

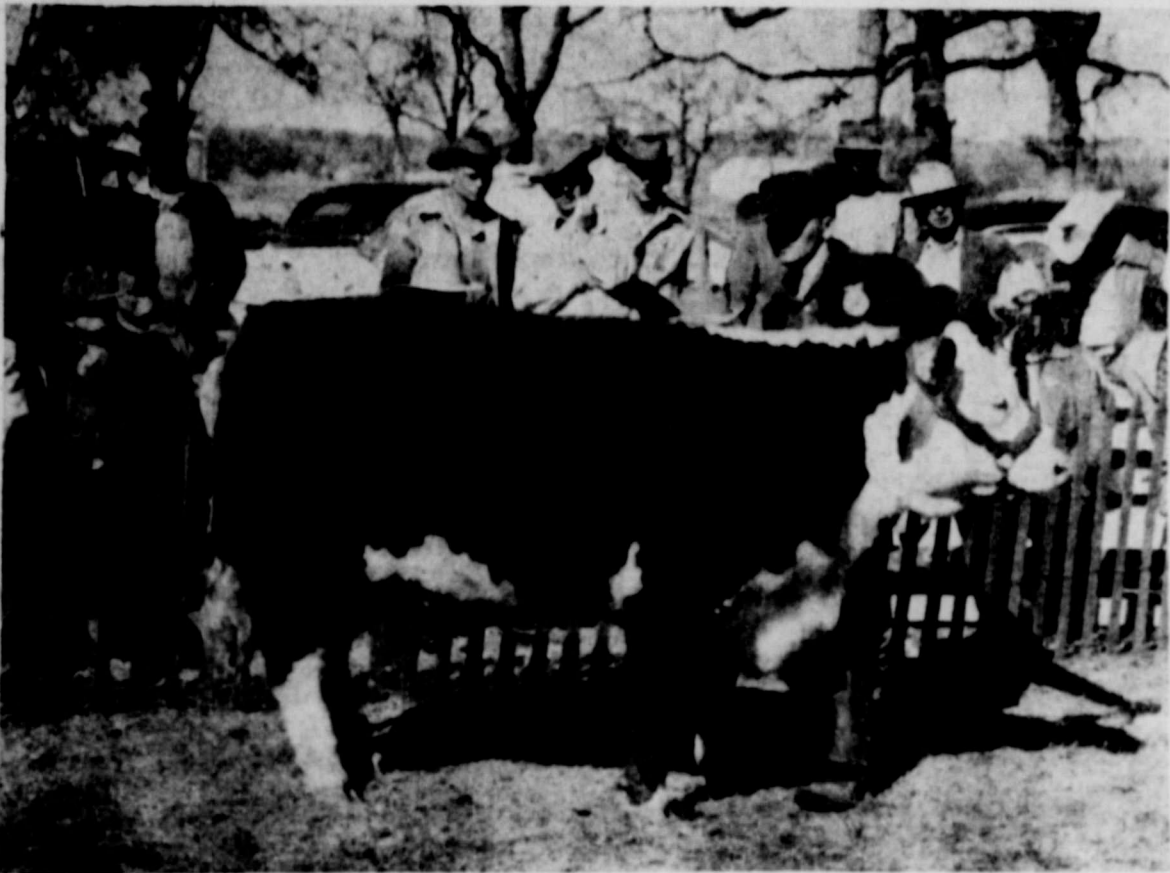

City Election Will Be Held Tues., April 3

Tuesday, April 3, is the date set aside for the general city election in Hico. Three places on the council are to be filled, and also the office of mayor.

Only four names appear on the official ballot. T. A. Randals is a candidate for mayor, and G. M. Bullard, W. C. Howard and Jim Jameson are the only names listed for aldermen posts.

Retiring from office will be J. B. Ogde, mayor, and H. W. Sherrard, O. L. Davis and Ernie Jacobs.

