the dry lot altogether.

Grain-fed hogs are healthier and gain faster when allowed to graze. A combination of permanent and temporary pasture can save up to half of the concentrated protein supplement needed by pigs in a bare lot.

Poultry in good pasture eat about 10 per cent less mash and grain than they do in confinement. Ladino clover has been worth \$100 an acre as poultry pasture for egg production. Pasture is especially important in raising healthy, vigorous pullets for flock replacements. Green pasture for turkeys more than eight weeks old may save at least 20 per cent of feed required.

The state extension service and the Texas Department of Agriculture can furnish information of grasses suitable for the various sections of the state. For details write John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, Austin.

boarding house and the business area of Waco, and nearly always saw an old-time dray hauling big slabs of bacon, each of which would weigh almost as much as a marketable hog weighs today. The bacon was shipped in box cars, just piled up, having the salt on it, and was unloaded onto a dray for warehouse storing, or for transporting to retail stores. Two negroes were always on the dray, one a driver and the other a helper. The driver stood up on the load of bacon and being barefooted stuck his toes into the huge slabs of bacon to keep his footing while he drove the team.

The average farmer, such as my father, raised a bunch of hogs and had a killing or two in the winter and put up his side meat for spring and summer use. First we ate the shoulders and hams, and along in the spring got down to side meat. We never called it bacon, a word not heard then. It was side meat, or sow belly. It got pretty strong in the late summer and early fall, and we always welcomed the period in mid-autumn when salt pork was stocked in the local groceries. It was only partially cured and could not be kept very long.

and truth to tell it did not have a chance to remain very long, for we hungry fellows devoured it as a real rarity.

Our home was about an average of the period and for breakfast we had side meat fried and the grease gravy and biscuits, finishing with sorghum molasses, or maybe New Orleans sugar-house molasses. There were homes that did not have that much for breakfast, and the noon meal, always dinner in those days, was usually boiled dry beans with fat side meat, corn bread and occasionally, in season, some kind of green vegetables.

One hard year in the 1890's we had biscuits only for Sunday morning breakfast. Believe me

that was the real meal of the week. Ah, but we growing boys could sure hide the biscuits in those days. Some housewives baked little biscuits cut out with a biscuit cutter. But most women of those days pinched off a good-sized piece of dough, whirled it around in their hands and put it in the pan, patting it on top as they did so, and when the biscuits came to the table nice and hot and just fairly light, they really hit the spot. When you went to the field with hired men of that day they would express their appreciation of the women who cooked real man-sized biscuits, and in like-manner their near contempt for the woman who cooked the small delicate biscuits.

Well, "them days are gone forever," and now if we get any kind of biscuits at any time it is a kind of seven-day wonder!

In an early issue we expect to tell the story of a family of boys, near a dozen in number, all of whom became dentists in keeping with the tradition of the family.