L. N. Lane has been appointed election judge, and he will be assisted by A. A. Brown, Mrs. Lorene Randals and Mrs. Ernie Jacobs, clerks.

Candidates seeking election have appointed Mrs. Marvin Marshall and H. H. Ramage as supervisors. They will be sworn in as officers of this election by the judge.

Gas Showing Is Encountered At Koonsman Test

A strong showing of gas was found at the Alvin Koonsman test well 5 miles north of Hico Tuesday afternoon. The well was treated by the sand-fracturing method, and late Tuesday night, recovery oil was still flowing.

Drilling has been temporarily delayed on the No. 4 location, one-half mile northeast of the Koonsman test, due to a breakdown on the rig, which occurred while moving. Activities are expected to start again the last of this week. Bargin Oil Company of Oklahoma City is doing the drilling.

ATTEND CLINIC

Watershed Finance Plans Outlined Friday

Duffau Now Being Served by Adequate Telephone Service

For the first time in history, residents of the Duffau community are being served with adequate and inexpensive telephone service.

Several months ago a group of interested citizens held a meeting with Gulf States Telephone Co. officials to try and work out a program whereby the residents could have the service.

After many hours of hard work and effort on the part of the people in that area, 22 subscribers are now being served, and the plan is apparently working fine. F. E. House and J. R. Lawrence were in charge of the organizing.

The new service gives the people in that community free service into the Hico office, whereas, before lines were run out there, they were being served by one phone, and a toll charge had to be paid from there to Hico.

Art Anderson, manager of the Stephenville and Hico offices said the service is apparently satisfactory with the residents. Under the plan, residents paid half the cost of running the lines and the company paid the other half. Monthly rental is reported very nominal.

Civil Defense Unit Organized Recently at Hico Meeting

Sgt. E. E. Ellsworth of Dallas met Tuesday night, March 20, at Firemen's Hall with a group of interested local people for the purpose of organizing a Civil Defense Unit locally.

Details were worked out, and the group will meet one night each month, date of which will be set later.

W. R. Hampton is in charge of the local unit, and the City Water Works Plant has been designated as observation post. Primary purpose of the unit is airplane identification.

Twelve persons signed for voluntary duty at the meeting.

Methodist Church At Clairette Will Hold Revival

Evangelist George Coats of Abilene will be preaching an Easter Revival at the Clairette Methodist Church, beginning Thursday evening, March 29.

There will be services each evening at 7:30 o'clock. The public is cordially invited to worship with them.

A proposed watershed protection and flood control project on the Bosque River moved a step nearer reality last Friday afternoon as members of the Bosque Watershed Association initiated planning for the institution of a special water control district at a meeting in the 21st District Courtroom in Stephenville.

Members of the association heard Bill and John Hamilton of Hurt Hamilton and Co., Inc., investment securities firm of Dallas; Clarence Crow of McCall, Parkhurst and Crow, attorneys of Dallas, and Marion Porter, Stephenville work unit conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, discuss the various phases of the project.

Crow outlined the procedures

necessary for the formation of a water control district with taxing powers, indicating that the first step is to compile a petition of at least 50 signers to be presented to the State Board of Water Engineers.

Should the board approve the petition, the next step toward formation of the district would be to submit the matter to a vote of the taxpayers (both personal and property) of the area covered in the district.

If formation of the district is voted by the taxpayers, the district could then call for a vote on the bond issue necessary to finance the local cost sharing portion of the watershed protection and flood prevention program.

Officials have estimated that the local share of cost of the project under the current program would be around \$300,000 and the investment securities representatives stated at the Friday meeting that on a bond issue to be paid in 30 years, based on an assumed evaluation of \$12 million for the covered area, the tax rate per \$100 evaluation would be in the neighborhood of 20 cents.

At a meeting of the watershed association board of directors and steering committee following the general meeting an agreement was reached with Hurt, Hamilton and Co. for the firm to serve as bond consultants on the project and with McCall, Parkhurst and Crow to handle the legal aspects of the endeavor.

Messrs. Hamilton and Porter were to meet Tuesday to work out a map of the watershed showing the watershed drainage area tied into the survey lines.

Following this meeting, the law firm will then work out the form of the petition and will check with the tax assessor-collectors in the watershed to determine the assessed valuation of property and work out a more accurate tax rate estimation.

Representatives of the firm will then meet with the board of directors of the association and the latter will select various members to circulate the petition.

Porter pointed out at the meeting that had the watershed program been completed before the spring flood last year the loss in Stephenville would have been reduced from an estimated \$230,000 to about \$15,000.

He detailed the seven necessary steps to be made in getting approval of a watershed project by the federal government and stated that if the water control district is formed and a bond issue is voted then the State Soil Conservation Board would be authorized to set a priority for the local project.—Stephenville Daily Empire.

Top Honors In Stock Show Won By Local FFA Youths

Top honors in the 9th Annual FFA Stock Show and Sale held last Thursday at City Park went to Buddy Teague, who showed the grand champion beef heifer; to Roland Sherrard, who had the grand champion feeder calf, and to Charles Stipe, who showed the champion fat calf. Stipe also exhibited the third place fat calf, and Sherrard placed second in the division with his other entry.

Charles Stipe has won \$89.50 in prize money on his champion fat steer, which sold to Odis Petsick at the Thursday sale for \$297.60 in the auction. Roland Sherrard

showed the grand champion calf which also won the feeder calf class. His calf was purchased from the Weathers Ranch south of Hico. Buddy Teague showed Proud Francis to the grand championship in the beef female competition. The judge, Y. B. Johnson, in giving reasons on the class, said that Buddy could show his heifer anywhere in the country and do well. The calf has earned him ribbons in every show she has entered, as well as the \$2,000.00 scholarship to Texas A & M. won recently at the Houston Show.

It Happened Here or Near

What is a boy? To begin with he is an animal, of the genus Homo. He is also a male. And he is mostly appetite. Ma used to say of us boys, there were eight of us, "I believe you boys are hollow from your heads to your heels." She would pour beans and bacon and biscuits, butter and beef and brown bread down us three times a day, and yet we were never able to say "enough!"

Boys are clear-eyed, squint-eyed, bleary-eyed, dreamy-eyed and dewy-eyed; likewise eyed by the girls with interest, by mothers with affection, and by dads with suspicion, for he was once a boy himself. Some boys resent being the focus of so many eyes but a majority of them like it, especially the way the girls cast sheep's eyes at them. (Now, that "sheep's eye" business I have heard all my life but have never learned just what it means.)

Boys are what you make things of. They are the only thing that men can be made of. They are also what criminals are made of. The frightful wave of vandalism that is going on over the country is due to boys who are turning out to be

a bad product instead of being men.

Bob Jenkins, pastor of Amelia Church, Beaumont, tells in a recent church bulletin that he and a bunch of Beaumont pastors went to Huntsville to visit the State Penitentiary, and were the guests of State Prison Manager O. B. Ellis for an hour in his office. Bob says that through a window of the room in which they were meeting could be seen a recreation field within the prison walls, and a great number of the prison inmates out on the field, it being the noon hour. Mr. Ellis seeing the eyes of his visitors focussed on the prisoners, said, "Ninety-five per cent of those boys out there were never in a Sunday school." Mr. Ellis has stressed many times, according to the state press, the fact that religious influences have been lacking in the lives of the overwhelming majority of the criminals of Texas. And he has urged upon every fitting occasion that churches constantly enlarge their Sunday school work so as to exert a saving influence upon our

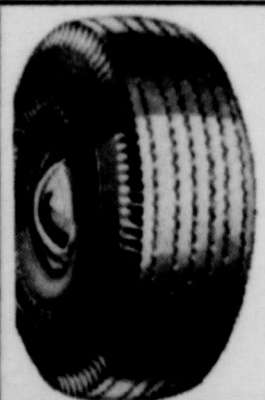

Home Nursing Course Is Completed by Local Ladies

Twenty-two ladies of Hico and surrounding territory were enrolled in the Red Cross Home Nursing course. Twenty of these completed the course, which was taught by Mrs. Rosellen Davis, homemaking teacher at Hico schools.

This course was to better acquaint the ladies with the care of home patients, how to give a bath, to care for the helpless patient, to make the patient more comfortable while in bed, to preserve the homemaker's strength at all times, also how to recognize the more common illnesses, such as the flu, a cold and so on. We were taught to make a paper bag for the disposal of waste, and how to care for all waste.

There are so many things that we learned, it would be hard to say just what was the most useful, or helpful, to us. In other words ladies that did not take this course can't possibly begin to realize just what you missed. This was to prepare us in case of emergencies, whether in our home or elsewhere, to know what to do is a great help. It might save a life, or much suffering. It gives us a more secure feeling to know how to do, with what we have at hand.

We are indebted to Mrs. Davis for this course, also to Mrs. Lenard Weaver, the local Red Cross chairman in Hico. Texas and U. S. farmers are just like business men—everyone is interested in making a return on invested capital. How did the farmer come out in 1955?

Agriculture demands a big investment in land, improvements, tools and machinery. Last year, the nation's farmers had an equity in farms of about 95 million dollars. In addition, farm operators and their families did 11 billion hours of unpaid work on their land.

For this capital investment, and for all this labor, the farmers collected a total of 11 billion dollars in 1955.

This means that if we allow farmers and their families a return of \$1 per hour for their labor then they had nothing left at all for a return on their investment capital last year.

However, let's say we allow farmers a 3 per cent return on their \$95 billion investment. This would be giving them 2.85 billion dollars on their capital.

In such a case, subtracting the capita gain from total income, the farmer would have earned only 74 cents an hour for 11 billion hours of labor.

All this points out a curious situation. It appears that the best thing for farmers to do is to sell out and invest all their money in a good safe company that would give them a 3 per cent return. Then, any side job, including ditch-digging, would at least pay them the minimum wage of 90 cents or more an hour.

These figures are, of course, national totals. It is true that many of our farmers get returns to capital and labor that are higher than average. But also, many farmers obviously get returns that are far below the national average. Unless some immediate relief is found in the form of a new outlook for American farmers is not much improved over the dim picture immediately past.

Last week here in town we had another very successful stock show put on by the boys of the Hico FFA Chapter. These boys are certainly due much credit for their efforts in this. And Harold Walker, to, for the splendid manner in which he is training his boys in leadership.

You know, when you go to a stock show you always see a lot of grown men doing all the necessary work to make such a show possible. But this not so here in Hico. Harold gets his boys assigned to certain duties, turns it over to them and they carry on to perfection. I think this kind of training is worth just as much to a boy as getting in the ring and showing a calf, or lamb or hog.

Leadership training now will be worth more to more boys in the future than showing some kind of livestock, I think.

To all the Hico FFA boys, I'd like for you to know I get as much pleasure watching you handle the affairs of your show as I do watching you show your projects.

Many of you have received samples of Hybrid Grain Sorghums to plant this year for trial purposes. You will be able to contribute greatly to the further development of these if you will keep a few records. One point of importance is to put down the date the seed is planted, another one is to observe the date the blooms appear, and the third one is to combine the sorghums in the same manner in which you normally combine and weigh the production.

These items, if as accurate as you can get them, will hasten the future development of the hybrid sorghums. There is need by the plant breeders to know the above information and should they get it at their research farms, more time would be taken in getting the varieties out to the general public for planting.

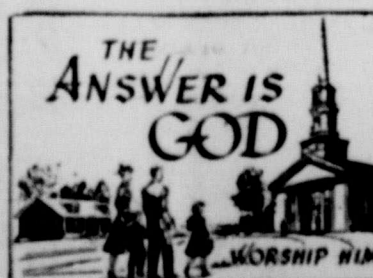
GENE BUTLER
